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NO TIME TO PANIC

WHAT'S OPEN AND WHAT'S CLOSED IN COUNTY WICKLOW

The Government's introduction last Thursday of measures to combat the spread of COVID-19 prompted immediate panic buying across County Wicklow as people sought to stockpile food and essentials, - chiefly bread and toilet paper.

In Bray, Tesco on the Vevay Road had its shelves ransacked and had to turn people away at the door as there were too many people in the shop, eventually they had to close the shop. At Aldi on the Boghall Road some shoppers gave up when they saw the queues. Elsewhere there were reports of people fighting over the last available trolleys. Video footage

and images on social media showed empty shelves and aisles full of people.

The measures, announced by an Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar, came into effect at 6pm last Thursday and include closure of all schools, creches, childcare facilities and universities, closure of museums, galleries and tourism sites, and banning of public

gatherings above 100 people indoors and 500 people outdoors.

The Government has also asked people work from home if possible and reduce social contact. These measures are to remain in place until at least 29th March.

What has happened is that Defence Forces members have been told to report to barracks on

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Serious concerns about manning levels in Bray Fire Service

Recruitment events due to take place this week in order to increase the number of retained, on-call firefighters in Bray and Greystones have now been cancelled due to the measures introduced to slow the spread of Covid-19. There was to be open evenings in both Greystones Fire Station and Bray Fire Station.

Sinn Féin TD John Brady recently expressed serious concerns about the manning levels in Bray fire service and reiterated the need for a full-time fire service. Raising the matter in the Dáil, he said he was informed that recruitment to fill a number of vacancies was meant to have taken place in January.

Deputy Brady said "I have serious concerns for the safety of both the public and the safety of our fire-fighters in Wicklow given the continued inadequate number of fire fighters in Bray. In a reply to me from the Chief Fire Officer Aidan Dempsey in November it showed that the manning level in the Bray station was ten and two of those are on long term sick leave - so out of an establishment of what is supposed to be 15, there are eight fire-fighters.

"I subsequently raised the issue in the Dáil in December, and I was told that recruitment to fill the vacancies in the Bray fire station would commence in January.

"In February 2005, the retained firefighters in the fire station in Bray staged a day of protest over major difficulties in how the service was operated. One of their main concerns was the manning level in the station. Two years later, on 26th September 2007, two of the firefighters that took part in the day of protest in Bray, Sub Officer Brian Murray and Firefighter Mark O'Shaughnessy, died in the line of duty serving the community of Bray. Fourteen years after the protest at the station in Bray, and twelve years after the deaths of Brian and Mark there are still very serious issues with the fire service in Wicklow."

Cllr Dermot O'Brien said "No matter who I talk to about this issue, within the fire service, among the public, elected reps, campaigners and even when I explain the situation to children it seems like a full time fire service is the logical, ethical and absolutely necessary decision that is

required. I find myself wondering who actually doesn't agree and more importantly why?"

Cllr Grace McManus said "looking back on this story over the last ten plus years, and everything that has happened, it's beyond belief that we are still at a stage where no real investment has been made to back the agreed need for a full-time fire service. Reports and recommendations are only as good as the action they inspire, and I hope that in the coming year we will see that for the first time on this issue."

Deputy Brady continued "I have real concerns for the safety of both the firefighters and the public due to the current manning levels within the fire service. The low level of firefighters in the station in Bray means that when a second pump is required it must come from Greystones. This not only takes more time it is leaving the entire Greystones area vulnerable.

"The only way to protect lives and address the serious problems in the

Fire service in Wicklow is to provide a full-time fire service in the Bray area. In 2007 the council carried out a feasibility study into a full-time fire service for Bray, this was reviewed in 2014. I believe that given the serious difficulties within the fire service in Wicklow and the massive increase in the population and increase in building heights in the North Wicklow area, a full-time service is needed more than ever."

Deputy Brady concluded "Unfortunately Fine Gael and Fianna Fáil governments have failed to progress Bray getting a full-time fire service. The 2007 and 2014 reports are completely outdated. They need to be independently reviewed and updated. Critically we then need a government that will fund the provision of a full-time service. The recruitment of firefighters must also be given priority to ensure that the safety of both the public and members of the fire service is protected."

Bray commuters should examine Bus Connects Corridor

Minister Simon Harris has encouraged Bray to City Centre commuters to examine the latest designs from the National Transport Authority for the proposed Core Bus Corridor between Bray and the City Centre.

Minister Harris said "The National Transport Authority has published updated designs for the new Core Bus Corridor to link Bray with Dublin City Centre.

"In respect of Bray there are to be a number of significant junction upgrades including the Lower and Upper Dargle Road junctions with Castle Street/Old Dublin Road. It is proposed to replace the roundabout at the junction of the old Dublin Road and exit 5 on the M11 with a signalised junction.

"It is important that the National Transport Authority's designs for the Bus Corridor must ensure appropriate boundary treatments, planting and street furniture to enhance the entrance into the town. Further details are available at busconnects.ie."

Funding secured to carry out Arklow Transportation Study

Funding has been secured from the National Transport Authority (NTA) to carry out an Arklow Transportation Study.

Welcoming the news that funding for an Arklow Transportation Study has been secured Deputy John Brady said "This is good news for Arklow and it's a positive first step in actually moving to unlock some of the huge potential Arklow has. I believe that there are two key areas that need to be included in the study. A slip road on and off the M11 to the Vale Road is desperately needed, and the development of a new port access road.

"Arklow is a fantastic town with massive amounts of potential that needs to be unlocked. Unfortunately, traffic in the town is still a major problem and it needs to be addressed to ensure that the town's potential can be fully unlocked.

"I believe that key to addressing the traffic problem in Arklow would be the construction of a new slip road on and off the M11 to the Vale Road. Currently people travelling to Woodenbridge or Aughrim must come through Arklow. This is unnecessarily bringing cars into the town and adding to the congestion."

Deputy Brady continued "There are also a considerable number of new houses under construction on the Vale Road, and more large planning applications are due to be submitted soon. It's critically important that

the right infrastructure is in place. One of the most logical things to address the issue of traffic is to construct the new slip road to take cars out of Arklow. This was one of the main proposals in my Unlocking Arklow's Potential document which he published last year. Last year Sinn Féin launched a campaign for the development of this vital slip road and several thousand people signed a petition looking for its development too.

"I also believe that the construction of a port access road to Arklow harbour should also be explored. This would allow for the removal of heavy goods vehicles from the town centre and allow the harbour area to develop."

Deputy Brady said "When I published my Unlocking Arklow's Potential document I contacted the Minister for Transport and asked him about funding for the construction of the slip road. The Minister informed me that no application for funding has been forthcoming from the local authority for the project and that a feasibility study should first be carried out."

Deputy Brady concluded "The council has appointed a senior engineer to the project and are in the process of procuring consultants to carry out the transportation study. The study once completed will be critically important for subsequent funding applications to have the work carried out. I will continue to work with the council and the NTA to ensure that the full potential Arklow has is unlocked."

ALONE launch a COVID-19 support line for older people

ALONE, the organisation that supports older people, has announced the launch of a national support line and additional supports for older people who have concerns or are facing difficulties relating to the outbreak of COVID-19 (Coronavirus) in Ireland. This new initiative is being done in conjunction with the HSE.

