'GROSSLY UNDER-RESOURCED'

Mental health rehabilitation services in Wicklow are 'grossly under-resourced' according to the Mental Health Commission, which says there has been a 'long-term neglect' of people with serious and enduring mental illnesses.

It goes on to assert "The short-sightedness of not providing adequate mental health rehabilitation services, from both a human rights and a financial viewpoint, is quite astounding."

Authored by the Inspector of Mental Health Services, Dr Susan Finnerty, the report - entitled 'Rehabilitation and Recovery in Irish Mental Health Services' - demonstrated a continued lack of development in mental health rehabilitation services.

"The absence of any rehabilitation team in Community Healthcare East has been a major challenge in providing rehabilitation for service users. One rehabilitation consultant post is due to be filled in Quarter 4, 2019," the report states.

"There are currently no specialist rehabilitation services in Community

Healthcare East, where there should be at least four teams. Even with the appointment of one consultant psychiatrist, the rehabilitation service for Community Healthcare East will be grossly under-resourced with one occupational therapist, one social worker and one clinical nurse specialist. There are no medium support residences to enable those in high support residences to progress to more independent living. There are, however, a total of 112 low supported places.

"A significant amount of effort has been made to provide a recovery based mental health service across Community

Healthcare East, including youth services, and there is no doubt that there is strong engagement with recovery principles among front-line staff; however, the full provision of rehabilitation services is urgently required."

The Mental Health Commission's report for the West Wicklow/Kildare area (Community Healthcare Organisation 7) also points to gaps, with the area also without an outreach team.

The report states that "There are only three rehabilitation teams in CHO 7, where there should be seven. These teams lack enough resources to provide a comprehensive service and rely heavily on high support beds. The high support residences accommodate too many people and are not in line with A Vision for Change (the government's 2006 mental health policy). Bedrooms are

shared in some cases. This is compounded by the lack of appropriate housing for service users to continue the journey to more independent living and the lack of well-developed outreach teams to support the moves.

"The teams have members who are well trained to provide a rehabilitation service and there are a number of good programmes available. These are complemented by the programmes offered by EVE (a programme within the HSE which provides support to people with mental health difficulties in employment, community education, and community activities)."

While, 'A Vision for Change', included the development of specialist rehabilitation and recovery mental health services, Dr Finnerty's report found that there has been minimum improvement in the num-

ber of rehabilitation teams over the last decade. The Mental Health action plan to address the concerns raised in the report.

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BUS CONNECTS PLAN WELCOMED BUT CHANGES STILL NEEDED

The updated Bus Connects proposals were unveiled last week, giving detailed plans for a number of revised bus routes operating in the north Wicklow area. The changes have had a mixed reaction with many welcoming the addition of a loop bus service in Bray, however, the news that a direct bus will no longer run from Bray to City Centre was met with disappointment. As indeed was the news that there will not be a direct bus to St Vincent's Hospital which is officially the hospital servicing County Wicklow.

Minister Simon Harris welcomed the publication of a 'significantly revised' Bus Connects plan. "Last year I ran three public information sessions in the County to highlight the proposed changes and encourage people to make submissions to the consultation process. I sent in a lengthy submission to the consultation process reflecting the views shared with me from constituents. In this submission I highlighted the concerns of people in Enniskerry, Blessington, Bray, Greystones, Kilcoole and particularly Kilpedder and asked the NTA to find resolutions.

"I am really pleased that the NTA has come back with a significantly changed plan taking the consultation feedback into account. It is important that we, as Wicklow residents, make sure that all the necessary changes have been made. I welcome the commitment to

a secondary consultation process for the new plan and I would strongly urge people in our county to use this as an opportunity to have their voice heard.

"This second consultation phase is vital to rectify issues like connectivity to hospitals that need to be highlighted to the NTA and I would urge people in Co Wicklow to use this forum to make their views known."

John Brady TD while welcoming most of the changes, highlighted the lack of a direct bus service to St Vincent's Hospital as a glaring example of a change that still needs to be made. "It is simply unfair to ask elderly and sick people in Wicklow to take two buses to get to their designated hospital, especially in cold and wet weather. Also, there is no direct bus to Holles Street Maternity Hospital," he said. "I first raised this issue back in 2012 when the 45 & 84 buses

stopped going down Nutley Road and while Wicklow voices have not been listened to we will continue to pressure for change. Worth noting also that back in 2017 the Sisters of Mercy who owned the St Vincent's complex were not favourable disposed to having a bus terminating on their grounds."

