## LIGHTS! CAMERA! ACTION!

Wicklow is set to be cemented as Ireland's film capital as Greystones Media Campus Limited has submitted a planning application for a new state-of-the-art film/TV studio and media campus on an 18-hectare IDA Ireland site at Killincarrig in Greystones, which has been lying idle for over 30 years.

The proposed facility will seek to build upon the existing Dublin-Wicklow film and screen cluster, the leading economic cluster of its type in the country. It will also work to consolidate Wicklow's position as the traditional heart of television and film production in Ireland.

The planning application proposes 14 studios, offices and ancillary production buildings in a landscaped setting - more than doubling the available stage capacity available to film, TV and

media crews in Ireland. Subject to planning, and once fully operational, the 18-hectare site is the first step in a process which hopes to deliver up to 1,200 new jobs in the film, media and broadcasting sectors. The development could also in turn lead to, in the region of up to 300 full-time positions in other sectors of the Irish economy through knock-on impacts. A further 580 jobs could be created during the construction phase.

Welcoming the news,

the new Cathaoirleach of Greystones Municipal District, Cllr Derek Mitchell, said "This is very welcome as there are few jobs in Greystones and we can't all commute. The site has been waiting for 35 years to find a use. I hope this comes about. There are to be four entrances, 722 car spaces and 276 bike spaces. The area fronting Mill Road is to be for higher quality buildings not more than three stories high."

Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Pat Kennedy, said

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"This will copper fasten Wicklow's reputation as the home of film and TV production in Ireland. We have so many talented film professionals living in Wicklow while we have a superb range of locations and pride ourselves on being Ireland's most film friendly county".

Cllr Tom Fortune, speaking to *Wicklow Times*, welcomed the news as the result of the efforts of numerous town councils and Municipal District Councils who had fought "tooth and nail" over the last three decades to get the site developed. He said that Wicklow would now have a 'film cluster' that could make it the "film centre of the country".

"This is fantastic news for Greystones Municipal District. It has been a long time coming. This site has been discussed around the

district council table for over 30 years and at last something is landing. A lot of local councillors both past and present are delighted. A massive thanks to everyone who made this happen. It is important now that this project is facilitated to completion."

Jennifer Whitmore TD and Cllr Jodie Neary said the news is "hugely encouraging". Speaking on the development Deputy Whitmore said "I have raised the potential of this site with the Council and various high-tech stakeholders since I became involved in politics. While the finer details of the planning permission still need to be teased out, I'm glad that after all this time there seems to be some interest in developing the IDA site. We are so lucky to have a vital piece of IDA

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# 'COALITION MUST MEET THE CHALLENGES AHEAD'

"The new FF-FG-Green Government has two Cabinet Ministers from Co.Wicklow. I congratulate them both. This is an opportunity for Stephen Donnelly and Simon Harris as well as Steven Matthews, the other Government T.D. to deliver on promises they made before and since the election," declared Independent councillor and former TD, Joe Behan last week.

"The health and housing crises are becoming greater with each passing day. The early comments from the Ministers for Health and Housing were worryingly vague and non-committal about issues such as housing supply and waiting lists.

"In fact, Minster Donnelly indicated that 20% of hospital bed capacity will be left idle for the foreseeable future in case of a Covid resurgence. This will inevitably lead to longer waiting lists for operations such as knee and hip surgeries as well as countless other procedures and will particularly hurt many older people from our county. This is the time to begin planning for a new acute hospital on the east coast of

Ireland, based in County Wicklow. Existing hospitals serving our people cannot cope with the number of patients in its catchment area and the Minister should show some vision by supporting the location of a new hospital on the east coast.

"Minster Harris was rightly praised for his handling of Covid-19. He now has an opportunity to shape the provision of Third and Fourth Level education for the future. I suggest he begin by elevating the status of Bray Institute of Further Education to a Third Level Institute with all the resources it needs to continue and expand its excellent provision to post Leaving Cert students from Co.Wicklow and beyond. The Minister

should also expand the provision of Third Level courses at other potential Higher Education Institutes across the county.

"I suspect that in setting up a new Dept of Higher Education, that this Government might have an agenda to introduce third level tuition

fees and I call on Minister Harris to specifically state that this will not happen.

"Generally, I believe that this Government, with its huge majority, will attempt to impose a new austerity plan on the people in the next few years. I am particularly concerned that there will be massive increases in property tax in the future to pay the Covid bills and it would be helpful if the three Government TDs assured us that there are no plans to raise this tax in the years ahead.

"Many other issues will arise over the next few years and I believe it is essential that we hold this Coalition Government to account every single day of their term of office."

## Office workers in Wicklow among least equipped for working from home

Wicklow is among the top five counties where office workers are least equipped to work from home, according to a recent survey carried out by Censuswide on behalf of Open Sky, the digital transformation specialist for government organisations and large private enterprises.

The survey found that almost a quarter (22%) of Irish office workers don't have the necessary tools (including laptop, sufficient internet speeds and secure connection to work systems) to effectively work from home. The counties that are best equipped with the necessary tools for remote working are Monaghan, Roscommon, Tipperary, Wexford and Sligo. In terms of the age group that were keenest to work from home during the current coronavirus outbreak, the 35-44 category came out on top (93%). The over 55s were the least keen to do so (57%). Furthermore, the survey revealed that more than half (54%) of citizens would prefer to do non-emergency appointments with a doctor online rather than in-person. Some 28% said this was to avoid infections. The most popular reason was to save time.

## CAB search businesses and residences

The Criminal Assets Bureau (CAB) conducted a search operation last Tuesday, 30th June, as part of an ongoing intelligence led operation targeting foreign nationals (believed to be Chinese) involved in the laundering of the proceeds of crime, accumulated by Irish-based organised crime groups.

The operation took place in the Dublin Metropolitan Region and the Wicklow Division. A total of 13 sites were searched which comprised of five business premises and eight residential addresses resulting in the seizure of funds totalling €1,035,093.

Cash totalling €733,499 was seized. A further



€301,594 funds were frozen in Irish bank accounts. In addition 4 cars were seized along with other high value items.

Seven people were arrested for money laundering offences contrary to Section 7 of the Criminal Justice Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing Act, 2010 and are currently detained at Garda Stations across the Dublin Metropolitan Region.

