'WE NEED MORE GARDAI'

There are growing calls for an increased Garda presence in County Wicklow with the county currently experiencing a crime wave of thefts and burglaries.

Seven arrests were made recently following a spate of thefts from shops in Bray and residential burglaries and thefts from cars in Greystones and Bray.

There also has been a spate of thefts from cars parked at graveyards and tourist hotspots across the county. The Wicklow Mountains have had their own problems with crime in recent weeks with incidents of cyclists being run off the road by cars so their bikes can be stolen from them.

Fianna Fail TD Stephen Donnelly has called for more Gardai on the streets in the Greystones area after pharmacies on Church

Road were targeted. Deputy Donnelly explained, "Major shoplifting was reported in both pharmacies on Church Road this week, within the space of just a couple of hours. The local Gardai should be commended for doing their absolute best to deal with the situation, but their hands are effectively tied without adequate resources.

"We need to see extra money spent on patrol cars and more members of the force hired so that Gardai can return to the old-fashioned notion of 'feet on the street'. Even in today's modern world there's no better deterrent to criminals than a visible

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presence; boost funding and support for Garda controlled CCTV; encourage and promote GPS tracking and location devices to help protect against the robbery of farming machinery and equipment; amend our bail laws to include electronic tagging; and introduce a system to recoup the cost of legal aid from convicted criminals.

"There are many ways to fight back against crime, but we need to start with a belief that our communities are worth it", concluded Deputy Donnelly.

Wicklow Labour party councillor Paul O'Brien said "With the growing number of new estates in Newtownmountkennedy, Ashford, Rathnew and Wicklow Town there needs to be an increase in Garda numbers to represent the increase in the population and relying on the numbers we have at present may not be enough

to cope with the ever growing demands on our Garda".

Bray Labour Party councillor Anne Ferris added her support to her party colleague and said that she has noticed a greater Garda presence on the streets of Bray but that needs to be replicated all over the county.

"There are large estates being built all over the entire county and I agree with my colleague Cllr O'Brien that an increase in Garda numbers is badly required."

Both Councillors went onto praise the efforts of the Gardai and called on the Government to provide them with all the resources they require. Cllr O'Brien stated that every effort should be made to ensure those on the frontline fighting crime get all the support we can give them and that goes for the public as well.

BRAY COUNCILLORS 'COMPLETELY BY-PASSED AND BLINDSIDED'

Bray-based Cllr Anne Ferris (Lab) criticised Independent councillor Joe Behan at last Monday's Wicklow County Council meeting for becoming 'aggressive' while speaking.

Cllr Behan was reacting to the news that Bray Town Centre is to get a 'Health Check' by a consultancy firm, with the aim of enhancing the town. Cllr Behan felt that councillors had been "completely by-passed and blindsided" by the move, which he said he knew nothing about until he received an email about it the previous Friday evening.

A heated Cllr Behan declared: "As far as I am concerned, we need a lot of work done in Bray town and town centre, but the elected members have to be involved from the beginning. We weren't asked if it was a good idea, we weren't asked should a survey be done, and we weren't asked what questions should be asked, we weren't able to discuss what would happen to the report and the survey when it was done."

Cllr Behan became further enraged when Cathaoirleach, Cllr Irene Winters, cut him off when he went beyond the allocated three-minute speaking time. "I will let you back in after other councillors have spoken, if you cannot take three minutes to make one point," said Cllr Winters. "You will have to wait, I am sorry."

Cllr Ferris said "I think that kind of behaviour, Cllr Behan, would put people off, being aggressive like that, I think you can get your point across without shouting."

will include three stages: Online Survey, Focus Group Workshop, and Wider Community Group Workshop. The wider community workshop is scheduled for Wednesday, September 18th in the Royal Hotel at 7pm.

The aim of the public consultation events will be to identify: What are the existing assets? What are the priority actions for town? How can they be achieved? Who is responsible for leading the action? When are actions required to be completed? A final report will issue and will include a series of recommendations on future opportunities for the town.

Steven Matthews, welcomed the health check as "a very positive thing for the town".

"I believe it's an objective of the Town Team and the Wicklow

Economic Think-Tank to have these processes carried out. This company is experienced in economic matters," he said.