Many Enniskerry residents were pleased that a number of their submissions were

taken on board.

The following are the proposed Bus Connects local routes: **201** - This is a looped service every 40 minutes from Bray Station to Greystones - Kilcoole - Newtown - Kilpedder - Glenview and back to Bray; **202** - Same as **201** every 40 minutes, running all day; **211** - A service running every 20 minutes from Kilmacanogue to Dun Laoghaire, through Killarney and Boghall Road in Bray. Similar to

the current 45a route; **212** - Running every 10-15 minutes all day this service goes from Bray Station to Southern Cross via Killarney and Herbert Road; **214** - A new service running every 30 minutes, there was strong demand for this from the people of Bray. It runs from Palermo to Southern Cross via Strand Road, Putland road;

215 - Running every 60 minutes from Bray Station to Shop River Enniskerry, this route will go via the Upper Dargle Road and M11. This is a similar to the 185 but without going through Palermo.

Peak only services will operate in the form of the **301** (Kilcoole to Townsend Street via Charlesland, Greystones, Southern Cross, N11) and **302** (Newcastle to Townsend Street via Kilcoole, Charlesland, Southern Cross, Cherrywood, UCD, St Stephen's Green). Fares will simplify across bus,

Luas, and DART services. There will be two Leap fares: a 90 minute ticket that covers all bus, dart and Leap services and a short hop ticket.

Councillor Derek Mitchell (FG) said he welcomes the improvements of the revised proposals but that he still has some concerns. With the 301 and 302, Cllr Mitchell welcomed that there would be "connection to the LUAS to assist those working in Sandyford who have poor public transport. Kilpeddar/Willow Grove has now been included in the 201/202 route following much lobbying.

The 304 will provide an around Greystones service every 30 minutes.

"I have concerns that the traffic congestion from Bray Head to the station will delay the main Greystones service connecting with the main spine route, E1, to Dublin. I had wanted the main transfer to be to a bus which went on the N11. Also, people have difficulty getting on the 84x Southbound as short-distance passengers are filling it up. I will be asking for it to be a 'limited stop' south of UCD to discourage this and for bus lanes from the Southern Cross

to Bray Station."

Also commenting on proposed changes Bray Labour Party representative Ian McGahon said

"Overall these proposed changes are welcome for North Wicklow, they retain most current routes in Bray, Enniskerry, Greystones and Kilmacanogue and add some new bus routes notably in West Greystones and in Southern Cross and Bray Beach. It is really great news under these proposals that Enniskerry will not be losing any direct bus services to Shop River or to Dublin City and that Bray will have a

new round loop service taking in Palermo, Bray Beach and Southern Cross Road.

"There are some proposed changes that some people in Bray may be disappointed with such as splitting the current 145 route, a lack of direct route to St Vincent's Hospital and a lack of services to Fassaroe. We urge the public to let the NTA know of these concerns. Overall these proposals are a very positive forward step for Bray. We emphasise that these proposals are still at a consultation stage and urge the public to utilise the consultation process."

Speaking about the Government investment, Minister Simon Harris said: "I am really pleased that these two estates are now open and being occupied. Delaney Park and Heatherside estate are both fantastic new estates for Co Wicklow families.

"As a result of the economic crisis, our housing stock in Co Wicklow is no way near the levels that we need. Demand has significantly out-

stripped supply since the building industry collapsed and in recent years, Government has been pushing to get more houses built.

"These new houses are a very welcome addition to our community and I am pleased that they are just two of many ongoing build projects underway in Co Wicklow. I will continue to work to bring significant Government funding into Co Wicklow for building and development."

Speaking at the event, the Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Irene Winters, said it was one of many official openings that will take place over the coming months and years as the Council vigorously progresses its development programme under the Rebuilding Ireland banner.