Speaking on the launch Co-Leader of the Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore said "this is a fantastic initiative which will really help elderly people in our communities. They are the most vulnerable to the effects of the virus but also to any changes being made such as cancellation of cultural events or visiting bans in hospitals. I also know that many people fear the misinformation out there. It's important at this time that vulnerable people like the elderly are comforted in the wake of such a threatening development. Having a helpline they can turn to will help alleviate any fears or concerns elderly people might have at this time.

"I'm also delighted to see that the initiative is a collaborative effort between ALONE and the HSE. This kind of collaboration is what works best for our communities and for vulnerable populations especially. I hope this kind of initiative that will be rolled out in future responses to COVID-19.

"At times like these, it is the support and care that our communities show to those most vulnerable that is most important and our best defence. I want to commend the many volunteers in our voluntary sector who are provide this invaluable work with communities and who are working as part of the coordinated national response to COVID-19.

"Roísín Shorthall, Health Spokesperson and

Co-Leader of the Social Democrats will be following developments to do with COVID-19 very closely and will meet with other party leaders twice a week on the issue. As a Party we are committed to making sure communities are adequately protected and support as we deal with the spread of the Coronavirus.

"I would urge anyone who is in touch with an elderly relative or neighbour to check in with them to make them aware of ALONE's helpline and the additional outreach supports available to them if required" concluded Deputy Whitmore.

On Tuesday 3 March, the National Public Health Emergency, chaired by Dr Tony Holohan, Chief Medical Officer in the Department of Health, announced the establishment of a Vulnerable People Subgroup.

The supports offered include a new national support line and additional outreach and coordinated support. This support line complements the clinical advice and information being provided by the HSE through its website and helpline.

Professional are available to answer queries regarding COVID-19 (Coronavirus) and give advice and reassurance where necessary. **The support line is open Monday to Friday, 8am-8pm, by calling 0818 222 024, and hours may be extended to meet the demand.**

Sean Moynihan, CEO of ALONE said, "The WHO advises us to be SMART and inform ourselves about COVID-19 (Coronavirus) and to be kind and support one another.

"We are ramping up our response to COVID-19 to provide support to all older people nationwide working in collaboration with the Department of Health and the HSE," he continued.

"As the situation develops, as well as advice, information and emotional supports, we will ensure every older person will have access to food, medication, fuel, daily contact, and any other support that may be needed. We want to emphasise that these supports are free, and available to all older people, including those who have not previously used our services.

"We are also collaborating on our response with more than 100 other organisations in the community and voluntary sector working with older people, providing them with support where necessary, to create a surge in capacity and ensure a comprehensive and robust response. As the situation develops we may need to call on civic organisations to support our work."

ALONE advises that older people practice the following protective measures as outlined by the HSE:

- Wash your hands regularly with soap and water.
- Maintain at least 1 metre (3 feet) distance

between yourself and anyone who is coughing/sneezing.

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth.

- Practice cough and sneeze hygiene - covering your mouth and nose with your bent elbow or tissue when you cough/sneeze. Then dispose of the tissue immediately.

- Stay informed: keep up to date on latest Covid-19 information on www.hse.ie.

Cllr Jodie Neary, who was recently co-opted to Deputy Jennifer Whitmore's seat on Wicklow Council for the Greystones District is urging people to check in on elderly and vulnerable neighbours with limited contact to curb the spread of COVID-19, also known as the Coronavirus.

Cllr Neary says, "a lot of elderly and vulnerable neighbours are too anxious to leave their homes but do not have the same level of communication available to them as others do such as access to the internet etc... This means they are restricted from doing online shopping or communicating with people in ways that minimise social contact. With reports of stockpiling and increasing numbers of people with the virus, many elderly neighbours are too anx-

ious to leave their home or even answer the door.

"I am working with a local group and individuals who have recognised this as an anxious time for elderly and vulnerable neighbours. There are many local groups in the area coming together to find novel ways to help people in need while limiting social contact and the potential spread of the virus. For example, some are printing letters offering help with shopping, walking dogs, getting medication etc... and leaving the letters in post boxes to avoid physical contact. They also aim to liaise with delivery trucks so elderly people can avoid direct contact with people themselves.

"More and more groups are organising themselves and are doing fantastic work coming together as communities should do. The strength of community is really heart warming and is a valuable resource in our fight against the Coronavirus.

"I am in contact with Greystones Municipal District and Wicklow County Council to see how Councils can officially engage with vulnerable constituents in local areas and how best to coordinate local groups so that communities can continue to provide the best defence against the spread of COVID-19 and I will continue to work with local groups to ensure no neighbour is left alone at this time" concluded Cllr Neary.

The project commenced last Monday, March 9th, with an expected completion date of August 24th 2020.

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Parents urged to follow Govt advice and reduce children's social contact

Social Democrats TD for Wicklow Jennifer Whitmore is urging parents to follow Government advice and reduce social contact to reduce the spread of COVID-19, also known as the Coronavirus.

Deputy Whitmore says, "now that parents will be at home with their kids for some time there may be a temptation to organise play dates and social activities to fill the time. I am hearing from people that there is a temptation to do this however, I am urging parents to listen to the Government including the Department of Education advising parents to engage in social distancing and minimise social contact with each other to help avoid the spread of the virus.

"This includes minimising social contact, avoiding meeting up and keeping physical space between them. The Department of

Education is also urging parents and guardians to support their children to maintain this approach.

"I understand it will be a tough time trying to entertain kids for two weeks and no doubt cabin fever will kick in for all of us but it's important that parents do their best to minimise contact. There are a variety of online resources for parents who might want their children to keep on top of school work. There are also a variety of online sites with suggestions of healthy activities for families both inside and outside the home during this time.

"It's also important to point out that shops are open as are public walkways etc... but again, refrain from stockpiling and continue to engage in social distancing.

"Ireland does community very well and the sense of community out there is heartening. I want to commend all the hard work local groups are doing to try and engage in a safe and hygienic way, with elderly and vulnerable neighbours too anxious to leave their homes.

"For those of us who are healthy the responsibility is with us to do what we can to protect the vulnerable in our society. The best thing we can do is listen to official advice and keep ourselves up to date with the facts as given by the HSE and Government Departments" concluded Whitmore.

Monday and to be on standby to support civil authorities.

Rumours were circulating on Friday that the army was on stand-by to enforce a Code Red Lockdown this Monday, however the Department denied this as 'Fake News'.

A Defence Forces spokesperson said: "We stand ready to provide aid to civil authorities within our means and capabilities. Misinformation like this is most unhelpful and irresponsible."

It's understood that members will be on standby in their barracks to provide whatever support is deemed necessary during the upcoming weeks.

Separately, a contingency roster is coming into effect for gardai next Monday, with a limit on annual leave to no more than 5% of the force at any time, and 210 extra Garda vehicles have been hired.

Around 325 Garda students at the Templemore Garda College will be sworn in this week, and deployed to Garda stations across the country in the coming weeks. Tutors and instructors at the Garda College will also be deployed for operational duties or essential services."

