## WILL ARKLOW LOSE THEIR 90 JOBS?

## The 90 jobs announced for Arklow last week with the proposed building of a data centre are already under threat.

The Arklow planning permission is imminent but the promoter of another data centre in Newtownmountkennedy which has full planning, maintains that there is only sufficient power available in County Wicklow for one data centre. His solicitors, Madigans, have written to Wicklow County council saying that granting permission for the Arklow site would 'premature' and be adding that if permission is grated "Our clients will take whatever steps necessary to protect their position.

speaking to *Wicklow Times* says he is baffled with what is going on with regards to proposed Data Centres in County Wicklow. "There is planning

permission for a Data Centre in Kilpeddar which is a very important project for North Wicklow, this is important to Kilcoole, Newtown, Greystones, Newcastle, Delgany and Bray. This is a shovel ready site, vital for jobs and the spin off for industry and provision of economic power provided by its operation. This permission is in

tion." Cllr Fortune says that there are a lot of questions that need answering: "People may recall that at the setting of our county development plan a couple of years ago that the county manager's proposal was for this planning (Kilpeddar project) to be de-zoned. At that time I put in a submission that this would not happen. I

was amazed at the time how difficult it was to have my submission approved.

"Why was the project proposed for de-zoning? I suggest that the IDA have questions to answer.

"It beggars belief that this project would not have been driven by all of the state agencies. Something does not stack up the more you reflect on it."

Cllr Fortune says that a root and branch review must take place, from 2008 to date "It needs to review all meetings regarding the Kilpeddar project, who met who and why and what was the outcome. It needs to review letters and emails. I get a real sense of unfairness about all this but my fear is it may he way beyond unfairness.

Local businessman Paul Kavanagh who describes himself as a committed member of the local business community said "I am more than frustrated to see the Kilpeddar Centre with full planning permission in Newtownmountkennedy having been put through the ringer in trying to

the ringer in trying to develop its business here in this town. I personally question the location of a second Data centre in Arklow on the same critical infrastructure of Gas supply and Power supply as that of the Newtownmountkennedy Data Centre. It's my understanding, if the Newtownmountkennedy Data Centre starts first: there is insufficient capacity for both Data Centres to work so there is a big problem."

# **PLANNED STRIKE AT SHS CALLED OFF**

Hundreds of workers in Wicklow-based Sunbeam House Services are to get improved pay following significant movement in talks between the HSE, Fórsa and the Wicklow-based intellectual disability service provider.

The union's Wicklow Health & Welfare branch confirmed last Thursday that a one-day strike scheduled for the following day was postponed on foot of the breakthrough

The long-running dispute centred on the HSE's refusal to provide Sunbeam with funds to restore pay lost when increments were suspended between January 2009 and January 2016. But the union has now received a formal proposal, which will see staff moved to the correct point of their pay scale from 1st May this year.

Last year, an overwhelming majority (87%) of Fórsa members in the organisation backed industrial action, after face-to-face discussions and a number of conciliation sessions in the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) and its predecessor, the Labour Relations Commission (LRC), failed to result in agreement to restore income lost during the recession.

A strike planned for last March was suspended after the HSE - Sunbeam's main funder - said it would validate the costs involved and allocate appropriate funding. That validation process was completed last June.

"But the HSE did not follow through," Forsa stated, "even though Sunbeam House management accepted that restoration was due, and had carried the liability in its accounts since incomes were cut in 2009."

Fórsa official Ryan McKinney said the staff's determination, and the prospect of further industrial action in future, had resulted in a clear agreement to restore lost pay. "This is a huge relief for staff, particularly because their very strong commitment to service users meant it was never going to be easy for them to take industrial action," he said.

Union members were invited to meetings in Arklow and Bray last Thursday to discuss the proposal in details.

