SKULL & BONES FOUND

SKELETAL REMAINS DISCOVERED AT BRAY RECYCLING CENTRE

It's not every day that the grisly discovery of a human skull and bones has an innocent explanation.

That was the case last week however when it emerged that the skull and bones that were discovered at Bray Recycling Centre in Fassaroe, were apparently used as medical aids for teaching purposes and were thrown away entirely by accident by an elderly GP.

An investigation was launched and the Gardai released a statement saying "Gardai in Bray were called to a recycling plant in Bray today where a skull and bones were discovered. The

items will now be examined. Investigations are continuing." The following day they released a statement saying they were satisfied the remains are medical specimens for the purpose of education.

It was later reported that the bones were returned to their rightful owner.

A Gardai spokesperson told *Wicklow Times* they couldn't divulge who the owner was. The age of the bones was not determined.

It was reported by

Herald.ie that the skull and bones were dumped accidentally by a GP who was clearing out his office following his retirement. The site quotes an unnamed source who said "he was doing a big clean out of his premises, his father had been a GP before him and had certain historical items there which had been used as a teaching or instruction aid back in the day. This included the skull and the bones."

Medical students now use plastic replicas of

skeletons in their studies, but up until thirty or forty years ago it was common for those studying medicine to use a real human skeleton.

This can lead to a dilemma when doctors and their relatives literally find a skeleton in the closet and wonder how to dispose of it.

The mix-up apparently occurred as the retired GP accidentally placed the box containing the skull and bones among the boxes that were to be taken to the recycling facility. It's understood the man was identified by CCTV footage at the recycling facility which showed his car registration number.

The discovery was reported to the Gardai at 4pm on Wednesday 3rd July, after the skull was discovered at the recycling facility. A spokesperson from the

Garda Press Office told *Wicklow Times* "I'm not sure if it was a full skeleton, but I believe it was a skull and several other bones".

It's understood that the bones were examined on site by Gardai and a forensic pathologist.


The worst was initially feared when the skull and bones were found as it was not the first time that human remains were discovered at the facility. Three years ago, the recycling centre hit the headlines when the body of a baby girl was found on the site.

Later named Alannah, the baby girl was buried in Redford Cemetery in Greystones with the headstone paid for by Greenstar. A number of appeals went out for the mother of the child to come forward but no contact was ever made.

X-RAY AND ULTRA SOUND FACILITIES PLANNED FOR BRAY PRIMARY CARE CENTRE

Minister Simon Harris has announced that there are now plans to add diagnostic facilities including X-Ray and Ultra-Sound to the Primary Care Centre currently under construction in Bray.

Minister Harris turned the sod on the project last year and visited the site last week to see how work is progressing. The build is due to be complete by December this year and the Centre will be open in the new year (2020).

Speaking on the news, Minister Harris said "I am really pleased to confirm there are now plans in place to deliver diagnostics from the new Primary Care Centre in Bray. The new centre is currently planned to deliver a wide range of services including; GP services, public health nursing, dental, dietetics psychology, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech & language therapy, addiction services, pharmacy and a centre for the Bray Old Folks Association."

"The plan is to make provision during the current building work for the inclusion of X-Ray and Ultra Sound facilities at a later date. This would provide local access to diagnostics that would reduce the need for people in our community to travel to hospitals.

"This is just one of a number of very positive developments for the area in recent months. I was delighted to announce the designation of Bray as the next

town to receive a Jigsaw Mental Health project in April after fantastic community buy in.

"The new GP Out of Hours Service for North Wicklow opened and is serving our whole community and the multimillion euro Wicklow Hospice is on track to open in November 2019. Investing in our local healthcare infrastructure is a key priority for me so I am really pleased with the progress made to date."

Register removal process questioned

Cllr Jennifer Whitmore has called for online voter registration to be rolled out in Co. Wicklow. Cllr Whitmore made the request at last week's meeting of Wicklow County Council, where councillors discussed the process and criteria for people being removed from the voting register.

Speaking after last week's meeting, Cllr Whitmore said "In April of this year, a new online voter registration system was made available to voters in Dublin, whereby first-time voters, or those who find they have slipped off the electoral register, could sign up to vote without visiting a Garda station. Voter.ie is a service for the four Dublin local authorities which allows Dubliners to add their names to the Register of Electors, change their address on the register, and amend other details, including citizenship or name.

"However, I question as to why this system is only available to those in Dublin. Currently, in Wicklow, people need to get forms stamped by the Gardai, and deliver them to WCC in order to get on the Wicklow register.

removed from it.

Director of Services Tom Murphy explained that there are 30 field-workers around the county working to inform people who are being removed from the register, but that ultimately it is the responsibility of the citizen to check the register.

"The field workers will call to the house two or three times, and leave a form if there is no answer," he said. "We

don't remove anyone without first advising them in writing. We get no joy in removing people from the register, but we have to operate within the parameters set by the Department."

Cllr Joe Behan said that "there are people who claim they have been removed from the register without notice. We should adopt a new policy of not taking people off the register unless less we get a written request from them to do so."

