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90 JOBS FOR ARKLOW

IF DATA CENTRE GETS PLANNING PERMISSION

Echelon Data Centres Limited, a new Irish company based in Dublin, has announced that it will create 1,100 jobs through the €1bn development of data centres.

Echelon is to construct data centres in Clondalkin and in Arklow. The capacity available across the two facilities is the equivalent of approximately 34% of all operational capacity currently available in Ireland and 15% of that either planned or in development.

Planning permission has been granted for the Clondalkin site and is 'imminent' for Arklow. The 1,100 jobs to be created consist of 460 construction jobs and 100 operational positions in Clondalkin, and 450 construction jobs and 90

operational positions in Arklow.

Niall Molloy, CEO of Echelon Data Centres, said that the provision of customisable, scalable data centre facilities is key to the continuing growth of the digital economy, driven by social media, e-commerce, digital broadcasting and the internet of things.

Fianna Fáil Pat Casey TD said "This is the beginning of new era for Arklow and a game changer for jobs development in Arklow and indeed the South Wicklow region. For

years the old IFI site at Avoca River Park has been a metaphor for failed industrial development in Arklow. One of my top priorities for Arklow and the South Wicklow region was locally based jobs development.

"I have been working on this project with Crag Digital now Echelon for the past sixteen months. The initial investment is over €500 million and will transform this brown field site into a major data centre with 100 mega watts of capacity in phase 1 which will in turn attract

industries in the valuable technology and software sectors.

"Apart from the 450 construction jobs that will be needed for the substantial redevelopment of the site, the data centre will in turn initially employ 90 high skilled jobs and will in the future become a hub for a business park which is the model that US data centres have evolved into. Tech companies prefer to locate adjacent to these data centres and therefore the potential for not only Arklow but the South Wicklow region is very exciting.

"The old IFI site which began construction in the 1960's and at its height in the 1970's employed over 1,500 people, eventually closed in 2000 and has been a symbol of the lack of regional job growth not just in

Arklow but in South Wicklow. This is the perfect industry to be located at this site as there are limitations as to the type of development that can take place here and there are crucial infrastructural benefits such as grid connection and its location near the N11 only an hour's drive from Dublin Airport."

Minister Simon Harris also welcomed the news that Echelon Avoca is to create 450 construction jobs and a further 90 operations jobs in Arklow. "This investment is fantastic news for Arklow, especially as it's one that will use a number of Irish suppliers and domestic expertise in its delivery. Success breeds success and Echelon's new presence here in Co Wicklow will add to our increasing reputation as a great place to do business."

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SUNBEAM CENTRE NON-COMPLIANT IN MOST CATEGORIES

A recent inspection of a centre for adults with disabilities operated by Sunbeam House Services in Rathdrum found the centre to be non-compliant in seven out of nine categories.

The Dunavon Centre was inspected by HIQA (Health Information and Quality Authority) in October 2018 and the inspection report was published last week. The report states that "This inspection was in response to a notification received by the Health Information and Quality Authority

(HIQA) with regard to a resident who had engaged in a prolonged incident of self injurious behaviour on 6 October resulting in significant bruising to their body. Despite these injuries the resident had not been brought to their General Practitioner (GP) for a medical review until 10 October

four days after the incident. "It was also observed that on 30 September an on call doctor reviewed the resident in the designated centre and advised the centre to make arrangements for them to see their GP the next day. This appointment was not facilitated." The inspection report

further notes issues of oversight: "the current person in charge had responsibility for three centres overall. Taking into account the issues found on this inspection and the significant complex needs of the residents, the inspectors were not assured that the arrangements in place were sufficient to provide adequate oversight of the centre."

The inspection also found that: the roster was not adequately maintained as it did not indicate the hours staff worked; some information on file was not being updated and had conflicting information in relation to records kept pertaining to some residents; the centre did not have an adequate system in place to ensure that the service provided was responsive to the needs of the residents or effectively monitored; some actions as identified in the auditing process last April had not been addressed or were incomplete; the Statement of Purpose did not accurately reflect the service being provided to the residents and the process of managing risk required review.

Responding to the Compliance Plan for Dunavon, Sunbeam House stated that they had advertised and interviewed for a full-time Person in Charge and made a job offer, and had brought in extra staff to ensure adequate monitoring of the centre until a full-time PIC was in place. SHS have also updated the roster to clearly show the hours that staff work, residents' records had been reviewed and updated along with medication protocols.

SHS also stated they had taken steps to address issues with governance and management and health care, had updated their Statement of Purpose, reviewed and updated risk assessments for each resident and implemented positive behavioural support plans.

Donard Garda Station to open 'within weeks'

Donard Garda Station is due to reopen within a number of weeks once some minor works are completed.

Speaking on the announcement, Minister of State Andrew Doyle outlined, "The opening of the Garda Station in Donard is welcomed news for the community of Donard, The Glen and surrounding areas.

"Last year I discussed this issue surrounding the Garda Station in Donard with my colleague Frances Fitzgerald when she was Minister for Justice. I outlined the importance of this station for the rural community in West Wicklow. With fears surrounding rural crime, we must ensure that those living in these areas are not left vulnerable.

"I have received confirmation that the building itself is currently undergoing some minor works and when this is complete the station will reopen.

"Given Donard's location, on the foothills of the Wicklow Mountains and the close proximity of the N81, the reopening of the station will be a relief to many living in the area. The closure of the station in 2013 was a huge blow to the community and I warmly welcome the decision to have this community station reopened."

Lucky escape after ceiling collapse at Parkview Hotel

Customers of the Parkview Hotel in Newtownmountkennedy had a lucky escape last Tuesday evening when a huge section of the ceiling came away and fell to the ground. The ceiling appeared to collapse in one piece of approx 30x30ft.

Those present felt certain that had anybody been sitting underneath they would have been killed outright. Given the size of the ceiling that fell, it is almost miraculous that nobody was walking or sitting underneath it at the time. The Parkview Hotel declined to comment, saying the matter is currently under investigation.