The operation was conducted by the Criminal Assets Bureau, supported by the Emergency Response Unit (ERU) and Regional Armed Support Units, and assisted by the Garda National Immigration Bureau (GNIB), the Garda National Economic Crime Bureau (GNECB), Garda National Protective Services Bureau (GNPSB) and local District Detective Units.

This operation marks a significant development in the Criminal Assets Bureau's ongoing investigation into a criminal network involved in the laundering of funds for a number of national and international organised crime groups.

## New heritage map for Newtown

Newtownmountkennedy & District Tidy Towns recently launched the Newtownmountkennedy Map & Heritage Guide. Easily portable and full of interesting information about the history and folklore of Newtown and the surrounding area, it can be picked up now free of charge at the Post Office and Eugene's Grocery Store.

The heritage map is the result of a collaborative project made possible by funding from Creative Ireland and The Heritage Council's Heritage in Schools Scheme initiated by the Newtownmountkennedy Primary School. It was 1 of only 10 projects to be selected out of 70 nationwide.

Two local 5th class students researched the topics for two months in 2018. They read old stories with help from their teachers and the Newtownmountkennedy & District Tidy Towns, using the School Folklore Collection of Dúchas.

The design/layout and publication of the map was done by local designer Ann Glynn. Further historical detail was researched by Peter McCormick and Therese Hicks. Newtownmountkennedy and District Tidy Towns funded the design/layout and the first print run has been funded by Wicklow County Council in June 2020.

Newtown Tidy Towns encourage everyone in the community to pick one up, send one to their loved ones abroad as a gift. The map is a great learning resource for those interested in the history and folklore of the Newtown area.

# Peter raises €20,000 for Open Door Day Centre

Peter Lawlor from Kilmacanogue has raised an amazing €20,000 for Open Door Day Centre in Bray, the activity centre for adults with physical and sensory disabilities. Since May, Peter has been doing regular walks and increasing his distance, raising vital funds for Open Door where he attends.

Peter, 48, has been a regular attendee at Open Door since 1991, going twice a week to enjoy the activities. Peter, who suffers from the complex genetic disorder Prader-Willi Syndrome (PWS), credits the physiotherapy at Open Door with helping with his physical health.

PWS affects people in different ways, and in Peter's case it has meant his muscles are weak, resulting in poor balance. This is what has made his achievement so impressive. He suffers from back problems and has had to have a kneecap replaced.

Speaking about his fundraising endeavor, Peter says "I am cocooning at home since the outset of COVID-19 in Ireland and my parents are

encouraging me to walk in order to maintain and improve muscle tone and balance and to prevent muscle wastage. I miss my friends and my outings so I decided to do something new. My family is amazed at my improvement through my daily walking and I decided that I would like to set up a fundraiser for Open Door to help fund the activities when the Centre re-opens. I am going to do 6,000 steps per day. This is a huge commitment for me and will take a lot of effort. I hope that you will sponsor me or donate to Open Door to let me know that you are behind me all the way."

## Agreement reached in long-running fishermen dispute

The long-running issue of lack of access to Greystones harbour for three local fishermen was resolved last week.

In a positive outcome for the fishermen, it has been agreed that they will now be allowed to land at the South end of the North Pier, bring their lorry to the end of the Pier to unload their boats, and tie up their boats at the North end of the North Pier.

The situation had been going on for over a decade, and flared up last year with protesting at Greystones Harbour in response to a section of the harbour being sealed off, preventing the fishermen from doing their work.

When work on the new harbour began in 2008, the local fishing boats were deprived of access to their moorings, but they say they were promised that berths would again be provided to them once the new harbour opened.

However, the subsequent harbour by-laws drafted by Wicklow County Council officials effectively excluded fishing boats by preventing them landing any catch and imposing high fees.

The fishermen had been forced to berth as far away as Dun Laoghaire, motor to their traditional fishing grounds off Bray Head and Greystones to fish, then return to south Dublin to land the catch, which they may then have to drive

The Harbour Master's spokesperson said at the time that the north pier was not blocked to keep the fishermen out, but was closed to everyone for health and safety reasons because the entrance to it is across a building site where the harbour apartments are being built.

Independent councillor Tom Fortune, who last year as Cathaoirleach of Greystones Municipal District had fought on the side of the fishermen, last week welcomed the positive outcome.

Speaking to Wicklow Times, he said "I'm delighted for the fishermen, this agreement has come from the accumulation of 13 years of hard work, and trying to make a case. It was one of the key issues I had hoped to resolve during my term as Cathaoirleach.

"Over the past 12 months there have been many meetings with everyone concerned, and in the last meeting before the lockdown the points were finally agreed. Over the last few weeks there had been further talks and in a meeting between the fishermen and SISK a few days ago it was finally resolved. It hasn't been an easy process, it's been nasty at times, but I'm pleased now that it's done and dusted. This is great outcome hard fought for."

infrastructure but sadly it has been left underdeveloped for too long.

"This large tract of land has the potential to develop local jobs and industries, stimulating the local economies of not just Greystones but Kilcoole and Newcastle as well. Now with a potential new media campus, we could see more jobs in industries which are currently underdeveloped in Wicklow including in technology and the creative sector. I know the Council have worked very hard over the last number of years to attract this type of industry into the county.

"Observing the size of this project, it's easy to see the potential impact it will have on local job creation and it's something currently lacking across Wicklow. Very few IDA trips have been taken here in comparison to other counties, instead we are dealing with a growing commuter population working and spending their money outside of Wicklow."

Also speaking on the news, Cllr Neary said "creating more local jobs is essential not only as a way to develop local economies but also to reduce road congestion and bring about greater work life balance for people in the area. I myself am aware of the long commuting times and how that can affect family life as well as social cohesion as we spend more time commuting and less time enjoying the local area.

"While we need to look at the document in finer detail, I will ensure that any concerns or issues constituents have are represented throughout the planning permission process and that communication with the local community is provided at all times. We need to ensure that this project can benefit the community to its fullest potential and that we do not miss out on any opportunities for people in the area."

