# SOLAR FARMS FOR ARKLOW

Arklow could become the solar power capital of Co. Wicklow with five solar farms all located within 5km of each other. A planning application was submitted to Wicklow County Council last week for a solar farm at a site within the townland of Ballymoney just outside Arklow.

The application was submitted by BNRG Neoen Holdings Ltd, and is due to be decided on by 4th August.

According to the Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR) accompanying the application, four other Solar PV developments have been granted within 5km of the subject site.

Another application by BNRG was submitted for a solar farm in the townland of Johnstown North, on a site area of approximately 39ha with panels covering up to 27.2 ha. This was approved by the Council in May 2018. It

was subsequently appealed but was granted permission from An Bord Pleanála in February of this year.

An application by Highfield Solar Ltd for a solar farm in the townlands of Ballinclea, Ballyrichard & Templerainey, Arklow, on a site area of approximately 58.9 ha, was also granted permission by An Bord Pleanála in February, after being appealed by a third party.

Another application by Highfield Solar Ltd for a solar farm in the townlands of Templerainey & Coolboy, Kilbride, on a

21.5 ha site just 700m south west of the latest subject site, was approved by Wicklow County Council in June 2017.

Highfield was also granted permission by An Bord Pleanála in August 2016 for a solar farm in the townland of Ballycooleen, Avoca, on a site area of approximately 13.76 ha.

The most recent development would consist of a solar farm within a site area of approximately 19 hectares consisting of solar photovoltaic panels covering an area of up to 9.8 hectares on ground mounted steel frames, as

well as an on-site substation, and three inverter/transformer stations. Permission is being sought for a period of 10 years, with a request that the development be granted planning permission for an operational period of 30 years to reflect ongoing technology which make the expected physical lifetime of modern solar photovoltaic equipment at least 30 years.

The development would also consist of underground cables and ducts; boundary security fencing; new internal tracks; CCTV cameras and all associated site services.

The site of the proposed development is approximately 2.8km north of the centre of Arklow, and is bound to the west by the M11 Motorway. The site comprises five individual agricultural fields, the

existing land use of which is arable crop cultivation and pasture.

BNRG Renewables specialize in utility-scale solar PV projects, and the company's work covers all aspects of the project life cycle.

Previous projects include solar farms across the UK, South Eastern Europe and the United States. More recently it has expanded its activity to Australia and Latin America. The company states that their power plants are zero carbon emission.

The EIAR states that the other solar PV developments in the planning stages in the vicinity of the site need to be assessed cumulatively with the proposed solar farm in Ballymoney. Once operational, the solar farm will be monitored remotely.

# HOMELESS ACCOMMODATION CLOSES DOORS

A number of occupants of an emergency homeless shelter in Bray received a Notice to Quit letter on the morning of Friday 7th June informing them that their place in the facility was now closed. The shelter was opened as part of Wicklow County Council's 'Cold Weather Initiative', and The Simon Community operate it on behalf of the Council.

The council informed *Wicklow Times* that "Of the clients remaining in the service, move on options have been identified for most such as transitioning to supported accommodation and others have been accepted for the Dublin Homeless services as they are on the Dublin list. The clients have been kept fully aware and informed of developments."

John Brady TD has sharply criticised the closure of the emergency beds, stating "The housing crisis is continuing to grow with more and more people and families presenting as homeless. We need more houses and emergency accommodation to meet the demand, not closing beds."

"I am dealing with a number of people who had been using the facility and, as of today, they are back on the streets, no alternative accommodation was offered to them."

The only choice they say they have is to get sleeping bags and sleep in a field somewhere. The closure of the beds in Bray comes about only a matter of weeks after the terrible death of a young homeless man in the town.

"People are dying on our streets and the very measly measures being put in place to prevent this are being shut down. The 12 emergency winter beds in Wicklow were opened before Christmas, but never met the demand in Wicklow. There has been a consistent waiting list to gain access to the emergency beds. Despite this, a decision has been made to close these beds. It is absolutely shameful."

"I have continuously raised the issue of homelessness in Wicklow with Minister Eoghan Murphy and the need to keep the facility in Bray open. His constant reply has been that funding is not an

issue and all Wicklow County Council need to do is ask for funding. The question has to be asked then why are homeless people in Wicklow being thrown back onto the streets if that's the case. The Minister needs to intervene immediately to ensure that these vulnerable people aren't evicted and the facility remains open as long as there is a need for it."

In a statement to *Wicklow Times*, the Council said "Wicklow County Council operates the Cold Weather Initiative to provide shelter for those sleeping rough during inclement weather conditions, traditionally terminating the provision at the end of March/April. This year the Council extended the provision to continue the key support work with those who engaged with the Council and the service providers."

## 3000 take on the 38th edition of Wicklow 200

More than 3,000 riders from all over the world took to the roads of Wicklow for the 38th running of the Wicklow 200. Ireland's longest running mass participation bike ride, organised by the IVCA, attracted another huge entry to face one of the toughest challenges in Irish sport.

