'DECIDE WHOSE SIDE YOU'RE ON'

'TIME TO SHOUT STOP TO THE ABJECT FAILURE'

A furious row has broken out locally over a Dáil motion of no confidence in Housing Minister Eoghan Murphy. The Social Democrats will use their private members time this week to bring a motion of no confidence in the Minister for Housing, Planning and Local Government, Eoghan Murphy TD, to the floor of the Dáil. Sinn Féin TD John Brady described the motion of No Confidence as an opportunity for Fianna Fail TDs Pat Casey and Stephen Donnelly "to put their money where their mouth is on the housing crisis that they are quick to criticise locally."

Speaking last week as they confirmed the motion, Social Democrats Candidate for Wicklow, Cllr. Jennifer Whitmore, said "It is time for us to shout 'stop' to the abject failure that is this Government's Housing Policy. We can no longer continue to pretend that this Minister and this Government are getting to grips with our housing crisis. They have repeatedly failed Irish families, our communities and our economy in not providing housing that is affordable to buy or rent."

Cllr Whitmore added: "I have been out on the doors talking to constituents all over Wicklow and homelessness and the lack of affordable housing is coming up again and again. Every single person I speak to believes that it is completely unacceptable that we now have 10,397 people, including 3,873 children, who are

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homeless. That figure does not count those that are hidden homeless, living in family or friends' homes. Or those that struggle to pay exorbitant rents or mortgage payments. This Government's housing policy can only be classed as a complete failure. This cannot be allowed to continue and it's time for all opposition parties to come together to shout 'stop' and to hold Fine Gael to account. This is the only way we can hope for a complete rethink on dealing a housing crisis that is crippling communities all over Wicklow and Ireland."

Whitmore continued "I know a reason put forward for not supporting the motion is that it could cause a general election, and FF are worried that people wouldn't like their Christmas celebrations to be disturbed. However, the Social Democrats

have called for a vote of no confidence in the Minister, not the Government. If the Government loses this vote, it would mean that they would have to replace the Minister. It does not have to mean that a general election is called. In any walk of life, if you fail to perform in your job, you will be removed from that role. The Social Democrats believe that this Minister has failed in his role to solve our housing crisis.

"I would say to FF that it is time to get off the fence and to join all other parties in the Dáil and send a strong message that we will hold our Ministers to account and, if they fail in doing their job, that the opposition will work together to represent the best interests of the country."

'WICKLOW BUDGET IS A PROPERTY TAX GRAB'

The adopted Wicklow County Council 2020 budget "is proof that the increase in local property tax could have been avoided", according to Independent councillor Mags Crean who was one of five councillors to vote against the budget last week.

Cllr Crean who also voted against the increase in property tax in September maintains that the decision to increase the tax at the time was "a blind decision as councillors did not have access to actual budget figures". Independent councillors Joe Behan and Tom Fortune, and Sinn Fein councillors Dermot 'Daisy' O'Brien and Grace McManus, also voted against Wicklow's 2020 Budget. The Budget was passed with an amendment that compensation owed to the Council from the Government as a result of the valuation of Irish Water infrastructure, believed to be over €300,000, will be divided among the five Municipal Districts to spend as they wish. The budget reveals additional rental income of €3.1 million, additional funds of €1.7m arising from the decision to increase the Local Property Tax in Wicklow, and an increase of approximately €4m in commercial rates. The surplus from the LPT will be used to fund housing services, replacing Central Government funding. The increase in commercial rates will be used to offset losses in income following the rating of Irish Water

and any future income losses that may arise as a result of appeals made to the Valuation Tribunal under the Rates Revaluation process. Wicklow County Council received nearly €2.2m in compensation from the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government in respect of commercial rates for Irish Water. This compensation payment will cease in 2020 as a result of the valuation of Irish Water infrastructure this year, leaving a net shortfall for Wicklow of €600,000. The Council says it will "continue to actively engage with the Department on this matter in order to try and secure some element of compensatory funding to offset this income loss." Speaking after last week's meeting Cllr Crean said "I'm sure the original decision was made in good faith by councillors who believed it to be the only option to protect services but it is now clear that the budget contained other forms of increased income such as rental income of 3 million euro and increased rates. The adoption of the budget was also a lost opportunity to lobby central Government for increased funding, resulting in a type

of tax grab when other options and opportunities could have been examined. "In Waterford City and County Council, the councillors stood together, met with the Minister and negotiated an additional €2 million to assist in the budgetary process following extensive lobbying. We should have done this in Wicklow". Cllr Crean refused to support a budget that she believed had unfairly placed the burden of inefficient management of public monies at a national level onto homeowners locally in Wicklow. She said "At the budget meeting, Wicklow councillors had an opportunity to right a wrong. They cannot reverse their decision of increasing the property tax but they could have taken the opportunity to vote against the budget, meet with the Minister to address the serious lack of central Government funding for Wicklow and income losses related to Irish Water, and then adopt a revised budget with real added value for the country". A proposal put forward by Cllr Behan to adjourn the meeting until Monday 2nd December, so that the Council could "go back to the Department of Environment and look for