"This was discussed at a councillors induction meeting that I organised, so councillors were aware we were looking to carry out this work on the town and have a health check done. Councillors should and did know about this, we also have public meetings which councillors have been informed of as well and we have had wide stakeholder engagement on it, this hasn't been going on quietly."

Chief Executive of the Council, Frank Curran, said that the town health check is a follow on from the formation of the Bray Town Team.

"It's active citizenship within the town and it's been positive to date in other towns and I have no doubt this one will be. Councillors will be involved in the town health check," he said.

Independent councillor Mags Crean said "It is great to see the range of work that town teams are undertaking. However, we do need to ensure that there is transparency and accountability. Some of the activities are similar to planning functions and more strategic town development pieces so it is important to have links between the town teams and local councils."

Wicklow Hospice nearing completion

Wicklow Hospice is now nearing completion with building works expected to be completed in October and fit out of the building to take place in November. It is expected that the hospice will be open to patients for the first time this year.

Minister Simon Harris visited the brand-new Wicklow Hospice recently and met with the Committee and the builders on site to see the progress that is being made.

Speaking after the visit, Minister Simon Harris said: "This incredible facility for Co Wicklow is now nearly there. I want to pay a huge tribute to the incredible committee of the Wicklow Hospice Foundation for their sterling work and to all of the people across the county who supported this amazing project. We are now going to have for the first time ever, a dedicated in-patient hospice in our County. I have no doubt this will make a difference to the lives of so many people and so many families. I am delighted to have been in a position as Health Minister to secure some funding for this project - including an additional €1.25 million to help towards the build of the project and also receive guarantees from the Health Service that they will meet the running costs of the hospice. I look forward to continuing to work with the Wicklow Hospice Foundation and everyone involved in this project. Appeal against Council decision on Arklow housing development

A third-party appeal has been lodged with An Bord Pleanala against Wicklow County Council's decision to refuse an application to build 41 housing units on Yellow Lane, Knockenrahan Lower, Arklow.

The application, from Yellow Lane Business Park Ltd, is for "the demolition of existing 498sqm commercial unit and removal of existing temporary car wash shed, construction of 41 housing units to be constructed in two phases and all associated works."

The application proposed to install a temporary waste water treatment system to serve multiple dwelling units until a new public wastewater treatment plant is available in Arklow. The site of the proposed development is located along Yellow Lane at the south end of Arklow adjoining TJ O'Mahony Builder Merchants store and yard.

The Council refused permission last month, stating that it is the Planning Authority's position to refuse permission to any residential development which is reliant on a private treatment plant pending the provision of the Arklow WWTP by Irish Water.

The Council said that the proposed development would also contravene the County Development Plan, which states that 'private wastewater treatment plants for multi-house developments will not be permitted'.

The Council's Planner's Report also states that there are a number of design issues in the proposed development. The case is due to be decided by ABP in mid December.

Mortgage To Rent cases on the rise

Hundreds of Wicklow householders in unsustainable mortgage arrears and at risk of losing their homes are being given fresh hope of a solution to their problems.

Central Bank figures for Wicklow show over 800 family home loans in arrears for two years or more, while 58 Mortgage to Rent cases have either been completed or are being actively progressed, according to figures just released by The Housing Agency.

The Government's Mortgage to Rent scheme aims to keep homeowners with unsustainable debt in their current properties debt-free as long-term tenants of their local authority.

A recent rise in eligibility values in the county to €395,000, combined with an increased appetite from lenders to work with the scheme, could see Mortgage to Rent engagements dramatically

favour the Wicklow householder.

"The Government has shown it is interested in developing the scheme by widening the eligibility bands by €30,000 while banks and funds have made it clear they prefer to see a solution where the householder can stay in their home paying an income-based rent.

"Neither the lenders nor the funds want to go down the repossession route and see Mortgage to Rent as playing a significant role in avoiding such outcomes."

Mr Cunningham estimates that a large percentage of Wicklow families deemed to be in serious arrears of two years or more could use the Mortgage to Rent route to solve their unsatisfactory mortgage situation.

"Our engagement with home-dwellers in mortgage distress has doubled

over the past year, and the growing success of the scheme nationally is in contrast to the tidal wave of reposessions that doomsayers had been predicting.

