WICKLOW LOSES IN 'POSTCODE LOTTERY'

County Wicklow is one of the losers in the country's healthcare 'postcode lottery' coming in at joint second-last place for the poorest level of health services in the State, according to a new report by the Economic and Social Research Institute (ESRI).

Wicklow failed in eight out of ten areas of its health service. In the eight services where it failed, Wicklow was performing at least 10% lower than the national average.

This includes areas such as Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists, Speech & Language Therapists, Counsellors and Psychologists. The report is entitled 'Geographic Profile of Healthcare Needs and Non-Acute Healthcare Supply in Ireland'. It shows an unequal supply of community health and social care across

counties, with the greater Dublin Commuter Belt and the South East having the lowest supply of primary and community care in Ireland.

The report was published last week as part of a Health Research Board funded project. Findings suggest that areas with low supply of care should be targeted to increase supply provision.

In Wicklow, there are 1.2 counsellors and psychologists per 10,000 people, compared to 2.4 in counties such as Laois and Sligo.

The Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Health,

Stephen Donnelly, said that the ESRI's geographic profile highlights a 'glaring inequality' in community and social healthcare around the country. Deputy Donnelly called for the targeted tailoring of resources and funding to address shortages.

He said, "Inequality cannot be tolerated in healthcare. Through Slaintecare we are attempting to move towards universal healthcare which means that everyone, regardless of whether they have money or not, can access a high standard healthcare. We

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need to see the same target resources to where access in community they are needed most.

"We know that central to this inequality is the fact that we have no data on population need. In fact, a system of resource allocation based on population need has not been in place since 2014 so it's very reasonable to assume that this inequality will continue long into the future until we allocate on the basis of need.

"Community and social healthcare facilitate discharges from the acute hospital sector and prevents admissions in the first place. The ad hoc allocation of resources is undoubtedly heaping pressure on the acute network. We need to work smart and work hard to gather the stats. This will take a cross departmental approach from Government to use data on demographics to

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GRAVESEIDE ITEMS BEING STOLEN TO SELL ON

Items are being stolen from gravesides in cemeteries around Wicklow then sold on by unscrupulous thieves at car boot sales, *Wicklow Times* has learned.

Relatives and friends visiting graves of their loved ones in recent months have been appalled to discover that wreaths, flowers, candles, toys, lights and other mementos had been stolen from the headstones.

In what would appear to be a connected occurrence, cars in cemetery car parks are also being targeted by thieves. The thefts have been reported at a number of cemeteries across the county and have been understandably upsetting

for those who are leaving memorial items for their loved ones.

Mementos have been stolen from graves of all types, including ones for the very recently deceased as well as babies and children. One visitor to Springfield Cemetery in Bray reported spotting a woman walking through graves with a large shopping bag, grabbing anything that took her fancy.

A little bit of investigative work by local woman Pam Jenkins appears to

have solved the mystery of the missing graveside items. Pam happened to be attending a car boot sale in Wicklow when she came across a family selling a number of memorial items. Upon closer inspection Pam realised that the items were engraved with names, one read 'Mum and Dad, sadly missed from Grace'. Pam said there were at least 20 items all personalised with different names. She enquired as to whether

they offered a personalisation service for items and was told no, they were just selling the items displayed.

Pam said, "We realised the items were not new so we phoned Gardai who turned up and confiscated all of them. So hopefully some people got them back but realistically they would have had no clue where they came from. It's disgraceful."

Visitors to cemeteries are advised to report any suspicious activities to Gardai.

Wicklow loses in 'postcode lottery'

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John Brady TD said the ESRI underlines the large inequalities in the supply of health and social care in Wicklow and highlights the need for targeted investment in our county's primary and community care. Deputy Brady said "The ESRI must be congratulated on an encompassing and extremely detailed study which lays bare the inequalities in non-acute and primary care services county by county. The report itself underlines the inequalities in the supply of health services and social care in Wicklow and highlights the need for targeted investment in our county's primary and community care.

"The report is very clear that healthcare supply has not been allocated according to population need and this has led to inequalities across the primary care and other non-acute services they examined across the State, especially in Wicklow. This report underlines the need for targeted investment in primary and community care to address the inequalities we have in healthcare supply and also to have any hope in implementing Sláintecare."