Aidan Flynn, General Manager of FTAI commented: "As the business organisation representing Ireland's logistics sector, FTAI wants to reassure the public that the nation's supply chain is resilient and well equipped to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic; there is no need to stockpile food and other basic items. However, we ask that members of the public now stop stockpiling activity as it will place unnecessary pressure on the supply chain. As a nation, we should deal with this pandemic calmly and remain considerate of others."

"We would like to reassure everyone that Ireland is prepared to continue to supply all grocery outlets for the coming months. There is no reason for Irish citizens to have any concern in that regard. The industry has never been more prepared having planned for a hard Brexit over the past number of months. Social media images of empty shelves are simply sensationalising the matter. These shelves are restocked every evening and restocking will continue into the future."

The closure of cultural venues and limiting of public gathering have meant that venues such as the Mermaid Arts Centre in Bray and the Courthouse Arts Centre in

Tinahely have had to cancel all upcoming events up to and including 29th March. The South Wicklow Drama Festival has been cancelled following the announcement from the Amateur Drama Council of Ireland that the 2020 Amateur Drama Festival Circuit has been cancelled, and on a smaller scale numerous public events, from Storm Disco to Friday Night Bingo, have also been cancelled.

Purple House Cancer Support announced that "Purple House Cancer Support Centre will be closed to the public until Monday 30th March. . . "We will be operating a telephone support & Counselling service while the Centre is closed and we can be contacted on 012866966 or by emailing info@purplehouse.ie. Our hospital transport service will be continuing as normal."

Wicklow's golf courses will not close however the Golfing Union of Ireland and the Irish Ladies Golf Union stated that "The restrictions until Sunday 29th March do not prevent club competitions or casual rounds of golf taking place, however we need to be cognisant of the social nature of our game and how this element of it is impacted. Golf is a great sport for people generally to get out and about, exercise and enjoy fresh air. It is played in an outdoor setting where the risk of contracting COVID-19 is low."

In terms of other sports across Co. Wicklow, the GAA announced the suspension of all club activity including games, training, and team gatherings at all ages and grades. Likewise, the IRFU and FAI announced that all club activity must cease across all clubs and age groups. All of Bray Wanderers' fixtures have been postponed until after March 29th.

With 14 weeks remaining before the start of the biennial SSE Renewables Round Ireland Race, organisers at Wicklow Sailing Club decided to postpone the official launch which was due to take place last Wednesday. More than 100 participants from around Ireland and abroad had been expected to attend the event at the Royal Irish Yacht Club in Dun Laoghaire but measures to contain the spread of the Covid-19 virus meant that a brief photo-call was held instead. However, with entries already running ahead of 2018 levels, there are currently no plans to amend the expected start date of the race on Saturday 20th June 2020. To date, the 41st edition of the classic

offshore race has attracted 38 entries from eight countries.

Kyran O Grady Wicklow Sailing Clubs commodore commented: "Heeding expert advice, it was with regret we decided to postpone the launch of the 2020 SSE

first. This will take sacrifice and some struggles, and embracing behaviour which is unfamiliar. There is no easy way. There are no short cuts. We have been preparing for this for weeks and planning to keep our country running. We will

Renewables Round Ireland race, ensuring safety for all is our priority on and off the water. We are continuing to plan for our 21st race and look forward to seeing you all at the start if not before."

In response to reports of panic buying by customers Wicklow TD Minister Simon Harris has said people should "buy what we need to provide for themselves, families and loved ones" but he said that everyone should consider the "unintended consequences of taking something that somebody else requires. Retailers and suppliers have assured the government there is sufficient products in the supply chain and that there is no need to over-shop. Just buy what you normally need and come back next week."

Minister Harris added: "There is a dedicated HSE helpline for Coronavirus queries 1850241850. I have been greatly heartened by the offers of help from people in Wicklow to assist and volunteer in whatever way they can to tackle the public health emergency. In the first instance it remains absolutely essential that we maintain hand hygiene and follow the advice when it comes to coughing and sneezing."

"We do not underestimate the challenge today's decisions will involve for people, for families, for older people, for employers, and we do not take the measures lightly. Public health must come

work with all sectors and communities. We will all have to pull together and help each other".

Minister Harris has also encouraged businesses impacted by COVID-19 to avail of the range of supports that have been put in place to protect businesses from the impact of COVID-19. He said: "I welcome the news from the Department of Business, Enterprise and Innovation on the package of supports for businesses facing difficulties as a result of COVID-19. I have received a number of queries from local businesses seeking advice around the COVID-19 outbreak and this package will provide some of the necessary supports required to keep businesses on their feet".

An Post announced that "Post offices continue to operate as normal. We are carefully monitoring the situation regarding C O V I D - 1 9 (Coronavirus). Business Continuity Plans are in place and we are working closely with the HSE Expert team, the Health Threats Coordination Group and international postal organisations. See anpost.com for further updates."

In the event of a customer not being able to collect their Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection payment personally at the Post Office a nominated person (Temporary Agent) can be nominated to collect the payment on their behalf. When col-

lecting a payment, a 'Temporary Agent' must produce the recipient's card as issued by the DEASP as well as their own valid photo I.D. e.g current Passport, Driving Licence or Public Service Card. To become a Temporary Agent, the recipient must complete the required form which is available from the Post Office.

While Buildings are open, members of the public are being asked to make contact with the Council by phone or email where possible and to submit applications for services such as Planning etc by post. Motor Tax renewals can be processed online by applicants or alternatively, renewal applications may be forwarded by post. Members of the public with additional queries regarding Wicklow County Council Services are encouraged to contact us by telephone (0404) 20100 or by email: corporate@wicklowcoco.ie."

Wicklow County Council Chief Executive, Mr Frank Curran, said: "The Council is taking action to minimise the spread of the virus. Council staff will work to ensure a continuity of service across our key operations. The Council's Crisis Management team meets daily to monitor the situation as well as liaising with Government Departments and Agencies across the Eastern Region."

Firearm seized and arrest made on N11

A Mach type Machine Pistol was seized and a man in his 40s arrested when a vehicle was stopped in the Shankill area on the evening of Saturday 7th March.

Members attached to Garda National Drugs and Organised Crime Bureau (GNDOCB) and Emergency Response Unit supported by the Garda National Crime and Intelligence Service



investigating organised crime stopped the vehicle in the Shankill area. The prisoner was arrested pursuant to the provisions of section 30 of the Offences Against The State Act 1939/98 and was detained in a Garda Station on the South side of Dublin.

Speaking after the arrest Detective Chief Superintendent Angela Willis, head of the Garda National Drugs and Organised Crime Bureau said, "The seizure of firearms and the arrest of those who are prepared to use them continues to be a priority for the Garda National Drugs and Organised Crime Bureau who remain totally committed to detecting and disrupting those involved and bringing them before the courts."

New Gardai Superintendents to be allocated in June

An Garda Síochána last week announced the phased introduction of the Garda Operating Model in each of its 19 Divisions during 2020, and the allocation of Superintendents to each of those Divisions.

The Garda Operating Model will see more front-line Gardai, a stronger focus on community policing, and a wide-range of policing services delivered locally.

The Wicklow Division will be part of the third phase. It is anticipated that implementation will commence in June 2020.