I can now see a situation arising where thousands of cases can be solved nationally, including many in Wicklow. However, for that to happen, politicians locally and nationally must make themselves more aware of the potential of the scheme."

Mr Cunningham appealed to families to grasp this opportunity by engaging with their lender, their local MABS officer or a Mortgage to Rent provider. "Society has a problem when we have 28,000 families in serious mortgage arrears, where many of them could potentially find a way out of this misery through Mortgage to Rent."

Council set to exceed 'Rebuilding Ireland' housing targets

County Council is on course to exceed its targets under the Government's 'Rebuilding Ireland' housing supply strategy by over one hundred houses, councillors were told last week.

Breege Kilkenny, manager of the council's Housing Capital Construction Programme, informed councillors last week that the Council's housing strategy will see 1,327 houses built during the period 2018-2021, surpassing the delivery target of 1,225 set for Wicklow by the Government in April 2018.

In 2018 the council delivered 83 new social housing units. By the end of this year Wicklow will have increased its social housing supply to 272 units. For the following two years, 2020 and 2021, Wicklow will see a further increase in its own social housing, delivering 557 housing units by the end of 2021.

"This demonstrates a sevenfold increase in the number of social housing units that Wicklow will construct in this two-year period," said Ms Kilkenny. "We have more schemes in the pipeline, but we haven't submitted them for approval yet, but they will be post 2021."

The Council currently has 11 housing schemes. Ms Kilkenny explained that "In the last year we had a review and realised we need to look at bigger sites and attempt to go through rapid build. This was discussed and brought forward through the SPC as a policy change, and we are now seeing dividends in relation to that.

"Our units were low last year because we were concentrating on the greatest need and infill sites, and we were only getting small sites, using the traditional build and construction.

"Our shift towards rapid build was necessary given the delivery target given by the Government of these 1,225 units."

There are five pillars of action to address housing and homelessness under the Rebuilding Ireland plan; pillar one is to address homelessness; pillars two and three is to accelerate social housing and build more homes; pillar four is to improve the rental sector; and pillar five to utilise the council's staff in a better and more efficient way.

Councillors were told that 1,420 HAP (Housing Assistant Payment) tenancies have been created in Wicklow since it was rolled out in 2018. Speaking after last week's meeting, Cllr Mags Crean (Ind) said "It is positive to hear that the council intends to meet Rebuilding Ireland targets by 2021 but there is also the issue that the housing list is increasing annually. Even if the council provides 1,025 houses by 2021, there will still be thousands left in need of social housing and growing numbers in need of affordable housing. "It is unfair to refer to these housing statistics as only a positive news story, as this type of argument negates people's real experiences of homelessness and housing need. Yes, there are positive aspects to what the council are doing but there are very real housing shortages especially in social and affordable housing and we need proactive local action".

No matter how much you dream about winning the Lotto, you're never quite prepared for it when it actually happens. We've been getting some sound financial and legal advice to ensure we are best prepared for the next couple of months."

Contract signed for N81 Knockroe bend realignment scheme

A contract for the N81 Knockroe Bend Realignment Scheme was signed with Clonmel Enterprises by Wicklow County Council on Monday last (Sept 2nd).

The Realignment Scheme involves the upgrade of the N81 National Secondary Road at Knockroe Bend over approximately 1 km.

This bend is situated on the N81 approximately 800m south of Hollywood Cross (Junction of N81 and R756) and approximately 11km south of Blessington between two sections of relatively good alignment and has been the scene of numerous collisions.

The scheme has been prepared to improve road standards, to implement an improvement in the road safety performance of this section of the N81 and reduce the occurrence

of collisions by realigning and widening the road at this location.

Site works commenced last week and it is anticipated the main works contract will take 72 weeks. Site supervision of the main works contract will be provided by RPS Consulting Engineers. The scheme has been funded by Transport Infrastructure Ireland.

Welcoming the news, Stephen Donnelly TD said "Upgrade works on the N81 can be counted as a success if they help to save even a single life."

Deputy Donnelly explained, "We've spent a long time trying to convince the authorities of

the importance of this work so I was very relieved to discover that on Monday Wicklow County Council had signed a contract with building and engineering company Clonmel Enterprises to widen the road at the Knockroe Bend south of Hollywood Cross.