John Brady TD said "This land has lain undeveloped now for many years. The proposed development of 14 new studios along with offices and production facilities is a gamechanger for the TV and Film Industry and is an important opportunity to position Wicklow again firmly as the number one hub for the industry.

Deputy Brady concluded "Wicklow currently has two large film studios, Ardmore and Ashford Studios, we have a highly skilled crew that work in

Wicklow Film Commission. "The Commission is committed to supporting local, national and international filmmakers. The benefits of this support are evident when County Wicklow is showcased around the world and the local economy thrives during the film making process. Not only will this development bring jobs to the screen industry, it will provide fantastic opportunities for the development of the as yet, largely untapped screen tourism sector."

Creation hub at Wicklow County Campus. This will consist of a range of private and co-working spaces for the creative media sector. The Hub will help to support and grow start-ups and more established businesses in the sector and will act as a landing space for foreign direct investment."

When asked about what the new film studios might mean for Wicklow's film industry going forward, Ashford Studios MD Shelley Hargadon told *Wicklow Times* "We're obviously invested

## €62,000 to improve facilities and amenities in communities

Nearly €62,000 in funding has been allocated to enhance facilities in urban and rural communities across Wicklow.

Minister Harris said "the Community Enhancement Programme (CEP) provides vital support to community groups in order to help them improve their facilities.

"It supports small-scale funding for projects which range from purchasing lawnmowers and IT equipment to minor renovations to buildings. Ultimately the Programme responds to local needs and therefore it also provides some funding towards larger projects where needed.

"We depend hugely on these community groups Wicklow and I hope that this funding will help them to continue the important work that they carry out within our society. I urge communities throughout Wicklow to familiarise themselves with the CEP and to apply for funding if they feel that it can be of local benefit.

"The CEP is administered by Local Community Development Committees in Wicklow. Details on how to apply will be available from each LCDC shortly," Minister Harris concluded.

Concerns have been raised about a rise in the use of Nitrous Oxide, better known as 'laughing gas' or 'Whippets', as a recreational drug in communities around Co. Wicklow.

Nitrous Oxide is a colourless gas found in pressurised metal canisters commonly used in the medical field and commercial industry (for example whipping cream) which means that it is legal and very easy to get your hands on.

Deputy John Brady has urged new Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly, to immediately start an awareness programme on the dangers of using nitrous oxide as an inhalant. Deputy Brady

said "The misuse of Nitrous Oxide which are commonly known as silver bullets has become a widespread problem since the outbreak of Covid-19. There has been a spike in the number of discarded canisters of nitrous oxide in parks and public areas across Wicklow.

"In May a fifteen-year-old youth from Tallaght sadly died at Our Lady's Children's Hospital in Crumlin from what his parents believe was as a result of the side effects of taking the lethal drug. The Government must do more to warn people of the dangers of taking nitrous oxide. A national campaign warning of the dangers of the drug needs to be launched before more lives are lost."

Speaking on the matter, Sinn Fein councillor in the Bray Municipal District Dermot 'Daisy' O'Brien, said "As Covid-19 restrictions ease and people return to socialis-

ing we are receiving numerous reports of extensive use of this substance. I have been told that you can get a dispenser online for under 40 and similarly a pack of 50 whippets canisters for 50. My concern is that people are so excited about moving out of Covid restrictions that laughing gas has become an easy option for people looking for a short term high.

"Many of us are aware of the occasions where someone inhales helium from a balloon to change their voice for a short period of time. Laughing gas is often consumed in the same way but with very different effects. This is not just another 'good fun' outlet for people who are socialising."

Speaking on the issue Cllr Grace McManus said "When we see a spike in any recreational drug use, it is important that we zoom in and look at the specific harms of the substance, raise awareness of these harms and manage the fallout. It is also important to zoom out and look at why we are seeing such an increase in the first place.

"Covid-19 has had a profound effect on our well-being. There is disconnection, financial pressures, fears about the future, things that we know can have negative impacts on our mental

health. This fact is not inherently bad news; it's what we do now that counts. Fostering well-being through supporting community groups, spaces, projects, ensuring mental health supports are available, funding sports clubs etc are protective factors, and act as an antidote to the wounds of covid-19.

"I think taking this overall health perspective on the issue of laughing gas is vitally important to reduce the harm, in tandem with promoting specific awareness about the

dangers of the substance itself."

Cllr O'Brien added

"Nitrous Oxide slows down your brain and body's responses. It can cause feelings of euphoria, relaxation and fits of giggles while also creating hallucinations, severe headaches and dizziness. People have reported intense feelings of paranoia and not being able to think straight. When people perceive a substance to be harmless there is a danger that they develop an attitude towards it which ignores any risks. Misuse of any substance is risky, mixing one drug with another

drug is extra risky such as alcohol and laughing gas. We want people to understand what the risks are and to be aware that heavy use of Nitrous Oxide can cause nerve damage and increased risk of falling unconscious or suffocating. This is not a new drug but the increase in its popularity requires our attention. We believe that there should be a directive to place a health warning on these products about their non-medical or industrial use."

## €80,000 allocated to 50 community groups during Covid emergency

Almost €80,000 was distributed by Wicklow County Council to 50 groups who have been supporting their communities across the county during the COVID-19 emergency.

Each county in the country received a grant from the Department of Rural and Community Development to assist Community and Voluntary groups involved in the delivery of COVID-19 community response efforts.

Amongst those sharing the grant in Wicklow are: 9 groups providing meals to those in need; 8 sporting organisations aiding; 9 groups supplying face masks for frontline staff; 5 groups offering technology support; 4 groups providing PPE (Personal Protective Equipment).

The other groups involved provide a mix of assistance such as transport, financial advice, etc.

Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council, Mr Frank Curran, thanked the Department of Rural and Community Development for the financial assistance which allowed the Council to recognise the great work being done by thousands of volunteers throughout the county.

# Abortion rate in Wicklow up by almost 40 percent

Since the abolition of the Right to Life from the Constitution in the abortion referendum removing the 8th Amendment, the Wicklow abortion rate has increased by almost 40% between 2016 and 2019.

The first report laid before Dáil Éireann by the newly appointed Minister for Health, Fianna Fáil TD Stephen Donnelly was the first Annual Abortion Report (Annual Report on the Health (Regulation of Termination of Pregnancy) Act 2018) detailing abortions carried out in the State from the 1st January 2019 to 31st December 2019, to number 6,666 abortions.