Cllr Edward Timmins said this was flawed as "people won't bother doing that". He suggested instead that people be informed after they have been taken off the register, as this would have more immediacy than informing them beforehand.

Wicklow contributes to Ireland's best ever battery recycling figures

WEEE Ireland, Ireland's largest electrical and battery recycling scheme, surpassed national targets once again, collecting a total 36,131 tonnes of e-waste and 856 tonnes of waste batteries for recycling in 2018.

The scheme's annual report, published in conjunction with its AGM this week, also revealed the people of Wicklow proved themselves to be avid recyclers once again, contributing to Ireland's highest-ever average of 10.2kg of e-waste collected per capita. Wicklow contributed almost 9kg per person, nearly twice that of Kildare.

As the country prepares for the roll out of the 2019 Climate Action Plan, WEEE Ireland are proud that their 2018 recycling efforts contributed to a saving of equivalent of 220,000 tonnes of CO₂ emissions as compared with the same items being diverted to landfill - the equivalent of 865 million kilometres driven by passenger vehicles, or the annual carbon consumption of 4,398 hectares of

trees.

Among the items recycled were an estimated 3.2 million lamps and light-bulbs, 195,000 televisions and monitors, and 13 million small appliances. 48% of the e-waste recycled was large household appliances such as dishwashers, ovens and washing machines, which can be returned to retailers for free recycling upon delivery of new appliances. This is a truly green story as WEEE recycling activity happens close to home. WEEE Ireland supports indigenous recycling facilities with WEE-LABEX certified recycling partnerships.

The report also outlines WEEE Ireland's plans for the future, managing a new generation of emerging technologies such as PV panels, EV and hybrid batteries in the transition

towards a more circular and low carbon economy.

Commenting on the best year yet for WEEE Ireland, Leo Donovan, CEO of WEEE Ireland said: "We are extremely proud of these results and want to thank every person who recycled even one item of e-waste. While the 2018 report sets new e-waste recycling records, we cannot become complacent. We will only achieve long-term change and benefits for the environment if we continue to manage our e-waste responsibly. Maintaining the 65% collection rate in 2019 and beyond means WEEE Ireland must collect 12% more e-waste in the next year. Everyone can play their part in achieving this national target by recycling their WEEE, waste batteries and lighting

equipment for free at their nearest Local Authority Recycling centre and participating electrical retailers."

On foot of these positive recycling results, WEEE Ireland is also calling on the people of Wicklow to join the search for a 2019 WEEE Champion at this year's Pakman Awards. Open to individuals, businesses, schools and community groups, the Pakman Awards showcase the environmental champions who are shaping Ireland's future. The WEEE Champion Award recognises those who can demonstrate the extra steps they have taken to increase electrical take-back for recycling and increase awareness of the need to recycle this waste stream.

Over 200 volunteers help clean Wicklow's coastline

Twenty-seven tonnes of marine litter was removed from Irish beaches and coastlines during Clean Coasts Week 2019, which ran from Saturday, 1st June to Sunday, 9th June.

Entire communities hosted beach clean-ups and celebrated the Irish coastline with fun activities based around the water, all of which aimed to get people more engaged with the coast. Events included free beach yoga classes, poc fada, kayaking, seaweed workshops and plogging (the Scandinavian trend of picking up litter while jogging) to just name a few.

Over the course of the week, in Wicklow, 12 registered clean-ups took place, with 221 volunteers taking part in the initiative.

Coca-Cola Clean Coasts Week encourages the whole country to protect and celebrate Ireland's beautiful coastline, hosting events all over Ireland with the help of some community spirit. The aim is to engage and empower people and communities to protect our precious coastal resources and appreciate everything our coastline has to offer.

Michael John O'Mahony, Director of Environmental Education at An Taisce said: "With almost over 250 events taking place all over the country with the help of 5,450 volunteers, Coca-Cola Clean Coasts Week 2019 has been one of our most successful yet. The week saw entire communities coming together to have fun and work together in taking care of their local beaches and coastlines. Everyone was motivated to help prevent the long term negative impact of marine litter, taking pride in looking after the scenic shorelines in their area. Greystones excluded from charging point installations

No electric vehicle charging point will be installed in Greystones in the new round of nationwide installations, despite an online petition with almost 1,000 signatures.

The news came in a reply received by Cllr Jennifer Whitmore from the Minister for Environment and Climate Action Richard Bruton.

Cllr Whitmore, co-chair of Wicklow County Council's Climate Action and Biodiversity SPC, expressed her disappointment, saying "many people have been asking me when an EV charging point will be installed in Greystones. In response I arranged an online petition and received almost 1,000 names. Earlier this month I wrote to the Minister for Environment and Climate Action to ask that he direct the ESB to install an EV charging point in the Greystones District as part of the €20m funding roll-out for charging points across the country.

"Unfortunately, the response was unsatisfactory, in fact absurd when you consider the demand is clearly there and while charging points exist in other nearby

localities it looks like there are no plans to install any EV charging point in the Greystones District in the near future. Meanwhile other counties are leading the way including Dun Laoghaire, Rathdown and Fingal where on-street chargers have already been installed.

