NO 'GREEN' LIGHT FOR N11

The tens of thousands of Wicklow commuters stuck in the traffic nightmare on the N11 every morning and night will be concerned at recent statements by the Green Party on the proposed upgrade of the N11/M11, according to Independent councillor and general election candidate, Joe Behan.

"The Greens want to halt or delay any proposed upgrading of the carriageway thus prolonging the agony of families who are forced to endure long hours apart because it takes so long to get to and from work in Dublin every day," he said.

"While I don't doubt the sincerity of the Greens in their reasons for seeking to delay the project, I believe it is not in the interests of the hard-pressed Wicklow commuters and they should reconsider their position on this major issue for the county."

"It is also a disgrace that the ultimate decision

on this project will be made by An Bord Pleanála not by local councillors. I cannot accept that the people currently stuck in their cars now in 2020 should suffer any further unnecessary delays in upgrading the capacity of the N11/M11."

"Greystones Green Party Councillor Lourda Scott said "Given the



environmental sensitivity and importance of the area we are also asking that all necessary environmental impact assessments be produced for each proposed route to enable the public to be fully informed of the likely environmental damage before being asked to select preferred road options. We would like to see Wicklow County Council take the lead by assessing the carbon footprint of the Phase 2 options and demonstrating how any of the proposed options will reduce transport emissions contributing to climate change."

Clr Matthews concluded: "It seems apparent from this week's meeting that most parties just want the road built regardless of the environmental consequences or the fact that widening a road will do nothing for the

commuters of Wicklow." There was not much enthusiasm for Cllr Matthews' proposal from Fine Gael or Fianna Fail councillors. Cllr Derek Mitchell (FG) said he was "reluctant" to postpone Phase 2, and Cllr Pat Fitzgerald (FF) said he was against any deferral. "Sixty percent of the working population in Arklow are commuting. The people I represent don't want any deferral on the project," he said.

Cllr Gerry Walsh (FF) agreed that postponing it would "send out the wrong message".

Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council, Frank Curran said he did not recommend postponing it as it would mean "We would go back to the end of the queue".

Clr Behan, said he was against any delay:

Life saving 'Message in a Bottle' idea from Wicklow Lions

Members of Wicklow and District Lions Club say they are very proud to be part of the National Lions project called 'Message in a Bottle'.

'Message in a Bottle' is a simple idea that encourages people to keep their basic personal and medical details in a common place, for example in their fridge, where in cases of emergency, the emergency teams can easily access them and possibly save their lives.

The information required is very basic but necessary. The personal information form is self-explanatory; however one may like to ask a relative,

friend, neighbour or carer to assist in completing the form.

The bottle which is normally kept in the fridge or press, can then be located by the attending service. They quickly read the vital information on the form and act accordingly.

The bottles are available free of charge from any Lions member throughout the district or from pharmacies, garda stations, the fire service, first responders, doctors surgeries, etc.

Whilst it is focused on the more vulnerable people in a community, anyone can have an accident in the home, so this scheme can benefit anyone.

Message in a Bottle is now also available to golfers. A metal disc /tag is placed on the golf bag to indicate that a bottle is contained in the top pocket of the golf bag, proving once again how much a life saving idea this is, created by Lions.

Just seven IDA visits

There were just seven IDA site visits to Co. Wicklow in the whole of 2018 and the first three quarters of 2019, according to data released in response to a Parliamentary Question. This makes Wicklow the joint second lowest in terms of site visits from the direct investment agency.

Labour General Election candidate, Cllr Paul O'Brien from Wicklow Municipal District, has said it's time for the IDA to "get away from their bubble in Dublin".

In 2018 there was just one IDA site visit to Co. Wicklow, the fewest in the whole country, and there were six in the first three quarters of 2019. IDA site visits to Co. Wicklow over this period amounted to less than one percent of the total of IDA site visits around the country. Over 40 percent of site visits were to Dublin. Details of the number of site visits for the whole of 2019 will be available soon.

Wexford, Longford and Monaghan also received just seven IDA site visits during this time period, while Roscommon has the least amount with just five site visits.

The matter was raised at last week's meeting of

Wicklow County Council by Labour General Election candidate Paul O'Brien. Chief Executive Frank Curran said he will pass on Cllr O'Brien's concerns to the IDA.