Under the Garda Operating Model, Divisions will increase in size, will be operationally autonomous, and will be the key to policing delivery. Between now and the end of 2021, there will be a net increase of approximately 600 Gardai to bring Garda numbers up to 15,000. In addition, more than 800 Gardai will be deployed to the front-line. 640 Gardai have already been re-deployed to the front-line from administrative roles in the last few years.

The Garda Operating Model is being introduced as part of A Policing Service for the Future, which is the implementation plan based on the report of the Commission on the Future of Policing in Ireland.

An Garda Síochána has committed to ensuring

Superintendents will be in locations throughout a Division and not all located in the Divisional Headquarters. Before changes are made at a Divisional level, change impact assessments will be conducted at a local level to ascertain what needs to be done to enable implementation.

Under the Operating Model, each Division will for the first time have a Superintendent dedicated to Crime, a Superintendent dedicated to Governance and Performance Assurance, and a number of Superintendents in charge of Community Engagement.

An Assistant Principal, which is the grade equivalent of a Superintendent, will also be appointed in each Division to head up Business Services, which covers areas such as HR, Finance and Administration. This will free-up Superintendents from administrative tasks so they can focus on policing activity.

Following a review based on operational requirements including the submission of business cases from local management, a total of 93

Superintendent positions have been allocated across the Divisions. This is a further 17 Superintendent positions from original projections. The total number of Divisional Superintendents will go from 104 to 93.

Seven of the 19 Assistant Principals are already in situ in their respective Divisions. The remainder have either been selected or the selection process is underway.

Under the Operating Model, there will be a significant increase in the allocation of Sergeants and Inspectors to Divisions, particularly in the area of community policing.

Garda Commissioner Drew Harris said: "These changes will see us deliver a more responsive, more efficient and better service to local communities."

"It will mean increased numbers of Gardai working on the frontline, better investigations of crimes against the vulnerable such as sexual crime, and community policing teams dedicated to working with communities to identify and tackle prob-

lem crimes in their area.

"Today's announcements demonstrate the good progress we have made and plan to make over the coming months in implementing the Model. The quicker we can make these changes at Divisional level, the quicker we can deliver these improvements to communities."

Under the Garda Operating Model, a Division will be typically made up of around 600 to 800 personnel. This will ensure each Division has the resources and skills to deliver a wider range of community policing and specialist services based on the demand in their area.

There will be better investigative services locally as Divisions will have a wider range of specialist skills and expertise such as Protective Services, Economic Crime and Cyber Crime. Regions and divisions will have greater control over how policing is delivered, while working to a corporate framework and oversight from the centre. The focus of the centre will be on supporting regions and divisions.

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Welcome changes to 133 route to come into effect from next Sunday

Changes to the 133 Bus Éireann Route will be implemented from Sunday 22nd March. A revised timetable along with routes will be implemented which will see increased frequencies. The service has been much complained about.

Speaking after the announcement from Bus Éireann, John Brady TD said "The announcement today from Bus Éireann about improvements to the 133 Route has to be welcomed. Last November I met with both the National Transport Authority and Bus Éireann and they committed to improving the 133 Route early in the New Year. The announcement today sees the creation of four separate 133 routes serving Wicklow."

The four routes are: Route 133: Wicklow - Bray - City Centre; Route 133x: Wicklow - City Centre - Dublin Airport; Route 133b: Wicklow - Bray; Route 133L: Arklow - Wicklow via Avoca.

Deputy Brady continued: "Bus Éireann have said that there will be revised morning and evening peak services with an enhanced range of departure times. There will also be an increased evening frequency with later departures in both directions, along with increased frequency at weekends with an hourly fre-

quency throughout the day.

"We need a reliable, regular and assessable 133 Bus Route, so what has been put forward by Bus Éireann and approved by the NTA, is positive. We have yet to see the timetable, however it has to be welcomed that they have listened to my concerns and the concerns of the users and potential public transport users and have been willing to make changes."

Deputy Brady concluded "I will continue to engage both Bus Éireann and the NTA to continue to improve the 133 Route and I plan on meeting both bodies again in the near future to discuss the revised timetable when it's fully published."

At the January meeting of Wicklow County Council Bus Éireann CEO Stephen Kent acknowledged the problems with the much maligned 133 bus route service and said the company is hopeful that the new timetable will improve it. He admitted that the company "have not been delivering an optimal customer experience" with the 133.

The 133, which makes 300 trips per week between Wicklow Town and Dublin Airport, is the most complained about of all Bus Éireann's routes, receiving 889 complaints per 100,000 passengers in 2018 (compared to an average of 40 complaints per 100,000 passengers on the company's other routes).

Housing First contract signed for Mid-East

Wicklow County Council says it is committed to the Housing First model which is being rolled out across the Mid-East Region (Wicklow, Kildare and Meath). Wicklow had its first client accommodated in December 2019, with a further client in January 2020. Other clients proposed for Housing First have been assessed by the team and are currently receiving relevant supports.

The Rebuilding Ireland: Action Plan for Housing and Homelessness sets out the Government's aim to introduce Housing First as a means to address homelessness, by strengthening the housing led approach and extending it nationally, focussing on persistent rough sleepers and long-term homeless households. To this end the Housing First National Implementation Plan 2018-2021 was published in September 2018. The commitment to deliver Housing First is a key action of the Mid East Region Homelessness Action Plan 2018-2020.

Kildare County Council, as the lead authority for the Mid-East Region Homelessness Forum, with the local authorities of Meath and Wicklow, and in partnership with the Health Service Executive, has established a regional Housing First service. The service is co-funded by the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government and the Department of Health. The Mid East Homeless

Forum is advised by a multi-agency group including Non-Governmental Organisations in the sector and other relevant Statutory agencies.

Following a tender process, The Peter McVerry Trust was chosen to deliver Housing First across the Mid-East Region. The Housing First model is a participant-centred approach that focuses on ending homelessness for people with high and complex needs who have been rough sleeping or using emergency homeless accommodation for long periods of time. This is achieved by providing the individual with direct access to secure, independent housing without pre-conditions and this is accompanied by intensive wraparound housing and health supports.

The coordinated service is now available in Kildare, Meath and Wicklow with the purpose of providing tenancies in self-contained independent housing units, with the combined services of the Health Service Executive's primary care,

mental health and substance misuse teams, working in collaboration with TUSLA, the Gardaí and other voluntary agencies, managed by The Peter McVerry Trust.

Signing a Housing First Service Level Agreement with The Peter McVerry Trust today, Mr. Peter Carey, Chief Executive of Kildare County Council, noted that the central objective is the ending of rough sleeping and long-term emergency accommodation use. He noted the service model includes intensive wrap-around supports for tenancy and health supports provided to Housing First clients in a timely and appropriate manner and for as long as required.

Mr. Pat Doyle, Chief Executive of the Peter McVerry Trust, stated that the service's immediate focus is on an active settlement approach, utilising trauma-informed care which emphasises physical, psychological and emotional safety for the service user to assist them in rebuilding a sense of control and empowerment. The overall out-

come is that the person is progressed successfully and sustained out of homelessness and into an appropriate tenancy arrangement.

