DRUGS AND THUGS

Is the rule of law breaking down in Wicklow? This is the question many residents are asking after a number of gang related violent incidents.

Bray father of two Stephen Somers (27) is in a critical condition after being shot a number of times last Wednesday evening. The victim was sitting in the passenger seat of a car with a female companion at St Laurence's Terrace in the Dargle area, when a gunman approached in a dark car, firing several times through the window.

The victim was shot a number of times in the chest and body but was understood to be responsive when paramedics arrived. The man is believed to be known to Gardai but a motive for the shooting is not

immediately clear but is believed to be drug gang related.

Also recently three masked men armed with baseball bats forced their way into a home in Ashford and terrorised a family. They said they wanted to speak to a young man that lived there but who wasn't present at the time. There have been similar incidents reported in Arklow and Wicklow Town where thugs used axes to smash in front doors. The common denominator seems to be the thugs' total lack of fear of the consequences.

Independent councillor, Joe Behan said "The savage shooting on Wednesday night has shocked the people of Bray. While the victim's injuries are thankfully reported to be not life-threatening, this incident is deeply troubling as it is yet another gangland style shooting in Bray.

"I am deeply concerned that the rule of law is being undermined by criminal elements, who are becoming more ruthless in their activities and who do not put any value on human life. The fact that these shootings are happening in places where innocent bystanders or passers-by

could also be killed or injured should be of added concern to everyone.

"As a member of the Co. Wicklow Policing Committee, I have raised the issue of Garda resources in the entire county of Wicklow, including Bray on many occasions. I am extremely concerned that there are not enough Garda personnel available to deal with this rising threat of gangland crime particularly in urban areas of our county.

"The Gardaí in Bray and County Wicklow do a magnificent job but there are not enough of them. It is time that this Government treated Bray and County Wicklow the in the same way as other urban areas in the big cities who are subject to rising levels of serious crime. There should be an immediate increase in

Garda personnel at all levels to stamp out this growing scandal of gangland crime."

Responding to the shooting Bray based TD, John Brady condemned it and called on the Justice Minister to deliver all necessary personnel and resources to An Garda Síochána to apprehend those responsible.

The Sinn Féin Deputy said; "The shooting on Wednesday evening has been roundly condemned in the strongest possible terms by the local community. This shooting took place in a highly populated part of the town that has already seen much grief in the recent past as the shooting took place adjacent to where our two brave firefighters lost their lives."



BE VIGILANT FOR MENINGITIS AS CASES ON THE RISE

Minister for Health Simon Harris has advised people to make themselves aware of the symptoms of Meningitis as the HSE are reporting higher occurrences in recent weeks.

Signs and symptoms may include: Fever (sometimes with cold hands and feet); Joint or muscle pain; Rapid breathing; Severe Headaches; Drowsiness; Discomfort from bright light; Neck stiffness; Vomiting, stomach cramps and diarrhoea; Non-blanching rash may appear which may be tiny red pin pricks that may develop to purple bruises. This rash does not fade under pressure.

The HSE have advised that eleven cases have been notified to the Health Protection Surveillance Centre (HPSC) since the last

week in December. Three patients diagnosed with meningococcal disease have died. All three deaths were directly due to this infection.

The eleven cases notified in week 52 2018 and week 1 2019 compares to 5 cases for the same time period last year. In 2018 a total of 89 meningococcal cases were notified compared to 76 in 2017.

Minister Harris said: "The HSE have advised of a spike in the reported cases and for this reason, I am really eager to make people aware of the risks. Meningitis can be very serious and it is really important that people are

aware of the symptoms. It is really important that people have their vaccinations up to date also as we do have vaccinations against certain strains. I would urge everyone to take a few minutes to read the HSE's advice on the issue by visiting : www.hse.ie.