Several local councillors were present at the time, participating in a local GAA meeting. The incident happened at approximately 8pm. A video of the immediate aftermath of the incident was circulated shortly afterwards on social media. One councillor is heard commenting on the effect the incident would have had on the upcoming local elections, if they had been sitting just feet from their meeting table.

A customer who was present at the time of the incident told Wicklow Times, "It was an awful fright. Thank god nobody was sitting underneath. There were no serious injuries as far as I could see but a couple of people sitting close to the fall might have had a few scrapes and a bit of a bang."

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SOCIAL WELFARE CLAIM ASSESSMENT 'A SHAMBLES'

Social Democrat Cllr. Jennifer Whitmore has branded the Social Welfare claim assessment process as a "shambles".

Cllr. Whitmore was reacting to figures that were released to Social Democrats Co-Leader Roisin Shortall TD by the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection, which gave details of social welfare applications that were overturned on appeal.

Cllr Whitmore said: "Questions have to be asked of a system that would appear to get it wrong on so many occasions. Figures released to Deputy Shortall show that significant numbers of applications for varying

categories of Social Welfare payments that are initially refused on application are then approved on appeal. The payments that have the highest number of decisions being overturned on appeal are for payments for people with disabilities or those caring for them. For example, over 60% of cases where a person appeals a decision to refuse Disability Allowance are overturned. There is clearly a massive problem with how the initial applications are assessed if the successful appeal rate is this high.

"Over 40% of Domiciliary Care Allowance and Invalidity Pension appeals are upheld, upwards of 35% of Disablement Benefit appeals are successful. The Minister needs to initiate a serious review of how applications for these payments are processed, there is clearly a problem when so many vulnerable people are allowed to slip through the net like this."

"There is something very wrong with decision-making systems that allow this to happen and it is causing needless concern for applicants and

more work and administrative costs for the Appeals Office. There is an obvious need for better expertise in the Department where the decisions are first examined so that time and resources are not wasted on appeals that shouldn't be necessary."

Cllr Whitmore ended by saying "I would urge anyone who was unhappy with a decision on an application for a payment such as this to make an appeal, particularly in light of the fact that the success rate of appeals is climbing."

Gardai investigate more Bray fires

Gardai in Bray are currently investigating two recent fires which occurred in close proximity and within a week of each other.

On Wednesday, 23rd January, in the early hours of the morning, two cars parked next to each other were set on fire outside a house in Dargle Crescent. Nobody was hurt during the incident and it's believed that the fire broke out in one vehicle and then spread to the other one. The car which first caught fire was observed to be fine at approximately 1am, and the fire is believed to have occurred just one or two hours later. Gardai have not yet established any cause for the initial fire.

Five days later, on Monday 28th January at approximately 8:30pm, a fire broke out in the first floor apartment of a building in the Dargle area, in the Ashbrook section on Greenpark Road.

The fire occurred in a first-floor apartment. There was nobody in the building at the time but extensive damage was caused to the building. Fire units from Bray and Greystones battled the blaze and succeeded in containing it to just one build-

ing. This fire is also being investigated.

Gardai in Bray told *Wicklow Times* they do not know yet the cause of either of the fires and are not yet following any leads.

Whitmore selected to run for Greystones local elections

Social Democrats councillor Jennifer Whitmore has been formally selected to run as the party's candidate in the upcoming Local Election for the Greystones Municipal District. Cllr Whitmore was new to politics when she was first elected in 2014, topping the poll in Wicklow and getting the highest female vote in the country.

Speaking after the selection convention last week, Cllr. Whitmore said "I am delighted to have been selected as the Social Democrats candidate for the elections in May. I have been honoured to represent the people of Greystones, Delgany, Kilcoole and Newcastle over the past five years.

"One of the most enjoyable aspects of my term has been working with local communities on a broad range of projects across the District. A recent example is the Greystones' Inclusive Playground, a new standard in playgrounds where children of all ages and abilities can play together side-by-side. I am very proud to have been a part of that project, and to have worked hand-in-hand with a great local committee and Wicklow County Council to drive this important project to conclusion. Other projects that I have worked on include the widening of the paths to St. Laurence's school in

Delgany, the pop-up Garda clinic in Delgany Village, jobs clubs in Kilcoole and the installation of a wheelchair accessible gate at Kilcoole train station, amongst others."

Cllr. Whitmore has also played a role in the provision of education for the area, as Chair of the Greystones CNS and as a board member of Colaiste Chraobh Abhann. "The Greystones District has had a difficult history when it comes to providing sufficient schools places for children and I have worked hard to lobby for both primary and secondary school places for the area. I am hopeful that the new

schools that are planned will meet that demand, but I will keep a close eye on this to ensure that our growth in population runs parallel to the provision of school places. I am particularly looking forward to seeing the completion of the new primary school for Charlesland, which is due to open in September of this year, and of which I am Chairperson."

Cllr. Whitmore, whose background is in environmental law and natural resource management, has also focused on environmental issues and was one of the team of specialists that fought to save the Vartry River from over-extraction. "Following on from a successful conclusion to that campaign, we have now established the East Wicklow Rivers Trust, which has the aim of protecting the river systems that rise in Wicklow and flow into the Irish Sea. The environment will continue to play a large part of my focus if re-elected. In

addition, I am very keen on continuing to work for co-working spaces for the area, and better public transport, both for commuters and residents."

Whitmore concluded "I would really like to thank everyone that has supported me over the past five years, and in particular all of the local community groups that work so hard on a voluntary basis to make sure our district is a great place to live. The greatest asset we have is our communities and I would be honoured to be able to work with them for another five years achieving positive results for our area."

So far, the Social Democrats have confirmed two candidates for the Wicklow local elections in May - Cllr. Jennifer Whitmore for the Greystones Municipal District and Dave McGinn in the Baltinglass constituency. They are planning on fielding more candidates in Wicklow over the coming months.

SURPRISES IN BRAY LOCAL ELECTION

Three sitting councillors not to run

With just under four months until the local elections, the Bray Municipal District is shaping up to be one of the more interesting constituencies to watch, with big changes in store for the new Council.