ESRI say "healthcare supply could impede progress in implementing Sláintecare proposals, such as meeting more healthcare needs in the community and thereby reducing pressures on acute hospitals. This report also shows the importance of accurate and timely collection of health and social care data. Establishing a consistent and systematic data infrastructure would improve the evidence base to inform the efficient and equitable allocation of health and social care resources in Ireland. As the population will grow and age at different rates across counties, policies are required to allocate supply according to need."

One of the authors of the report, Brendan Walsh, stated: "Quantifying supply at the local level is vital to inform policymakers about those areas where greater provision of care is required. The findings demonstrate that in the absence of a national resource allocation system that relates supply to population need, inequalities in the supply of health and social care could impede progress towards proposed Sláintecare policies."

Proposed Kilcoole development 'requires further consideration'

A proposed major strategic housing development on the west side of Kilcoole Main Street requires further consideration/amendment, An Bord Pleanala has decided.

The pre-application to ABP from Kimpton Vale Ltd seeks permission for 253 residential units (211 houses and 42 apartments), as well as offices, shops, and creche.

ABP's decision means that the planned project is not yet in a fit state to be lodged as a formal application, however the developer may proceed with a formal application at any time.

A previous application from Kimpton Vale for a

housing development of 206 dwellings at the same location was refused by Wicklow County Council in 2003. At the time, the Council's reasons related to the dangerous and inadequate junction with Main Street proposed; no traffic impact assessment; inadequate surface water drainage; insufficient public and private open space; inadequate variety of layout, pedestrian and cycle links and poor integration with existing

development; no provision for childcare facilities; and no Part V proposals.

It's stated in the new planning application cover letter that these issues have all been addressed, and that the proposed development has been designed to integrate with an approved three-story mixed use development to the south of the site, granted permission by the Council in 2017.

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'133' IS MOST COMPLAINED ABOUT SERVICE

Bus Eireann's 133 route, which runs from Wicklow Town to Dublin Airport, is the most complained about of all Bus Eireann's routes, according to figures released by the National Transport Authority (NTA).

The NTA last week released details of customer complaints for bus services all over the country. According to these figures, Wicklow's 133 service was the most complained about, with 899 complaints per 100,000 passengers in 2018. The average for other Bus Eireann routes last year was 40 complaints per 100,000 passengers.

Social Democrats councillor, Jennifer Whitmore has called on the NTA and Bus Eireann to urgently resolve the issues with the 133 bus service, saying that "commuters and residents in Wicklow have put up with an inefficient, irregular service for too long and this is evidenced by the recent publication of customer complaints by the

NTA".

Cllr Whitmore continued: "These figures will come as no surprise to people who rely on the 133 to get to work or school. There have been issues with this service for many years. I, and many other public representatives, have raised this with Bus Eireann and the NTA on numerous

occasions. However, we are yet to see any improvements to the service. In the meantime, the daily commute for many is very stressful and the unreliability of the service means that many take to their cars. This is not a good result for the commuter or the environment, and we should be encouraging commuters to use public transport, rather than have a service that puts them off it completely."

Cllr Whitmore continued: "If issues on the

133 cannot be resolved in the short term, then I believe the NTA should look at building on the success of their recently opened Local Link service in Wicklow and introduce a link between Wicklow Town and Greystones. At least in this way, passengers from Wicklow Town would be able to access the Dart service and make their overall commute less time consuming, less stressful and more reliable."

Controversy as Pig Race is replaced by Sheep Race

The controversial pig derby that takes place every year as part of the Arklow Seabreeze Festival was cancelled this year ahead of the festival on the advice of Minister Andrew Doyle, citing concerns about swine fever. However there was widespread anger in the community when instead, sheep races which consisted of five sheep being chased down the street by the Festival Queen among cheering onlookers, were scheduled instead at the last minute.

Local woman Ciara Fitzgerald has been campaigning against these races for four years. She organised a petition which to date has 12,000 signatures. Ciara told *Wicklow Times* the committee said they do not care about the petition as they claim it was signed by a number of people from outside Arklow. Ciara says she has offered to show the committee a breakdown of the signature locations but to date, they have declined.

