## THE COUNTY'S LEADERS OUTLINE THEIR WISHES FOR 2020

As we greet the year 2020 our thoughts turn to the challenges and changes that the year ahead will bring. As a commuter county, Wicklow is developing rapidly. House prices are high, rental properties scarce; our hospitals and roads are packed and our rural areas cry out for facilities. Meanwhile as we edge ever closer to climate breakdown, the pressure is on the people and politicians of Wicklow to act in the interests of our planet. A general election in the first few months of 2020 will give us an opportunity to make our voices heard on all of these issues. Wicklow Times asked our five sitting TDs, and the Cathaoirleach and County Manager of Wicklow County Council what their priorities and hopes are for County Wicklow in the year ahead.

Minister for Health Simon Harris said "I want to thank the people of Wicklow for their support through 2019 and for affording me the honour of representing them in Dáil Éireann as their TD. At a national level, 2020 promises to be a very busy year with a number of really important issues to pursue regarding Brexit, improving our public services, protecting our economy, the Northern Ireland institutions, working to advance climate action and so on. Locally, I want to

continue to deliver on key projects. In 2020, as a local TD, I will be focusing on improved

public transport, easing traffic congestion on the M11 through sensible investment that aligns with public transport, working to ensure the delivery of a number of school projects, securing more funding for our sports clubs and community groups and the

delivery of greenways. I will also be working to help secure a public swimming pool for West Wicklow. I will continue to hold Constituency Advice Clinics where I look forward to linking in with communities, local groups, schools and businesses. We live in a wonderful county and we need to all work together to make it even better."

Minister of State Andrew Doyle (FG) told *Wicklow Times*, "My main aims for 2020 include the continuation of this Government's policy towards strengthening our economy while investing in broadband, housing, education and supporting and developing rural economies and communities.

“Regarding Brexit, I hope that the clear majority in the House of Commons will result in ratification of the Withdrawal Agreement which guarantees no border and protects citizens’ rights.

“As Minister of State for Agriculture, my priorities are to continue to grow new markets for our agri-food products, delivery of the Forestry programme and recognising the integral role that afforestation plays in meeting our climate change objectives.

“In Wicklow, I will be continuing to work closely with stakeholders towards the provision of improved public

transport options for commuters in the overall context of the N11 improvement scheme, as well as providing regular input on the proposed routes with the aim of ensuring minimum disruption on surrounding residents and communities, as well as remaining mindful on the potential environment impact on the Glen of the Downs area.”

Deputy Stephen Donnelly (FF) said his word for Wicklow in 2020 is ‘momentum’. “Lots will be happening - Bray’s Florentine Centre, Greystones’ IDA land, Wicklow Town’s library, Arklow’s water treatment plant, Blessington’s Greenway, Baltinglass’ town centre

revival, Ashford & Ardmore film studios, Newtown’s community pitches, the Hospice and much more. But there are also huge challenges to sort out. The commuter nightmare continues on the N81, N11 and public transport. Thousands of children in Wicklow can’t access urgent healthcare. And services like St. Joseph’s and Purple House need our support.

“Many of Wicklow’s schools need investment - in new schools, extensions and upgrades. We need far more Gardaí and our Fire Services need support. People need affordable homes. Crazy insurance hikes for Wicklow’s business-

es and childcare providers need to be dealt with, and we need far more local jobs (the real answer to commuter gridlock). And we need radical action on the environment, from national and local government, and from each and every one of us. It’s going to be a busy year!”

Deputy John Brady (SF) said, “Housing is currently the biggest issue in the County and will continue to be in 2020. It is clear that Rebuilding Ireland has failed, and we need new policies to address this crisis.

“Wicklow has largely been ignored and forgotten by this government. In 2020 we need considerable investment in our public transport system.

“Unfortunately, more jobs have been lost in Arklow with the recent closure announcement of Rondo Food. We immediately need an Unemployment Task Force to be established to help bring jobs to Arklow and Wicklow Town.

“I would also like to see moves to address the

need for more public amenities. Blessington needs a swimming pool, a home found for Vartry Rowing Club and progress on the development of a Sports Campus in Bray.

“In 2020 we need to see significant improvements in our health service and put an end to forcing organisations to mount public campaigns to secure funding. We also need to see the Primary Care Centre delivered for Arklow.”

“2020 is going to be a critical year for the people of Wicklow and Ireland,” said Deputy Pat Casey (FF).

“Housing delivery must be the top priority and, solving the shame of family homelessness.

We can provide homes for all who need them if the political will is there. We can ensure that older people live in dignity and not in fear of homelessness or lack of adequate health care. The General Election in 2020 will give the people of Wicklow the choice to decide who can deliver solutions not just peddle the politics of outrage.

