WILDFIRES WARNING

A number of large-scale fires have ravaged areas of County Wicklow's forests and hillsides in recent weeks and the trend is likely to continue as we enter into the summer months.

Following dry weather patterns, a wildfire risk can quickly develop in all areas where flammable vegetation such as grasses, gorse and heather are present, which makes Co. Wicklow, the most forested county in Ireland, the most vulnerable county for forest fires.

The most recent blaze occurred on the west side of Sugarloaf Mountain, in an area known as the Rocky Valley, with Bray fire crews eventually extinguishing it.

On Tuesday 14th May, a fire in the Wicklow Mountains that spread to

the historic 'Coronation Plantation' lasted for several hours before Wicklow Fire Services with the help of the National Park staff eventually extinguished it in the early hours of the next morning. The fire started with the burning of vegetation, which is illegal between March 1st and August 31st, and then spread to the historic site, which dates back to 1831.

On Sunday 12th May a gorse fire occurred near Wicklow head close to Wicklow Town. In February, firefighters needed the assistance of an air corps helicopter to help tackle an inferno

that spread across the areas of Hollywood, Lacken and Kippure, threatening homes. Fires lasted for days in the Wicklow and Dublin Uplands at this time.

Andrew Doyle, Minister of State at the Department of Food, Forestry and Horticulture has urged farmers, forest owners, forest managers and the public of the need to be alert to the risk of wildfires over the summer months, and he called for anyone enjoying the outdoor recreation to behave responsibly and within the law.

"I want to continue to urge farmers, forest

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owners, forest managers that there is a risk of fires during summer months on certain types of land, particularly in upland areas, and that high fire risk conditions can be expected over the coming months, when weather conditions dictate."

Recalling the major wildfires in recent years that destroyed or damaged property, including farmland and forests, he added; "Such fires directly endanger people's homes and property and destroy valuable habitats and tourism resources. Furthermore, they place enormous strain on the emergency services and put the lives of rural dwellers and emergency service personnel at considerable risk.

"The message is essentially the same each year

- I ask land owners, rural dwellers and other land users to maintain a high degree of vigilance regarding fire, with special regard to lighting fires."

Michael Power, National Estates Risk Manager for Coillte, says that people who burn growing vegetation on uncultivated land between 1st March and 31st August are liable to prosecution and could face fines, imprisonment and penalties to their farm payments.

Aidan Dempsey, Chief Fire Officer for Wicklow County Council says that "Suspicious activity should be reported to the Gardaí and uncontrolled or unattended fires should be reported immediately to the Fire and Emergency Services."

PERMISSION GRANTED FOR MASTS AT MARTELLO

Permission has been granted by An Bord Pleanála for the installation of six antenna and four transmission dishes at the rear roof level of the Martello on Strand Road.

The Board granted permission after two previous refusals by Wicklow County Council. The planners refused permission as they considered it would be contrary to the development standards for mast and telecommunications structures as set out in the County Development Plan. They said the development had the 'potential to impact upon the residential amenities of the area and to detract from the visual amenities of this area. To permit this development would therefore be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area.'

The report also stated that the applicants had failed to submit a statement of compliance with the International Radiation Protection Association (IRPA) Guidelines.

However, following an appeal, An Bord Pleanála found that having regard to the existing pattern of development in the area, and the nature and scale of the proposed development, it considered that 'subject to compliance, the proposed development would be in accordance with the proper planning and sustainable planning of the area.'

The six antenna will be 2.5m high (8.2

ft) with four transmission dishes on supporting poles including remote radio units, gantry platform with associated equipment cabinets, cabling and associated site works.

The application, by Cignal Infrastructure Ltd, is one of five applications by the company in locations around County Wicklow since 2017. Applications were lodged for locations at Merrymount in Rathnew, Meridian Shopping Centre in Greystones, Sandyhills in Dunlavin, The Horse and Hound in Delgany as well as the Martello Bray.

The application in Greystones led to the formation of a campaign last month by concerned locals to halt the development. They said they were concerned that the masts will 'expose residents within 50/100 metres of the tower to microwave frequencies known to be biologically active 24/7; expose workers/shoppers/school and afterschool children to biologically active microwave frequencies; significantly devalue the surrounding property potentially making housing units in close proximity unsaleable.'

