APPEAL AGAINST 'BOX HOTEL'

A third party appeal has been made against a decision to grant planning permission for a new hotel on South Quay in Wicklow Town.

The appeal has been lodged with An Bord Pleanála by local residents against the proposed 'Box Hotel', which was granted permission by Wicklow County Council in January.

Waterbrand Holdings Ltd applied to the Council for planning permission for the hotel in July 2018.

The hotel would have a maximum height of 15.5m and would be constructed using shipping containers comprising 25 hotel bedrooms, a cafe, a restaurant, a wine bar and a roof terrace. There would also be 14 car parking spaces. Two existing warehouses would be demolished

while the stone wall to Quarantine Hill would be retained.

The third party appeal lists concerns over the structure's size, potential light and noise pollution, and traffic. The residents appealing the decision are also concerned with a loss of privacy in the rear of their homes and gardens. The appeal complains about potentially 'bulky', 'overbearing' and 'incongruous' structures in their area. They fear an obstruction of the direct light they get at the rear of their property and are calling for a 'shadow analysis' of how the structure will impact the surrounding area.

They fear that the finished structure will be "at odds with all the other buildings in the area". They cite the Wicklow Town & Rathnew Development Plan 2013-2019 which prohibits developments that result in a "significant degree of visual obtrusion or overshadowing, is detrimental to the character of an area or to the amenity of adjoining residential properties".

The residents point out that the proposed site at the westerly end of South Quay is surrounded by modest residences, a historical two-storey building, and several smaller warehouses.

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They point out that the hotel 'will be at the forefront' of the views of Wicklow Town from the conservation area at Blackcastle, 'among the most picturesque in the area'. "The location of the proposed structure ensures that it will be tall enough to extend up to the heritage buildings surrounding Market Square."

They say "Within the historical and picturesque setting of Wicklow Town, Port and Harbour area we fear the proposed development sets a deeply undesirable precedent."

Speaking to *Wicklow Times*, Cllr Irene Winters said that the hotel would be a "welcome development" for the town. "It's great to see the quays being developed and in a way that won't impede employment. A hotel will bring employment to the town."

Cllr Shay Cullen is also

supportive of the hotel development on South Quay and told *Wicklow Times* that he was disappointed with the delay. "We need accommodation in Wicklow Town. With the loss of the Grand Hotel we're short of accommodation. With the proposed Greenway from Wicklow to Greystones, and the re-opening of the cliff walk bringing more tourists, we'll need a hotel. I'm supportive of this development and I'm supportive of further developments which bring accommodation to the county."

Wicklow Town has been without a hotel since the Grand Hotel became a Direct Provision centre last November. A decision is due to be made by An Bord Pleanála in June.

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GREEN LIGHT FOR WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

An Bord Pleanála last week gave permission for works to go ahead on the upgrade of the Blessington Wastewater Treatment Plant, which will facilitate housing development in the area.

Up to now the development of housing projects in West Wicklow has been stymied due to a lack of wastewater infrastructure.

Permission for the upgrade works was granted to Irish Water by Wicklow County Council in September 2018, however the decision was appealed by the Ballymore Eustace Trout and Salmon Anglers Association.

Welcoming the decision, Cllr Edward Timmins said "Wicklow County Council must go ahead with planning permission for houses on the council land at Burgage. Blessington has a huge number of people on the social housing list and

almost every day I get contacted by people in Blessington who need a place to live because of overcrowding or the landlord selling their house or other reasons."

The works will include the construction of two new primary treatment units, one new anoxic tank, associated pump sumps, tertiary treatment infrastructure and associated site works.

An Bord Pleanála determined that an Environmental Impact Assessment is not required for the development.

The Ballymore Eustace Trout and Salmon Anglers Association appealed the Council's decision due to

concerns over ammonia emissions and effluent from the treatment plant and the impact on water quality and aesthetics in Golden Falls Lake.

In its decision, An Bord Pleanála say the treatment plant is necessary for "the policies and objectives of the Wicklow County Development Plan 2016-2022 and the Blessington Town Plan 2013-2019, which seek to improve and expand waste water treatment facilities."

