## ONLY FOUR GARDAI IN DRUG UNIT

At a time when there's a surge in drug offences in County Wicklow new figures reveal a significant reduction in the number of Gardaí assigned to the Wicklow divisional drugs unit. There are now just four Gardaí working in the unit.

The figures were released to Fianna Fail after the Party raised a question in the Dáil regarding the number of Gardaí assigned to each divisional drug unit in 2011, 2017, 2018 and to date in 2019. In Wicklow in 2011 there was a total of 11 Gardaí in the unit, this dropped to 3 in 2012, and now in 2019 there are just 4. Neighbouring counties Wexford and Kildare each have 9 gardai in their drugs unit.

In the last year there has been a 57% increase in crimes relating to drug sales and supply in the Wicklow Garda Division.

"The number of Gardaí

attached to the drug unit in Wicklow has continued to remain critically low despite accelerated Garda recruitment and a surge in drug related crime," Pat Casey TD said.

"These cuts are unacceptable particularly when we see high levels of drug crime continuing and also see how the rapid increase in drug use is damaging communities in every village and town in Wicklow.

"In response to our question, the Minister has said he has been informed by the Commissioner that the additional resources coming on stream have enabled him to assign

resources to Specialist Bureaus such as the Garda National Drugs and Organised Crime Bureau for next year.

"Extra resources are badly needed in these divisions and not reductions like we have been seeing over the past few years. Garda drugs units are mainly detectives and undercover Gardaí assigned to deal with illicit drugs, movements and seizures."

Responding to the figures last week, Stephen Donnelly TD said that an increase in drug crime outside Dublin is proof that Wicklow needs more Gardaí.

Deputy Donnelly explained, "The number of drugs offences recorded in the first half of this year at 10,900 is 20% higher than the first six months of last year. What this says to me is that it's becoming more important than ever to have a visible Garda presence on the street. We know that this would act as a deterrent and help reverse this upward trend."

"I was so worried about the rise in crime rates in Wicklow that I held a public meeting on the issue in Bray in September. That night, I called on the Government to dramatically increase the number of Gardaí on our streets.

"We're lucky to have such dedicated and hard-working Gardaí in Wicklow. Unfortunately, their numbers and resources have been depleted in recent years. So, despite their hard

work, crime figures have been on the rise here. I have written directly to the Garda Commissioner to explain the urgency for our county to get more Gardaí and I will keep the pressure on until he starts listening," concluded Donnelly.

Responding to Fianna Fail's Parliamentary Question, Minister for Justice Charlie Flanagan said "The Garda Commissioner is statutorily responsible for the management of An Garda Síochána, including personnel matters and deployment of resources. As Minister, I have no responsibility for these matters. Garda management keeps the distribution of resources under continual review in the context of crime trends and policing priorities so as to ensure that the optimum use is made of resources."

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## Wicklow Dementia Support needs volunteers

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# First phase of development at old Dell site approved

An Bord Pleanála has granted permission for the first phase of a development at the old Dell site in Bray. The initial phase will consist of construction of a four storey 205 bedroom nursing home with resident and staff facilities, a plant area at roof level, totalling a gross floor area of over 10,000 sq ft. The proposal includes internal courtyards and terrace areas, and adjacent landscaped amenity space. The development also includes a four-storey office building, with a ground floor café. Vehicular access will be from the existing entrance at Vevay Road.

An Bord Pleanála ruled that having regard to the nature design, scale of the proposed development, the location of the site on lands zoned mixed use, in an area well served by public transport and close to services and amenities, it

is considered that subject to compliance with conditions, the proposed development would not seriously injure the residential or visual amenity of the area or property in the vicinity. They say the development would respect the existing char-

acter of the area, be acceptable in terms of traffic and pedestrian safety and would constitute an appropriate form of development at this location.

It is expected that a further planning application will seek to build

residential units of the rest of the site.

Councillor Steven Matthews (GP) told *Wicklow Times* that he had submitted an amendment to ensure that overlooking is minimised.

He said, "The local area plan proposed four storey development throughout this site. I submitted an amendment that was agreed by council that 4 storey would be limited to the south and west of the site, with heights to the north and east being more consistent with existing residential, protecting views of Bray Head and minimising overlooking of existing residents."

"In this application the Council planners called into question whether the proposal adequately addressed my amendment and sought further information and suggested a redesign which

would include reduction in heights to the north and east.

"The developer responded by reducing heights to 3 storey at these points and I think this is a better outcome."

"I fully support higher density and mixed use development and it is something we are going to see more of in future throughout Bray and other parts of Wicklow. It is of vital importance that these developments are well designed, considerate of existing amenity and provide proper well

managed public open spaces for amenity."

Deputy Stephen Donnelly (FF) said he is very happy that a slightly altered version of the new design has been accepted by the planning authority.

Deputy Donnelly added, "The latest plans will see a mix of residential and commercial properties erected. Part will be designated for a nursing home and part will be used as an office block. Some locals had been worried that the planned 4 storeys would

overlook their homes and restrict their views of Bray Head. Amendments were submitted to An Bord Pleanála and the new design will now stretch to only 3 storeys in the north and east of the site.

"In my role as Health Spokesperson I can personally say I'm very relieved to see a brand-new nursing home coming into the area. My party has recently exposed serious delays in the project to upgrade existing nursing homes to acceptable standards. In

fact, almost one third of projects announced in 2016 have missed their completion date. It is absolutely essential we provide high quality accommodation for people at every stage in their life. We know many prefer to remain in their own home, but when that isn't an option we absolutely have to provide top notch alternatives. We already have many fine nursing homes in Wicklow, hopefully this new nursing home will be prove to be a great addition", concluded Donnelly.