"Funding is limited outside of the Climate Action Fund within the Department. To maximise the few options that currently exist I have been engaging with local businesses to see if they are interested in getting EVs installed as part of the Better Energy Communities Scheme which supports community-based partnerships which can involve local businesses, enterprises and Local Authorities. I will also continue to engage with Wicklow County Council to see how best we can improve the much needed EC charging infrastructure within the town."

"Ultimately, if the Minister was serious with his Climate Action brief he would see that in order to encourage people to make the switch districts like Greystones must have sufficient charging capacities for EVs particularly as Greystones continues to expand."

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Mortgage distress hope as Wicklow scheme limit raised to €395,000

Families in mortgage distress in Wicklow have been given fresh hope after the county's upper housing valuation limit for the mortgage-to-rent scheme was significantly increased to €395,000.

This €30,000 rise from the previous mark allows many homeowners in unsustainable mortgage debt to now qualify as part of the expanded scheme which became operational last week.

It will allow those previously above the upper ceiling limit of €365,000 the opportunity to seek reassessments of their cases.

However, the upper limit on valuation for apartments stays at the same level of €310,000, the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government announced.

A total of 826 households in Wicklow were in mortgage arrears for over two years at the end of 2018, according to the Central Bank, while over 630 of those had been in arrears for at least five years.

The CEO of mortgage-to-rent operator Home For Life, Paul

Cunningham, said the decision to introduce a more realistic upper threshold showed a commitment to finding solutions for as many of the estimated 25,000 families in serious mortgage arrears in the State as possible.

"This sends a message out to those in financial trouble that there is a way back and by increasing the threshold, the Government is showing it believes mortgage-to-rent is a scheme that can work for all sides," said Mr. Cunningham.

Well-known homeless champion, Fr Peter McVerry, described the expansion as a step in the right direction.

"This is a small step because in my view mortgage-to-rent should be expanded to include most unsustainable mortgages. I would include in that the 12,000 buy-to-let mortgages of two or more

years in arrears," he said.

"I believe that alongside the current increase in house value thresholds there should be a rise in the income limits which apply to mortgage-to-rent."

Minister of State with Special Responsibility for Housing and Urban Development, Damien English, said the changes would enable more properties to qualify for the scheme.

The Minister also welcomed the rise in the number of mortgage-to-rent cases completing.

"This confirms that the scheme is a good solution to unsustainable mortgage arrears and one that is being recognised as such by the borrowers," said Minister English.

The government's mortgage-to-rent scheme aims to keep owners with unsustainable debt in their current homes debt-free as

long-term tenants of their local authority.

As a mortgage-to-rent operator, Home For Life works with homeowners, lenders and the local authority to avoid the upheaval of moving families away from schools and friends they have formed in their locality.

Under the scheme, a property is sold to Home For Life and then leased back to the State through the local authority which, in turn, sublets the house or apartment back to the homeowner.

The homeowner pays an affordable income-based rent to their local authority.

As part of the scheme, the local authority would then undertake to provide for the ongoing long-term housing needs of the applicant and other eligible residents of the property for as long as their housing need exists.

HFL works with all banks and funds and can facilitate properties irrespective of location or condition.

Property prices rise by €9,000 in past year

Property prices in Wicklow have risen by €9,000 in the last year, according to the latest MyHome.ie Property Report.

The report for Q2 2019 shows that the median asking price for a property in the county now stands at €329,000. This was up 2.8% on this time last year when they stood at €320,000. This increase all came in the last quarter after four consecutive quarters unchanged.

This is the highest property prices in the county have been since standing at €339,000 in Q4 2010.

The rise in prices was reflected in the asking price for a 3-bed semi-detached house in the county, which were up 1.7% in the quarter from €317,000 to €322,500. This contributed to an annual increase of 9.3% with prices for this house type €27,500 ahead of where they were this time last year at €295,000.

Prices for this house type are now at their highest level since they stood at €325,000 in Q4 2009.

Meanwhile, the asking price for a 4-bed semi-detached house in Wicklow was up 13.7% in the last quarter from €382,500 to €435,000. This contributed to an annual increase of 17.6% with prices for this house type now €65,000 ahead of where they were this time last year at €370,000.

The number of properties for sale in Wicklow on MyHome.ie jumped by 14.4% in the last quarter and was up 6.4% on this time last year.

The average time for a property to go sale agreed in the county after being placed up for sale now

stands at five months.

The author of the report, Conall MacCoille, Chief Economist at Davy, said that while the price falls may fuel fears of a more damaging downturn, the reason for the price falls this time round were as a result of increased regulation.

"The current slowdown in price inflation is largely due to the Central Bank's lending rules and stretched affordability. These factors are preventing the latent housing demand from translating into rampant house price

inflation fuelled by rising leverage on mortgage loans."Ireland's economy continues to perform well and the property market will continue to be underpinned by high employment and wage growth.