"Over the years it is very clear that Wicklow has been consistently let down by the IDA," Cllr O'Brien recently stated after seeing the figures. "Wicklow has poor public transport, clogged infrastructure, and job losses being announced.

We need the IDA visiting and promoting Wicklow. We live in one of the most diverse, scenic, and educated counties in the country, yet we have been consistently let down. I'm calling on my fellow councillors and our TDs to park our political differences, to work together and do what is right for everyone in our county. We should be collectively demanding that the IDA get down here, away from their bubble in

Dublin, and get working on bringing jobs to Wicklow."

The Parliamentary Question came from Fianna Fail Deputy Aindrias Moynihan, who asked the Minister for Business, Enterprise and Innovation the number of IDA visits by county, in tabular form; and if she will make a statement on the matter.

In response, Minister Humphreys said "Regional development is a key priority for my Department. We understand the importance of achieving the best possible spread of employment and investment across the country and we have been working hard towards that goal. Significant progress has already been made, with 58% of all IDA client-supported employment now located outside of Dublin. This figure represents the highest such figure in the history of the Agency. Our aim

"Tens of thousands of people are struggling to get home to their families because of the N11. It's not good enough to say that we're going to delay this. Parents are away from home 12 hours a day. I won't agree with stopping the process."

After last week's meeting Cllr

Mitchell said "Councillors did not want to 'postpone' the N11 study as the Green Party wanted at Monday's council meeting. The problem is urgent and the study has already been redirected in 2019 to study public transport more. The Council's Transport Committee will, next Monday, hear from the Study chiefs about the new objectives."

BUS EIREANN CEO QUESTIONED OVER 133 RELIABILITY

Bus Eireann CEO Stephen Kent has acknowledged the problems with the much maligned 133 bus route service and is hopeful that a new timetable will help to improve the service.

Mr Kent and other representatives from Bus Eireann attended last week's meeting of Wicklow County Council to give a presentation and take questions from councillors, who voiced strong criticism of the reliability of the 133 service.

Mr Kent admitted that the company "have not been delivering an optimal customer experience" with the 133. "We recognise there are issues of punctuality on the route," he said, "due to increased traffic congestion in the Greater Dublin Area. Traffic congestion has been the biggest bugbear for us."

He noted that there have been differences of 18-20 minutes between the timetable and real time, according to equipment on the busses which monitor time between stops.

However he maintained that 98% of journeys were delivered on the 133 last year, a figure which Cathoirleach Irene Winters said she found "hard to believe".

The 133, which makes 300 trips per week between Wicklow Town and Dublin Airport, is the most complained about of all Bus Eireann's routes, receiving 889 complaints

per 100,000 passengers in 2018 (compared to an average of 40 complaints per 100,000 passengers on the company's other routes).

Mr Kent said that the company has "great ambition to improve the service", and plans to implement a new timetable on March 22nd.

He said that the company has "spent months with the National Transport Authority" devising the new timetable, and believes it will be "more reliable and more efficient, informed by the data we have collected".

Included in the changes will be increased frequency in the morning and evening at peak times to every 20 minutes instead of every 30 minutes, and the service will run from 5am to midnight.

Speaking at last week's meeting, Social Democrats General Election candidate Jennifer Whitmore described the 133 service as "a huge problem".

"Something has to be done, people have had to change their jobs or buy a new car because they couldn't rely on the 133. Hopefully the new plans will achieve improvements." Cllr Whitmore also called for the 133 to be extended to Aughrim.

Cllr Mary Kavanagh, who recently submitted a petition to Bus Eireann with over a thousand signatures calling for improvements to the 133, said last week: "Here in Wicklow town the bus service is vital; we have no Dart, we have no Luas. People are dependent on the bus for college, work, hospital appointments, and they are at the end of their tether. One of the comments included in the petition was from a woman who said that her husband's mental health was being affected from being constantly late."

West Wicklow councillors used the opportunity last week to complain about the bus stop at Hollywood Cross, which some drivers acknowledge and others don't. The Bus Eireann officials explained that the stop is not an official designated stop but that the company will enter dialogue with the NTA to make it one.

Cathaoirleach of the Baltinglass Municipal District Gerry O'Neill said that the stop has been there for a long time but that "it's hit and miss as to whether the driver stops there. It seems to depend on the driver and whether or not he wants to stop."