# COPD Support Ireland Bray Support Group to Host Information Point

To mark World COPD Day 2019, COPD Support Ireland's Bray Support Group is to host an Information Point at Tesco Shopping Centre, Vevay Road, Bray, on Wednesday November 20th from 10am to 1pm.

COPD, or Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease, is a lung condition that makes it hard for people to breathe due to obstruction of the airways and incorporates two well-known conditions - emphysema and chronic bronchitis. 883 people from Wicklow Hospitalised due to COPD between 2016 and 2018.

COPD Support Ireland is the national umbrella body for COPD support groups nationwide and works to raise awareness of the condition, to advocate on behalf of patients and their families, to enable peer support and self-management, and to support research and educational initiatives.

Representatives from the Bray Support Group will be on hand to provide information on the condition and general health and well-being advice, as well as point to the resources available locally, including peer support meetings, information talks and exercise programmes. COPD Support Ireland is supported in its awareness activities for World COPD Day 2019 by A Menarini, GSK and Novartis.

Smoking is the most common cause of COPD but prolonged exposure to environmental toxins, fumes and dust, is also a risk factor. According to most recent information from the Department of Health, it is estimated that almost half a million people aged 40 years and over in Ireland have COPD, of whom over 200,000 have moderate or severe disease and only half are likely to be diagnosed. COPD is the most common disease-specific cause of emergency hospital admission among adults with Ireland having the highest hospitalisation rate for COPD of all OECD countries in 2015, the last year for which international data is available.

For Prof. JJ Gilmartin, Consultant Respiratory Physician and Chair of COPD Support Ireland, it is important to get the message out that COPD can be managed and treated effectively, especially if caught early:

"My advice to anyone who has a persistent cough with phlegm, shortness of breath, and recurrent winter bronchitis, is to visit their GP. I would also encourage people who are over 35 years, who are current or former smokers, or who have a family history of lung conditions to talk their doctor too. If appropriate, your GP can organise a spirometry test. This is a very simple procedure where the patient simply blows into a device to determine if they have COPD. The key thing to remember with COPD is that the earlier it is caught, the better. It means that we can make sure that a person receives the appropriate treatment and care, and have a much better outcome. Put simply, you will be able to live your life better, for longer. This World COPD Day, I would encourage people to take a moment to say hello to the members of the Bray Support Group at their information point. It could make a real difference to your life, or to that of someone you love."

### Top Tips - How to Live Better with COPD:

1. Early diagnosis is key. This is the first step to living better with COPD. If you are experiencing symptoms such as persistent cough, wheeze, phlegm and difficulty breathing, talk to your GP.
2. Know your COPD. Get to know your symptoms, monitor them and watch out for things that can trigger flare-ups. For example, avoiding smoky environments, dust, smog, foggy weather and high pollen, can help keep flare-ups at bay.
3. If you smoke, stop. This is the most important thing that you can do to help your lungs. Support is available through the National Smokers Quitline on 1800 201 203 or at [www.quit.ie](http://www.quit.ie). Talk to your GP or pharmacist for advice on nicotine replacement therapy or other medications that can help.
4. Shake a leg. Exercise, done in a structured, safe and controlled way, is one of the best ways to improve breathlessness. It helps to strengthen muscles, promotes good sleep and contributes to an improved feeling of well-being. Join a local COPD Support Ireland exercise class near you - visit [www.copd.ie](http://www.copd.ie) for details.

5. Eat well. A balanced diet provides the energy needed to breathe, promotes a strong immune system to help fight infections and helps maintain a healthy weight.

6. Know your medicines. Make sure you are familiar with how they work and how and when to take them. Have your inhaler technique checked regularly and make sure you have enough of your medicines so you don't run out.

7. Breathe easier. Use controlled breathing techniques and chest clearance to help get rid of phlegm and aid relaxation.

8. Get vaccinated. People with COPD are more at risk of catching the 'flu and pneumonia - both of which can be very serious and affect your breathing. Seek advice from your healthcare professional.

9. Mind your head, as well as your lungs. The demands of living with COPD can lead to feelings of stress, anxiety and depression. It is important to recognise these responses and seek help in finding ways to cope with the mental as well as the physical challenges of COPD.

People who have questions about how best to manage COPD, and who wish to speak to a specialist respiratory nurse for information and advice, can telephone the national COPD Advice Line on Freefone 1800 83 21 46. This is a call-back service and an appointment will be made for a nurse to return the call at a convenient time. The line is open Monday to Friday, from 9am to 5pm.

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# Sudbury School 'falling through the cracks' with no access to educational buildings

Ireland's first democratic school for self-directed learning, Wicklow Sudbury School, says it is "falling through the cracks". The school has just started its fourth year, but is without a permanent building, and will hold a public meeting this week seeking a solution.

For the past two years, the school was located in a house in Kilpedder, but the property was sold at the end of last school year. The school community has searched exhaustively for another suitable property and have found two educational buildings that they say would be suitable in the short to mid-term, Ravenswell and Colaiste Raithin in Bray, but the school says it has run into difficulties due to the Department of Education's lien on educational buildings.