“We need to ensure progress throughout Wicklow, in all our towns and villages. Rural Wicklow and towns such as Wicklow, Arklow, Blessington and Baltinglass can be centres of local employment thus reducing the commuter chaos that is seeing the N/M11 and N81 at a standstill. I hope the people of Wicklow all take part in those decisions that will be made in 2020.”

Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council Frank Curran said “On behalf of Wicklow County Council, I wish the people of Wicklow a peaceful New Year. I will continue to work with my staff and the elected members to enhance the quality of life for citizens and communities throughout the County during 2020. Throughout 2019 we made significant progress on the delivery of social housing. Indeed, over the course of the next two years, we will deliver newly constructed homes for more than 400 families on the Council’s social housing list.

“Urban regeneration projects are underway in Arklow, Wicklow Town and Bray while one in Baltinglass will also commence. Bray will see the new Town Centre opening, bringing a cinema, shops and restaurants in the heart of the town.

“We look forward to major tourism initiatives such as the development of Avondale and Glendalough; the commencement of the Avonmore Footbridge and the Blessington Greenway.”

Cllr Irene Winters, Cathaoirleach of

Wicklow County Council, said “As Cathaoirleach my hopes for the new year are to see the continued roll out of the social housing programme. Almost 300 houses were delivered in County Wicklow in 2019 and double that is the target for 2020. The ongoing need for better Public Transport and a real workable plan to alleviate traffic congestion will also continue to be a top priority for me.

## Vehicles stranded in Wicklow Uplands

Dublin & Wicklow Mountain Rescue Team and Glen of Imaal Mountain Rescue Team were tasked on December 15th to a number of incidents involving stranded vehicles on upland roads in Wicklow.

The incidents occurred on the R759 and R115 that cross the Sally Gap and the L2083 between Laragh and Glenmalur. Near the Shay Elliot Recreational Area, on the L2083, mountain rescue (MR) personnel evacuated 13 people from a stranded bus, and later MR personnel evacuated people from multiple vehicles that became stranded on the R759 and R115.

Both MR teams were operational from approximately 1pm and 8pm on the day assisting members of the public who had fallen foul of wintry weather.

Road conditions on untreated upland roads in

Wicklow were extremely hazardous last week, with widespread sheet ice.

The DWMRT stated last week "To complicate matters, there is very little snow on the ground meaning snow chains are of limited use. Both mountain rescue teams ask - echoing the advice of An Garda Síochána and Wicklow County Council - that people avoid untreated upland roads in Wicklow at the moment. Much of the R759 and R115 are above an altitude of 400m meaning that, even when road conditions are clear elsewhere, these roads can still be extremely difficult to drive safely."

# Education and Training Board is patron for new Greystones school

The Education and Training Board will be the Patron for the new Greystones Second Level school, it was announced last week.

Minister Simon Harris said "I am delighted to announce that the Education and Training Board has been selected to be patron of the new Secondary School in Greystones. I would like to thank all the families who participated in the patronage selection process. Over 800 families participated and more than 50% of these indicated the Education and Training Board as their first preference.

"Greystones has seen a surge in school enrolments not only due to more families living in our community but also more parents choosing to enrol their children in local schools. This announcement will provide peace of mind for many families who have struggled to find a sec-

ond level place for their child. The new school will have a capacity of 800 and will open in Autumn 2020. This is another significant investment in Greystones with the announcement last week that St David's has been given the green light to proceed with their new buildings.

Social Democrats Councillor, Jennifer Whitmore, said "I am very relieved that the decision as to who will run the school has been finally made. It is over 10 weeks since the patronage competition closed and many parents and students have been understandably concerned with the delay in the announcement.

"I have been inundated with parents asking when a decision would be

made, and it's great that this has now happened and parents have some certainty about who will run their child's new school and can see progress being made in setting it up."

Clr Whitmore continued "There will be lots of work to be done to get this school up and running for September 2020. As patrons to a number of excellent schools in the area, including Colaiste Chraobh Abhann in Kilcoole, the KWETB is well placed to get this new school established quickly. I look forward to seeing some fast progress on the establishment of this school as the principal is hired and a new Board of Management is established.

Whitmore said "It's very exciting to have a

new school open in our district and I look forward to working with the new Patron to help in any way I can to ensure a quick and smooth path for its establishment. I would also like to recognise the effort put in by the other patron applicants and their supporters, who worked very hard over the course of a very competitive campaign."