"The plan to realign the stretch of the road is expected to take over a year - 72 weeks is the current estimate. It's being funded by Transport Infrastructure Ireland and it'll be money well spent if it helps to prevent even one crash.

"We know there have been many collisions at

this spot over the years and the upgrade is well and truly needed. Needless to say, however, there's a lot left to do in the area.

"We're trying to get nearby footpaths improved and more bus stops added, especially along the 132 route where the Hollywood Road meets the N81. In fact, public transport is one area where we're really lagging behind. We can't expect everyone to turn green and take the bus if we can't promise a decent service in return. My message to Government here is simple. The N81 upgrade is a good start. Now keep going."

Climate Adaptation Strategy adopted

Councillors voted last week to adopt Wicklow County Council's Climate Change Adaptation Strategy. Wicklow is among the first Local Authorities in the country to adopt such a strategy, and was the first to declare a 'climate emergency'.

The Climate Change Adaptation Strategy identifies current vulnerabilities for the county in relation to climate change and outlines key adaptation measures that the organisation can put in place to respond to climate risks.

Social Democrats Councillor Jennifer Whitmore, co-chair of the council's Climate & Biodiversity Action Strategic Policy Committee (SPC), said "I welcome the adoption of the Council's

Adaptation plan, as it will provide a very important framework for how the Council, as an

organisation, will respond to climate change. Ninety-seven submissions were received in response to the Council's consultation on the draft strategy, which is the highest number of submissions received by any council across the country. I believe that this demonstrates how important this issue is to the people of Wicklow. Many of the submissions and feedback received looked at measures relating to biodiversity

and climate change mitigation.

"Unfortunately, these specific issues could not be dealt with under the Adaptation Strategy, as its scope was set down by the Department of the Environment and was very narrow in its remit. However, the Council staff did an excellent job in collating all the information and feedback and that will all now come to the Climate Change and Biodiversity Action SPC for further consideration.

"I am really looking forward to chairing this SPC. As the first SPC in the country that has been set up specifically to develop policy in relation to Biodiversity and Climate Change, I believe there is a huge opportunity for Wicklow to take the lead in addressing these environmental challenges. As Chair of this group, I want this to be a very outward looking policy group and involving our communities as much as possible. We have enormous talent and expertise both within our communities and our council staff, and I want to be able to draw on all

that knowledge when developing our policies. We are also the first group to specifically involve a young representative of Comhairle na nÓg, to ensure that the youth voice is heard when discussing these important issues."

Cllr Whitmore continued "One of the first things I want the SPC to look at is the adoption of the All Ireland Pollinator Plan. We also need to review our Biodiversity Strategy and look at developing a climate change mitigation strategy. In addition to these future initiatives, much work is already underway by the Council. For example, today the Council also approved the Part 8 planning for the installation of solar carports in County Buildings which will provide up to 40% of the electricity requirements of the Wicklow Town building. It's great to see climate change and biodiversity so high on the Council's and public's agenda and I look forward seeing what we can achieve over the 5-year term of the Council in this critically important area."

The previous programme expired in June. The new plan retains the 1:16 ratio, where 1 house in 16, in new housing schemes is allocated to traveller accommodation.

It states that "Wicklow County Council recognises Travellers' identity as an indigenous minority ethnic group and strives to accommodate Travellers in a culturally appropriate way. It is the policy of Wicklow County Council, within the resources available, to provide group and standard housing options as well as halting sites for the accommodation of Travellers who are on the list for Social Housing Support with Wicklow County Council."

Living accommodation and onsite facilities will be improved at existing sites such as Silverbridge, Ballinteskin, Rocky Valley, and Windgates. This will be subject to Government funding. Meanwhile, there are approximately 80 trav-

eller families deemed to be in need of housing. The new plan retains the 1:16 ratio, where 1 house in 16, in new housing units being allocated to a traveller family. It's essential we continue with that policy.

"Many young travellers may want to travel at certain times of the year, but they want to have a home they can call their own and one of the concerns that the traveller representatives on the committee indicated to us is that because of the extreme shortage of rental accommodation in this county at the moment, unless things change soon, we will be back to a situation of having to deal with illegal encampments around the county. That is a day we do not want to go back to. We have to make sure that travellers have every possible assistance to get housed on a permanent basis."