The decision was taken last year by the Local Electoral Area Boundary Committee to divide the Bray District into two four-seat electoral areas, known as Bray West (including Enniskerry, Kilmacanogue and Powerscourt) and Bray East (including most of the town and seafront area). Together they will form an eight-seat Bray Municipal Borough District.

The big news for the Bray area is the retirement of three big names from the existing Council, who will not contest the election in May. Councillor Pat Vance (FF) presumably thought there is no better time to bow out than as Cathaoirleach of both Wicklow County Council and Bray Municipal District.

Councillor John Ryan (FG) shocked supporters

last week by making the decision to bow out. Councillor Ryan, who is CEO of Great Place to Work, said the demands of his job meant he could not give the role the time and attention it deserved. He said he remains passionate about Bray and hopes that any new councillors will put the interests of the town first. "I'm a little frustrated that I won't get to see projects that I worked on come to fruition, such as the Florentine Centre and the 42 houses at Ballywaltrim but I'm confident that they are on track." Councillor Ryan said he would be canvassing for new Fine Gael candidates.

Rumours have been circulating that Independent Councillor Christopher Fox has made the decision not to contest this election, however numerous calls to

Councillor Fox were not returned. Councillor Fox would be one of the few 'safe seats' in the constituency, so news of his rumoured retirement has come as a huge surprise.

Fine Gael organisers in the Bray area told *Wicklow Times* that Aoife Flynn, who works at Sunbeam Services would be putting herself forward for selection as a candidate for the west ward. The Fine Gael Bray selection convention will take place on February 17th. As of the time of going to press there was no Fine Gael candidate announced for the East Ward.

Fianna Fail already announced Chirs Walsh as their Bray East candidate but have not as yet given any indication as to who they will run in the west.

Sinn Féin has already declared their two candidates, co-opted Councillor

Dermot O'Brien in the West and new candidate Grace McManus in the East.

The Green Party will announce their candidates this week, it is expected that sitting Councillor Steven Matthews will contest in the East ward.

The Labour Party is running former Councillor and TD Anne Ferris in the east and Ian McGahon in the West.

Peadar Toibin's new party Aontu will run two candidates, former Sinn Féin Councillor Oliver O'Brien and former Independent Councillor Brendan Thornhill.

Sitting Councillor and former TD, Independent Joe Behan will contest the election in the West ward.

It is expected that a number of new independents will also throw their hats in the ring in the coming weeks.

Dalton selected by Sinn Féin to run in Wicklow East

Sinn Féin's local area representative Muireann Dalton was formally selected to contest the upcoming local elections in the Wicklow East electoral area.

Dalton has a history of community activism, trade unionism and political activism.

She said "I am delighted that the membership of Wicklow Sinn Féin have put their faith and trust in me to run for election and be the new voice of the people in Wicklow East. It's thrilling to be part of such a strong and supportive Sinn Féin team.

She went on to say "I have been a community activist for many years, having helped organise and manage a number of different groups. I have also been heavily involved in my Trade Union, MANDATE and was a shop steward and headed the decency for Dunnes workers campaign.

"I also played a leadership role in the Right2Water and Right2Change campaigns and this is what has encouraged me to step into politics. I have seen that progressive change is possible if we stand up together and demand it, and that's what Wicklow County Council needs at this time, fresh thinking and a progressive outlook on political policies for Wicklow."

Dalton concluded "I would like to thank all my family friends and supporters; I would also like to thank Deputy John Brady and the rest of the Wicklow Sinn Féin team for their ongoing support. 'KING OF SPRING' HONoured IN WICKLOW TOWN

Wicklow Olympic athlete Peter O'Connor has been honoured in his home town with a plaque in his memory unveiled on Ashtown Lane.

Peter was an Olympic champion, a World Record holder and an Irish nationalist. His world long jump record of 24ft 9" achieved at the Royal Dublin Society's grounds in 1901 stood for 20 years while his Irish record of 24ft 113/4ins stood for 90 years.

He won a Gold Medal for the Hop Step and Jump competition in the Olympics of 1906 held in Athens and a Silver for the Long Jump.

The O'Connor family lived at the gate lodge off Ashtown Lane where Peter's father, Edward,

was caretaker of the newly completed reservoir.

Peter was an accomplished athlete and in 1906 took part in the Intercalated Games in Athens. Ireland did not have an Olympic Committee at the time and the Greeks ignored the Irishmen's independent entries and included them on the British team.

He was placed second in the long jump and the three Irishmen mounted an international protest when Peter scaled the 20ft pole and unfurled a large green flag. His fellow ath-

letes, Con Leahy and John Daly, stood guard at the base as the organisers had wanted a Union Jack to fly if any of the three won a medal.

Some days later, Peter took part in the Hop Step and Jump competition and came first, winning a Gold Medal.

Back in Ireland, Peter had a lengthy legal career in Waterford. He was a founder member of the Waterford Athletic Club and also Vice-President of the Incorporated Law Society of Ireland.

Speaking at the unveiling of the plaque, Mr

Frank Curran, Chief Executive, Wicklow County Council, said "This is a wonderful story of a man who was reared in Wicklow and who won two Olympic medals in the 1906 Intercalated Games in Athens and who not only held the Irish Long Jump record for 90 years but also held the world record for 20 years."

He said it was only right and fitting that we pay tribute to him in Wicklow, particularly as he perfected his hop, step and jump from the doorstep of his family home in Ashtown Lane and which may have been instrumental in his Gold Medal win in Athens in 1906.

The plaque was unveiled by Peter's great grandson, Mark King, who is author of the book, "The King of Spring". Mark himself is an International Chess Master and has represented Ireland at seven Chess Olympiads.

Cllr Daire Nolan, Cathaoirleach of Wicklow Municipal District, described Peter O'Connor as "one of Ireland's greatest athletes of the early 20th century" and gave a special welcome to members of the O'Connor family.