Riders of all ages taking part in the full 200km Wicklow 200 event and the Wicklow 100 Challenge sister event faced numerous hills and other difficulties along the way. Among the riders enjoying one of Ireland's toughest sporting challenges was Olympic medallist Annalise Murphy.

The sailing heroine has been a keen bike rider for many years and the Dubliner completed the 200km without difficulty and afterwards declared the day a great success.

"It was great! We actually didn't get rained on once even though there was a lot of heavy rain around. But yeah, it was pretty tough - I think everyone is feeling pretty tired after it," the Rio Silver medallist said when she arrived back in Bray. "But we managed to get a great group with three other guys for the first half, and then we had a group of six or seven of us for the second half, so it made a massive difference just being able to chat to people and we were rotating around, so yeah, overall, a great day out!"

Wicklow 200 is a celebration of road cycling for all as riders of all ages and levels of ability challenge themselves on a variety of steeds.

The event organisers IVCA were also satisfied at the conclusion of another successful edition of Ireland's favourite bike ride. The riders were supported throughout the day by an army of more than 250 volunteers from the IVCA.

The final finishers in the Wicklow 200 arriving back at Bray Emmets GAA Club just before 8pm, fully 13 hours after their departure on what is always a challenging day on the bike regardless of fitness levels and many, if not most, were soon making plans for the 39th edition of Wicklow 200 in June 2020.

## Approval of Spinraza welcomed

Minister for Health Minister Simon Harris has welcomed the decision of the HSE to approve access for the drug Nusinersen (Spinraza) for children with Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) Type I, II or III on an exceptional and individualised basis.

Minister Harris confirmed the decision was made by the HSE leadership team last week.

Speaking on this decision, Minister Harris said "This is such welcome news. Families have fought a long journey to get here but I am so pleased children will now have access to this drug. I am pleased to confirmed to me there will be no delay in accessing the drug. I want to commend the families for their campaign and the HSE for approving access."

Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Health, Stephen Donnelly has said that the HSE's decision to pay for the drug Spinraza is a testament to determination of patients and their families.

He explained, "This has been a long-fought battle by those suffering from the rare

muscle-wasting disease, spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) who rightly wanted the health authority here to follow the example of almost every other European country and supply the Spinraza treatment for free. When I joined families protesting outside the Dáil I was humbled by their strength and courage and I'm honoured they let me support them on their journey.

"I understand that it was a major decision for the Health Minister to sanction the level of funds needed to pay for Spinraza, but who among us could watch our loved ones suffering, know there is a treatment available and not do everything we can to help?

"We know that treatments are becoming more advanced and that there are now some incredibly expensive ones on the market. But this is the reality of modern medicine and we need to come up with a plan to deal with it. Specifically, we need projections for the kind of money that Ireland will have to spend in five- or ten-years' time, we can work to these projections and ensure that Irish citizens have access to the very latest breakthrough therapies. It's no less than Irish patients deserve", he concluded.

## Permission refused for Belair Village change of use

An Bord Pleanála (ABP) has refused permission for a change of use of 28 holiday homes in Ashford to private family homes.

The Ashford Owners Management Company Limited had made the appeal to ABP following Wicklow County Council's refusal of permission in December. The two-storey holiday homes are located in Belair Village, Cronroe Demesne.

In the cover letter for the planning application it was explained that the homes were linked to the Belair Hotel and it was expected that they would get bookings from an overflow of customers to the hotel. However, the closure of the hotel to all but private parties had an

impact on the holiday village as did the economic downturn.

In refusing permission, An Bord Pleanála stated that the change of use would "materially contravene the settlement strategy of the Development Plan and would be contrary to over-arching national policy in respect of rural housing as set out in the National Planning Framework" and would "set an undesirable precedent for further development of this kind and would be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area".

ABP also stated that the change of use would "materially contravene Objective W18 of the Wicklow County Council Development Plan 2016 which does not permit private wastewater treatment plants for multi-house developments", and would "result in a sub-standard level of residential amenity for future permanent residential occupants of the dwellings" due to "the design, layout, quantum, and poor quality of the existing public and private open spaces and the location and quantum of car parking spaces".

In its final reason for refusing permission, ABP stated "the proposed development would materially contravene a condition attached to an existing permission which requires that the use is restricted to short term tourist use only/ holiday letting and the development as a whole is held in single ownership. The proposed development would, therefore, set an undesirable precedent for further such changes of use, and would be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area."

## Ecotrail Wicklow and PURE partner to clean up The Uplands

On Saturday September the 28th, County Wicklow will become the 10th European destination to organise an EcoTrail Trail Running Event. Starting and finishing at Bray seafront, participants will have the choice of four different trail distances that will take them from the shore of the Irish Sea to the top of the Wicklow Mountains.