During a Dáil debate in January 2018 on the proposed introduction of abortion to Ireland the then Minister for Health

Simon Harris identified 85 women as travelling from county Wicklow to Britain for abortions. The 2019 Report states that 138 women gave county Wicklow addresses when having abortions, indicating an increase of 38.41% in the number of Wicklow abortions. The British Department of Health and Social Care reported that a further 8 women from county Wicklow had abortions in Britain in 2019.

The British Health Department reported that in 2018, 2,879 Irish women gave Irish

addresses when having abortions in England. The 2019 Report identifies 6,666 abortions as taking place in this State. This represents a national increase of almost 57%. The British Department of Health and Social Care reported a further 375 abortions by Irish mothers bringing a total to 7,041 abortions. This represents 10.5% of Irish pregnancies now ending in abortion.

Of the Wicklow constituency's national representatives, John Brady TD of Sinn Féin; Jennifer

Whitmore TD of the Social Democrats; Minister Simon Harris TD of Fine Gael; and Minister Stephen Donnelly TD of Fianna Fáil supported the introduction of abortion in the referendum. Green Party TD Steven Matthews also supported the introduction of abortion. Former Wicklow TD, now Senator Pat Casey of Fianna Fáil opposed the abortion referendum, lost his Dáil seat in the February general election and was subsequently elected to Seanad Éireann.

## Wicklow records 1.5% rise in electrical waste recycling in 2019

Wicklow people recorded their highest total of electrical waste recycling per head of population in 2019, a yearly rise of 1.5%, a new report has revealed.

A new annual high of 8.93 kg of waste electrical items per person was collected by WEEE Ireland on behalf of its members in the county in 2019, according to the organisation's annual report.

Wicklow people recycled a total of 1,271,438 kg of electrical waste for free at local authority centres, WEEE Ireland collection days and participating retailers in 2019.

WEEE Ireland was the second-best performing recycling scheme in Europe in 2019, with 38,594 tonnes of waste electrical items and the equivalent of over 44 million used AA portable batteries collected, its annual report has revealed.

A new national record of 10.89 kg of e-waste was recycled per head of population last year by WEEE Ireland, on behalf of over 1,114 members and partners - a rise of 6.2% on 2018.

And the scheme was one of the few in Europe to meet a landmark EU environmental Directive target to recover the equivalent of 65% of the average weight of all new electrical equipment placed on the market by its members over the three preceding years.

However, its CEO claims that the country could struggle to meet the 65% benchmark figure this year if an expected glut of waste electrical items is not diverted from landfill.

"Households throughout the country have used the lockdown to carry out extended spring cleaning, and it is vital that these end of life electrical items do not end up in landfill, or worse illegally dumped, destroying the progress that we have made as a nation," said WEEE Ireland CEO Leo Donovan.

"Now that people are free to travel within their counties, we are urging consumers to avoid an e-waste crisis by recycling for free at their local authority recycling centres and participating retailers which have now reopened.

"2019 was a major target year when we successfully demonstrated that a structure was in place to effectively manage e-waste from households. However, 2020 brings a different challenge.

"We are facing a battle to stay on target against an

increase in electrical and electronic products sold over the past three years and the impact of the Covid-19 lockdown on recycling."

The equivalent of 227,000 tonnes of CO2 emissions were avoided by diverting e-waste from landfill through the scheme last year - the equivalent of the annual carbon consumption of 4,543 hectares of trees.

Over 19 million pieces of e-waste were recovered in 2019 including 3.2 million lamps and lightbulbs, 334,000 large household appliances, 194,000 TVs and monitors and 122,000 fridges.

The country's largest electrical and battery recycling scheme also exceeded the EU's 45% target for waste portable batteries in 2019 by 2%.

"56% of e-waste collected in 2019 came from our retailer collection points, rising for the fifth year in a row, with 27% being recovered at local authority sites," said Mr Donovan.

"Our special events such as free public collections, and in the workplace and education settings accounted for 17% of the total, showing that when prompted, the public will deliver - with almost every county in Ireland showing an increase on their annual recycling figures."

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# WHEN TO TALK TO YOUR SOLICITOR



**T**here are times when legal advice is crucial and it is knowing the important times to call on your solicitor that will make a difficult or stressful situation, a much easier one to manage.

Solicitors in Ireland have a very wide range of different functions. A solicitor may give legal advice about non-contentious matters, such as buying a house or flat or drafting a will. A solicitor may act as your agent or representative in commercial transactions. Your solicitor may also give you legal advice and represent you in relation to a dispute or disagreement that you have with another party, for example, a family dispute or a dispute with your employer or your neighbour.

A solicitor may give you legal advice about taking or defending a case, if you have been involved in an accident, for example, a road traffic accident or an accident at work.

If you are involved in a court case, your solicitor will manage the case and represent you when dealing with the other party. For example, your solicitor will send letters to the other side on your behalf. Your solicitor will file all of the necessary court documents and contact the witnesses for the case.

If it is necessary to

involve a barrister in the case, your solicitor will "brief" the barrister by sending him/her all of the necessary documents and information. Your solicitor may also actually represent you in court, although in the High Court and the Supreme Court, a barrister will usually be engaged.

Unlike barristers, solicitors are allowed to join together to form partnerships or companies and they are allowed to advertise their services.

The Law Society sets down rules and regulations about how solicitors may conduct their business. There is a Disciplinary Tribunal, which can investigate any allegations of misconduct

made against a solicitor. In the past, it was not possible to make a complaint about a solicitor or barrister in Ireland involved in a family law cases due to the 'in camera' rule. (The in camera rule prevented anyone other than those directly involved in the family law case being present in Court. In addition, the 'in camera' rule prevented the publication of any matters discussed there, including the outcome of the case). However, in July 2005 an amendment was made to Section 40 of the Court and Civil Liabilities Act 2004 and complaints about solicitors and barristers in family law cases are now admissible.