A priority intake list for Housing First will be jointly managed by the Local Authorities, the HSE and the Peter McVerry Trust. Ms. Ann O'Shea, Chief Officer of the Community Health Office serving Dublin South, Kildare and West-Wicklow stated that Housing First participants will be offered intensive, time-unlimited (for as long as the participant needs) visiting support from a team capable of responding to a wide range of needs including alcohol and/or drug dependency, physical and mental health (enduring or otherwise) needs.

Working in partnership, the multidisciplinary team has successfully provided secure and supported accommodation for six individuals to date, and provided additional practical support with moving in, getting established and healthy life skills to support long term tenancies.

Wicklow Uplands Council disappointed as no announcement is made on extending controlled burning season

Wicklow Uplands Council says it is disappointed that no announcement is forthcoming from the Department of Heritage, Culture and the Gaeltacht, regarding the controlled burning season this year.

The Heritage Act 2018, introduced a two-year pilot, which would allow for the use of controlled burning in the month of March should circumstances such as adverse weather conditions require it, however this is subject to ministerial approval.

The current permissible dates are from September 1st to the last day in February and although an announcement has been widely anticipated, the department has stayed silent on this issue.

Recent figures released from Met Eireann confirm that the month of February saw record breaking rainfall across the country, with some of the records broken dating back as far as 1850. The country was battered by three storms, Ciara, Denis and Jorge, contributing to new wind records for February being set at 11 different locations. The farming communities across the country have reported that land and vegetation remain saturated and that the weather conditions required to safely undertake controlled burning, did not materialise.

Wicklow Uplands Council continues to advocate for the need to permanently extend the permissive controlled burning season to "more realistic and workable dates" and has been in correspondence with the Department to convey this.

The Uplands Council says that "Data supports the conclusion that the month of March offers much more favourable conditions, which is reflected in Northern Ireland's use of April 15th as the final day to its season."

The Roundwood-based organisation, continues to support the provisions contained within the Act that promotes the use of controlled burning which aids upland biodiversity and prevents the spread of wildfires during the drier summer months. Controlled Burning is an effective land management tool, with farmers and land managers carrying out burning activities within the permissive season.

Speaking about the promotion of Controlled Burning Practices, Brian Dunne, Coordinator of Wicklow Uplands Council said: "In the debate over controlled burning in the uplands, the fact that these are semi-natural habitats which need to be managed appropriately, is often overlooked. Vast areas of mature vegetation which can be subsequently wiped out by summer fires, are devastating to upland habitats.

"It should be recognised that there is a significant

difference between the destruction caused by uncontrolled wildfires compared with the use of controlled rotational burning. Used correctly, it offers the opportunity to reintroduce a mosaic of vegetation which supports extensive farming, habitat quality and biodiversity, and reduces the chances of a wildfire taking hold during drier periods".

Meanwhile, BirdWatch Ireland stated "The restrictions on the destruction of vegetation are in place in order to allow birds to undertake their breeding cycle, a time when they are most vulnerable. All wild birds are protected under national and EU law, especially during the period when they are breeding. This period starts when birds seek out and establish territories, find a mate, begin nest-building and then lay eggs and rear their chicks.

"There have been calls from some elected officials for hedge-cutting to be allowed in March. We reject this call, on the basis that it is reckless and goes against the calls of many in the farming circles for recognition of hedgerows as important habitats on farms for wildlife and carbon sequestration. In addition, we stress that hedge-cutting is already fully permitted in cases of bona fide road safety concerns."

Wicklow Montessori Primary School Win LEGO All-Ireland Final

Budding engineers at Wicklow Montessori Primary School were crowned the All-Ireland Lego League Champions, and will head off to the FIRST LEGO League world finals in the USA to represent Ireland.

Twenty teams of young engineers from across Ireland battled it out for the title on Saturday last, 7th March, at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Santry.

The science and technology challenge, which is aimed at 11-16 year olds, tasks teams to build a robot to tackle a series of missions, and create an innovative solution to a real world problem.

This year's 'City Shaper' challenge will see students learn more about architecture and the spaces we live in, while demonstrating their skills in robotics, computer programming, teamwork, research, problem solving and communication.

Dr Niamh Shaw, scientist, engineer, writer and astronaut in training, acted as MC for the fun-packed science day. Top tech professionals from firms like Combilift, Amazon, Sage and Qualcomm were there to help out and support teams too.

The programme is organised by the Institution of

Engineering and Technology (IET) in partnership with Irish STEM educators, Learnit.

The Dublin-based education specialist is the only official partner of LEGO Education in Ireland and runs after-school classes, workshops, summer camps and schools events that make science fun. The FIRST LEGO League is more than a robotics competition, Ross Maguire of Learnit says.

"The concepts of cooperation and competition combine. It's the idea that, by working together, we all win. FIRST LEGO League is a platform for students to discover the world of STEM and to collaborate on real-world problems. These fantastic young people are taking the first steps to becoming tomorrow's innovators, creators and problem solvers."

FIRST LEGO League participation has grown 70% in the past three years in Ireland.

Learnit works with Dublin City University and its LEGO Education Innovation Studio, with support from Science Foundation Ireland, to increase STEM awareness in young people.

Lowri Walton, IET Education Manager, says FIRST LEGO League allows young people to experience engineering in action.

"There is a great need for young people with STEM skills to fill the next generation of global engineering roles, and we are always excited to see so many bright young Irish engineering minds in development."

FIRST is an acronym for 'For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology', and the FIRST LEGO League encourages children to think like scientists and engineers, working on real-world issues.

PURE CONTINUE THE FIGHT AGAINST ILLEGAL DUMPING

In 2019 the environmental project, Pure, recorded its lowest amount of illegal dumping collected from the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands. Last year Pure removed 150 tonnes of illegal dumping from the beautiful, scenic, Wicklow/Dublin Mountains, when compared to ten years previous in 2009, they removed 344 tonnes, which is a 56% reduction.

A significant amount of the 150 tonnes of rubbish collected by Pure was gathered by the numerous volunteers involved in the Pure Mile. Thousands of volunteers are involved in the Pure Mile Project and in 2019 they collectively improved and enhanced over 550 miles of roads, mountains, woodlands, valleys and upland amenities, with hundreds more enlisting in the 2020 Pure Mile Project.

This is the third consecutive year that Pure has seen a reduction in illegal dumping in the upland region and the lowest amount of dumping they've collected since the Pure Truck started on the road back in 2007. Pure is the first project of its kind in Ireland and works with a number of statutory and non-statutory organisations and stakeholders, including, The Department of Communications, Climate Action and Environment, Wicklow County Council, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council, South Dublin County Council, Coillte, National Parks & Wildlife Service, and the Wicklow Uplands Council. This unique partnership project was established to combat illegal dumping in the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands and was officially launched in September 2006.

