FIRST CASES OF COVID-19 IN WICKLOW

There are now two confirmed cases of the Coronavirus in Arklow. The men arrived back from Italy last week after being on a skiing holiday and it's believed they contracted the virus while there. Both men are in the Mater Hospital, while their families are in self isolation. It is understood that one of the men is the spouse of a health practitioner.

The HSE when contacted to confirm the cases in County Wicklow refused to comment saying "Please be advised that the HSE and the Department of Health are not providing information about individual activations of preparedness plans or about individual cases of Covid-19 (coronavirus) other than confirmed cases" and directed us to email the Department of Health, who didn't respond.

St. Mary's college Arklow issued a statement on Friday saying

"We wish to update the school community on the current situation in St. Mary's college in light of a reported incidence of Coronavirus in the locality. Following conversations with the HSE we have been advised that any risk to students in the school is classified as low risk. Contrary to reports on other platforms, St. Mary's College remains open for students as normal. Should this situation change, the Board of Management will communicate information immediately through our normal communication channels."

Also last Friday visitor restrictions were announced by Nursing Homes Ireland "For the protection of nursing home residents, NHI has confirmed that visiting restrictions are now in place in nursing homes nationwide. No non-essential visiting, children or groups will be allowed. All visitors are asked to contact prior to attending. Visitors should only seek to attend in urgent circumstances and the management reserve the right to impose full restrictions

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where necessary. We urge prospective visitors to nursing homes to be cognisant and understanding of the measure that is required in the interest of resident and staff safety. Older people and people in nursing homes with pre-existing medical conditions are particularly vulnerable if they contact the virus. The virus presents an unprecedented situation for our nursing homes and the care provided within them. Nursing homes are imposing the visitor restrictions in the best interests of residents and staff. We thank people for their understanding and patience during this period of unprecedented challenges presented by Covid19."

Speaking at government buildings last Friday evening Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar said people should not

act unilaterally, including creche owners, school principals, business owners or event organisers as that causes problems. Mr Varadkar confirmed that the Dublin St Patrick's Day parade would go ahead. Chief Medical Officer Tony Holohan said they will continue to monitor the public health advice. Asked if they might cancel St Patrick's events at a late stage, Mr Holohan said that would be possible if the advice indicated such a move should be taken.

His comments come as the organising committee behind the St Patrick's Day parade in Youghal, Co Cork, said the parade has been cancelled due to concerns about Covid-19. In a statement, the organisers said "the health of our community is our primary concern".

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GREENS DON'T WANT N11 FUNDING

Following recent remarks about the N11 improvement scheme made by Green Party Leader, Eamon Ryan TD, advocating not proceeding with them, Independent councillor Joe Behan has urged Wicklow County Council not to delay the works as it could result in the project missing out on vital funding.

The Green Party leader said that money spent on widening the N11 would be better invested in improving the rail line between Wexford and Dublin.

Speaking at last week's meeting of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Behan said "As we know, there are negotiations in progress at the moment for the formation of a new Government. The Green Party are central to those negotiations at the moment. And the leader of the Green

Party made a statement in the Dáil about the N11 and works that may be happening with regard to the N11/M11. It was to the effect that if they get into Government they are going to stop those works and I think there is a very serious threat to improvement works on the N11 if that particular threat is carried out.

"I raised this before the election and I remember the one issue that I think most people were agreed on at the time is that there needs to be a combination of works done there, not just widening a road, but also public transport options for people and we all agree with that.

"As a body, we should be indicating very clearly to the Department of Transport and the Department of Local Government that we do not want to see the priority of that particular road being removed by a future Government and we should make our views very clearly known on that subject."

Cllr Behan asked that the Council send a letter to the Department outlining the view that funding for the upgrade must be retained.

Harris raises the need for increased police presence

Minister Simon Harris has written to the Minister for Justice about the need for an increased police presence in Charlesland and Enniskerry

Minister Harris said that the recent attack on two joggers in Charlesland "caused great alarm in the community. I have requested the County Wicklow Policing Committee discuss the recent increase in burglaries in residential areas adjacent to the N11 including the communities of Enniskerry, Delgany, Charlesland and Kilcoole.

"I have also written to the Minister for Justice seeking an update on how to extend the opening hours for Enniskerry Garda station in light of a number of incidents in the community since the start of the year including the recent attempted robbery on Enniskerry Post Office. The North Wicklow area has a rapidly growing population and policing resources must keep up with the related demographic and social pressures that come with new housing developments."

Three teenage males were arrested for the mugging at knife-point of three female joggers that took place in Charlesland on the evening of Thursday, 20th February.