Wicklow Municipal District, he said, was happy to honour and highlight the achievements of Peter who had spent a large portion of his life growing up in Wicklow.

Wicklow Municipal District Meeting Report

Wicklow prepares for St Patrick's Day

A sum of €1,500 is to be given towards those volunteering to organise the Wicklow St Patrick's Day parade, councillors decided at last week's Municipal District meeting.

Councillors also suggested that if there was any surplus available closer to the time, that this be given over as well. Cllr Mary Kavanagh said that the parade always "benefits the whole town".

The Twinning Committee has requested funding in the lead up to the hosting of international visitors for the St Patrick's Day Parade. Last year the committee received €4,200 from Wicklow Municipal District and it has requested the same again.

Councillors have decided to hold further talks with in the next week regarding this allocation of funding.

Councillors heard that

45 members of a German Brass Band, hailing from the area of Eichenzell-Fulda, will be coming to Wicklow Town for five days along with fellow travellers. The band are looking to take part in both the Wicklow Town and Greystones parades. The funding will be used to pay for busses to and from the airport as well as local hospitality, not including accommodation.

Cllr Irene Winters has been involved in hosting such visitors since before she was a councillor, and said "When people from Ireland go over there, they are hosted and they are really well looked after. Some of the people in the town that are

involved are really closely bonded and the people really do see us as family, they have a much more personal view of it than we have here. They see us as their friends, their European cousins".

Cllr John Snell and Cllr Kavanagh raised concerns about costs associated with the hosting of people from the twinned towns. Cllr Snell said that the Wicklow Municipal District have "always been very supportive" but wondered what Greystones Municipal District contributed to the hosting, considering that the visitors would also take part in that parade.

Cllr Kavanagh said she was concerned about councillors lacking under-

standing as regards what the money would be used for and what itinerary the Twinning Committee might have for the visitors. Cllr Kavanagh added that she feels "We pay money for this but we're no wiser as to what's happening, we're not getting informed. It would be nice to just be kept in the loop".

Cllr Winters explained that the councils abroad have a different hosting set up, in that they can bring the visitors into their Town Hall and host them with a dining area. She added that in that way, "it doesn't cost them the same as how it costs us" and suggested that she talk to the Twinning Committee and about bringing down their costs so that the money goes further.

Over €1m to be spent on Wicklow Municipal District roads this year

An estimated €1,061,760 will be the total cost of road works in the Municipal district for the year ahead. The type of road works to be delivered by local authority engineers include overlays, surfacing and tarmacking as well as recycling of old roads.

Overlay works are scheduled for the Sallygap area, the road from Ballinahinch to Newtown and the Main Streets of both Ashford and Roundwood. Although surface dressing is planned for the Dunbur to Kilpoole area in Wicklow Town, Cllr Gail Dunne pointed out that money had been allocated to fix the pedestrian crossing on Dunbur Road in last year's discretionary fund.

Expressing his concern he said "Nothing has been done. The road itself, the surfacing, it's falling apart up there and it's probably going to cause a traffic hazard". Cllr Kavanagh and Cllr Winters both agreed that they'd like to see the works done as soon as possible in the area. Also in Wicklow Town, Cllr Dunne highlighted that part of the footpath is missing going towards the schools at the top of Rocky Road.

"I'm telling you now, someone is going to get hurt and get hurt badly up there. I've had a number of people who have emailed me. Rome wasn't built in a day but this really should be priority," he said.

Notices issued to landowners regarding hedge cutting

As notices are currently being issued to landowners regarding the cutting back of hedges and ditches, Cllr Shay Cullen said there is a need to increase the efforts by the Local Authority this year.

Cllr Cullen said that "Hedges, overgrown ditches and hanging trees particularly in the rural upland areas of the district, are certainly an issue". He went on to say that "We have some fantastic landowners who always cut their hedges and keep them in fantastic condition, but on the other side we have people who totally disregard both the letters that they receive from the local authority and what they're supposed to do.

"I'd ask the overseers of our district here to be very strong on indicating where the problems are." Highlighting his concerns regarding repeat offenders he said "I'd

like us to focus our efforts on getting as many letters out and trying to follow up with further letters". He added that "At the end of the day, we have to respect the people who are doing the job properly, as we want our district looking well for tourism, such as bus routes, particularly to Glendalough."

Concern with lack of progress on projects

Councillors raised concerns around the issues of public safety, particularly with the lack of progress and delays on certain projects following money having previously been allocated. An example of this was the lack of progression on traffic calming measures in Glenealy village.

Cllr Gail Dunne said "We were looking to slow down the traffic from the King's Pub to the church there, to stop cars coming out from Belard Manor. That need is getting more serious. I'm told that there has been a few near misses there recently, and I can't understand what is holding things up".

Cllr Mary Kavanagh agreed that this being a safety issue gives it huge importance. Cllr John Snell said that "Unfortunately, we're losing the projects between the cracks here. We're deciding on projects, allocating for them and they're not getting done".

Cllr Shay Cullen added that "We don't seem to be making progress. We've told the public that these projects are being done, and it looks like we're not upholding our side of what we agreed. We need to get more finalised dates going forward, for the likes of the 2019 projects".

Councillors have arranged to sit down together in the coming days and finalise their proposals on projects for the coming year. Although there are still outstanding projects from previous years, those will be carried forward and treated separately to new projects suggested by councillors.

AVONDALE HOUSE AND FOREST PARK REDEVELOPMENT GETS GO AHEAD

The significant investment plan for Avondale House and Forest Park has been given planning permission from Wicklow County Council and the re-development plan is now underway.

It is envisioned that this project, which is a collaboration between Coillte and Fáilte Ireland, will see Avondale become a major visitor destination and a key attraction on the Ireland's Ancient East trail.

A total of €8 million will be invested in the re-development entitled 'A Place for Visionaries' set to open in 2021. The detailed design stages will commence soon.

The development will include an enhanced visitor facilities, a subterranean orientation space; a walking trail comprising sunken pathways, tunnels and elevated timber lattice walkways through the tree canopy; a timber lattice constructed lookout over the Avonmore River valley, as well as Ground, first floor and mezzanine extensions to the existing venue facility and refurbishment, extension and change of use of the existing outbuildings to a new café.