Ecotrail Wicklow comes with a very strong eco-responsible ethos and has partnered with the Wicklow/Dublin uplands environmental project, Pure (Protecting Uplands & Rural Environments). Ecotrail is committed to reducing litter, minimise environmental impact and promote public transport and are collaborating with Pure on litter picks and cleanups of all the running routes prior to start day.

The event will include 4 routes all starting from Bray Seafront, to suit both novices and ultra-trail runners, ranging from, 18km, 28km, 45km and 80km, with an expected 1,000 runners participating in the event.

Ian Davis, Pure Director, commented "This is the first time that this prestigious running event will be held in Ireland and Pure are delighted to be working with Wicklow Tourism and the Ecotrail Team. It's extremely important that both participants and spectators see the county of Wicklow, pure and pristine, the way it should be, and this collaboration will ensure that there is no unsightly litter and dumping tarnishing the 'Garden of Ireland'."

"Partnering with Pure is a perfect fit for Ecotrail Wicklow, and over the next few weeks and months, we will organise a series of litter picking mornings," said Fred Verdier from Wicklow County Tourism. "Embracing the Ecotrail concepts offers a fantastic opportunity to look after our Wicklow trails. We are committed to prepare our routes prior to our event in September, but also maintain our efforts throughout the year."

The various optional trails will take participants to some of Wicklow's most scenic locations including Bray Head, Killruddery Estate & Gardens, Belmont Estate, Little & Great Sugarloaf, Powerscourt Waterfall, the Wicklow Way, Lough

Tay (Guinness Lake) viewing point and all the way to Roundwood and the Vartry Reservoir.

Ecotrail was first organised in Paris ten years ago with the objective to connect the city with the outdoors with a stunning finish on the first floor of the Eiffel Tower.

The Ecotrail concept has been recreated around various cities in Europe and is now held in Reykjavik, Oslo, Stockholm, Brussels, Geneva, Florence, Madrid and Funchal (Madeira).

# Council to form new Climate and Biodiversity Committee

Just weeks after Wicklow County Council became the first council to declare a climate and biodiversity emergency, Green Party councillor Steven Matthews proposed the formation of a new Strategic Policy Committee (SPC) dedicated to climate and biodiversity action. The committee will produce climate and biodiversity policy and actions for the full council to consider.

Cllr Matthews received cross-party support for the proposal which he put forward at the Council's annual meeting on Friday 7th June.

Speaking at the meeting, Cllr Matthews said, "Wicklow County Council was the first Local Authority in Ireland to declare a climate emergency, this was a bold and necessary step, but now we have to take action. The Citizen's Assembly recommends Local Authorities to form SPCs to tackle it, and we as councillors are empowered by the Local Government Act to do so. We should set the example and lead on this. I'm asking members to support this and make good on election promises that were made."

Fellow Green Party councillor Lourda Scott called the proposal "absolutely essential": "This is an issue that the electorate are worried about. We must put it at the forefront, the next five years will be critical."

The proposal was sec-

onded by Cllr Tom Fortune (Ind) who said that Wicklow County Council had to show leadership: "We are here to reflect the mood of the electorate, it would be remiss of us not to approve this. We can't just pay lip service to this issue, we must approve the forming of this new SPC."

Cllr Jennifer Whitmore (SD) said that although people had welcomed the Council's declaration of a climate emergency, they had been quick to follow it up with the question "so now what?" "This is the next step that we need to take," said Cllr Whitmore, "we need to have this as an SPC to give the issue the importance it needs."

The position of chairperson of the new SPC will be shared between Cllr Whitmore, for the half of the Council's five-year term, and Cllr Matthews for the second half.

Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council Frank Curran agreed that climate

change and biodiversity action should be a priority for the council. He explained that the topic currently comes under the remit of the Environment SPC, but that the Corporate Policy Group (CPG) would work towards drawing up terms of reference for the new SPC.

Cllr Anne Ferris (Lab) requested that an update be provided at the July meeting, and said that she wished to see the terms of reference ready by September.

Speaking to *Wicklow Times* after the meeting Councillor Matthews said, "There is much urgent work to be done to address the loss of biodiversity, environmental degradation and to mitigate climate breakdown and we all have a hand in addressing this emergency."

"So many residents raised these issues during the local elections and so many candidates promised to take action if elected."

"The Council's Climate Adaptation

Strategy is out for public consultation until July 5th and this gives every resident in Wicklow the opportunity to request action and make suggestions on what the Council should do in relation to the services it provides.

"As joint chair of the Climate and Biodiversity SPC I will be working with all councillors and the council executive to implement policies, objectives and actions to address our climate emergency, to protect our environment and to prevent further loss to our biodiversity."

"I would urge all residents to make a submission on the climate action strategy and I would especially like the younger people in Wicklow to let us know their views and opinions on what action they want to see."