She stated: "I recognise the serious challenge we face in terms of housing and a critical focus and priority has

been firmly placed on responding to this challenge by Wicklow County Council, through the development and implementation of the Social Housing supply programme."

The social housing target for Wicklow over the course of 2018-2021, Cllr Winters said, sets an ambitious task: to deliver over 1,300 additional homes under Build, Acquisition, Part V and Leasing schemes. She said "I am confident that this Council is committed, energised and mobilised to deliver on that ambition."

Regarding Delany Park, she said it was named in honour of the Olympic Gold Medallist and former Arklow resident, Ronnie Delany, and she was delighted to welcome him to the opening.

The Cathaoirleach congratulated all the new residents and wished them the best of luck in their new homes which boast an 'A' energy rating, low cost heating systems and zero emissions.

Mr Frank Curran, Chief Executive,

Wicklow County Council, joined in the welcome to Ronnie Delany who won Gold for Ireland in the 1500 metres at the Summer Olympics in Melbourne in 1956.

"It is very fitting to honour this incredible achievement of a former Arklow resident by naming this housing scheme Delany Park," he said.

The Delany Park homes, he added, were located close to the town centre within safe and easy walking distance to shops, schools and parks. The new estate had been laid out in keeping with the adjacent Meadow Vale estate to give the development a sense of an integrated community.

Mr Curran said that over the course of the next two years, the Council's programme was expected to deliver newly constructed homes for more than 400 households on the Council's social housing list.

The Council currently has 18 Local Authority projects at various stages of construction and

tendering, with funding of over €58m already sanctioned by the Department. A further 16 Schemes are under active consideration with a potential yield for a further 260 units by 2021.

The Council is also engaged with Approved Housing Bodies under the CALF and CAS schemes and with private developers who are delivering significant additional homes under Part V.

Wicklow County Council worked in partnership with the builder in developing the scheme as a 'Turnkey'. This collaborative approach to delivery is at the heart of the Council's supply programme and part of the strategy contained in Rebuilding Ireland. A further phase of 40 units has been approved by the Department.

Mr Curran thanked all involved in the provision of both developments,

including the Minister and his Department, along with the Council's own housing staff under Director of Services, Joe Lane.

Minister Murphy said the opening of the two estates in Arklow was a very important occasion with "houses built and people moving into their new homes".

He paid tribute to Ronnie Delany whom he said was a very proud Arklow man.

The Minister also praised the work of Wicklow County Council Chief Executive, Mr Frank Curran, who as Chairman of the County & City Managers Association's Housing & Building Committee, was driving the local authority housing programme nationally. Mr Murphy said 6,000 Council homes would be built this year and more than 7,000 next year.

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



'Brain injury survivors facing lottery to access services'

A lack of brain injury rehabilitation services is devastating thousands of brain injury survivors and their families across the country who are left 'merely to exist', according to Acquired Brain Injury Ireland. Co. Wicklow is currently one of the counties where there is no speech & language therapist for adult victims of acquired brain injuries from causes including stroke, road traffic accidents, falls, assaults, and brain tumours.

"Don't Save Me, Then Leave Me," was the wake-up call delivered to politicians by the national brain injury rehabilitation charity as they presented the case last week for urgent investment in regional neuro-rehabilitation services.

Barbara O'Connell, Chief Executive with Acquired Brain Injury Ireland, stressed to politicians how it's a lottery for brain injury survivors getting access to neuro-rehabilitation services which is having a detrimental impact on the lives of brain injury survivors and their families.

Acquired Brain Injury Ireland said despite more people surviving the major trauma of a brain injury, many young brain injury survivors are forced to live indefinitely in nursing

homes or community hospitals without access to any rehabilitation to aid their recovery. Additionally, many more are discharged home to families who are often unable to cope and struggling to understand the aftermath of brain injury.

According to the national brain injury charity if you have a brain injury outside Dublin, there are no specialist rehabilitation beds available regionally. This is despite the need for regional rehabilitation centres being clearly outlined in the Neuro-Rehabilitation Strategy in 2011 and confirmed again in the 2019 Neuro Rehabilitation Implementation Framework.

Acquired Brain Injury Ireland is now calling on politicians to support their proposal

to deliver Ireland's first Regional Neuro-Rehabilitation Centre and support families in crisis after brain injury. Their centre will offer specialist in-patient and out-patient rehabilitation for people with an acquired brain injury in a 25-bedded centre.