According to Dr

Suzanne Cotter, Specialist in Public Health Medicine, HSE Health Protection Surveillance Centre, "If anyone has any concerns about meningitis they should ring their GP in the first instance. Meningitis and septicaemia often happen together and symptoms can appear in any order. Some may not appear at all. If someone is ill and getting worse, get medical help immediately. Parents of children should also check that they are up-to-date regarding their childhood meningococcal vaccinations."

'Catch-up programme needed for MenB vaccine'

Social Democrats Spokesperson for Children, Councillor Jennifer Whitmore, has called on the Minister for Health to introduce a Meningitis B catch-up vaccination programme for children and young adults born before October 2016, when the current HSE vaccination programme was introduced.

Councillor Whitmore said "Vaccination is our main way of preventing the spread of these kinds of life-threatening diseases. Many parents might feel secure because their children have already been vaccinated with the six in one vaccine. However, the Meningococcal B strain has only been included in the HSE's vaccination programme since October 2016.

"This means that children who received their vaccinations before October 2016 will only be immunised against Meningococcal C. However, the age groups that are most vulnerable to Meningococcal B are the under 1s, under 5s and teenagers. The latter two cohorts will not have received any protection against this disease under the current vaccination programme.

"The HSE should provide catch-up vaccinations for children and young adults. The vaccine injections cost hundreds of euro, so it's vital that people know they can bring their children and teenagers to their GPs for the vaccines without having to worry that they will be charged."

"This shooting like the previous fatal shooting in Bray Boxing club does not represent what Bray stands for, or the strong community in the town. That's why as a community we stand united in our condemnation of the violence.

"It will be vital in the days and weeks ahead for the Justice Minister to continue resourcing An Garda Síochána and provide any additional resources needed to apprehend those responsible and secure convictions.

"Thankfully the Garda Drug Unit which had been disbanded has been recently re-established. However Garda numbers in the area remain low and that needs to be addressed immediately.

"Unfortunately a dark cloud has been over Bray since the fatal shooting in Bray Boxing Club last September; however these are isolated incidents that don't represent the town. We must continue to build on the strong community in the town and all the positives. We do need the establishment to step up to the mark and tackle the senseless gun crime that's growing across the entire State."

Speaking the *Wicklow Times*, Minister Harris said, "The dedication of our Gardai is incredible and I know as a community we are all very grateful to them. I was pleased to have the Minister for Justice in Bray in recent months to meet Garda management with me.

"I am also pleased that the Drugs Unit for the district is now in place and that we are also benefiting from new Garda recruits in our community. I would hope the County Wicklow Joint Policing Committee could meet to be briefed by the Gardai and to discuss how best we can support their efforts."

A fire broke out in the building housing the Florentine Bar, Hilton's Pharmacy and Maguire McNeice Solicitors at 1.30am on the morning of January 4th. The main Street was sealed off for most of the day as fire crews from Bray, Greystones and Wicklow Town fought the blaze in the old building.

Three days later on January 7th a fire broke out at Pete's Pizza on the Main Street. It is understood that an electrical fault caused the blaze. Nobody was hurt in the incident but the premises will be unusable for the foreseeable future.

The third fire occurred at a residential address on Galtrim Road, breaking out in a garage attached to a house. The fire was quickly extinguished and did not spread to the adjoining house. The affected businesses were quick to react. Maguire McNeice Solicitors released a statement thanking the

community for their support and informing customers of their new premises at 5 Quinsboro Road. They said their records are securely stored digitally and customers could also reach them at their Greystones branch.

Hiltons Pharmacy is not thought to have been badly damaged by fire but rather smoke and water damage and will remain closed for the foreseeable future. Immediately after the blaze, pharmacists were available at their other branch in Cornelscourt and in the coming days they will move into the neighbouring premises 'Pink Bomb'. Pink Bomb has transferred their stock to Fitzmaurices Pharmacy and will hold their workshops at another location.

It is not known what plans are in place for the Florentine Bar. Owners left a message on their facebook page thanking people for their support and saying 'we'll see you soon'.

CASEY HITS BACK AT TÁNAISTE OVER PASSPORT REMARKS

Responding to recent comments made in the media by the Tánaiste and Minister for Foreign Affairs regarding passport applications, Pat Casey TD has said the minister's comments are "arrogant and out of touch".