the money that we are owed and being denied", was voted down. Speaking at the meeting, Cllr Behan explained: "It would be wrong to make a decision without knowing what the outcome of the talks with the Department of the environment are going to be this week. Look at what has happened in Dublin City. They have postponed budget considerations; they have gone back to central Government to look for the Irish Water rates they are owed." Cllr Pat Fitzgerald was against this idea, saying: "Dublin City Council reduced their property tax by 15%. Now they are begging the Government to make up the difference because they can't balance the budget.

"We are in a different situation; we increased the property tax. Dublin made a mistake to reduce the property tax. We made the right decision as far as I am concerned. I am not in favour of delaying the meeting whatsoever, because of Dublin City Council or anyone else."

Labour councillor Paul O'Brien agreed, adding "I feel we have to do the responsible thing for our constituents and pass this budget today."

Just 59 Garda vehicles to cover entire Wicklow Division

Fianna Fáil TD Pat Casey has said the Minister for Justice has questions to answer as to why there are so few Garda vehicles to cover the entire Wicklow division.

Deputy Casey was commenting as new figures revealed to Fianna Fáil show that the total number of Garda vehicles in the Wicklow Garda division in 2019 is 59. In 2018, 2017 and 2016 this stood at 61, 62 and 62 respectively.

Deputy Casey said, "Over the past four years, despite an increase in the population of Wicklow, we've seen a steady decline in the number of Garda vehicles to patrol the county.

"There are 41 cars, 10 vans, one motorcycle, and six 4x4s patrolling a 2,000km area with 142,425 residents. Wicklow consists of a very mountainous

terrain and six 4x4s just isn't sufficient. The Winter months in particular mean that it is difficult to access rural areas in Wicklow and people in emergencies. In the remote Baltinglass district there is only one 4x4.

"With the vast majority of the population concentrated in the North of the county there is a very real fear that those elsewhere in the county will bear the brunt of a lack of resources.

"Bray to Tinahealy is over an hours' drive and we have very rural roads. We need a robust and mobile police force to patrol them," he concluded.

Deputy Brady called publicly on Deputies Donnelly and Casey to support the no confidence motion in the Minister for Housing, saying "this government has run out of time and ideas to tackle the housing crisis".

Brady said: "The newspapers are filled with horror stories of the impact of the government's housing policy on children across the State. The government's housing policy is now in its fourth year and is simply not delivering.

"The problem has gotten worse and for the many families, young people and pensioners; their housing situation is grimmer than ever. Wicklow is no exception to this crisis. In the month of October alone, 43 families in Wicklow presented to the Council as homeless. This consisted of 100 adults, and 71 children. There are currently 4,388 people on the Council list for housing support, that's up from 3,941 in November 2018.

"Sinn Féin will wholeheartedly support the motion of no confidence in the Minister for Housing. The vote affords an opportunity to Fianna Fáil TDs to make it clear where they stand. Are they on the side of homeless children or on the side of Minister Eoghan Murphy?

"Fianna Fáil either support Eoghan Murphy and Rebuilding Ireland, or they support those who want a housing policy that meets the needs of those waiting for social and affordable homes. Fianna Fáil need to stop hiding behind Brexit as an excuse for doing their job and must start holding this government to account. It is time for Fianna Fáil to decide who's side they are on, those struggling through the housing crisis or Minister Murphy?"

Responding to Deputy Brady's remarks, Pat Casey TD said that "Populist rhetoric designed to play down the Irish Housing and Homeless crisis is as inexcusable as populist stunts designed to make political capital out of the suffering of thousands of Irish Families, our fellow citizens."

"Those politicians who think that a December/January General Election will help ease the Housing crisis at one of the most dangerous periods for homelessness should also reflect deeply on the politics that they are promoting. Populist PR motions days before a Bye-Election reflect poorly on these parties' commitments to Housing solutions."

"These politically motivated tactics are disgraceful, and bring shame to the responsible, mature yet radical actions that need to be enforced to address the Government's failure to provide homes for our people.

"As Vice-Chair of the cross-party Dáil Committee on Housing, I have attended 140 meetings where I have held the Government to account and engaged with all the Housing experts to provide solutions for our crisis in home building. I don't remember Deputy Brady attending a single meeting.

"We all know that we are heading towards a General Election in late spring or early summer. That gives this current Dáil a little over 40 sitting days to pass this bill and to bring in many measures that will provide solutions to increase the supply of homes.

