

# WHY DID SO MANY DIE?

## DEMANDS FOR MINISTER STEPHEN DONNELLY TO INVESTIGATE DEATHS IN WICKLOW NURSING HOMES

"Questions remain to be answered about the reasons why so many older people died in nursing homes in this country during the Covid crisis. These questions arise for us in County Wicklow as much as anywhere else. A total of 17 out of the 49 residents of the HSE run St.Brigid's Community at Crookslig on the border of West Wicklow lost their lives in the period after they were moved to a new facility in Tallaght," declared Independent councillor Joe Behan, last week.

"In addition, about 40 staff at the nursing home contracted Covid."

"Cllrs Gerry O'Neill, Patsy Glennon, Deirdre O'Donovan and I sought answers at the meeting of the Dublin Mid-Leinster Regional Health Forum held in Tullamore on Tuesday 21st July. We

were told that a decision was made to move the residents of Crookslig at the end of March based on clinical advice from the Department of Public Health and Consultant Geriatrician. We were told that a Risk Assessment was undertaken and that the move

was necessary because of the increased risk of Covid transmission in the existing facility.

"While acknowledging that Covid risk was a major factor, I believe that the risks attached to moving older people from a place they knew as home for many years to a

new facility posed an equally serious risk. It is not clear whether the dangers in moving these elderly people at such short notice and in the already stressful circumstances of a pandemic were also risk assessed.

"As Councillors, we are determined that a full independent enquiry should be held into the circumstances of the deaths of so many people in such a short space of time. We called for such an enquiry at the meeting in Tullamore and it was agreed that the HSE management would meet us to discuss in more detail our concerns and their response to those concerns. However, a full independent enquiry is also needed and I call on

the Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly T.D., to hold such an enquiry."

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has reiterated his call for an inquiry into the deaths of former residents of St Brigid's Nursing Home in Crookslig. He said "The residents died as a result of Covid-related illness following a move from the nursing home in Crookslig to the Tymon North Community Nursing Home in March."

Deputy Brady also said that he is deeply disappointed that the Health Minister hasn't even acknowledged correspondence from him with the request.

"Unfortunately, here in Wicklow we have seen the devastation Covid-19

"The new programme for government commits to a substantial increase in funding for cycling in

the transport budget.

"I am looking forward to the implementation of this in County Wicklow. I am seeking the support of the Minister for Transport to allocate additional funding for schemes such as the KINNERO Greenway in County Wicklow.

"One particular issue I would like addressed by the National Roads Authority is ensuring the upgrade of the N11 junction at Garden Village (junction 12) ensures safe crossings for pedestrians and cyclists as part of the greenway, and they can count on my full support."

Wicklow County Council will take the opportunity to recognise the work with the annual Tidy Towns and Environmental Awards. Covid-19 has led to the postponement or cancellation of some projects and initiatives and has made it very challenging for groups to organise activities and complete work.

## Spruce up your street

Delgany Community Council is encouraging people to volunteer from home and think about how they can spruce up their street! There are lots of really simple things you can do to brighten up your surroundings like:

Have bits and bobs lying about the house, shed or garage? Can you make something with them like an insect hotel or a bird feeder? You can use twigs, branches, bamboo canes etc.

had in our Nursing Homes. In June it was revealed there were 31 deaths at six different nursing homes across County Wicklow. Those included the deaths of 24 people in Bray, with 10 in just one nursing home in the town. These figures don't include the Covid deaths in St Brigid's Nursing Home in Crooksling which is on the border between Counties Dublin and Wicklow."

Deputy Brady continued "Things got so bad here in Wicklow that the State health watchdog HIQA was granted an emergency court order to shut down Donore Nursing Home in Bray in May over fears residents could not be protected during the Covid-19 outbreak. This was the only Nursing Home closed in the State due to Covid."

"Last week I sent comprehensive correspondence to the Health Minister, Stephen Donnelly in relation to St Brigid's Nursing Home in Crooksling, in it I outlined the situation in Crooksling and asked him to investigate what happened there. Over a week later I still

haven't received anything back, not even an acknowledgement."

Deputy Brady concluded "I agree with Minister Donnelly when in opposition he said that Wicklow's nursing homes were 'left screaming for help' as they battled the Covid crisis. He is now the Minister for Health and has a responsibility to find out why so many people died in Crooksling and other Nursing Homes. In May a Covid-19 Expert Panel on Nursing Homes was established to examine the issues surrounding the management of Covid-19 among people in Nursing Homes. It will not look at what went on in individual Nursing Homes. That is why a stand-alone investigation is needed for Crooksling."