Minister Simon Coveney made the comment that TDs' offices should not be set up as passport delivery offices. Minister Coveney was referring to the practice of TDs making representations to the Passport Office on behalf of constituents.

Fianna Fáil TD Pat Casey said, "Each year, very many of my colleagues in the Oireachtas make representations on behalf of constituents to support their needs. I make no apology that in my own office, we were pleased to assist many Wicklow residents last year to obtain their passport through a variety of means.

"The Minister has oddly seen fit in his comments to criticise his party colleagues and public rep-

resentatives for assisting and representing their constituents.

"It's easy for a Minister based in an urban constituency with its own Passport Office to criticise those of us representing Counties more isolated and neglected by Government. These are areas left in Wicklow without broadband services to apply online and are quite some distance from a Passport Office.

"Thousands of homes in Wicklow are without broadband - so the Minister's proposed solution to divert everyone to apply online is as distant and impractical to these households as the office on Dublin's City Centre Mount Street."

He added, "Staff in the Passport Office work

under tremendous pressure given the restraints on resources but there have been occasions when applicants have been forced to wait up to 45 days for a passport or have found themselves in an emergency when a passport is required within a short time frame.

"The Minister failed to acknowledge that pass-

ports are a service provided by the State but that citizens pay for. It must not be forgotten that the State and the Department obtain an income from the issuing of passports each year. It should be therefore seen as the customer and consumer lead service that it is as opposed to the one being espoused by the Minister.

"I take my role as a public representative very seriously and see my duty to represent the people of Wicklow in the manner which they request or seek be that a passport application or anything else. Time and time again we have seen a complete lack of understanding from Government of the matters facing ordinary people. These latest remarks are no different," concluded Deputy Casey.

Wicklow has lowest level of drink/drug driving in Ireland

Wicklow has the lowest ranked level of drink/drug driving in the country, despite a steady increase in the number of offences recorded nationally.

Recent Central Statistics Office (CSO) figures show that the Garda division of Wicklow recorded 8.28 drink driving detections per thousand of population. This was well under half the amount recorded in the highest district recorded, the Garda division of Cavan/Monaghan which stands at 19.11 per thousand of population.

The CSO figures show that detection rates are usually higher in rural areas while cities have more incidents of drug driving. However the assumption that drink driving is a relic from the past, predominantly carried out by older people was challenged by Garda Assistant Commissioner last month when he warned that 'millennials' are responsible for 30% of drunk drivers. Rural

Despite Wicklow's comparatively good driving behaviour, drink and drug driving is on the increase nationally, with the number of motorists caught in the past five years at 34,000 and rising.

In 2018 there were 149 people killed on the roads, 117 males and 32 females. 83 of these were drivers, 42 pedestrians, 15 motorcyclists and 9 cyclists.

Just under €500,000 in Outdoor Recreation Scheme Funding (Measure 2) has been announced for Co Wicklow Outdoor Projects.

Speaking as he made the announcement, Minister Simon Harris said "The Outdoor Recreation Scheme is a key funding stream for Co Wicklow as Outdoor

Reaction is one of the key strands of our tourism strategy. "I was honoured to launch the Co Wicklow Tourism and Outdoor Recreation Strategy in the Brockagh Centre, Laragh recently. The strategy document clearly highlights the importance of Outdoor Recreation to our local economy and well-being.

"At that launch, I reaffirmed my commitment to supporting the development of our tourism and recreation sector so I am very pleased to this morning announce €467, 300 for three key Wicklow Outdoor Recreation Projects."

The Varty Reservoir Walk, which was opened by the Taoiseach this summer, will receive €157,705 in funding from this scheme for an extension of facilities and car park. €160,000 is being allocated for the upgrade of the fantastic St Kevin's Way from Hollywood to

Glendalough. In Wicklow National Park, €149, 600 will be allocated for rerouting and repair works at The Spinc.