"We need to use that time to concentrate on helping the thousands of homeless families and children during the very dangerous Christmas and January period. Providing some stability is the responsible thing to do here. I won't play political games with Housing and I ask John Brady to do the same."

Fianna Fáil's Stephen Donnelly (and one time leader of the Social Democrats) lashed out at Sinn Féin saying "Fianna Fáil has never had confidence in this government, on housing, health, broadband, transport, or anything else. Ireland has never before had two terms of such a nakedly right-wing government - the impact of that is being felt by every patient, every commuter, everyone trying to buy or even rent a house."

"There will be a general election in the coming months, and we will be asking the people of Wicklow to support us, so that we can repair the damage done, and get things moving again for children, women and men all over the county."

"I won't take any lectures from Sinn Féin - they ran away and hid after the 2016 election. They hide in Westminster, when they could have influenced critical Brexit votes. They have been hiding from Stormont for years now. And after the upcoming general election, they will still be hiding, while all the time giving out about why other people won't solve their problems. They like to talk a big talk, but when people need to step up and govern, or even just turn up to work, they are nowhere to be found," concluded Deputy Donnelly.

Operation Hurdle takes to the skies to target Christmas tree thieves

Christmas trees in Wicklow will once again be under the watchful eye in the sky as Gardai launched Operation Hurdle last week, an annual patrol to prevent Christmas tree theft.

The operation was launched by Gardai in 2012 and since then has been invaluable in preventing large scale theft from the often remotely located Christmas tree farms in Wicklow's uplands. Air patrols will be deployed by the Garda Air Patrol Unit along with detectives and regional armed support back up. Before the operation was set up, gangs would target the isolated farms and make off with thousands of euros worth of trees, many of which had taken between seven and ten years to grow to size. Local grower Christy Kavanagh said that up to a fifth of his trees were stolen before the introduction of Operation Hurdle. Gardai say that the amount of tree theft during the run up to Christmas is now almost negligible.

The patrols will be especially welcome news to Christmas tree growers this year as heavy rain has added extra costs, both in time and money to the production of trees. Farmers are expected to be under extra pressure to get the trees ready in time and make up for lost days due to rain and storms.

Up to 450,000 Christmas trees are expected to be sold in the run up to Christmas, many of them grown in Wicklow, with approximately 200,000 exported to Europe.

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IMPROVEMENT WORKS FOR SCHOOLS ARE 'A TINY SHUFFLE' IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

Eight local schools will undergo major improvement works next Summer through Government funding provided under the 2020 Summer Works Scheme. Stephen Donnelly TD said that "I wouldn't go so far as to say the summer school upgrades are a step in the right direction, they're more like a tiny shuffle".

Andrew Doyle TD said the works are a vital investment for the future education of primary pupils and post-primary students in County Wicklow.

"Today's announcement confirms the Government's continuing prioritisation of capital funding for school buildings across Wicklow which will enhance the learning and working environment for pupils and teachers. My colleague the Minister for Education, Joe McHugh has announced that 405 schools across the country will receive more than €30 million for Summer

Works projects for delivery in 2020. Minister McHugh confirmed to me that 7 primary and 1 post-primary schools in Wicklow will receive funding for major improvement works which is positive news for staff and students alike."

The schools to undergo works are: Naomh Padraig NS Arklow, Moin an Bhealaigh NS, Brittas Bay NS, Rathdrum Boys NS, Kilcommon NS, Kilmacanogue NS, Scoil Chualann and St Marys College Arklow.

Two Wicklow schools received funding to upgrade and improve life safety systems like fire

alarms and detection and emergency lighting; 6 schools received funding to upgrade and install new surfaces on play areas and car parks; and schools will be obliged to plan for electric vehicle charging.

"The work will be carried out in schools mainly over the summer months, so the disruption to students, teachers and other staff will be kept to a minimum," Doyle added.

Minster McHugh said: "We have also made sure that schools are getting the notification several weeks earlier than last year to try to give principals and boards of management a better lead in

time to plan and then get the work done."

Projects allocated funding under the 2020 Summer Works Scheme relate to applications submitted by schools in category 10 from the Summer Works Scheme 2016/17 and category 1 from Summer Works Summer 2020 onwards.

Under Project Ireland 2040, the education sector will receive approximately €12 billion from 2018 to 2027. This includes some €8.8 billion for the school's sector.

Stephen Donnelly TD said "Most of the improvements will focus on the so-called 'external

environment' so that's things like playground surfaces, car parks, etc., but some of the schools will have their safety systems upgraded instead. While these upgrades are extremely important for these schools, we can't forget all the outstanding work that the Department of Education has yet to do in Wicklow. Not least of which are extensions for St David's, Temple Carrig and Coláiste Chraobh Abhann which are needed urgently to alleviate the chronic shortage of secondary school places for pupils in the Greytones, Kilcoole, Delgany, Enniskerry areas."

