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WILL IT CHANGE ANYTHING?

WICKLOW'S NEWLY ELECTED TDs SET OUT THEIR PRIORITIES

With the country in a state of limbo with no new government looking likely to form in the near future, *Wicklow Times* asked the county's five newly elected TDs what they hope to achieve for the county in the next few years.

Wicklow Sinn Féin TD John Brady said that the people voted for change and that everything possible must be done to deliver a government for change. He also thanked the people of Wicklow for giving him a huge mandate.

"Wicklow has been neglected by successive governments for far too long. We have crises in health and housing, a public transport service that isn't fit for purpose and one of the most expensive counties in Ireland for childcare.

"Our objective is to deliver a government that will build homes, cut rents and freeze them, reduce the pension age to 65, give workers and families a break and advance

right across Wicklow and I thank the thousands of people that voted for me to help bring about the

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Irish Unity. We will look at how to deliver the change that people voted for. There should be no delay in government formation. We have serious work to do and we have started the process of speaking to other political parties."

Brady concluded "Sinn Féin won the election and is the largest political party in Ireland. I respect the mandate given to all political parties, it's important that others respect the Sinn Féin mandate and stop being so arrogant, or is change something that they just can't do."

Newly elected TD for the Social Democrats Jennifer Whitmore said "Wicklow is a great county but there are many ways I can, in my new role as TD, work to make it even better.

"At a national level, I will work hard to ensure

that Wicklow gets the funding and resources it needs when it comes to things like school places, affordable housing, public transport, job creation and council funding. 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CASEY TO RUN FOR SENATE

Pat Casey has confirmed that he will be contesting the upcoming Seanad Elections in order to ensure that there is representation in Leinster House from rural Wicklow following the election of five TDs from Bray and Greystones.

I have also consulted with the hundreds of members of Fianna Fáil and my own supporters who strongly feel that this election be contested."

"People know the work that I have done and want to do for the people of Wicklow. I will be keeping my Arklow office open during this cam-

paign to allow local people have access to our advice clinics. I have a track record of defending rural Wicklow and grow-

ABP refuses permission for Newcastle timber facility

An Bord Pleanála has refused permission for a proposed timber products manufacturing facility on Timmore Lane in Newcastle.

Warmridge Ltd had appealed to ABP after Wicklow County Council refused permission last September. The site is presently used as a yard and storage area by Abwood. The site is zoned in the current Development Plan to provide for light industrial and employment use.

ABP refused a previous application on the site for a development of a larger scale. The scale of the proposed development had been reduced from a previous application, which was one of the grounds for the appeal, along with a lack of alternative sites in the surrounding area and the Abwood operation being dependent on local resources and loyal local employment. The Council's planner's report recommended refusing permission for the development due to the site's rural location which went against the Council's development plan policy.

Additionally, the Council's Planner's Report also stated that the development would result in a traffic hazard due the traffic movements that it generated.

In its decision to refuse permission, ABP stated "Having regard to the size and scale of the proposed timber manufacturing facility and offices taken together with the sales and display area and having regard to the objectives of the planning authority as set out in the current Wicklow County Development Plan including objectives RUR 1 and RUR 2, it is considered that the proposed development is excessive in scale and is not dependent on local resources. Furthermore, it is considered that the proposed development would seriously injure the rural amenities of the area and would detract to an undue degree from the rural character of the area. The proposed development would, therefore, be contrary to the objectives of the Wicklow County Development Plan 2016 - 2022, and would be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area."

Planning application lodged for Blessington housing development

A planning application has been lodged with An Bord Pleanála for a Strategic Housing Development of 360 dwelling units in Blessington.

The development on Kilmalum Road would consist of a mix of houses, duplexes and apartment units ranging from 2 to 3 storeys, including associated car parking spaces, internal roads and paths, public and private open spaces and a crèche. The application has been submitted by Windlynn Ltd.

Out of the 360 residential units, 36 are dedicated to meet the applicant's

obligations under Part V of the Planning & Development Act. Each unit has associated private open space, as well as public open spaces accessible to all units with hard and soft landscaping treatment. The proposed development includes measures to upgrade the Blessington Orchard /Kilmalum Road and Culvert over the Deerpark Watercourse.

There would be 675 car parking spaces for the development overall, as well as residential bicycle spaces with a further 114 bicycle spaces provided throughout the development for apartment, duplexes and visitor spaces.

The crèche would be a two-storey crèche with a capacity for 80 children, associated car parking for the crèche.