Ian Davis, Manager of Pure commented "The Pure partnership approach, incorporating statutory and non-statutory organisations, and members of the public, has proven extremely successful in combating illegal dumping in the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands and over the past three years we have recorded an annual reduction in illegal dumping

activity. This reduction in dumping is a direct correlation with the increase of Pure Mile areas. The Pure Mile makes a huge difference to the environment, especially in areas that are affected by littering and illegal dumping. Pure Mile volunteers have totally transformed the upland regions and because of their dedication, determination, and enthusiasm, they have not only reduced illegal dumping, but in some areas, eliminated the problem. A huge amount of progress has been made since Pure was established, however, there is absolutely no room for complacency, and it is vital that we continue to monitor the situation, or, we will see a return to the old days."

The Pure Mile engages with all demographics in society, and in the past ten years, thousands of volunteers from community groups, walking groups, cycling groups, scouts, beavers, businesses and organisations, have removed hundreds of tonnes of illegally dumped waste and thousands of bags of litter and rubbish from the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands. Pure provide all groups with Pure Mile signage, Pure Mile bags, gloves, litter pickers and Pure Mile high-vis vests, and they also remove all of the rubbish collected by the groups. The success of this environmental community project clearly demonstrates that people do care about the environment, and, that people want to make a difference to improve and enhance the environment. The role of the Pure Project is to facilitate groups, providing them with equipment, advice, and support, so they can make that difference.

The Pure Truck is on the road every day, and since the project was established, Pure has collected over 3,500 tonnes of rubbish from over 11,000 illegal dumping sites in the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands and have received 12,000 reports to the Pure office. If you were to put all this rubbish into standard household rubbish bags, you would fill over 400,000 bags. If you lined up each of the bags that Pure has removed from the landscape, they would stretch all the way from Dublin to Dingle.

Ian Davis continued: "Illegal dumping is not unique to the Wicklow/Dublin uplands, however, most regions in Ireland are currently reporting an increase in illegal dumping, the Pure Project are now recording a decrease. We have been recording and mapping every location and incident of illegal dumping in the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands since 2007, and we have built up a baseline-data of all illegal dumping activity in this region, the location of dumping, type of dumping, land owner, and amount of dumping, and for the past three years we have been recording an annual reduction."

Pure utilize a multi-disciplinary approach in combating illegal dumping, incorporating a number of preventative measures, covert CCTV operations, media/PR campaigns, public awareness campaigns, community projects, such as the Pure Mile, and educational initiatives, and due this approach the project has finally seen a marked reduction in illegal dumping in the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands. Another initiative

attributed to the annual decline in illegal dumping activity is the success of the Pure Covert CCTV Operations, which involved the deployment and installation of a number of covert CCTV units at several problematic upland dumping sites which were continually affected by illegal dumping. The footage obtained from this operation clearly identified the people involved

in both littering, and illegal dumping. This footage resulted in a number of people receiving litter fines, and one case brought before the courts involving large scale illegal dumping, resulted in a criminal prosecution and a large fine for the offending individual. A number of illegal dumping incidents caught on covert CCTV are currently under investigation by Wicklow County Council, and South Dublin County Council, and Pure are confident that both of these local authorities will proceed with court prosecutions this year.

Ian Davis added: "We will continue with our Covert CCTV Operations in 2020 and a number of locations that are continually affected by illegal dumping have already been selected for monitoring. We are collaborating with, Wicklow County Council, South Dublin County Council, Coillte, and the National Parks and Wildlife Service, and we are determined to catch those involved in illegal dumping and further reduce this environmental scourge."

vides, that isn't provided in your area, or which you can provide better than anyone else.

Determine your cost of operation. You will need a solid business plan to present to any investors and the best place to start would be with determining your basic cost of operations. This will outline and help you determine how much money is needed to produce the product or offer the service you intend to offer or produce. It includes production costs, shipping,

taxes, worker's wages, rent for workspace, etc.

Write up a budget. Once you have a general idea of how much money you have to work with, write up a budget for marketing which indicates how much money you have available to spend on advertising.

Create ideas fitting your budget. Once you know how much money you have, research the costs of different types of marketing and come up with ideas which fit those methods and are effective.

Broadband Plan will 'leave no one behind'

The National Broadband Plan, launched in Laragh last November, will "leave no one behind", Geoff Shakespeare from National Broadband Ireland (NBI) told councillors at this month's meeting of Wicklow County Council.

Currently almost a quarter of premises in Wicklow are still without access to high-speed broadband. Mr Shakespeare said "The Government is putting €59 million of subsidy into delivering the service in Wicklow. NBI will spend an additional €80m to deliver that service over the next 25 years."

There will be a detailed plan for getting high-speed broadband to every premises, he said: "we will have surveyors out walking to check the high-level designs they will have, and they will identify which poles we are going to use, which ducts we are going to use, which poles need to be replaced and then we will buy service off Eircom to buy those. We have a require-

ment once we have passed your home to deliver a connection to you within ten days, even if I have to build poles up the side of the road. What that means is I have to plan as though an order is going to come to from every premises in Wicklow, so that I can despatch on order and have a good shot hitting that ten-day Service Level Agreement. So we will know how we are going to connect to you and what it's going to cost to connect to you when we do our detailed survey."

The Broadband Connection Plans is a process that is going to take seven years but that will start delivering for Co. Wicklow in real terms early next year, he said.

"In advance of that, we are connecting broadband community points which will be wirelessly connected by microwave that will provide wi-fi in buildings," he said. The first two sites will be the areas around Killoole and Blessington, which will be connected by June of 2021.

February sees further disappointment in new car registrations

The Society of the Irish Motor Industry (SIMI) recently released their official new vehicle statistics. New car registrations for the first two months of 2020 were down when compared to 2019. In Co. Wicklow, there were 973 new registrations by the end of February 2020 compared to 1,095 in February 2019.

The most popular brand of passenger in Wicklow is Toyota which accounts for 134 of the new units registered this year, followed by Hyundai with 111 and Volkswagen with 103. The most popular models of cars are the Toyota Corolla, the Hyundai Tucson and the Nissan Qashai.

Petrol remains the most popular engine type, with 417 units registered, while electric engines accounted for 43 registrations, petrol/plug in electric hybrid 21, and diesel/electric 3.

Grey is the most popular colour choice in Wicklow, accounting for 381 units, followed by blue and then white/ivory. The least popu-

lar colour is yellow.

Brian Cooke, SIMI Director General commenting on the market figures said: "New car sales continue to disappoint with February's registrations showing further deterioration since January. Political and economic uncertainty is depressing consumer confidence and we now have the added problem of the Coronavirus, which may disrupt new hire drive registrations for the tourist season in March and April. The introduction of the new NOx charge in January has led to a fall in the demand for older used imports, with a fall of over 40% in used imports over 5 years old.

New electric car registrations are up 15% (1,294) year to date yet, but further analysis of this number reveals that while private consumer purchases of EVs, which still attract the SEAI grant, are up over 30%, there has been a reduction in company electric car purchases where this support no longer applies."

Nationally, Light Commercial vehicles (LCV) are down 6.9% (2,294) compared to February last year (2,465) and year to date are down 0.8% (7,946). HGV (Heavy Goods Vehicle) registrations are up 14.5% (300) in comparison to February 2019 (262). Year to date HGV's are up 11.04% (684).

Open Day in Wicklow for those with disabilities looking for employment

On April 1st, National Learning Network (NLN) will be holding an Open Day in its centre on the Boghall Road, Bray from 11am. Bray is just one of 30 nationwide centres welcoming the public to see what courses NLN has to offer.