## Wicklow excels in latest IBAL litter survey

The latest litter survey by business group Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) shows that Wicklow is in 13th spot overall in the ranking of 40 towns and cities nationwide and is among 14 towns to be deemed "Cleaner than European Norms".

The survey also revealed that Ireland's principal tourist towns and cities are cleaner than ever as the peak season for visitors approaches. Kilkenny topped the rankings, with Ballymun in Dublin City a litter blackspot at the foot of the table.

The An Taisce report stated: "A best-ever showing for Wicklow Town on its return to the League after an absence of several years. Top ranking sites included the Car Park on Church Street, the Main Street and Wicklow Harbour to Murrough Playground - the latter was exceptionally good in terms of litter. This lovely 'promenade' walk is clearly a very well respected environment. Ironically, the one seriously littered site was the 'Viewing Area' on Dunbur Road. Most of the site was excellent with regard to presentation and maintenance but it was badly let down by heavy accumulations of food and alcohol related litter in a corner location."

Litter levels were assessed by An Taisce, who found 31 of towns and cities, or 77%, to be clean. This was in line with recent IBAL surveys.

"Today's tourists demand high levels of cleanliness and these results indicate that's what they will be getting this year when they come to Ireland," says IBAL's Conor Horgan.

For the first time in 3 years, an area received the lowest grade of 'litter blackspot' as Ballymun recorded one of the worst results since the league was founded 17 years ago.

# The River Derry Bubbles Project

**A River Derry Bubbles Project exhibition by Kilcommon National School in Tinahely is taking place on June 19th at 1.30pm.**

This project was funded and supported by Wicklow County Council and Tinahely Community Projects. The exhibition will be held in Tinahely Library, Market Square, and has been organised by Rubalcava Heritage Services, Maeve Hunter, artist and educator with the help of Joanne Katus from Kilcommon National School.

The River Derry Bubbles Project is a pilot project in Tinahely developed by Sarah Rubalcava of Rubalcava Heritage Services. Sarah hopes to expand the project and allow The Bubbles journey down the river passing on important messages as they head towards the Slaney and beyond.

3rd and 4th class students of Kilcommon National School in Tinahely have been led on a journey by The Bubbles. They have learnt about the Derry River and catchment area. A catch-

ment has been described as "a community related by water". Working closely with Sarah, is Maeve Hunter who has guided the kids with the development of a River Derry Bubbles diary, making a World Waters Day card, and an up-cycled, water themed t-shirt. These are some of the things that will form part of the exhibition in Tinahely Library.

The project received funding through Wicklow County Council's Local Agenda 21 Environmental Fund and Tinahely Community Projects. The River Derry Bubbles Project has helped to raise awareness of the biodiversity, uses and issues associated with an Irish river on a local scale. Some of the outdoor learning experiences include bringing the kids to the local water abstraction and treatment units, and a visit to Tomnafinnoge Woods (Special Area of Conservation) where the kids got up close and per-

sonal with the aquatic life in the river. A visit to the school by Mary Ryan of Kerry Foods, Shillelagh, helped the students see how food is linked with the river.

As part of Ireland's commitment to the Water Framework Directive (WFD), and the current implementation plans (2016-2021), 2nd cycle, community engagement is strongly encouraged and supported by the authorities. The Derry River based on the 'catchment' concept of the WFD firmly places Tinahely within the larger Slaney Catchment. Community engagement like the River Derry Bubbles Project raises awareness of our streams and rivers, fostering positive actions and behavioural change. These in turn are proven to improve water quality both inland and further downstream benefitting communities and natural environments.

Green Party Councillor Steven Matthews was elected Cathaoirleach of Bray Municipal District at last week's first meeting of the new council. Councillor Matthews topped the poll of the East ward in Bray at the local elections and was nominated unopposed.

Speaking after the meeting, Cllr Steven Matthews said he was delighted and thankful to his family and all who had supported him and voted for him in the local elections. He also thanked the elected members for entrusting him as Cathaoirleach for the first year of the new council.

"The first year is always a difficult one

as the new council beds in but we have a good mix of new and enthusiastic members and returning experienced councillors. It's vitally important that the eight Bray Councillors work together to ensure that Bray district gets the budgets and investment it needs so that the residents of Bray, Enniskerry and Kilmacanogue receive good services and maintenance in their areas.

"I'm looking forward to the year ahead, there is, as always a lot of work to be done and a lot of projects to progress for the betterment of the town. There are housing schemes progressing and more coming on stream but far too slowly in my view and pressure must be kept on the Department to provide funding for the local authorities to build more houses. Transport is also a big issue for our town, with the new public transport bridge and NTA projects progressing and there are also plans to improve access from the Dublin Road to the town. It is critical that we also improve pedestrian and cycling infrastructure and create safer walking routes to schools.