Local schoolchildren benefit from additional funding for Writers in Schools scheme

Wicklow schoolchildren are benefitting from a new writer being added to the Poetry Ireland Writers in Schools scheme, thanks to funding provided by Wicklow Arts Office.

Poetry Ireland delivers the scheme on behalf of both Arts Councils on the island of Ireland. The increased funding from Wicklow Arts Office has enabled them to bring Bray children's writer Sadhbh Devlin onto Writers in Schools where she will have the opportunity to work with hundreds of schoolchildren in the future.

More than 1,300 schoolchildren across Wicklow have enjoyed workshops with some of Ireland's leading writers - including Marita Conlon McKenna and Alan Early - as part of Writers in Schools this year. Sadhbh visited St Brigid's National School, Greystones, recently as part of mentoring and training for writers joining the Writers in School scheme.

Through this programme, Sadhbh had the opportunity to shadow her mentor, children's writer and poet Lucinda Jacob, and then worked with the St Brigid's schoolchildren, bringing out huge smiles in the classroom. Wicklow Arts Office has provided funding for Poetry Ireland to curate a lively and wide-

ranging programme of literary events in schools across Co Wicklow throughout 2019.

Anna Bonner, Writers in Schools Development Officer at Poetry Ireland, said that the organisation is always excited to be able to bring a new writer onto the Writers in Schools scheme.

"Thanks to the support of Wicklow Arts Office, we're delighted to have Sadhbh Devlin joining our dedicated team of artists," she said. "We aim to offer schools a wide range of writers and storytellers to choose from in as many parts of the country as possible."

"We see how the creative energy sparked by these first-hand encounters with writers can trigger an appreciation of the emotional and intellectual power of language that lasts a lifetime."

Wicklow Arts Officer, Jenny Sherwin, said it was a wonderful opportunity for children and schools to work with authors in the classroom. We are particularly delighted to sup-

port national to local partnership in the arts and look forward to continued success with the roll out of the scheme with Poetry Ireland," she said.

More than 1,300 young people in schools located in Wicklow town, Bray, Avoca, Ashford and Rathnew have enjoyed meeting and working alongside writers such as Marita Conlon McKenna, Alan Early, Catherine Ann Cullen and Kevin McDermott during 2019.

The Writers in Schools scheme part-funds visits by writers and storytellers to primary and post-primary schools in the Republic of Ireland (funded by The Art Council) and Northern Ireland (funded by Arts Council Northern Ireland). The scheme has been running since 1977, making it one of the longest running arts-in-education programmes in the country. More than 500,000 children and young people across the island have experienced working with a writer since Writers in Schools was established.

Councillors complain about reduced funding for footpaths

Councillors last week expressed disappointment at the reduced funding for footpaths in Wicklow's 2020 Budget.

Funding from the local Footpath Renewal Scheme which the Council has relied on over the last number of years has now ceased, meaning a reduction of €300,000 in expenditure on footpaths.

Speaking at last week's meeting, Cllr Steven Matthews said "there is some positives in this budget, but they are very minimal. Housing and roads represent half of the budget. What it highlights is the fact that local Government is not funded sufficiently and we have had that discussion over and over again, but it is plainly clear, and Wicklow is faring quite poorly in that measure. We are not being funded significantly by central Government and they are two areas where we would have historically relied heavily on central funding and it's just not there. That is a national discussion, probably not for today, but it is a discussion that will have to take place."

He continued: "In terms of the €300,000 reduction in footpaths, that is going to have very significant negative impact on district engineers' ability to carry out repairs to footpaths required in our towns and villages. Our roads and footpaths are dangerous at the moment for people

who want to walk and cycle."

Also speaking about the reduction in funding for footpaths, Councillor Shay Cullen said "I am disappointed it's been reduced. I think our footpaths across the county are in need of a lot of work. There are quite a lot of older estates in our county where paths are basically disintegrating or are a health and safety concern. We are going to have to look at doing some sort of a survey on our footpaths, particularly in the estates and villages around our county, to get a clearer picture of how serious the problem is. Because there is no doubt we are going to have further claims, if we don't deal with this issue."

Councillor John Mullen from Tinahely said "We have a situation where a footpath has been taken over by nature, the ditch has reclaimed the footpath. It's disappointing and we need to have a proper discussion on how we can get extra funding."

Cllr Pat Kennedy proposed that €100,000 be taken from the Development Contribution Scheme to be divided equally among the five Municipal Districts for footpaths, and this was agreed to.