There are currently 254 traveller families in Co. Wicklow; 142 are accommodated by or with assistance from the council.



Wicklow for the last three years and who are on the council's list for social housing support).

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Rescued hens need homes

Would you like to have free range eggs fresh from your garden and perform a good deed into the bargain?

Animal charity Little Hill Animal Rescue and Sanctuary are looking for Wicklow homes for hundreds of rescued chickens and will bring them to Bray, Blessington and Baltinglass next week for collection.

Further locations around County Wicklow will be announced in the coming months. The hens are seeking homes as they have been producing eggs commercially for at least a year and have been replaced by younger more fertile hens. When this happens, the hens are routinely killed, so the Little Hill Sanctuary rescues them and re-homes as many as possible, so they can live out their lives in a caring environment.

Many people who have adopted in the past report that the hens flourish once they are cared for in the outside world. Anybody wishing to adopt some of the hens is advised to go to their Facebook page and send a private message to reserve hens. As free animals are often used to bait dogs or for commercial purposes there will be an 'adopt fee' of €6 per hen.

The sanctuary asks that interested parties do not reserve hens unless they are full sure they intend to take them. You will need to bring along cat carriers, or adequate sturdy cardboard boxes with lots of airholes, one box per two hens. Hens will not be given without these.

The hens are just over one year old and should lay for many more years at a rate of approximately five or six eggs per week. The hens will need a fox proof chicken coop or shed that can be locked at night and a small outdoor area to walk around.

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Public urged to be mindful of seals

Wicklow County Council is urging the public and particularly dog owners to be mindful of disturbing seals when they visit the coast this autumn.

The call comes after a seal pup washed up on the shore at The Cove beach in Greystones at the end of August. The seal was taken to the seal sanctuary in Courtown where it died.

September to December is a particularly important time for grey seals as it is the breeding season during which time the adults seek safe sites to "haul out" on land.

These are typically sheltered beach areas where the animals return year after year to breed, rest, moult and engage in social activity.

In the coming weeks seals will give birth to a single pup which is born with a white coat and does not swim. Mothers will stay close to their pup for a number of weeks until it is weaned, during which time the animals are very vulnerable to disturbance by humans and dogs.

Seal rescue Ireland (SRI) recommends that people and dogs stay at

least 100 meters or more from seals that are "hauled out" as coming close to them will cause stress and could cause a stampede possibly leading to injury, drowning or death to small pups in particular.

This can also lead to the abandonment of pups as mothers who are spooked by human contact will often not return for them. Orphaned pups have very little chance for survival and often SRI must intervene by bringing a seal into rehabilitation whereas without human disturbance the pup would have been successfully cared for and weaned in the wild.

It is important to note that "disturbance" includes any deviation from normal behaviour and even seals who become alert due to humans at a great distance are exposed to dangers from stress, waste of energy, loss of rest, and potential loss of feeding/mating/nursing or

evasion of predator opportunities.

"Most 'haul out' sites along the East coast of Ireland have public access", explained Deirdre Burns, Heritage Officer, Wicklow County Council.

"Therefore the behaviour of people visiting the coast is hugely important. The Municipal Districts of Wicklow and Greystones are working in tandem with Seal Rescue Ireland to raise public awareness of this issue by erecting information signs at known 'haul out' sites and restricting access to these areas as required."

She added: "Our natural world is under increasing pressure from human influence and the Council is pleading with beach users to act responsibly."

Speaking to *Wicklow Times*, Brendan Price, Founder of the Irish Seal Sanctuary in Courtown, said that the signage that the Council had erected at Lime Kiln Bay in

Wicklow, where there is a significant seal colony, is too close to the colony. He also believes that the council's marketing of the cliff walk as a tourist amenity is putting the seal colony in this area at risk.

"As soon as people's heads appear over the top of the hill, the seals retreat into the water," he said. "The council need to extend the cordon around the area. Adequate safeguards need to be put in place; at minimum a fencing off the bay and promontory is needed, and a ranger should be present at critical times such as the current breeding season. Minister Josephine Madigan needs take corrective measures as necessary and the Irish Seal Sanctuary (ISS) has been lobbying her for NPWS oversight of multiple stakeholders engaged with seal welfare, ourselves, fisheries, seal science and seal tourism.