"The larger projects I will be focusing on are the Bray Harbour protection and improvement scheme and the large community sports facility proposed for the old Fasaroe lands as they develop. There are other smaller but important projects such as a dog park and skateboard park and also supporting the tremendous work of voluntary and community groups such as Bray Tidy Towns. "As ever, environmental protection and proper planning for our town will be my priority and I'm also keen to get working on the climate and biodiversity action committee which I will be co-chairing on Wicklow County Council. I'm relieved that the election is over and very eager to keep working for the town and district with our council management team."

## Winters elected Cathaoirleach

Fine Gael councillor Irene Winters was elected as the third ever female Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council at the annual meeting on Friday 7th June.

Cllr Winters was elected by a narrow margin over the Green Party's Steven Matthews, winning by a vote of 17 to 15.

Cllr Winters was nominated by Cllr Shay Cullen (FG), while Cllr Matthews was nominated by Cllr Anne Ferris (Lab).

Cllr Winters follows in the footsteps of Independent Councillor Mary Walsh from Tinahely, who served as Cathaoirleach in the 1970s, and more recently Cllr Anne Ferris.

Cllr Winters said it is "an honour and a privilege" to be Cathaoirleach. She thanked her mother and family, and the many people who have helped her on a personal and political level over the years.

Cllr Winters, when

elects to the Council 10 years ago, was the only female councillor. On becoming Cathaoirleach she welcomed the fact that there is now 40% female representation on the Council.

Cllr Winters said she wishes to prioritise the areas of transport, housing, climate action and economic development during her term as Cathaoirleach. She also said that she wants to see the Council exploring all possible funding streams, to draw down as much funding as possible from central Government. Cllr Winters said she wants to see quick progress on a third lane for the N11, improvements on the N81 in West Wicklow, and the creation of more local jobs.

"The public have put us in a position of trust, they have entrusted us to lead Co. Wicklow to a better future. We may not always agree on the details, but everyone here wants a vibrant and thriving Co. Wicklow for all of our communities," she stated. "I hope over the next five years we will work together and put party politics out the window."

Fine Gael's Pat Kennedy, meanwhile, will be the Leas Cathaoirleach, as he was elected over Cllr Jennifer Whitmore by the same margin of 17 votes to 15. Cllr Pat Fitzgerald, in nominating Cllr Kennedy praised him as a 'workaholic' and said he would make a very effective Leas Cathaoirleach.

## Balance of power in Council hinges on one vote

'Independent' Murphy backs Fianna Fáil again

With the votes for Cathaoirleach and Leas Cathaoirleach at the first meeting of the new County Council on June 7th, it was clear that the balance of power in the Council, although it has not shifted, is more precarious than it was.

The votes, being an indication of how the voting pattern will be over the five-year term of the council, revealed that Fianna Fail and Fine Gael now hold only a very slim margin of control over the other grouping which includes Independents and other parties.

Both councillors Irene Winters and Pat Kennedy were elected to the positions of Cathaoirleach and Leas Cathaoirleach by a narrow margin (17 to 15). While Fianna Fail and Fine Gael have consistently voted together as a block, against the other grouping, they were previously also able to rely on the support of Independent councillors Jim Ruttle, Daire Nolan, Christopher Fox and Miriam Murphy, which gave them a comfortable 19 to 13 majority when it came to voting on matters.

With Ruttle, Nolan and Fox no longer there, and the siding of newly elected Labour councillors Anne

Ferris and Paul O'Brien against Fianna Fail and Fine Gael, Independent councillor Miriam Murphy is now the only councillor siding with Fine Gael and Fianna Fail and is the difference between a 17 to 15 majority or a 16-16 stalemate on votes (in cases of stalemates, the Cathaoirleach will cast the deciding vote).

# Tom Fortune elected Cathaoirleach of Greystones

**Independent councillor Tom Fortune was elected Cathaoirleach of Greystones Municipal District last week. Cllr Fortune was proposed by Independent Councillor Mags Crean and was seconded by Green Party councillor Lourda Scott. Cllr Derek Mitchell was elected Leas Cathaoirleach.**

Speaking with the *Wicklow Times* following his election, he thanked his colleagues for their support, he also thanked the municipal staff for all the backup they provide.

Cllr Fortune says there are many issues that require attention and he is looking forward to working with his colleagues to make them happen and come up with solutions.

"Access for the fishermen to Greystones harbour is urgent and must be resolved over the next few weeks. The proposed development in the centre of Kilcoole village if developed as planned will destroy the village, this must be altered to ensure this does not happen. A footpath to the train station in Kilcoole is urgently required."

Cllr Fortune also highlighted the commencement of the Delgany and Kilincarrig village improvements, work on footpaths in Kilpedder and a solution to the issue of it been used as a rat run for traffic, improvements for Newcastle village, and more attention needed to Kiladreenan.

Cllr Fortune also talked about the function of the district and the powers it requires that should be allocated from Wicklow County Council. He believes the district chairs should be members of the corporate policy group, and that this would make the districts stronger and would be better for local democracy.

