that opened in December as part of the cold weather initiative were closed on Sunday.

Speaking last week on the impending cessation of the cold weather initiative, John Brady TD said "The majority of people will then end up back on the street as there is no alternative accommodation for them. I'm informed that the funding was only in place for this emergency accommodation to remain open until the end of March. The Minister for Housing has said that funding is not an issue when it comes to homelessness: he needs to immediately intervene to ensure that additional funding is in place to ensure that the 12 beds don't close. I have raised the issue directly with the Minister.

Last week Department of Housing's homelessness figures for February demonstrated that there are 45 people in emergency accommodation in Co. Wicklow, a 25% increase on the figure of 36 from December.

Deputy Brady added that "these figures however don't reflect the real story of homelessness as many people are not offered any form of emergency accommodation and are forced to stay with family or friends and don't appear in these statistics as homeless.

"The time for a measured response in tackling this crisis is long gone. It's clear that Rebuilding Ireland isn't working, what

the is needed are measures that will have an immediate impact. Sinn Féin wants an immediate threevear rent freeze. We have also brought forward a Bill that will prevent buy to let landlords from issuing vacant possession notices to quit to tenants when they are selling the property. The Bill, which is based on the Focus Ireland amendment, will help tackle the single biggest cause of family homelessness.

Brady concluded "Fine Gael need to wake up to the reality that their plan has failed a long time ago. The definition of madness is doing the same thing again and again and expecting different results,

Wicklow energy firm to create 50 new jobs

Wicklow-based energy firm Crowley Carbon will create 50 new jobs in Enniskerry as part of a €10m investment in solar energy. The new roles will be based at Crowley Carbon headquarters in Powerscourt Estate and will bring to 250 the number of employees globally.

The expansion comes as the company committed to increase solar energy production in Ireland by 50% with a €10m investment for three separate projects under the name Crowley Solar. Chief Executive Norman Crowley said the company hopes to install more than 1,000MW of solar energy in Ireland over the next five years for its corporate customers, reducing Irish carbon emissions by 250,000 tonnes per annum in the process. They currently supply energy services to companies such as Johnson & Johnson, Bunge and General Electric

Mr Crowley said "Ireland's position on solar is unfortunately quite poor, with our installed base of solar standing at a mere 8MW in contrast to the UK, with similar sunlight, having 1,600 times more solar than Crowley explained that there are many myths surrounding solar that need to be debunked, adding that there is a "general understanding that because it rains a lot here in Ireland we have little or no hope of generating electricity from the sun, which is simply not true."

Crowley Carbon is one of Europe's fastest growing energy efficiency companies. Founded in 2009 the company focuses on reducing the energy consumption of large industrial and commercial sites.

Application for over 200 houses in Enniskerry

A planning application has been made to An Bord Pleanala for a proposed Strategic Housing Development in Enniskerry for 218 residential units.

Capami Ltd lodged Enniskerry. the application on 22nd March and a decision is due to be made on the application in July.

The proposed development would consist of 19 one-bed units, 42 two-bed units, 109 three-bed units, 45 fourbed units and 3 Fivebed units. Bray Rotary appeal for those affected by Cyclone Idai

Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi were recently devastated by Cyclone Idai leaving tens of thousands homeless and hundreds, possibly thousands, dead.

The effects of Cyclone Idai will last for years, especially in Beira, the Mozambican city hardest hit by the storm that left more than 750 people dead.

The Rotary Club of Bray are organising a collection next Saturday (6th April) outside the Holy Redeemer Church on Bray Main Street, and are appealing for the public's support to help those affected by this disaster.

The damage to infrastructure in the countries affected by Cyclone Idai-Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi-has led to a loss of more than \$1 billion, according to the Economic Commission for Africa. Beira, one of Mozambique's largest cities, was the epicentre of the disaster.

"We probably have lost about a billion dollars in Mozambique, Zimbabwe, Madagascar and Malawi in terms of resources, in particular the Beira port, the signature port of Mozambique, is essentially today almost a thing of the past because of Cyclone Idai," Vera Songwe, the UN's Economic Commission for Africa's executive secretary, said.

"It is particularly distressing that severe damage has been done to schools, hospitals, health facilities and other key infrastructure as this will have consequences not just for the emergency response phase but for the long-term efforts of these countries to eradicate poverty and hunger," said Mami Mizutori of the UN's Office for Disaster Risk Reduction.

With hundreds of people still missing, there has been no time to estimate the cost of rebuilding Beira, but it will take years.