KWETB stated "we are delighted, a thank you to all concerned and to all parents who voted for KWETB. It is a real honour to be able to bring the ETB Secondary School to Greystones ready for academic year 2020." KWETB will be opening enrolments and announcing parents meetings soon.

## Junk to Christmas decorations

Creative students who made Christmas decorations out of junk materials were rewarded at a prize-giving ceremony organised by Wicklow County Council on Tuesday December 17th.

The Christmas Decoration Competition provided students with the opportunity to show their creativity, making decorations with items of junk. The challenge was to produce a decoration from items of waste that would often end up in the bin. Students responded by making decorations as diverse as snowmen, angels, cribs, ornaments for the tree, stars, and candleholders.

Waste items reused included plastic bottles, light bulbs, sweet wrappers, toilet rolls, drink cans, polystyrene and bits of old toys, socks and fabrics. The students showed an amazing ability to see the potential to use items of junk creatively. Winners were presented with their prizes by the Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Irene Winters, and Mr Frank Curran, Chief Executive, at a ceremony in County Buildings.

All prize winners received a family pass to Cool Planet in Enniskerry which provides an interactive workshop on Climate Action, a great way for children to learn about Climate Change and the actions we can all take to reduce our impact. Presenting the prizes, Mr Curran paid tribute to the role young people played in pushing for Climate Action during 2019.

Christmas is the ideal time to take a second look at what we are throwing out. Over 20 per cent of our annual waste is produced at Christmas time. Food waste in particular reaches high levels and Wicklow County Council is encouraging people to avoid wasting food this year through better planning and shopping. The Environmental Awareness Office of Wicklow County Council has produced a recipe book to help use up all those leftovers - including the turkey, ham, cheeses or salmon - and turn them into interesting dishes for the Christmas holiday. ## Bray Boy Eric has deportation order lifted

Young Bray boy Eric Zhi Ying Xue has had the threat of deportation lifted and has his future in Ireland assured.

Speaking after hearing the good news, John Brady TD said "I welcome news this afternoon that Eric is no longer facing the threat of deportation and has had his future in Ireland secured.

"I am in no doubt that the threat to Eric's future in Ireland, the place he was born and in fact, has never left, has been an extremely worrying time for his family. It has been a nightmare for him, for his family and for the community in Bray, and especially all at St. Cronan's Primary School.

"All of this came about due to the 2004 referen-

dum which ended the automatic right of babies born in Ireland to claim citizenship. Sinn Féin were one of few political parties to oppose this at the time. However, the result of that referendum, or any referendum should not blind us from common sense. His family have suffered immeasurably as a result.

"Today is a good day for Eric, for his mother and for all at St. Cronan's Primary School who sprang into action when the deportation order was first served. They are due huge credit for that."

# M11 submission deadline extended as calls for route rethink grow

Friday 13th this year became a day of victory, albeit a small one, for local residents around the proposed new M11 Motorway routes as Wicklow County Council (WCC) confirmed an extension to the deadline for submissions on the N11/M11 upgrade scheme.

After just two weeks of campaigning an estimated 2,000 submissions were received on the new Orange, Pink, Red and Cyan routes planned for the N11.

The news of the extended deadline was welcomed by the locally based volunteer information team helping residents around Delgany, Kilmurray, Ballydonagh, Foxborough and Greystones to understand the colossal scale of the motorway proposals being hatched.

The team, who have set up the Facebook group M11 Friday 13th, estimates that already over 2,000 people have now made submissions to N11M11@ARUP.COM. This huge tally comes after just two weeks of effort and the team says it shows the anger, frustration and opposition among local residents.

The campaign started in early December. With flyers and petitions the teams have taken stands at local church and school Christmas markets, trekked door-to-door for leaflet drops, created social media groups, opened

online petitions, hosted local information evenings, and contacted local Councillors and national TDs.

At people's doors the team has been met with widespread dismay at the proposals and almost total support in calling for a rethink on these proposed new routes. Issues raised by residents included concerns about homes and farms to the wider issues of climate change, public transport, water and air quality and community severance.

The information team stated that "the proposed new routes, which are a departure from previous suggestions, would rip through homes, farms, sporting grounds, heritage trails, and more. They would also decimate local village access in Delgany with the knock on impact on businesses in the village. A further major concern is the impact of new routes on the hydrology in the area. With proposed routes - particularly the Orange and Pink routes, requiring 30m (9 story) to 40m (12 story) deep cuts into the ground over a

wide and long run, the impact on water quality for the wider area could be a cause of major concern."

With little previous experience of this type of community-based campaign, the volunteer team has focused on getting and sharing information so that local residents can inform themselves. The local residents helping out come from groups in Drummin, Ballydonagh, Delgany, Kilmurray, Bellevue, Foxborough Lane and more. These local groups are now joining forces to fight the new 6-lane motorway routes.