Ciara added, "The Seabreeze festival's decision to switch to sheep because they were told not to race pigs anymore, and not just

for swine fever concerns either, but because the health, welfare and stress the pigs were also condemned by the IFA.

The decision to race sheep was abhorrent, and incredibly short sighted and I do believe it backfired on them. There was public outcry online and I implore them not to use any animals again. They need to start listening to the majority of people who do not want animals herded through a crowded, noisy main street, for the sake a few cheap laughs. Sheep are even worse than pigs if that's possible and can literally die from fright. There is absolutely no consideration for animal wel-

fare during the ahead. In light of the Seabreeze festival, racing livestock is disgusting."

Ciara says she will continue her campaign to have the races stopped.

Meanwhile festival organiser Colm Moules said that the farmer who owned the sheep assured them that the race would not cause any distress to the animals.

"We issued a press release only on Thursday night in light of information received regarding the Swine Flu. At this point we had been in contact with the farmer who owned the pigs and naturally he was disappointed at the Pig Race not going

ahead. In light of the short notice we received, and having promoted the event through press, leaflets etc for the Festival he asked if we would go ahead with a sheep race instead, where he would supply sheep to the Festival. We asked him about proceeding along this route and he indicated it would not cause any harm or distress to his sheep. In the interest and safety of the animals we took the decision to only run three races instead of the five we normally have done for the pig race and shorten the distance considerably. Our thanks to everyone for their help and support."

Smile agus Sláinte will cover a wide range of services, many of which are not available under the current oral health policy. Services include, but are not limited to: Oral health assessments & examinations; Preventative interventions such as fissure sealants; Restorative treatment, such as fillings; Emergency Care; Diagnostic supports such as radiographs, orthodontic and oral surgery assessments; Fluoride therapy; Oral cancer risk assessment; Advice for alcohol control, tobacco cessation and diet.

Minister Simon Harris said: "I am really pleased to support this excellent initiative by my Department. This new strategy will mean a completely new approach to Dental and Oral health and will emphasis prevention over treatment. Children and adults in Wicklow, and throughout the country will benefit from this much more supportive approach to dental care."

Shorter and lighter batons were developed for the many girls and young women that were attracted to the activity, and by the 1960s it was a competitive sport with incorporated baton twirling associations. The WBTF itself was formed in 1977.

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Core funding a concern for Wicklow Uplands Council

Core Funding for the Wicklow Uplands Council is a concern, according to its Chairman Tom Byrne.

Speaking at the Uplands Council's recent AGM, Mr Byrne said "Despite the large number of successful projects initiated by Wicklow Uplands Council, core funding is a concern. The organisation continues to be supported by the Heritage Council, Wicklow County Council and Communicorp and while this support is greatly appreciated, the Uplands Council is seeking a more secure funding arrangement.

"Ongoing budgetary constraints faced by the Heritage Council has meant that the funding for groups like Wicklow Uplands Council has been cut in recent years. This is of concern as the Heritage Council is one of the few organisations that can support these groups."

Large numbers attended the Wicklow Uplands Council's Panel Meeting and AGM event held in the Glendalough Hotel.

The Community Panel, which looks at wide ranging issues affecting upland communities, concluded that issues such as poor broadband, rural crime and rural isolation needs to be highlighted further. The impact of additional windfarm operations in the uplands were of concern, although there was some positive discussion about the formation of energy group schemes in the uplands.

The Farming and Landowning Panel spoke of the ongoing issue of responsible dog control, in particular on open mountain where sheep are grazing. Rural crime prevention was keenly discussed, and the panel welcomed the news that three new Garda liaison officers had been assigned to the county. The installation of CCTV close to key roads such as the Sally Gap, was suggested as a possible measure to tackle incidents of rural crime. There was disappointment expressed by the panel that the permissive burning season was not extended in March, despite the provisions found in the recently enacted Heritage Act.