Wicklow Sudbury claims that the owners of these properties have expressed that they would be happy for Wicklow Sudbury to occupy their buildings, however Wicklow Sudbury says that the Department of Education will not release either of the properties, even for just one year. "The result is that two suitable, educationally zoned buildings are sitting empty," Wicklow Sudbury School says. "Both are apparently being held for a local secondary school."

Wicklow Sudbury is currently being held in a community centre for three days, a yoga studio for one day, and parents have volunteered their houses for one day per week. The school says that this arrangement "severely limits the activities the school can do and prevents its students from settling into their learning space. Wicklow Sudbury has been in touch with local Councillors and TDs, who have shown great support and have submitted Parliamentary Questions to the Minister of Education on the school's behalf. The Department has responded by saying that the school is not in their remit. Wicklow Sudbury has received a similar response from the office of the Minister for Children and Youth Affairs.

"Wicklow Sudbury is a registered independent school and has been approved and endorsed by the child welfare agency TUSLA. There is clearly an appetite for change to Ireland's educational system, evidenced by the recent review of the leaving cert and by studies like 'So How Was School Today?'"

Wicklow Sudbury will hold a public meeting in the Glenview Hotel at 7pm on Thursday 7th

November. The meeting is for families (current and future), friends, and supporters of the school, to come together and contribute their collective knowledge and experience to help Wicklow Sudbury find a home.

"We know what needs to be done, and every small contribution of time and effort will help us get to where we want to go," said staff member Ciara Brehony.

"We have a big vision for our little school, a vision that is outward reaching and inclusive, that can offer a solution to the almost 100 families (and growing) that are on our waiting list who are looking for an alternative, but also that can help change the landscape of education in Ireland for many more than just our students.

"If you believe Irish children deserve to have a choice, deserve a positive, nourishing, healing educational experience, if you are inspired by what Wicklow Sudbury is doing, then please come along to see how you can help. Ireland cannot afford to let schools like Wicklow Sudbury fall through the cracks."

Sudbury Schools follow the philosophy of 'self-directed learning, responsibility, freedom and age-mixing', with no fixed curriculum, homework or schedules. Staff serve as 'facilitators' rather than traditional teachers, and practice 'non-interference as much as possible'. Children aged from 5 to 18 can attend the school and are mixed together with no grade/class levels.

It is a not-for-profit organisation and registered charity, and receives no State funding. It's a fee-paying school with fees going towards the running of the school (rent, staff pay, utilities, etc.). Fees are on a sliding scale based on an income assessment. The annual tuition fee for one child is 12% of the Gross Household Income. If the GHI is €20,000 or below then the fee is €2,400 for one child, and some families may qualify for subsidies if payment of the minimum fee isn't possible.

On its website, the school states its core principles: "Wicklow Sudbury School is a place where children can play and learn by following their passions and interests, where there are no compulsory classes and

no set curriculum. At our school equal importance will be given to all activities and interests. Practical skills, the Arts and Academics are held equally.

"Wicklow Sudbury School will be a comfort-

able, safe place for children to learn, play and explore. The school will have a democratic structure with each child and each staff member having an equal vote in decision making and in the creation of the rules and regulations of the school."

The school says it is inspired by the Sudbury Valley School set up in Massachusetts in 1968.

Since then over 50 Sudbury model schools have been set up around the world. Basics subjects like reading, writing, and maths are learned 'when the child is ready and willing', and if students wish to sit the Leaving Cert then this will be facilitated. The school says that 80% of Sudbury graduates get into the college of their first choice.

# Funding boost for social enterprises in Bray and North Wicklow

## Megazyme leads the world on measurement of lactose

A team of scientists from Megazyme, headquartered in Bray, has developed a new analytical test "K-LOLAC Enzymatic Low Lactose Assay" that offers a rapid, novel, and sequential measurement of free glucose and lactose in conventional, low-lactose and lactose-free dairy products.

The global accreditation body, Association of Official Analytical Chemists (AOAC) International approved LOLAC for Official Methods of Analysis First Action during a meeting of the AOAC INTERNATIONAL Expert Review Panel for the Stakeholder Panel on Infant formula and Adult Nutritionals (SPI-FAN) Nutrient Methods in Denver last month.

Lactose Intolerance is a condition that affects almost 70% of the population of the world. Though only 15% of Northern Europeans suffer, it affects close to 100% of the population in parts of Asia and Africa.

Lactose, the most abundant sugar in dairy products, is normally hydrolysed during digestion by the enzyme lactose-phlorizin hydrolase. Any person deficient in this enzyme can experience gastrointestinal symptoms. LOLAC promotes public health by allowing greater precision in measuring the remaining lactose.

The global accreditation body AOAC recently asked analytical scientists around the world to propose methods for the measurement of lactose in lactose-free products.

LOLAC, presented to the AOAC Expert Review Team Panel by R. Ivory, E. Delaney, D. Mangan and B. V. McCleary of Megazyme, was launched in October 2017 as the result of a major R&D investment over the previous 18 months. Five other methods were also put forward from companies across the world. The Expert Review Panel of AOAC recommended that

of the six methods submitted, only Megazyme's LOLAC procedure was currently suitable to progress to AOAC Official Method First Action Status. This now triggers an interlaboratory validation study which will take place in a number of countries around the world over the next few months and hopefully pave the way for LOLAC to achieve AOAC Official Method Final Action Status. This is Megazyme's 11th validated method from AOAC with research ongoing with other products.

"This is a major step forward for the team, as a key element of the method being accepted globally is AOAC validation" said Barry McCleary, CEO and Founder of Megazyme.