However, concerns have also now emerged as residents have learned that flyer-based submissions with a range of multiple-choice options signed by local residents will not be considered.

The information team said "the initially scant information about the routes has since been supplemented with some additional reports now available on the official motorway website. Requests for more information were originally refused and these new reports have

arrived after significant pressure and multiple requests from local residents."

Meanwhile, Stephen Donnelly TD, Wicklow's Town Team and State agencies, met recently to explore a plan to turn the hard shoulder of the N11 into a dedicated bus corridor, as part of a new integrated public transport plan. Deputy Donnelly said "The NTA has now agreed to fund a short term project to see what technical specifications and works are required to turn the hard shoulder into a dedicated bus corridor. Serious safety concerns for cyclists and commuters need to be looked into.

"Critically, this work can be done years ahead of the 2027 proposal. We're also investigating options for park and rides, express bus, and higher rail frequency - both the Dart from Greystones and the line from Arklow through Wicklow Town to Greystones. Again these are being looked at with a view to getting things moving in a much shorter time frame than previously being spoken about.

## Triple triumph for Wicklow Rugby Club

# Plans announced for 598 new homes at Shanganagh

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council in partnership with the Land Development Agency (LDA) have announced plans to deliver 598 new homes at Shanganagh in Shankill.

This partnership enables the Council to fast-track the delivery of much-needed homes. The proposed development will incorporate state-of-the-art sustainable design principles, combining sustainable density, high-quality materials, environment-friendly techniques and dedicated measures to enhance the attractiveness of the development as a place to live for families and individuals, in addition to promoting car-free living to the greatest extent possible given its proximity to quality transport connections.

This significant development will be one of the first projects to be backed by the LDA, which was established by the Government to unlock State land for new homes and improve the supply of new homes throughout Ireland.

It will include (subject to planning permission and the final decision of the Council's elected members): 307 cost-rental homes, which will offer long-term security of tenure to people who struggle to access homes at affordable levels; 200 social homes; 91 affordable purchase homes.

The development is consistent with the Council's ambition to exceed its housing targets and the LDA's mandate to deliver new homes on publicly owned land, helping to address the current supply shortage and to make access to homes

more affordable for both buyers and renters. About half of the proposed development will be devoted to cost rental homes, which is a new form of tenure in Ireland and will result in more affordable rents for households who struggle to pay private rents.

Cathaoirleach of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown, Councillor Shay Brennan commented: "This is excellent news for people looking to buy or rent a home in our area and will make a significant contribution to meeting the Council's social housing requirements and will provide an opportunity for people to purchase or rent a home at an affordable cost. The development will offer people an attractive place to live that is close to key transport links and supported by a wide range of local amenities. We look forward to continuing to work in partnership with the LDA to complete these homes and have people living in them as soon as possible."

LDA Chief Executive John Coleman said: "This landmark development for the LDA is the first of many projects in our pipeline. It will be one of the largest residential construction projects in Ireland and is a major statement of our intent to help renters, buyers and people in need of social housing with large-scale delivery of high-quality new homes. It also points to the effectiveness of the LDA and the potential to

work with local authorities and other public landowner partners.

"This development will offer renters long-term security of tenure while also adding to the supply of social and affordable housing in the Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown area. Its proximity to the planned DART and BusConnects transport options is consistent with our ethos of engendering reduced need for car journeys.

"Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council is an excellent partner and we are grateful to the Council members, its executive team and its staff for the ambition, expertise and co-operation they have brought to getting the project to this stage. This project is an excellent

example of what can be achieved by local authorities and the LDA by working towards our shared goal of delivering more homes."

A planning application will be submitted by the Council to An Bord Pleanála in January.

The proposed development comprises a diverse range of home types and focuses on sustainable density levels. It features a wide range of ancillary facilities including (subject to planning): a crèche to take care of children living at the development; a gym which will be available to all residents; In excess of 1,200 bicycle spaces; a local shop and café to create a sense of community; communal lounge areas, community space and function rooms which can be used for social events and will engender community integration; business

units which will assist tenants who work from home or run small businesses; a central energy centre which provides heating and hot water in the most sustainable and efficient way; concierge and storage facilities for tenants to secure their belongings in a safe manner; electric car charging points from commencement, with all spaces future proofed for additional charging points; shared car facilities; children's play areas.

The site occupies approximately 9 hectares and is zoned for residential development. It is adjacent to Shanganagh Castle, Shanganagh Park and Castle Farm and will be within 5 to 10 minutes' walk of the proposed DART station at Woodbrook and BusConnects route on the nearby Dublin Road (N11).