Councillor Behan added "We also demanded that the HSE drop its plans to sell the St.Brigid's site on the open market next month. This magnificent site of 42 acres was gifted to the community for care of the elderly by Mr. John James Verschoyle in 1856. It now seems that the HSE, having moved the 49 elderly residents off the land, is now

planning to cash in by putting it up for sale to the highest bidder. This is grossly unjust and unfair to the local community and to the memory of the man who donated the land many years ago.

The local community and local councillors led by Cllr Gerry O'Neill, Cllr Patsy Glennon and Cllr Deirdre O'Donovan organised a public meeting (on Saturday 25th July) in the grounds of St.Brigid's. We are sending out a clear message to the HSE and the Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly T.D. that this sale must be stopped and the lands used for the purpose for which they were intended. The sale process must be approved by the HSE Board which reports to Minister Donnelly and we expect that he will use his powers to ensure that the St.Brigid's land is kept in public ownership and used for the care of the elderly in the community."

## Wicklow's Covid cases and deaths

The Central Statistics Office has published data on the number of Covid-19 related deaths between 28th February and 17th July.

During this time period, there were 655 cases of Covid-19 in Wicklow and 42 deaths. The median age of those that died from Covid-19 was 83. The median age of those who contracted Covid-19 was 49.

The number of confirmed Covid cases in Co. Wicklow peaked during the week of April 24th when there were 86 cases. By 15th May the number of Wicklow cases had declined to 10, and finally to zero by the week of July 3rd.

The week of July 10th however saw a spike in Wicklow cases to 9, the third highest spike in the

country that week. It was however the ninth week in a row that Wicklow had recorded less than 10 new cases.

The latest publication is the eighth in the CSO's series of information bulletins produced by the Central Statistics Office (CSO), that aim to provide insights into those who have either died of, or contracted, COVID-19, by using data from the Computerised Infectious Disease Reporting (CIDR) provided to the CSO by the Health Protection Surveillance Centre.



## Tropical Brown Booby dies

The Brown Booby which was spotted on Greystones beach the week before last, died after spending four days in intensive care at the Kildare Animal Foundation Wildlife Unit where it was receiving round the clock care.

The bird, which is thought to have ended up in Greystones after being blown off course by a storm, caused a much excitement when it was spotted as it was the first time a live one was spotted on Irish soil.

At first appearing in good health, the bird's condition deteriorated throughout the day, and it became weak with exhaustion.

The large tropical seabird breeds on islands and coasts in the pantropical areas of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, and can be found on the islands in the West Indies and Cape Verde Islands.

The Kildare Animal Foundation Wildlife Units stated "Firstly, we would like to thank everyone for their lovely messages and calls of support since admitting the Brown Booby into our care late on Tuesday night.

"It's with deep regret however, that we need to inform you that despite everyone's best efforts the condition of the bird deteriorated late on Thursday evening, just like it had on the beach on Tuesday afternoon, and it passed away peacefully.

"The bird had travelled a huge distance and lost a third of its body weight on its journey, and then during its time here, it had to deal with a much colder climate than it was used to. It's also probable that there had been an underlying condition that caused it to become ill in the first place.

"We were very realistic from the outset but, as with all our cases, we look at them with optimism and positivity, with the animal's welfare always being our upmost priority. All life is of equal value. Be it a feral pigeon or a rarer species they all receive the best veterinary, nursing and rehabilitation care that can be provided. We are saddened by the loss of this bird but grateful and overwhelmed by how people came together to help this rare visitor to our shores. Despite the outcome it gave everyone some well needed distraction and focus during these challenging days.

"A special thanks to NPWS ranger Jason Monaghan for taking the correct decision to remove the bird from the beach when it became obvious that it was the only realistic option, and his follow up and support since.

"Thanks to Kilcoole Vets, Mi Night Vet, Greyabbey Vets and Bairbre O'Malley, for their advice and veterinary care, the RSPCA for sharing their advice, and last but not least the wonderful volunteers of Kildare Animal Foundation who help to make a difference to so many animals' lives each and every day. The bird's remains will be given back to National Parks & Wildlife Service for consideration for further scientific use."

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# Wicklow remains top for herd incidence of Bovine TB

Wicklow West and Wicklow East have the highest herd incidence when compared to the national 12 month rolling average (4%), according to figures released last week by the Department of Agriculture. These regions combined represent 2% of the national herd.

There are 1,065 herds in East Wicklow; out of 574 herds tested there was a 12-month rolling herd incidence of over 10%; In West Wicklow 300 out of 523 herds were tested and there was rolling herd incidence of almost 14%. No other county apart from Louth has a rolling herd incidence of over 7%.

