"LET'S BE CLEAR, A HOUSE IS A **HOME, IT IS A PLACE TO LIVE"**

The problem of homelessness, soaring rents and unaffordable house prices calls for a new approach according to Malachaí Duddy, Independent local election candidate for Bray East, "The housing crisis and homelessness represent a failure of government policy but there are local solutions which must be implemented in order to improve the lives of people.

"At a time of crisis, or availing of the charity homes cannot be allowed to be treated as mere commodities. There is an attitude among some that a house is primarily an investment. Let's be clear, a house is a home, it is a place to live.'

According to Malachaí Duddy, there are solutions at a local level, "The lack of social housing being built over the past number of years is well documented. If the government is not in a position to allow local authorities build social housing, the answer is to facilitate housing associations or cooperatives to build on local authority owned land."

Duddy explains. "Housing cooperatives and housing associations are Approved Housing Bodies which means they can assist local authorities in the provision of housing. They are voluntary not-for-profit organisations that build housing for a specific purpose. The Ó Cualann Co-housing Alliance (named after the Sugarloaf) is a local example based here in Bray There is also a local Employees Housing Cooperative in the town. Ó Cualann has current projects in Dublin, Cork, Limerick. Kilkenny, Waterford and Tipperary but none in Wicklow because the land is not being made available."

Another area of potential investment is the credit union sector. As Duddy says, "The Irish League of Credit Unions is on record saying that the credit union sector has €700 million available now and it is waiting to invest in sociable and affordable housing, with the social housing income being effectively guaranteed by local authorities as an assured source of repayment. This figure would provide 5,000 homes without exposing credit union member funds to undue risk."



'POOR GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT ARRANGEMENTS' AT SUNBEAM RESPITE CENTRE

An inspection of a centre operated by Sunbeam House Services (SHS) found poor governance, leadership and management arrangements which were impacting on the care and support provided to residents, HIQA (Health Information and Quality Authority) have said. HIQA said that significant improvement was required to ensure residents' needs were appropriately met with regard to their assessed needs.

A HIQA inspection report published last week for Suaimhneas Respite Centre in Bray found that "The provider's governance, leadership and management arrangements had not ensured a good quality service".

"In response to the findings of this inspection, the Office of the Chief Inspector wrote formally to the registered provider representative requiring the provider to submit assurances as to how they planned to address issues of non-compliance and ineffective governance arrangements. The provider submitted a response to the Office of the Chief Inspector within one week of the inspection setting out a number of actions that had been undertaken to improve the overall quality of service provided to residents."

The centre commenced operation last September in order for the transition of the respite service from another designated centre within Sunbeam House Services. It supports men and women with an intellectual disability who require low to medium support, and can care for four residents at any one time.

The inspection was carried out in January of this year. It noted that "some residents said they were happy with the service they received, while others expressed dissatis-

faction with the service and felt it was not meeting their assessed needs".

The report further notes that "the provider had failed to adhere to transition date time-lines" which resulted in "a resident living in respite service provision, on a full-time basis, for over a year."

"The provider's ineffective transition processes and systems had impacted on the quality of service provision for the resident. Suaimhneas Respite service was not set out to meet the needs of residents requiring fulltime residential services and therefore the provider was failing to meet the assessed needs of some residents and also failing to adhere to the matters as set out in their statement of purpose.

SHS CEO Hugh Kane recently tendered his resignation as CEO, a position he's held for 19 months after initially being appointed for a sixmonth period. He told *Wicklow Times* recently that the Board would begin the process to appoint a new CEO.







Advertising for a design team for the extension to Blessington Community College has taken place. Design teams visited the site last week and the selection will be made shortly. It is expected that the extension will take three years to complete.

'Transport chaos' in Greystones without transport improvements

Cllr Derek Mitchell said he will be voting against any further rezoning in Greystones or Kilcoole in the next Development Plan.

"They are building everywhere but the road and transport improvements have not happened," he explained. "In 2015 I proposed, at a Council meeting on the Development Plan, that this expansion should be dependent on the N11 and Public Transport being improved.

"This was heavily defeated and only Cllr Grainne McLoughlin (FG) of the six local councillors supported

this. The transport chaos that is happening is a direct result.

"Most Councillors don't seem to understand the difficulties faced by commuters, they just seem to want to maximise rezoning. Since then I have worked hard to get the N11 and DART improved but the building is outpacing transport. It would be far, far better if this condition had been imposed," concluded Cllr Mitchell.

Seperately, Cllr Mitchell is calling on Wicklow County Council to produce a plan for the Greenroute along the Three Trout Stream from the sea to Delgany.

Cllr Mitchell said "This should form an attractive walk and has been an objective for decades. There are various suggestions that individual developments will produce sections of it. An overall plan dealing with lighting, security, biodiversity etc. is needed so that it joins up in a coherent way. I am asking the Council to produce this plan so that each section which is developed fits in to a plan.

'No Public Access' sign removed from Enniskerry Garda station

Access" Sign has been removed from the front window Enniskerry Garda Station.

Over 200 locals in Enniskerry signed a petition, set up by Independent local election candidate Rory O'Connor, urging the Minister for Justice Charlie Flanagan TD to give the public access to Enniskerry Garda station. The petition opened on April 1st and quickly gathered pace, becoming an election issue in the village.