ABI Ireland say the centre will: Remove 'bed-blockers' and free up acute beds; Take brain injury survivors out of acute hospitals who don't need to be there; Free up places in the National Rehabilitation Hospital (NRH) and reduce NRH waiting list. Take people who have completed their medical rehabilitation or straight from the waiting list; Provide specialist brain injury rehabilitation that will ensure people reach their maximum potential; Reduce the burden

on families who are struggling to cope; Save money across our health services by providing timely access to rehabilitation and improving the flow of people from hospital to home.

Ms O'Connell, said: "This country cannot continue to save a life on the one hand, but then rob their quality of life on the other hand by not providing rehabilitation to brain injury survivors. Without investment in rehabilitation, our hospitals are clogged up unnecessarily by keeping brain injury survivors in acute beds that don't need to be there. Families are pushed to breaking point because of severe under-resourcing of brain injury rehabilitation. The reality is if you have a brain injury outside of Dublin, there

are no specialist beds for you."

Ms O'Connell added: "That's why we're calling on the government to support our proposal to establish a regional

neuro-rehabilitation centre. Nothing like this exists in the regions which is a major source of crisis for families stuck without a brain injury rehabilitation

pathway. Our proposal is in full alignment with the Government's Slaintecare plan. It will fill a vital rehabilitation gap for families, guiding their loved ones

with brain injury back to live in their own communities and out of high-cost care that does nothing to aid recovery after brain injury."

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WINTER CAR SERVICING

The rain and cold of winter will be upon us shortly, so it's time to get prepared. We get our homes ready for the harsh winter weather - getting the fuel in and so on - but few realise that the same rules apply to their cars. Luckily, a few simple steps, accompanied by a quick trip to a qualified garage, can make a world of difference to you and your car.






For those of us in locations characterised by heavy snow and dangerous winter roads - and that includes a lot of Co. Wicklow - your first line of protection should be a set of high quality tyres. Good deep thread tyres work by ridding themselves of snow and slush as they roll, ensuring as much direct contact between the tyre and the road as possible. Having a new set of deep thread tyres properly installed on your car will go a great distance toward helping you grip the road and keep control when conditions get rough.

When it's particularly cold, make sure your battery is fresh and strong. Cars need extra amps to get started in icy weather, and a weak battery that's been neglected all summer could come back to haunt you when you least expect it (say, for instance, late at night in the middle of a blizzard). By having your battery and charging system checked out by a professional, you might just save yourself one cold, lonely night. If in doubt, replace the battery - especially if it is over four years old. They always fail

when it's the most unsuitable time.

Did you know your car can overheat in the winter? It's true, but potential trouble can be easily avoided by having your car's vital fluids checked and replaced. More specifically, take a close look at your anti-freeze and oil, and if you can't remember the last time you had a service, now would be a good time. Keep your car's engine running smoothly by making sure that it has a fresh supply of the fluids it needs.



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And don't forget heavy snow, salt and washer solvent, dirt. Anyone who's ever driven on a heavily sanded or salted road knows how quickly a car's windshield can be coated. Keep it clean and clear with a fresh supply of washer fluid. And while you're at it, make sure your windshield wipers are new and up to the task of sweeping away all that

Last, but certainly not least, break out the bucket and sponge and give your car a thorough cleaning. A good wash and wax goes a long way towards repelling some of the salt and dirt that can easily corrode your car's exterior. And please, for your car's sake, do what you can

Top Ten Tips on Motor Servicing

- Check if the garage employs qualified mechanics, and can show that technicians are suitably qualified and/or is registered by the SIMI or equal.
- When at the premises, check for training certificates on display. If in any doubt, ask.
- Ensure that the garage is familiar with your car's make and model.
- Prior to booking your car in, consider how it's been running. Be honest - inform the service staff of any problems and/or any recent work carried out.
- Check what is included within the service - ask to see a copy of the service schedule for your vehicle type.
- Check the breakdown of costs, including all parts, consumables, labour and VAT - you should know exactly what you are paying for.
- Insist that no additional work is undertaken without your express permission. If recommended, this should be quoted against, not estimated. Ask for any replaced parts to be retained for your inspection upon collection.
- Ensure that you receive a detailed itemised report with a verbal explanation of the work undertaken and/or recommended. Ask about the garage's quality control checks and make sure your service book is stamped.
- Ensure that the name of the technician that works on your car is detailed on your invoice. Ask to speak to him or her specifically, if you have any concerns or require necessary explanations.
- Ensure that you receive a guarantee. Make sure you know what it covers, check the period of validity and identify the complaints procedure, should a query arise.