A Natura Impact Statement has been prepared which states that the proposed development "will not adversely affect (either directly or indirectly) the integrity of any European site, either alone or in-combination with other plans or projects."

Public submission for the development are being taken until March 15th, and APB is due to make a decision by 5th April.

Primary school pupils invited to create a better world

Minister of State for the Diaspora and International Development, Ciarán Cannon, T.D., has issued an invitation to Wicklow primary school pupils to share their ideas on how we can create a better world by taking part in this year's Our World Irish Aid Awards.

The Awards were launched by Minister Cannon at Carrabane National School, Athenry, Co. Galway where he was joined by pupils and teachers to also mark the 15th Anniversary of the competition, which is the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade's flagship global citizenship award scheme for primary schools.

Speaking at the launch, Minister Cannon said "In 2019, we published Ireland's Policy for International Development, A Better World. It sets out an ambitious view of the world we want to live in and outlines the things we must do if we are to play our part in meeting the United Nations Global Goals for Sustainable Development.

"The Our World Irish Aid Awards are an important way of introducing our young people to this world and the very real challenges experienced by others less fortunate than ourselves around the world.

"This year, we mark the 15th Anniversary of the

Awards. Our theme for 2020, A Better World, is both an invitation and a challenge to Wicklow primary school pupils to think critically and creatively about how we can work together to create a more equal, peaceful and sustainable world. I would encourage schools to take part and look forward to seeing their projects later this year."

The Minister for Education and Skills, Joe McHugh, T.D., added his endorsement saying that "Children in schools up and down the country are already challenging older generations on issues like the climate and sustainability. The Our World Irish Aid Awards are a great way to encourage children to think about how they can make the world a better place." Registered primary schools nationwide receive curriculum-linked teaching and learning materials to help teachers and pupils discover more about each of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Irish Aid's eight focus countries. Schools are invited to communicate their ideas and understanding of the issues in writing, song, film, artwork or another medium of their choosing.

This year's theme, A Better World, invites pupils to consider what the better world of their dreams would be like and what we can all do to make that better world a reality, for ourselves, our family and friends and for people who live far away in other countries.

Highest ever passenger journeys on the Rosslare route recorded in 2019

A total of 723,000 passenger journeys were recorded on the Dublin/Rosslare rail line in 2019. This figure, encompassing both Intercity and Commuter demand on the line through Wexford and Wicklow, represents a 1.7% increase on 2018.

Economic improvements, greater numbers of people in employment, and increased road congestion have all contributed to the increase in passenger numbers. As part of the DART Expansion programme, Iarnród Éireann will undertake a detailed study of options for further capacity and service expansion on the route this year, as well as progressing major new fleet orders to benefit the national network, including Dublin/Rosslare line services.

Nationally, Iarnród Éireann recorded its highest ever number of passenger journeys in 2019, with 50.1 million passenger journeys made across DART, Commuter and Intercity services. This represents a 4.4% growth on the previous year. Commenting on the figures, Chief Executive of Iarnród Éireann, Jim Meade said: "We welcome the growth on the Dublin/Rosslare line through Counties Wicklow and Wexford. We recognise the need to enhance capacity to ensure more people can switch to a sustainable and scenic option that this route represents, and will be prioritising development of options in 2020."

The Tax saver scheme run by Iarnród Éireann continues to grow, with more and more employers opting to join the scheme, which offers savings of up to 52% of travel costs through tax and PRSI and universal social charge savings for employees. Employers can save up to 10.75% on PRSI. Many Commuters from Wicklow and North Wexford are availing of this scheme through their employer.

'Next Govt has to get serious about attacks on sheep'

As lambing season begins, it's a worrying time for sheep farmers as with it comes the threat of dog attacks which have the potential to decimate flocks.

Responsible dog control continues to be a major issue for sheep farmers resulting in the loss and serious injury of their flock and the financial and emotional burden that it creates, according to the Wicklow Uplands Council.

There have been no reported attacks on sheep in Co. Wicklow during this year's lambing season so far. However, speaking to *Wicklow Times*, Irish Farmers Association Wicklow Chairman Chris Hill said that there almost certainly have been attacks but that there tends to be an 'under reporting' of such incidents by farmers as they are more likely to "take it on the chin".

Mr Hill said that there tends to be a feeling of futility due to the culprit dog and owner being very hard to track down.

Mr Hill explained that the bad weather at this time of year also increases the risk of attacks on sheep, as dogs are more likely to get muddy during the day and therefore be left out of the house during the night, which is when they go roving.