## Early Childhood Ireland welcomes the smooth reopening of Wicklow's childcare sector

The smooth reopening of the early years sector has been a testament to childcare providers and their strong relationships with parents. That's according to Early Childhood Ireland, the leading organisation in the early years sector, whose members reopened their doors last Monday for the first time since March.

Many crèches reopened last week, with many of them operating at 50 per cent capacity. A further 2,800 centres are expected to reopen in September around the country, if it is financially viable for them to do so. New health and safety measures introduced in response to the threat of

short-term, to navigate the transition and additional cleaning duties. She said: "We brought the staff back in last week and, by Friday, we almost felt back to normal, apart from the handwashing and social distancing. We're a close-knit team and everyone is happy to be back."

of Early Childhood Ireland, said: "The Government funding package which offered staffing, operational and capital supports has been critical to ensuring that childcare providers across Ireland can reopen safely and sustainably."

"We believe the public health information and the comprehensive resources published by the Department of Children

Covid-19 will see crèches operating in pods to keep groups separated, parents making handovers outside the crèche buildings, and an increased emphasis on outdoor play wherever possible.

Elaine McQuillan from StartBright Early Learning Centres in Dublin said staff are well prepared for the day-to-day changes.

"A couple of our centres had already introduced greater outdoor play before Covid-19 so most of the staff had already undergone mentoring and upskilling, and we've invested in extra all-weather gear for staff and children so we can keep it up whatever the weather," she said.

"We've been working closely with the team to ready the building and staff for reopening, so when we opened our doors this morning it was

times. There was clearly a lot of excitement to get back, the kids were delighted to see each other. It all went smoothly, even for those couple of kids who would usually be unsettled when their parents say goodbye."

Ms. McQuillan said her team is looking ahead to inducting new children in the coming months.

# Brady appointed spokesperson on Foreign Affairs and Defence

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has been appointed Sinn Féin's frontbench spokesperson on Foreign Affairs and Defence.

Deputy Brady outlined a number of areas of concern, where he would be applying particular focus.

"At a time when the country is beginning to emerge from restrictions imposed in order to battle the Covid-19 pandemic, we begin the task of addressing the economic impact which this has had; I will be demanding that this government starts to up its game in relation to the Next Generation EU package of €750 Billion; a fund of which Ireland is set to receive only a fraction of one percent."

"There is an absolute failure to take into account the scale of challenges that Ireland continues to address. Not least of which is Brexit. We are currently hurtling down the road towards the Brexit deadline at the end of the year. Whilst negotiations continue between the EU and the British government, it is critical that we ensure the avoidance of an internal border on the island of Ireland. One of the key priorities will be to ensure that the Irish Protocol and the Good Friday Agreement are defended."

"Sinn Féin has committed to holding a referendum in order to ensure that the principle of neutrality is enshrined in the Irish Constitution. I intend to do everything that I can, to prevent the government from further eroding Irish neutrality."

"The record of the Irish Army in the service of the

United Nations is second to none. The Irish military has become synonymous with peace keeping missions throughout the World. It is the responsibility of the minister for Foreign Affairs and Defence to ensure that our troops have resources to carry out this valuable work. The disgraceful disregard for our armed forces has to end; I will ensure that neither the minister, nor government, will be unable to hide from their responsibilities towards our military personnel."

"At a time when Ireland enjoys the position of membership of the UN Security Council we must use this position to enhance our relationship and commitments to the UN. We must work to actively promote UN reform and capacity-building in order to create a revitalised UN which is capable of fulfilling the promise of the Charter and Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and of upholding international law."

"I intend to work with stakeholders and lobby for an increased role for Ireland in addressing poverty and hunger through both Irish Aid, and our influence within the international community. We cannot separate our concern with international Security from the conditions that produce the very crisis that create the security concerns that beset the world."

"The record of the Irish Army in the service of the

"Decades of economic mismanagement have fuelled the tragic export of our youth from these shores. Sinn Féin is committed to giving a voice to the Irish Diaspora. We have argued, and will continue to argue and campaign on behalf of the diaspora."

"Currently, the citizens of Palestine are living in fear of the consequences of the threat of the impending Israeli annexation in the West Bank. Ireland must recognise the state of Palestine. It must use its influence in the UN and in the wider international community to argue for sanctions against Israel in the same manner that it would so against the naked aggression of any other state which sought to overwhelm a smaller neighbour through the use of force."

In closing Brady reiterated his commitment to hold the Minister and

Government to account in the Dáil, but wryly added that he would also be "watching the performances of Fianna Fáil's Stephen Donnelly and Fine Gael's Simon Harris closely to ensure that Wicklow was not left behind in the government's plans as was the case under the outgoing government arrangement of supply and demand under the two parties."

Speaking as she announced Sinn Féin's new frontbench team last Thursday, Sinn Féin President Mary Lou McDonald TD said: "New government Ministers will have to be on their toes and on top of their briefs because they will be matched by a very energetic, very determined Sinn Féin leading the opposition."

"We will hold the government to account, bring forward solutions and continue championing the change that so many people want. I am very proud of our new frontbench team and the fact that we have strong representation from rural Ireland, as well as our cities. Sinn Féin will provide constructive and critical opposition to this government."

"An effective opposition can achieve change by engaging constructively to bring forward solutions and force the government to act. The strong and competent team that I lead is committed to doing this at every opportunity."

## Wicklow District Hospital will not close, HSE confirms

The HSE has confirmed that the 20 beds due to reopen in Wicklow District Hospital will remain open into the future and not close in a post Covid situation.

Speaking after receiving confirmation from the HSE, Deputy John Brady said "I'm delighted that there is now a commitment that the 20 recently refurbished beds in the closed Wicklow District Hospital will remain open into the future. The HSE have confirmed that the now closed Hospital will be used for Frail Older People from mid and South Wicklow leaving Acute Care settings."

"I had been informed initially by the HSE that the reopening of the 20 beds was for Covid related activity and there were concerns

that the beds would close again in a post Covid situation."

"This confirmation about the long-term use of the hospital shows that the political decision to close Wicklow District Hospital 10 years ago was wrong and short-sighted."

"It's good that the HSE are also looking at using the hospital for respite and long-term care support in the form of a day care centre for the elderly of Wicklow. This is a support that was previously on site but had also closed."