The report states that "Rising herd incidence and reactor numbers are of concern to all stakeholders. Senior Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine (DAFM) officials at policy and operational level are closely reviewing national and regional trends in order to determine the main factors influencing these changes.

Continuing cooperation between farmers, Private Veterinary Practitioners and DAFM officials will be required to take action to reduce disease spread and target more effectively the high-risk factors associated with bTB transmission in order to bring disease trends back on a downward trajectory.

"At around 4%, bTB herd incidence in Ireland remains at lower levels than in previous decades. However, disease trends have deteriorated over the past three years and this has continued through the second quarter of 2020. This

has resulted in an increasing number of farm enterprises dealing with the challenges of a bTB restriction. It has also led to significant funding penalties imposed by the EU.

"The reasons why this is happening are multifactorial and often relate to local factors. The expansion of the dairy herd since 2015 has played a role in this, since dairy herds, larger herds, farm fragmentation and herds which introduce more cattle are all more at risk of bTB breakdowns. 52% of all bTB reactors in 2019 were in dairy herds, while there were approximately 2.8 million farm-to-farm cattle movements last year.

"We know the risks that contribute to increased herd incidence from many years of scientific research. Risks must be addressed both by national policy changes and by actions at farm level. As we enter into the decade towards 2030 this is a pivotal year for Ireland's bTB Eradication programme and it is critical that, through working in partnership and joint ownership, all stakeholders take the necessary actions to reduce disease transmission, protect herds from new infections, and clear bTB from restricted herds."

These recommendations are part of the

Department's efforts to help farmers tackle bTB; Reduce the risk from badgers; Reduce the risk of contiguous spread; Reduce the risk of residual infection; Reduce the risk of introducing cattle which are infected.

The Department also offers general advice such as: Ensure good quality bTB testing facilities are available and the vet receives any assistance needed; Farmers engaged in contract rearing should consider their biosecurity measures and how they would manage a bTB breakdown affecting the contract arrangements. Avoid feeding pooled unpasteurised milk to calves in dairy herds; Effective cleaning and disinfection of any areas where reactors were kept is essential and will reduce the risk of environmental contamination infecting other cattle; If sharing machinery, trailers, etc. with other farms, minimise the risk of bTB spread through environmental contamination by cleaning and disinfection before moving from one farm to another; When breeding, select bulls which are genetically more resistant to bTB and avoid those more genetically susceptible.

ICBF provides bTB scores for bulls on their website, using a traffic light system.


There is also a fun 'Back-Garden Dog Agility'

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## Revenue seize drugs worth €20,000

Last Tuesday as part of an intelligence led operation, Revenue officers seized 550g of herbal cannabis, 110g of cocaine (subject to analysis) and 105 valium tablets with a combined estimated value of €20,000.

The seizures were made following a search, under warrant, of a premises in Co. Wicklow as part of a joint operation conducted by Revenue's Custom Service, the Garda National Drugs and Organised Crime Bureau, the Wicklow Divisional Drugs Unit and the Baltinglass Detective Unit.

Gardai arrested a 29 year old Irish man at the scene. The man is being detained under Section 4 of

The Criminal Justice (Drugs Trafficking) Act 1994 at Baltinglass Garda Station. Investigations are ongoing.

This operation was part of ongoing joint investigations targeting organised crime groups.

## Harris calls for site for West Wicklow Pool to be identified

**Minister Simon Harris TD has called on Wicklow County Council to name the site for a municipal pool for West Wicklow.**

Minister Harris said "I recently met with the Pool for West Wicklow Committee. This excellent community group has undertaken an enormous amount of work over the past year.

"There is a long standing anomaly in County Wicklow that West Wicklow does not have a

municipal pool unlike the rest of the county despite its growing population.

"I have written to my colleague Minister for Sport Catherine Martin TD supporting the application by Wicklow County Council to the Large Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund for this project.

"To progress the project the council needs to identify a site for the pool and I will be meeting with the CEO of the council in the near future to discuss this," concluded Minister Harris.

# Progress made on NWETSS works

**Progress has been made in relation to the North Wicklow Educate Together Secondary School (NWETSS) in Bray, with work likely to commence on site in the coming days.**

Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore has welcomed the news, after raising the issue of delays in securing accommodation for the school with the Minister for Education in the Dail recently.

At the time, the school was mid-move to their new accommodation in Ravenswell, Bray but refurbishment work had yet to commence on the school, and there were serious delays in contractors getting onsite due to issues in getting a licence for the works to commence.