Speaking after last

week's meeting, Councillor Avril Cronin said "As a commuter and a regular on the 132 bus, I am frustrated with the ongoing issue regarding the stop at Hollywood. Traditionally, the Bus Eireann 132 route has always stopped at Hollywood Cross, which has become a vital service for many in Hollywood and surrounding areas. Recently an issue has occurred with the bus route and the bus is no longer stopping at Hollywood. This is a major loss to Hollywood and surrounding areas such as Valleymount and Dunlavin."

"I have raised the issue on numerous occasions and have asked both Bus Eireann and Wicklow Council to ensure that Hollywood becomes an official stop on the 132 Bus Route. Living in West Wicklow we lack public transport. We do not have the luxury of a train service, a luas line or even a frequent bus service, in fact we don't even have a motorway. Many people have become reliant on the 132 bus which services areas along the N81 from Bunclody to Dublin City Centre, stopping at Tallaght Hospital on route."

'Additional capacity needed for rail commuters'

John Brady TD has argued the case with the Minister for Transport, Shane Ross, for additional Irish Rail capacity for commuters on the Dublin-Rosslare line.

Raising the matter in the Dáil, Deputy Brady said: "Every day Wicklow commuters traveling into Dublin for work face overcrowded trains with barely enough room to stand, let alone sit down. This overcrowding is forcing commuters off public transport and into their cars leading to major traffic on the N11."

"We know from the 2016 Census that 1,750 people from Arklow and 4,339 people from Wicklow Town commute to Dublin on a daily basis for work yet, this is not reflected in the train service provided. There are only five train services through Wicklow to Dublin daily and the train times are awkward for commuters with only two morning trains between 6am and 7am."

"At a time when people are being encouraged to use public transport and when many are prepared to make changes and do their bit for climate change, they simply cannot do so in Wicklow. We know that Irish Rail have ordered 41 carriages which will arrive in 2021 however, it does not appear that any of these carriages will be used to provide additional capacity on the Dublin/Rosslare line. This is completely unacceptable."

"I have met with and asked Irish Rail directly to extend the Short Hop Zone to Arklow to allow commuters to avail of the leap card fares yet, I am told they cannot for fear more people would use the train and they cannot cater for any more passengers. This is madness. We need to see additional capacity on the Dublin/Rosslare line urgently. Minister Ross must begin prioritising public transport over motorways and invest in a proper public transport system," concluded Deputy Brady.

'Nine health care centres are a massive investment in local health care services'

In advance of the general election Minister for Health Simon Harris TD outlined the progress by Fine Gael in delivering Primary Health Care in Wicklow since 2011

Minister Harris said "Since Fine Gael went into government in 2011 four Primary Care Centres - Blessington, Wicklow, Newtownmountkennedy and South Wicklow have opened."

"County Wicklow will have another five Primary Care Centres in the next few years: Construction of the Bray Primary Care Centre is nearly complete. Equipping the building will commence in March with the centre due to be operational in summer 2020; Construction of the Baltinglass Primary Care Centre will be complete in Summer 2020, and the centre will be operational in Q3 2020; Construction of the Rathdrum Primary Care Centre are imminent with the developer informing the HSE that works are planned to commence on site this month.

"The Arklow Primary Care Centre received a conditional grant of planning in December 2019 and a final grant of planning is due by the end of January 2020 and works are scheduled to commence in 2020.


"The HSE and Wicklow County Council are working on a masterplan for the development of the Greystones Primary Care Centre on council owned lands. The Council have confirmed to the HSE that a Primary Care Centre will be allowed for in the master plan.

"Delivery and investment of Primary Care in Wicklow has been and remains a major priority for me. Nine Primary Care Centres in Wicklow since 2011 is a remarkable transformation and a huge investment in County Wicklow frontline services.

"Fine Gael's work in fixing the economy has allowed increased investment in local health services and I am seeking Wicklow people's number 1 vote to ensure this progress continues."

Property prices up by €5,000

Property prices in Wicklow have increased by €5,000 in the last quarter, according to the latest MyHome.ie Property Report.

The report for Q4 2019 shows that the median asking price for a property in the county has gone up to €335,000 from €330,000 in Q3. It also increased by €15,000 compared to this time last year. This is the highest price recorded since Q4 2010.

The asking prices for 3-bed semi-detached houses in the county have fallen by €5,000 this quarter, to €320,000. However, prices for this house type have increased by €21,000 compared to this time last year, when they stood at €299,000.