Cllr Fortune is a big supporter of the climate change initiative and seconded Cllr Steven Mathews' proposal to put in place a climate change SPC, this was approved by all the members of Wicklow County Council. Cllr Fortune says the initiative from the students in our secondary schools was a big driver in making this happen.

Cllr Fortune outlined housing as a key priority, and the demand for affordable housing. He is calling for a change in Government policy to allow young couples who are paying very high rents of €1600-€1800 per month and who have a good payment record to qualify for mortgage approval without the need to provide a deposit.

"This would help the housing crisis in a big way. The growing threat of homelessness is very concerning and I believe this requires an emergency group to come together immediately to agree a solution, it is not good enough or acceptable to allow a family become homeless."

Other challenges where he wants to see changes and solutions are; derelict sites, the bus service, parking, a toilet for the harbour area, support of tidy towns groups, and protection of trees throughout the district. He said it is an honour and a privilege to be Cathaoirleach and he is looking forward to working with his colleagues to make a busy programme happen.

This was his first election as an Independent, having been expelled from Sinn Fein two years ago. Councillor O'Neill said he felt 'vindicated' as a result, and delighted that his vote was evidently a personal one.

"I'm delighted to get the chance to chair Baltinglass Municipal Council,"

Councillor O'Neill told *Wicklow Times* adding, "I do feel that I deserved a shot at it."

"I'd like to thank Patsy Glenmon for proposing me and Edward Timmins for seconding the proposal which then had unanimous support."

"I will immediately be proposing a health check on West Wicklow. We

need a rapid response to issues in this area and I will pursuing the relevant Minister to look on this area. Issues such as the N81, housing, and our interconnectedness, as one quarter of our town is actually in Kildare.

"We have given so much over the years, our sand, granite, water, now

we need something back. There is huge tourism potential; we are right on the doorstep of Dublin, but we need the infrastructure."

Councillor O'Neill said he was not surprised to witness Sinn Fein's lacklustre performance in the local elections but did feel sad about the direction the party has

taken. "I gave 47 years of my life to Sinn Fein and the republican movement, it is sad to see how it has been destroyed by a certain bunch of people. I am pleased however that the people of west Wicklow made their feelings known, and voted me back in to serve them."



# Poll topper Cullen is Wicklow Municipal District Cathaoirleach

**Fine Gael Councillor Shay Cullen was elected Cathaoirleach of the Wicklow Municipal District at the first meeting of the new Municipal District Council last week.**

Cllr Cullen was the poll topper in the Wicklow East Electoral Area in the recent local election, receiving a massive 2,287 first preference votes, the second highest in the whole county.

Cllr Cullen was elected as a first-time candidate in 2014. He is a resident of Newtownmountkennedy and grew up in Roundwood, and attended De La Salle secondary school in Wicklow Town. He has been an employee at Glen Fuels for over 20 years.

On the campaign trail, Cllr Cullen highlighted the need for investment in Wicklow Town and the importance of supporting local businesses. He has also been outspoken on the need to maximise Wicklow's tourism potential and the creation of more jobs.

# Fitzgerald is Arklow Cathaoirleach


**Long-serving member of Wicklow County Council, Fianna Fail's Pat Fitzgerald, is the new Cathaoirleach of Arklow Municipal District.**

A native of Arklow, Cllr Fitzgerald has been a full-time Councillor since 2002 and was first elected to Arklow Town Council in 1999. He was previously Chairman of the Old Arklow Town Council in 2001, and Chairman of the Municipal District in 2014.

Speaking to *Wicklow Times*, Cllr Fitzgerald said Arklow is facing many challenges in the year ahead, but he said that he sees a "great future for Arklow. I believe there are good times ahead."

Cllr Fitzgerald highlighted the problem of the lack of housing and social housing, but said he looks forward to the completion of local housing schemes such as those in Delaney Park and the Vale Road. "These are giving some hope to the many people we have on the housing list," he said.

He also highlighted the issues in Aughrim and Avoca with no capacity in the Wastewater Treatment plants. He looks forward however to progress on the Wastewater Treatment Plant in Arklow and the Data Centre, and hopes to see progress on the Primary Care Centre.



# Newly elected councillors called on to make social housing a priority

**The Housing Alliance, a collaboration of six of Ireland's largest Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs) is calling on newly elected councillors in Wicklow to make the increased delivery of social and affordable housing a priority.**

AHBs are not-for-profit organisations that have a social purpose to provide for people's housing needs by working in close co-operation with the Government, local authorities and relevant agencies. Rebuilding Ireland, the Government's plan to increase housing supply, recognises that AHBs will deliver one-third of the 50,000 additional social homes needed by 2021.