Wicklow has had its share of attacks over the last couple of years. In early 2019, there were two reported incidents close to the village of Auhgrim, where newly born lambs were killed and maimed. In both cases, the dogs who were thought to belong locally,

were found in the midst of the attack and destroyed onsite. Some flocks have been attacked multiple times by roving dogs.

Mr Hill recalls an incident in last year where two feral dogs "killed a significant number" of sheep as well as and deer. However, he was quick to add that as horrific as these incidents are, a dog doesn't have to attack a sheep physically to do harm.

"Even being chased can be enough to worry the sheep so that it aborts her lamb. They have a nervous psychology and it can take them weeks to settle down. Also when they run away from a dog a lot of sheep can get piled on top of each other in a ditch or drain, and many suffocate or get crushed as a result. The danger is multi-faceted. Dog owners need to be responsible and make sure their dog is chipped."

The Irish Farmers Association (IFA) have said that the next Government "has to get serious" about dog attacks on sheep", and it is looking for a targeted direct payment of €30 per ewe. To combat the scourge of dog attacks, it has identified the following measures: A properly-funded dog warden service in every county; Micro-chipping of all dogs to be mandatory and properly implemented; A central database managed by a

Government Department.

IFA National Sheep Chairman Sean Dennehy said "Marauding dogs are a nationwide problem for sheep farmers. Dog owners can be held responsible for any losses from attacks on sheep, with serious financial and legal consequences. Farmers have a right to protect their sheep flock and can shoot a dog worrying, or about to worry, their flock."

The message from the Wicklow Uplands Council is that "As recreational use of the Wicklow Uplands increases, the presence of dogs close to farmland areas and the hills used for sheep farming, requires a greater awareness of Responsible Dog Control. Uncontrolled dogs are a serious threat to the livelihood of upland farmers. Dogs loose on the hills cause anxiety within a flock of sheep often causing them to be displaced and getting stuck in rough ground and vegetation.

"One of the impacts that is often unseen by recreational users is the early abortion of lambs and in the worst incidences; dogs directly attack sheep causing them severe injury or death.

"When a flock is disturbed, the loss of young lambs due to hunger can also occur if they become separated from their mother, the source of

essential milk. This is not just a problem for the landowner in terms of their livelihood but it is also a serious animal welfare issue.

"The problem is not limited to walker's dogs with damage often being caused by local dogs which stray from neighbouring properties, often with their owners unaware of their whereabouts. The farming community in County Wicklow experienced a number of serious incidents involving multiple sheep losses in 2019. This included serious incidents where newly born lambs and heavily pregnant ewes were killed and maimed. In several cases, dogs who were thought to have been owned locally were found in the midst of the attacks and destroyed onsite."

The Uplands Council asks that people observe and respect local signage and leave dogs at home if accessing land where livestock are present.

"The presence of dogs even with playful intent, can cause great anxiety within a flock of sheep. During the winter months this can prevent ewes from coming into season. In lambing season it is the main cause of stillbirths and miscarriages, which can occur 2-3 days after contact with dogs.

"Know where your dogs are at all times - attacks often occur at night. Keep dogs under

'effectual' control at all times including the use of a leash where appropriate or directed to do so. Report wandering dogs and suspicious sights to your local authorities. Make sure your dog(s) are registered and microchipped - this is now a legal requirement for all dogs."

According to Brian Dunne, Coordinator of Wicklow Uplands Council "As the lambing season is now upon us, it is the time that sheep flocks are at their most vulnerable to incidences of worrying and attacks by dogs. Dog owners are asked to be vigilant in keeping dogs under control and knowing where their dogs are at all times, especially at night when most attacks occur".

Mr Dunne added: "It is also an important breeding season for ground-nesting birds and wildlife which along with sheep, can become startled by the presence of dogs. By launching this awareness campaign, the Council is highlighting the role that all dog owners must play in tackling this serious issue".

If you witness an incident of sheep worrying or damage to livestock, report it immediately to Wicklow County Council. It is important that all incidents be report as soon as possible. Call 0404 - 20236 or email, env@wicklowcoco.ie.

Information event held on the future of hill farming

An information event titled 'The Future of Hill Farming in the Dublin Mountains' took place at the end of last week in the picturesque south County Dublin townland of Glenasmole.

Attracting over 60 people, the open event held in the Glenasmole Community Centre was organised jointly between the SUAS Pilot Project and the state agency Teagasc, to explore a range of topics related to hill farming in the Dublin and Wicklow Mountains and the issues affecting hill farming communities throughout Ireland.