While the economy has been driven by strong foreign direct investment, export growth and a slow rebound among indigenous companies, the recovery in homebuilding is still in its infancy," he said.

Angela Keegan, Managing Director of MyHome.ie, said the fact

that we are seeing more transactions, more properties on the market and more sustainable price increases were all positives for prospective buyers.

"The environment for buyers is becoming much more favourable, with 22,600 homes listed for sale in June 2019 on MyHome, up 4.5% on the same period of 2018. The improvement is especially marked in Dublin, with 5,400 homes listed for sale on MyHome - up 9% on last year.

Arklow added to Rent Pressure Zones

Arklow Local Electoral Area has now been designated a Rent Pressure Zone. An announcement of 19 new RPZs around the country was made last week following a change of criteria from the Residential Tenancies Act.

In an RPZ, rent increases are limited to a maximum of 4% each year. It applies to new and existing tenancies.

Rent Pressure Zones are located in parts of the country where rents are highest and rising, and where households have the greatest difficulty finding affordable accommodation. They are intended to moderate the rise in rents in these areas and create a stable and sustainable rental market that allows landlord and tenants to plan financially for their future.

Bray and Wicklow were designated RPZs in January 2017, and Greystones was added

in September of 2017. Speaking last week, John Brady TD said that Arklow's inclusion is "too little, too late" for many.

The rent index for Q1 of 2019, published by the RTB today, indicates that the standardised average rent is now €1,169 per month, an annual increase of 8.3%. The standardised average rent for Wicklow has reached €1,210 per month, an increase of 8.5% per year.

Despite rents skyrocketing across Wicklow, only Arklow has been included in the nineteen new rent pressure zones announced today. This is welcome for Arklow but

fails to address rising rents everywhere else in the County. In areas of Wicklow that were previously included in rent pressure zones landlords are terminating leases stating the property is to be sold. The property is then subsequently re-let with a higher rent.

The RTB shows that rental inflation is highest in highest in areas outside the Greater Dublin Area showing an increase of 7.5% per year. The Minister has finally decided to make changes to how the RPZs are designated on foot of, as the Minister states, 'rents rising unsustainably' outside of RPZs.

Worryingly he also confirms that these

Hit and Run incident in Kilmacanogue

Local resident Roisin Mulligan is seeking any information that the public might have after she and her 8-week-old son were involved in a hit and run incident in Kilmacanogue late last month.

Roisin says "The 'accident' occurred on Wednesday June 26th on Bohilla lane approaching Kilmacanogue at 10.40 in the morning. The driver caused extensive damage to my car about €4,000 worth and drove off leaving me and my 8-week-old son inside. My car is a red Kia Ceed Estate.

"His car, a greyish audi estate, would have damage to the driver's side. The

"The car had already been reported to the guards for driving erratically in Bray and the Gardai suspect he might have been a drink driver as there was other reports of a car matching the grey Audi estate description before he crashed into me. It was a terrifying experience."

Work to start on new Wicklow Library

Wicklow Town's new library moved a step closer last week with the signing of a contract for the construction work on transforming the old bank building.

The former Ulster Bank building on the town's Main Street has been sitting idle for a number of years and was purchased in 2017 by Wicklow County Council as the location for a new library and County Archives.

Contracts for the construction phase of the development were signed on Monday July 1st by Frank Curran, Chief Executive, Wicklow County Council, O'Connell Mahon Architects has been appointed to lead up this project.

A plan has been developed for the conversion of the six storey building to a public library along with Wicklow County Archives and Local Studies was prepared by O'Connell Mahon Architects. Construction will be carried out by Byrne and Byrne Ltd of Cllr Irene Winters,

Buncloody.

It is anticipated that the building element will take approximately 12 months to complete. Allowing for fit out and stocking, it is hoped that the new library will open to the public is late summer/early autumn of 2020.

Welcoming the contract signing, Mr Curran said:

"The new library and archive will be a centre of excellence for the town and county. The County Archives and Local Studies will add to tourist numbers and complement Wicklow Gaol. I want to acknowledge the generous financial assistance received from the Department of Housing, Planning & Local Government (URDF Funding) and the Department of Rural & Community Development (Library funding)."

Cllr Irene Winters, Cathaoirleach, Wicklow County Council, stated: "The people of Wicklow town have always been avid users of the local library. A new library and archive will ensure an annual footfall of 150,000, which will have a knock-on effect for other businesses in Wicklow town".

Go-ahead for improved visitor access at Glendalough

Wicklow County Council has approved new visitor access plans for Laragh-Glendalough. The decision was made at last week's meeting of Wicklow County Council.

The council first assessed the current visitor access infrastructure and deemed it to be insufficient. They discussed six different locations which are currently deemed 'difficult' for visitors to access and will need an infrastructure improvement: the area near the junction at the Laragh-Glendalough Green, Lynham's Junction, the junction at 'McCoy's Great Gas' petrol-station, at the Wicklow Gap junction, visitor centre entrance, and Glendalough village.