"International customers from 25 countries have already driven sales of LOLAC and Megazyme is confident that this latest AOAC recognition will further position LOLAC as the number one global analytical method for the measurement of lactose in lactose-free products," he added.

Megazyme has recently launched new test kits for the measurement of available carbohydrates and digestible starch to help address the global obesity and Type II diabetes challenge. Additional new products to be scheduled in 2019 include assay kits for the measurement of phosphate, for water quality analysis, and histamine to accurately identify fish spoilage.



# Council seeks funding for Arklow Transport Study

Wicklow County Council has made an application for funding to the National Transport Authority to carry out an Arklow Transportation Study.

John Brady TD welcomed the news and said that two key areas need to be included in the study - the need to develop a slip road on and off the M11 to the Vale Road, and the development of a new port access road.

Deputy Brady said "I welcome the fact that an application for funding to carry out a transportation study in Arklow has been made. Arklow is a fantastic town with massive amounts of potential that needs to be unlocked. Unfortunately, traffic in the town is still a major problem and it needs to be addressed to ensure that the town's potential can be fully unlocked. I met the CEO of Wicklow County Council Frank Curran last year and I asked him to look at having a study carried out, so I'm delighted that action is now finally being taken to have a study carried out, so measures can be put in place to address the problem that is having a

negative impact on the development of the town. "I believe that key to addressing the traffic problem would be the construction of a new slip road on and off the M11 to the Vale Road. Currently people travelling to Woodenbridge or Aughrim must come through Arklow. This is unnecessarily bringing cars into the town and adding to the congestion. It's unbelievable that this slip road wasn't constructed in the 1990's when the Arklow Bypass was being constructed." Deputy Brady continued "There are also a con-

siderable number of new houses under construction on the Vale Road, and more large planning applications are due to be submitted soon. Its critically important that the right infrastructure is in place. One of the most logical things to address the issue of traffic is to construct the new slip road to take cars out of Arklow. This was one of the main proposals in my Unlocking Arklow's Potential document which was published last year. Earlier in the year Sinn Féin launched a campaign for the development of this vital slip road and several thousand people signed a petition looking for its development too.

"I also believe that the construction of a port access road to Arklow harbour should also be explored. This would allow for the removal of heavy goods vehicles from the town centre and allow the harbour area to develop.

"When I published my Unlocking Arklow's Potential document I contacted the Minister for Transport and asked him about funding for the construction of the slip road. The Minister informed me that no application for funding has been forthcoming from the local authority for the project and that a feasibility study should first be carried out."

Deputy Brady concluded "The council is currently engaging with the NTA to secure the necessary funding allocation to carry out the study. In the meantime, the Roads Directorate is preparing a brief for consultants to carry out the transportation study. I have also been in contact with the NTA in support of the application which I hope is considered favourably. However, the council must give priority to carrying the study out with or without the funding from the NTA."

## Climate Action Charter introduced for all Local Authorities

The Minister for Communications, Climate Action and Environment Richard Bruton, T.D., and the Minister of State Sean Canney T.D. last week signed a Charter with all 34 Local Authorities, committing local government to driving forward meaningful climate action in their communities, through the actions set out in the Climate Action Plan.

Minister Bruton said "The public sector leading by example is a central pillar of the Climate Action Plan. I am determined that government, both at central and local level, will lead the way in our response to the climate challenge."

The Climate Action Plan, published earlier this year, is the government's plan to ensure we meet our 2030 climate commitments, putting us on a trajectory to be net-zero emissions by 2050. The Charter being signed today is a key action in the Plan and will ensure every local authority embeds decarbonisation, sustainable development and climate resilience into every aspect of the work they do.

Minister Bruton said "Local Authorities are uniquely placed to drive forward effective climate action at both the regional and local level. Given their pivotal role across the key sectors of planning, housing, transport and waste and their close relationship with the community, they have a crucial role in implementing the step change that is needed and influencing many more to address this challenge."

Minister of State Canney said "The key to achieving our Climate Action targets is to bring everyone with us. Local authorities are a focal point for our communities, villages, towns and cities and their support for this charter reflects the whole of society approach we need to take to transform our economy from brown to green."

The Charter commits Local Authorities to several actions that will ensure that they play a key leadership role locally and nationally in delivering effective climate action. Among other commitments, all local authorities will: Put in place a process for carbon proofing major decisions, programmes and projects on a systematic basis, including investments in transport and energy infrastructure; Deliver a 50% improvement in energy efficiency by 2030; Ensure all suppliers provide information on their carbon footprint and steps they plan to reduce its impact; Build local citizen engagement, particularly with young people; Partner & collaborate on climate action initiatives with local community groups, local enterprise and local schools and higher level institutions; Monitor, evaluate and report annually on the implementation of activities under the Charter.

Minister Bruton said "Last year's emissions figures show that we do not have time to waste. We must drive forward the actions in the Climate Action Plan. Only through consistent, sustained action, can we deliver the step change that is needed."

Minister of State Canney said "The local authorities through their various roles, including spatial planning, forward planning and engagement with communities through the Local Community Development Committees (LCDCs) and the Public Participation Networks (PPNs) are ideally placed to help deliver effective Climate Action in our communities."