ABP say that the treatment plant "would not seriously injure the amenity of the area or of property in the area and would not be prejudicial to public health". It stated "based on information

provided by the applicant and assessed by the Local Authority's Environment Section regarding the assimilative capacity in the receiving environment, the Board considered that the proposed development would not seriously injure public health or the environment."

The board was also satisfied that the proposed development, "either individually or in combination with other plans or projects, would not be likely to have significant effects on the Poulaphouca Reservoir Special Protection Area."

Resolution put forward to extend Luas to Blessington

At a meeting of the Eastern and Mid Land Regional assembly on Friday March 1st, Cllr Tommy Cullen successfully put forward a resolution that an extension of the Luas Line from Saggart Co. Dublin to Blessington is approved for consideration of appraisal, planning and design of the LUAS network expansion.

Cllr Cullen's resolution was unanimously approved and will now go out for public display.

Speaking afterwards, Cllr Cullen said "I argued that as the Government had refused approval for the funding upgrade of the N81 that the extension of the LUAS line to Blessington which only be one third of the cost of the N81 upgrade is a reasonable proposal.

"That I received full support from Board members throughout Leinster vindicates my position. This is the start of the process to extend the LUAS line and I would envisage a stop at the Lamb in

Manor Kilbride and Blessington with park and ride facilities to facilitate people from West and South Wicklow to access the LUAS line from Blessington.

"The LUAS extension from Saggart across country is 9 miles and can follow the route already approved by the Transport Authority for the N81 upgrade without impacting on that upgrade in the future. This is an historic day as the last light rail to Blessington in the 1930's and today's decision is the commencement of its return."

BRAY GOLF CLUB FIRE

There was nothing to convey that the recent fire at the old Bray Golf Club was suspicious, Gardai say.

Dublin Fire Brigade were called out to the fire at the old Bray Golf Club near the River Dargle in Little Bray the weekend before last. The blaze broke out at about 7pm on Sunday, 24th February.

Superintendent Pat Ward of Bray Garda Station, said that people had possibly been loitering nearby but that the fire was possibly accidental.

"There was nothing to convey that the fire was suspicious, the scene was examined but there was no indication of anything malicious. There had pos-

sibly been people loitering there," he said.

The fire is one of several that have occurred in Bray in recent weeks. Two fires broke out at premises on Bray main

street in early January. This was followed by a fire on Galtrim Road later that month, two cars going up in flames in Dargle Crescent in late January and a fire in an apartment in Green Park Road.



Bomb scare in Bray

Bomb disposal experts were called to a quiet residential road in Bray last Wednesday afternoon to examine a suspicious device.

The object, said by onlookers to resemble something wrapped in sellotape, was found at Wyndham Park. The area was cordoned off by Gardai and some residents were evacuated from their homes while the Explosive Ordnance Disposal team examined the device.

Superintendent Pat Ward told *Wicklow Times* that the object 'was a device that had the appearance of an improvised explosive device'.

Superintendent Ward added, "It was reported to the Gardaí by the public. The Gardaí attended the scene. An EOD was then called to the scene. They had x-rayed and examined the suspicious device and having done so, they determined that it wasn't an improvised explosive device."

'Delivery of community facilities is essential in Ireland's fastest growing village'

Sinn Féin representative and local election candidate for Wicklow East Muireann Dalton has expressed serious concerns about the failure to provide public facilities and infrastructure in Newtownmountkennedy, Ireland's fastest growing village.

Uplands Council condemns uncontrolled burning

The current permissive season for the burning and cutting of upland vegetation ended last week on February 28th. Any burning in the uplands which occurs from now until September 1st will be in breach of the Wildlife Act 1976 (as amended 2000).

The Wicklow Uplands Council said "There is a perception among some that burning within the permissive season is 'controlled', while outside the

season is 'uncontrolled'. This is not the case.

"The unusually dry weather this week has seen a number of fires being lit around the

uplands but in some cases these fires are not controlled and are damaging to the environment and a threat to public safety and property.