Patron for new secondary school to be announced 'within weeks'

Fianna Fáil TD Stephen Donnelly said he has received confirmation that the patron of the new secondary school for the Greystones/Kilcoole area will be announced within 'weeks'.

Last week Deputy Donnelly explained, "This is the most up to date information available which came from a Parliamentary Question answered just this Tuesday. After months pressuring the Department of Education to reveal the patronage of our new school I'm relieved to say we should finally find out very shortly.

"I'm also pleased to say that the Minister told me the whole process should be open and transparent, as all assessment reports and recommendations for patrons will be made available online.

"This is a big step forward for parents who have been contacting my office every single day worried about the lack of local secondary school places. Understandably they can't choose a school for their child without knowing who will be in charge. But hopefully as soon as the patron is

announced they can make an informed decision and admissions can be opened straight away.

"While this latest news is reassuring, we can't forget we're still a long way from the finish line. For instance, the location of the school hasn't been decided yet. The official Department of Education report claims the building project is only at the 'land acquisition' phase, so a permanent home hasn't been secured. We're also very unhappy about the proposal to use 'temporary accommodation' when the school opens in September 2020.

"Most people fear this will be code for 'prefabs' which certainly wouldn't be suitable here. The upshot is that we have made a move in the right direction, there's still a long road ahead but we won't give up until our children get the education they deserve", concluded Donnelly.

"Until that decision is made, there can be no progress towards hiring the Principal, establishing a Board of Management or locating accommodation for the school. There is a considerable volume of work that needs to be undertaken before the school can open in September of next year.

"This delay in progressing the school is placing a considerable amount of stress on parents and chil-

Doyle joins Cycling royalty in the hall of fame, the likes of Sean Kelly, Stephen Roche, and Peter Crinnion (Also Bray Wheelers) who was multiple Irish Champion and represented Ireland at the Rome Olympics.

'HYPOCRITICAL GREEN PARTY IS AGAINST EVERYTHING IN WICKLOW'

Fine Gael's Cllr Derek Mitchell has attacked the Green Party for opposing N11 and rail improvements in Wicklow and in a statement headed up 'Green Party hypocritical in opposing N11 and Rail improvements', said that the proposal to reduce the N11 to one lane and a bus lane would "paralyse" Wicklow and create "total chaos".

Cllr Mitchell said "The Green Party proposal to cancel the N11 upgrade and convert one lane to a Bus Lane will cause total chaos in County Wicklow. Speaking to the leader of the Green Party Eamonn Ryan on the radio I was surprised to hear that he wants to reduce the car lanes on the already jammed N11. It is essential that the bus lane is extra to the existing two lanes South of Kilmacanoge and there must be many Express Buses."

"North of Kilmacanoge there may well need to be three car lanes. A solution to Wicklow's transport will need rail, bus and N11 improvements. We need to let the engineers study this and make their recommendations which are due next Summer. The Green Party is wrong to think Central Dublin solutions will work on this National Primary Route."

"The Green Party opposed 'improving the South East rail line' in the Regional Planning Guidelines. I asked the Minister for Environment to overrule this and he has now altered the wording to

'improve' rail. Now the Green leader Eamonn Ryan says he will shelve upgrade plans for the N11.

"In April 2015 I proposed that rezoning in Wicklow should not take place unless Public Transport and the N11 had been improved. The Green Party and Fianna Fail voted against that as well and with only Fine Gael Councillors in favour this was defeated. Hence the present traffic jams which will get much worse in future.

"The Green Party is against everything in Wicklow and will produce chaos. Currently Irish Rail keeps the Wicklow Rail line virtually empty at rush hour. In 2018 I produced a plan to improve Wicklow's rail and bus services but this will need to be done with Bus Priority measures

for Express Buses."

Responding to Cllr Mitchell's remarks, Green Party Cllr Steven Matthews said "The road needs work to improve junctions and drainage but the third lane is a folly that will fail the commuters of Wicklow. The overall N11 proposal is worrying because it's such outdated thinking and lacking any imagination on improving existing public transport.

"It's extremely worrying that most political parties are looking for this to be fast tracked without knowing much detail but knowing that improving public transport options on the rail line are being largely ignored in the National Transport Authority transport strategy. A third lane or a fourth or fifth has never reduced congestion it will simply bottleneck and back up again at N11/M50.

Instead of looking at traffic gridlock out of one window you'll be looking at it out both sides, with a massive price tag, continued environmental damage and years of construction misery.

"I fully expected Fine Gael to come after the Greens, as Fine Gael is completely bereft of any good ideas on transport, planning, housing and climate change so it's natural they would target us. It's a cynical attack to use Wicklow commuters in this way. Much of the N11 problems are due to a lack of investment in public transport, land use planning over the years and inappropriate zoning often led by FG councillors.