"The confirmation that the

reopening of Wicklow District Hospital is not a short-term initiative is really important for the people of Wicklow. It will also play a critical role in freeing up acute care beds in other Hospitals."

"I will continue to work with the HSE on the reopening of the 20 beds in Wicklow District Hospital also the day care services. It's important that adequate funding is in place to ensure the day care service can resume as quickly as possible and I call on the Minister for Health to make sure the necessary funds are in place."

# Greystones woman receives Langton Award for Community Service

Dr Margaret Kennedy from Greystones has received the Langton Award for Community Service from the Archbishop of Canterbury for services to victims and survivors of Church-related sexual abuse through founding MACSAS.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Reverend Justin Welby, recently announced this year's recipients of Lambeth Awards for outstanding contributions to the Church and wider society.

In total 32 awards were this year given to people from across the Church and beyond in fields including evangelism, the Religious life, safeguarding, ecumenism, theology and interfaith relations.

The recipients include

people from New Zealand, Kenya and the USA, as well as a number of others in the UK and Ireland. The awards are usually presented at a ceremony at Lambeth Palace, which this year has had to be cancelled due to Covid-19.

Dr Kennedy founded Minister And Clergy Sexual Abuse Survivors (MACSAS), an organisation run by survivors for survivors, amongst whom she is almost legendary. Margaret set up MACSAS in the late

1990s following requests from survivors with whom Margaret had worked through Christian Survivors of Sexual Abuse (CSSA), which she had also founded in 1989.

MACSAS continues to fight for changes in safeguarding practice and improved responses to survivors of Church-related abuse across all Christian denominations. MACSAS has played a hugely significant role in the Church of

England's journey to offer a professional and compassionate safeguarding service. MACSAS offers individual advocacy and support to victims of abuse, a helpline staffed by trained volunteers, and advice and assistance to survivors.

MACSAS volunteers support the Church of England in other ways, including cofacilitating the Survivors' Reference Panel and sitting on the National Safeguarding Panel as survivor representatives.

Margaret's contribution to society goes well beyond her work with MACSAS. She campaigns not only against clergy sexual abuse but also against disability inequality and abuse, inadequate housing provision for disabled people and inadequacies in the Irish Health and Safety Executive, in spite of the fact that she has a very

rare neuro-muscular degenerative disease (which she shares with her identical twin sister Ann), is in constant pain and uses a wheelchair. A former nurse and social worker, she prides herself on her ability to stir things up, so that when she received her PhD she was also presented with a symbolic wooden spoon. As she herself says, "I'm still stirring things up from my wheelchair."

Dr Kennedy said, "I am absolutely delighted to receive this award and I do so knowing my work is totally led by those who suffered long and without support from Church or State. As a survivor of abuse and clergy sexual abuse myself, I was determined NOT to be silent or silenced. I felt compelled to encourage, nurture, and facilitate our 'voice(s)' to be heard. To speak out, to make Justice when no-one else would. MACSAS began and took a key role to enable change to take place, and still does. I know this award goes to all of us and indicates 'hearing' by the Church of England and Archbishop of Canterbury; Marcus Welby. Thank You.

"My congratulations goes to Phil Johnston and Jo Kind of present day MACSAS, who also receive a Lambeth Palace award today; for all the hard work they've done

to carry forward my mission and 'Justice-Making' vision."

Margaret is disabled and supposedly 'retired' but continues to fight for Disability Rights, equality and services in the Republic of Ireland where she now resides. She could be seen pre-Covid on many occasions outside the gates of Dail Eireann protesting about how disabled people are treated in Ireland.

Dr Kennedy says "Despite all I did for over 30 years in the field of disability and abuse I find abuse of disabled people an on-going pernicious issue in Ireland. It's disheartening to know disabled people must struggle for every service, every piece of needed equipment (including Wheelchairs) as if they are whingers and manipulators. Nothing is provided graciously to improve our lives. I hope in receiving the Langton Award I might raise further the plight of all disabled people in Ireland. The poor services, lack of services is not just a political priorities issue, it is an attack on disabled, a disrespect of us, an inequality no-one wants to see. We are not equal in Irish Society. We are seen as expendable and 'low hanging fruit'. It is clear I will die fighting injustice and calling for Justice. I will never cease this mission."

## Jigsaw secures new Bray premises

### NOTICE OF CONSIDERATION OF SETTING A LOCAL ADJUSTMENT FACTOR

The Finance (Local Property Tax) Act 2012 (as amended), makes specific provision that elected members of a local authority may pass a formal resolution to vary the basic rate of the Local Property Tax for their administrative area by a percentage known as the local adjustment factor. ## Tiny kitten is rescued from ditch near busy road

ISPCA Chief Inspector Conor Dowling responded to a call from a concerned member of the public about a cat heard crying in a ditch near Ballyremon Commons, near Kilmacanogue recently.



Inspector Dowling investigated the call made to the ISPCA's National Animal Helpline and located the little kitten shivering in a hedge.

Chief Inspector Dowling said: "Although the road was noisy with traffic, I heard a faint cry for help and discovered a very scared and soaked little tabby kitten. I had to act quickly in case she attempted to run".

The kitten, now named Star, was taken to a foster home for some much needed food and a warm, dry bed.

Conor added: "It is unclear how the kitten came to be in such a perilous position, so close to the busy road. There are not a lot of houses in the vicinity and, enquiries suggest that none of the locals have kittens. Star was no more than seven weeks old and far too young to be wandering on her own. Huge thanks to the member of the public who heard her cry for help and called us".

Although Star experienced a traumatic start in his/her young life, she is safe now in ISPCA care.

Once a little older, the ISPCA will be appealing for a new loving home if they have been unable to locate an owner.

All cats and kittens adopted from the ISPCA are fully vaccinated, treated for parasites, neutered/spayed (when of age), cat-flap and litter-trained. They also offer six weeks free pet insurance.

"We ask for an adoption donation of €75 to help us cover some of our veterinary costs. The shop staff promoted organ donor awareness while at work by wearing Irish Kidney Association t-shirts and distributing donor cards during the month of June. Caoimhe and her parents, who she works alongside in the family business, vouched a 10 donation to the IKA for each member of staff who did the 10km run. With donations still coming in, the event has raised in excess of €1000 (TBC) for the Irish Kidney Association.