Sunbeam House provides a range of supports, including residential places, to adults with intellectual disabilities at various locations in county Wicklow and south county Dublin.



present some challenges hen winter arrives. The R115 and R759 that cross the Sally Gap typically present the most difficulty. Much of these roads are above 400m altitude and they are not part of the current Wicklow County Council road gritting plan. When temperatures drop, these roads, in particular, tend to become unsafe for driving. Both roads are popular throughout the year, with beautiful views drawing many people to them. "If you must drive in

winter conditions, there are some things that will help avoid problems. Planning your journey is essential. Firstly, do you really have to drive a particular route? Have you looked for information about the route you intend to use? How will you get there, and back, safely? Is there another route where road conditions are better? Consider who you are travelling with. Are you bringing children or peo-

ple with reduced mobility? Do you have a plan to keep them safe if you run into trouble? If conditions are too difficult, turn around and find another route. Winter tyres, snow chains, and a snow shovel should be considered necessities. In addition, carrying some extra clothing layers and suitable footwear, a sleeping bag, extra food and water, and a fully charged mobile phone will be very useful if you do get stuck somewhere

"In Ireland, mountain rescue is a 24-hour voluntary service. All of our volunteers have a love of the outdoors, and understand the desire to spend time there. All we ask is that people respect our volunteers' safety by not taking unnecessary risks with theirs. If you find yourself in need of help in the mountains, call 999 or 112, ask for the Garda', and tell them that you need mountain rescue.

Almost €10m in funding to repair regional and local roads

Cllr

Co Wicklow is to receive just under €10 million in funding to assist the repair of regional and local roads in Wicklow.

This allocation will fund the following targeted road improvement schemes in Co Wicklow: Bridge Rehabilitation; Safety Improvement Works; Specific Imp. Grants; Training Grants; Drainage Works; Restoration Improvement; Restoration Maintenance; Supplementary Restoration Maintenance; Discretionary Grant.

There is  $\in$  70,000 allocated for the R755 Calary Road Realignment and  $\in$  249,500 for Bridge Rehabilitation Works on Regional and Local Roads including Knocksink Bridge, Enniskerry, Beechdale Bridge, Kilcoole and 10 others. €315,000 has neem allocated for Safety Improvement Works on Regional and Local Roads including Killincarrig Safety Improvements, the Dunbur Road Wicklow, the Florence Road & Adelaide Road Junction, Bray and 10 others.

Minister Simon Harris said:"I welcome the additional funding support of €9,910,890 to assist Wicklow County Council in progressing repairs to regional and local roads. 2019 will see a further significant increase in grant funding for regional and local roads, which I'm delighted to see. I know this funding will greatly assist in the repairs and ensure our road network in Wicklow is of the highest standard. These grants are to supplement Wicklow County Council's own resources and expenditure on regional and local road and are just part of the total investment in regional and local roads for this year.

# **Council issues second** warning letter regarding public access to Arklow's North beach

Wicklow County Council has issued a second warning letter in relation to the blocking of public access by a landowner to the North beach in Arklow.

Speaking after the second warning letter was issued, John Brady TD said "I have been working with local residents for a considerable time now. This is a fantastic local amenity that has been used by generations of Arklow people.

"I welcome the decision by the council to issue the second warning letter this week; a previous letter had been issued last June. The warning letter states that the named individuals have four weeks to respond to the alleged unauthorised development which has seen a fence being erected and locking of a gate to restrict public access to the local North beach.

"In the letter the planning authority states that they are satisfied that the fence that has been erected along the southern boundary is not exempted development, as it is enclosing land that has been used by the public for recreational purposes or a means to access the seashore during the 10 years preceding."

Deputy Brady continued "The protection of our public right of ways are very important and any attempts to restrict or curtail those rights has to be opposed. The right of ways to the North Beach and Porters Rock/Seabank areas in Arklow date as far back as 1896.

This is the second warning letter that has been issued; if no response or an unsatisfactory response is forthcoming the council must issue an enforcement notice and legal action if necessary.

Local Sinn Féin councillor Mary McDonald said "I have worked closely with local residents on this issue now for over a year now and have raised it consistently at meetings of the Municipal District where unfortunately it had seemed to fall on deaf ears.

"I welcome this second warning letter that has now been issued by the council and I will continue to work on this issue until the public have unrestricted access along the well established right of ways to our beautiful beaches."