"The N11 proposal is vague, lacking in detail and shows very limited forward planning thought. It's all about being seen to do 'something' but in reality, will do more harm than good and ultimately fail. It's a bit like FG in general, all spin and no all substance or understanding. If we really want to improve commuting for Wicklow residents then TDs and councillors need to work together and start thinking public transport not ridiculous road based solutions. I recently received confirmation from the NTA that no new carriages or ser-

vices are planned for the Wicklow rail line and will instead focus on Kildare, Maynooth and the Northern line, it appears at national level that few of our TDs are fighting for better public transport for Wicklow."

Also weighing into the debate was Independent councillor Joe Behan. He said "Recent newspaper reports have stated that the Green Party leader has said the Greens will halt the proposed upgrades of the N11 if they are in the next

BUILT HERITAGE GRANT SCHEMES 2020



Kilcoole sisters share podium at Cross Country Championship

Two Wicklow sisters took podium positions at the National Cross Country Championships. Fionnuala McCormack (formerly Britton) and her sister Una Britton took first and third place respectively at the 8km senior women's event in Abbotstown.

Fionnuala led the field all the way and took the gold medal winning her ninth national title with a time of 28.41. Her sister Una took the bronze medal with a time of 30.32 with Fionnuala making a u-turn after finishing to run back and cheer her sister through the finish.

Fionnuala will now hope to pick up a medal in Lisbon next week as she was announced as part of the 40 strong Irish team for the European Cross Country Championships. The Kilcoole AC athlete has previously picked up gold twice at the event, taking the senior women's title in 2011 and 2012.

35 year old Fionnuala began her international junior career in cross country running in 2001. Since then she has picked up a massive haul of medals and competed at the Olympic games in Beijing in 2008, London in 2012 and Rio de Janeiro in 2016. Earlier this year she achieved a personal best in her marathon time of 2.26:47

"I've about 30 so far finished and aim to cover a lot more," he concluded.



Pearse Doherty addresses insurance meeting in Wicklow

Sinn Féin TD for Wicklow John Brady was joined by his colleague and party spokesperson for Finance Pearse Doherty TD, who has been spearheading a campaign calling for Insurance Reform, at a public meeting in Bray last Wednesday.

This is the latest in a series of campaign events that Deputy Doherty has held across the state in his bid to reform the insurance industry and end the rip-off of individuals, businesses and families.

Speaking following the meeting, Deputy Brady said "Last night in Bray, I along with my colleagues Cllr Grace McManus and Cllr Dermot O'Brien hosted a public meeting on the insurance rip-off with Pearse Doherty TD.

"Insurance costs have become extortionate, ripping off consumers and closing down businesses. Since 2016 Fine Gael have sat back in the face of rising insurance costs while Fianna Fáil have let them off the hook."

"The insurance industry tells us that fraudulent claims and the cost of personal injury awards are causing premiums to rise. But through the work of Pearse Doherty we know that their figures don't add up."

"Despite the total number of motor insurance claims reducing by 22% between 2014 and 2017, the average motor insurance premium has increased by 53% between 2013 and 2017."

"Premiums are rising. The only other thing that is rising are insurance company profits. Pearse Doherty is leading a campaign to take on the industry and end the rip-off."

"The policies and legislation that he has produced on behalf of Sinn Féin would stamp out fraud, protect consumers, ban price discrimination and reduce premiums for everyone."

Speaking on Sinn Féin's work to date, Cllr Grace McManus added "Only this month, Pearse successfully campaigned for the Central Bank to open up an investigation into price discrimination by the insurance industry.

"The meeting heard about Sinn Féin's plan to set up a Garda Insurance Fraud Unit to tackle insurance fraud when and if it takes place and to ban Dual Pricing by the Insurance Industry. The meeting also heard about Sinn Féin's Consumer Insurance Contracts Bill law which, if enacted, proposes to abolish Premium Levies and put €230 million back in consumers' pockets while also introducing State Intervention to address the market failure."

Cllr Dermot O'Brien concluded "The issue of insurance is such a huge one and affects the lives of ordinary people and businesses alike throughout Wicklow, so therefore it's important that we continue to campaign to end the Insurance Rip-Off."

BirdWatch Ireland appeals to the public to record sick finches

BirdWatch Ireland's Irish Garden Bird Survey is entering its 31st year this December, and for the first time participants are being asked to record the numbers of sick birds seen in their gardens.

Last year's results showed that Greenfinches fell to their lowest ever numbers as a result of 'finch trichomoniasis' - a parasitic infection that results in the deaths of infected birds. In the 1990's and early 2000's Greenfinches were recorded in around 90% of gardens each winter, but their numbers since have plummeted and fewer than 60% of gardens had Greenfinches last winter.