Coillte outlines seven steps to prevent fires this summer: "Do not light fires in or near woodland; Have a fire plan. Ensure you have a current fire plan for your forest; Work with neighbours. Co-operation is vital to achieve successful pre-prevention; be vigilant. Forest owners should be particularly vigilant following dry weather; Check fire breaks and access routes; insure your crop; report losses. If a plantation is destroyed or damaged by fire, the incident should be reported to the nearest Garda Station and to the Forest Service."

The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) recently announced plans to manage the risk of wildfires through drone technology. The NPWS will work with Coillte to combat the spread of wildfires. This pilot is the first of its kind. It will initially be rolled out in the Dublin Mountains and if successful both NPWS and Coillte will look to roll out this technology in other areas.

Drones can be equipped with infrared cameras that peer through smoke, as well as sensors for wind direction and other weather variables that affect how fires spread. They will capture continuous footage of areas deemed as high-risk

and spot small fires that otherwise could not have been detected until they had become much larger and harder to contain.

The Wicklow Uplands Council say that they "have seen a rise in the extent and frequency of unregulated burning in recent years, highlighting a greater need for controlled burning practices to be implemented. There is a perception that burning vegetation within the permissive season is 'controlled' while outside the season is 'uncontrolled'. This is not the case. Controlled burning refers to the practice of burning smaller areas of vegetation on a rotational basis. It requires notice be given to adjacent landowners and local Gardaí. Burning areas greater than 5 ha within a designated area requires prior written consent from the NPWS. Uncontrolled burning, regardless of the time of year, is destructive and poses a serious threat to property, public safety and can cause extensive damage."

'Serious gaps' in Wicklow dementia services

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland (ASI) says there are serious gaps in the services provided in Wicklow, with none of the following services available according to the mapping project carried out by ASI and National Dementia Office (NDO): Dementia Assistive Technology Library, Dementia Cognitive Therapies, Dementia Counselling Service and Dementia In-Home Respite.

There are over 1,200 people living with dementia and their struggling families in Wicklow. With dementia a growing issue and the majority of those with dementia living in the community, there is a need for a 'whole community response' to dementia, the ASI says.

The ASI is calling on newly elected local councillors to sign up and become a 'Dementia: Understand Together Community Champion' at understandtogether.ie; Engage with local dementia service providers to identify facilities where dementia inclusive initiatives can be held and link with other Community Champions to offer these; Encourage public facing staff e.g. libraries, to participate in dementia-awareness training.

This support from local representatives is desperately needed, ASI says, the 2018 mapping of dementia-specific services in Ireland shows that not only does access to community dementia-specific services vary depending on where you live, but no county has even a minimum level of dementia support.

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland CEO, Pat McLoughlin, said "People with dementia and their family carers need their newly elected local representatives to play a key role in championing their rights in the years ahead and a community-wide response is needed to ensure that struggling families get better support and services. Dementia is one of the biggest health issues that this country faces. The sad reality is that

people with dementia and their families are really struggling because they are being faced with inadequate services and supports."

Vice-Chair of the Irish Dementia Working Group (IDWG), Kathy Ryan said "Newly elected local councillors can ensure that local communities make dementia a priority. The last time the local elections were held, in 2014, was when I received my diagnosis of Younger Onset Alzheimer's, so this year's elections have a special poignancy for me. By everyone learning a little, you have the potential of helping us a lot."

Irish homecare provider, Bluebird Care, recently launched Understand, Respect and Respond with Care, a national roadshow of community talks to raise awareness of

dementia in support of the HSE's Dementia: Understand Together campaign.

Speaking at the launch, Managing Director of Bluebird Care Ireland, Brian MacGoey, commented, "In Ireland one in two people know someone who has dementia. People who have had a diagnosis of dementia can live active and meaningful lives in the community and it's important to learn how best to support these individuals and their families. The Bluebird Care campaign is called Understand, Respect and Respond with care. Our aim is to raise public awareness and give people the skills and additional knowledge to respond appropriately to people and their families with a diagnosis of dementia."