Guest speakers from the National Parks & Wildlife Service, Teagasc and the SUAS Project, gave presentations on the ecological importance of our uplands, sustainable and profitable hill farming practices and the appropriate land and vegetation management approaches for upland terrain.

With the aid of visual slides, satellite footage and data collected from across Ireland's upland farming community, much discussion was had about optimum grazing periods, flock sizes and breeds, and how best to create an upland farming model using a blend of modern and traditional farming techniques.

A number of contributions were also made from the attendees, with a general consensus that

although quite challenging, the role of the upland farmers is of national importance and contribute widely to the greater public good and enhance sustainable rural communities.

In addition to managing the natural landscapes, it was agreed that healthy upland habitats play a vital role in providing good quality water sources, the prevention of flooding and the sequestration of carbon stores.

After the 90 minutes of presentations and open discussion with attendees, many of the group travelled to a nearby hill to observe first-hand, the many ecological factors found in upland habitats.

Surrounded by stunning mountain views and overlooking the Glenasmole Valley and the 19th century Bohernabreena Reservoir, the group assembled for a short guided walk within the Wicklow Mountains National Park which is home to diverse collection of sheep flocks.

Leading the large group was Enda Mullen, the Divisional Ecologist for the National Parks and Wildlife Service, who demonstrated many of the plant species found in the upland biodiversity and gave an overview of the impact recent fires have had to the areas' sensitive ecology. Much discussion was had about the widespread use of burning to manage vegetation, with welcome contributions made from a number of attendees on the difference between controlled and planned burning and the wild burning that have plagued the area in recent years.

The attendees were made up of farmers, participants of the SUAS Project, representatives from the National Parks and Wildlife Service and other interested parties, with one group from Northern Ireland's upland partnership groups travelling down for the occasion.

Launched in 2018, the Sustainable Upland Agri-Environmental Scheme (SUAS) is a locally-led Pilot Project designed to address the decline in hill farming activities and the promotion of sustainable practices in the Wicklow and Dublin uplands.

One of 23 EIP- Agri projects in operation in Ireland, the project is working with a number of commonage groups and individual farmers on

selected sites in the region and it is anticipated that the project's findings will contribute to future national decision making on a range of issues.

Speaking following the event, Declan Byrne, Project Manager of the SUAS Pilot Project said "It was wonderful to see so many choosing to attend and actively participate in the discussion and the sharing of invaluable knowledge and experience with each other. As it is our first open event to be organised in the Dublin Mountains, the warm response received, clearly demonstrates the great interest there is to collectively find future solutions to managing our uplands"

Mr. Byrne continued, "The importance of our uplands and the preservation of it's healthy, thriving biodiversity, really cannot be underestimated. The work of the SUAS Project is to discover and promote the best approaches and methods for land management, to create a better understanding of the appropriate grazing and to better support hill-farming communities".

'New Government must deliver on dementia'

Journalist and broadcaster Teena Gates has revealed that socialising and working outside the home is now practically impossible for full-time family carers like her due to the dementia care crisis that is a daily reality for the 1,274 people living with dementia and their struggling families who are fighting to access essential supports and services in Wicklow.

Yet despite this, in Wicklow only a small number of candidates signed the pledge to deliver on dementia.

Teena, who is from Dublin and is a full-time carer for her elderly father, Terry, who was diagnosed with dementia last year, has issued one last rallying call to the newly elected TDs to support The Alzheimer Society of Ireland (ASI) who are calling on all them to pledge their support to Deliver on Dementia and ensure

dementia is in the next Programme for Government.

Teena Gates said: "I used to think I knew what being a carer was. I used to think I knew what 24/7 care meant. I didn't have a clue. It means you never go to the toilet on your own again. It means you never close the door when you shower. It means you can't meet a friend for coffee without a complicated cover system. It means working outside the home is

practically impossible. Yet all of these things are possible with support. So many of us just need a little help, to help us love and care for the ones we love and care for."

The ASI knows only too well that access to dementia care in the community depends on where you live and no county in Ireland has an acceptable level of dementia support. The ASI's General Election 2020 campaign 'Deliver on Dementia - Time to

End the Crisis' aims to ensure that dementia is included in the new Programme for Government so people with dementia and their families can get the support that they need.