"The rapid decrease in Greenfinch numbers over the last 10 years has been extremely worrying, and last winter's results suggest their decline hasn't bottomed out yet," said Brian Burke, who coordinates the survey for BirdWatch Ireland. "Thousands of people all over the country take part in the Irish Garden Bird Survey every winter, so we're hoping to use the public's help to get a better handle on where and when this infection is hitting birds over the winter. As well as noting down the numbers of different bird species using their gardens each week, we need participants to tell us about any sick birds they see too."

"We're delighted to have The Ballymaloe Group on board once again as official sponsor of the Irish Garden Bird Survey again this year. Thanks to their generous support we're able to dedicate more resources to tackling issues such as bird illness in a scientific way, which in turn allows us to do even more to protect and monitor Ireland's beloved garden and countryside birds."

Fern Allen of Ballymaloe said, "Ballymaloe are proud to support the BirdWatch Ireland survey. As one of Ireland's leading food brands, Ballymaloe has a responsibility to ensure sustainability is at the core of everything we do. Our commitment to wetlands, rewilding and protection of natural habitats allows birds and other creatures to thrive in the East Cork countryside."

It is important to note that the Trichomonas gallinae parasite poses no threat whatsoever to humans, nor indeed to any other mammals, including cats, dogs, horses, cattle and sheep. It is strictly bird disease and has been recorded in pigeon and bird of prey populations for a long time. It is even thought to have been a problem for the dinosaurs, from which modern bird ultimately evolved. It 'jumped' to finches in Britain in 2007 and was first recorded in Ireland the following year.

Since then it has caused huge declines in Greenfinches in many parts of northern Europe.

Brian Burke noted, "Finch species are the birds that are most likely to be affected by trichomoniasis. The symptoms that infected birds show include fluffed up feathers, difficulty swallowing food, sometimes with food stuck to their beaks, and an unusual reluctance to fly away when disturbed.

"Nobody could have predicted that this parasite would start to impact our finch populations, but thankfully we had the Irish Garden Bird Survey in place before it happened, so we have the data to show just exactly how hard some species have been hit. We get a great response to the survey every winter, and this time around people can give added value to their records by letting us know about any sick birds they see."

"Other finch species can be affected, most notably Chaffinches and Goldfinches, but their populations haven't been impacted to the same degree. Chaffinch numbers did dip when the parasite first appeared, but their numbers have recovered," according to Brian Burke. "Goldfinches have been doing well and trichomoniasis has done little to slow their growth. They've gone from being recorded in under 15% of gardens in the mid-1990's to over 80% of gardens in recent years."

Harris meets with social media companies to discuss anti-vax misinformation

Minister for Health Simon Harris last week met with the social media companies, Facebook, Twitter, and Google, to discuss the measures they are taking to combat anti-vaccination misinformation on social media platforms.

Vaccine hesitancy has been identified by the World Health Organisation as one of the ten leading threats to global health in 2019.

The Minister outlined his concerns, saying "The progress we have made in reducing, and in some cases eradicating, vaccine-preventable diseases will be in vain if we allow our immunisation programmes to be undermined by misinformation and disinformation about the benefits and safety of vaccines, particularly on social media".

He added, "Social media is an incredibly powerful tool that can also be harnessed to direct people to sources of factual information about vaccination, so they can make informed decisions. It is in this context that I met with the social media companies today".

The Minister commended the social media companies for being proactive and putting in place measures to tackle this issue and he welcomed their commitment to work with the Department of Health to make further progress.

However, he added: "The companies themselves acknowledged they

have a responsibility to their users in the area of public health. While some of them have taken measures to combat vaccine misinformation, they acknowledged there was much more work to be done and agreed to liaise with the Department regarding the work of the Vaccine Alliance and with the HSE to progress further initiatives.

"We must do everything we can to ensure people get accurate and reputable information on public health," he concluded.

The 2019 Netwatch National Carer of the Year and four regional Young Carers of the Year for 2019 were announced at a gala awards ceremony held in the Westin Hotel, Dublin on Friday, 22nd November.

Broadcasters and patrons of Family Carers Ireland Marty Whelan and Mary Kennedy presented the Wicklow Netwatch Care of the Year to Margaret (Pearl) Pryor.

Pearl cares for her daughter who has an Acquired Brain Injury for the past nine years. She provides this care with compassion and love, she also promotes and encourages independence and helps her daughter to live as 'normal' a life as possible.

Pearl is a brilliant advocate for her vulnerable daughter and will keep fighting for her, she cares and loves every member of her family equally and has never made anyone feel left out or forgotten. She is a very loving and caring person and really deserves this award.