The Economic and Tourism Panel gave a warm welcome to a number of exciting developments in the region including the announcement of funding for the Blessington Greenway, the opening of the Miners Way trail, the remedial works on St. Kevin's Way and the arrival of the international EcoTrail race

in attendance. There was also a widespread welcome given to the 183 bus service operating between Glendalough and Wicklow Town.

The keynote address was given by Minister of State for Food, Forestry and Horticulture, Andrew Doyle, who complimented the Council on its extensive efforts to represent all of the communities across the uplands. Minister Doyle drew special attention to one of the key projects the council has developed over a number of years, the SUAS Pilot Project, which is working with the farming community to support hill farming and commonage groups in the uplands.

The Roundwood based TD, said that the Council had been successful in its tender for the competitive Deer Management Project, due to its well-established reputation and wide skillset to undertake large-scale projects.

Speaking after the event, Brian Dunne, Coordinator of the Council, added: "The panel meetings offer an important opportunity to discover the issues affecting the upland communities and to collectively seek solutions to address them. We saw a great number of representatives including many new ones, attend the event, and the Council's newly elected board looks forward to engaging with them. The keynote address from Minister Doyle really captured the importance of having an organisation such as the Uplands Council and we are grateful for the support he offered in sourcing sustainable core funding."

€57M to be invested in Wicklow under National Broadband Plan

Over 20% of premises in Wicklow still without high-speed broadband in 2019

The roll-out of high-speed broadband to over 14,437 premises in Wicklow has moved one step closer, as the Government announced that work to finalise the contract for the National Broadband Plan (NBP) is well progressed.

Many homes and business premises in County Wicklow are adversely affected by lack of broad-

band and many have been lobbying their local representatives for years to get the same services

as their counterparts in the capital and major cities around the country.

The high-speed broadband roll out will cover the remaining 22% of premises in the county.

Communications Minister Richard Bruton recently told the Cabinet on Wednesday that 'it is crucial that we move to sign the contract so that the one million people who today are without access, are not left behind'.

National Broadband Ireland (NBI) are the Preferred Bidder for the contract, and Taoiseach Leo Varadkar has already indicated that he would like to have the contract signed by the National Ploughing Championships in mid-September this year. The first homes could be passed and connected by early autumn next year once the contract is closed.

Wicklow will receive an investment of €57 million to provide fibre broadband to homes in the Intervention Area (IA). This is a mapped area of rural Ireland where high-speed broadband is currently not commercially available and it encompasses over half a million premises, 56,000 farms and 44,000 businesses. In Wicklow this includes areas such as Tinahely, Ashford, Glencree and Blessington. In total, 22% of all premises in Wicklow will be passed and eligible for connection.

Commenting on the latest news, Dónal O'Keeffe, Broadband Development Officer of Wicklow County Council said, "Wicklow County Council welcomes the news from the NBP and NBI regarding the investment commitment of 57 million euro to rural communities within Co. Wicklow. This will future proof rural communities by providing vital high-speed broadband services to all premises in the county. Currently, 22.3% of premises in the county, approximately 14,500

homes, businesses, farms and other facilities, still do not have access to high-speed internet. This is severely obstructing rural business growth and sustainability and quality of life of rural people in this digital era. The project will substantially help bridge the divide between rural and urban living over the coming years."

Local businesswoman Rachel Kane of Lifehack.ie welcomes the news, "As a resident of Baltinglass, West Wicklow, I have been immersed in the research and development of human connections to overcome the 'barriers to communication' for enterprise and individuals with West Wicklow Business Network, also on a community project for co-working in Baltinglass Courthouse, a contributor to the development of the Wicklow Digital Strategy (Wicklow County Council) and my own fledgling business Lifehack as a design researcher. The potential impact of the NBI roll out for the 'one-in-four' premises to participate in a digital society is very promising.

West Wicklow, similar to other rural towns and villages has not recovered as quickly as other areas since the recession, due to geographical, transport, infrastructure, accessibility and broadband barriers. With this investment in County Wicklow, the future for residents and SMEs to be included in the economic recovery and digital innovations in health, literacy, education, e-commerce, will create a level playing field. While it is not total saturation, we need to remember the rural electrification process took 30+ years to reach every home. We can innovate with remote working, co-working and sustainable futures for our 'millennium babies' and democratise our workplace in the beautiful 'Garden County.'