"Controlled burning is primarily carried out to clear dense vegetation and regenerate fresh new vegetation for grazing livestock. As controlled burn-

ing is carried out on a small scale, and on a rotational basis, it results a mosaic of vegetation type and structure which in turn supports greater biodiversity. These are low intensity fires which do not damage the underlying soil structure.

"Controlled burning should always be followed with an appropriate grazing regime to reduce the need for future burns. Lighting a fire and walking away is not controlled and results in extensive environmental damage.

"In the past week participants in the new SUAS Project (Sustainable Uplands Agri-environment Scheme) have successfully carried out controlled burning activities. The area to be burnt was identified as part of a long-term management plan which aims to improve the ecological condition of the site. Before the burns were carried out, advance notice was sent to the Fire Service, An Garda, the NPWS and surrounding landowners. During the controlled burning activities there were sufficient people involved to ensure that the fires did not get out of control and afterwards the Fire Service was informed that the fire had been fully extinguished. The activity was fully supervised by SUAS project manager Declan

NEW ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP TO HOLD INAUGURAL MEETING

Bray Tidy Towns, in discussion with various groups and individuals in Bray, have decided that now is an opportune time to set up a North Wicklow Environmental Network.

This group's goal will be to bring together NGO's, voluntary groups, businesses and individuals who have a common agenda, which include a broad range of environmental issues, everything from wildlife conservation, waste reduction to climate change.

The Irish Environmental Network is an umbrella network that works to support environmental NGOs through access to funding and services. It consists of environmental NGOs that carry out their work through practical conservation work, campaigning, lobbying and raising public awareness of environmental and conservation needs. It is proposed that the North Wicklow group would be a local branch attached to the national parent body. There are similar groups in Dun Laoghaire and Dublin.

Details around the role of the group will be up to the steering committee, but as a principle it will have an environmental and conservation bias and support and develop the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, as set out in the European Environmental Bureau, within the North Wicklow area.

It will exist as a central body for groups to discuss how best to achieve these goals with each other's support.

The inaugural public meeting of the North Wicklow Environmental Network (NWEN) will take place at 7:30pm on Thursday 7th March at the Function room in the Martello. At this meeting attendees will elect a chair person, secretary and steering committee.

"Wicklow Uplands Council continues to seek the implementation of the Heritage Act 2018, which will allow for the controlled burning of vegetation in March when conditions are not conducive in the preceding months. The current dry spell is exceptional, as it is often the case that controlled burning cannot be carried out effectively within the current permissive season. Again we reiterate that we only support controlled burning and the best management of upland habitats."

BirdWatch Ireland meanwhile welcomed the decision by Minister for Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, Ms. Josepha

Madigan, T.D. not to extend the open period for burning into March in 2019.

"The decision by the Minister not to grant an extension for burning is a responsible act considering the dry weather conditions experienced not only in the last week but in the previous months during the 6-month open period," they stated.

"BirdWatch Ireland calls on the Minister to take the time now to put in place a licensing system for burning activities in the uplands that guarantees protection for breeding birds and is compliant with the Birds Directive and the Habitats Directive.

"Sadly, the fact that the

Minister has not granted an extension will not mean an end to the fires in the Spring of 2019. BirdWatch Ireland calls on the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine to stringently apply cross compliance rules in relation to land eligibility.

"The activity of upland burning must be regulated and be supported by an effective agriculture policy which financially supports upland hill farmers for their produce and the public goods they can provide such as High Nature Value Farmland. We again call on the Minister to set up a Stakeholder Forum to work out the issues in relation to burning."

88 NEW SOCIAL HOUSING UNITS FOR RATHNEW

Wicklow Municipal District February Meeting notes

Councillors agree on plans for discretionary funding

Footpaths are to be widened from the areas of Glebemount in Wicklow Town to Kidzone, with €5,000 allocated to complete these works.

The existing footpaths here will be cleared and widened, with sleepers to be placed at the toe of the path. A further €20,000 has been allocated to widen the footpath to the Rugby Club, from the junction at Hawkstown Road to in Wicklow Town which councillors welcomed.