Fergal Leamy, Chief Executive of Coillte, said: "We are excited to be embarking upon such an ambitious project that will place Avondale Forest Park as one of the country's leading visitor destinations. Creating a unique space to socialise, enjoy and learn. 'A Place for Visionaries' will showcase all that Irish forests have to offer, demonstrating some of the leading-edge science and technologies used in the forestry industry today."

Visitors will be able to

explore two main themes: 'At Home with the Parnell's' which will celebrate the life and times of Charles Stewart Parnell at Avondale House and 'The Evolution of Forestry' which will take a retrospective look through the history of the forest park from the 1700's to present day and beyond.

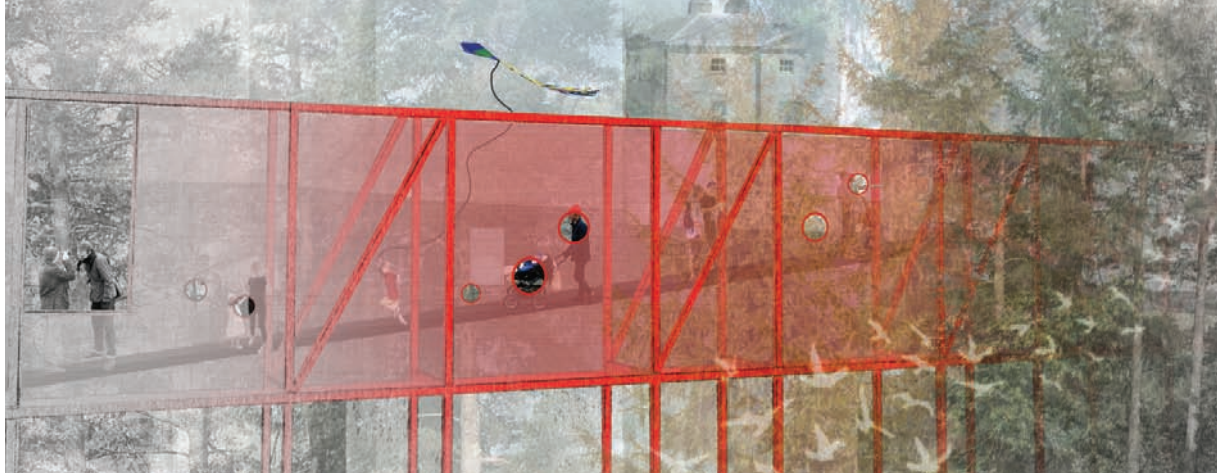
Paul Kelly, Chief Executive of Fáilte Ireland is confident this development will provide a major boost for the Irish tourism industry; "The re-development of Avondale House and Forest Park is hugely significant from a tourism and economic perspective for Ireland's Ancient East and for the country as a whole. Fáilte Ireland has provided more than 6.1 million towards this re-development project which builds on our continued investment across Ireland's Ancient East. We are confident that the re-developed Avondale House and Forest Park will attract a sizeable number of overseas visitors and domestic tourists ensuring Wicklow and the entire region benefits. The development of this new world class visitor experience also provides a major opportunity for tourism businesses across Wicklow to leverage the significant investment in the project."

Minister for Forestry Andrew Doyle TD welcomed the announcement, saying "This project will position Avondale as one of the top destinations in the

County. Avondale is often described as the cradle of modern democracy and the birthplace of Irish forestry and so it is very welcome to see Avondale gaining the recognition that it does truly deserve and fitting that this would happen as we are celebrating the centenary of the first Dail. I will be providing input to the detailed design stages when they commence. There is no national forestry library and there is an onus to preserve any information that may be in Avondale on the foundation of the forestry service.

"It is important to ensure that Avondale is open for Summer 2019 season and that proper facilities and information will be available to visitors during this time. It is important to recognise the work done so far by Coillte, Fáilte Ireland, local stakeholders and Wicklow Co. Council and all that has been achieved and I am looking forward to the next stage of this plan for Avondale."

Avondale was once the home of Charles Stewart Parnell, is now owned by Coillte and is considered the birthplace of Irish forestry. The 500-acre estate was originally built for Samuel Hayes in the 1700's who introduced exotic tree species into Ireland, right through to the state's acquisition of Avondale in 1904, ultimately leading to Coillte's formation in 1989.

Management company appeals to ABP over Ashford holiday village change of use

Ashford Owners Management Company Ltd are now appealing to An Bord Pleanála regarding their planning application for a 'change of use' which was rejected by Wicklow County Council.

Permission for 28 two-storey holiday homes at Belair Hotel in Ashford, Cronroe Demense, was previously granted in 1995 and 1998. The management company is now seeking a change of use to convert them into private family homes.

The Council refused permission in October of last year on the grounds that it would contravene the County Development Plan.

The Council also cited among its reasons the layout of the dwellings, poor quality of existing amenity space, and lack of adequate car parking,

The Council's decision stated that "the proposed change of use would materially contravene the settlement strategy of the County Development Plan 2016-2022, would be contrary to the overarching policy in respect to rural housing as set out in the National Planning Framework, would undermine the tourism objectives of the County Development Plan and would result in a sub-standard level of residential amenity for future permanent residential occupants of the dwellings.

"To permit this devel-

opment would set an undesirable precedent for similar sporadic development in the rural area and would undermine the core values of the County Development Plan 2016-2022. The proposed development would, therefore, be contrary to the proper planning and

sustainable development of the area."

The Development Plan states that "New housing shall be required to locate on suitable zoned or designated land in settlements, and will only be considered in the countryside when it is for the provision of a rural

dwelling to those with a housing, social or economic need to live in the open countryside."

Previous planning applications to change the use of two of the holiday homes to permanent family residences were also turned down by the Council in 2015.

A decision is due to be made by An Bord Pleanála by 20th May.