# Baltinglass designated a Rent Pressure Zone

The Residential Tenancies Board (RTB) has published the quarterly Rent Index for the July-September period (Q3) of 2019. It shows that the Baltinglass Local Electoral Area (LEA) was one of four LEA's around the country that now meet the criteria for being a Rent Pressure Zone.

The RTB Rent Index, which is compiled in conjunction with the Economic and Social Research Institute (ESRI), is the authoritative report on the Irish rental market. It is based on actual rents paid on 21,236 tenancies registered with the RTB in the quarter, which is made up of new housing stock to the rental sector, new tenancies and renewals of existing tenancies.

For an area to be designated as a Rent Pressure Zone, it must meet the following criteria: The annual rate of rent inflation in the area must have been 7% or more in four of the last six quarters;

The rent is above comparison standardised average rent appropriate for that area.

As of Q3 2019, there were seven counties where the standardised average rent exceeds (or equals) €1,000 per month - Cork, Dublin, Galway, Kildare, Louth, Meath and Wicklow.

While Limerick, Carlow and Kilkenny all have a standardised average rent between €900 and €999. The high rental levels in these areas relative to other counties reflect the concentration of demand close to the country's largest employment hubs.

RTB Director, Rosalind

Carroll said "We recognise that affordability continues to be an issue in the rental sector with rents peaking over €1,700 in Dublin despite the increase in housing completions.

"It is also important to be aware that since July 1 the RTB has increased powers to investigate and sanction breaches of rental law. To date, the


RTB currently has 38 investigations in progress.

## Redevelopment of AO Smith site in Bray to commence in 2020

Wicklow Sinn Féin TD John Brady has welcomed confirmation that the derelict AO Smith site on the Boghall Road will be redeveloped next year. Lidl Ireland has confirmed to Deputy Brady that they will start development of a new store on part of the old AO Smith site in June next year.

Deputy Brady said "The AO Smith site on the Boghall Road has unfortunately lain derelict since 2005 when the factory closed with a loss of 140 jobs. Last year Lidl Ireland secured planning permission to develop a new store on the site; however there were concerns in the community that the development wouldn't precede."

"Over the last number of months I have been in contact with Lidl and they have now confirmed that they are committed to developing their new store on the site. They are at detailed design stage and anticipate that work to demolish the old AO Smith factory will commence in June next. The opening of the new Lidl store is expected to take place in early 2021."

"The new Lidl store is the first phase of the redevelopment of the AO Smith site. No planning application has been submitted for the remainder of the site. There is residential zoning on it that could accommodate 120 apartments."

Cllr Dermot O'Brien said "I note that Lidl as the national partner of Jigsaw, the National Centre for Youth Mental Health is committed to supporting that service across the country. I am particularly interested in exploring if the second phase of the development of that site might include a community asset such as a Jigsaw building."

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# HSE urges the public to play its part in reducing infection from flu

The HSE Health Protection Surveillance Centre (HPSC) has asked the public to help prevent the spread of flu, as the latest figures show that the disease is now actively circulating in the community.

"People in high-risk groups need to get vaccinated against flu if they have not done so already" said HPSC director, Dr John Cuddihy. "The ILI (influenza like illness) rate for the week ending 8th December was 37.5 cases per 100,000 population which is above the baseline threshold of 18.1 cases per 100,000, used to assess influenza activity."

Dr Mary O'Meara, Specialist in Public Health Medicine, HSE Dublin South, Kildare & West Wicklow is asking the public to be aware of the symptoms and for those most vulnerable to get the vaccine, stating, "The symptoms of influenza usually develop over a matter of a few hours and

include a high temperature, sore muscles, dry cough, headache and sore throat. This is different from the common cold, which tends to come on more gradually and usually includes a runny nose and a normal temperature.

"The flu vaccine is a safe and effective prevention measure against flu and it is provided free of charge for people in at risk groups, which includes everyone aged 65 years and over, pregnant women, anyone over six months of age with a long term illness requiring regular medical follow-up such as chronic lung disease, chronic heart disease, diabetes, cancer or those with lower immunity due to disease or treat-

ment. The vaccine is also recommended for all healthcare workers to protect themselves and those they care for."

Vaccination remains the most effective means of preventing infection by seasonal influenza viruses and can reduce severe disease that can lead to hospitalisation and death. The vaccine takes two weeks to take effect once received.