Minister Andrew Doyle said "I have no doubt that these improvements to The Spinc, St Kevin's way and Varty Reservoir will continue to attract many visitors to our county. As a newly developed walkway and amenity area, the Varty Reservoir, opened in June 2018, is a great example of a local community working with its local development companies and local authority to enhance its existing tourist offering and benefit the local area by bringing forward a project under this scheme."

Council, Cllr Pat Vance said: "Recreational tourism is a growing part of Wicklow's tourism offering, and we have seen an increase in the number of visitors enjoying the many walking trails which have been developed in Wicklow in recent years. This is generating income for rural areas and helping to create more jobs in the hospitality and leisure sectors".

The Chief Executive of the Council, Mr Frank Curran, congratulated all

those involved in submitting the excellent applications under the Outdoor Recreation Scheme, and thanked Minister Michael Ring and his officials in the Department of Rural and Community Development for the continued investment in the County.

He also thanked Fáilte Ireland who co-funded Measure 2 of ORIS, and County Wicklow Partnership and the wider community who worked with the Council in bringing forward these projects.

Five Wicklow Municipal District projects shortlisted for national awards

Wicklow Municipal District has been successful in its nomination of five shortlisted finalists in the 2019 All Ireland Community & Council Awards.

The five are: The Volvo Round Ireland Yacht Race - in the category Best Tourism Initiative; Marine House Hospitality Training Centre, The Murrrough, - Best Educational Building; Vartry Trails Project - Best Community Health Initiative; KWETB Riverwalk Cafe Culinary Entrepreneurship - Best Education/Training Initiative; Vartry Trails Project - Best Tourism Initiative.

Commenting on the nominations, Cathaoirleach of Wicklow Municipal District, Cllr Daire Nolan, said: "It was great news to see so many entrants from Wicklow shortlisted. It is testament to the hard work of all involved who bring these quality projects and events to Wicklow which help to enhance our everyday lives."

Now in their 13th year, the Awards aim to celebrate and recognise Councils and communities working together while also bringing national recognition to achievements that would otherwise go unnoticed.

The 2019 All Ireland Community and Council Awards, presented by IPB Insurance and LAMA (the Local Authority Members' Association) will take place on Saturday, 9th February in Croke Park Stadium.

Free public WiFi to be provided in three Wicklow districts

Three Wicklow Municipal Districts - Arklow, Wicklow and Baltinglass - are to get free WiFi hot-spots, thanks to a European funding initiative. Wicklow County Council was successful in its application to secure the three WiFi vouchers worth €15,000 each.

Dónal O'Keeffe, Broadband Development Officer, Wicklow County Council, confirmed: "This funding will enable the development of several free public WiFi hotspots within these districts, which will aim to enhance public space amenities for local communities. Work on the procurement process with the Department of Communications will commence this month along with the selection of locations of WiFi hotspots".

The vouchers were made available under the European Commission initiative,

'WiFi4EU'. A total of 59 vouchers were awarded around the country, representing 21 local authorities which will benefit from the project and combined Irish funding of €885,000. The funding will be matched by the Department, doubling the value of the investment in public WiFi networks.

According to Minister of State at the Department of Rural and Community Development, Mr Sean Canney TD: "This outcome shows how proactive local authorities in Ireland are and their determination to bring

connectivity to their areas. They are doing as much as they can to provide their communities with a much-needed service and their efforts and engagement need to be applauded.

"Each successful local authority now has 18 months to select locations for the WiFi4EU hotspots and complete their installation to be ready for public use. These locations need to be 'centres of public life' where no other free WiFi service is already available. The WiFi4EU service will be free of charge, free of advertising and free from

commercial re-use of data."

Minister of State Canney, said "The amount of work invested in this project by our local authorities should not be underestimated. It speaks to a shared commitment to improve free-of-charge public WiFi services and to bring down the cost of mobile data. Local authorities across Ireland now have an opportunity to install WiFi in their villages, towns and cities, in parks and hospitals, libraries and town squares and I wish them all the best in their endeavours."