Cllr Irene Winters said that these works will serve the people living there who need to access the road.

Outside of Wicklow Town, €20,000 has been allocated towards the refurbishment of the existing public toilets in Roundwood.

Cllr Winters explained that this amount will not cover complete reconstruction cost of the toilets and so the team will have to go looking for additional funding in the future and at the moment the council are looking to the options here.

A total of €6,000 has been allocated to secure traffic calming measures on the road from Annamoe to Laragh. These measures are to be

looked into, but the members were advised that a speed ramp may not be needed, rather increased signage and road lining to highlight speed restrictions here. Members have also decided to keep back €13,000 in reserves, to allow for unexpected works that may arise during the year.

Cliff walk looking set for April

Members of the Wicklow Municipal District at their February meeting were informed that the Cliff Walk in Wicklow Town is expected to be open to the public in early spring.

A final mapping of the route has been prepared and an application has been submitted to Sport Ireland Trails for final inspection. Following this approval, the members expect to open the trail in the spring. Cllr Irene Winters said that the cliff walk will be "a fantastic addition to the town for both residents and tourists alike".

Wildflowers for the Murrough

A total of €3,000 has been allocated in the discretionary funding of the Wicklow Municipal District to the planting of wildflowers along by the Murrough in Wicklow Town.

These flowers will be planted behind the public gym and near to the playground section of the popular public open space. Cllr Mary Kavanagh described this wildflower meadow project as something vitally important for county councils to get

behind, in supporting biodiversity projects and helping pollinators. She added that she chose this site in particular "as it will have maximum impact for local people and tourists alike".

Approval for the Maritime Project

A total of €6,000 has been allocated for a new project that will include the placing old maritime artefacts along the quayside.

Cllr Mary Kavanagh described the project as the brainchild of local sculptor Thomas Flynn, adding that he is "delighted to finally have this project approved". Mr Flynn will work on preparing the artefacts and signs will be erected along the quay, to highlight these artefacts and tell the story of Wicklow's maritime history in Wicklow Town.

Irish Water works ongoing

"The community are up in arms over the works. But these works are vital, we know they are", said Cllr Miriam Murphy addressing the issue of ongoing works underway in Arklow by Irish Water and Virgin Media.

Cllr Murphy said that it's "unfortunate that all these works are happening together" which is causing confusion for people. Going forward, councillors said that they'd like a list of works that are taking place at all times, simply to know exactly what's going on, in the form of updates from engineers.

Cllr McDonald said that the traffic management particularly at the Sea Road area where works are currently underway, needed to be looked at as the traffic lights are "not working in sync".

Cllr Sylvester Bourke also said that people are avoiding the road to avoid congestion and therefore blocking up other roads such as around the

Ferrybank area.

Cllr Fitzgerald said that "we want this work done but you can't have people in queues of traffic this way" and described the situation as a big issue for the town. Although supervision of works is the responsibility of Irish Water and their own contractors, Cllr McDonald suggested that councillors request for correspondence between the Municipal District and Irish Water on this given that the council do not have staff supervising it.

It was agreed that council members would try to make contact with Irish Water and speak to them further on this matter.

Arklow Heritage and Pottery Centre a step closer

The team constructing the Arklow Heritage and Pottery Centre say its construction will not impact on the progress of the Arklow Wastewater Treatment Plant, Michael Nicholson, Director of Services at Wicklow County Council, informed councillors at this month's meeting of Arklow Municipal District Council.

The three-storey Heritage & Pottery Centre will contain the main museum display showcasing works of art and pottery, which will exhibit the ways of life in Arklow since the foundation of Arklow Pottery in 1934.

A restaurant and a small shop will also be housed in the centre, as well as an open-plan space for optional further exhibitions, displays or even a meeting place.

An observation was raised by Irish Water as part of the consultation phase for the centre, asking about any potential impact on the progress of works on the wastewater treatment plant.

Mr Nicholson explained

that his team have been trying to develop this project over the last number of years, and he was happy to report that there had been no public submissions received by the closing date, back in early January.