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland say that all TDs must pledge to deliver on dementia in the next Programme for Government to ensure: The National Dementia Strategy is fully implemented; Home care for everybody; Dementia is in the Chronic Disease Management Programme.

Patricia Maguire, from Wexford who helps to care for her dad who has dementia, said: "My hope for the next Government is to give back to the people like my dad who contributed so much to our society as my mam has no support from the Government. My Mam is living in Wexford where there is no home care support for her. My Mam has her own health issues as a 70-year-old woman may have and her mental health and physical health is being impacted due to the lack of support. My parents both deserve better from this country and should be cared for in a meaningful way. We want our dad to receive the care that he deserves."

Luggala was Wicklow's biggest one-off sale of 2019

The sale of Luggala in Roundwood was the largest one-off property transaction recorded in Wicklow last year.

Data from the Property Price Register, analysed by property website MyHome.ie, shows that the dwelling and lands adjacent to Wicklow National Park sold for €11.585 million in October. Given the amount of land at Luggala, the full sale price would have been for more than this but the Price Register only takes into account the property plus an acre and a half.

The only sale larger in the county last year was for the Hazelbrook Rise

development in Rathnew which sold for €20,232,350 in October. Other large one-off sales included Prospect House in Newcastle for €2.572 million in April and Templecarrig House in Templecarrig, Delgany in August for €2.15 million.

In total there were 30 sales recorded in Wicklow last year for a seven-figure sum.

As of the Property Price Register update of February 5th, just over €697.4 million had been

spent on property last year in Wicklow.

There were 1,969 sales recorded as of that date, which was up 21.5% on the 1,621 sales recorded in 2018.

Angela Keegan, Managing Director of MyHome.ie, said that the analysis confirmed a trend of significant activity in commuter counties. "We knew from our analysis of the Property Price Register for the first half of 2019 that activity in commuter counties was sharply rising, and our

analysis this time round proves that this trend continued throughout the year.

"The affordability of properties in the counties around Dublin is proving to be extremely popular especially with first-time buyers who are constrained due to the Central Bank's mortgage lending rules. It is good to see new building starts in these counties have also continued, bringing more homes on the market where they are badly needed."



Wicklow County Council hosts Business Breakfast Briefing

A state-of-the-art Customer Care Innovation Hub is to be developed at County Buildings in Wicklow town to improve communications with Wicklow County Council's service users and provide greater facilities for visitors.

Details of the new Hub were outlined by the Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council, Mr Frank Curran, in his address to the Council's 2020 Business Breakfast Briefing held in the Druids Glen Hotel & Golf Resort.

As part of its ongoing commitment to economic development, Wicklow County Council hosted the 2020 Breakfast Briefing attended by leading local and national businesspeople. The theme of this year's event was: "Endless Opportunities for Living, Leisure and Business in County Wicklow."

Guest speaker at the event was Mr Mike Seaton, Director of Development for SSE Renewables.

In a keynote address, Wicklow County Council Chief Executive, Mr Frank Curran, detailed various developments and projects which the Council had completed over the past year or is involved in for the future.

One of these, he said, was the creation of a state-of-the-art Customer Care Innovation Hub at County buildings. This would lead the process of major organisational change and improvement in how the Council delivers its services to the people of Wicklow.

Supported by a Customer Relations Management (CRM) system and a highly trained customer care team, the Hub will greatly improve communication and engagement with the public as well as achieving efficiencies in service delivery.

"It will help ensure there is clear, consistent and appropriate communi-

cations and service delivery between Wicklow County Council, the citizens of County Wicklow and other stakeholders", stated Mr Curran.

He also highlighted the drafting of the new County Development Plan 2021-2027 which was at an initial stage. This would set out future development across all areas such as economic development, settlement strategy, tourism and retail strategy, climate change, green infrastructure, sustainable transport, town planning and many other important issues.

Mr Curran pointed to the Council's policy on Climate Change saying that Wicklow had the potential to play an important role in the renewable energy market, particularly in the area of offshore wind energy.

Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Irene Winters, said the Council used the occasion

to update the business community on the various activities carried out by the Council, with particular emphasis on enterprise and economic development. "It is also your opportunity to network, to share your views and to provide us with feedback," she said.

The input of the business community was invaluable, she said adding: "Over the years many of you have participated on committees of Wicklow County Council including the County Wicklow Economic Think Tank, Local Community Development Committee or Strategic Policy Committees, or indeed the Business Advisory Council. These groups are essential to Wicklow County Council and help to identify actions and priorities aimed at driving economic activity and increasing employment in County Wicklow."