Meanwhile, the asking price for a 4-bed semi-detached house in Wicklow have gone up by €10,000 in the last quarter, and now stand at €435,000. The price went up by €60,000 compared to this time last year.

The number of properties

for sale in Wicklow on MyHome.ie decreased by 25% in the last quarter and by 14% compared to this time last year.

The average time for a property to go sale agreed in the county after being placed up for sale now stands at nearly 5 months.

The author of the report, Conall MacCoille, Chief Economist at Davy, said that the slowdown in house price inflation was to be welcomed and was inevitable given stretched affordability.

"Central Bank rules have stopped first-time buyers taking out too much mortgage debt and should lead to more realistic asking prices. Our analysis shows that the average residential transaction in Ireland (€292,000) is now 6.8x the average income of €43,000. This is only slightly below the UK's

ratio of 7x. This is the first time since 2012 that Ireland's house-price-to-income ratio has declined.

"While there has been a 13% fall in new instructions to sell and an 11% drop in the total number of homes listed for sale, there are positives in the market. Mortgage lending to first-time buyers is up 15% in the first three quarters and transaction volumes in the €300,000-€400,000 price range are up 7% in the capital," he said.

"It is also encouraging to see homebuilding completions rose above 20,000 for the first time in the 12 months to September, and housing starts went above 26,000."

Angela Keegan, Managing Director of MyHome.ie, said it was welcome that clarity was emerging regarding Brexit and Central Bank mort-

gage lending rules. "For most of the year, we understandably saw prospective purchasers being reluctant to take the plunge due to these two unresolved issues, leading to sluggish house price inflation. The clarity we now have will likely lead to more settled price expectations and a stabilisation of residential transactions in 2020."

"It remains to be seen how the Central Bank's decision to keep mortgage rules unchanged and indeed Brexit will affect the Irish market in the long term, but at least now purchasers can plan without being fearful of any sudden shocks."

According to daft.ie's q4 Report FOR 2019, prices in Co. Wicklow in the final quarter of 2019 were 4% lower than a year previously, compared to a rise of 6% seen a year ago.

Wicklow's young scientists awarded

Wicklow students were awarded at the BT Young Scientist and Technology Exhibition awards ceremony. The young scientists who are students at Gerard's and Avondale Community School impressed the judges and took home 3 awards from the Social & Behavioural Sciences and Chemical, Physical & Mathematical Sciences categories. A total number of 10 projects represented Wicklow at the exhibition this year.

Cormac Harris and Alan O'Sullivan, both aged 16, fourth year students from Coláiste Choilm, Cork, have taken home the top prize for a project entitled "A statistical investigation into the prevalence of gender stereotyping in 5-7 year olds and the development of an initiative to combat gender bias". The coveted prize was presented to the winners this evening in the BT Arena by Minister for Education and Skills, Joe McHugh TD, and Managing Director of BT Ireland, Shay Walsh. Cormac and Alan presented their project in the Intermediate section in the Social and Behavioural Sciences category.

Head Judge of the Social and Behavioural Sciences Group category, Professor Joe Barry said about Cormac and Alan's project, 'Despite awareness of the lower percentage of females relative to males pursuing study and careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM), we still do not understand exactly why this is the case.'

The aim of Cormac and Alan's project was to determine how early gender stereotyping can be identified. They conducted workshops with 376 5-7 year olds from a range of school settings with a number of different tasks including: choosing between gender-specific and gender-neutral toys; drawing and naming an engineer, and; rating male and female competency at a number of gender-specific roles. One of the most striking findings emerging from the research was that 96% of boys drew a male engineer while just over 50% of girls drew a female engineer. This, along with the other data, indicates that gender stereotypes emerge in young children and that they are particularly strong among boys. Cormac and Alan's findings are important as intervention typically focusses on girls, but the project recognises the need to focus on all children, boys and girls, from a young age, in order to combat the development of gender stereotyping. The project is particularly impressive in that Cormac and Alan also created very pertinent and useable resources for primary school teachers to combat gender stereotyping among young children.'

The 2020 BT Young Scientist & Technology winners received the BYSTE perpetual trophy and the top prize of €7,500. The lucky winners will also represent Ireland at the European Union Contest for Young Scientists, which takes place in Santander, Spain in September 2020. Cormac and Alan will also get to attend the 62nd Annual London International Youth Science Forum later in the year.