Mini bus drives into Avoca River

A mini bus ended up in the Avoca River in Arklow in the early hours of Tuesday morning last week. The Arklow RNLI rescued the male driver who was the only occupant of the vehicle. He was taken to hospital with minor injuries. The accident occurred at the junction of South Green and South Quay.

The volunteer RNLI crew left their beds and within minutes of the request were aboard RNIB Ger Tighlearr and underway. In good conditions, The Allweather Trent Class lifeboat Ger Tighlearr made its way to the reported position in the Avoca River.

Once at the scene, it was ascertained that the vehicle was located in a shallow part of the river. It was then decided that RNLI volunteers would access the semi submerged vehicle from the riverbank as due to the river depth the lifeboat could not enter the area. The boat then completed further searches of the river downstream.

A crew member managed to wade out and gain access to the vehicle and it was established that there was one person inside.

Following efforts to open the doors and equalise the pressure, one of the RNLI volunteers was able to extricate the injured man from the vehicle. The man was then brought to shore and treated and removed to hospital by a waiting ambulance crew.

Following the incident, Mark Corcoran, Volunteer Press Officer at Arklow RNLI said "Thankfully this morning was relatively calm, had conditions been worse and had the river been in flood, the situation might not have ended so well. I would like to say thanks to all of our volunteers who through teamwork got this positive result. We would like to once again remind people to respect the water."

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NO FAIR 'FAIR DEAL'

A new analysis shows HSE nursing homes in Co Wicklow are being paid 60% more per resident, per week, than private and voluntary counterparts in the county under the Fair Deal scheme.

The fees payable highlight Fair Deal funding for nursing home care is 'fundamentally flawed', Nursing Homes Ireland (NHI) says, with no recourse for private and voluntary nursing home providers to independently appeal the fee they are set under the Scheme. This arises as HSE nursing homes pay their homes fees that are a multiple those payable to private and voluntary counterparts, with no negotiation entailed.

The analysis undertaken by Nursing Homes Ireland shows that the 20 private and voluntary nursing homes operating

in County Wicklow receive an average Fair Deal fee of €1,066 per resident per week. Three nursing homes - St Columban's in Magheramore, Aisling House in Arklow, and Asgard Lodge in Arklow - receive a fee of less than €1,000 per week. The largest fee in Co. Wicklow among private and voluntary nursing homes was Kinvara House in Bray (€1,200 per week).

In contrast, the two HSE nursing homes in the county (St. Coman's Hospital in Rathdrum and Baltinglass District Hospital) receive fees of

€1,669 and 1,750 per resident per week respectively.

The HSE homes are receiving on average 60% more than the private and voluntary nursing homes. The disparity within the county is long standing. When the fees were published for January 2019, the differential was 58%, with the average for the two HSE nursing homes being €1,657 but only €1,051 for the 20 private and voluntary

says that the figures lay bare "the gross disparity in fees payable between HSE and private/voluntary nursing homes under

the scheme". He said that private and voluntary nursing homes are seeking fair fees to provide specialised care and are dismayed that fees under the Scheme are not commensurate with the reality of costs or those given to HSE homes.

"The State is effectively applying mass discrimination against older people supported by Fair Deal in private and voluntary nursing homes. Private and voluntary nursing homes have had to close their doors due to fees payable under Fair Deal not being sustainable and are operating under unnecessarily severe financial pressure."

Speaking last Friday evening, Minister for Health, Simon Harris said: "Ireland remains in the containment phase. While countries are in different situations, it is vital we work together.

"We are better protected if we work together on this. We need rational, coherent decision-making based on science and public health.

"It is clear this virus is going to have an impact for a prolonged period of time. It is essential we plan ahead, protect our healthcare workers and do our best to provide accurate, evidence based and timely information to our people."

Minister Harris added: "Public communications is an important focus in our response. Europe must act together to stop the spread of misinformation about this virus."

"Those who spread such lies are increas-

ing the stigma attached to this virus. They are endangering lives and they are stopping us from doing our jobs. Our public health doctors should lead our response to this matter."

Sinn Féin Social Protection Spokesperson John Brady said the Government must revise the illness benefit for people who are made to self-isolate from Covid-19, and that a simplified application process must be rolled out to ensure people do not have to attend either the INTREO office or a GP to attain a medical certificate.

Deputy Brady said; "With recent international health events it is critically important that every effort is made to ensure workers are protected and to contain further spread of illness. "I have serious concerns that thousands of low paid or precarious workers may be unable to afford to self-isolate.

"The government must ensure that nobody is forced to work if medical advice

to self-isolate is given. Employers then should continue to pay workers who fall ill or are made to self-isolate due to the virus."