Welcoming the adoption of the Charter, Michael Walsh, Chair of the County and City Management Association (CCMA) and Chief Executive of Waterford City and County Council, said: "Local authorities have huge ambitions for what we can achieve in the area of climate action. We are already making significant progress; councils around the country are cutting the carbon footprint of our internal operations, making our housing stock more energy efficient, prioritising climate considerations in development planning and actively engaging our communities on climate issues. With support from central government we can do even more and provide the on-the-ground leadership needed to make Ireland a global leader in climate action. The Local Authority Climate Action Charter is the blueprint for future progress in creating an Ireland that is sustainable for future generations, and councils around the country are ready to take the lead in this vital work."

The Green Party welcomed the announcement but says that local authorities are not prepared nor resourced for the challenges that climate change and biodiversity loss will present.

Green Party Spokesperson for Local Government, Cllr Malcolm Noonan, said "We warmly welcome this commitment by the City and County Managers Association (CCMA) towards addressing the climate and biodiversity crisis but we remain deeply concerned that local government is simply not fit for purpose to deliver and inspire the change required."

He said that the charter makes no reference to the biodiversity emergency and that including the line 'in so far as is practicable' with reference to measures to reducing carbon emissions, is a get out clause from making difficult decisions.

"Ultimately we have a serious governance and resourcing issue to making this charter a reality. We have the most centralised and underfunded local government system in Europe. Politically it is clientelist in structure and the skills do not exist within local authorities to build participative democracy and support young people in particular to be agents of change," he said.

# Harris publishes first Climate Change Adaptation Plan for health sector

Minister for Health Simon Harris TD has published the first Climate Change Adaptation Plan for the health sector (2019 - 2024).

The plan was developed by a joint Department-HSE team of officials and doctors following a public consultation. The plan identified six main climate scenarios with the most profound health implications. Two of the six scenarios relate to slow onset climate effects over time (UV radiation and air pollution) and four scenarios concern acute, severe weather events (windstorms, extreme heat and heatwaves, high precipitation and flooding, and extreme cold snaps).

Following the publication of the plan, Minister Harris said: "Without decisive adaptation action, climate change will have profound impacts on the health and well-being of our people, on the smooth delivery of our health and social care services, and on our critical infrastructure."

"Crucially, the health effects of climate change will be felt particularly by our most vulnerable citizens, including the elderly, children, those with pre-existing conditions, the urban poor, farmers and those living in coastal areas."

"Clearly, many of the negative health impacts of climate change originate in other sectors, and continuing strong cross-government collaboration will be required to effectively address these."

The Minister announced a Climate Change Oversight Group will be established for the health sector. Its role will be to drive and oversee implementation of the plan; will closely collaborate with relevant stakeholders in the health sector; and will monitor and review progress, including any unintended consequences that may arise.

Minister Harris added: "I am establishing a Climate Change Oversight Group for the health sector, led by the Department of Health. This new group will oversee implementation of the actions set out in the plan, and will adopt an inclusive and collaborative approach to addressing the health impacts of climate change."

# 'Urgent transport plan needed for Greystones District'

Social Democrats Councillor for Greystones Jennifer Whitmore has called for Wicklow County Council to develop a Transport Plan for the Greystones Municipal District. Cllr Whitmore says a 'real-life' representation of the traffic and public transport patterns for residents is urgently required to enable the sustainable development of the area, and to ensure that whatever new housing is being built is met with sufficient transport infrastructure.

Cllr Whitmore said "For years now, residents in the Greystones District have had to suffer from public transport and road infrastructure that cannot meet the demand placed on it by residents commuting on a daily basis. As a public representative for the area, I have raised this issue repeatedly with the National Transport Authority (NTA), Dublin Bus, Bus Eireann and Irish Rail. The response has always been the same - that there has been a lack of Government investment in public transport but that investment is planned for the future. However, this funding never seems to materialise, despite the many promises over the years.

"In fact, in the last couple of weeks, the NTA has admitted that even if an order for new carriages was placed today, it would be at least 4 years before they were available to be used because of manufacturing lead-in times.

This information should be used to inform planning decisions and the next round of the local area plans to ensure that we have sustainable development of the district. I got full support from my Councillor colleagues for the motion, and I hope that the proposal is met favourably by the officials in Wicklow County Council. I will certainly continue to push for this critical issue."

# 'Wicklow commuter misery to continue as old plans re-announced'

Fianna Fáil TD Pat Casey says there is nothing new in the announcement from the Minister for Transport last week regarding new rail carriages.

Minister for Transport Shane Ross announced in a press conference last week that the Government is ordering an extra 41 rail carriages at a cost of €150 million. However, they are not expected to be fully in use until mid-2022.

Deputy Casey commented, "Yesterday's press conference is largely another media engagement to announce what we already have heard before from the Minister for Transport regarding rail capacity. The earliest these 41 rail carriages will be delivered is in two years' time. That's assuming they are ordered in the coming days.

"The urgent expansion of the rail fleet is needed particularly in Wicklow. The services are overcrowded and approaching dangerous levels. Safety rather than comfort is now a real concern for Wicklow commuters.

"The Minister must immediately outline contingency plans he intends to put in place to accommodate Wicklow commuters while these new carriages are on order. He cannot tell people to wait two years while demand outstrips capacity at an increasing rate."

"The Minister's suggestion to stagger journey times, and proposals to introduce pre-booked only services are an insult to hard working and long-suffering commuters.

"We need less photo calls from Minister Ross and more hands on and proactive actions to deal with today's problems. Running our public transport system on the never never is no longer a viable possibility. We cannot allow this capacity crisis to continue without credible contingency plans to facilitate commuters in Wicklow," concluded Deputy Casey.