Water works in Wicklow Town

Irish Water, working in partnership with Wicklow County Council, is commencing works to replace aging water mains in Fitzwilliam Square, Wicklow Town. The works are due for completion by the end of June. Once complete, Irish Water say, the benefits of the project for the local community will include a more reliable water supply for all customers.

"Replacing old water mains and service connections will reduce the instances of bursts and water outages to customers and local businesses in the area. Operational and maintenance costs will also be reduced as the network operation will require less maintenance."

The work is part of Irish Water's national Leakage Reduction Programme as part of which over €500 million is being invested to reduce the level of leakage across the country by fixing and replacing aging water mains. Irish Water say "This will ensure a safe, reliable water supply which is vital for our health, our environment and our growing population and economy."

The works will involve the replacement of approximately 350 metres of aged cast iron and problematic water mains with high density polyethylene (plastic) pipes. The section of works will take place between Abbey Street and Fitzwilliam Square. The works will also involve laying new water service connections from the public water main in the road to customers' property boundaries and connecting it to the customers' water supply. The works will be carried out by Ward and Burke Ltd, on behalf of Irish Water.

Irish Water has planned the works in short sections in order to limit impact on customers. Traffic management will be in place during this time with stop/go arrangements or temporary traffic lights in place on Fitzwilliam Square as required. Works may involve some short-term water shut offs and the project team will ensure that customers are given a minimum of 48 hours' notice prior to any planned water shut offs.

A local road closure is required for a section of the works which will be in place for a number of days on Fitzwilliam Square from the junction with Abbey Street to the junction with Bridge Street. The local community affected will be directly notified in advance of the closure. There may be local diversions in place for the duration of the works. Local and emergency traffic will be maintained at all times.

Commenting on the works, Joe Carroll, Irish Water's Leakage Reduction Programme Regional Lead said: "The replacement of these aging water mains in Wicklow Town will improve security of supply for local residents and businesses alike. Replacing the existing water mains with new modern pipes will provide a long-term solution to ensure a safe and secure water supply is delivered to customers. Irish Water understands this type of work can be inconvenient and will ensure our work crews make every effort to minimise any disruption these works may cause."

Residents and businesses in the areas of the works have been notified and customers can call the Irish Water customer helpline on 1850 278 278 for any questions in relation to the works.

Rehab Care services granted additional funding

Funding has been secured to save the Rehab Care services in Wicklow. The services in Wicklow are: Bray Resource Centre, Lean Aghaigh Day Service and Phoenix Resource Centre.

Bray Resource Centre is for people aged 30 and over who have mild intellectual disabilities (including autism and asperger's syndrome) and mental health issues. Lean Aghaigh Day Service is for people with profound disabilities, and Phoenix Resource Centre offers a vital service to younger people with a dual diagnosis of intellectual disability and mental ill health.

The agreement secures an additional €2million this year to fund RehabCare's services. The group had threatened to terminate provision of services due to a €2m HSE funding shortfall. Rehab Group and its Board stated that they are deeply relieved that these critical care services for more than 3,000 people throughout 117 locations can now continue to be provided.

RehabCare offers life-changing care and support for the people it serves. This includes vital respite and residential services for 186 children, many with high-support needs. It includes day services for more than 1,600 adults along with supported accommodation services which allows hundreds of people to live independently in their communities, some after leaving decades of institutional care.

Rehab Group CEO, Mo Flynn said "Every day we see the difference our work makes to the people who use our services and throughout this campaign we heard how much it would affect them were those services to be threatened. Many of people supported us by contacting their TDs, Councillors and Senators, and by holding

days of action. We're delighted their voices were heard by the HSE, Minister Harris and Minister McGrath.

"We welcome the fact that we have reached a resolution and that we can now continue to provide these vital services to the people of Wicklow who rely on them. The news will come as an enormous relief to the people in our services, their families and our dedicated staff who have worked so hard to campaign for the continuation of their services."

Fianna Fáil spokesperson on Health, Stephen Donnelly, welcomed the news but warned that families and service users should not have had to endure such fear in the lead up to the confirmation of funding.

Deputy Donnelly commented, "It is very wel-

come news that €2m has been secured for RehabCare services. The government only sat down with RehabCare after much political and public pressure.