Anyone who gets flu should stay at home, rest, drink plenty of fluids and use over-the-counter remedies like paracetamol to ease symptoms. Anyone in one of the at-risk groups who develops flu symptoms or anyone who is not in an at-risk group, but whose flu

symptoms are severe or getting worse, should contact their GP. GPs may wish to prescribe antiviral medication for patients in these categories. If you need to visit your GP or the Emergency Department, please phone first to explain that you might have flu.

Covering your cough and sneeze can also help stop the spread of flu. Use a tissue and place it immediately in the bin. Wash your hands or use a hand sanitizer. If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve. Don't cough or sneeze into your hands. If you do, wash your hands immediately. This is to prevent spreading germs on the surfaces you touch.

## What a difference a year makes

**Aisling O'Brien, aged 44, lost 3 stone in less than a year. Aisling joined Slimming World in March 2019 after becoming increasingly unhappy with her size.**

By the time this picture was taken, I had been avoiding mirrors for a while and was wearing loose clothes. At this stage I was heading for the heaviest I had ever been. My family and friends are amazed at how much I can eat and still lose weight. I love, with

food optimising, that I am never hungry and there are endless food options. Before I started food optimising; I had become very bored with the food I was eating. This led to grazing on snacks. I enjoy eating all types of food, but just did not know what to cook. Food optimising provided me with the opportunity and information to cook beautiful, tasty and healthy dishes, my favourite and go to meals are Spaghetti Bolognese and Caribbean Pepper Pot."

Aisling lost four pounds in her first week and was blown away that the changes she'd made had such a big impact so quickly. Initially she did not feel able to exercise.

When Aisling lost her first stone, she felt able to take up an exercise class and did not feel as self-conscious as she was more physically able to participate, she has much more energy now and doesn't get those afternoon slumps anymore.

Her Consultant says she is so proud of Aisling: "She has grown and soared in confidence as she has lost the weight. Aisling is an inspiration to everyone in our group and I hope she inspires other women and men to change their lives in the same way."

Only give your waste to Collectors who have a valid Waste Collection Permit. Always ask to see the Waste Collection Permit. Always note the Waste Collection Number on the Waste Collection Permit.

The Waste Collection Permit will display the Waste Collector's Name, Address and Waste Collection Permit Number. The vehicle should clearly show the Name of the Waste Collection Permit Holder and the Waste Collection Permit number.

It is a criminal offence to give waste to a unauthorised collector. Penalties upon conviction can be up to €5,000 and/or 12 months imprisonment

## Helping young brain injury survivors rebuild their lives

**Be a STEP AHEAD in 2020 with Acquired Brain Injury Ireland's national vocational assessment initiative designed to help young people return to work or education after brain injury.**

According to the national brain injury rehabilitation charity, returning to work after a brain injury can be extremely daunting, not least because many people experience difficulties with fatigue, memory and confidence after their injury.

With centres in Cork and Dublin, Acquired Brain Injury Ireland's new STEP AHEAD initiative has proven extremely successful at the end of its first year in supporting participants aged 18-29 years old with practical strategies to overcome obstacles returning to work or college. An estimated 19,000 brain injuries are acquired annually in Ireland from causes such as stroke, road traffic accidents, falls and assault.

Senior Occupational Therapist with the Step Ahead programme in Cork, Sinead Stack said: "Following a brain injury, there are so many steps involved in returning to education or employment and Step Ahead is here to help you. Throughout 2019 we have seen individuals make incredible progress in areas such as managing fatigue at work, memory strategies, and the number one area everybody struggles with - building confidence! There's no time like the present to set your New Year's resolution and sign up for STEP AHEAD to maximise your potential."

Through the STEP AHEAD programme many participants work on goals including CV development, confidence building, interview skills, organisational skills, interpersonal skills and how to advo-

cate employers for supports they need.

Ms Stack continued: "When you join STEP AHEAD, you will complete a vocational assessment which informs a personal vocational plan just for you. In this plan we outline the steps needed to achieve your personal goal whether you want to return to education or build confidence to start your career journey. Our STEP AHEAD programme is here to help you develop practical strategies and supports so you can reach your goal of working or learning. We also help people return to work in a previous role and provide advice to employers on how to accommodate an employee returning to work after a brain injury."

STEP AHEAD is co-funded by the Government of Ireland and the European Social Fund as part of the ESF Programme for Employability, Inclusion and Learning 2014-2020. The programme is designed to equip young brain injury survivors with the skills to proactively engage in job searching and to self-advocate their needs to employers and third level education bodies.

An estimated 40 percent of people with traumatic and non-traumatic brain injuries can return to work after one- or two-years post injury. But according to Acquired Brain Injury Ireland, many brain injury survivors attempt to return to work too soon, without the necessary supports and the effort fails once the impact of the injury is apparent.