# Calls for 'dedicated transport police' to tackle anti-social behaviour on trains

Fianna Fáil TD Stephen Donnelly has said that a 'zero tolerance' approach is needed to deal with anti-social behaviour on trains, and has called for the establishment of a 'dedicated transport police'.

Deputy Donnelly explained, "Commuters travelling to or from our stations in Bray and Greystones need to know that they will be safe on their journey. They are entitled to travel in peace and comfort without being annoyed, threatened or sometimes even disgusted by the conduct of fellow passengers. I had a woman in my office tell me that a group of young men were urinating into bottles on her recent trip from Greystones into Dublin.

"Fianna Fáil got a breakdown of the stats from the Transport Minister which showed that there have been 785 incidents of anti-social behaviour on Irish trains so far this year - that's a rise from 572 in 2018 and a 14 percent increase on 2017. Now this shows a trend. It's clear that there's more anti-social behaviour happening than ever before.

"I believe what's necessary now is a dedicated transport police to tackle the problem. We need to crack down on the culprits to send a strong signal that it will no longer be tolerated", concluded Donnelly.

From Kilmacanogue, 22-year-old Linnane spent his 2019 season competing in the Irish Supercar Championship powered by Pirelli, where he took a brace of wins on his way to narrowly missing out on the title following the final 3 rounds of the series which took place at Brands Hatch last weekend.

Like many aspiring Irish racers, Linnane spent his formative years in Ginetta Juniors before stepping up to single seater racing in the Formula Sheane class. It was competing in this class that Linnane won the Bob Parks Memorial trophy which he ranks as

one of his best achievements to date. This was followed by a move back to saloon racing and the Supercar class where Linnane has raced since, where he has become a regular frontrunner.

When he's not racing, Charlie works full time in the family car dealership, John Linnane Motors, as a sales executive. John Linnane Motors are also one of Charlie's main sponsors along with Corcoran Crash Repairs. In the future, Charlie would love to race abroad, potentially in an endurance series or make a return to single seaters and build on his Formula Sheane experience.

A run at Gary Corcoran out of Clearways annexed second and immediately afterwards he sliced down the inside of champion elect Philip Jones into Paddock Hill corner to take the lead- and subsequently the win.

Cameron Fenton said "It was an amazing experience to race on the famous Brands Hatch Indy Circuit both in very wet and dry weather. It is great to be able to step into such a high powered car after a full year and take another 2 first place trophies ahead of the 2019 class regulars. A big congratulations goes out to Philip Jones who took the 2019 Irish Supercar championship on Sunday.

# Wicklow artist goes from movie sets to the national stage showcasing at Art Source

Kathrina Shine is a former draughtsperson, actor, set designer and award-winning short film producer who has worked with Morgan Freeman, Ben Kingsley, Pierce Brosnan, Brendan Gleeson, and Joanna Lumley.

She received the best short film award at the Belfast Film Festival in 2001 and her productions have been screened at 55 such festivals.

A storyteller and proponent of the impasto technique of painting, Kathrina creates vibrant narratives with knives, inks, strokes, semi-collages, and sometimes a liberal application of paint.

She has created an innovative way to wear her art well, and will display her fashionable work on trendy t-shirts, hoodies, dresses and leggings at Art Source.

The Wicklow Town resident returned to painting after shelving it for various careers as an architectural draftsman, actor, set designer and film producer.

Having fully embraced her artistic talent, she has staged five acclaimed exhibitions and her work can be found in the Office of Public Works (OPW) national collection and private collections around the world.

"I started off as an architectural draftsman, but quickly realised that the construction industry in the 1980s was no place for a woman," she said.

"I decided to pursue acting in Scotland and London before returning to Ireland where film making was really taking off.

"I constantly upskilled on film sets with Screen Training Ireland, learning from very high standard professionals, so I was eventually able to start my own production company with a varied skill set.

"It was hard. I was a single mother who had to work weeks away and I was only able to do it because of an amazing network of school mums and dads who used to help by minding and including my children for me."

It was during those years she worked with Freeman, Kingsley, Brosnan, Gleeson, and Lumley and won the Jury award best short film at the Belfast Film Festival with Petrol Country Blues.

As with her career, her art style is constantly changing and Kathrina has been described by critics as an abstract expressionist.

"I paint first and then I understand what I have

Painted. I never know exactly what's going to come out onto the canvas. What I do is very organic, and I follow my interest rather than anyone's rules.

"In my clothing range, I digitise the art and print on the t-shirts and hoodies. Then on other pieces, I stretch the work and tile it as a textile design."

The largest collection of Banksy's work exhibited on public show in Ireland is also set to feature at Art Source.

Gormleys Fine Art will be showing 12 screen prints by the anonymous

UK-based artist and political activist whose original piece Devolved Parliament recently sold for €10.9m.

Over 15,000 people are expected to attend the year's biggest and most exciting art show which will feature 200 of the best contemporary Irish and international artists and galleries.

Irish art lovers also have the unique chance to get their hands on 100 pieces of original artwork for €100 each on a first-come, first-served basis on the opening morning of the show on Friday,

For this purpose, the Planning Authority will prepare an Environmental Report of the likely significant effects on the environment of implementing the new Plan and the provisions of Articles 13C to 13J of Regulations shall apply.