The council's discussion on the need for an improvement in these visitor-access infrastructures stems from a report on the Laragh-Glendalough area commissioned by Wicklow County Council.

The overall aim of the works is to improve safety for cyclists and pedestrians, facilitate the establishment of Laragh as a tourism area, minimise and slow traffic, and create a public realm space for people to enjoy. Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council Frank Curran said the widening of Wicklow Gap junction will make access easier for buses.

Glendalough based TD Pat Casey spent 10 years campaigning to get 'Part 8' of the major Laragh-Glendalough Traffic Access Plan initiated. Deputy Casey has described the traffic congestion in the area as being as crisis levels.

Mr Curran, explained that the area will be

improved in different phases, this being phase 1. A report on the area was delivered to councillors in a long slide presentation, which included detailed ordinance survey maps.

Cllr John Snell said the works to improve traffic congestion were "vital".

Cllr Mary Kavanagh expressed concern about the eventual refurbishment of the visitor centre, which will be Phase 3 of the project.

"I have a horrible feeling in the put of my stomach that it will lose some of its character, the last thing we want is to see it glamorised," she said.

Restricted access to Derrybawn Bridge

Notice has been given by Derrybawn House that Derrybawn Bridge remains open to all light traffic and pedestrians.

It has been advised that vehicle traffic has been restricted to that of not more than 5 ton gross weight and 10kmh. This means that cars and vans under this weight have unrestricted access to the Bridge.

Pedestrians are not affected by this limitation and have full access to the Green Road at all times. Bollards have been placed at the entrance to the Bridge to ensure that this limit is adhered to and thereby ensure that one and all are able to enjoy this historical structure in safety.

Derrybawn Estate stated "We appreciate that this is the height of the tourist season but we are unfortunately subject to the depth and flow of the river which is at its lowest at this time of the year. We apologize for any inconvenience caused."

Tenders invited for Bray Harbour project

Bray Harbour Joint Development Committee (BHJDC) has welcomed the news that tenders have been invited to develop a plan to improve and develop the facilities at Bray Harbour.

BHJDC consists of elected members from Bray Harbour as a centre for water based leisure and commercial activity and as an amenity for all the people".

The tender process, which closes in August, invites tenders from suitably qualified consultants in the marine sector to

carry out detailed surveys, report on the options available to protect the harbour from storm conditions, and to look into options to provide additional berthing facilities, including the possibility of providing a short-term drop on/drop off berth for a small passenger vessel

plying between different harbours within an hour or so of Bray. The funding for this exploratory work was approved by members of Bray Municipal District Council in 2018.

Cathaoirleach Steven Matthews, who also acts as vice-chairperson of BHJDC said "I am

delighted that we are now seeking tenders from consultants to develop detailed plans for our harbour. Bray Harbour is an amenity that most seaside towns would be extremely envious of, and is in urgent need of improvement and development so that we can maximise the potential of this resource for everyone in our community. I would like to thank the council officials who have worked so hard to get this far, and look forward to seeing this project move on to the next stage."

Ger Crowley, chairperson of the Bray Harbour Action Group, whose lobbying led to the formation of the BHJDC also welcomed the announcement, saying "The harbour users who I represent are pleased to note that Wicklow County Council are planning to engage consultants to develop a plan for Bray Harbour. This sadly neglected resource is in urgent need of investment and has the potential to transform Bray into a town which embraces its coastline, instead of turning its back on it."

Wicklow native, model Qichen Hu, is in the final group of finalists from Leinster competing for the title of Miss Universe Ireland 2019.



Lakers new facility in Bray was recently officially opened by Minister for Health Simon Harris

After a fire destroyed their original premises last October, Lakers - a social, recreational and sports club for children and adults with intellectual disabilities - moved into the Old Schoolhouse on Eglinton Road.

Lakers' beginnings go back thirty years to 1989, when a small group of parents decided something should be done about the lack of sports or social clubs for their children with intellectual disabilities.

What started with a small number of members, managed by parents who volunteered their time and skills,

has grown into a club that now offers over 50 weekly classes, across 32 different activities, for its members. The club provides a support network for over 400 members and their families. With the help of its 160 volunteers, Lakers members take part in on-site activities, such as arts & crafts, dance, drama, computer skills, cooking, healthy living, music and music therapy, keep fit classes and pottery. The club also works with local facilities for its members, such as golf clubs, leisure centres and sailing, ski and rugby clubs.

Lakers' new club facility was officially opened by Minister for Health Simon Harris on Wednesday, 26th June.

Speaking at the event, Minister for Health Simon Harris T.D., said:

"Having grown up down the road in Greystones, I am acutely aware of the importance of Lakers and the services it provides to its members, their families and the wider community. I visited the Lakers team at the site of the fire last October and the sense of loss was overwhelming. Through sheer resilience and determination to do everything in their power

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

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

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across the wider Lakers community, last October. Unfortunately, there are little or no social, recreational or sports services provided for people with intellectual disabilities, outside those set-up by private organisations and charities. Without Lakers, our members would have nothing - nowhere to go for social interaction and nowhere to learn and develop new skills. If Lakers ceased to exist, the impact of removing that support network would be detrimental to members and their families.