One area of particular

importance, Cllr Winters added, was the County Development Plan 2021 to 2027. The Forward Planning Team was currently assessing the submissions received in response to the Issues Paper, to assist the Chief Executive in the preparation of his report to the elected members.

This was due in the coming months while the Draft County Development Plan would be published later this year when a further round of public consultation will be announced. "I would encourage you to continue to engage with us, as the plan is developed and to play your role in shaping the future of the County," she said.

Mr Seaton from SSE dealt with Ireland's Climate Change policy and the key role renewable energy would play in that. He said Ireland's offshore wind resource was vast and significantly under-

developed and pointed out that Ireland has just one offshore wind farm, located 13km off Arklow.

SSE has long held plans to develop Arklow Wind Park Phase two and are close to delivering on those and added that "this project holds significant socio-economic benefits for the county of Wicklow and the East Coast. Depending on the final design of the wind farm, we expect to invest between €1 billion and €2 billion developing the next stage of the Arklow Bank."

While they had yet to announce the location of the O&M base for the Arklow Wind Park, he said this had taken longer than hoped because of land, property and legal agreements. They hoped to be in a position to announce the location with the next month.

Mr Seaton said offshore wind energy could be an enabler to unlock new infrastructure investment in Ireland's ports and maritime businesses and create local sustainable jobs. "We have seen this at firsthand on other projects across Ireland and the UK. Already we rely on the existing local supply chain in Co Wicklow."

A number of local companies with considerable offshore wind expertise have already been retained to support the operation, he said, including two Co Wicklow firms, Gavin & Doherty Geosolutions and AlphaMarine Services. "We intend to rely further on the support of local firms, they will be critical in the years ahead as we progress the project."

Wicklow celebrates Safer Internet Day with family event

On Tuesday, 11th February, Co. Wicklow Children and Young People's Services Committee (CYPSC) hosted an online safety event in partnership with Tusla, Wicklow Comhairle na n'Og, Extern, ISPC and Wicklow Child and Family Project to celebrate Safer Internet Day 2020 - Together for a Better Internet.

The event took place in the Arklow Bay Hotel and was attended by both parents and professionals, along with 25 children from 6th Class in St. John's National School, Arklow. This

year marked the third annual Safer Internet Day event hosted by the Wicklow CYPSC.

The event was opened by Fionnuala Curry, Coordinator for the Wicklow CYPSC, who

noted that the issue of online safety has been a priority area for Wicklow CYPSC since their first Children and Young People's Plan [CYPP] in 2012, and that the issue features

once again in their most recent plan for 2020-2022. The keynote speaker on the day was Dr. Colman Noctor, Child and Adolescent Psychotherapist in St. Patrick's Adolescent Mental Health Services and Assistant Professor at Trinity. His specialist area of interest is in the impact of technology on our mental lives.

Speaking at the event, Dr. Noctor said, "The advent of technology has changed the landscape of family life in Ireland and we are struggling to keep a pace with these new ways of communicating. It is imperative that we try to develop healthy relationships with technology and mirror these for our children."

Dr. Noctor explored the impact of technology

and social media on our mental health, emotional wellbeing and resilience, and the ways in which our relationship with technology can affect our family, work and personal lives.

The event looked at ways in which we can support ourselves and our families to become more resilient in the contemporary world and develop better relationships in a digital era. Paul Hickey, Social Worker, Tusla, looked at the issue of cyberbullying, and delivered advice on how to stay safe on social networks and online video games.

Nine month window to insulate your business against a hard Brexit

The United Kingdom left the European Union on the 31st of January 2020, ending a 47-year relationship with all countries in the EU. This 47-year allegiance ending will bring uncertainty to the trade relationship between the UK and the EU.

The new date for businesses within Wicklow to be aware of is December 2020. This is a transition period for the UK and EU to strike a trade deal and figure out their future relationship. Business owners should take advantage of this transition period according to the Local Enterprise Office Wicklow and use every support available, not only through the Local Enterprise Office but through other state agencies, to get their business #BrexitReady.

These 9 months represent a short time period for a trade deal to be struck. Therefore, there is a real risk that an agreement will not be made and a default agreement will come into play where the World Trade Organisation tariffs and rules will apply. This signifies a real risk of increased

costs and administration burdens to businesses. In light of these potential threats businesses in Wicklow should get as prepared as possible within this transition period.