Rathnew content creation hub gets €1.43m funding

A content creation hub planned for the Wicklow County Campus in Rathnew has secured funding of €1.43m under the Government's Regional Enterprise Development Fund (REDF).

The funding was announced last week by the Minister for Business, Enterprise and Innovation, Ms Heather Humphreys TD.

The Content Creation Enterprise Hub will provide 10,000 sq ft of private and co-working spaces and is hoped will boost job creation in the content creation sector and spin out services feeding into these industries.

It will also offer a collaborative social space, conference centre, podcast studio and screening facility along with access to a range of existing meeting rooms and training facilities on the larger Clermont campus.

The hub will incorporate the Courtyard buildings, the second floor of the existing campus building and the Chapel which will be refurbished and renovated. It will also include a newly built two floor extension to the Courtyard buildings.

Mr Frank Curran, Chief Executive, Wicklow County Council, said: "We welcome the announcement by the Minister of the approval of our application. This is a really positive development for Wicklow County

Campus. It's also positive for the future growth of a strong local screen industry. Stakeholders and development agencies as well as training providers in this sector have been widely consulted and are extremely supportive of this innovative project. We're aiming to start construction this year in order to open the hub in 2021".

The Regional Enterprise Development Fund aims to support projects that drive sustainable job creation in the regions. Twenty-six successful applicants representing all regions of the country have been approved for funding of over €40m.

Minister Humphreys said: "The Irish economy has had a remarkable turnaround in recent years, but we cannot rest on our laurels. Although we have made a lot of progress with six out of 10 jobs created outside Dublin since 2016, some parts of the country are not recovering as quickly as others."

"The Regional Enterprise Development Fund is about supporting every region to build on its unique strengths and ultimately create sustainable jobs. Collaboration is at its core - among the public and private sectors, within and across regions."

"The projects we are funding today are at the cutting edge of innovation. I am confident that they have the potential to make a real and lasting impact on enterprise development at both regional and national level."

CANDIDATES ADVISED TO AVOID POLITICAL JARGON

With the general election set for Saturday 8th February, we will be hearing a lot more about fresh mandates, manifestos, swing voters, fiscal space, building an Ireland for all and a future to look forward to.

In response to all this jargon, the National Adult Literacy Agency (NALA) have a 'Plain English Guide' to the way politicians and political commentators speak.

It explains the well-worn phrases used in election campaigns that are often misunderstood, such as the hustings, tallyman and marginal seat.

"Politics is awash with terms and phrases that are beloved of commentators and politicians alike. That's why we wrote this guide - to help people to better understand what is being said. But we also encourage political parties to use less jargon and to be more aware of the issues faced by the 1 in 6 adults with literacy difficulties in Ireland. While political jargon allows politicians to talk about issues in a quicker, coded way, it can also act as a real barrier for people accessing information," said Dr Inez Bailey, NALA CEO.

explained from NALA's Plain English Guide to Political Terms.

Bandwagon effect: The tendency for a popular candidate or proposal to gather even more support simply because they appear to be winning; also called the "snowball effect".

Canvassing: Trying to win votes by contacting voters directly, for example, by going door to door.

Mandate: The authority to represent people's interests and take action on their behalf.

Manifesto: A document stating a political party's values, goals and intended actions.

Quota: The number of votes that a candidate needs to win a seat under the proportional representation (PR) system.

Swing voter: A person who votes, but whose support can switch from one political party to another, depending on the issue at stake.

Jargon: What's out for the election

- **Drive:** Politicians shouldn't 'drive' anything out (unless it is cattle) or 'foster' (unless it is children).
- **Slimming down** (processes don't diet)
- **Deliver** (pizzas, post and services are delivered - not abstract concepts like 'improvements' or 'priorities')
- **Key** (unless it unlocks something. A subject/thing isn't 'key' - it's probably 'important')
- **Strengthening** (unless it's strengthening bridges or other structures)
- **Tackling** (unless it is rugby, football or some other sport)
- **Going forward** (unlikely we are giving travel directions)

Here is a selection of some of the political phrases

This plain English guide focuses on political terms as part of NALA's ongoing campaign on literacy and political participation. The National Adult Literacy Agency (NALA) is seeking the support of all political parties for greater action on adult basic education - literacy, numeracy and digital skills. Specifically we are seeking the following commitments in their manifestos:

- Develop and implement a 10 year Whole-of-Government Strategy for adult literacy, numeracy and digital skills (to provide opportunities for those with the least education)
- Enact a Plain Language Bill to require that all information for the public from government and State bodies is written and presented in plain language (so that those with low literacy levels can access public information).



al attitudes and experiences might affect their helping role with a person at risk.