"As difficult as it was after the fire, we all resolved that we would build something much better than we had for our members. The community rallied around us in the most magnificent way. Our staff team worked around the clock to get activities up and running again, in a variety of begged and bor-



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More than one skin cancer death a week from the construction and farming sector

The Irish Cancer Society has said that almost one in four (23%) of skin cancer deaths in Ireland are from the construction, outdoor and farming industry. The figures have remained stagnant in recent years.

The Society has announced that it has teamed up with the Irish Congress of Trade Unions to urge outdoor workers to be extra vigilant during the summer months, and reduce their risk of skin cancer.

Congress represents 44 unions and approximately 750,000 workers across the country, with around 18% of the membership working in the outdoors.

Announcing the partnership, Kevin O'Hagan, Cancer Prevention Manager with the Irish Cancer Society said, "These figures from the CSO show that in 2016, we had over 60 deaths in Ireland which were related to sun exposure at work. That is more than one death a week. The dangers of skin cancer in these industries have often been neglected, because the risk of accidental death and injury on the job is considered higher and more immediate. However long-term exposure to the invisible hazard of the sun's ultraviolet rays puts outdoor workers at a high risk of skin cancer."

"We are really pleased to be teaming up with the Irish Congress of Trade Unions this summer to encourage employers and employees to take the necessary sun protection behaviours to reduce the number of workers dying from a very preventable cancer."

"Every year in Ireland, it is estimated that almost 12,000 people are diagnosed with skin cancer, and figures show that more men than women were diagnosed. Getting repeated sunburn throughout life increases the risk of skin cancer. Half of all adults experienced sunburn in the last year and a third of men have experienced sunburn while working outdoors, so we are asking people to take the necessary steps to avoid sunburn and to be SunSmart at work."

Congress General Secretary Patricia King added, "We are really pleased to be teaming up with the Irish Cancer Society to raise awareness of skin cancer among outdoor workers. Congress represents over 135,000 people whose work is characterised as being predominantly or occasionally outdoors. This includes union members in sectors such as construction, horticulture, quarrying, postal services, environment, tourism, recreation and education."

"Workers need to take every precaution in protecting their skin while exposed to the sun, and should be supported in doing so by their employers. We would also call on employers to put in place robust policies to ensure that outdoor workers, such as builders, postal workers or fishermen are adequately protected. At a minimum they should be following the Health & Safety Authority guidelines. We would encourage all of our members to ensure they are being SunSmart this summer. It could save a life."

Keep your pets safe in hot weather

As temperatures rise in Ireland, the ISPCA is sharing some tips and advice to help keep your pets safe during the hot weather.

ISPCA Public Relations Manager Carmel Murray said: "We all love the summer sunshine, but please plan in advance if you are bringing your pet anywhere with you in hot weather ensuring they won't be left in a hot car for any length of time. Avoid walking your dog during intense heat, early morning or evening walks is always best when it's cooler. If the pavement is too hot for your hand, it's too hot for their paws. Always have fresh cool water available and access to shade from the sun".

The ISPCA would like to remind pet owners that 'dogs can die if left in hot cars'. Pet owners often think leaving a window open is sufficient for their pet but this is not enough to prevent heatstroke under intense sunshine. By leaving a dog unattended in a vehicle during hot weather, even for 10 minutes can prove to be fatal.

It is important to always have fresh water available for your pet; refresh and

give a small drink of water and contact your vet. It is important to know the signs of overheating such as increased heart rate with excessive panting and drooling, drowsy or out of sorts, vomiting or diarrhoea".

Ensure you leave out extra water in the shade for cats and wildlife too. If you have a rabbit or small mammals in the garden, keep their living quarters in the shade. You could also partially cover the front of their enclosures as they can heat up very quickly. All caged animals, even if they are indoors, should be kept out of direct sunlight.

Keep an eye on aviaries or birdcages, which are near

refill more often than on a normal day and leave extra if you are going out.

You can also add ice cubes to your pet's water. Make sure they have access to shade, and keep them indoors in cooler rooms when the heat becomes too extreme.

Remember household chemicals and common summer foods can be toxic to pets. If using sunscreen or insect repellent, please ensure the product is labelled as safe for use on pets. If you are unsure about certain products consult your vet. Alcoholic or caffeinated beverages, chocolate, coconut, grapes or raisins, onions, raw meat or excessively salty foods or foods containing the sweetener xylitol can be toxic or cause serious health issues for your pet. Keep them away from your pet during summer barbecues.

If you do witness an animal locked in a car on a hot day, try to establish how long the dog has been

Warning issued for Wicklow asthma and hayfever sufferers

The Asthma Society of Ireland is warning the 8,417 people who have both asthma and hayfever in Wicklow to take precautions as pollen levels begin to rise.

The Asthma Society has teamed up with Dyson Ireland to launch its Pollen Tracker on asthma.ie. The tracker provides an update of pollen levels across the four provinces each day, and a predictor of the pollen levels for the following day.