Marcin Filak from Kildalkey, Co. Meath was the overall Netwatch Carer of the Year winner. Marcin cares for his wife Ola, who suffers from locked-in syndrome, and their two children, the eldest of whom Piotr (13) has autism. Ola suffered a catastrophic brain stem stroke three weeks after the birth of the couple's daughter Anastasia (2), resulting in locked-in syndrome. Her condition means she is aware of her surroundings but cannot move or speak and now communicates through eye movements. The couple are originally from Poland but moved to

Ireland in 2016.

Now in their 13th year, the Netwatch Carer of the Year awards seek to recognise, celebrate and shine a light on the remarkable contribution of Ireland's 355,000 family carers - almost two thirds of whom provide over 100 hours of care per week. Today, 1 in 10 people provide care for a loved one in the home. By 2030, that figure is expected to rise 1 in 5.

Speaking at the gala awards ceremony, Catherine Cox, Head of Communications and Carer Engagement with Family Carers Ireland said "We are thrilled to announce the Netwatch

Carers of the Year for 2019. We are in awe of the dedication they show in caring for their loved ones. We look forward to this event each year which not only gives family carers the recognition they deserve, but also shines a light on caring in Ireland today and the challenges that many face in their roles. The theme of this year awards is "No one should have to care alone" highlighting the need for a shared responsibility for caring between the family carer, wider family, community and most importantly the state."

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New Wicklow local currency app goes live

An app supporting a new local currency for Wicklow has gone live in app stores in recent days. Supported by over 60 local businesses, the VillagePod app supports a new local currency called 'VillageCoin', which is tied one-for-one with the euro.

With a dedicated team of six based from Bray, VillagePod is a platform to help local communities thrive which puts local businesses right at the centre. The platform was conceived and developed as a result of a recognition that local businesses would benefit from a platform that champions them and addresses the technology and marketing disadvantage that many local businesses experience. The platform aims to help people make spending local a habit.

VillagePod founder, Cormac McKenna said "We have been hugely encouraged by the strong take up of VillagePod from local businesses. We started this journey when people told us that they really valued their local businesses and our mission is to help those businesses harness the good-

will that people already have for them. These businesses are the fabric of our local communities and our team is excited to be able to support them. We are also very happy to have received assistance from the Local Enterprise Office in Wicklow which has been key to our ability to launch the platform."

The platform works by allowing consumers to top up the app from their bank accounts using a debit card and then pay with their smartphones. Retailers can accept payments from customers with a small tablet or even a phone.

The platform already supports payments to retailers and will shortly also support payments from person to person. It will also integrate loyalty and rewards features for retailers and digital gift cards which will allow retailers to sell gift cards



from social networks like Instagram.

A core feature of the platform is the nomination by each retailer of a local 'cause' - such as a charity, sports club or school - which the retailer supports each time a consumer makes a purchase. Overall costs for business are similar to a typical charge for accepting a credit card.

Louise O'Neill, Susan Collins, Home of Hair, VillagePod Partnership Manager said "More local businesses are coming on board every day and we welcome all businesses wishing to take payments from the public to contact us and get started on VillagePod - it's free to set up. The platform has been operational now for several weeks in test retailers. A big selling point for retailers is that we are bringing them a platform that up to now has only been available for larger businesses which make huge investments in IT and marketing. We're making these capabilities easily accessible for smaller businesses in a way that resonates with

the public." Louise added: "As well as prominent local 'main street' retailers, we're also now seeing many small businesses such as physiotherapists that up to now only take cash payments adopting VillagePod instead of having to go to the hassle and expense of setting up with a credit card provider."

Greystones retailer Greystones retailer Susan Collins, Home of Hair, said "VillagePod is a great way to bring a community together by encouraging people to support local small businesses. I am from Greystones and have been active in my community all my life but through VillagePod I am able to effortlessly give back and support Bray Women's Refuge through the percentage that goes to my nominated charity."

"We are excited to be part of VillagePod. It's such a super and simple idea. There is such a buzz amongst local businesses and customers already" stated Lauren O'Sullivan from Dockyard No. 8.

The value of public meetings organised by the Wicklow County Council Joint Policing Committee (JPC) was stressed by Committee Chair, Cllr Gerry Walsh, when the JPC met in Baltinglass on Thursday 19th November.

The purpose of the meeting was to give the community a forum in which they could make their views known, ask questions and share their concerns in relation to the prevention of crime in their area.

Attendees welcomed hearing about the new community policing framework currently being developed which will enhance community engagement and public safety.

Recently appointed Superintendent to Baltinglass district, Karen Maloney, said that "the proposed new Community Policing

Teams will work with local communities to prevent and detect crime in their locality supported by community safety forums made up of local Gardai, members of the public and community groups."

Members of the public were encouraged by Chief Superintendent Denis Ferry to be proactive in reporting crime and called for the continued cooperation of the local community in crime prevention in their area and engagement with the Gardai.