Deputy Whitmore said "I have just received confirmation from the Department of Education that the licence agreement between the Department and Religious Sisters of Charity to use the former St Philomena's Primary School, Ravenswell, Bray for NWETSS has been finalised, and that the Department is in the final stages of signing the con-

tract with the preferred contractor to undertake refurbishment works in this building."

Deputy Whitmore continued "The Department have stated that the contractor should commence on site in the coming days and that they will continue its engagement with the patron relating to these works to ensure that contingency arrangements are in place where necessary.

"Whilst it is very

welcome that there is now some movement on the matter, there are serious questions to be asked as to how such delays were allowed to occur. It will also be important to keep in mind that, as Ravenswell is only intended to be a temporary stop-gap for the school, they still need to secure a permanent site and I will work with the school, and the Department on this issue going forward."

## Caravan and campervan owners urged to park smart following recent thefts

**As part of the Garda Park Smart appeal, Gardaí are appealing to caravan and campervan owners to take extra security measures following a cluster of recent thefts.**

This comes as a result of 13 caravans being stolen since March, 2020. 43 caravans and campervans stolen between 1st January, 2019 - 10th July 20, one of which was in Wicklow.

Crime Prevention Officer Sergeant Ber Leetch said "With 'staycations' expected to rise this year, and more people using caravans and campervans, there is a need to be extra vigilant with their security. As a campervan owner myself, I always make sure we have the hitch lock on when we are parked up for the evening or when it's not in use. We have also invested in a tracking device, they can be purchased for around €150.

"A caravan or campervan can be very expensive, and the items you have inside them could be irreplaceable if they hold a sentimental value. I would recommend that you keep valuables out of sight and make sure everything is locked when you go out. Criminals are opportunistic, so don't give them the opportunity by not securing it. Please make sure you park smart and lock up your caravan or campervan no matter where you are."

As part of the Park Smart campaign, Gardaí have previously highlighted that over €30 million worth of items has been stolen from vehicles in the last four years. Caravans and campervans are no different and should be kept secure with no valuables left inside, if possible.

Crime prevention advice is to:

Ensure a good quality hitch lock and wheel clamps are in place and that the caravan is locked to a secure point; Get an alarm fitted if one is not already in place; Keep valuables out of sight and remove when not in use; Ensure windows and doors are locked; Park in a well-lit area. Keep a light on if leaving unattended overnight; Use a cover when not in use. This may deter thieves as pulling off a cover can be noisy and add to the time taken to steal the caravan; Keep good records of all serial numbers, unique markings, image of the caravan/campervan etc; Keep documents secure; Consider voluntarily registering your caravan with the Central Registration and Identification Scheme.



# Work on delayed Arklow Primary Health Care Centre due to commence in August

**The HSE has confirmed that construction on the long-awaited Primary Health Care Centre in Arklow is due to commence in August. This follows delays to the project for nearly two years.**

Sinn Fein TD John Brady welcomed the news, and also the confirmation from the HSE that the Primary Care Services in the new Bray Primary Health Care Centre will be operational in the new facility from September.

Speaking following receiving updates on the Primary Health centres in Arklow and Bray, Deputy Brady said "Unfortunately there have been many delays in rolling out Primary Health in communities across the State and Wicklow has been no different.

"Work was due to start on the long awaited Arklow Primary Health Care Centre in 2018, there have been numerous delays and the work hasn't proceeded to date.

So, I welcome confirmation from the HSE that they have entered into a lease agreement with the developer of the Arklow Primary Health Care Centre and that works are programmed to commence in August.

"The estimated time frame for construction is two years and they are hopeful that the centre will be operational in Q3 2022. This is good news for the people of Arklow who have been promised this facility now for many years."

Deputy Brady also spoke about the delays with the new Primary Care Centre in Bray.

"Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic the relocation of Primary Care clinical services from the Civic Centre in Bray to the new Primary Care facil-

ty was delayed. The HSE now hopes to have the Primary Care operational from the new premises from September.

"The HSE has also informed me that they plan on relocating the Civil Registration Office

back to Bray from Wicklow Town when works take place in the Bray Civic Centre when space is fed up due to the moving of the Primary Care services to the new centre on the Killarney Road."

Deputy Brady concluded "Getting clarity on the time frame for the delivery on these centres is important, the HSE must now ensure that they are adhered to. There is an onus on the Minister for Health to ensure that adequate resources are given to ensure that these centres can roll out proper Primary Care services and that there are sufficient staffing levels, fancy new buildings are only as good as what services are delivered from them."