"Unfortunately, some employers have said they will not pay their workers in this context. IBEC refused to give an assurance that employers would provide sick pay to workers affected by the Covid-19 virus on an across-the-board basis. The only possible option for many workers will be to avail of illness benefit. However, due to criteria requirements, many workers might not have enough PRSI contributions to qualify. Even if a worker qualifies for full illness benefit, there is no entitlement at all for the first six days of absence from work. The government must make immediate changes to ensure illness benefit is paid from day one. There must also be an emergency payment for anybody that doesn't meet the qualifying requirements for the illness benefit, where there is a financial need."



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Senator Alice-Mary Higgins, daughter of President Higgins, was in Bray last Friday, canvassing with supporters including Social Democrats councillor Jodie Neary and former Fianna Fail local election candidate Sarah Fogarty. Senator Higgins said she is seeking re-election as "a progressive independent voice on equality and environment".

West Wicklow pool could form part of 'Leisure Complex'

Having the West Wicklow Swimming Pool form part of a larger leisure complex development could be a way to get the project over the line, Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council Frank Curran said.

The setback for the West Wicklow Swimming Pool project was raised by several councillors at last week's meeting of Wicklow County Council. Cathaoirleach of the Baltinglass Municipal District, Cllr Gerry O'Neill, vented his frustrations with the Blessington Town Development Plan being put on hold and said that he could see a swimming pool being part of a leisure complex.

Responding, Chief Executive Frank Curran said "maybe that is the way we should go and have it part of a bigger development, maybe the Department would be more interested in that." He said that the Council would have to examine where it had gone wrong with its application.

The Council applied to the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport for funding under the Large-Scale Sports & Infrastructure Fund, to carry out an in-depth feasibility study to confirm the site for the swimming pool and to commission specialist architect drawings. However, the application was unsuccessful.

Councillors Gerry O'Neill, John Mullen, Sylvester Bourke, Joe Behan, Lourda Scott, Patsy Glennon, Peir Leonard, and Avril Cronin all raised the matter of the West Wicklow swimming pool.

Cllr Joe Behan said "Any of us who attended the recent public meeting in West Wicklow were left in no doubt how important that project is to the community in West Wicklow. Obviously, anything that the Chief Executive can do to support that, I am supportive of it."

Cllr Cronin asked if it were possible to get a report regarding the funding that was applied for: "It would be great to see the areas that were unsuccessful and why they were unsuccessful in that application, if a report could be provided it might help for future applications."

The Chief Executive assured her that this was possible.

The Council's Director of Finance, Brian Gleeson said "The build of the Swimming Pool would be subject to the feasibility study and the securing of grant aid for that. It's a big project, about €10 million, but the first step will be undertaking a feasibility study in relation to it. If we can't secure funding, we will have to look at our own resources and see if we can use some of our own funding, but obviously the first port of call is to try and see if we can get any funding towards it from different sources."

Cllr Cronin asked that if the Council is unsuccessful with the application again next year, would it commit to funding part of the project. The Chief Executive replied that "We will have a look at it but we are going to be funding part of it anyway even if we get the full grant. There is no point in us spending unless the Department is on board with following it through, because it can't happen without them. So, I think if they are serious about it, they will fund the design of it."

My first library card launched

A joint initiative to get young children to join their local libraries was launched recently in Blessington Library by Wicklow and Kildare County Library Services.

The idea behind the 'My First Library Card' project is to encourage parents of all newborns and children aged 0-5 to join the library.

My First library Card is free, all children can borrow up to 12 books at a time and libraries no longer charge fines. The initiative sees the launch of an attractive and colourful library card, designed by award-winning author and illustrator Chris Judge.

My First Library Card came about as a direct result of the national library programme 'Right to Read' campaign which is all about embedding the development of literacy into our communities through the local authority.

Libraries, as local champions of literacy support, have taken a leading role in the delivery of the "Right To Read" campaign across the country, because they have the experience and resources and are a trusted local community service and well placed to promote reading to all ages.

Wicklow County Council Library service is delighted to be working alongside Kildare County Council Library Service on this project. Both library services have collaborated on projects in the past, most recently the Shelf Help programme.

That project purchased and promoted a special collection of books on mental well-being and social issues. The collection was selected in conjunction with experienced professionals working in primary care within counties Wicklow and Kildare.

Public Health Nurses across Wicklow and Kildare will be distributing brochures to the parents of newborns at their first meeting and they will also be encouraging parents of all children up to the age of five years to get a library card for their child.