Participants will feel challenged and safe, work interactively with others in small groups, learn a suicide first aid model that provides a framework for skills practice and experience powerful audio visuals. Attendance at the full two days is mandatory.

ASIST helps people apply suicide first aid in lots of different settings - with family, friends, co-workers and in more formal helping relationships. Benefits can be found in everyday situations, professional work or volunteering.

Planning application for new Greystones Coastguard Station lodged

Minister Simon Harris TD has welcomed the news that the office of Public Works has lodged plans with the County Council for the redevelopment of the coastguard station in Greystones.

Minister Harris said "My colleague the Minister for Public Works confirmed that it has finalised revised plans for the redevelopment of the coastguard station and have lodged them with the local authority.

"I have been pursuing this issue since I was in the Department of Public Works. The Greystones Coastguard do great work and provide a great service for our community.

"In parallel to the planning application work is continuing by the OPW on putting the construction works out to tender. The Minister for OPW expects construction to get underway in the last half of 2020 and that these works will take approximately 14 months. This will then allow for the refurbishment of Greystones Garda Station to get underway."

New report provides first national picture of Local Authority climate actions

A new report launched last Tuesday outlines for the first time the range of actions local authorities have undertaken nationally to tackle climate change and to promote climate action within their communities.

The research, carried out by the Local Government Management Agency (LGMA) on behalf of the County and City Management Association (CCMA) has found that half of all local authorities will achieve energy savings beyond their 2030 targets and have invested more than 120m in energy efficiency projects, preventing more than 60,000 tonnes of CO₂ from being produced.

The report looks at Wicklow County Council's solar panel project in the car park at County Buildings as a case study. The report notes that the project will provide "approx. 285,000kWh/year of 100% renewable energy. It is not currently anticipated that any of the electricity will be exported or lost to the grid. With anticipated increased staff and fleet uptake of EVs, the potential for renewably powered transport is significant. The canopy will have guttering that reduces surface pluvial flooding in the carpark and offers future potential for rainwater collection or attenuation, thereby providing a dual benefit.

"The expected amount of renewable energy is equivalent to the baseload, or 40% of County Buildings' requirement, saving an estimated 40,000/year in energy costs. The canopy is being considered on a power purchase agreement basis. However, project costings have indicated that the project would have a simple payback of 10 years before grants are considered. The installation comes with a 25-year warranted life expectancy. As a proof of concept, there is significant potential to replicate at virtually any local authority public surface carpark."

Outside of energy efficiency, the local government sector has also been proactive in areas including sus-

tainable transport development, flood risk management, water conservation, waste management, nature-based solutions and public engagement.

The actions outlined in A Profile of Local Government Climate Actions in Ireland were undertaken in the period 2011-2018, ahead of the sector being named as a key driver of change under the National Climate Action Plan and each council signing up to a Climate Action Charter last year.

The recently published Heads of Climate Action (Amendment) Bill requires all local authorities to prepare individual climate action plans outlining the mitigation and adaptation measures the authority intends to adopt.

The research released today shows councils are poised to meet that obligation, according to Paddy Mahon Chair of the CCMA Environment Committee. "Local authorities have been taking measures to reduce emissions and to position the sector to lead in the response to the climate crisis. We have extensive expertise and we plan to build on that now by training all 28,000 members of staff in climate action. This will involve technical training as well as training in leadership, community engagement and behavioural change. That is a measure of very wide view we're taking and the scale of ambition we have."

Dr Bernie O'Donoghue Hynes, LGMA Head of Research pointed out that the report provides a snapshot in time that allows for local authorities to learn from each other and to recognise where additional action might be taken, "The research shows that local authorities have been taking a proactive approach to climate and environmental sustainability for some time, prioritising the needs of their areas and basing their response on prevailing risks in their jurisdictions. The research shows what has been done and serves as an important reference for local authorities to examine what can be done."

42 nursing home beds available to facilitate hospital discharges

There are 42 beds available in Nursing Home Ireland (NHI) nursing homes across Co. Wicklow to facilitate timely discharge of patients from acute hospitals to nursing home care, NHI told Wicklow Times.