The Local Enterprise Office Wicklow is providing free, one-to-one, and confidential Brexit Mentoring with Moira Creedon of Artemis Consulting on February 26th 2020. There are three main areas covered in these sessions; the potential risk Brexit may have to your business, the impact these risks could have if they occurred, and the steps you can take now to reduce the risk and the potential cost this will have on your business.

Moira is a teacher and consultant in Strategic Finance and has worked with both large corporate and SME clients



Wicklow people urged to volunteer for Aware's Support Line

Aware, Ireland's national charity supporting people affected by depression, bipolar disorder and mood-related conditions, has launched a volunteer recruitment campaign for its Support Line

The Aware Support Line is a national freephone service which operates from 10am to 10pm 365 days a year, located at Aware's HQ at 9 Upper Leeson Street, Dublin 4.

The Line provides telephone support to people concerned about issues relating to their own mood or that of a friend or family member. It operates against a backdrop of an estimated more than 450,000 people experiencing depression in Ireland at any one time, while there are approximately 45,000 people here diagnosed with bipolar disorder.

Depression and bipolar disorder are mental health conditions that affect our thinking, energy, feelings and behaviour. While they can vary from mild to severe, and impact on our relationships, family and work lives, it is possible to find ways to manage the conditions, and to lead healthy and productive lives.

According to Bríd O'Meara, Aware's Director of Services, volunteers gain as much as they give on the Support Line: "Our more than 400 volunteers nationwide are a crucial lifeline for people impacted by depression and bipolar disorder. They play a key part in our work supporting people affected by stress, depression, bipolar disorder and mood-related conditions, and are passionate about nurturing

people's positive mental health.

"On our Support Line, volunteers listen carefully to callers, their questions, concerns and reasons for calling, so as to best understand and respond. They are compassionate and non-judgemental, treating people with dignity and respect, and provide information and signpost people to pathways to recovery such as other services and therapies.

"We know from people who have volunteered for the Support Line that it is hugely rewarding for them. There is a real feelgood factor in giving something back, while also developing their own life skills and talents in the process."

Signing Up Volunteers for the Support Line should have good communication skills, including being fluent in written and spoken English, and be comfortable speaking on the phone.

They will need to be over 25 years, and available for three hours a week, for a minimum of 18 months. Comprehensive training is provided to volunteers in responding to different scenarios that can arise, and so no prior qualifications or experience is required.

Staff from Wicklow Law Centre honoured for service to Legal Aid Board

Two staff members from Wicklow Law Centre were honoured for their service of more than 20 years with the Legal Aid Board. Phil Whelan and Lorraine Porter received their awards at an event in Dublin to mark the 40th Anniversary of the founding of the Legal Aid Board. Established in 1979, the Board provides legal advice and representation to people with limited means.

The Legal Aid Board was established following the recommendations of a government-established Committee, the Pringle Committee, and also the influential Airey v Ireland case, which saw Johanna Airey take Ireland to the European Court of Human Rights. The Court found Ireland was in breach of the European Convention on Human Rights because Ms. Airey could not afford the legal fees charged by solicitors in seeking legal separation from her husband. The Government of the day moved quickly to establish the Legal Aid Board in response to both of these events.

Speaking at the 40th anniversary

celebration, John McDaid, Chief Executive of the Legal Aid Board, said: "Ireland is a vastly different country to what it was in 1979. In the last 40 years we have had extensive legislation in relation to matters such as marital separation, divorce, domestic violence, refugee law and tenant and home-owner protections.

"As Irish society has changed, so too has the work of the Legal Aid Board. This has been reflected in the expansion of our service provision to include supports for asylum-seekers and refugees; the Abhaile scheme, which provides legal assistance for people at risk of losing their family home because of mort-

gage arrears; and our family mediation services, with 16 family mediation centres nationwide.

"The occasion of our 40th anniversary is also an opportunity for us to acknowledge the contribution of all of those who have been instrumental in our achievements over the past four decades and those who continue to do so on a daily basis. Some of our staff have served with us for over 20 years, such as Phil and Lorraine, and we are delighted that some of those involved in the establishment of the Legal Aid Board were honoured at our anniversary celebration."

Long Service Award for Wicklow woman

Royal Ulster Agricultural Society (RUAS) member Patricia Swandel recently received the Society's Silver Service Award that recognised her contribution as a Steward and Exhibitor for the past 47 years.





Dancing with Bear, an exhibition by Maggie Wright, will run in the Signal Arts Centre in Bray from 27th April to 10th May.