Another observation was made however by the Heritage Office of Wicklow County Council highlighting that an archaeologist would need to be appointed due to the close proximity to Abbey Graveyard and the site of a friary which holds potential for archaeological discovery in Arklow Town. The office also highlighted that in order to ensure compliance with legislation of the National

Monuments, and archaeological assessment should be carried out on site.

Mr Nicholson assured councillors that an archaeologist will be appointed to conduct the initial survey and will then be on standby during the construction stages.

The building will contain a lift with capability to provide access to all levels, including wheelchair users. Mr Nicholson said that his team are confident that the proposal would get through this year, and requested support from the councillors. Cathaoirleach of Arklow MD, Cllr Miriam Murphy said that she feels a project like this doesn't hap-

pen overnight but it is now "coming to a reality, after all the years of it being discussed around the table. "It seems like it's going to be a brilliant feature and we have to thank Michael and his department as well as the local committee".

Mr Nicholson highlighted the team efforts of Arklow Chamber of Commerce, Arklow Town Team, Arklow Municipal District Council and former employees of Arklow Pottery in getting the project off the ground and following a vote proposed by Cllr Annesley, all councillors agreed to support the proposal.

Local Primary Health Care Centres to progress

During the meeting an update on the Primary Health Care Centres for Arklow and Rathdrum was heard, which was received from the secretary to Minister for Health, Simon Harris.

Cathaoirleach Murphy said that the members were "very shaky and worried" about the progress of the centres following the controversy in the Dáil about the construction of the National Children's Hospital, and had raised the issue with local TDs.

The update read that "Arklow Primary Care Centre will not be delayed by the construction of the National Children's Hospital" and that the developer of Arklow Primary Care Centre has received a full grant of planning and has informed the HSE that works are programmed to commence construction in 2019. Following discussions, Cathaoirleach Murphy said that the Municipal District should respond and go back with a question specifically around the lease that the developer has going forward.

Speaking about the Primary Health Care Centre in Rathdrum, Cllr Pat Kennedy said that he had been working closely with the developers, and could confirm that a lease has been signed there. In a statement from the secretary to the Health Minister, the centre in Rathdrum "Is being progressed under the same system as Arklow PCC so will be unaffected by the HSE Capital Budget".

Construction in Rathdrum is programmed to commence on site in March and be delivered in 2020.

Outstanding 2018 works in Arklow Town

Low-cost safety schemes for 2018 have all been completed but ESB connection works remain outstanding in Arklow.

Councillors discussed the lack of street lighting on the Beech Rd at Coolboy Bridge after hearing that staff have had meetings and direct contact here but are finding it difficult to set down a date with the ESB to come out to the site and make a connection, they said.

Cathaoirleach Miriam Murphy described this waiting time as a "serious complaint" following Cllr Pat Fitzgerald remarking that it has been nearly a year.

Councillors also suggested the need for remedial work on footpaths in the town,

describing some situations where tiles are missing and footpaths are sinking.

Cathaoirleach Murphy offered to demonstrate the issue to the engineer to highlight the issue further. Cllr Sylvester Bourke expressed understanding at the lack of money available but said that things are "Very bad, and it's something we're going to have to face. The bricks we have are coming to the end of their life, management are going to have to find some way to replace them."

Remembering Sheehan in Arklow

While discussing a new housing development site in Arklow Town, located at the old council depot and Sheehan's crisp factory, Cllr Tommy Annesley proposed that the name "Sheehan Court" be given to the new estate.

Cllr Annesley explained that this would be a gesture as a mark of respect to the former councillor and entrepreneur John Sheehan, who gave much needed employment to the local area before he died at the young age of 44 in 1958.

Cllr Annesley presented the members with some historical research, which included an obituary that had been read at a council meeting in 1958, honouring the late Mr Sheehan. The obituary labelled John Sheehan a "kind and generous employer" and added that his main concern was always "the welfare and benefit of his employees" who were employed in his local factories. Cathaoirleach Miriam Murphy said that this name would be a fitting tribute to the man, known locally as Johnny, and Cllr Mary McDonald seconded Cllr Annesley's proposal for the new street name for consultation that will take place in the early summer time.