"Nationwide, in every town and village, people benefit from the dedicated services of RehabCare. Often these services supplement health centre services, particularly in rural Ireland as this sector struggles.

"Without this €2m there was a real concern that services would stop. Fortunately, this is now not the case. The Minister for Health and his Department must quickly outline when the money will be issued and ensure an examination of issuing multi-year funding is considered, so we do not have an annual panic for the clients and families of RehabCare."

Initiatives will include the availability of peaked caps for people with autism and other sensory issues which will block out light and help staff to identify people who may need assistance.

Trips to the shops can be stressful for autistic adults and children and they can be overwhelmed by sensory experiences. Peaked caps reduce the possibility of sensory overload.

Sigma Retail Partners, which manages a number of retail parks across Ireland, is making the customer experience easier for families of children with special needs.

Working closely with stores, Bray Retail Park will provide advice to store staff and develop inclusive activities to improve the customer experience.

These will include 'quiet hours' to facilitate visits by people with autism and other sensory difficulties which will be advertised on the Park's Facebook page.

The spotlight on the family day was on the Bray Retail Park community providing both fun for children and information for families.

"There needs to be bigger and better awareness of autism in our commu-

nities across the country and Bray Retail Park is more than happy to introduce sensory-friendly shopping," added Emma.

Now in its ninth year, the National Scratch Competition has established itself among both teachers and students as a leading platform and showcase for Ireland's aspiring digital creators.

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Wicklow the exception as number and value of house sales decline in 2018

Wicklow was the only county in Leinster to see a fall both in the number of sales and the value of those sales in 2018, according to an analysis of the Property Price Register carried out by leading property website MyHome.ie.

The total number of sales in Wicklow accounted for 10.6% of Leinster, ex Dublin's, total. The amount spent accounted for 10% of the province's total, minus the capital.

The level of residential property sales in the rest of Leinster, excluding Dublin, increased by 6.1% in 2018 to 15,142. This means that property sales in Leinster, excluding Dublin, accounted for 26.6% of total national

sales of 56,836 last year.

Meanwhile, the total value of property sales in Leinster, excluding Dublin, increased by a much higher percentage, rising by 11.4% to almost €3.5bn.

The number of transactions fell by 3.4% from 1,667 to 1,611. Meanwhile the value of those sales was down 3% from €552.2 to €535.9m, a decline of €16.3m.

The bulk of the sales in

the province came in Kildare where sales rose from 2,850 to 3,076 - an increase of 7.9%. This was just over a fifth of all sales in the province, excluding Dublin. Kildare was also the county where the most amount of money was spent at €876.8m.

The Managing Director of MyHome.ie, Angela Keegan said the figures reflected the general trend towards increased urbanisation.

"Dublin has been very successful in attracting investment and higher paid jobs. As a result, the capital is where people increasingly want to live and if they can't live there due to the lack of affordable housing or if they want more space, they tend to move to towns in the commuter belt.

"Despite the fall in the volume of sales in Wicklow and a couple of other counties, sales were up in the other nine. Wicklow, along with the other commuter belt counties made it into the top five counties by number of sales. Overall the figures are encouraging as it shows the market is continuing to recover. For a market like Ireland's with some two million homes, we should be seeing at least 4% of those properties changing hands annually. We're currently under 60,000 sales nationally and we need to get to circa 80,000 sales a year, but the graph is moving in the right direction."

Wicklow rents rise by 7.1%

In Wicklow, rents were on average 7.1% higher in the first quarter of 2019 than a year previously. The average listed rent is now €1383, up 79% from its lowest point. That's according to the latest quarterly Rental Report by Daft.ie.

Rents in Dublin's commuter counties rose by an average of 6.6% in the year to March 2019 and are now almost 33% above their previous high in early 2008.