"The ultimate aim of this project is to have all children reading ready by the time they start in primary school," explained Cllr Irene Winters, Cathaoirleach, Wicklow County Council, adding: "Reading to a child is a powerful way to help children grow their vocabulary, language skills and imagination. It will help them develop life-long skills that will support their future learning and literacy."

She said research shows that a child that is read to every day will have heard up to 30,000 more words than a child who is not read to. "The child who is not read to is at a considerable disadvantage when he or she is in the same class as a child who has been read to regularly from birth," Cllr Winters said.

Cllr Winters said it was appropriate that the launch should be held in Blessington library as it has been the heartbeat of the community since it opened in 2006. There are 3,000-plus members while last year set a new record with 73,000-plus items borrowed from Blessington library.

The libraries of Wicklow and Kildare host a wide range of activities to promote reading awareness, throughout the year.

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SSE address public lighting outages

Representatives from SSE Airtricity attended last week's meeting of Wicklow County Council to address frustrations regarding the number of public lights which are not working and the length of time it takes to fix them.

Patrick Rooney, Regional Head of Operations at SSE Airtricity, disputed the figure that was given at last month's council meeting (that there were over 700 public lights out around the county). Mr Rooney said that there were only 310 lights not working, 56 of which were out of SSE's control.

Cllr Gail Dunne, who raised the matter at the February meeting, said that the figure of 700 had come from the Council's Director of Services.

Mr Rooney said he believed that the actual number of broken lights may have appeared to be higher than it was due to factors such as a 'doubling up' of reported faults, but he added that the company was working on improving its reporting system so that this no longer happened.

He said a lot of Wicklow's SOX lanterns have been there for 45 years plus, long past their shelf life, so "obviously they are breaking down and failing".

He said that in other cases delays were explained by severe cable faults - "It involves us discovering it, doing a lot of civil work and replacing the cable. These things take time, I am afraid there will be delays. There is also issues with the connections, where lanterns have not been energised. This sits again with ESB. We are escalating it to them, we deal with them on a weekly basis and we are speaking to their new public lighting interface manager, Sean Scannell. We are meeting with him this Thursday to escalate this point with him."

"The current replacement rate for those new lanterns is seven lanterns per crew per day and we currently have five crews working in Wicklow, so we are doing LED lantern refit," Mr Rooney explained.

A little under a third of Wicklow's lights are on ESB poles, which also adds to delays Mr Rooney said: "The wooden poles belong to the ESB network, we are not allowed to put up new lights on those poles. So, if there is a wooden one, a new steel column has to be erected."

Addressing the SSE representatives, Cllr Paul O'Brien said it has been "the not knowing factor that is killing us. If we can go back to our constituents and tell them what will happen, then at least we can give them knowledge and can pacify

them until the new lights are installed."

Cllr Lourda Scott said

"this is my first winter as a councillor and I have been amazed at how many complaints I am getting about street lights not being repaired and particularly complaints coming in from elderly people who are feeling unsafe leaving their own house and not being able to walk down their own cul-de-sac because of lack of lighting."

Mr Rooney assured councillors that "we are very aware of what these lights are and mean to people across Wicklow. Safety is our number one priority and we understand that, so we take our job seriously. We fix nearly 4,500 lights for you every single year, every single day our teams are out there across the country, out there reporting faults and out there repairing them, we are very aware of the safety implications."

St. Cronan's Celebrates 200 Years

St. Cronan's School celebrates 200 years educating boys in Bray this year, and kicked off the celebrations last week with a drone photo of all of their students.

"We have planned a number of events and activities to celebrate this momentous year" says Chairperson of the 200th Anniversary Committee Karl Ó Broin.

"There are very few schools in the country which have served their community for 200 years, and we are very proud of this tradition in Bray".

The school began in 1820 in a number of cottages as Bray Male School. In 1880, due to rising numbers the school moved into what is now known as The Little Flower Hall beside The Holy Redeemer Church.

It was during this time it's most famous past pupil was enrolled; Cearbhall Ó Dalaigh, who would go on to become the 5th President of Ireland. Cearbhall was born in 1911 above 85 Main Street, Bray, which is now the Jasmine House Restaurant.

In 1932, the school moved into a new premises on the Vevay Hill, and was renamed St. Cronan's Boys'

National School. The school was lead by many noteworthy principals during this time, including Paddy McDonnell, Martin Daly, Jim French and Seán Cotter.

When Vaughan Dodd arrived as principal in 1991, he lead a campaign for a new school building to cater for the growing school. A new building in Vevay Crescent was completed in 1999 and has been home to St. Cronan's ever since. The original Vevay Hill school building is now used by Gaelscoil Uí Chéadaigh.