'Delivery of community facilities is essential in Ireland's fastest growing village'

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
'Driving instructor shortage to blame for Wicklow test delays'

Holidaymakers urged to check passports

Cllr Irene Winters is encouraging all families in Co. Wicklow to check their passports before booking their flights this summer and to apply early, at least six weeks in

"From my years as a travel agent I know the May Bank Holiday Weekend leads to the biggest spike in passport applications over the course of the year, as families across the country book their holidays. So

people to prepare, to check before you book and to renew online.

"Common incidences that can cause last minute dashes to the passport office, are children's passport expiry dates being overlooked or some countries require your passport to be valid for a minimum length of time after your intended date of departure.

"Both adult and child passports can be renewed online. Online applications are open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week at www.dfa.ie/passportonline No need for a paper application form, witnesses or printed photos, however a signed consent form must also be submitted to the passport office for a child's renew-

Cllr Winters added "The online method is convenient and secure, with current turnaround times of 10 working days. The postal express method currently has a turnaround of 15 working days (three weeks) but both these wait times are likely to increase as the main holiday season approaches.

"If you are not eligible to use the online facility and are travelling in more than three weeks' time, you can submit your application by Passport Express through your local post office. You can also make an appointment to submit your application at the passport office in Dublin.

"A same day turnaround service is available if you are travelling within three days, however this service is by appointment only and costs double the normal fee per passport. There are a limited number of appointments per day and proof of travel will be required."

Boil water notice issued for Avoca Ballinaclash public water supply

Following consultation with the Health Service Executive (HSE), Irish Water and Wicklow County Council have issued a Boil Water Notice for the area supplied by the Avoca Ballinaclash Public Water Supply to protect approximately 1,343 people.

was put in place last Monday as a precautionary measure following a failure in the treatment process on the Avoca Ballinaclash Public Water Supply

Irish Water drinking water compliance and operational experts are working with colleagues in Wicklow County Council to resolve this situation as soon as possible.

In the meantime, all customers of this supply are advised to boil water before use until further notice. The areas affected include Ballinaclash, Avoca and Ballymoneen.

Water must be boiled for: Drinking; Drinks with water: Preparation of salads and similar foods, which are to drink

The Boil Water Notice not cooked prior to eating; Brushing of teeth; Making of ice - discard ice cubes in fridges and freezers and filtered water in fridges. Make ice from cooled boiled water.

AVERAGE HOUSE PRICE IN WICKLOW FELL IN 2019

The price of the average three-bed semi in County Wicklow fell by -0.7% in the first three months of this year, according to a national survey carried out by Real Estate Alliance.

Wicklow prices rose by 5.3% to €289,000 in the past year, the REA Average House Price Survey found.

The survey concentrates on the actual sale price of Ireland's typical stock home, the three-bed semi, giving an up-to-date picture of the second-hand property market in towns and cities countrywide to the close of last week.

"As we approach Brexit, we are starting to see an effect in the market, with buyers becoming nervous about an exposure to reduction in price values," said Matt Forkin of REA Forkin, North Wicklow, where the average three-bed semi is currently selling for €315,000 - down from €320,000 in December.

REA Forkin have also reported the market stabilising in Wicklow town with average time to sell rising from six weeks to eight, and a fall of 1.41% in the Bray market with sales times rising from five weeks to eight, with the selling price of an average three bed semi at €320,000 and €350,000 respectively.

"We have seen an increase in the cash percentage of purchases, which reflects an increase in investors coming to the market," said Simon Murphy of REA Murphy, Baltinglass and Blessington, where a three-bed semi is currently averaging at a price of €170,000 - unchanged over the past 12 months.

The average semi-detached house nationally now costs €235,898, the Q1 REA Average House Price Survey has found - a fall of -0.16% on the Q4 2018 figure of €236,287.

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
Bray to get Jigsaw **Youth Mental Health Service**

Often families will divide this responsibility between several family members. Gather the information you will need for the completion of the death certificate at the funeral home. Parent's names including middle initials, date of birth of the deceased, their place of work (Name and address) and occupation of the deceased.

If the deceased left specific instructions regarding preferences for funeral and burial arrangements, with a list of people to be notified, your job is that much easier. 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



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

Where are Wicklow's wintering waterbirds?

A new BirdWatch Ireland study has found that the number of waterbirds wintering in Ireland has declined by 15% over the past five years and 40% since the mid-1990s, and Co. Wicklow has been no exception.

organisation has shown that Wicklow's wetland areas - home to species such as the Wigeon, Shoveler, Mallard, Greatcrested Grebe, Golden Plover, Lapwing, Curlew, and many more - have shown very rapid declines in these pop-

BirdWatch Ireland have described the survey results as "truly shocking"

The wintering wigeon population in North Wicklow's coastal marshes descreased from 1,602 in 2010/11 to 913 in 2015/16, while the number of Mallards in this time period fell from 353 to 118. The Lapwing population plummeted from 1,562 to 340. In Arklow's ponds, the black-headed gull decreased from 356 in 2010/11 to 98 in

Co. Wicklow, with numerous wetland sites, is an important wintering area for migratory waterbirds (ducks, geese, swans and wading birds, amongst others) that breed at Arctic latitudes and migrate southwards to spend the winter on our estuaries, coastal bays, rivers and

These waterbirds are monitored through the Irish Wetland Bird Survey (I-WeBS), which is funded by the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) (Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht) and coordinated by BirdWatch Ireland. Each winter, birdwatchers volunteer to count waterbirds in their local areas, together with staff of NPWS and BirdWatch Ireland. The data collected enable regular assessment of the numbers and trends of our wintering waterbirds.