There are different trends in rental inflation across the country. In Dublin, the increase in rents in the year to December 2018 was 6.8%, the 31st consecutive quarter where rents have risen but the slowest increase since early 2013. Similarly, inflation is slowing in Leinster, with rents 7.3% higher than a year ago, half the rate of inflation seen two years ago. But elsewhere in the country, rents continue to rise at double digit rates, with increases of between 10% and 15% in Cork, Galway, Limerick and Waterford cities, and increases of 12% on average in Munster, Connacht and Ulster. Commenting on the report, Ronan Lyons, economist at Trinity College Dublin and author of the Daft Report, said: "The rental market remains plagued by weak supply at a time of strong demand. While the total number of rental homes on the market did improve slightly earlier in 2019, the figures for May have undone all that progress. Much of the commentary around new supply for the market is unhelpful, particularly talk of so-called 'cuckoo funds' - what in other countries are termed landlords. With the sale market showing signs of greater balance between supply and demand, policymakers must maintain their focus on boosting rental supply. A key part of that is developers building, and institutional landlords buying, new apartment blocks."

Raychel O'Connell from Daft.ie said "Low availability of rental properties is clearly a major issue at the moment. With over 1.4 million property searches on Daft each day demand continues to be strong, despite decreasing supply in the current market."

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Sports clubs benefit from early allocation of equipment sport capital fund

Co Wicklow sporting organisations will benefit from an early allocation of €417,861 for equipment only applications to the Sports Capital Fund.

Minister Simon Harris met with Minister of State with responsibility for Tourism and Sport recently and raised the issue of allocations to clubs awaiting funding for much needed equipment. Speaking after the meeting.

The allocations will benefit over 20 organisations. They include €89,310 for the 9th Wicklow (port of Arklow sea Scout group) for outdoor activities, €30,000 to Cobra Gymnastics Club for Safety and trampoline improvements, and €90,155 to Wicklow Sub Aqua Club Replacement RIB and

rescue inflatable. Minister Harris said: "I am delighted to confirm that Wicklow has received half a million euro in funding for just the equipment based Sports Capital applications.

"The Sports Capital Grant has become a very successful tool to aid the development of our sporting organisations and we in Co Wicklow have benefited significantly each year. This year, Minister Griffin has agreed to allocate the 'equipment only' applications ahead of the larger capital applications to ensure there is no unnecessary

delays for clubs. The equipment only applications can be processed and assessed much faster than the larger applications so this is really a common sense approach."

Minister Harris continued: "Having visited Wicklow Rowing Club on Saturday to unveil a new skiff purchased thanks to the 2018 Sports Capital scheme, it is fantastic to be able to confirm almost half a million euro in new funding for projects like this again today. Indeed, Wicklow Rowing Club will receive an additional €20,000 this year for an offshore Quad FISA

Boat with trailer this year. This €417,861 will mean significant improvements for clubs throughout Co Wicklow and I am really delighted to have been able to assist.

"As Minister for Health and a local TD, I am determined to do all I can to assist people to live healthier lives. Making sports clubs more accessible is key to helping our community to be more active.

"I look forward to meeting with Minister Griffin regarding the larger Sports Capital Applications from Co Wicklow shortly.

Pres Bray project contributes to local biodiversity

APPEAL AGAINST NURSING HOME DEVELOPMENT

An appeal has been lodged with An Bord Pleanála regarding a nursing home development on the former Dell site on the Boghall Road in Bray.

The planning application, submitted by Avonvard Limited, is for 'construction of a first phase of development consisting of a four storey nursing home and office building'.

The application was submitted to Wicklow County Council last October. The person against the development believes that Phase 1 of the development does not meet the objective in the Bray Local Area Plan which identifies the site for mixed use and high intensity employment uses, including 20,000 sqm of commercial and 150 residential units.

In a submission on the planning application they state "A nursing home is not a high intensity employment use and is effectively a residential use. The entire site would

therefore end up being developed as principally residential."

In a separate submission on the planning application, Cllr Joe Behan stated "I favour the development of this site for mixed use but I am concerned about the following issues; Height of the buildings relative to local residences; possible flooding of local residences by surface water emanating from the development; effect of the development on water pressure in the local area; roads and footpaths infrastructure and its ability to handle a development of this magnitude; Failure to include all elements of the proposed development of the full Dell site in this application, which would have allowed a complete assessment to be made of

the impact of the development in its totality; The potential destruction of mature trees on the site and the necessity to protect as many as possible; The impact of construction on the local residents and the necessity to ensure as little disruption as possible to local residential amenity."