"We are very excited about the 200th anniversary of our school and of celebrating the great history that St. Cronan's has in Bray," says current school principal Maeve Tierney.

"We are appealing to all past pupils of the school to get in touch with us if they have photos from St. Cronan's in times gone by, or if they have stories from bygone years to share with us," says teacher Karl Ó Broin."

The Committee for the Commemoration of Irish Famine Victims (CCIFV) is stepping up its campaign to have a site in Woodenbridge investigated as the possible location of a mass famine grave.

Michael Blanch from CCIFV told *Wicklow Times* that "Without investigation we will never know. What we do know is that a National Treasure 1847 Memorial Stone needs immediate protection, and the semi circle needs to be investigated. The National Museum of Ireland and the National Monuments Service both have a duty and obligation to protect such memorials. National institutions are duty bound to enlighten and

Also at the site there is the remains of a semi-circle stone structure similar to the dimensions of the holy grotto which is in pristine condition at Rathdrum Workhouse, the site a mass grave of over two thousands people, the majority of which are believed to have died during the famine.

The site was hidden under bushes and undergrowth and was found accidentally a few years ago.

CCIFV and local forester Barry Coad have for the last two years been informing Ministers, the National Museum of Ireland, National Monuments, Coillte and Wicklow County Council about the memorial stone, in order to have the site

educate the people on our greatest loss of life in Irish history nothing compares to An Gorta Mor.

Mr Blanch said that when it comes to the Famine there is a lot of "shamefully hidden and forgotten history", and "national amnesia", and he doesn't want this site in Wicklow to be ignored.

As examples he named Kilkenny Workhouse and Letterkenny Workhouse, where unmarked mass graves were discovered

when there was construction activity at the sites. "At all of these sites there was no X to show or mark the mass graves. Ministers, Wicklow County Council, and Coillte are looking at maps for burial sites, but as proven in all the other cases they will not find such graves marked on maps."

He added "CCIFV wish to thank Deputy John Brady, Cllr Dermot O'Brien and Barry Coad for supporting this worthy cause."

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PLANNING AHEAD FOR PEACE OF MIND

You really should have an Enduring Power of Attorney
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Many people are alarmed to be told that just because you are the 'Next of Kin' that you do not have the authority to make decisions for your loved one if they become mentally incapacitated due to injury or accident. The medical profession will require that an Enduring Power of Attorney be in existence, as indeed will other professions such as accountants and banks. Safeguarding Ireland says more people 'Thinking Ahead' would help to reduce and prevent abuse of vulnerable adults.

Recent research, commissioned by Safeguarding Ireland, showed that just 6% of adults had appointed an Attorney under Enduring Power of Attorney, and just 8% had discussed a preferred place of care.

"When people don't have their choices, preferences and decisions legally stated - and they have a life-changing accident, become seriously ill, or frail due to age - they are reliant on the honesty of friends and family. In most cases people's wishes are upheld by loved ones."

"Unfortunately, it is estimated that up to 10% of people are dishonest in how they manage a vulnerable person's money. That is why it is very important for all of us to appoint an Attorney and also put in place an Advance Healthcare Directive."

SO, WHAT IS AN ENDURING POWER OF ATTORNEY?

An Enduring Power of Attorney is a legal document which allows an individual to choose to appoint a specific individual (usually a close family member) to look after both your personal and financial affairs in the event that for any reason you lose your mental capacity in the future. We at Probate Ireland must stress that an enduring power of attorney is only valid or effective if you lose your mental capacity at some future point in time. An enduring power of attorney can be an extremely powerful document that significantly bypasses the hurdles and problems your family could face when trying to deal with your affairs should you become incapable. The main purpose of an enduring power of attorney is to enable somebody of your choosing to have the entitlement to manage your financial and personal affairs for you if you lose your mental capacity at some future date.

An enduring power of attorney therefore allows you to maintain control of your affairs until such time as you may become unable to do so yourself through mental incapacity.

By setting up an enduring power of attorney in advance you are able to choose some person or persons to deal with your affairs in a situation where you are no longer capable of doing so yourself. If you suffer such a setback and you do not have an enduring power of attorney in place then if your financial and property affairs are to be administered it will be necessary for an application to be made to the High Court to have you made a Ward of Court and to have someone appointed to take charge of your affairs.

As a donor of an enduring power of attorney, there are a number of safeguards designed to protect you.

When executing an enduring power of attorney, you can decide as to the scope of your affairs that you wish to have delegated to your attorneys. As donor, you can decide whether to grant authority for the control of your financial affairs, personal care, housing, medical affairs etc. Your solicitor will take great care in discussing all options so as to determine what is best for you.