Cllr Pat Fitzgerald, whose father worked for Sheehan, said that the next step should be to try and make contact with the Sheehan family about this proposal. Cllr Annesley said that "As time goes on, I realise that history plays an integral part in the future of Arklow" and suggested a plaque be erected on the wall with historical information on it.

Former Fianna Fail councillor Kathleen Kelleher received the Leader's Award at the 79 u Fianna Fail Ard Fheis in recognition of service to the Party over the years. The Ard Fheis was held in Citywest Hotel on Saturday, 23rd February.

Speaking afterwards, Kathleen said the award was "unexpected, but much appreciated".

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SPRING 2020 FOR 'FLORENTINE CENTRE'

The 'Forentine Centre' site development in Bray has been given an opening date of Spring 2020, it was announced last week.

It was originally hoped that the 25,000 square metre mixed use development, located on the former 'Florentine Centre' site in Bray Town Centre, would be open in time for Christmas 2019.

Savills has been instructed as lettings agents and confirm that - in addition to the reserved

anchor tenant - some substantial pre-lets have also been agreed with the market leading Press Up Group. The Press Up Group will be operating a 5-screen Stella cinema, an exciting new leisure concept, and the renowned Elephant and Castle restaurant.

The high profile 2.4 acre main street site has

been the subject of a number of retail-led development proposals since 1996. In November 2016, Wicklow County Council - owners of the site - sought a development partner to realise the sites potential. Oakmount were appointed to develop the site in March 2018.

Darragh Cronin,

Director, Savills Ireland commented "The development of the Bray Town Centre will transform the retail and evening economy of Bray, where the main street has been poorly provided for due to a lack of restaurants, larger retail units and leisure offerings. The existing modern design that compliments the towns historic evolution will bring modern retailing and entertainment to this successful town."

The 3-storey development will comprise space for 3 anchor tenants - one of which is reserved - in addition to 9 individual retail units, restaurant / café space, and 250 car parking spots.

The plans also incorporate the development of a new urban street - accessed from Bray Main Street - and a central plaza with pedestrian access from Quinsborough Road.



Eight Wicklow towns to be 'poster free'

Eight towns and villages in Co. Wicklow so far have agreed to a voluntary ban on election posters for the upcoming Local and European Elections.

So far, the Co. Wicklow towns and villages that will have no election posters are; Glenealy, Wicklow Town, Arklow, Grange Con, Blessington, Avoca, Dunlavin and Baltinglass. In total, over 50 towns and villages around the country have currently agreed to be 'election poster free', and the list continues to grow.

The 'poster free' initiative is being encouraged by Tidy Towns groups and the campaign group PosterFree, a joint campaign by Donegal councillor Séamus Maguire and ZeroWaste.ie.

In Bray, Green Party councillor Steven Matthews will bring a proposal to the Municipal District Council requesting that they endorse a request from Bray Tidy Towns to limit the number of election posters in the town.

The proposal asks that all candidates and referendum campaigners would

voluntarily agree to keep Bray Main Street poster free as well as parts of Quinsborough and Florence Road; That all local election candidates would limit to 50 the number of posters they erect in the Bray District area; and that all Local election candidates, post elections would ensure the removal of any remaining cable ties from poles while removing their posters.

Cllr Matthews said "If I can get agreement on this then I think it's an important progressive step closer to eliminating fly poster. I had proposed to Wicklow County Council that designated poster sites such as temporary or mobile billboards run by the local authority could be a solution to fly poster. This would improve the safety aspect and also present a managed 'level playing field' for all candidates.

"The proposal was

referred to an SPC group (of which I'm not a member) but this group failed to progress the idea any further. I have no doubt that someday the ridiculous pre-election frenzy of fly poster will be prohibited. Until then I hope small measures like my proposal will keep the momentum towards that goal."

The PosterFree campaign group say "This May we're calling on all candidates to go poster free (plastic free) during the 2019 Local and European elections. We request candidates to abstain from the use of single use plastics. We encourage candidates to align their green agenda with their actions by going poster free (plastic free).