Fines removed from all County Wicklow libraries

Borrowers who fail to return books to Wicklow Libraries in time will no longer face fines. As a result, Wicklow people are being encouraged to make a New Year's Resolution to reconnect with their local library.

From now on, library members through Wicklow, in line with a national move, do not have to pay fines for overdue items and no existing fines will be collected.

Any library user who has overdue items can return them now, confident there will be no fines to pay and their memberships can be reactivated on the spot, so they can begin using their local library again.

The removal of fines for library users is one of the actions included in the national strategy named 'Our Public Libraries 2022 - Inspiring, Connecting and Empowering Communities'. This strategy, launched in June 2018, aims to improve access to and increase use of the library as a community hub.

The five-year strategy is a joint initiative between the Department of Rural and Community Development, the County and City Management Association (CCMA) and the Local Government Management Agency (LGMA).

Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Pat Vance, said: "Libraries are an invaluable resource for all in the community and we want to remove any barriers that might prevent people making full use of them. That is why we are eliminating fines and other charges.

Libraries are welcoming spaces where all members of the community can access knowledge, ideas and information, and where people can reflect, connect and learn".

Wicklow County Council Chief Executive, Mr Frank Curran, stated: "Research has shown that people view fines as a

barrier to membership and usage of libraries. In addition, fines disproportionately affect those on lower incomes and can create a negative association with library use for children. There is evidence that library services which have removed fines see an increase in usage follow-

ing their removal and we very much hope that will be reflected now in Wicklow County Council's library network".

PROPERTY PRICES RISE €21,000 IN PAST YEAR

Property prices in Wicklow have risen by €21,000 in the last year, according to the latest MyHome.ie Property Report.

The report for Q4 2018 shows that the median asking price for a property in the county now stands at €320,000. While this was unchanged from the previous quarter, it is a 7% increase on this time last year when they stood at €299,000. The rise in prices was reflected in the asking price for a 3-bed semi-detached house in the county, which is also

unchanged from the previous quarter but is up 2.1% on this time last year from €293,000 to €299,000. Prices for this house type remain at their highest level in eight and a half years since they stood at €310,000 in Q2 2010. The asking price for a 4-bed semi-detached house in Wicklow rose by 3.5% in the last quarter from €362,500 to €375,000, putting them back at the

same level they were at this time last year. The number of properties for sale in Wicklow on MyHome.ie fell 9% in the last quarter but was up 16.2% on this time last year. The average time to go sale agreed on a property in the county now stands at four months. House prices nationally are expected to rise by around 5% in 2019 after slowing sharply in Q3 and stabilising in the last quarter of 2018 according to the latest house price report from MyHome.ie. The report, which is published in association with Davy, predicts that robust demand and rising incomes will continue to push house prices higher once the uncertainty of Brexit has been resolved.

813 dwellings added to Wicklow residential stock in 2018

A total of 813 residential address points in Wicklow were added to the GeoDirectory database in the twelve months to December 2018, according to the latest GeoView Residential Buildings Report, published by GeoDirectory.

Nationally, 21,207 dwellings were added. The vast majority of these new addresses were located in Leinster region (65.6%), with Dublin accounting for over a third (35.2%) of the overall total.

In December 2018, 461 residential buildings were classified as being under construction in Wicklow according to the GeoDirectory database.

There were 1,463 residential property transactions in Wicklow in the 12 months to October 2018, with 25% of these being new dwellings. Wicklow's vacancy rate is 2.6%, which is lower than the national average of 4.8%.

Dublin, Wicklow and Kildare were the only counties to record house prices above the state average. The average residential property price in Wicklow in 2018 was 355,092, higher than the national average of €284,546. Residential property prices in Wicklow increased by 6.5% across the twelve months, equating to €1,811 per month.

In Wicklow, the town with the highest average residential property price was Greystones (€458,785).