An enduring power of attorney therefore allows you to maintain control of your affairs until such time as you may become unable to do so yourself through mental incapacity.

Under the Powers of Attorney Act 1996 it is possible for you to make provision for these situations by setting up an enduring power of attorney. Your solicitor can explain the formalities

and arrange for you to sign the necessary document now while you have the good health and the capacity to make the decision as to the person or persons whom you would wish to look after your affairs should the need arise. If a person loses mental capacity without having signed a valid Enduring Power of Attorney then in order to manage the person's property and affairs it is necessary to have such a person made a Ward of Court. This can be an expensive and lengthy process so having an enduring power of attorney in place is preferable.

There are many ways in which a person might lose mental capacity; Alzheimer's disease; Dementia; Stroke; Accident etc

With advances in medical care, increasing life expectancy and varying property values there is a growing need for people to make arrangements which can be brought into effect in the event of mental incapacity arising.

Under the Powers of Attorney Act 1996 it is possible for you to make provision for these situations by setting up an enduring power of attorney. Your solicitor can explain the formalities



to act: jointly (that is, they must all act together and cannot act separately), or jointly and severally (that is, they can all act together but they can also act separately if they wish).

If you give your attorney(s) general power in relation to all your property and affairs, they will be able to deal with your money or property and may be able to sell your house.

If you do not want your attorney(s) to have such wide powers, you can include any restrictions you like. For example, you can include a restriction that your attorney(s) may not sell your house.

You may authorise the attorney(s) to take certain personal care decisions on your behalf, e.g. deciding where you shall live. If you decide to do so, you should indicate, the particular personal care decisions you want to authorise. You should also name any person you would like the attorney to consult so that the attorney can have regard to that person's views as to your wishes and feelings and as to what would be in your best interests.

Unless you put in a restriction preventing it, your attorney(s) will be able to use any of your money or property to benefit themselves or other people by doing what you yourself might be expected to do to provide for their needs.

You may also appoint an attorney or attorney(s) to act in the event that the original attorney is unable or unwilling to act.

You must give notice of the execution of the enduring power of attorney as soon as practicable to at least two persons. None of

them may be an attorney under the enduring power of attorney. At least one must be the donor's spouse, if living with the donor. If the donor is unmarried, widowed or separated, notification must be given to a child of the donor (if applicable) or

otherwise to any relative (i.e. parent, sibling, grandchild, widow(er) of child, nephew or niece).

Mark Felton of Felton McKnight Solicitors in Greystones says "For the majority of people, various types of insurance policies are part of life.

Whether it is car insurance, house insurance, health insurance or even travel insurance the concept is the same. The insurance policy enables you to make provision for something you hope will never happen and ensures that if it does you can get the assistance you need with the minimum of difficulty. An Enduring Power of Attorney is in effect another form of insurance

and it too enables you to make provision for something you hope will never occur. In this case you are making arrangements for what you want to happen if you lose your mental capacity at some later date. It is an extremely powerful document and it enables you to choose who it is you want to have your authority to manage all of your property and affairs if you are no longer able to

do that. Your attorneys can also be allowed to make personal care decisions about you. That is decisions about where you live, who you live with, your dietary requirements and other similar matters. You can choose to appoint one or more than one attorney, it's up to you. There is no doubt that having an enduring power of attorney in place can and does in the main, ensure

that if it is necessary, your affairs can be managed for you in a manner that you have chosen by people you have chosen. This will give you great peace of mind. Talk to your solicitor today about this extremely important concept."

an EPA consultation you will need to have given careful consideration as to whom you would like to act as your Attorney(s) and who you would like to appoint as your Notice Parties. In addition, we will need your date of birth and the name of your current General Practitioner. You can call into us and we will walk you through the entire process."