Top tips for keeping your dog safe this Halloween

Halloween and the period leading up to it can be a frightening and confusing time for many dogs. Fireworks tend to be sudden, unpredictable and bright and sadly this combination of effects can often have a profoundly negative impact on some dogs.



In fact, research carried out on behalf of Dogs Trust, found that 52% of dog owners describe their dogs as being quite or very frightened by fireworks and bangers.

If your dog is feeling scared or nervous, the charity has put together some tips you can do to help make sure your dog doesn't get too upset or injure themselves in a panic.

- Walk your dog before it gets dark to avoid fireworks and flashing lights and to make sure he is well exercised and has had a toilet break before the fireworks begin.

- Feed your dog before the fireworks begin as he may become unsettled and not want to eat during the fireworks.

- Provide a safe hiding

place - at noisy times around Halloween, make sure your dog has somewhere safe in his or her favourite room, perhaps under the table. Close the curtains, turn the lights on, and turn up the volume on your TV or radio to drown out the firework noises.

- Don't leave your dog alone outdoors during the Halloween period, scared dogs can make desperate attempts to escape and there is the danger of him being injured.

- Be extra careful when opening the door as your dog may escape; if possible, try to ensure there is another closed door between your dog and your front door.

- Never force your dog to wear a dog costume - loosely tied festive dog-

gie bandanas are usually more acceptable for dogs.

- Do not force your dog to receive any unwanted attention even from family members, as they may not recognise people in costumes.

- Make sure that your dog is wearing a collar and an ID tag and that his microchip details are up to date via fido.ie in case he escapes.

Speaking about Halloween, Head of Operations at Dogs Trust, Karla Dunne said "Halloween can unfortunately be a terrifying and confusing experience for some dogs. Dogs' hearing is approximately four times more sensitive than us humans and they can hear much higher frequency sounds than people, so you can imagine

how loud the whizz, pop and bang of fireworks can be for dogs! We are asking people to please think twice about taking their dogs 'trick or treating' as the extra excitement around the event and meeting strangers may cause them distress.

"We are also reminding people to keep treats and sweets away from your furry friends. Chocolate, raisins, grapes and the sweetener xylitol are toxic to dogs. If you suspect your dog has eaten anything he shouldn't, please call your local veterinary practice immediately and always store their out of hours' emergency number on your phone."

Although Dogs Trust does not recommend taking your dog Trick or Treating, that does not mean your dog needs to be left out of the fun. As well as keeping your dog safe, it is important to ensure that you can make the night as enjoyable as possible by keeping him distracted with treats and games. Give your dog a Kong or K9 Connectables jam packed with tasty goodies, which will help keep him busy and calm."

'Fireworks can be beautiful but devastating'

Just in time for Halloween, the Minister for Justice and Equality, Charlie Flanagan TD, together with Chief Fire Officer of the Dublin Fire Brigade, Denis Keeley, and Chief Superintendent for the DMR North Central, Patrick McMenamin, have launched a campaign to warn the public of the dangers of fireworks, including the potential for injuries and property damage as well as highlighting penalties that come with the illegal use of fireworks.

Fireworks are classed as explosives and are regulated under national and EU legislation. They can only be imported into the country under licence. They must be stored and sold in accordance with explosives law.

It is an offence to possess a firework with intent to sell or supply, without a licence; light illegal fireworks; or throw or direct a lit firework at any person or property.

Launching the campaign this afternoon, Minister Flanagan said "Most of us enjoy firework displays and we associate them with very special occasions. However, it is really important that anyone who intends to illegally purchase fireworks to mark Halloween knows

that these devices can be extremely dangerous and cause very serious injuries. I want young people and their parents in particular to be aware of the risks - fireworks may be beautiful to watch but can be devastating if handled incorrectly.