Emer Duffy, Senior Occupational Therapist with Step Ahead Dublin also stressed the impact of brain injury and the need for positive support to help young people rebuild their lives. She added: "Brain injuries can happen in the blink of an eye. When it happens, it turns your life upside down, often interrupting your career or education. After a brain injury, an individual's brain is often working harder than someone who hasn't gone through such a trauma and so that can cause fatigue, memory problems, frustration and stress. So while people with brain injury can often look fine on the outside, inside they may be experiencing problems which impact on their day to day lives. Our vocational assessments are vital to identify a person's strengths and needs so they can learn strategies to cope with stresses that might occur when returning to work or education."

Ms Duffy concluded: "Like any rehabilitation programme, it's important to say that there are no quick fixes and it takes time to work on goals. But very positively, the results are worth it. We have clients who have successfully transitioned into part-time work, volunteering and education. That could be you."

STEP AHEAD is a national service and Acquired Brain Injury Ireland has two teams located in Dublin and Cork. Anyone wishing to take part must be aged between 18 and 29 years and have sustained a brain injury. ## 'New childcare scheme means Wicklow families receive subsidies quickly'

Minister Simon Harris has encouraged all parents in Co. Wicklow to apply directly for subsidies to meet the cost of quality early learning and care for school age childcare at [www.ncs.gov.ie](http://www.ncs.gov.ie). So far 207 Wicklow families have been awarded under the scheme.

The scheme, under the guidance of Children's Minister Katherine Zappone, means financial supports can be used with any participating Tusla registered, early learning and care and school age childcare service, including Tusla registered childminders.

The scheme's innovative, purpose-built IT system aims to process a universal application in a matter of minutes, and an income assessed application in a matter of days.

As of December 10th, a

total of 277 applications have been received in Co. Wicklow from parents, with 207 awards issued. More than 8,000 awards have been issued nationwide in three weeks with applications processing smoothly and quickly.

"Under the National Childcare Scheme, families will be supported to meet the cost of quality early learning and care and school age childcare through a system of universal and income-related subsidies. Using a verified MyGovID account, I

encourage families to apply directly for subsidies at [www.ncs.gov.ie](http://www.ncs.gov.ie).

"Additional funding provided under Budget 2019 ensures that an estimated 7,500 additional children will benefit from the scheme, with over 40,000 other children, already eligible, seeing increases to their subsidies.

"Income based subsidies are available to families with reckonable household incomes of up to 60,000 which can translate into as much as over 90,000 gross for families in certain specific circumstances," Minister Harris concluded.

## Additional funding for seven new courses at IT Carlow

Institute of Technology Carlow is to receive €723,000 for 77 additional places across seven of its newest courses.

The announcement was made this morning by Minister of State for Higher Education Mary Mitchell O'Connor T.D., as she released the results of the call for additional places on undergraduate courses under Pillar 2 of the Human Capital Initiative that will provide for almost 3,000 additional places on 138 courses, to commence in Autumn 2020 and 2021.

The seven courses at Institute of Technology Carlow that will receive funding for additional places are: Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Creative Computing and Digital Innovation; Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Cybercrime and IT Security; Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Computing in Interactive Digital Art and Design; Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Brewing and Distilling; Bachelor of Science in Digital Marketing with Analytics; Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Digital Marketing with Analytics; Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) in Mechanical Engineering.

The Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Creative Computing and Digital Innovation is delivered at the Institute's Wexford Campus; the remaining courses are delivered at the Carlow campus of Institute of Technology Carlow.

Welcoming the announcement, Dr. Patricia Mulcahy, President of Institute of Technology Carlow said, "This morning's announcement by Minister Mitchell O'Connor is a further endorsement of our newest courses at both Carlow and Wexford campuses. Institute of Technology Carlow prides itself on developing and providing an undergraduate course portfolio that is both diverse and relevant and, because we engage with a broad range of partners in industry, provides every opportunity for employability and career success".

The additional student places represent an allocation of over €24 million from the Human Capital Initiative, which is a key part of the Enhancing Skills and Developing and Attracting Talent Pillar of Future Jobs Ireland. They will address identified key areas of enterprise skills needs and are provided through increased and incentivised provision in full time undergraduate provision.

## BirdWatch Ireland concerned with MickKinnon forestry report

**BirdWatch Ireland, headquartered in Kilcoole, says it is 'very concerned with the shortcomings of a newly published external review of the forestry licence approval process', carried out by Mr James MacKinnon CBE, on behalf of Andrew Doyle TD, Minister of State for Food, Forestry and Horticulture.**

BirdWatch Ireland say that "The review does not sufficiently address the root causes of the backlog in afforestation license approvals".