# ABP green lights Kilcoole development

An Bord Pleanala (ABP) has granted permission for a mixed development on Kilcoole Main Street consisting of six apartments, three commercial units, and six car parking spaces. A third party appeal had been made against the development.

Douglas Hatton Developments had applied to Wicklow County Council for permission for the development in July of 2019. The Council granted permission with 20 conditions. The site, Kilcoole House (Urells) is located at the corner of the intersection of Main Street, Lott Lane and Sea Road.

The third party appeal, from local residents whose home is situated immediately to the north of the development site,

raised several issues including: concerns about the height of the proposed development (2-3 storeys) and proposed concourse; The proximity of the proposed buildings to the appellant's boundary in terms of potential overshadowing.

In its decision, ABP stated "Having regard to the zoning objective for the site as set out in the Greystones Delgany and Kilcoole Local Area Plan 2013-2019, and the over-

The proposed height of the proposed development would, development, it is therefore, be in accordance with the proper considered that, subject to compliance with the planning and sustainable conditions, the proposed development would not seriously injure the development of the area."

The conditions include details of the materials, colours and textures of all the external finishes to the proposed dwellings being submitted to, and agreed in writing with, the planning authority prior to commencement of development in the interest of visual amenity..

## HiQA publish inspection report of Wicklow's child welfare services

A HIQA inspection report in relation to child protection and welfare services in Dublin South East/Wicklow undertaken in February 2020, highlights many positive aspects of the child protection and welfare service in Dublin South East/Wicklow.

These include: Children were protected through good practice relating to the screening, preliminary enquiry and initial assessment processes; A child-centred, open and transparent approach was taken to encourage the child and family's engagement with the service; The area developed a new child friendly website ([changingfutures.ie/](http://changingfutures.ie/)) to help young people better understand the work Tusla does.

This local area initiative was later adopted by Tusla on a national basis as the 'Changing Futures' project; There was good cooperation between the social work teams and An Garda Síochána in taking protective action to ensure that children were safe; The area was

found to be managed by a highly motivated management team with clearly defined governance arrangements in place.

HIQA also identified areas for improvement, including further progress in ensuring the consistent monitoring and review of safety plans for children, and improvements on recruitment practices to ensure that the appropriate copies of references were on file. Work is underway to make the improvements required.

Commenting on the report, Joanne Cullen, Area Manager, Dublin South East/Wicklow said: "We are pleased that the area was found by the inspectors to have high levels of compliance with the standards assessed. In particular, we are pleased that the inspection highlighted the child-centred, open and transparent approach which is taken in the area to encourage the child and family's engagement with the service. We will continue to improve and maintain our services so that the children and families in the areas receive a timely and effective service."

### *Who is spreading Covid?*

Dear Sir,

Has the State's National Public Health Emergency Team (NPHE) too dominant an influence on Health Minister Donnelly? In my opinion, the current Government position on Covid may be making the problem worse.

On July 19th I took two taxi rides. Both taxi (night time) drivers told that me that taking young customers to private parties in North Wicklow are their main source of business. GPs first noticed the increase in cases on Monday, July 7, according to a web platform that allows GPs to track community health issues, GPbuddy. The referrals and requests for tests have climbed steadily since, said Dr Darach O Ciardha, one of its co-founders. More than 90% of cases were acquired in the community, rather than from travel, or hospitals or nursing homes. "This is not Americans coming in from Texas with Covid-19 - the problem is Covid-19 is circulating in the community and that is 88% of the problem," said Dr Jack Lambert, a consultant at the Mater hospital in Dublin. "I think we need to have a balanced view on this and understand where our priorities lie. If you have a crack in the dam and there's a little one downstream, are you going to fix the one downstream and let the big one break?"

The big problem is still Ireland and the young adults that are spreading the virus.

It is available in every community in Ireland, and offers every individual, regardless of any previous level of education, a pathway to take them as far as they want to go. It is delivered locally by 16 Education and Training Boards (ETBs) ensuring that FET reflects regional characteristics and meets regional needs. SOLAS looks forward to working with Kildare and Wicklow ETB who play a vital role in the local community in supporting people to reach their potential and will strengthen this role under the new strategy."

"FET can offer personal development and fulfilment, a link to community and social networks, and a range of supports that reflect the diverse base of its learners. It also offers great opportunities to move into exciting and interesting vocations and careers, or a platform to develop the skills that will allow someone to flourish if they go on to further study in higher education."

"Our new strategy sets out an

## Get your boiler serviced

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# 'Community and public facilities must be frontloaded in Fassaroe plans'

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has said the strategic housing development plans for over a thousand residential units on the old Fassaroe lands by Cosgrave Property Group must be front loaded by constructing the critical community and public facilities and infrastructure first.