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
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


We always hear of horror stories of homeowners begin scammed by dodgey builders, but there are ways to make sure you don't hire the



HOME IMPROVEMENTS

Home maintenance and repair projects are projects that must be done to maintain the integrity and value of your home. Check flashing around the chimney, walls, etc. Make sure broken shingles are

Gutters and Downspouts:

Make sure these are clean and flowing well. If they are clogged, clean and flush the gutters

and downspouts. Clogged gutters are the source of many problems such as paint failure, leaks, wood rot, sagging gutters. Improper downspout outlets are also a problem that can cause water in the basement and cracked foundation walls. Make sure the downspout outlet drains away from the house on soil that is sloping away from the house. If downspouts are allowed to drain into the house or into crocks that run to the basement or foundation, water problems can occur including ground settlement resulting in cracking of the basement wall.

Brick Wall:

Make sure that the brick wall is solid and in good repair. Replace damaged brick including cracked brick and tuckpoint any missing mortar joints.



Foundation: Repair any cracks in the foundation wall. If you see cracks check that the downspouts are not draining into the house foundation and footings. Downspouts and the yard should drain away

from the house. If the basement wall cracks are severe, you may need structural repairs including foundation underpinning. This is serious and you need to consult an expert foundation repair contractor.

Plumbing Fixtures:

Check that the plumbing fixtures are in good working order. Identify the type of faucets you have and replace any leaking washers or cartridges if the faucet leaks. Check the

drainage of toilets and sinks and unclog as necessary.

Furnace: Make sure the furnace has clean air filters and is in good working order by performing a seasonal furnace checkup.

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

Install a patio or garden decking

Your architects will advise you on the correct procedures if an appeal is lodged against your project, if planning permission is refused or if you need to appeal against a condition in your permission.

These building regulations. Your architect will know which materials and construction systems will meet the requirements for each part of the building and will advise you on a cost effective solution.

Extensions

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Summer gardening tips

Eager gardeners are rushing out to make hay while the sun shines. To enjoy hassle-free gardening, follow a few of these simple steps to ensure your garden works for you over the summer months.

Succulents make outstanding container plants because of their striking and quirky colours and forms. Sedum, Sempervivum (hens and chicks), Echeveria and Aeonium are perfect for the job. Plain and simple works best when it comes to containers - terra cotta is ideal, allowing the eye to focus on the plant instead of the pot. Place your succulents where their intricacies will be appreciated. Natural elements such as beach glass, coloured rocks, sand and bits of driftwood complement these low-maintenance plants.

Coax a second bloom from summer perennials like phlox, delphinium, "true" geranium, aster and some types of veronica. Cut stems down by half, using blooms in the vase, and you'll likely get another flush of flowers in the autumn.

Lightly prune shrubs after they're done flowering. Trim dead wood anytime - a satisfying activity with a nice sharp pair of pruners.

Avoid scalping your lawn. If you allow grass to grow a little longer, removing no more than one-third at each mowing, the taller grass will dominate the weeds, and you'll have less of them.

Gardening seems natural enough, but children (adults too) need to learn to water low - on the soil, not the leaves - and not a fairy sprinkle but a long, slow drink. Frequent shallow watering encourages roots to grow towards the surface, making plants especially vulnerable in hot weather. Irrigate in the morning.

For those berries to be made into jam, layer singly on a paper towel. A cool, well-ventilated room is best for short-term storage, rather than the fridge. Washing promotes cell-wall breakdown, so rinse if you must but only before using. Your garden is full of summer bounty, so who wants to think about winter? Nevertheless, light levels begin to wane in August, and growth slows.

This fall you will need sturdy seedlings ready for transplanting into empty spots in your garden for over-wintering, so seed transplants of kale, winter cabbage and Swiss chard by the third week of August.

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

Report details importance of racing to local economy

The horse breeding and racing industry in counties Wicklow and Wexford support over 1,600 jobs in the two counties. This is the key finding of a Regional Economic Impact Study conducted by Horse Racing Ireland and Deloitte.