Permission granted for Ashford Studios expansion

Permission for a €90 million extension for Ashford Studios has been granted by An Bord Pleanála.

Stephen Donnelly TD called it "a massive boost for the entire community".

The studio is to expand with four new film studios of 40,000 square foot each. The new buildings will also include TV studios, offices and support space.

Deputy Donnelly explained, "Ashford Studios has already proven to be a huge success for Wicklow. Thanks to blockbuster shows like 'Vikings' it's achieved worldwide fame and recorded more than 2 million Euro in annual profits according to its latest accounts.

"Huge praise is owed to studio boss Joe O'Connell and his daughter Shelley. They've been a pleasure to work with over the years and showed real determination when faced with development levies. Thankfully I was able to encourage Wicklow County Council to unanimously vote to exclude the studio from those levies and that foresight has seen the business flourish.

"We're told that the new extension has the potential to create an extra 1,500 film-related jobs. And there's huge potential for ancillary industries such as pre- and post-production and animation. Building this type of infrastructure will surely encourage more major productions to come here and that will have a superb knock-on effect on our tourism and hospitality industry. Simply put, this is fantastic news for County Wicklow", concluded Donnelly.

Start-ups encouraged to apply for early-stage fund

Minister Humphreys and Enterprise Ireland last week announced the 2019 Competitive Start Fund (CSF) which is now open to all sectors.

The €750,000 fund will provide up to €50,000 in equity funding for up to 15 successful entrepreneurs and start-ups, and eligible start-ups from Wicklow are encouraged to apply. The fund closes to applications at 3pm on Tuesday, 12th February 2019. The Competitive Start Fund provides entrepreneurs and start-ups with the critical early-stage funding to test the market for their products and services and progress their business plans for the global marketplace. The fund is designed to enable those companies to progress key technical and commercial milestones. In addition to written online applications, companies will be asked to prepare an online video pitch. KEEPING YOUR OPTIONS OPEN

Most would-be third level students will have completed their CAO forms last week, but have they chosen the right options? With the run up to the 'Mocks' and pressure of study, CAO forms are often hastily completed without giving proper regard to life ambitions.

But remember there is the availability of the 'Change of Mind' option on the CAO that can be used right up to June.

Selecting the best possible course for you is a key decision to make, and often a challenging one. The stress on Leaving Certificate students is compounded by intense pressure to choose the 'right' CAO course before they even step onto a university campus.

For a few lucky people, choosing a course is simple: they have always wanted to be a doctor, accountant, dentist or an engineer. Others tend to choose their third-level options on the basis of the number of points they expect to achieve in the Leaving Certificate, rather than on their particular aptitudes and interests. Others may select on the basis of peer pressure, going

where their friend will be or indeed for geographical reasons, - where is nearest.

Come September and October the result is that some students discover that they have started on courses that may be unsuitable to them.

So how should you go about choosing a course? The greater the overlap between an individual's interests, aptitudes and personal characteristics and those required by the area of study, the greater the degree of satisfaction when engaged in that area of study.

A lot of heartache can be avoided if you take the time to look at the college websites to find out not just which subjects you will be studying on your course but also to find out the content of the individual modules of each subject. In this way you will know exactly what

lies ahead of you. Discovering that you have made the wrong choice can be upsetting, and expensive. If you decide to change course and repeat 1st year in college you will pay the full cost for that repeat year - a total of approximately 8,000 euros.

Most importantly consider options outside the CAO, such as the further education sector. Many students who do not secure the points they want for a course through the CAO, do very well in a Post-Leaving Certificate course in the discipline they want to study and then go on to secure a place in their preferred CAO course the following year.

If you are thinking of going to a PLC college, you must apply directly to the college as soon as possible as some courses are very popular. Places are offered on a first-come first-served

basis in most cases.

Choosing the right course is a big decision and it is important to get it right as it can impact your future success. If you can manage to get it right it will help you to take the next step in your career journey into the right postgraduate course in a few years.

How do I know if a further education course is the right choice for me?

First up, look at the post-Leaving Certificate courses on offer in your local college of further education - you'll find a full list at ETBI.ie. These are usually full-time courses, one year long and leading to a QQI level 5 certificate, or a second year leading to a QQI level 6 award. They include as diverse a range of options as you'd find in higher education, including animal care, arts and humanities, business, computers, construction, crafts and trades, healthcare, culinary arts and more.

Many students will go on to employment, not further study. Further education courses provide useful qualifications in their own right by equipping graduates with the workplace skills they need and many offer workplace experience. Students leave with skills which make them more employable than someone with just a Leaving Cert.

It's worth adding that students who move straight from a further education course to the workplace don't have the college door closed to them: after a few years in the workplace, they may decide to return to further education, start a third-level course (perhaps as a mature student) or do a goal-oriented training course. And the fees, usually below €500, are significantly less than the €3,000 you'll pay at third-level.

Wicklow Montessori Primary School are LEGO League Champions

Robots designed and built by school students using LEGO were in action at Dublin City University at the Learnit & DCU FIRST LEGO League Leinster finals on Saturday January 26th with Wicklow Montessori Primary School crowned as the overall champions.

Twenty-two teams from Leinster schools, including Gaelcholáiste na Mara and Kilcoole Primary School, competed in the event following four months of preparation including designing, building and programming their own automated robot, using LEGO Mindstorms. Teams also developed a research project based on identifying a human physical or social problem faced during long-duration space exploration within the Sun's solar system and devised solutions to combat this.

Wicklow Montessori Primary School who were crowned the 2019 Learnit & DCU FIRST LEGO League Champions will now go forward to represent Ireland in the UK Finals in the University of the West of England, Bristol on Saturday 16th February.

It is not the first time Wicklow Montessori pupils have had success with lego; last year they were the winners at the Irish finals of the First Lego League robotics championships in Galway.

FIRST is an acronym for 'For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology', and the FIRST LEGO League encourages children to think like scientists and engineers, developing practical solutions to real-world issues.