"We ask that Tidy Towns and other environmental organisations support by coordinating with candidates to introduce voluntary bans and poster free zones. In a 2018

Claire Byrne Live/Amáarach Research poll, 77% of respondents said that they thought the use of posters during election campaigns should be banned.

"Corrugated plastic, commonly known as Corriboard is the material of choice for election posters. Like other single use plastics, they take 400+ years to biodegrade. In the 2014 local elections, 2038 candidates ran for 765 seats. An estimated 611,000 posters were erected with a combined cost of €3M with posters covering the equivalent area of 23 Croke Parks. This produced 366 tonnes of Co2, the equivalent of driving an average car non stop for 592 days. In many areas, these posters were a safety and driving hazard, often obscuring important road signage. After 30 days of canvassing, the majority of these posters were sent to landfill."

'Jock and Annie Slater' arrives at Wicklow

The relief Shannon class lifeboat Jock and Annie Slater arrived in Wicklow harbour on Sunday 24th February, after traveling from the RNLI headquarters in Poole, Dorset.

A large turnout of family, friends and supporters gathered as the Wicklow all-weather lifeboat Annie Blaker and the Inshore lifeboat escorted the relief Shannon into the harbour, while a lone piper on the East pier played a musical tribute to signal the arrival.

Staff Coxswain Pete Hanscombe accompanied the crew on the training passage, but Coxswain Nick Keogh had the honour of bringing the relief Shannon into Wicklow harbour. A short impressive display of the boats speed and agility was greeted with applause from the crowd, before it came alongside the pier.

The relief lifeboat will replace the present Wicklow lifeboat in the next few weeks after the crew complete familiarisation training. Temporary mooring facilities are being placed on the South Quay to support the lifeboat once it becomes operational.

The Shannon lifeboat is self-righting and the first jet propelled lifeboat to go into service with the RNLI. Two Scania engines give it a speed of 25knots.

She is self-righting and can endure up to 10 hours

in extreme sea conditions. She is highly maneuverable even in shallower waters, and her Systems and Information Management System (SIMS) lets crew monitor, control and operate many of the boat's systems from the safety of their seat.

These seats have impressive suspension to make arduous sea voyages in the worst conditions more comfortable and safer for crew by reducing the impact of vertical slamming forces.

Her distinctive hull shape is also designed to reduce the vertical and transverse slamming forces caused by rough seas, with a narrow bow to slice through water and a wide aft section to keep the Shannon steady.

Speaking after the arrival of Jock and Annie Slater, Tommy Dover, Volunteer Press Officer at Wicklow RNLI Lifeboat Station commented: "The arrival of the relief Shannon today marks the end of an era at Wicklow, as Annie will be retired soon and naturally, we will miss her. She has been the busiest all-weather boat since our station opened in 1857, rescuing 400 people during the thirty years on sta-

tion. But we are all excited with the arrival of the relief Shannon, the crew are now focused on the transition to a jet-propelled lifeboat, which begins with familiarisation training on Monday and continues for the next few weeks."

The most important thing is to come up with an idea. You will need an idea for a business before you do anything else. This should be something you are passionate

about, since your new business will consume a great deal of your time and money.

Come up with business ideas by identifying things people need which no one else currently provides, that isn't provided in your area, or which you can provide better than anyone else.

Determine your cost of operation. You will need a solid business plan to present to any investors and the best place to start would be with determining your basic cost of operations. This will outline and help you determine how much money is needed to produce the product or offer the service you intend to offer or produce. It includes production costs, shipping, taxes, worker's wages, rent for workspace, etc.

Write up a budget. Once you have a general idea of how much money you have to work with, write up a budget for marketing which indicates how much money you have available to spend on



advertising.

Create ideas fitting your budget. Once you know how much money you have, research the costs of different types of marketing and come up with ideas which fit those methods and are effective for the price

range.

Talk with your bank. Talk with a bank with whom you already have a positive relationship.

Ask about what kind of business start-up loans they offer and how they can benefit your business. By