"The rate of these declines is alarming," said Brian Burke, lead author of the study and a key member of

The study from the Kilcoole-based BirdWatch Ireland's conservation team, "and the declines we're seeing in Ireland are consistent with the global pattern of declines. According to figures published by BirdLife International in 2017, 17% of all waterbird species are considered globally threatened, which is extremely concerning. Numerous pressures can impact migratory birds on their breeding grounds, along their migration route, and at their wintering sites, and we know that climate change is playing a significant role."

According to BirdWatch Ireland, recent studies have shown that climate change is causing shifts in the migratory behaviour of many of our familiar wintering waterbirds. Milder winters mean that many species no longer have to migrate as far as Ireland in order to find ice-free wetlands. But in addition, climate change is making conditions increasingly unsuitable on the breeding grounds, with the resulting poorer breeding success, meaning that in some years, very few young are raised at all.

BirdWatch Ireland is keen to stress that problems at wetland sites here are also likely to be affecting these species, making it harder for them to find food and conserve energy in advance of their epic spring migrations. Factors such as disturbance from increased recreational use of wetlands by people and unleashed dogs, loss of habitat from changes in land use, including development and agricultural intensification, as well as pollution have all been identified as pressures upon wintering waterbirds. Strict enforcement of the laws that protect sites designated for waterbirds around the country is essential so that Ireland can play its part in the conservation of these special migratory species.'

Fire training day held in Avondale Forest Park

Andrew Doyle, TD, Minister of State at the Department of Food, Forestry and Horticulture recently launched Coillte's National Fire Training Day for 2019 at Avondale House.

The National Fire Service and the Air Corps were showcasing a series of lives of rural dwellers and practical firefighting exercises with a fire truck and a helicopter.

A series of presentations took place for local Coillte foresters and wider industry networks, covering practical advice on firefighting, climate change, health and safety, including different firefighting systems.

The event was launched by Minister of State for Food, Forestry and Horticulture Andrew Doyle TD. The fire training day helps inform and up-skill Coillte foresters and the wider industry on fire safety and prevention.

2018 was an exceptional year for forest fires in Ireland with 90 separate fire events on Coillte property alone, which affected more than 400 hectares of forestry and 500 hectares of bog.

The cost of fighting these fires as well as the loss of standing timber was significant and Coillte are still engaged in an ongoing process to evaluate the expenditure required to ensure forest and habitat regeneration.

Minister Doyle urged farmers, forest owners, forest managers and the public of the need to be alert to the risk of wildfires over the coming summer months, and called for anyone enjoying the outdoor recreation to behave responsibly and within the law.

Speaking at the launch, Minister Doyle stated; "I want to continue to urge farmers, forest owners, forest managers that there is a risk of fires during spring months on certain types of land, particularly in upland areas and that high fire risk conditions can be expected over the coming spring and summer months, when weather conditions dictate."

Recalling the major wildfires in recent years that destroyed or damaged property, including farmland and forests, he added; "Such fires directly endanger people's homes and property and destroy valuable habitats and tourism resources. Furthermore, they place enormous strain on the emergency services and put the

emergency service personnel at considerable risk".

Michael Power, National Estates Risk Manager for Coillte, said; "Last year, we saw over 90 separate fire events on Coillte property alone, which severely effected more than 400 hectares of forest of forestry and 500 hectares of bog. The largest and most dangerous of these incidents was in the Slieve Blooms, counties Laois and Offalv."

He also reminded land owners that under the Wildlife Act, it is illegal to burn growing vegetation on uncultivated land between 1st March and 31st August and that persons engaged in such illegal activity are liable to prosecution and could face fines, imprisonment and penalties to their farm payments.

Aidan Dempsey, Chief Fire Officer for Wicklow County Council said; "Suspicious activity should be reported to the Gardaí and uncontrolled or unattended fires should be reported immediately to the Fire and Emergency Services."

Coillte and the Forest Service are also hoping to educate the public on how to be more fire aware this summer, and to understand the importance of reporting any forest fire sightings to their local fire brigade.