The FIRST LEGO League (FLL) is an international competition involving students age 11 to 16 from 80 countries. Teams of up to ten students, aged from 11 to 16 years with at least two adult coaches, can participate in the FIRST LEGO Leagues.

Greystones councillors hold 'positive' meeting with NTA

Greystones councillors met last Monday with the National Transport Authority (NTA) to discuss issues regarding bus and train services in the Greystones Municipal District.

Cllr Derek Mitchell said "I was pleased with a very good and open discussion about the problems of Greystones and Kilcoole District. I now feel they are taking our problems seriously. We went through a detailed list of rail and bus improvements which we requested.

"The Interim result of a study of providing more DARTs, every 20 instead of 30 minutes, to Greystones shows it is likely to be feasible. As yet this is uncoded and the final report is not out. This is based on the partial double tracking idea in my 2018 paper on the DART. This will take years to implement but shows a serious approach by the NTA.

"More DART and diesel cars are being ordered though these will take some years to arrive. I asked that they work out how to provide longer trains to Kilcoole and Wicklow in advance of carriages arriving. More frequent weekend DARTs are hoped for at the end of 2019 when more drivers have been recruited and trained.

"The NTA also agreed to our request to liaise with the N11 redesign team to include bus priority measures. The NTA are keen to have express buses and

Park n' Ride on the N11 provided they can get adequate priority.

"The NTA was keen to receive e-mails of problems with buses going to schools. We asked about providing extra 84xs, 84s at peak times, making the 133 reliable and other improvements. Their priority is to introduce the Bus Connects project following a revised draft coming out this Summer and they will consider changes in that context. They are keen to improve the Templecarrick School bus stop, the exit from Greystones station and a shelter at Kilcoole." Speaking after the meeting, Social Democrats councillor Jennifer Whitmore said "As a Greystones District Cllr I am acutely aware of the multitude of transport problems that face both residents and commuters. As our population grows, and our commuting levels increase, these issues are becoming more and more pressing. The District Cllrs have all worked together to ensure that those in decision making roles understand the difficulties faced by our constituents. This has included meetings with Irish Rail and Dublin Bus, and yesterday, we met with the National Transport Authority, which

is the overarching body that deals with transport strategy and funding.

"The meeting was a relatively positive one, and they reviewed all the issues that we raised with them. Ultimately, many of the issues faced will require significant investment, such as doubling the train track in part between Greystones and Bray to enable a 20 min Dart service, but they were open to reviewing this. They also have ordered new and refurbished carriages for the train but unfortunately there will be a time lag before that will happen. In relation to the buses, the NTA are publishing an updated BusConnects proposal in early summer, and this will be the driver for bus improvements. I was, however, happy to hear that they are supportive of my suggestion of Park n Rides on the N11, done in conjunction with the prioritisation of bus use on a new third lane on N11. So whilst there will be no immediate improvements, it does look like they are moving in the right direction. I will continue to keep in contact with the NTA, Irish Rail, Dublin Bus and Bus Eireann to try to push for these improvements as quickly as possible."

VALENTINE'S DAY

Loved-up couples across Co. Wicklow are gearing up to celebrate their affections for each other on Valentine's Day this February 14th. This day, full of red envelopes, bouquets of flowers, chocolates and candle-lit meals has been around for centuries.



There are different opinions as to who was the original Valentine was, but the most popular theory dates back to the time of the Roman Empire and the reign of Claudius II, 270 AD. Claudius believed that single men made better soldiers and

did not want his men to marry during wartime. Bishop Valentine went against his wishes and performed secret wedding ceremonies. Valentine was jailed and then executed by order of the Emperor on February 14th. While in jail, he wrote a love note to the jailor's daughter signing it, "From your Valentine." In any event, in 496 A.D., Pope Gelasius set aside February 14 to honor St. Valentine. Through the centuries, the Christian holiday became a time to exchange love messages and St. Valentine became a patron saint of lovers. In the 1840s, Esther Howland, a native of Massachusetts, is given credit for sending the first Valentine cards. The spirit of love continues as valentines are sent with sentimental verses and children exchange valentine cards at school.



Valentines Facts

- Every year around 1 billion Valentine cards are sent around the world. After Christmas it's a single largest seasonal card-sending occasion.
- Amongst the earliest Valentine's Day gifts were candies. The most common were chocolates in heart shaped boxes.
- Richard Cadbury produced the first box of chocolates for Valentine's Day in the late 1800's.
- In the middle Ages, people believed that the first unmarried person of the opposite sex you met on the morning of St. Valentine's Day would become your spouse.
- The most fantastic gift of love is the Taj Mahal in India. It was built by Mughal Emperor Shahjahan as a memorial to his wife.
- Cupid is a symbol of Valentine's Day. Cupid was associated with Valentine's Day because he was the son of Venus, the Roman god of love and beauty.
- The Roman Lupercalia, a celebration of fertility began on February 14th. The date was later borrowed by the early Christians to celebrate a martyr by the name of Valentine.

Wicklow athletes gear up for Special Olympics World Games

This March, four Co. Wicklow athletes will travel to Abu Dhabi to compete in the 2019 Special Olympics World Summer Games. Part of a 91-strong Team Ireland squad, these athletes will represent their country at highest level of sporting competition for Special Olympics athletes.

Taking place between 14-21 March 2019, Abu Dhabi 2019 will be the largest sporting and humanitarian event in the world this year. Supported by a volunteer management team of 39, including Co. Wicklow football coach Graham Hillick from Bray, Team Ireland will join 7,000 Special Olympics athletes from 170 countries at the Games.

The Co. Wicklow athletes will represent Team Ireland in four sports.

World Games veteran, Aisling Beacom (38) from Wicklow Town, who has competed in several Special Olympics World Games, including Athens 2011, where she won a silver and bronze medal, is Abu Dhabi bound this March. The swimmer, who helped to set up the

Blue Dolphins Special Olympics Club in Wicklow Town, which she attends, will compete in the Open Water Swim for Team Ireland.