When Dublin is excluded, the average house prices falls to €207,135. The counties with the lowest average house prices were Longford (€106,813), Leitrim (€113,093) and Roscommon (€121,170).

Perfect grooming for dogs and cats

National Leakage Reduction Programme will improve water quality in Arklow

Irish Water, working in partnership with Wicklow County Council, is replacing ageing water mains in Arklow to improve security of supply, improve water quality and reduce high levels of leakage.

The works will involve the replacement of approximately 2700 metres of old problematic water mains with high density polyethylene (plastic) pipe material. Works commenced last week.

The works are part of Irish Water's National Leakage Reduction Programme which will reduce the high level of leakage across the country by fixing or replacing ageing water mains in the coming years. This contract is being carried out by Ward and Burke Construction Limited. Works are due to commence next week and will be complete by June 2019. Once complete, customers will benefit from a more consistent water supply due to the reduction in instances of bursts and leaks. The communities that will benefit from these works include Sea Road, Beresford Terrace, Wicklow Terrace, Worsborough Terrace, Seaview Avenue and Clogg Lane.

Explaining what's involved, Irish Water's Network Regional Lead Joe Carroll said: "The section of works will take place along the Sea Road (R750), from the junction with Ferrybank to the Cluain Árd junction. The works will also involve laying new water service connections from the public

water main in the road to customers' property boundaries and connecting it to the customers' water supply. Where the existing service connections on the public side are lead these will be replaced as part of this improvement work."

"Areas of work will be limited to short sections to minimise impact on customers. The works may involve some short-term water shut offs and the project team will ensure that customers are given a minimum of 48 hours' notice prior to any planned water shut offs."

"Traffic management will be in place during this time. Local and emergency traffic will be maintained at all times. We understand that this type of work can be inconvenient and works crews will make every effort to minimise any disruption these necessary works cause."

"Residents and businesses in the areas to benefit from the planned improvements have been notified and customers can phone Irish Water on Callsave 1850 278 278 if they have any questions about the project."

Irish Water regret any inconvenience these necessary water network improvements cause. Details of work in the area will be updated regularly on the Water Supply Updates section of our website.


WICKLOW RNLI ANNUAL SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE

Meeting with key public transport stakeholders held in Greystones

Public transport issues in the Greystones area was the topic of a local meeting last Monday with key public transport stakeholders.

There has been increasing frustrations in the Municipal District following recent changes to the bus and DART timetables and the privatisation of the 184 route. Key public transport agencies came to Greystones Municipal District offices to meet with the local representatives to discuss services. There were over 20 attendees.

Commenting on the meeting he convened, Minister Simon Harris said "I am pleased that all stakeholders confirmed their commitment to developing our public transport system. Our public transport network was starved of funding during the economic downturn and the impact has been very real for the people of Greystones and Co Wicklow. Where our train, Dart and bus services should have been developing, there was a standstill.

"As a Government Minister, I have been a strong advocate for increased funding for our public transport infrastructure. As the country's economy has stabilised, we as a Government, began a programme of strategic investment in public transport. In recent years €1.5-2 billion has been invested in our public transport in recent years.

"In Greystones, we have a fantastic asset in our train station however, it is absolutely vital that we are making the most of this asset. Our population is growing rapidly in Greystones and the sur-

rounding areas and nobody wants that to mean additional cars on our already congested roads. We have a train station and we have the demand - it is imperative that this is met by the expansion of our services. I am really pleased that Irish Rail are listening to this and have committed to increased capacity on existing services. They have also confirmed their commitment to finding a way to make Darts every 20 minutes possible. At the meeting, Irish Rail confirmed that this would involve significant alterations to the line. It should be remembered that the NTA's Bus Connects proposal is dependant upon a more frequent Dart service in and out of Greystones."