However, NHI states that feedback from members is the discharge process within hospitals is disorganised, inconsistent and supports are not available to enable staff facilitate the timely discharge of patients to nursing home care, where required.

There are 18 NHI Nursing Homes in Wicklow and 841 total registered beds. With 42 of these available to facilitate the discharge of patients, this is an average of more than 2 beds available per Nursing Home in Co Wicklow. An estimated 2,000 beds are available in private and voluntary nursing homes across the country.

NHI undertook a snapshot survey on Tuesday 7th January asking private and voluntary nursing homes the number of available beds within their homes to facilitate

transfer of patients from hospital.

HSE figures inform circa 60% of the hundreds of patients clinically fit for discharge in our acute hospitals are awaiting long-term nursing home care. Recent figures state at the end of November, almost 700 patients within our hospitals were delayed discharges.

Tadhg Daly, NHI CEO states: "Engagement with nursing homes the past number of days has informed of huge level of frustration with regard to the discharge process within our acute hospitals. We have nursing homes informing us they are aware of patients requiring discharge to nursing home care but many of these patients are being deterred due to delays in accessing funding support or bureaucracy within the hospital.

We've hundreds of beds available to provide specialised care for people in our hospitals who need step-down care but these are not being utilised.

Our Members are reporting extreme frustration that patients assessed as requiring nursing home care are experiencing unnecessary delays and are remaining within hospital for periods of days in many instances.

"Late Saturday, NHI fielded an urgent request from the HSE at local level seeking information regarding nursing home beds immediately available to facilitate discharges from two severely overcrowded hospitals. Over 20 beds from ten nursing homes surrounding the hospitals were identified within a matter of hours but only one bed has since been utilised. These hospitals remain severely over-

"While discharges occur every day to nursing homes, the urgency and focus required during this national emergency is not evident.

"Nursing home care has a lead role to fulfil in alleviating overcrowding within our acute hospitals and engagement has been undertaken with the HSE at national level. But it is damning upon the Government that no engagement is undertaken with the nursing home sector prior to the Winter period with view to planning timely discharge of the hundreds of patients requiring nursing home care that are within our hospitals on a daily basis.

Year-on-year it fails to comprehensively plan for the Winter period and the outcome is distress for hospital patients, their families and hospital staff."

'Wicklow playing catch-up due to lack of resources'

Social Democrat's General Election candidate for Wicklow, Cllr. Jennifer Whitmore says high population growth counties like Wicklow are constantly playing 'catch-up' as resources are being stretched across communities experiencing increasing growth in population and demand for services.

Speaking on the General Election campaign trail, Whitmore says "much of the data compiled in research carried out by the Social Democrats confirms that Wicklow has a significant revenue problem and is one of the worst resourced counties in Ireland when it comes to Gardaí, pupil-teacher ratio, spending on fire services and the number of health staff available to communities.

"This certainly matches up with the experiences people are having in Wicklow as they attempt to get

their kids into schools, commute to work, or contact community health services. I have seen it myself as Councillor and the lack of resources at council level resulting in resources being visibly stretched as their communities expand and demand for services increases.

"Wicklow is not getting its fair share of public services and funding making it a Catch-Up County. I want to see this change and bring about a new resource allocation system that is balanced, transparent and meets the needs of individual counties like Wicklow.

"Ireland needs to remodel how we identify needs and allocate resources. We must allocate on the basis of population growth and need with pre-agreed criteria and keep the Ministerial remit completely outside the process. Meanwhile there needs to be sustained investment in public services to meet service deficits and growing populations in counties like Wicklow" concluded Whitmore.

Concluding Mr. Timmins said "BIFE has developed significantly in recent years and it's my belief that Wicklow must have a growing and developed third level educational facility to cater for the needs of Wicklow Students".

2020 GLAS Traditional Farm Buildings Scheme



The Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Michael Creed, last week announced the opening of the 2020 GLAS Traditional Farm Buildings Scheme.

This scheme funds the restoration and preservation of traditional farm buildings and structures such as historic yard surfaces, walls, gates and gate pillars. The Heritage Council administer the scheme on behalf of the Department.

The grant available can range between €4,000 and €25,000 and it can cover up to 75% of the cost of the works which is subject to the maximum ceiling.