The study highlights the economic reach of the industry in the counties - generating an economic return of €84m per annum - and has found that the breeding industry in both counties operates at a particularly high level.

Over 750 breeders are registered in Wicklow and Wexford, with the focus on National Hunt breeding. The registered broodmare population is in excess of 1,450 and the region produces over 900 foals every year. Total breeding revenue comes in at €29m, with the majority of this figure, €27m, derived from bloodstock sales.

There are 53 trainers in the region and between them they are responsible for close to 400 horses. Paul Nolan, the Cheltenham Festival winning trainer and a three-time winner of the Galway Hurdle, runs a hugely successful yard close to Enniscorthy. The

likes of Liz Doyle, Colin Bowe and Philip Rothwell are also regular visitors to the winners' enclosure while Cheltenham Festival winning trainer Colm Murphy has recently renewed his licence and will operate once again from his Gorey base.

Champion trainers Aidan O'Brien and Jim Bolger are both Wexford natives and maintain strong links with the county. The point-to-point industry in Ireland is at its strongest in the region with the likes of Bowe, Donnchadh Doyle, Denis Murphy, Sean Doyle, Liam Kenny and Cormac Doyle all producing horses of the highest quality. Recent Cheltenham Festival winners Envoi Allen, Samcro and the Arkle winner Western Warhorse have all begun their careers in County Wexford. Wexford Racecourse has undergone major transformation in recent years, becoming a National Hunt-only venue in June 2016.

'Council must take action to stop illegal dumping at the Murrough'

Wicklow Sinn Féin TD John Brady has called on Wicklow County Council to take immediate action to stop the ongoing illegal dumping at The Murrough in Wicklow Town and have the waste deposited there removed.

Deputy Brady said "Unfortunately the illegal dumping at The Murrough has been ongoing now over a considerable period of time. What appears to be a mixture of commercial and household rubbish is being brought to the scenic location in Wicklow Town and dumped, with most of it being burnt.

"Wicklow County Council is aware of the issue; it has also been reported to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The dumping has been allowed to drag on too long and the Council must now take immediate actions to stop the dumping and have the area cleaned up.

"The Murrough is not just a beautiful location that's widely used by many; it's also an environmentally important area. It is covered by National and European protection designations such

as 'Special Protection Area', in 2018 it was designated a 'Special Area of Conservation', the area is also a proposed 'National Heritage Area' and 'Flora Protection Order'. So the illegal dumping that's ongoing there is destroying a valuable public amenity and an environmentally important area."

Deputy Brady concluded "The perpetrators of this environmental vandalism must also be held to account and they must face the full riggers of the law. I would also ask people to be mindful of handing their rubbish over to people who knock on their door and offer to remove any waste they may have. These operators should be asked for a waste permit, otherwise it will more than likely end up at The Murrough and beautiful places like it."

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Summer weather lifting spirits for Wicklow hoteliers

Tourism figures reached record levels last year. However, early indications for 2019 from hotels and guesthouses in Wicklow and across the country are that it will be challenging for the industry to maintain the growth of recent years.

According to the latest industry survey from the Irish Hotels Federation (IHF), the domestic market is holding and US business levels are continuing to rise. However, the continental Europe market shows signs of softening while business levels from the UK market are still falling. Mr Brian McNamara, Chair of the Wicklow branch of the IHF states that the heightened risk of a disruptive Brexit is a serious concern for the tourism industry.

Other major concerns highlighted include reduced competitiveness due to increases in the cost of doing business and the hike in tourism VAT. These reflect the findings of the Crowe Ireland Annual Hotel Survey which showed that many costs are increasing faster than the underlying growth in revenues. Some 62% of IHF members have seen further increases in insurance costs over the last 12 months in addition to substantial increases in recent years. Meanwhile the VAT increase has led many hoteliers to take a more cautious approach to investment with over half postponing or scaling back their plans.

According to the IHF survey, almost two-thirds (64%) of hoteliers say domestic business levels are holding with some reporting increases compared to this time last year. This market is of particular importance to regional tourism, where the recovery has been slower. Further afield, the

US market continues to perform strongly with almost four in ten (38%) of hoteliers reporting increases in business. However, there are signs of a slowdown in growth from continental Europe. Closer to home, 62% have seen a drop in business levels from Northern Ireland while almost three quarters of hoteliers (73%) report a fall-off from Great Britain.