Speaking after last week's meeting Cathaoirleach of Greystones Municipal District Cllr Nicola Lawless said "The purpose of Monday's meeting was to get all key public transport stakeholders around the table and to discuss the strategic plan that we have compiled. Invitations were sent out to the National Transport Authority (NTA), Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII), Dublin Bus, Irish Rail, Bus Eireann and Go Ahead. We were very pleased that Dublin Bus and Irish Rail attended this meeting this morning and listened to what we had to say and took on board our plan. It was disappointing that the NTA would not attend as most of the long-term issues are

under their remit.

"I'm committed to improving our transport services; however key to this is an increase in capital investment. If we want to achieve a fully operational train station for Kilcoole, or a second line from Bray to Greystones which is badly need, commitment and funding is necessary. I will continue to use my role as Cathaoirleach to advance these and other transport issues in the district."

Cllr Lawless said she intends on organizing a follow-up meeting with the NTA, and she stressed the need for an increase in capital investment "If we want to achieve a fully operational train station in Kilcoole or a second line from Bray to Greystones". Speaking after the meeting, Cllr Derek Mitchell said "The DART Manager, Chris Rafferty said that all Greystones rush hour DARTs would be at least six cars and most eight. There had been some four car ones earlier which led to overcrowding.

"He is also to look to see how the service can be improved. Not much can be done currently about the diesels though they hope to provide a shelter at Kilcoole Station. Also they hope to widen the doors at Greystones Station to reduce pedestrian congestion.

"Councillors emphasised the need to cater for the schools. Dublin Bus felt they were now adequately catered for but wanted to know of specific problems which they

would consider. They hope to improve the bus stop at Templecarrick School.

"The NTA refused to attend but offered to meet in their premises. Councillors agreed to this and hope to meet in a month with the NTA and the providers. This will allow them adequate time to consider the many points in detail. So far this has been a useful process."

John Brady TD, who also attended the meeting, said "I must commend the councillors in the Greystones Municipal District who have started this important discussion on public transport, I particularly want to thank Cllr Lawless who in her role as chairperson has pushed this issue and now arranged three important meetings.

"From our engagement with the service providers it's clear that under funding is having an impact on the delivery of a proper and efficient public transport system.

"Both Dublin Bus and Irish Rail said that they are operating at capacity, so capital investment is critically required. We also need to be ambitious and plan for the here and now, but also the future.

"I believe that a feasibility study needs to be commissioned into running a second rail line south of Bray and also running the DART to Kilcoole and further. Provision also needs to be made for park and ride facilities, both for bus and rail."

Bray DART station's regeneration

A decision is due on February 15th on Wicklow County Council's planning application to regenerate the existing forecourt at Bray DART station, a scheme otherwise known as the 'Bray Transport Interchange Scheme'.



Wicklow County Council proposes to "Regenerate the existing Forecourt at Bray DART Station to create a transport interchange that strikes a balance between fulfilling the key functions of a transport interchange and providing a land-

mark civic space with a clear identity contributing to the local place function.

"The extent of the Bray Transport Interchange consists of the general forecourt area in front of Bray Station and incorporates sections of

Quinsborough Road, Adelaide Road and Florence Road.

"The proposed scheme intends to facilitate interchange between the key modes of walking, cycling, taxi, bus and railway, whilst providing a high quality public realm

that complements the heritage of the station building. In general, this will consist of works to footpaths including construction and realignments of kerb and channel lines, and provision of high quality paving setts and landscaping features."

N11 improvement & safety funding for 2019

Transport Infrastructure Ireland has announced funding of €2m for the Kilmacanoge safety scheme.

Welcoming the safety scheme, Cllr Derek Mitchell (FG) said "I hope it can be completed in 2019. This will provide a separate slower lane, Southbound, for exiting and business traffic similar to the Lucan Road and should enable an increase in through traffic speed.

"They have also allocated €1m to the design process for the major improvement works from Bray North to Coyne's Cross. This recently started with the public consultation session in the Glenview Hotel.

"I have been lobbying for this for many years am pleased money has been allocated to proceed." €5m has also been allocated to improving the N81 in West Wicklow for the Knockroe Bend improvements and pavement improvements.