Rukky Atiyota (18) from Delgany, who is also a member of the Blue Dolphins Special Olympics Club, will compete in Basketball. Meanwhile, Paul Condren (30) from Bray will compete in Football and Pdraig Reilly (37) from Hollywood, Co. Wicklow will represent Team Ireland in Tenpin Bowling.

Emma McMenamin, Head of Delegation for Team Ireland said: "These athletes are extremely focused and determined and like any athlete facing into a major competition, they are putting 100% into their training. It was great to see how excited

the athletes are to be part of this huge event. To represent Team Ireland and compete on the World Stage in Abu Dhabi is a big honour and one these Special Olympics athletes are not taking lightly."

President Michael D. Higgins sent a message of support to Team Ireland athletes. He said: "Being chosen to represent your country on the international stage is a great honour indeed. It is a tribute, not only to your great talent as athletes, but also to your dedication, hard work and perseverance; qualities which make you inspirational role models and admirable ambassadors for Ireland."

"I thank you for your commitment to representing our country so proudly on the international stage and assure you that, as you travel to Abu

Dhabi, you bring with you the support and goodwill of all of the people of Ireland. May I wish each and every one of you every success and many precious moments of enjoyment and happiness at the 2019 Games. May I also commend those who have encouraged and assisted you on your journey to date including your coaches and family members."

As the countdown to the World Games gets under way, Special Olympics Ireland is calling on the business community and individuals to help them raise much-needed funds to send the athletes to Abu Dhabi. To cover the cost of sending Team Ireland to the Games, Special Olympics needs to raise a total of €455,000 (€5,000 per athlete).

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE CENTRES MOVING FORWARD RAPIDLY

Health Minister and Local TD, Simon Harris has confirmed that all Primary Care Centres planned for Co Wicklow are progressing well.

Speaking following a briefing from the HSE, Minister Harris said: "I have continued to push the HSE to deliver these much needed Primary Care Centres and I am pleased to confirm that we have good progress on each at this stage."

"Anyone passing through Bray can see that the new Primary Care Centre opposite my constituency office is developing rapidly. Building works are continuing and we expect to have the new centre up and running, serving the community by the beginning of this year. The Bray Primary Care

Centre will be a hub for health care services in the Bray area.

"I was really delighted to receive confirmation of the grant of planning permission for the Arklow Primary Care Centre last week. The centre has been delayed due to the planning and design process but thankfully, it will now quickly move to construction."

"I am working to ensure progress on each of our primary care centres moves as quickly as possible. I will be visiting the site of the new Baltinglass Primary Care Centre in the coming

weeks as construction begins. This PCC will be a fantastic addition to Baltinglass and it will hopefully serve as a centre point for the community like the Blessington PCC has for Blessington."

"Building works are scheduled to begin on the Rathdrum Primary Care Centre this month (February) and a letter of intent has issued to the developer of the Greystones Primary Care centre. They are now in the process of purchasing the chosen site."

Minister Harris spoke about the importance of Primary Care Centres to the change in how we

deliver health care in Ireland: "I am absolutely determined to develop a proper network of Primary Care Centres as these are a key infrastructure component of moving healthcare from our acute hospitals, into our communities. People want to be able to access services like OT, Physio, Speech and Language Therapy, and others without having to travel to a hospital in Dublin. I am really delighted to see the impact of the Primary Care Centres we already have in place and I look forward to having a complete network operational."

Progress made in securing sports campus

Wicklow County Council has signed a contract with a specialist sports consulting company for the proposed sports campus for North Wicklow.

Stephen Donnelly TD has welcomed the progress, saying "The firm W2 has been hired to help planners understand the sporting needs of the area. I have written to all the clubs and associations in North Wicklow encouraging them to have their say and will facilitate communication between the clubs and the consultants. This is an incredible opportunity to ensure that any new facility is purpose-built to the community's requirements and should not be missed."

"Councillor Pat Vance and I have been working hard on this issue for a long time. We have a once-in-a-lifetime chance now to have a sports campus that would rival any of those currently located in our major universities. It would be

located on a huge 55 acres of land at Old Fassaroe just off the N11. The County Council is clearly taking this idea seriously and is putting its money where its mouth is by hiring consultants."

"And this is not the only good news we've had. Progress has also been made on the overall development, with various concerns being addressed, including remediation of old landfill, public transport links, and required works on the N11. While the timing couldn't be better, right now a major fund for sports capital projects is seeking applications. The deadline for submissions is the end of April and I will be strongly supporting an application from Wicklow County Council for initial funding for the North Wicklow Sports Campus."

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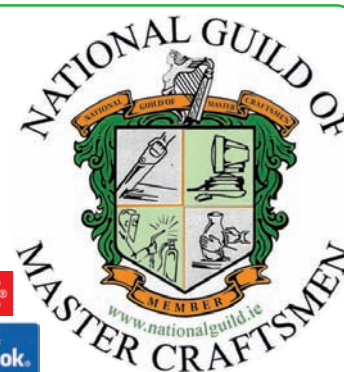

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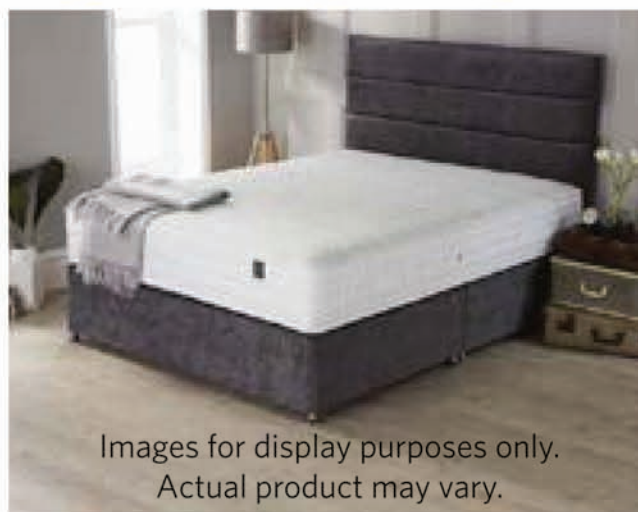
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