An Bord Pleanála is due to decide on the case on 7th September. The plans are to develop 1,161 residential units (496 houses and 662 apartments), as well as a crèche, on the site between Bray and Enniskerry.

Speaking after Cosgrave Property Group lodged a Pre-Application Consultation to An Bord Pleanála Deputy Brady said "The application that has been recently lodged by Cosgrave Property Group to An Bord Pleanála is for a pre application consultation to develop 1161 residential units. This is a huge application; however, I'm concerned that the critical community and public infrastructure seem to be a secondary consideration in the plans."

"This is a massive development which will take place just off the N11 at Old Fassaroe, it is intended that the development will be done in a

number of phases, the first phase is for 1161 residential units and a creche. It is estimated that the entire project will take about 10 years to develop. In a Master Plan for the entire site there is provision for an educational campus, a sports campus which Sinn Féin have been campaigning for. There is also provision for the LUAS to be extended to the area, however there is no mention of any of these in this phase."

Deputy Brady continued "Whilst we badly need houses, we also need proper community and public infrastructure. I believe that the provision of the schools and Sports campus should be front-loaded in this development. We already have a need for these, and they shouldn't be pushed back to be included in later phases of the development."

"This is a pre application consultation submission to An Bord Pleanála. The next step will see

Wicklow County Council, Cosgrave Property Group and An Bord Pleanála meet to discuss the plan. An Bord Pleanála will then issue an opinion on the proposal and this will help shape the actual planning application that will ultimately be lodged to An Bord Pleanála."

Bray Municipal District councillor Grace McManus said "There's a lot of interesting conversations at the moment around sustainable development and planning; what that looks like, the impact it has, and crucially how it will be delivered."

"This development is the perfect opportunity to put our sustainable planning ideals to the test, and to see where Wicklow County Council and An Bord Pleanála place value in discussions with developers. Key issues that should be included in these discussions are the environmental impact of this development, how energy efficient the properties will

be, if there is scope for affordable housing, and crucially how local infrastructure can be guaranteed, before we see an increase in demand. Some of this will need to be provided by the developer, but there's a wider challenge too in terms of local services such as schools, our fire service etc that will need to be addressed."

The Sinn Féin team in Wicklow will be sure to keep these ideas of sustainable development on the table as the discussion around this development progresses."

Deputy Brady concluded "It's important that all planning is sustainable, that's why it's critical that at this stage in this huge application that it is got right, and the needs of the community are met first. The council need to ensure that plans for the Sports Campus, Education Campus and LUAS are advanced in this first phase of this development."



**Sod turned at new Community Sports Facility in Aughrim**

Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr. Pat Kennedy, has turned the sod on a new Community Sports Facility in Aughrim.

The new Facility in Aughrim will consist of a new tennis court, bowling green, and exercise area. Cllr. Pat Kennedy said that he was delighted to have been involved and to be able to assist with securing the funding for the project. The project has been undertaken by Aughrim Community Hall with a funding application made by Wicklow County Council to the Department of Rural and Community Development. An allocation of €60,000 was secured to begin works however further funding will be required to complete the project over time.

Cllr Kennedy said, "I look forward to working with the Aughrim Community Hall committee to help secure further funds to complete the project."

## 'July Stimulus package will deliver for Wicklow'

Fianna Fáil Senator Pat Casey says the July Stimulus package marks another step in an unprecedented state response to the global pandemic.

He commented, "In Wicklow so many businesses and their employees have struggled due to the public health restrictions implemented since early March. The package announced by the government has over 50 measures and is worth over 7 billion.

"We are known the world over as a desirable tourism destination, but many bars, restaurants, and hotels have struggled following their temporary closure and a massive decrease in visitors. I am delighted to welcome the Stay and Spend Initiative. This is a tax rebate customers can avail of. The initiative will see more people dining and staying in our hotels and restaurants, helping the local economy."

"The Restart Grant, aimed at supporting small businesses, has been increased in terms of funding. The maximum payment has been increased to 25k and the minimum payment will

now be €4k. Importantly, the eligibility criteria to apply for the grant has been broadened to include non-rateable B&Bs, rateable Sports Clubs and more."

"I know a lot of businesses have used the Temporary Wage Subsidy Scheme to ensure staff stay on their books but the business is supported financially."