St. David's refurbishment works to begin in July

Minister Simon Harris has confirmed that the Department of Education expect work to begin on St David's in Summer 2019. A former pupil of the school, Minister Harris has worked with St David's since his election to secure significant Government funding for the extension and refurbishment of the school.

The major building project for St. David's Secondary School, Greystones is at an advanced stage of architectural planning, Stage 2b (Detailed Design) which includes the applications for Planning Permission, Fire Cert and Disability Access Cert and the preparation of tender documents. All statutory approvals have been secured. The current status of the project is that the Design Team is in the process of completing the Stage 2(b) report which will be submitted through the Board of Management to the Department.

In September 2018, the

Department provided the updated project programme from its Design Team which indicated that the stage 2(b) report is expected to be submitted to the Department for review end February 2019. On this basis, the Department responded to the school confirming that it would be satisfied to authorise the commencement of the pre-qualification process to select a shortlist of contractors in January 2019. Upon receipt and review of the stage 2(b) report and completion of the pre-qualification process the project will then be pro-

gressed to tender stage. The school and its Design Team are currently programming construction to commence in July 2019.

Speaking about the school, Minister Harris said "I am always eager to work with our schools to help them to grow and develop. St David's Greystones is one of the schools I have been working with since I was first elected. After a sustained campaign working with the school community, I was delighted to secure the approval and funding for a major extension and refurbishment of the existing building. Although the planning

permission process and other issues did cause some delays, I am delighted that the Department have confirmed that they expect construction to begin in July 2019.

"St David's is a fantastic school in the heart of Greystones and this work has been long awaited. It will mean a major improvement to the school infrastructure in the area. I have invited Minister McHugh to visit the school to see the wonderful work they do and to highlight the need for urgent progress on the building project."

Frustration with slow progress on Delgany to Blacklion Road

The developer who has received permission for 74 houses by Dromont, Delgany, has appealed the conditions to Bord Pleanala.

Cllr Derek Mitchell said "I have been pressing for the Delgany to Blacklion Road to be completed for a decade as it has been planned by the Council since 1989! With four large schools on it, a proper road with foot and cycle paths, is badly needed so children can walk and cycle to school also reducing traffic.

"The planning conditions require the developer to pay Development levies of €700,000 and also to pay for the €1.2m cost of the road through his site. He reckons that this is €700,000 more than would be needed to

simply access only the houses as it is a better and longer bit of road. He has appealed this cost condition.

"Even when he completes this part the Council has to design and go to Tender for the rest





of the road. Council Management should have got this built a decade ago, before the big expansion, instead they seem to have built roads and other infrastructure in other areas which have hardly expanded."

Bray retains 'clean' status in IBAL ranking

According to the final litter survey of 2018 by business group Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL), Bray is again 'Clean' and in 27th spot in the ranking of 40 town and cities. While almost all of Ireland's main towns are clean, pockets of our cities continue to be littered and are not improving.

An Taisce, who carry out the surveys on behalf of IBAL, commented in its Bray report: "Bray has consistently retained its clean status without being able to eliminate certain heavily littered sites. The Main Street, Bray Civic Centre and Bray Promenade were all top ranking sites - they were not just good with regard to litter but were also very well presented and maintained. Litter problems persist at certain spots along Upper Dargle Road - this has been a problem site for a long number of years. Another heavily littered site was a miscellaneous building / site across from Bray DART Station - there were persistent litter problems, loose food related litter, throughout this site."

Minister for Communications, Climate Action and Environment Richard Bruton presented the awards at a ceremony on 6th January, crowning Fermoy as the cleanest town among those ranked according to litter levels in 2018, with Waterford City again Ireland's cleanest city.

Minister Bruton said, "Combating litter is part of a much wider challenge - how we use our resources effectively and adapt to recognise environmental damage more generally. Litter is a very tangible, visible example of the kind of damage that is being done. It is vital that communities, businesses and local authorities in towns all across Ireland, work together to manage waste properly and reduce litter. I hope the recognition these awards provide spur others on to come together to make changes in their local areas."