The threat is

immediate so corrective actions need be prompt. We cannot afford to lose a seal colony like that one. I'm sure between the ISS, NPWS, and Wicklow County Council, we can find a solution."

Seals are legally protected under the Wildlife Act and it is illegal and dangerous to approach them or to allow dogs to do so. Grey seal mums will normally leave their pups alone on the beach for extended periods of time while they go off and hunt and will return to their pups to nurse. Just because a seal pup is observed alone on the beach does not necessarily mean the pup has been orphaned.

Food for life



A New Medicines Service would help people who are prescribed a new medicine for certain long-term conditions to manage their condition and to improve their medication adherence through providing clinical support at the outset of taking new medication. A pilot carried out by the IPU showed that adherence increased from 37% to 77% after the intervention and support of a community pharmacist.

Pharmacists supply medicines every day to patients. It is a normal pharmacy activity with pharmacists providing advice and recommendations regarding these medications.

Pharmacists are qualified to deal with a number of ailments including colds and flus; allergic rhinitis; cold sores; constipation; dermatitis and mild eczema; headache; heartburn; migraine; nausea and vomiting and pain, among other conditions. In the event that the patient requires additional treatment a pharmacist will always refer the patient to another healthcare professional including GPs.

All pharmacists have a consultation area where patients can talk to their pharmacist in private and discreetly.

Pharmacists are part of a continuum of care that is an essential part of our health service. In addition to the widely recognised role of dispensing medicines and advice, community pharmacists undertake a range of other primary healthcare roles. These include:

- *cross-checking prescriptions to minimise the risk of adverse drug reaction;
- *providing detailed information and support on medicine use and management;
- *promoting awareness of general health issues, e.g. diabetes, cholesterol, blood pressure; promoting medical compliance, with favourable implications for patient outcomes; providing advisory services on minor health problems to the general public.

As the most accessible part of the healthcare system, open on average six days a week, pharmacies are available to provide healthcare information and advice to members of the public without the need for an appointment or the cost of a GP visit. Community pharmacies are constantly increasing their services and are seen by the public as being very good value for money, which was identified by 86% of the public to a recent Behaviour and Attitudes survey.



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TALK TO YOUR LOCAL PHARMACY

SCHOOLS ARE BACK AND SO ARE HEAD LICE, WARN PHARMACISTS

Schools aren't the only thing that will make an unwelcome return for Irish children this month. According to pharmacists, head lice rates are set to increase as we hit the annual 'headlice season'. The Irish Pharmacy Union (IPU) has issued advice to families about how to avoid head lice.

IPU spokesperson and community pharmacist Tomás Conefrey said, "Eliminating the risks of head lice is not always possible and it is estimated that 1 in 10 children will suffer from head lice at some stage, with 80% of head lice infestations occurring in children between the ages of four and 16. However, identifying an infection early makes treating it far easier and prevents the spread of infection through the classroom or among a family."

"Headlice infections among children of school-going age (4 to

12). Therefore, our advice to parents is to check their children's hair regularly, ideally once a week.

"While some may feel there is a stigma associated with lice it really is nothing to be embarrassed about; if an infection is detected parents should seek advice as early as possible.

There is a range of treatment options available and you should speak to your pharmacist about which is the most appropriate for your child.

This is particularly important for any child suffering from asthma, allergies or have a pre-existing skin condition as they are the most likely to suffer a reaction."



Head Lice - Advice from Pharmacists:

Check children's hair for lice regularly, ideally once a week. Use a wet comb made for the purpose. Combing through wet hair makes the process easier. Good light is important.

Itching and scratching are common signs of head lice. As well as live lice, which crawl around the head, look out for nits which are tiny eggs that may look like dandruff but cannot be flicked off the hair.


Check close to the scalp, behind the ears, around the nape of the neck, top of the head and under the fringe.

Treat the hair only if live lice or unhatched eggs are present. Treat the child as soon as possible. Always ask your pharmacist for advice on the most appropriate treatment to use.