The review was carried out by Mr James Mackinnon, CBE, former Senior Planner with the Scottish Government and was commissioned by Minister Doyle, following a similar review in Scotland carried out by M. Mackinnon.

Minister Doyle said "The Government has set some ambitious targets for the forestry sector not least in the Climate Action Plan and I commissioned this review to ensure that collectively we are fit for purpose to help deliver these targets. I would like to thank James for his comprehensive report and for delivering it in such a timely fashion. I know that he met with a long list of industry stakeholders, the Environmental Pillar, Department staff and other interest groups during his time in Ireland. I am grateful for their time and constructive input which will no doubt add import and relevance of these findings."

Mr Mackinnon was commissioned to examine the process for approving afforestation proposals and the linked issues for other forestry related operations. His remit was to make recommendations on issues identified which would improve the process, taking account of his experience with the Scottish forestry system.

Minister Doyle added "I would encourage all stakeholders to take the time to study this report carefully and I and my Department will do likewise. It contains a number of important recommendations on which we all need to reflect. Implementation of the Plan is now a priority. I propose to publish a detailed implementation plan early in January next after discussions with stakeholders on the Forestry Programme Implementation group".

BirdWatch Ireland stated that "Irish afforestation policy and its licensing and approvals system must be set in the context of Ireland's declared state of climate and biodiversity emergency (Dáil Éireann May 2019). The review has done little to

address BirdWatch Ireland's concerns relating to biodiversity protection or public participation as they relate to forestry. In reality several of the report recommendations further entrench the view that these important public concerns are just red tape that should be bypassed instead as being seen as the foundations for a sustainable future and wellbeing of communities.

"The report itself rightly highlights the Government's failure to address environmental issues and highlights inadequate expertise and resourcing as contributing factors to the current backlog in approvals.

"But the recommendations do not go far enough to address other fundamental issues which include concerns relating to the current unsustainable model of forestry.

"The suggestion that the public should have to pay fees to make observations on applications would also do more harm than good as it would limit public participation in the process potentially rendering communities voiceless on afforestation in their own areas.

"Current government afforestation policy is a major threat to several bird species especially ground nesting birds which occur outside of Special Protection Areas including Hen Harrier, Skylark and Curlew and riverine species like Freshwater Pearl Mussel.

"According to research carried out by BirdWatch Ireland current afforestation policy is failing to include basic environmental safeguards required by Irish and EU law for High Nature Value farmland, breeding birds and threatened habitats protected under the Birds Directive and Habitats Directive. It also needs to address the issues with the planting of trees on peat soils that are already carbon stores."

Fintan Kelly, Policy Officer at BirdWatch Ireland said "Increasing forest cover in Ireland has the potential to deliver positive social and environmental benefits but the reality is that the current approach is resulting in a situation where the sector is one of the leading drivers of biodiversity loss and is a significant pressure on water quality".

Mr Kelly added "The right trees need to be planted in the right place with the right management to safeguard carbon stores, protect biodiversity and meet our legal obligations.

"BirdWatch Ireland's report 'Greening Irish Forestry' provides a vision for nature-friendly forestry in Ireland".

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# College choice - a different pathway with BIFE

While in many cases students, schools and parents see the CAO as the 'be all and end all' for those seeking third level education, nothing could be further from the truth according to Gabriel Allen, deputy principal at Bray Institute of Further Education (BIFE).

"Over recent years many new avenues have opened up to students to enable them pursue their dream career via a different route."

He added, "Further Education offers a learner, who may not have achieved the required CAO points, the opportunity to gain advanced entry onto honours degree programmes, both in Ireland and abroad."

## SuperValu commit to keeping Little Bray store open

John Brady TD has welcomed confirmation that SuperValu are committed to keeping their store on Castle Street in Little Bray open. There have been concerns that it would close following the opening of their new store on the Southern Cross which is due to open next summer.

Speaking after getting the confirmation Deputy Brady said "Following confirmation last week that Supervalu would be the tenants in the new supermarket that is currently under construction on the Southern Cross, there has been considerable concern the Little Bray store would close. Whilst I'm absolutely delighted that after many years of pushing to get services onto the Southerncross, the construction of the new 2,493sqm Supervalu supermarket did raise concerns about the store on Castle Street. This week the confirmation that I have from Supervalu that they intend on operating the 2 stores in Bray is a relief to the staff and the community of Little Bray."

Cllr Grace McManus said "There was real fear that the Castle Street store might close because Supervalu are going to open a larger store on the Southern Cross. There are a lot of elderly people in the area and they are particularly happy with the news it's not closing and that they don't have to travel far to get to the local supermarket."