"The new Employment Wage Support Scheme will be a successor of this scheme and will run to March 31st next year. Crucially, this new scheme will include seasonal workers and new employees. This has been a hard year for our county. I am confident the measures announced by government, along with the programme for government, will support families, communities, and our local economy to overcome the unprecedented challenges COVID19 brought to our shores," concluded Senator Casey

## Housebound families prepare for the single-use plastic challenge

Wicklow households will generate a combined 8,600 tonnes of single-use plastic packaging waste in 2020, it's been estimated.

"The 'Single-Use Challenge' is about tackling this environmental scourge that is scarring the beeches, rivers, streets and amenity areas across County Wicklow, by harnessing the power of community spirit to collectively reduce the volumes of single-use plastic waste generated across the county," according to CUSP founder Simon Ruddy. "We have developed the free CUSP app. Participants simply tap in their current number-of-units day 1; then, after 30 days and following CUSP 'Hints & Tips for Reducing', participants tap in their new reduced volumes to see their reductions."

The 'Single-Use Challenge' is looking to each family in County Wicklow to reduce their household single-use plastic packaging waste by just 1kg monthly. Simon explained "1kg monthly isn't just a random target. Both the EU and the UN have set as a key sustainability goal the elimination of all non-essential single-use plastic packaging by 2030, which accounts for approximately 70% of current global consumption."

"Applying this metric to County Wicklow and each household in the county would need to reduce from the current average of 171kgs annually, to 51kgs annually by 2030."

This exhibition, by Conor Wickham, which runs in the Signal Arts Centre in Bray from 17th-30th August, consists of drawings created over the last two years.



They are reflective pieces with no linear narrative. These drawn reflections do not have a predetermined structure like a written diary, but they span many states of mind over a two-year period. They cannot be read as a narrative but must be interpreted by the viewer, where they are required to give their own meaning to the images or symbols within each composition."

"Everything I have experienced, both real and through secondary sources, I have taken as my own. All memories/imaginings are constructs. We can change them, make them more interesting, make ourselves more interesting. Does it matter, if you imagine something, isn't it the same as having lived it. Through my constructed memories and imaginations, I have lived infinite lives, in different times and places. The drawings are my way of interpreting what I have experienced, both directly and indirectly. There are elements of both rational analysis and subconscious drivel within the work. There's nothing fixed, the pieces are constantly changing, only coming to an end when there is no more space left to explore."

"It is an aim to overwhelm the viewer with content, to make them feel lost, uncomfortable, confused as well as excited and positively stimulated. There is no fixed meaning within any piece, that's constantly changing and open to continuous reinterpretation."



# Carmen's Little Library

If you've recently been in the vicinity of the People's Park, Bray, you will probably spotted the new Little Library on the Lower Dargle Road. It is colourful, cheerful and very popular with young and old.

The little Library is one of Carmen Cullen's ideas for combating the blues associated with Covid-19.

Based on the idea of bring-a-book, take-a-book, it was inspired by another little library in Waverly Terrace. The People's Park little library, however, has been specifically put up to bring something positive to all who want their spirits lifted and feel isolated during the pandemic.

# Empty vessel off Arklow coast sparks major search operation

On Monday 20th July Arklow Lifeboat was launched following a pager alert and receipt of a report of a vessel with nobody aboard, having been located by a passing motorboat.

Sparking fears that the crew had fallen overboard, a large search operation was launched. However, it was later discovered that the vessel had merely broken loose of its mooring at a nearby holiday park and drifted out to sea.

The alert went out just before 3pm. Arklow's All Weather Lifeboat Ger Tigchlearr proceeded to the initial reported sighting of the empty vessel North East of Arklow.

With no sign of any-

body aboard the vessel, Arklow RNLI commenced a search of the reported area for potential casualties in the water, the motorboat who had sighted the stricken vessel initially had proceeded to tow the casualty vessel to Arklow.

Given there was no one reported aboard the vessel, the Arklow RNLI volunteers had to assume there was potentially casualties in the water and plotted a search pattern to search of the area.

Given the large area which was potentially to be covered, Wicklow RNLI Lifeboat Jock & Annie Slater was also tasked to the search along with Coast Guard Rescue Helicopter rescue 116 from Dublin.

Other local vessels diverted from their work and came to the area to assist in the search.

As the afternoon wore on and with the search looking like it might continue into the evening,

news came through that a vessel had broken its mooring near a local holiday park North of Arklow Harbour, this information was later confirmed.

All vessels and the helicopter were then stood down and all then returned to their respective bases.