Preliminary information required to prepare an Enduring Power Of Attorney

- You will need evidence of your identity - in order to comply with the Anti Money Laundering Regulations - simply the same as if you were opening a bank account, that is photographic evidence (your passport or driving licence) and a utility bill to confirm your address. You will also need to provide your date of birth, your occupation and your marital status.
- Your doctor will have to certify that you are mentally capable of signing the document so you need to give me his/her name address and contact number.
- You may choose one or more reliable people as your attorney(s) to act on your behalf in the event of you becoming incapable of looking after your own affairs. You need the names addresses and contact numbers for the selected person(s).
- It is advisable to appoint one or more substitutes who will act as attorney in the event that the originally nominated person(s) cannot do so.
- You are required to give notice of the making of the power to two of your closest relatives (other than an attorney(s) You need to provide the names, relationship, addresses and contact numbers for the selected person(s) At least one of these people must be your spouse, if living with you. If you are unmarried, widowed or separated, notification must be given to your child (if applicable) or otherwise to any relative (i.e. parent, sibling, grandchild, widow(er) of child, nephew or niece).
- If you give your attorney(s) general power in relation to all your property and affairs, they will be able to deal with your money or property as they think best and they may for example sell your house. If you do not want your attorney(s) to have such wide powers, you
- Although you need not do so you could name any person you would like the attorney to consult so that the attorney can have regard to that person's views as to your wishes and feelings and as to what would be in your best interests. You will need to let your solicitor know the name address and contact number for any such person so that reference may be made to the person concerned in the document.
- You may also appoint an attorney or attorney(s) to act in the event that the original attorney is unable or unwilling to act. Again you need to provide the names, relationship, addresses and contact numbers for any such person(s)

characterized by the use of everyday activities in which shared differences play an important role. He takes daily life as his subject matter, making work using creative game tactics, but these are never permissive. Funding for sensory facilities in Wicklow libraries

Funding of nearly €28,000 is being made available for the provision of sensory facilities and equipment in branches of Wicklow County Library Service.

The Minister for Rural and Community Development has announced that funding of €20,720 has been approved for Wicklow County Council for the project while the Council itself will match this amount by an additional 33%, bringing a total of €27,630.

This much welcomed support will enable Wicklow County Council Library Service to acquire the necessary equipment and make provision for individuals with sensory impairments, special educational needs, ASD and other learning difficulties.

Minister Simon Harris said "I welcome that the government are supporting Wicklow County Council in providing sensory facilities in our public libraries. The entire Wicklow library network

will benefit with the provision of sensory play equipment and toys, assistive technologies and autism-friendly signage.

Baltinglass Public Library will have a sensory room installed whilst Arklow public library will have a sensory pod.

"I am delighted to announce this investment as it makes our libraries a safe and welcoming space for all families and ensures everyone can access their local library service to the fullest extent".

Wicklow County Council Chief Executive, Mr Frank Curran, said: "Our libraries are essentially a space for all, and this funding will go towards ensuring that they are welcoming spaces where the experience for parents and carers of children and teens with sensory

needs is more comfortable".

In 2020 Wicklow County Council wants to make our libraries more accessible places for everyone in our community. Libraries can be very busy places with lots of activities happening throughout the day. Awareness that those with ASD, or indeed any member of the community, can suffer a sensory overload has guided our decision to ensure that every library in the county will benefit from this funding.

All other libraries will be provided with a sensory area which will feature padded tactile corners, mirrored walls and also pop-up sensory tents - depending on space and suitability. Each library will also have Sensory Kits which comprise a selection of sensory toys such as mini bubble tubes, fidget toys and various tactile objects which will calm a child experiencing sensory overload.

New insight into the rocks and soil below Wicklow

The Tellus Programme in Geological Survey Ireland has released the latest data from the ongoing airborne geophysical survey along with a series of photographic highlights taken by the survey pilots capturing the amazing Irish landscape.

The Tellus survey is a national mapping programme, and the data collected provides important information to the agricultural, mineral and environmental sectors. In 2019 airborne surveying was completed over the southeast of Ireland crossing the skies over Counties Wexford, Carlow, and Wicklow, and parts of Kilkenny, Kildare and Waterford. These new data map over 600 million years of complicated and varied geology; from traces of long lost continents, dramatic volcanic arcs and the massive granite intrusions which still dominate the landscape today.

Previously released electromagnetic data from the Limerick region have been re-worked using newly developed software allowing detailed vertical sections of varying resistivity values to be imaged down to a depth of 60 m along each flight line. These show differences in the soil and rock properties below the surface allowing a better understanding of the geology of the region.

Since the start of the Tellus survey in Ireland in 2011, the survey pilots have been taking photographs from their unrivalled vantage point of the stunning landscape below them. The Tellus team has collated these images along with facts from the localities and digitally mapped them to provide a 'Tales from

Tellus' ESRI storymap which shows the varied landscape of Ireland. While the survey collects geochemical and geophysical data that can image the deep geological features beneath our feet, these photographs show the human story of the survey and the dramatic coastlines, hills, fields and people who make up this island. The storymap can be viewed here.

Koen Verbruggen, Director of Geological Survey Ireland commented "We're delighted to release further geophysical data collected by the Tellus aircraft and in particular the new EM inversion dataset providing further value added products from the data which will be of use to people engaged in construction, mineral exploration and environmental management. Releasing the new data at the annual Irish Geological Research Meeting, held this year in Athlone and hosted by GSI, among the young geoscientists who will be using this information for years to come is most appropriate. We look forward to the next phase of the Tellus survey over the counties of Kilkenny, Laois and Tipperary which will take to the skies this summer".