The Minister continued, "The law contains severe penalties in accordance with the dangers fireworks pose. Having unlicensed fireworks in your possession with an intent to sell or supply can result in a fine of up to 10,000 or up to five years imprisonment or both. Igniting fireworks or throwing an ignited firework at a person or property is also liable to the same severe penalties.

"Using illegal fireworks can harm not only you,

your children or your pets but your pocket and your reputation. They're just not worth the risks."

The Department of Justice and Equality is launching the annual campaign to highlight these penalties in a bid to help keep communities safe this Halloween, working together with Emergency services, that are particularly busy at this time of year to prevent injuries and the illegal importation, sale and use of fireworks.

An Garda Síochána has put in place measures to prevent and detect the sale and organised importation of fireworks in the lead-up to Halloween. Operation 'Tombola' is designed to address all aspects associated with the policing of the

Halloween period, including the prevention and detection of illegal fireworks for sale and associated public disorder and anti-social behaviour.

Fireworks with an approximate value of €2300 were seized during a search in Graiguenamanagh, Co Kilkenny during the week.

Every Halloween, the Fire Service receive a high number of callouts to bonfires and fireworks related incidents. Firefighters are urging parents not to buy illegal fireworks for their children this Halloween and instead Families are being encouraged to attend family events organised by the council, rather than illegal fireworks and bonfire displays.

'If you see a bonfire call the Gardai'

Former councillor and Garda, Brendan Thornhill, says everyone should take collective responsibility for illegal bonfires which appear at Halloween. "Bonfires are illegal, bad for the environment, draw anti-social behaviour; are dangerous and are unsightly in estates after the event," he said.

Thornhill advises people if they see stockpiling of bonfire material or the setting up of bonfires to alert the Gardai, Bray Council and local council representatives.

"Remember you the taxpayer will pay the tab for these illegalities mainly with extra burdens on the fire services. The danger of fireworks used at this time should also be borne in mind. Halloween should be enjoyed but not at the expense of persons affected by illegal activities."


The lighting of bonfires at this time are illegal under the Waste Management Act 1996 as amended by the air pollution act 1987.

Thornhill continued:

"The burning of waste includes a wide range of activities and it is important that members of the public understand that they can be prosecuted and held responsible for these bonfires."

"Wicklow County Council has advertised on the local press about this matter. Some estates in Bray have had their open spaces destroyed by these bonfires in the past and these bonfires are bad news for a Tidy Town."

"Fireworks are also illegal and also can cause injury and inconvenience to people, pets and animals if used in a dangerous fashion. People should bear in mind Health and Safety at Halloween."

Haunted Wicklow!

County Wicklow has no shortage of spooky and allegedly haunted buildings and sites. Here we take a look at a few of the main ones.

Wicklow Gaol

Wicklow's Historic Gaol has the reputation for not only being the most haunted building in Co. Wicklow but one of the most haunted buildings in the entire country. Given the gaol's brutal history of torture and death, it's not surprising. The gaol's gallows got a lot of use; the gaol was the scene of many hangings, and some prisoners were even buried on the grounds of the gaol itself after being executed. Sometimes heads were chopped off the bodies and left for a hawk to feast on. As well as the executions, diseases such as typhoid fever accounted for many more deaths in the gaol, and often the bodies of prisoners who died from typhoid were left to rot in the cell after death so as the

gailer would not become infected.

Some of the 'strange and unexplained' events over the years have included: A woman in a full length black velvet cloak with the hood up seen walking towards the two rooms at ground level; A smell of roses or at other times bad smells sometimes emanate from Cell 5; green mist floating around the main floor; On the top floor some visitors have reported seeing or hearing children crying.

Bel Air Hotel

One of Ireland's oldest hotels, The Bel Air Hotel in Ashford has spooked its share of guests over the years. Like Wicklow Gaol it has attracted paranormal investigators and ghost hunters to stay there, and it hasn't disappoint-

ed them.