Sarah O'Connor, CEO of the Asthma Society of Ireland, said: "For the 300,800 people who have asthma and hayfever, hayfever can be particularly dangerous. Hayfever symptoms are capable of escalating an asthma attack, which in some cases can be fatal. Asthma deaths are rising in Ireland, with one person now dying every six days as a result of their asthma. In addition, people with hayfever experience symptoms which really compromise their quality of life and ability to enjoy the summer months.


With the pollen count predicted to be high over the next few days, we are advising all people who have asthma and hayfever to make sure they take precautions and to follow our "top tips for surviving hayfever season" to ensure they do not suf-

fer a fatal asthma attack. Our free Asthma and COPD Adviseline is also available on 1800 44 54 64 and allows you to speak to a respiratory specialist nurse who is trained in asthma and allergies, who will be able to advise you on managing your condition(s)."

Niamh O'Halloran, who suffered a near fatal asthma attack because of her hayfever, said: "Most of my friends with hayfever experience the itchy watery eyes, runny nose and itchy throat, etc. But for me, as I have asthma and hayfever, symptoms can be a lot more serious. It is essential that I manage my hayfever to ensure it does not lead to a serious asthma attack. In my teenage years, I suffered an asthma attack because of my hayfever which nearly took my life and left me in hospital. I find the Asthma Society's Pollen Tracker an excellent tool which allows me to prepare and take precautions on any day when the pollen count will be high."

"Today, I make sure to take my anti-histamines, along with all my asthma medications as part of my Asthma Action Plan. Controlling my hayfever is extremely important as it prevents me ending up back in hospital. I find the Asthma Society's Pollen Tracker an excellent tool which allows me to prepare and take precautions on any day when the pollen count will be high."

'Catalyst' is a new eco-friendly coffee shop on Florence Road, in Bray. It was opened in June by three young baristas: Ross Nolan, Nathan Walsh and Luke Gorman.



The name of the shop stems from Luke's passion for science; he is a graduate of the NeuroScience course in U.C.D.

"A catalyst is something that drives a reaction for change, so that's kind of what we want to do: drive

fee beans behind the counter and 'Huskee' cups (so named as they're made from the husk of a coffee bean) line the shelves.

The beans used by Catalyst are sourced from 'Imbibe', a company based in The Millennium Centre, Dolphin's Barn, just outside Crumlin, in Dublin.

"They're (Imbibe) very ethical. It's complete zero-waste coffee delivery. That's what we are adamant about", says Nathan.

Everything used in Catalyst is fair trade: the Columbian-Peruvian-blend beans are sourced from Café Femenino, a coffee farm in northern Peru run by local women

people to change their plastic-use habits, their eating habits, change their lifestyles, for themselves to be better, for the earth to be better."

The eco-friendly focus of the coffee shop is evident as soon as you walk in: giant tin-drums of cof-

farmers only. The owners and the packers are all women. These women "all get paid fairtrade prices" from Imbibe.

The owners of Catalyst refer to their business model with Imbibe as 'conscious capitalism' meaning that the money gained is for the women who harvest the beans first, and Imbibe and Catalyst second.

Imbibe buys products from, Café Femenino, which is helping these women create their own product, to sell and create their own incomes, in order to gain financial control and decision-making power in what is currently, socio-economically, a male-dominated country.

The Australian-made Huskee cups, a by-product of coffee waste, are a unique feature to Catalyst and have proven to be very popular with customers.

The team at Catalyst don't see non-disposable compostable cups as the way forward, as although they are designed to break down in an ecologically-safe way, they are often not disposed of properly, "...ending up straight in a normal bin anyway."

Huskee cups are 'keep' cups, a range of reusable coffee cups designed to reduce waste. The husk of a coffee bean is very strong and thermally durable, making them the perfect material for the

production of coffee cups.

The delicious beverages sold by Catalyst include Ice-Coffees, sold in beautiful glass jars, which customers can take with them on the go, clean and then return them to the store.

The customers can receive a discount of 0.20 off of their next purchase with Catalyst when they use a Huskee cup thereby "...closing the loop."

After a month, a Catalyst customer can actually save money, when compared to regularly purchasing cups from larger, more mainstream coffee-chains.

"No one has to be perfect. It's all about everyone doing a little", says Ross.

The owners of Catalyst are concerned about the lack of attention to recycling in Bray and the lack of compost facilities: "there's no brown bins on the road".

However, they recognise that they need to improve their method of production: "we're not perfect, we're not zero-waste, but we try. What we really want to do is be a part of the community in Bray and teach people about the harmful effects of plastic on the environment, we're showing you, we're not telling you."

The crew at Catalyst are keen on offering classic, fresh beverages to their customers, highlighting

their new 'Nature Juice Machine' used for making pure, freshly-squeezed orange juice, sold in small glass bottles.

The team at Catalyst are grateful for the support that the people of Bray are continuing to show ; A

lot of people have been bringing them back, an awful lot of people."