Declan Dunne, Chair of the Housing Alliance, said, "The current shortage of social and affordable housing in Ireland is one of the most acute problems facing our society. The social housing needs of many are currently being provided, with significant State

support, by private landlords. This short-term solution does not represent long-term value and fails to guarantee housing stability and security for tenants beyond the discretion of landlords.

"Local government plays a key role in housing delivery, and the members of the Housing Alliance collaborate and partner with local authorities throughout Ireland to help the State meet its social and affordable housing commitments. We want to continue and strengthen this partnership, working together with local authorities and their newly elected members to deliver more homes, at scale, for individuals and families who urgently need them."

## Wicklow & District Credit Union hosts delegation from Ethiopia

Wicklow & District Credit Union Ltd was delighted to host a delegation from the Federal Republic of Ethiopia recently.

The delegation was comprised mainly of government representatives working for federal and regional cooperative agencies. The delegates are responsible for the development of operational standards for Savings and Credit Cooperatives (SACCOS) i.e. credit unions in Ethiopia. The visit to Ireland was organised by the Irish League of Credit Unions International Development Foundation (ILCU Foundation), the charitable arm of the Irish credit union movement. The visit was funded by the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), a UN agency that provides support to develop and improve the access of the rural population in Ethiopia to well needed financial services.

For a number of years the ILCU Foundation has received funding from IFAD in support of the development of ethical financial services in Ethiopia. As a result, the ILCU Foundation are working closely with the Federal Cooperative Agency (FCA) and is supporting them to improve regulation of the sector in Ethiopia. The five day study tour visit incorporated a mix of training sessions and field visits to credit unions.

During the visit, Pat Hore, CEO and Jen Bergin, Assistant

would be an informative, productive and enjoyable session, sharing the history of Wicklow and District Credit Union Ltd which is rooted in a strong community-based ethos and it's current role within that community.

Pat hoped that the discussion on credit union regulation, legislative changes, how this has affected the sector and how the role of the credit union board has now changed to one of governance with responsibility to manage risk and setting business strategy would be of benefit to the delegation on their return to

Ethiopia.

Abdi Hassen, Director General of FCA in Ethiopia said the delegation was very thankful to everyone in Wicklow and District Credit Union Ltd. "We have learned a lot about regulation and we want to thank you very much. There are a lot of cooperatives in Ethiopia and they have a big role in helping people in all communities. We are coming from different areas in Ethiopia but we all work in cooperatives and it is important to ensure they are regulated and we have learned a lot from you, thank you."

## Teaming up to save the swifts

The Swift population of County Wicklow is being surveyed in a joint venture project between the County Council and Birdwatch Ireland. The aim is to identify for the first time, a baseline population figure for this bird in Wicklow.

At two recent community workshops in Bray and Baltinglass, participants heard from Ricky Whelan, Birdwatch Ireland survey co-ordinator, about the life cycle of this fascinating bird and received copies of a new publication 'Saving Swifts' produced jointly by Birdwatch Ireland and Local Authority Heritage Officers.

Swifts have recently arrived in Wicklow following a long migration from southern Africa. Slightly larger than a swallow, they are a "site faithful" bird, returning generation after generation to buildings in towns and villages to nest and raise young.

Like many of our wild

species however, Swifts are increasingly threatened through loss of nest sites and have suffered an alarming 40 per cent population decline in the past



decade.

Problems arise when buildings are renovated or torn down removing the Swifts nest sites and sometimes huge nesting colonies can be lost overnight.

Last year nesting sites were confirmed in Wicklow Town, Rathnew, Kilcoole, Greystones, Coolafancy, Bray,

Aughrim, Kiltegan, Knockanarrigan, Coolattin and Rathdrum. It is hoped that with the participation of interested individuals, schools and Tidy Towns groups, this list can be significantly expanded this summer.

All information for Wicklow will be uploaded to the National Biodiversity Data Centre at www.biodiversityireland.ie.

To support this initiative a new guide "Saving Swifts" has been produced by Birdwatch Ireland and Local Authority Heritage Officers. This guide contains all the information required for individuals, local groups, schools, businesses or government departments to play a role in helping this threatened species.

Swifts nest in buildings where small gaps allow access to the roof space or cavities in masonry. Their chosen nest sites are often in older buildings which are sometimes dilapidated or in need of renovation. Awareness about the presence and requirements of Swifts is essential to ensuring that their nest sites are protected as part of renovation works. This typically involves timing works to take place from Sept to May.

Also, there are many opportunities to create new nesting sites as part of new development through installing nest boxes or nesting bricks. The information is presented in a colourful and user-friendly format and includes details on Swift ecology, reasons for declines, suggested conservation measures, nest box plans, case studies and much more.

Wicklow County Council Heritage Officer, Deirdre Burns, stated: "Wicklow County Council is delighted to team up with Birdwatch Ireland on this Swift Project. This initiative forms part of our ongoing programme of biodiversity actions through the County Wicklow Heritage Plan, to record, protect and enhance biodiversity in Wicklow".