Apparitions people have claimed to see over the years have included a housekeeper with a limp roaming the halls and moving up and down the staircase, or sitting on the edge of beds, while other reported ghostly activity has included events such as curtains opening by themselves, and guests seeing orbs or light or feeling a physical presence.

Hellfire Club

Close to the Dublin/Wicklow border, the Hellfire Club, or Montpellier Hill, has long been associated with the supernatural, entwined with tales of the occult and demonic manifestations. Now just the ruins of a lodge, it was once a meeting place in the early 18th century for members of

the Irish Hell Fire Club, an infamous group known for their debauchery, and rumoured to be satanists and practitioners of black magic who sacrificed cats at black masses. One of the most famous folk tales is that the Devil himself has appeared there.


Arklow's Drummer Boy

One of Arklow's most well known ghostly tales is that of the ghost of a young drummer boy that appears to carry out unfinished business. It's said that when he was alive the boy was tasked with banging a drum to sound the alarm when the English garrison at the old Ormonde Castle was about to be stormed, but that he fell asleep on the job. As a punishment, he was locked away in the castle but was forgotten about, and died from starvation or suffocation.

Legend goes that the boy's ghost now appears at the old Ormonde Castle to fulfill the duty that he failed in when alive.

Glendalough's lady in red

According to Glendalough.connect.ie, "Perhaps the most famous legend of St. Kevin is the one about Kathleen of the 'eyes of

most unholy blue'. She is said to have pursued the handsome Kevin in a bid to captivate him, ignoring the fact that he was bound by holy vows. He became annoyed and repulsed by her by beating her with a bunch of nettles. She later sought his forgiveness and is said to have become a very holy woman, noted for her grate sanctity."

It's been said that the ghostly figure of a woman in a red dress said to be Kathleen has shown up in tourists' photos taken in Glendalough's Monastic City over the years.

Lover's Leap

According to Paranormal Database, the Lover's Leap rock in the Dargle Valley is the site of a recurring ghostly manifestation. On 23rd June each year, a female ghost is said to appear and jump off the rock. The tale goes that

Small Capital Grants Scheme for Social Enterprises

A €1 million Small Capital Grants Scheme for social enterprises throughout Ireland was announced last week.

The scheme, which is funded by the Dormant Accounts Fund, will provide grants of between €2,000 and €15,000 for equipment, repairs or refurbishments which will enable social enterprises to improve their service.

The scheme is an initiative under the National Social Enterprise Policy for Ireland 2018-2022, which the Minister published in July, and will be administered through the Local Development Companies.

Announcing the scheme, Minister for Rural and Community Development Michael Ring said "The new small capital grants scheme will support over 100 social enterprises through funding of 1 million from the Dormant Accounts Fund. It will provide grants of between €2,000 and €15,000 to enable social enterprises to make small equipment purchases, or to carry out refurbishments to their premises to help them to improve their service delivery. The scheme will be of particular interest to smaller or start-up social enterprises which do not necessarily have the capacity to compete for larger grants."

Hopping on buses and trains to the four corners of Ireland, O'Brien endured all weather from the warmest days of summer to driving winter rains in search of

his subjects. Some are highly localised, some extremely shy. They include top predators of day and night; migrants who cross continents to be here; sea-going pirates; underhanded nest parasites; songsters of the high mountains; and ingenious forest dwellers.

Ireland Through Birds, published October 25th, takes the reader on an ornithological adventure around Ireland in search of twelve of our rarest and most elusive birds.





Along the journey the author explores every kind of landscape and habitat our island has to offer across all four seasons, from the remote isles of Donegal to the rugged mountains of Kerry and urban parks of Dublin. Through it all, O'Brien is enchanted by calling corn-crakes, mesmerised by hunting harriers, and chased by angry skuas. It's a journey through a staggering array of landscapes that'll bring the reader face to face with the rich history and stunning wildlife to be savoured right on our doorstep. It explores the stories of the remarkable birds that live here: the genius of the jay, the sublime mimicry of the cuckoo, the nocturnal

prowess of the barn owl, while paying a moving, poetic tribute to our natural heritage - and warning about the threats that face it. Ireland Through Birds is a unique blend of natural history and travelogue, making it a great read for anyone with an interest in Ireland's natural world. (PB) RRP €16.95/£14.99)