Up to 13.5pc of Wicklow's population is living with a disability - and they are twice as likely to leave school early and be jobless as a result.

Some 1,223 people with disabilities have been supported into employment in the last three years by Ireland's largest non-governmental education and training organisation- National Learning Network.

Since 2017, a further 2,500 people with disabilities, mental health difficulty or challenging life circumstances have been supported to move onto further training education opportunities. A total of 800 of whom have progressed onto higher level training and education courses including third level colleges and universities.

Those who were supported to find employment through NLN, and who may otherwise have remained reliant on social welfare payments, have contributed in the region of 750,000 to the State as a result of securing employment. It also means that the Exchequer has saved in the region of 1million annually in reduced expenditure on social welfare benefits.

The figures were released as National Learning Network launched its inaugural National Open Day, which will be held on April 1st at 11am and will see more than 30 centres across the country open their doors to the public.

NLN, which is the education and training division of Rehab Group- provides a range of flexible training courses for people with extra support needs. It is the largest private provider of personalised education, training and employment services in Ireland.

The certified training courses, which offer nationally recognised qualifications including QQI, ECDL, and City and Guilds, have impacted significantly on the progression of people with a disability and/or health conditions into employment and have seen some participants land jobs in companies such as Ryanair and Facebook.

NLN, Wicklow Manager, Deborah Coughlan said: "It can be a transformative experience for students. Our courses give excellent training, but equally importantly they add purpose to students' lives and gives them self-confidence. It's not easy when big changes happen in your life, whether through mental health issues, back pain, social anxiety, cancer or any other setback, but if it's support to find a job or get a qualification you need, then that's where we can help."


One student who was supported by NLN in Bray is Wicklow man, Darren Moran, aged 37.

"Before NLN I mainly did factory work, but I was diagnosed with epilepsy which stopped me from working in that

area. Because of this I was nervous about going out to the workplace, and for many years I did nothing. Then I heard about the National Learning Network Bray. I saw how they have helped out so many people in finding work and getting back to further education. I decided that NLN would be a good

ment. The support systems they have at NLN are amazing. Whether it's going on to further education, finding a career or job, NLN really has everything you need to put you on the right path. It did for me," he added.

Interim CEO of Rehab Group, Barry McGinn adds: "If you have a disability you are twice as

place to try and re-educate myself and try a new career path. I am currently doing an IT and Business Administration course and it is going very well. Since I have started in NLN my confidence has improved so much that I am ready to get back into the work place as soon as I'm finished my course.

"I would recommend NLN to anybody looking to get back into further education or employ-

likely to be unemployed as a person without a disability. We know from the last Census that 73% of people who do not have a disability are working but only 36 per cent with a disability are working.

"This is unacceptable and this is where NLN comes in. Every day we are helping people into meaningful employment and helping them to change their story."

Last year's Irish and overall winner in the Drama category, *Backwater*, has gone on to gather awards and accolades at venues all over the world, after its initial success in London last June.

Advice for consumers following preventive cancellations of sporting and cultural events in Europe

The Coronavirus developments in Europe brought about travel restrictions and new quarantine decrees almost on a daily basis over the last while. Most recently, Irish consumers were affected by the cancellation in various places in Europe of major sports events, such as the recent Six Nations France v Ireland rugby match in Paris.

Attending events in Europe will always involve an air or sea journey from Ireland so a cancelled event at destination will almost always result in flight and ferry tickets cancellations or changes. This will complicate things for Irish air travellers and sea passengers, and we look at the different options on how to secure refunds for the different parts of the journey and the event itself.

Event Tickets

When an event is cancelled at destination, consumers are entitled to seek a refund of their tickets, if not already offered by the promoter or organiser. If the event organiser is based within the European Union, the United Kingdom, Norway and Iceland, the European Consumer Centre (ECC) Ireland may be able to assist consumers who run into difficulty in their dealings with the organiser.

Travel Fare

Securing a refund for flights purchased in advance may be more difficult still. In the current context of the wide-spread COVID-19 emergency in Europe, we have seen cases where refunds and free re-bookings were offered to fans as a gesture of good will from transport providers. This is not a rule, and with the travel disruption continuously evolving, we are not seeing a unified response on the part of air carriers or other transporters, such as ferry, train or coach services.

If your event was cancelled, yet flights to the destination country are not restricted, as was the case with the France-Ireland rugby match, even though the purpose of the trip has suffered changes, or was indeed cancelled altogether, any flights booked separately from the event ticket can only be considered within their own separate travel agreements, and the usual Terms and Conditions apply. Consumers should always contact the airline directly to see if a refund or a re-booking is possible or to see if the airline is offering any other once-off redress option related to that particular event's cancellation.

If you are concerned that your event might be cancelled or there is uncertainty regarding possible travel restrictions at the location or in the country of the event, monitor the airline's communications to see if any offers such as free re-bookings are offered in the near future.

Accommodation Costs

If you have bought tickets to an event that was recently cancelled, but there are no restrictions imposed

at the location or in the country of destination, and the accommodation providers you reserved with are still prepared to perform their side of the contract, securing a refund may be challenging. If you have booked through a booking engine such as booking.com, hotels.com, trivago.com, etc., please review and refer to the terms and cancellation policy received with the booking confirmation if you plan to make a claim for refund or re-booking.

There are cases where the hotel, AirBNB host or other accommodation provider offer to refund the costs without penalties, as a good-will gesture. In other cases, providers will offer accommodation credit or a voucher to be used at a later date, especially if the event in question was itself rescheduled. In all other cases, the relevant Terms and Conditions accepted at the time of booking are applicable. Consumers are advised to review these, as well as the contract's cancellation policy, and get in touch with the accommodation providers directly to see what their options are as to a refund or a free re-booking.

Your travel insurance, if you have it, may cover no refund situations also. If you have ascertained that no reimbursement of any kind is forthcoming on the part of the hotel, contact your insurer directly and see what level of cover you have and what it can help with.

All-In-One Travel Package

While package Terms and Conditions tend to be generally more favourable to the customer, securing a refund for travel tickets and the hotel costs may be difficult, unless the event was part of the package, in which case consumers are advised to contact the travel agent for assistance.

If you are planning to travel to events held in Europe in the very near future, particularly in COVID-19 affected areas or countries currently considering inward and outward travel restrictions, we advise that you carefully review your travel agreements and cancellation policies well in advance of your date of travel or decision to cancel your trip. In times of great uncertainty, one of the best options to make sure you don't end up out of pocket is to plan carefully, monitor the travel advice updates from the Irish authorities and the countries you plan intend to travel to. It's also a good idea to take out travel insurance, especially if you travel abroad multiple times a year.

Wicklow Rapid Response launch major fundraising drive for equipment

Wicklow Rapid Response will kick off our fundraising campaign for new equipment with the Wicklow Gaol break Half Marathon and 10km on Sunday 22nd of March.

In addition to the specialist skills and treatments that WRRR DOCTOR can provide, Wicklow Rapid Response is now also supporting six National Ambulance Service Paramedics and Advanced Paramedics to respond voluntarily to emergencies in their community when off duty. This further strengthens the chain of survival for out of hospital cardiac arrest in Co Wicklow and surrounds.