As part of Swift Awareness Week, members of Birdwatch Ireland will lead a Swift Walk in Arklow on Wednesday, June 26th. They have identified the locations of the main swift colonies but these are in large estates and difficult to survey so they are looking for local volunteers to help. The walk will begin in the Tesco car park in Arklow at 7.30pm on Wednesday, June 26th. The group will discuss swift conservation, the Wicklow Swift Survey and observe locally nesting swifts. The event is free, family friendly and all are welcome.

Currently it offers a selection of pastries, breads and cakes, made fresh, but there are plans to bring a chef on board and offer more substantial meals.

At the heart of the business, though, is the coffee, which is their own unique four-bean blend.

"It was never planned that it would become a business or money-making venture, but then things just started taking off, and everything happened very quickly. # CARING IN THE COMMUNITY

**W**e're all only human and at times it is all too easy to get bogged down with life. It is often difficult to avoid feeling overwhelmed, in need of a helping hand, some sound advice or guidance or even just a friendly ear to talk into or a shoulder to lean on.

Fortunately, Wicklow is full of amazing services with dedicated staff and volunteers who are there when you need them. One of the most distressing life events is the ageing of a parent or close

family member. Dealing with a family member's illness can put a huge emotional, physical and mental strain on individuals and families.

We all hope that we could cope with an infirm or elderly relative. But the simple reality is that it is not always possible. Nursing/Care homes provide a suitable alternative, which may improve the quality of life for both the elderly loved one and the family unit as a whole.

Often however, we need the help and support of professionals who are experienced in dealing with specific problems.

There are a number of options available to people looking for a little extra care, whether for the elderly, the young, or people who just need a little extra help with certain life skills. Help is at hand from a number of local organisations who can assist you with a range of different requirements.



## Home Care Packages

**A Home Care Package is a set of services provided by the HSE to support older people to remain in their own home rather than remain in hospital or be admitted to a nursing home.**

Home Care Packages are provided by organisations that have been approved by the HSE following a detailed tender process. There is no means test and you do not need to have a medical card.

If you are approved for a HCP, you will be given a list of 12 providers to choose from, however most of these are based in Dublin or further afield and do not provide services locally. One company on the list is Bluebird Care of Broomhall Business Park, Rathnew, who currently provide services to many HSE and private customers throughout the County.

Bluebird Care employ local Care Assistants who are QQI trained in Care Of The Elderly and Care Skills, they all need to have Patient Moving & Handling, are Garda Vetted and reference checked. Their Care Assistants are regularly supervised as they work in the community and staff and customers have access to a 24-hour emergency phone. Regular reviews of the service are carried out with customers and families and the HSE carry out regular Audits of the service being provided.



## 'Sea, Sky, Paint' art exhibition in Bray

'Sea, Sky, Paint', an exhibition by Eugene De Leastar, will run in the Signal Arts Centre from Monday 24th June to Sunday 7th July.

Eugene (Eoin) (Eugenio) was born in Cork and now lives and has a studio on Slievenamon in Co. Tipperary. He has a special affinity with Italy and has painted many works on Venice. His solo shows include ALCI, Loro Piceno Italy, Origin Gallery Dublin, Wexford Arts centre, Art Hive Cork, Turks & Caicos, Garter Lane, Waterford, Univeristy College Cork and The Narrow Space, Clonmel. He has participated in group shows in Bled, Slovenia; Trioflach, Austria; Peoria, Illinois, USA; Collyer-Bristow, London; Irish Arts Centre, London; Ward Nasse, New York. His work is also religious and allegorical and he has written several pamphlets on art theory including 'Problems of Truth for the Painter. His most recent work is based on residences in Cill Rialaig and studying the sea at Lettergesh Connemara which have produced the series 'Sky, Sea, Paint.'

"These works relate to recent stormy weather around the coasts of Waterford, Connemara and especially at the artist retreat of Cill Rialaig, in Kerry. A recent trip around the Skelligs left a lasting impression on me of the seas' overwhelming power and cantankerous nature. I have never gone onto the island rock of Skellig

Michael as I feel ill at ease approaching such a spiritual place.

But our relationship with the sea is an elemental part of our nature and evocative paintings of the sea for its own sake were a significant part of the Romantic Movement. For painters of the figure, a basic understanding of anatomy is essential, and I have begun to learn that a study of the anatomy of the wave is also vital for sea painting. I have been much influenced in this by the works of the Great American marine painter Frederick Waugh.

The Sky, Sea, Paint series relates in the main to my attempts to capture something of the movement of the sea, mostly when it is angry and sometimes when it is wistful and evocative.

I like that the elemental potency of great masses of water can be remembered in the sloppy viscous nature of paint on canvas. Sometimes it works; puddles of paint can recreate the shapes of water. But only for a moment, for the sea is ever changing, dangerous, tempting, relentless."