Cllr Steven Matthews made a submission stating: "The proposed development does not comply with the specific objective for this site that 4 storey buildings would be located to the South and South West of the site. This objective was included in the zoning objective to protect visual amenity and views of Bray Head and to mitigate an over dominant visual impact and overlooking on the surrounding residents and school grounds".

The full development proposal is for the "construction of a first phase of development consisting of a four-storey nursing home building, accommodating 205 bedrooms with a total ground floor area of 10,440sqm, over a single level basement with a ground floor area of 2,228sqm. The proposal includes internal courtyards and terrace areas, and adjacent landscaped amenity space. A four storey office building, including a ground floor café (GFA of 175sqm), and 107 surface car parking spaces, 38 basement car parking spaces, 5 motorcycle spaces and 141 cycle spaces. Vehicular access will be via the existing entrance from Vevay Road."

The case is due to be decided in September.

Liverpool legends tasked with saving Greystones Utd from relegation

He played a key role in some memorable victories for the Boys in Green during a glittering international career. And now Jason McAteer is back in the spotlight once again after being tasked with saving 'no-hopers' Greystones Utd AFC from relegation in a new fly-on-the-wall documentary series.

McAteer and former Liverpool teammates John Barnes and John Aldridge attempt to turn round the fortunes of the rock-bottom Sunday league side in the latest BetVictor 'Training SOS' show - the popular youtube broadcasts where ex-professional players help out struggling teams.

The two-part series, which has been viewed nearly 500,000 times, was filmed over a month from late January when the team appeared to face certain relegation from the Leinster Senior Division 1 Sunday table, with just four draws and nine losses from their 13 games.

But team manager Martin Killilea said his team's prospects and his players' self-belief have since been transformed after their coaching sessions with the soccer legends, which also included a coaching session at Anfield, overseen by Liverpool boss Jurgen Klopp.

Since being 'signed up' for Training SOS, which was filmed in association with Liverpool FC, the ailing side started winning games for the first time and quickly rose from bottom of the 14-team table to 8th at one stage.

And although the side has since slipped down to 10th position, a victory in their final game next week will ensure they avoid relegation - a feat which seemed highly improbable just a few weeks ago.

Killilea said: "We were dead and buried before Jason McAteer turned up,

but what he and the other Liverpool lads left us with was a new sense of confidence and self-belief.

"We've still a fight on our hands to avoid the drop, but the difference now is that we really believe in ourselves."

And reflecting on his experience with the Sunday league team, McAteer said in the documentary: "I'm a massive believer that team spirit can add something. Playing for Ireland all those years I did, we were never blessed with world-class players. We had a sprinkling, but what we had was this unbeliev-

able team spirit." He added: "To be honest, when I was first told about the Greystones story and the mess they were in, I just didn't know how they were going to change their fortunes around. Yes, we've given them some decent mentors over the last couple of weeks, but the reas stars are the players themselves.

"It's their hard work, dedication, character and a new-found team spirit that will ensure they retain their leagues status. Anything is possible from here."

Meanwhile, Greystones Utd AFC is bidding to set a new world record next month for the most number of players taking part in a continuous match.

The challenge - which will raise funds for a new clubhouse - will involve hundreds of participants taking part in an uninterrupted 24-hour game of football. The world record attempt kicks off at 6pm from June 21. For further

WATER REFILL STATIONS PROVE POPULAR

Water bottle filling stations installed by Wicklow County Council in three secondary schools last November aimed at replacing single use plastic have proven popular with students using them tens of thousands of times.

Colaiste Chraobh Abhann in Kilcoole had the highest use with bottles being refilled from the mains-fed fountain some 48,625 times in the first six months since installation.

The school reported that the station is in use all the time and is popular with both students and teaching staff. As a next step, the school is considering getting a second machine to ease congestion but has also put a reusable bottle on its 2019 book list for first year students.

The other schools - Colaiste Bhride in Carnew and St Mary's College, Arklow - also reported high usage.

All three schools found that the water refill stations have reduced the amount of plastic waste generated in their schools and that the project was enthusiastically embraced by students.

Funded by the Environmental Protection Agency under the National Waste Prevention Programme, the aim of the project was to displace single use plastics in our secondary schools.