Inform the school, contacts and friends when your child has head lice. The school can then inform other parents that there is an outbreak, so everyone can check and treat their own children.

Always follow the instructions on the treatment pack and any advice given by your pharmacist. Products used to treat head lice do not prevent the infestation from occurring and should never be used "just in case".

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Pharmacists have the skills, knowledge and public support to play an enhanced role in primary healthcare, helping to deliver more efficient, more cost-effective health services.

TOP OF THE HOUSE

With up to a third of the total capacity of a house lying immediately beneath the roof, an attic conversion offers huge potential for additional living space. A new bedroom, playroom, study, a second bathroom or simply some extra storage space could be yours within weeks, and unlike adding an extension, you won't have to forsake valuable garden space in your quest for a bigger home.



As with all home projects of this scale, it is critical to seek the help of experts and professionals in dealing with matters of electricity, flooring and insulation.

As heat rises, much of it escapes through the roof of your house and so it is recommended that you insulate your attic to keep your home warm and your heating costs low. Unlike wall insulation, however, the cost of attic insulation tends to be more affordable. Methods of insulating your attic include quilted insulation and an insulation fibre, along the floor between the

ceiling joists. You should talk to the experts about what method of insulation is right for you. Remember that too much insulation can lead to no heat escaping into your attic, which in turn can lead to frozen pipes and other problems.

There are other things you might consider too, such as draught-proofing the attic hatch, insulating pipes, wrapping tanks, installing flooring, lights, skylights and much more to turn your attic into a liveable space.

Don't neglect the roof over your head

Overhanging tree branches

Check if you need to trim back any overhanging tree branches.

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Clean your chimney

Keeping your chimney clean is one of the main steps in preventing chimney fires. How often you clean your chimney depends on how much you use it. It's a good idea to have chimneys cleaned at least once a year, usually before the cold weather sets in. Getting your chimney cleaned in Autumn will clean anything that might have fallen into the chimney during the Summer.

The best way to clean your chimney is to hire a chimney sweep, as it is a really dirty job. A well-trained chimney sweep will do a much better job in half the amount of time than you can.



Local artists shortlisted for National Gallery's Zurich Portrait Prizes

Portraits by talented artists from 10 Irish counties including Wicklow go on display in the National Gallery of Ireland on 5th October.

Artists have been shortlisted for the Gallery's prestigious Zurich Portrait Prize 2019. A total of 26 artists working across a variety of creative disciplines have made it through to the final stage of the competition, which received over 300 entries. And for the first time, the work of 20 young artists, ages from 3 to 7 years old, from Dublin, Meath, Cork, Kerry and Louth, have been shortlisted for the Zurich Young Portrait Prize.

The entries from Wicklow are from Oisín McFarland Smith (Granny Annie, photograph, Kodak Portra 400 taken on Bronica ETRS), who has been shortlisted for the Zurich Portrait Prize, and six-year-old Rita Ruitong Chen (School Girl, pencil on paper), who has been shortlisted for the Zurich Young Portrait Prize.

The winner of the Zurich Portrait Prize will receive a prize of €15,000 and a commission worth €5,000 to create a new work for inclusion in the National Portrait Collection. There will also be two awards of €1,500 for highly commended works. An exhibition of the shortlisted works will open at the National Gallery of Ireland on 5 October 2019. In a new partnership, the exhibition will run at Crawford Art Gallery from January to April 2020.

Sean Rainbird, Director of the National Gallery of Ireland, said, "Through these competitions, the Gallery aims to foster an interest in contemporary portraiture amongst artists and art lovers alike. The exciting shortlists offer our visitors the chance to see incredible new work at the Gallery in the Autumn. We're also delighted to develop our important partnership with Zurich this year as we celebrate the inaugural Zurich Young Portrait Prize."

Neil Freshwater, CEO of Zurich, said, "Zurich is pleased at the high standard of the shortlisted works for the Zurich Portrait Prize 2019 at the National Gallery of Ireland. We really look forward to the shortlisted works being unveiled at the National Gallery in October before moving to the Crawford Art Gallery in Cork in 2020. Another first for this year is the inaugural Zurich Young Portrait Prize which brings a new dimension to our association with the Gallery. 