While adult members of Aughrim Athletics Club and Community Games were encouraged to run or walk the 10km distance any time before the end of June, there was also an opportunity for children to get involved by walking or running a 2.5km distance to support fellow junior club member Jane Sutcliffe (age 6), the daughter of the dialysis mother Julie. Julie together with three of her siblings and her father have Polycystic Kidney Disease. One of her sisters, Susan, underwent a kidney transplant last summer just a few months before Julie started her twice weekly journeys to Dublin to receive her dialysis treatment at Tallaght Hospital.

Having worked as a nurse in the United States in Intensive

Care and Trauma I have seen first-hand how lives can be saved through organ donation while grieving families can take consolation from the legacy of their deceased loved one who can save the lives of many people in organ failure. We hope that through this fundraiser we have demonstrated solidarity in support of the Sutcliffe family while raising awareness about the plight of people with organ failure and the importance of organ donation for transplantation while raising vital funds for the Irish Kidney Association."

Jane Sutcliffe (6) recorded in a video to explain that her mother Julie was a dialysis patient and that organ

donation is very important and this generated a lot of interest on social media. Event organiser Caoimhe Byrne came together with her sister Monica and some members of the athletics club committee who completed the 10 km challenge and recorded another video encouraging people to take part in the Aughrim 10km June Challenge which was also shared on social media.

# 'Imperative that Arklow wind farm project develops Arklow Port'

Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore recently organised an onsite visit to SSE Renewables' proposed new Operations and Management centre, where activities for the development of Arklow's Wind Bank Park will be coordinated. The company is proposing to invest €1.2bn to develop the offshore wind project and recently announced that Arklow Harbour will be home to its Operations and Management activities. Local Councillor Pier Leonard also came along to meet the organisers and raise issues affecting Arklow Harbour.

On her visit to the new site Deputy Whitmore said "It is very much welcomed that SSE Renewables has decided to base their future operations and maintenance site in Arklow Harbour for Ireland's first wind farm. Not only is this decision an acknowledgement of Wicklow's potential as a regional leader for marine planning but also of the potential of Arklow as a key player in marine activity.

"I took up the invitation to visit the proposed site as I believe at this critical stage of development all opportunities for Arklow must be grasped firmly with both hands. I wanted to see for myself how we could maximise on much needed job creation and business development for the area as this project goes ahead. As I toured the new site at Arklow Harbour I discussed with SSE representatives, in detail how and where jobs will be created and maintained in Arklow and surrounds, even beyond the completion of the wind farm project.

"Arklow is expected to benefit with approximately 80 full-time jobs from the offshore wind project. I hope to see many more jobs created in association with the project. For this to happen it is imperative that this project develops Arklow Port which is currently underutilised. Potentially, the new facility could attract local firms to contribute to SSE's supply chain, specialists in ship repairs and site surveying, fuel supply, hospitality, logistics and stevedoring. SSE Renewables informed me that they will have a public consultation on the onshore grid application and will be in touch with more details soon. This will be a good opportunity for the local community to have their say.

"During the tour of the site I also discussed the potential for energy initiatives for Arklow and surrounding towns and villages. This could be one of the many community benefits associated with the project, which is obliged to coordinate a 'community fund'. How

this 'fund' is managed will determine to what extent the local community can benefit further from this development. They have informed me that a consultation process will be underway with the relevant Department on how this fund should be managed to maximise the benefit to local communities. I look forward to this process and will engage closely with communities who could benefit.

"I also proposed to SSE Renewables the potential for educational programmes arising from this development such as the establishment of education programmes including apprenticeships to be provided for people in the local area. This could be done in as part of the Community Fund to be established and in coordination with local schools and third level education facilities.

Also present was Cllr. Pier Leonard (IND) who said "I would like to thank Deputy Whitmore and SSE for the opportunity to meet with them to discuss their up and coming plans. SSE will

bring much needed employment opportunities to Arklow & Co. Wicklow as a whole. I look forward to helping them engage closely with all stakeholders going forward especially our local fishermen and maritime users."

Deputy Whitmore also said: "Opportunities for Arklow and its residents from this large-scale development, was at the forefront of my discussions with SSE Renewables during the tour of their new site. The possibilities are endless, but we need to make sure that we seize on those opportunities and that SSE Renewables and all stakeholders continue to have conversations around how this project could positively impact on business development in the area. I want to make sure that every opportunity is exploited for immediate and long-term benefit of Arklow's economy and its residents. If Arklow benefits, so too does Wicklow and that needs to be at the forefront of decision making going forward."

## Council launch Tracks & Trails 2020

A new Tracks & Trails video commissioned by Wicklow County Council and presented by travel writer Pól O Conghaile will be launched on Tuesday July 7th. It features Bray Head, the Belmont Way and the Sugarloaf Way.

Led by Wicklow County Council in conjunction with Wicklow Uplands Council, the three trails form part of the ambitious plan to create a series of interconnected trails from Bray to Woodenbridge. The envisaged 60km route connects with public transport services allowing for independent travel and also to the renowned upland trails of The Wicklow Way and St Kevin's Way.

The video, which follows a walk beginning at the foot of Bray Head ending at the Great Sugarloaf, will be launched at a special virtual event, available for online viewing on Facebook Premier, on Tuesday, July 7th, at 12.30pm on the Visit Wicklow.

Presented by Pól O Conghaile, the 10 minute show features a magnificent trail which now links and extends a number of other well-known trails into a long and challenging walk. This new Tracks & Trails follows a route across a very varied terrain including rugged mountain climbs, flat and quiet forest paths, rich farmland and country roads.

The trail, which can be completed in a day, for the experienced walker, or broken into shorter walks, reveals what is best in Wicklow landscapes from breathtaking sea vistas to magnificent rural views stretching across fields, mountains and skylines.

This show, presented by Wicklow native and dedicated walker Pól, also reveals underexplored paths, new access routes and until now, inaccessible trails in his home county. Pól begins the walk early in the morning on Bray Promenade, climbs up over Bray Head - a much quieter route than neighbouring paths - quite quickly ascending into an almost rural setting with wide views across five counties.