Pursuant to the requirements of Article 6 of the Habitats Directive (92/43/EEC), a Stage One Appropriate Assessment Screening of the proposed new plan shall be carried out as part of the overall process and a Stage Two Appropriate Assessment shall subsequently be carried out, if required.

### Public Consultation

Submissions or observations regarding the review of the existing plan and the preparation of a new County Development Plan are hereby invited from the public and interested bodies. Submissions may be made during the period from Wednesday 6th November 2019 to Friday 10th January 2020.

Children, or groups or associations representing the interests of children, are entitled to make submissions or observations.

While a review of the detailed policies, objectives (including zoning provisions) and development standards contained in the plan shall occur as part of the plan making process, this stage of the plan review process is 'STRATEGIC' in nature, in that it is for the purposes of developing:

- the objectives and policies to deliver an overall strategy for the proper planning and sustainable development of the County
- the 'Core Strategy' of the plan

and in this regard the Planning Authority shall take account of the statutory obligations of the local authority and any relevant policies or objectives for the time being of the Government or of any Minister of the Government.

## Appeal to ABP over refusal of Newcastle timber facility

An appeal has been lodged with An Bord Pleanála following Wicklow County Council's decision to refuse permission for a proposed timber products manufacturing facility on Timmore Lane, Newcastle.

Warmridge Ltd is appealing to ABP after the Council refused permission in September. The Council's planner's report recommended refusing permission for the development due to the site's rural location.

The Council's Development Plan 2016-2022 sets out the objective to channel industrial/commercial/ employment development into serviced centres and to restrict development in rural areas to developments that comply with specific criteria. The planner's report states that the proposed manufacturing activity does not have a 'locational need' to be situated in this rural area and therefore does not comply with the specified criteria. Additionally, the Planner's Report also states that the development would result in a traffic hazard due to the traffic movements that it generated.

The proposed development would include a timber products manufacturing workshop and parking facilities, access road and ancillary site development works. Access would be from Timmore Lane through the existing entrance and the overall development would also include improvement works to Timmore Lane and to the R772/Timmore Lane junction. The case is due to be decided by 25th February 2020.

## 'More action needed to stop plastic pollution at source'

Commenting on the news that a new expert group will be formed to advise on Marine Protected Areas (MPAs), Karin Dubsky, the Green Party candidate in the Wexford by-election and well-known marine ecologist and activist, said: "The Marine Protected Areas advisory group is an excellent government initiative which should not only signal the expansion of our sad little 2.3% MPA network, but also a new approach where MPAs are identified with public participation and proudly supported locally.

"While Ireland will not make our EU and UN targets for the start of 2020, it can make very significant progress over the next few months, with bigger and better MPAs as indicators."



The report singled out numerous areas for praise including the work carried out around the train station and the War memorial on Quinsboro Road, People's Park, the re-landscaped Herbert Road carpark, and landscaping of the Dargle River walk.

The report also praised the establishment of the North Wicklow Environmental Network as "a terrific initiative - various groups and individuals working together sharing their knowledge and experience is always a good idea."

Greystones also improved its marks in every category from last year. The report praised Greystones Tidy Towns as "a dynamic and very active group and the wider Greystones community is very lucky to have you! You are on top of all the categories and display great knowledge and inter-

est in all. You are lucky to have such a beautiful area as Greystones to live and work in with its mix of beautiful architecture, coastal habitats and rural hinterland. It is clear, however, that you know and cherish this so Greystones has a bright future ahead with you looking after it. Congratulations on all your efforts this year and we look forward to your progression in the competition into the future."

The adjudicator was particularly impressed by projects such as The Bugs Green Project and Community Orchard.

very active and dedicated Tidy Towns groups who work very hard every year to ensure these scenic coastal towns of Wicklow are looking their best all year round.

"The Department realised very quickly that several omissions had been made in error including the Bray and Greystones' entries from Co. Wicklow and made arrangements and reassurances to ensure proper and swift adjudication would follow for the relevant towns.

"I am delighted to learn

that all is now rectified and that the Bray & Greystones results have been released. 2019 has been another great year for Tidy Towns which symbolises everything that is great about community spirit in Ireland. There were over 900 entries nationwide this year with the overarching theme of 'Caring for the Environment' which conveys the relevance and importance of this annual competition.

"This latest announcement for Bray & Greystones means that

more funding will be awarded to 32 community groups across Co. Wicklow for this year's competition. The official Results booklet for the 2019 competition will be updated and awards arising from this recent adjudication will be presented at the Regional Awards later in the year. The Department of Rural and Community Development has apologised to the small number of groups who were omitted from the initial adjudication process and is reviewing its process to ensure this does not happen again.

"I believe that applications disappeared from as many as seven areas. Reps from Tidy Towns say that they never received their emails and while we don't know exactly what happened, what is clear is the fact that they need to learn from this incident and do whatever it takes to ensure it never happens again.

"The amount of time and effort that Tidy Towns volunteers invest cannot be underestimated. I'm really delighted all that hard work has now paid off," concluded Donnelly.

## Arklow vet to present dairy research findings at Nuffield Ireland Conference

Nuffield Ireland, the independent organisation which identifies future leaders in the Irish agricultural sector, hosts its annual conference on Friday 15th November. Among this year's speakers is Tommy Heffernan, a vet and animal health specialist living in Arklow.

Tommy will present his report on: A cow-centered approach to modern dairy farming. The report examines the signals for success in dairy farming; the influence on people on the health and performance of dairy cow.