Mr McNamara states:

"With the prospect of a prolonged and disruptive Brexit looming, the Government must not disregard the importance of tourism. The industry plays a vital role as an engine of growth and regional economic balance, supporting over 266,000 jobs throughout the country, 70% of which are outside Dublin. Here in Wicklow it supports 13,900 jobs and contributes some €174m to the local economy annually."

"Yet, we continue to have a two-tiered tourism industry, which Government policy is failing to address. There are parts of the industry that are performing well though the rate of growth appears to be slowing. However, not every tourism business or part of the country is enjoying the same level of success.

There are many areas where tourism remains very seasonal and hospitality businesses struggle to break even during off-peak periods. These businesses can ill afford to take another economic hit. The Government

must take decisive action to mitigate the impact of Brexit and address the other serious challenges we face with the high cost of doing business in Ireland," he added.

"Tourism is an exceptionally competitive activity. We compete daily for business at both a domestic and international level and every tourism Euro spent by overseas and domestic tourists in Ireland is hard won. Maintaining our competitiveness is absolutely vital to sustaining the growth of the industry."

Following calls from the Irish Hotels Federation, the Government has committed to the introduction of a Tourism Satellite Account within the Central Statistics Office (CSO). Mr McNamara is urging the Government to prioritise its implementation.

"With tourism heading into more difficult times, it is essential that policy makers have a complete and accurate picture of the industry. This account would provide a full analysis of the economic activity in the tourism industry and show how much it contributes to each county throughout

the country to inform future taxation and economic policy," he said.

Breakdown of business levels across markets compared to this time last year:

Domestic market: 32% of hotels and guesthouses are reporting an increase in visitor numbers from across Ireland compared to this time last year with 32% seeing no change and 36% noting a decrease.

Britain: Only 8% are noting an increase in visitor numbers from Britain, with 19% seeing no change, and 73% seeing a decrease.

Northern Ireland: 10% of premises are noting an increase with 28% saying they have seen no change, while 62% see a decrease.

United States: 38% of premises are noting an increase; while 30% have seen no change and 32% note a decrease.

Germany: 20% of hotels and guesthouses are reporting an increase, with 46% saying they have seen no change and 34% seeing a decrease.

France: 15% of hotels and guesthouses are noting an increase, with 55% saying they have seen no change and 30% seeing a decrease.

HEATWAVE WARNING

The Asthma Society of Ireland is warning the 8,138 people in Wicklow who have both asthma and hayfever in Ireland to take precautions when going on holidays this summer.

A heatwave across Europe could cause problems for Irish people with hayfever and asthma if they are on holidays in areas affected by the heatwave. The Asthma Society has teamed up with Dyson Ireland to launch its Pollen Tracker on asthma.ie providing a daily update of pollen levels as well as a downloadable Asthma Action Plan.

Holidays with Asthma and Hayfever:

Speak to the Asthma Society's free Asthma and COPD AdviceLine on 1800 44 54 64 or talk to a doctor or pharmacist prior to your holiday. Don't wait until you feel unwell or until you are abroad as the language difference can pose a challenge in getting the right treatment. Ensure that you have an Asthma Attack Card with you and that both you and your travel companions know what to do in case of an asthma emergency.

If the Pollen Count is high, you should:

- Keep windows and doors closed especially at night.
- Stay indoors as much as possible.
- Stay away from grassy areas, especially when grass is freshly cut.
- Put Vaseline around your nostrils to trap pollen.
- Wear wraparound sunglasses to stop pollen getting into your eyes.
- Shower, wash your hair and change your clothes if you have been outside.
- Avoid drying clothes outdoors or shake them out before bringing them in.
- Minimise your contact with animals that have been outdoors.

Verification works, including sampling, have been carried out and, following consultation with the HSE, the Boil Water Notice has now been lifted.

Irish Water stated "We wish to thank the community for their patience and cooperation while we worked to resolve this issue."