Following the callout, Mark Corcoran, Community Safety Officer at Arklow RNLI said: "This unusual call out was a difficult one for all involved, with the vast area involved it was going to be a real challenge to locate any casualties in the water, we'd like to say a big thanks to the helicopter crew, our Wicklow RNLI colleagues and all of the various other vessels who assisted in the search, special thanks to the crew of the motorboat who had initially spotted the stricken vessel, luckily there was no one in the water and it turned out the vessel had broken a mooring further up the coast. Once again I'd like to remind anyone planning to be on or in the water to please always wear a lifejacket and carry a means of calling for help."



## First 'Shout' for Peter during late night callout

New RNLI volunteer Peter Byrne participated in his first callout as the Wicklow all-weather lifeboat launched shortly after 10pm on Wednesday 15th July,



The lifeboat was launched after a member of the public reported seeing a wind surfer having problems getting ashore near Brittas Bay beach as darkness fell.

As the lifeboat proceeded south to the last known reported position, more information was relayed from the Coast Guard and it was confirmed that the craft was in fact a trimaran.

The lifeboat was on scene at 10:23pm and began a search, conditions in the area were calm with good visibility. At 10:35pm contact was made with a solo sailor on a 16-foot trimaran near Potter's Point.

He had secured his boat on the beach and was waiting for the tide to turn before resuming passage north and no assistance was required.

Once Coxswain Nick Keogh was satisfied the sailor required no further assistance, the lifeboat was stood down by the Coast Guard and returned to station.

Following the call out, Wicklow RNLI Press Officer Tommy Dover said: "We would like to commend the vigilant member of the public who contacted the Coast Guard, fortunately the sailor did not require assistance."

## Dogs in hot cars - what you should know from Maxi Zoo

**Every summer, countless dogs die in their owners' cars from heatstroke. Just a quick trip to the supermarket can mean death for your four-legged friend.**

Even if the window is open, the temperature inside of a parked car can skyrocket in minutes. Not only does this cause your trapped dog to panic; it can also lead to serious brain damage or even death. And it's not just when the sun is splitting the stones, this summer has seen temperatures rise while the sky is overcast, which can lull pet owners into a sense of false security thinking it's cool enough for them to leave their dogs inside their vehicles.

### Why is the interior of a parked car so dangerous for dogs?

- Dogs barely sweat. They regulate their body temperature almost exclusively by panting and in addition require a lot of water.
- When parked, even if your car is not directly in the sun, heavy breathing is not enough, as the temperature can shoot up in a matter of minutes.

### How can animal lovers react if they see a dog locked in a car when it's hot?

- If it is a supermarket car park, you can try to have an announcement made for the owner of a car.
- Draw other people's attention to the dog.
- If possible, document the situation with a photo or video.
- If the owner returns in time, explain the danger of a hot car interior.
- If the owner doesn't return, call the local authorities.

### How can I help an overheated dog?

- Cool the dog down carefully. If possible, get him into the shade quickly.
- He is heavily dehydrated and desperately needs water at the right temperature - do NOT give cold water!
- Moist compresses on the legs and paws help; the evaporation of water helps to lower his body temperature.
- If your dog is not reacting and can't drink by himself anymore, he must be rushed to the vet immediately so that he can receive the missing fluids via infusions.

## Ark Housing: Helping house vulnerable people

**Ark Housing is a Bray charity that gives vulnerable people in Bray and Co. Wicklow their forever homes. Following the completion of six houses in the next few months, it will bring the numbers of those housed by Ark Housing close to seventy! In addition to providing housing and support to residents, Ark Housing runs a charity shop six days a week.**

Ark Housing Association was set up in 2005 as a response to the very obvious needs of people presenting as homeless in the Bray area. With the assistance of grant aid, fundraising and donations, Ark Housing purchased and converted a property to provide six units of accommodation for homeless men who would benefit from support that would help in the transition from homelessness to independent living.

Driven by this mission, Ark increased the housing stock to provide sixteen additional properties for families and is currently in the process of another acquisition which they are hopeful to complete soon which will bring the numbers of those housed by Ark Housing close to seventy.

Supports provided are varied, depending on the current needs of the individuals, some of whom have complex, specific needs due to mental health and physical illness.

In addition to providing housing and support to residents, Ark Housing assist people to search for accommodation in the private sector and help with any issues regarding applications with finance.

Due to the increased demand for homes, Ark Housing is now fundraising and concentrating on being at the forefront of delivering housing and support services in Co. Wicklow.

"Our goal is to participate in reducing the numbers presenting daily to register for emergency accommodation. Ark Housing has never received any operational funding and has had to rely solely on fundraising activities for the success of the projects. To date, the achievements have been accomplished by the very arduous fundraising efforts, which not only purchased property but maintain them to a high standard and provide the supports needed to the residents which yielded a positive outcome."