They repeatedly urge their many customers to demand more of other companies, to make them use recyclable materials and have their concerns for the environment heard. They are clearly committed to their cause, to serve coffee and drinks to the people of Wicklow and to keep the surrounding county clean: "we started as we mean to go on."

scariest times. "Billy is doing great now and he's drinking more bottles than he ever did. He's sleeping all night too and is in a proper little routine. Thank goodness! We were in hospital for about three weeks but it felt like a lifetime. I'll be forever grateful to the incredible people in there who made my little baby well again."

The children from St Catherine's Special School are hoping local people and businesses will get behind their campaign to raise €60,000 through the triathlon to soundproof and insulate their PE Hall, and for other much-needed projects on their 'needs-list'.

"Our school in Kilmullen Lane, Newcastle was built 36 years ago of simple block construction with no insulation and certainly no sound proofing. Many of our children are very sensitive to sound and noise just bounces off the walls and is deafening! It's totally unsuitable for children with sensory issues," explained Claire McClean, Chair of the Parent's Association.

"We need to ensure the children are able to play games and do therapy in an environment that caters for their special requirements."

Ms McClean said the PE hall also has no insulation at all, so is sweltering in the summer, freezing in the winter and costs the school a fortune in heating bills.

"The children at St Catherine's have moderate to profound intellectual and physical disabilities and may also have an Autism Spectrum Disorder," said Ms McClean. "These children are very complex and the environment in which they are taught is extremely important to their ability to learn and progress."

St Catherine's Special School has finished up for the summer, but, parents and staff will continue to work over the coming months towards making the Triathlon which is their biggest fundraiser a success.

The Sporting Proud Triathlon has two events: Olympic length: 1.5km swim, 40km cycle, 10km run and a Sprint or Fun event: .75km swim, 20km cycle and 5km run. Entrants can compete as individuals or in teams of 3.

"It's a fun event whether you are a serious athlete or just want to do your bit to help special needs children in our community," said Claire. "Special needs children are amongst the most vulnerable and can be forgotten, but taking part or making a donation to St Catherine's Special School will have a huge positive impact on the children."

"Billy got so bad that they brought him to the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and they put a big mask on to help his breathing," Edel said. "It was like a suction mask all around his little face. Billy didn't respond to it or get better. They were giving him one more day and said if he didn't respond, they'd have to put him on the ventilator, the life support. It got really bad really quickly. They said he was having such difficulty breathing that he was becoming exhausted and might need the help of the machine to continue. It was so terrifying. I was a mother

for the first time and that alone was scary enough. I didn't know what to do. I didn't know what to say. I didn't know how to react."

Just before Billy was put on a ventilator the team got him stabilised to Edel's shock and relief - "We've never been so relieved in our lives. They are remarkable in ICU at keeping you calm. In the middle of your own panic the staff have everything under control and they reassure you. Billy didn't get home for about three weeks in total. After he was moved to the Nazareth Ward he was throwing up his food, so we had to get

"I was so happy the day we got to drive out of the hospital and home to Wicklow with our little baby. I was still scared because I was so used to having people around him that knew what was going on, and to reassure me all the time. When we got home we were by ourselves. Every time his breathing got a little bit heavy I started to worry. Crumlin was only a phone call away though, and that was reassuring. We learned

Metatron's Cube


Metatron's Cube, an exhibition by Mary Conroy, will be held in the Signal Arts Centre in Bray from Monday 22nd July to Sunday 4th August.

This body of work is a part of Conroy's continuing investigation into the Biophilia hypothesis which suggests that we humans have an innate connection to life and all living things.

During a residency at the Heinrich Böll Cottage, Achill Island, the artist began to closely examine organic structures found within the local environment when she observed similar shapes and patterns in a variety of local flora and fauna.

Parallel to this, during her research, Conroy came across the concepts of sacred geometry. In sacred geometry, Archangel Metatron, the angel of life, oversees the flow of energy in a mystical cube known as Metatron's Cube. This structure contains all of the geometric shapes in 'God's' creation and represents the patterns that make up everything 'God' has made.

Through observation and drawing Conroy began to deconstruct the organic structures that she found and distill them into simple geometric shapes. Hexagons, pentagon's and circles, along with the platonic solids became impossible to avoid. By using elements of sacred geometry, in tandem with familiar mathematical principles, it became possible for the artist to see the structural connections between elements in the natural environment. This visual investigation leads her to believe that there is undoubtedly a familiar and universal underlying structure within the natural world, that connects us to each other and every other living thing.

During these essential planned works homes and businesses in the affected areas may be impacted by reduced water pressure and water outages. Following these improvement works water supply may take 2-3 hours to return as water refills the network.

Irish Water understands this type of work can be inconvenient and will ensure our work crews make every effort to minimise any disruption these works may cause.

Newton-John was also a regular on "The Cliff Richard Show." In 1978, Newton-John would become not just an international movie star but a pop culture icon when she co-starred opposite John Travolta in the high school musical film, Grease (Paramount, 1978).