Tommy discovered that the biggest impact on cow health and happiness were human interactions, and therefore there is an opportunity to improve education around the biological needs of the modern dairy cow. Speaking about his findings he said, "I felt many current negative perceptions of agriculture are wrong and sometimes can even be affecting the mental well-being of farmers in the extreme. A cow centred approach affords us the opportunity to battle

many of negative perceptions around dairy farming."

This year's conference aims to discuss agriculture's role in growing a healthy, sustainable society and will challenge the Nuffield community to consider and act on sustainability initiatives to balance their relatively intensive agriculture systems.

This topic will be addressed in a panel discussion with Brendan

Gleeson, Secretary of the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Professor Alan Matthews, Trinity College, Dublin and Professor Alice Stanton, Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland and Devenish Nutrition.

Other 2018 scholars who have completed their research and travels include: Colm O'Leary from a family dairy farm near Blarney in Co. Cork will present the findings of his report: Farmer-led Animal Welfare - an opportunity for the livestock industry; Joe Lyng from a sheep and beef farm in Inistioge, Co. Kilkenny and currently Ruminant Business Manager with Glanbia will present the findings

of his report on: The value in the market for grass-fed dairy product; Karol Kissane, a dairy farmer from Asdee in North Kerry will present the findings of his report: A review of perceptions of agriculture among primary school students and opportunities for developments; Klaus Laitenberger from Germany and living in Leitrim is currently an organic farm and garden inspector for the Organic Trust. He will present his report on: The potential of growing Yacon and Jerusalem artichokes as crops and functional foods in Ireland.

## 'Electric car owners shouldn't be restricted by driving test'

The Fianna Fáil Health Spokesperson Stephen Donnelly has called for the drivers of electric vehicles not to be limited by the driving test.

Deputy Donnelly explained, "At the moment the rules mean if you take your driving test in an electric car you're license is restricted to similar vehicles. Electric cars have no traditional gears or gearbox, but despite that fact the Road Safety Authority, who's responsible for the testing system, treats ecars like automatic vehicles and drivers are restricted in a similar manner. This makes absolutely no sense at a time when we're supposed to be encouraging people to be environmentally responsible.

"We recently had the announcement that the Department of the Environment is to fund up to 1,000 on-street public charge points across the country for electric vehicles over the next five years. This is great news as it proves that the Government is listening to those of us who've been warning we need to start moving away from fossil fuels."

### N11/M11 JUNCTION 4 TO JUNCTION 14 IMPROVEMENT SCHEME - PUBLIC CONSULTATION NO. 2

Wicklow County Council in conjunction with Dún Laoghaire - Rathdown County Council are progressing the development of the N11/M11 Junction 4 to Junction 14 Improvement Scheme. The project is being managed by Kildare National Roads Office with Arup appointed as lead consultant to advance the project through the planning and design process.

The purpose of this public consultation is to inform the public of the transportation options which have been developed to date to address the problems identified, the constraints identified to date and the programme for advancement of the project.

Public consultation forms an important part of advancing the design process and allows for the involvement of the public in developing the Emerging Preferred Option. 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# Significant milestone for Blessington Greenway project with design and procurement team now in place

Minister Simon Harris TD last week attended the first meeting of the Blessington Greenway Extension Steering Group, which took place in County Buildings.

Following the meeting Simon Harris TD said: "I am delighted to report that the selection of the Design and Procurement Team for the Greenway Extension has been finalised. I attended the first meeting of the Greenway Steering group on Friday with representatives of the Blessington Town Team, Wicklow County Council, the ESB and the newly appointed design team.

"The Blessington Greenway extension will have a transformational impact on West Wicklow. We have already seen the great success of the Waterford Greenway in respect of local jobs and businesses. The Blessington Greenway has even greater potential and I am delighted to see an experienced contractor being appointed who has already undertaken greenway

developments" "2020 will see the full detailed design of the entire 42km Greenway route undertaken. Construction work will commence in 2021." "I would like to pay tribute to the work undertaken by Wicklow Town Team and the wider community to date in bringing the project to this point. I look forward to further engagement with the community in preparing for the posi-

tive impact such as a major tourist attraction will have on the community and local business."

John Horan from Blessington Town Team outlined the Greenway's progress at last month's meeting of Wicklow County Council. He said "the dream of Blessington greenway all the way around the lakes is very close to becoming a reality. It's a multi-million euro project to do it around the lakes and the Council got behind it and have developed the idea. Through the National

Planning Strategy and the good work of a lot of people, the County Council got €5 million in funding from the Department.

"The actual building of the greenway should be well under way in early 2020. It won't take too long to build in my view, and I think that certainly in 12 months' time we should see dramatic progress towards the finalisation of the greenway. It just shows what can be done when community and local authorities work together."

### Position Description

The successful applicant will support the efficient and safe operation of ESB's generation and water control assets on the Liffey Stations. The Liffey Stations include Pollaphuca, Golden Falls and Leixlip Power Stations and their associated infrastructure and catchment. The successful candidate will carry out all general maintenance duties on the Liffey Stations including but not limited to routine checks and operation of plant and equipment, undertaking & documenting maintenance works and noting dam monitor readings. The role will also provide relief duties for the Liffey station attendants when required. During these relief periods the successful candidate will be also be responsible for assisting with operation and monitoring of plant and equipment on the Liffey stations. This position will be based in Pollaphuca. From time to time, work at other ESB's locations such as Turlough Hill may also be assigned on a business needs basis.