While at primary level students commonly use refillable bottles and beakers, the inverse occurs at secondary where over 80 per cent either buy a drink in school or outside of school.

Surveys carried out by Wicklow County Council with the participating schools show that 50 per cent own a reusable bottle but that much less use one on a regular basis. The survey highlight that students were aware of the cost, health and environmental benefits to drinking refill water.

The project aimed to provide students in participating schools with an easy option to take the refill route.

The machines selected have a counter to measure usage. They have a bottle filling outlet as well as a traditional drinking fountain. The counters showed that all three machines were each used tens of thousands of times.

St Mary's College is looking at banning single use plastic bottles altogether from its campus while Colaiste Bhride were delighted to get the machine as it was a purchase they had been considering in order to support the ongoing work of their Green School committee.

All three schools found that the water refill stations have reduced the amount of plastic waste generated in their schools and that the project was enthusiastically embraced by students.

Wicklow County Council will continue to focus on eliminating single use plastics throughout the county, working with communities and schools.

Meanwhile, the Council is leading by example. Single use cups are being phased out and tumblers and reusable bottles will be supplied for use at refill stations throughout the organisation in the coming months.

Avoiding single use plastic is one way we can all take action on Climate Change.

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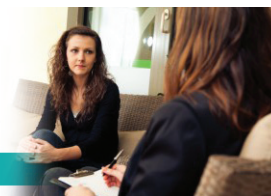

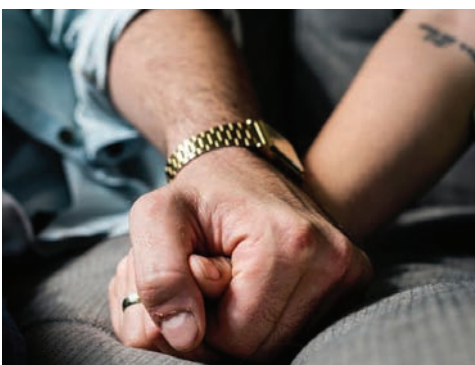

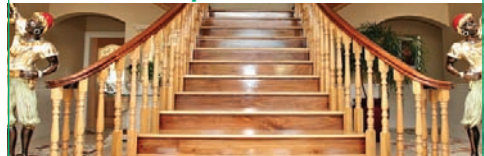

Eugene (Eoin) (Eugenio) was born in Cork and now lives and has a studio on Slievenamon in Co. Tipperary. He has a special affinity with Italy and has painted many works on Venice. His solo shows include ALCI, Loro Piceno Italy, Origin Gallery Dublin, Wexford Arts centre, Art Hive Cork, Turks & Caicos, Garter Lane, Waterford, Univeristy College Cork and The Narrow Space, Clonmel. He has participated in group shows in

Bled, Slovenia; Triofiac, Austria; Peoria, Illinois, USA; Collyer-Bristow, London; Irish Arts Centre, London; Ward Nasse, New York. His work is also religious and allegorical and he has written several pamphlets on art theory including 'Problems of Truth for the Painter'. His most recent work is based on residences in Cill Rialaig and studying the sea at Lettergesh Connemara which have produced the series 'Sky, Sea, Paint.'

"These works relate to recent stormy weather around the coasts of Waterford, Connemara and especially at the artist retreat of Cill Rialaig, in Kerry. A recent trip around the Skelligs left a lasting impression on me of the seas' overwhelming power and cantankerous nature. I have never gone onto the island rock of Skellig Michael as I feel ill at ease approaching such a spiritual place. But our relationship with the sea is an elemental

part of our nature and evocative paintings of the sea for its own sake were a significant part of the Romantic Movement. For painters of the figure, a basic understanding of anatomy is essential, and I have begun to learn that a study of the anatomy of the wave is also vital for sea painting. I have been much influenced in this by the works of the Great American marine painter Frederick Waugh. The Sky, Sea, Paint series relates in the main to my

attempts to capture something of the movement of the sea, mostly when it is angry and sometimes when it is wistful and evocative. I like that the elemental potency of great masses of water can be remembered in the sloppy viscous nature of paint on canvas. Sometimes it works; puddles of paint can recreate the shapes of water. But only for a moment, for the sea is ever changing, dangerous, tempting, relentless."