Tellus is funded by the Department of Communications, Climate Action and Environment. All data are made freely available to the public and data and maps are available to view and download from www.gsi.ie/tellus. The data and results were presented at The Irish Geological Research Meeting, hosted by the Geological Survey Ireland in Athlone, from February 28th to 1st March.



Wolf of Fall Streets made it back-to-back wins when taking the 2m handicap hurdle at Leopardstown on Sunday. Philip Rothwell's charge made much of the running under Adam Short to again get the better of the 12-year-old Youngnedofthehill, he beat him by two lengths at Naas in January but the winning margin was five lengths this time.

Rothwell said, "I thought the handicapper had caught up with him, but I'd never seen him in as good a form as he's been over the last three days. He's like a horse possessed so it's nice to come to the races and see it work out. His owners Carol Hogan and Eric Newnham are super supporters of the yard so it's great for them. I felt there was a race for him at Navan next week, but he wouldn't love it heavy and I thought here would be the lesser of two evils and we got away with the light weight."

Katie Taylor to put undisputed lightweight status on the line

Katie Taylor is already being backed to cement her status as undisputed lightweight champion after securing herself a blockbuster bout against Puerto Rican pro Amanda Serrano.

The dream fight was confirmed on Friday afternoon with Promoter Eddie Hearn dubbing it the 'biggest female fight of all time,' as Taylor is set to be pitted against a world champion in seven divisions on a current streak of 24 straight victories.

That stellar record however isn't putting punters off backing the Bray boxer, who has already been backed into 4/11 with BoyleSports who chalked her up as the 1/2 favourite minutes after the bout was announced for May 2nd in Manchester, on the undercard of Dillian Whyte's heavyweight clash with Alexander Povetkin.

Serrano, who began a war of words with the Irish star last month by labelling her 'average,' is the early 9/4 outsider as she bids to put the first defeat on Taylor's professional boxing record.

Lawrence Lyons, spokesperson for BoyleSports said: "Katie Taylor will be testing herself at the very highest level in May and there's no doubt this will be the biggest assignment of her career to date. But confidence is already high that she will come through it and her odds quickly shortened into 4/11 from 1/2 within a couple of hours of the betting opening up."

Incorrectly fitted child car seats major cause for concern

Research from the Road Safety Authority's 'Check it Fits' Service, which checks child car seats and restraints nationwide for free, has revealed that 4 out of 5 child car seats are incorrectly fitted nationwide.

To help address this problem, the RSA 'Check it Fits' service will be visiting Wicklow where child car seat installation experts will be available to ensure car seats and restraints are correctly fitted.

You can see the 'Check it Fits' service at SuperValu on Castle Street in Bray on Wednesday 18th March (10am-5:30pm), Pettitt's SuperValu on Wexford Road in Arklow on Thursday 19th March (10am-5:30pm), and SuperValu in Charlesland, Greystones, Friday 20th March (10am-5:30pm).

The service takes between 10-15 minutes, is free of charge and offers parents and guardians reassurance that their child is safe while travelling in the car. If your child's car seat or restraint is incorrectly fitted, the 'Check it Fits' experts will advise on how to fix the problem, demonstrate how to fit the restraint correctly and answer any queries participants

might have to avoid potential serious or fatal injury in the event of a collision.

Aisling Sloyan, Senior Road Safety Promotion Officer for the RSA commented: "The reality is

that if a child's car seat isn't fitted correctly, it could lead to a serious or fatal injury in the event of a collision. Having a correctly fitted car seat is a simple measure parents, grandparents and guardians can take to ensure children are safe while travelling by car. I would encourage people to visit the 'Check it Fits' when it comes to Wicklow and give yourself the peace of mind that your children are travelling safely."

Moyagh Murdock, CEO of the RSA, while speaking about the service said: "The RSA 'Check it Fits' service is there to provide professional, trustworthy advice to parents and guardians around child car seat safety. Parents all

over the country are availing of this service to get practical advice and expert fitting of their car seats. We would advise all parents to ensure that when they buy a new car seat, that they get the seat fitted by an expert. We would also advise that parents to check the label on their car seat to make sure it's appropriate for your child's age, weight and height, to make sure your seat is firmly installed in the car, and to always ensure that your child's harness is fitted snugly for every trip. Clothing can affect how the harness fits, so you should use blankets instead of bulky jackets in the winter. This makes sure that the harness is

making contact with your child's body and you should check this before every journey."