Currently these volunteers are equipped with old and barrowed equipment. Wicklow Rapid Response has plans to provide them with defibrillators that will allow not just to defibrillate a patient, but also monitor the patient's cardiac rhythm while providing treatment.

The Wicklow Rapid Response running team includes the Rapid doctor, volunteer Advanced Paramedics, volunteer supports and Mark Darcy of Sinnott Skoda Wicklow who sponsor the Skoda Karoq Rapid Response

Vehicle used by the Doctor. You can donate through their GoFundMe Page. Wicklow Rapid Response receives no statutory funding and is completely dependent on donations to support the service. You can also make a contribution at www.wvrr.ie

WRRR was tasked 163 times in 2019. As a community based emergency service, which is available to Ambulance Control, the WRRR Rapid Response Vehicle may be the closest emergency service and can make a lifesaving difference in time critical cases, where every second counts. On occasion, advanced critical care interventions from a trained specialist physician can be lifesaving. These interventions can include: advanced drug therapy, advanced analgesia and critical procedures such as emergency anaesthesia, roadside surgery and now pre hospital blood transfusion.

Wicklow has a significant rural population

where a community-based specialist emergency service can shorten the time to definitive care. WRRR have developed a volunteer model of pre-Hospital emergency medicine in Wicklow by using a physician and off-duty responders supported by communities working under the National Ambulance Service. Their aim is to maximise resources in the community complementing the existing pre-hospital care services.

WRRR is entirely dependant on charitable donations to fund their service. Please support them and the runners in any way you can with a donation, or contact them directly at info@wvrr.ie if you would like to help.

Wicklow Rapid Response Chairman Colm Dempsey highlighted the crucial role of teamwork in pre hospital care: "Extending skilled care to patients by supporting off duty ambulance paramedics willing to give up their free time with the right equipment

that will allow them to provide quality patient care is a positive move. Wicklow Rapid Response Team does not work in isolation. The positive patient outcomes are due to a coordinated multi-disciplinary response starting with the Emergency Call Taker and Emergency Dispatchers in the NAS Emergency Operations Centre, deployed services include Community First Responders, Off Duty Responders, NAS, the Fire Service, the Irish Coast Guard, Dublin & Wicklow Mountain Rescue Team, Glen of Imaal Mountain Rescue Team and many others.

Notwithstanding this, there are people alive and well today due to the treatment provided by the specialist Pre Hospital Emergency Medicine level of care Wicklow Rapid Response has provided. Wicklow Rapid Response is one of only 4 such services currently providing this level of care in Ireland."

Dog fouling awareness campaign comes to Delgany

Delgany National School last week got a visit from the Dogs Trust Education and Community officers to deliver the deliver 'The Big Scoop' workshop to pupils. The aim of this is to highlight that dog fouling is not a dog problem but a human one, all while using their three-tier approach-The Law, Health, and the people it affect. Delgany NS was one of 22 selected schools around the country where a workshop was held.

Dogs Trust's annual dog fouling awareness campaign, 'The Big Scoop', was launched last week to encourage more people to be kind to their community and pick up after their dog.

Free downloadable toolkits full of lesson plans, posters, fact sheets and activities were also made available. Both the toolkit and workshops educated children about this important job and encouraged them to remind the adults they're walking with (not strangers) of their responsibility to pick up after their dogs.

Delgany NS will now be invited to take part in 'The Big Scoop' national poster competition to highlight the importance of this issue. There are many prizes to be won and the overall poster winner will help represent the promotion of next year's campaign.

Dawn Kavanagh, Education Manager at Dogs Trust said: "Children are the future dog owners of Ireland so it's so important to instil the key messages around responsible dog ownership, which includes picking up after our dogs, from a young age. Adults should be leading by example, as it is the responsibility of adults to pick up after their dog.

"Our workshops will encourage children to remind family and friends, not strangers, about their responsibility as dog owners. We carried out research which revealed that almost half of people surveyed came across dog poo in local children's parks which is a staggering figure and highlights how big of an issue this is for communities.

"We hope that our 'The Big Scoop' workshops, toolkit and the poster competition will make learning fun and inspire the next generation to become model

dog owners of the future."

Deborah Martin, Campaigns Manager at Dogs Trust, said: "We are asking dog walkers to be kind to their community and to please always pick up after your dog. Our recent research highlights how big of an issue dog fouling is and we want to reinforce the message that this is solely a human problem and not a dog one. Please think of the vulnerable members of your community such as wheelchair users, visually impaired people, babies and toddlers, those who use buggies

and prams, as well as people playing sports. Whether you own a dog or not, dog waste in public spaces affects everyone so please Bag It, Bin It."

The charity is urging the public to always pick up after their dog using a Poo Bag or a scooping device before disposing of it in any bin and then to wash their hands when they get home. Remember that cleaning up after your dog is the law and owners who don't are guilty of an offence and can be fined if the poo is left behind.

Wicklow students take part in charity schools visit to Zambia

Planting fruit trees at a school for the blind, giving an Irish dancing demonstration in 100% humidity, and abandoning a bus on impassable, flooded roads... it was all in a week's adventure for two Wicklow students who took part in a recent schools study visit to far off Zambia with Irish development charity, Self Help Africa.

Students Ciarán O'Sullivan from Coláiste Bhríde in Carnew, and Sean Byrne from Avondale Community College took part in the annual Self Help Africa schools trip, where they got the opportunity to see at first hand what life is like for people in the southern African country, while learning and sharing stories and cultural exchanges with their hosts.

Ciarán travelled with his teacher, Alison Moran, on the week long trip, while Sean, who completed his Leaving Certificate last Summer and is currently in university in The Netherlands, took part as the winner of the BT Young Scientist and Technology 'Science for Development' award winner. Self Help Africa organises the Irish Aid sponsored prize at the student science fair year, with the award winner receiving a travel bursary to go on a schools visit to a project country where the Irish charity is working.

The two Wicklow teenagers were joined by students and teachers from Sacred Heart School in Clonakilty, Co. Cork, and by representatives from Sutton Park School in Dublin.

Coláiste Bhríde is amongst more than 80 schools across Ireland who are currently working with Self Help Africa's 'Global Citizenship' school workshops programme. Students are selected for the trip based on essays and presentations that they made, together with

a campaign of fundraising activities that is organised by the school, to both cover the travel costs and contribute support to Self Help Africa's work.

During the visit the students visited a number of projects that Self Help Africa is implementing in the country, had the chance to interact with their Zambian peers when they visited a local school, visited various cultural sites, and were hosted by the Irish Ambassador to Zambia, Seamus O'Grady, at the Irish Embassy in the capital, Lusaka. Sean Byrne also gave a presentation to university students in the Zambian capital, Lusaka, on his winning project, which had created a low-cost water filtration system using eggshells.

The students all kept daily journals of their experiences, and will give presentations in their schools and communities about their African visit, over the coming weeks. Self Help Africa's Development Education coordinator Dorothy Jacob said that the annual trip gives students a chance to experience Africa, and get an opportunity to see and learn at first hand what life is like for people living in this region of the world.