Rory O'Connor said: "It's very apparent that the people of Enniskerry recognise the lack of services in the village is a real issue. It's simply not good enough to say that there are Gardai there and you have to go around the back and knock on the window. We need our local Garda station open and delivering state services when they're paid to be there.'

'Make Wicklow train station fit for purpose'

Labour candidate for the Wicklow Electoral Area Paul O'Brien has called on Iarnród Éireann to make the station in Wicklow Town fit for purpose.

"I am convinced that the next steps we must take are to link the walking trails in Tinahely to Blessington via the villages and towns of West Wicklow such as Knockanana, Rathdangan, Baltinglass, Stratford, Donard, and Dunlavin. We already have an impressive 45 km of integrated walking tourism in South West Wicklow and this needs to be built upon.

€15,000 secured for public WiFi

Wicklow has been awarded a €15,000 voucher to install free public WiFi hotspots under the WiFi4EU initiative.

Each Local Authority in Ireland can apply through a competitive process for a maximum of 4 vouchers, each worth €15,000, over the lifetime of the scheme. The overall budget for the WiFi4EU scheme is €120 million between 2018 and 2020. €42 million was allocated to the first call and €51m to the second call.

Two further calls for applications under WiFi4EU will take place between now and the end of the initiative in 2020. €27 million of the overall scheme budget will be allocated during this period.

The service will be free of charge, free of advertising and free from commercial re-use of data.

The voucher may serve to purchase new equip-ment or upgrade old material and replace it with most recent and best available equipment on the market.

The first WiFi4EU call, which took place in November 2018, was hugely successful and granted 2,800 vouchers to municipalities from all across Europe, including 62 vouchers for Ireland.

'Urgent overhaul needed of outdated and unfair council funding'

Local election candidate Cllr Jennifer Whitmore has called for a complete overhaul of the method of funding Councils, saying it is unfair and discriminatory on Wicklow.

Whitmore's call came following the publication of the Social Democrat's policy 'Fairer Funding for Local Authorities' and she said that Wicklow residents would benefit hugely from the proposals if adopted by Government.

"As a Social Democrats Councillor I welcome the Party's proposal for a complete overhaul of how Local Property Tax (LPT) is distributed to ensure that councils like Wicklow County Council can properly meet the needs of their residents.

"The current model is outdated and deeply unfair particularly in areas with rapidly growing populations as is the experience in Wicklow. Residents in Wicklow are at a serious disadvantage as population increase means more pressure on increased funding to meet those needs.

"However, there is varied spending power across different councils in Ireland with Wicklow faring the third lowest in





local spending per capita according to 2018 figures. We are also fairly low in the pecking order of the amount of money we receive from Government Council Grants: the 6th lowest in the country based on 2017 figures."
Cllr Whitmore said

"Everyone can see clearly demands that increased developments in Grevstones, Kilcoole and Newtown are having on road infrastructure, school places and the continued need for increased recreational areas, youth centres, libraries and community halls, services I have been campaigning for in years as Councillor.

"The problem with the current system is that the Local Property Tax isn't local. Income generated from each County goes to the Central Exchequer fund before it is divided up. Unfortunately the current way of distributing the LPT is based on an out-of-date way of redistribution and one which was determined over 20 years ago when we did not have the same population changes as we do

"Our proposal calls on the Government to go back to the drawing board and establish transparent funding procedures. These must be updated at every census and take into consideration a wide variety of needs and deficits with much more emphasis on population changes as we are experiencing in Wicklow" concluded Whitmore.



Leinster needs a MEP but will it be one from Wicklow?

County Wicklow voters in the EU election will again be voting in a constituency labelled 'South'.

South elects 5 Members of the European Parliament (MEPs) using proportional representation by means of the single transferable vote

It was created in 2004 with the same area as the old Munster constituency, except for County Clare which was then in North-West. For the 2019 European Parliament election, a re-apportionment following Brexit and the loss of 73 MEPs from the United Kingdom gave two additional seats to Ireland. Following a recommendation of the Constituency Commission, South gained territory and an additional seat, from 4 to 5.However, the last candidate elected will not take their seat until after the United Kingdom has withdrawn from the European Union.

74.1% of the constituency's population live in Munster, while the southern Leinster counties account for 25.9%. The main urban areas (by population size) are Cork, Limerick, Waterford, Bray, Kilkenny, Ennis, Carlow, Tralee, Tullamore, Port Laoise and Wexford.

The political parties have divided up the territory amongst their candidates with the likes of sitting MEPs Sean Kelly and Deirdre Clune not even canvassing in Leinster. There is a drive on to elect a Leinster MEP and County Wicklow hasn't had an MEP since Greystones based Green Party Nuala Ahern was successful.

We profile here the candidates that have canvassed County Wicklow for your support.

MINISTER ANDREW DOYLE Fine Gael



Minister Andrew Doyle is the Fine Gael MEP candidate for the Ireland South constituency in the upcoming European elections. He is currently the Minister with responsibility for Food, Forestry and Horticulture. His long political career has resulted in extensive experience and knowledge at a national, European and global level - across a variety of key topics such as agriculture, food, fisheries, marine, tourism and business.