Enniskerry students pick up special award at Mini Scientist Grand Final

Students from St. Mary's & St. Gerard's National School in Enniskerry were awarded Special Award at the Intel Mini Scientist Grand Final, an event which is the culmination of a nationwide competition which has been running since September 2019.

Their project was titled 'Farming of the Future'. The event was held at Maynooth University and students from across Ireland took part.

The Intel Mini Scientist, which is now in its 13th year, gives primary school students from

4th, 5th and 6th class, the chance to explore science through project based learning and exhibitions.

The first phase of the program involves students participating at local level exhibitions where Intel judges visit the participating schools,

choosing two winning projects in each.

The second phase saw each of these winning projects take part in the Mini Scientist Regional Finals which were hosted throughout December in Leixlip, Shannon and Cork.

The 2019 / 2020 initiative was another exciting year for the Mini Scientist competition with 7,200 students from 105 schools in 18 counties across Ireland taking part in the Grand Final event.

This year there were almost 2,400 projects exhibited as part of the Mini Scientist competition and the Grand Final brought together the top 24 projects from across the country.

At the Grand Final, which was held in the Aula Maxima at Maynooth University, the participants exhibited their projects for a panel of judges, which was made up from Intel employees along with variety of invited guests from across the world of science and engineering, who each had the difficult task of choosing the winning projects from the very creative variety. Each of the projects included visual displays, projects books and practical experiments based on a scientific area aligned with the national primary science curriculum.

KnockanStockan says goodbye (but not for good)

The organisers behind KnockanStockan Music Festival have announced that the music festival will not take place this year.

In a statement released last week, they said: "KnockanStockan means a lot of different things to a lot of people. To some it's just another festival in an increasingly populated calendar, to others it's the musical highlight of the summer. Some feel it's home, where you camp, work and hang out for a few weeks every year. To others, it actually is home. Some hold it as a place to have the craic, catch new music and escape the real world for a few days. And to a few of us it's all of those things and much much more.

"For some of us KnockanStockan became the central focus of our lives, it shaped everything we did. From where we played, who we played with, the places we drank, the loves we found. And some we lost. The husbands, wives and children we have. The trades we've learned and the jobs we do. It's the lessons we've learned, the joy, the heartbreak and everything in between. Most importantly, it's the friends and community who've become family over the years. That, and the music.

"The Christmas of the Summer, the AGM of the craic, Electric Picnic on the dole, call it what you like there's no denying that there is magic in those hills and there's a decade plus of music and memories to prove it. It wasn't always easy and it wasn't always fun. In fact sometimes it was soul destroyingly difficult. But it was always real. And that's probably what made it so special. From the early, messy, outrageous, ridiculously expensive session in a field days to the smooth running, mostly on time, beautiful art having, almost breaking even, bonafide festival days, it's always been real. And that has been reflected by the acts who played each year. By the crew who worked each year. And by the people who came to share and celebrate that hard work and music.

"So much has changed over the last thirteen years that it's easy to forget what things were like when the festival started and why it started. KnockanStockan thrived because it had purpose

and enough people who believed in that purpose. We were on a mission and it felt like everything we did was important, and looking back maybe it was. Every gig, every song on the stairs, it felt like we were changing the world, and maybe in our own way we were. But things change and that's ok. The musical landscape in this country has changed dramatically and the scene is the healthiest it's been in a generation. And we'd love to think that we somewhat fulfilled our purpose and played our part getting it there.

"There's no one reason why a good thing comes to an end, nor are we sure if this is the end. To be honest we don't know what this is. All we do know is that KnockanStockan is too important to us and to so many others to just do for the sake of it, without the love and care and passion that made it what it was. If KnockanStockan is going to thrive again it's going to need to change and that change is going to take time. We're going to take that time and make sure that what we do next is the right thing for each of us and the right thing for KnockanStockan.

"So there will be no KS2020 and that's ok too. It's not a sad decision, or even a difficult one. It's the right decision. It's not goodbye for good, only goodbye for now. The last 13 years in that field have been some of the most wonderful, profound, strange, life changing and magical times of our lives and it's impossible to thank everyone properly here. But to all the bands who shared their music, all the artists who shared their work, to all the crew who gave their blood, sweat, tears and ears. To the collectives who joined us and promoted us. To the Gallagher family and all the festival land owners. To Kev Oz and the rest of Lacken and Blessington communities. Finally to all the festival goers who joined us on this journey, who gave us so much love and support over the years and to everyone who feels they can call KnockanStockan home, from the bottom of our hearts, thank you."