He continues down along quiet, well-marked ways into Belmont Demesne. Belmont Demesne has recently been opened to the public who can connect their walk from Bray Head along a new access route onto the Little Sugarloaf. Enjoying an exhilarating turn with Fat Bikes Adventures, based in Belmont Demesne, Pól then continues past Arthur's Barn, on foot to the Little Sugarloaf accessing it along a newly laid path which brings walkers around the side of the mountain.

Chatting to some other walkers en route, Pól then descends along quiet roads to Kilmacangou and onwards along the old Viking trail which skirts the side of the Great Sugarloaf where he completes his walk. Walkers familiar with the Little Sugarloaf and Bray Head will delight in this lovely, new, marked trail which adds a further new route to Co. Wicklow's ever-growing network of walks.

Speaking in advance of the Launch of the new trails, Brian Dunne, Coordinator of Wicklow

Uplands Council shared: "The addition of these three trails to County Wicklow, offers a wonderful setting for locals and visitors to experience the area's spectacular landscape and iconic natural features such as Bray Head and the Sugar Loaf peaks. Their development has been made possible through close cooperation with all stakeholders and brings the Council's overall vision of creating a new, long distance upland trail from Bray to Woodenbridge ever closer to becoming a reality".

Open spaces, a safe environment, off the beaten tracks and offering unique experiences are all what we can showcase in County Wicklow through this video. In the longer term it will introduce these lesser known newer and accessible trails, to a much wider audience, highlighting parts of Wicklow to an eager hiking and walking family through the medium of the Tracks & Trails video format.

Walkers familiar with the Little Sugarloaf and Bray Head will delight in this lovely, new, marked trail which adds a further new route to County Wicklow's ever growing network of walks, which now link Bray Head, to The Wicklow Way to Glendalough, Tinahely and all the way to Blessington and the new Greenway there.

Cathairleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Pat Kennedy, is delighted that the Council commissioned Tracks & Trails to film in the county: "It is great to see Wicklow welcoming locals and domestic visitors back to enjoy our wonderful range of outdoor activities amidst our breathtaking scenery. We have plenty of space in Wicklow for people to enjoy being outdoors among our mountains, lakes and forest, while maintaining social distancing and staying safe".

# Arklow is back in business - new plans announced to revive the town centre

Wicklow County Council, Arklow Chamber of Commerce, Arklow Town Team and An Garda Síochána are working in partnership with local stakeholders to help restart the local economy.

A wide range of potential solutions are being considered to help support the Arklow District businesses as COVID-19 restrictions begin to ease.

Arklow Chamber of Commerce has already launched a successful community-based initiative, raising positive awareness of the many business sectors in Arklow and the surrounding areas.

The "Back Soon #Love Arklow" video is a compilation of local businesses exhibiting enterprise and community spirit at its very best.

Changes to traffic routes, parking and pedestrian facilities may be introduced on a pilot basis to support local business in reopening through the potential for increased footfall in the

town. Any such measures will be temporary in nature for the summer months and will be notified in advance.

Plans are also afoot for the following: A register of all businesses in the district; Design and develop a new website specifically to promote Arklow Town and its Environs; A new "Local is Best" branding campaign; A new organic Farmers Market to be held in the town; River Tourism - Harbour to Headwaters project. The project focuses on the river catchment area in the district.

All businesses in the district will shortly receive a pack highlighting the supports available to them through the various Government initiatives. They will also be

invited to submit suggestions on any new measures that could be implemented in the short-term to assist in reopening our towns and thereby our shops and businesses.

In this context, to assist local businesses in expediting the required consent for use of public spaces for seating and tables to maintain social distancing requirements, Wicklow County Council has introduced a fast-track licence application procedure. All fees will be waived as a temporary measure for the summer months.

Applications for licences under Section 254 of the Planning Acts can be submitted online. Please contact plan-dev@wicklowcoco.ie to apply. Please note that liquor licensing laws and

local bye laws prohibit the consumption of alcohol on-street and it cannot be served to patrons of licensed premises for consumption outside.

Wicklow County Council can also provide standard temporary ground markings in order to help businesses implement queuing measures to encourage social distancing. Please contact us on arklowmd@wicklowcoco.ie if you wish to avail of same.



## Irish Water to review need for Water Conservation Order

Following recent heavy rainfall and improving river and ground water conditions Irish Water is reviewing the need for the Water Conservation Order, more commonly known as the hosepipe ban.

The National Water Conservation Order was put in place on 9 June and was expected to remain in place until 21 July. It was issued in a bid to safeguard water supplies for essential purposes, in particular water needed for sanitation purposes during the COVID-19 crisis.

Met Eireann confirmed that May 2020 was the driest since 1850 and continued dry weather was forecast. When the Water Conservation Order was issued, 27 of Irish Water's 900 drinking water schemes, were in drought with another 50 at risk of going into drought. Thereafter the situation deteriorated rapidly with the number of schemes in drought or at risk of drought peaking at 98.

Thankfully from a water supply perspective, over the past weeks there has been above average rainfall in many areas of the country. This has resulted in the recovery of some of the water supplies that were in drought or at risk of drought. Currently only 22 schemes remain in drought and a further 63 are at

risk. While the overall numbers are trending downwards, the situation is not uniform across the country. Since the Conservation Order was issued, the Rathdrum water treatment plant is no longer in drought. However, it is now classified as at risk of drought. The schemes supplied by the Bardarrig and Kirikee water treatment plants remain at risk of drought.

Irish Water is continuing to monitor these water sources as their recovery is fragile and subject to change. Early next week, Irish Water will again meet with Met Eireann, the OPW, the EPA and other key stakeholders to discuss the impact of the recent rainfall with consideration to lifting or partially lifting the Water Conservation Order.

Commenting on the evolving situation John O'Donoghue, Regional Operations Manager, said, "While some areas of the country have had significant rainfall it has not been equally distributed in all of the areas that are most in need. It is still essential that members of the public in Wicklow continue to conserve water and form good household habits at this time. Any non-essential use of water should be discouraged, whether we are in a drought or not. We would like to thank the people of Wicklow for their efforts in conserving water in their homes and gardens over the past number of weeks and our large water users who have worked proactively with us to use water more efficiently in their businesses."
