HOSPICE IS FINALLY READY

Our Lady's Hospice & Care Services (OLH&CS) has announced that it will open Wicklow Hospice on October 30th, with patients arriving from the start of November. The new facility in Magheramore provides specialist palliative care services for the county through its 15 in-patient public beds and its Community Palliative Care team who will care for patients and their families, across the county, excluding from West Wicklow, which comes under St. Brigid's Hospice in Kildare.

The Hospice's opening is the culmination of almost 10 years of work and campaigning from the Wicklow Hospice Foundation. The 3.5-acre site donated by the Columban Sisters was developed by Wicklow Hospice Foundation, which has been supported in its work by the local community. Although the completion of the building was marked in January, with the intention of opening to patients in April, the Covid-19

pandemic delayed the final works, fit-out and delivery of specialised equipment.

Speaking to *Wicklow Times*, Chief Executive Officer of OLH&CS, Audrey Houlihan said it's expected that the facility will be three-quarters full when it opens, and will be at full capacity by the end of the year.

Ms Houlihan paid tribute to the "huge legacy" of the Wicklow Hospice Foundation and its fundraising efforts

which raised over €5 million. Support is still needed to cover the bank loan of €2.75 million required to finish the building work. In the future, fundraising will pay for enhancements such as specialist equipment, complementary therapies and the volunteer gardening programme.

Speaking last week, Ms Houlihan said "We are truly delighted to be opening in Wicklow this month. This is a major achievement by the

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people of Wicklow and we are honoured to bring more than 140 years' experience delivering palliative care to the county. At a turbulent time for so many communities around the world, we are confident that Wicklow Hospice will transform the quality of life for patients and families and meet the changing care needs of current and future generations.

"The final preparations are underway and our new Community Palliative Care Team moves in on Friday 30th October. 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Feedback sought from Wicklow residents on Arklow Bank Wind Park Phase 2

Wicklow residents are being encouraged to have their say on the Arklow Bank Wind Park Phase 2, as public consultation on the project gets underway this week.

Located 6km to 13km off the coast to the East of Arklow and creating 80 full-time jobs, the wind park is being developed by SSE Renewables and will be Ireland's first large-scale offshore wind farm with an export capacity of 520MW.

Arklow Bank Wind Park Phase 2 will comprise up to 76 offshore wind turbines, and will have the potential to power almost 450,000 homes annually, reducing Ireland's annual carbon emissions by over half a million tonnes of CO₂.


A total of 80 new local full-time jobs will be created to support the operation of the wind farm. They will be sustained over the lifespan of the project, and will be based out of a new Operations and Maintenance Facility to be developed by SSE Renewables at Arklow Harbour's South Dock.

SSE Renewables is expected to invest between €1 billion and €2 billion developing Arklow Bank Wind Park. It will be located in shallow waters at the Arklow Bank sandbank, with the

foreshore lease covering an area approximately 27km long and 2.5km wide. Details of the project are being shared online with the public via www.sserenewables.com/arklowbank and by a number of self-guided exhibitions in Wicklow Town and Arklow. From

The public consultation will remain open until November 11, 2020.

Call for Nursing Home public inquiry welcomed

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has welcomed the decision of the Oireachtas Special Committee on Covid-19 Response on to call for a public inquiry into the startling number of deaths which took place in nursing homes throughout the state due to coronavirus pandemic.

Deputy Brady Said: "I have called for a public inquiry into Covid related deaths in nursing home facilities on a number of occasions at this stage. Including a call made during my appearance at the Oireachtas Special Committee on Covid-19 Response meeting in September, where I specifically called for an inquiry into the deaths of 12 former residents of St Brigid's Nursing Home in Crookslane, which is on the border between Dublin and West Wicklow."

"In June it was revealed there were 31 deaths at six different nursing homes across County Wicklow. Those included the deaths of 24 people in Bray, with 10 in just one nursing home in the town, and seven people in the rest of the county. Combined with the deaths of Crookslane residents who had been transferred to a facility in Tymon North in Tallaght, that is a total of 43 deaths.

"At the time the current Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly stated that nursing homes in Wicklow 'were left screaming for help'. Since then, I have made attempts to contact the minister on this issue, which he refuses to even acknowledge, leaving me 'screaming for a reply'.

"I call upon the minister to act now, to expedite a public inquiry, to ensure that there are no more unnecessary deaths in our nursing homes. We need to make sure that the lessons of the first surge have been learnt.

Government last Sunday."

Brady continued: "The first confirmed case of Covid-19 in a nursing home in Ireland was on March 13. By the 23rd March, ten days later, a decision was taken to move residents from the Crookslane facility to Tymon North. Twelve of these residents died, and a further thirty-four members of staff would test positive. A court order was secured by HIQA to close another Nursing Home in the County, the only one to

be closed due to Covid. HIQA informed me that this was a result of the identification of 'clear threat to life and limb' in the facility. Despite attempts by HIQA to enforce compliance, this was not possible. HIQA cited the fact that necessary changes did not take place, that the capacity to make the changes was not there, due to a lack of leadership, a lack of governance and a lack of understanding of what was required."

Brady concluded "HIQA also gave a report to the Dáil Covid -19 Committee that showed almost 60% of outbreaks in nursing homes inspected were more severe than they should have been due to weak governance and management. Half were not following proper infection prevention and control measures, and not even one of the 44 homes inspected were fully compliant with regulations. This can never be allowed to happen again."

Progress on new water treatments for Arklow and Avoca

Progress is being made in providing water treatment plants for both Arklow and Avoca.

Irish Water has confirmed in Wicklow, land has been acquired and planning permission has been granted for the new treatment plant in Arklow.

Works for the new Arklow Wastewater Treatment Plant will begin next year subject to Ministerial Consent.

It is expected that works will take at least three years to complete.

Plans to construct the Avoca Wastewater Treatment Plant are also progressing.

When these works are complete this will bring to an end the historic discharge of raw sewage into the Avoca River.

Together, these modern wastewater treatment plants will be able to treat wastewater for 37,100 people allowing for economic and social growth in

the area, as well as safeguarding our water for the future.

Minister Stephen Donnelly said: "Having a water treatment plant for Arklow is absolutely vital for the town's ability to grow and prosper.

"It has been sorely needed for a number of years as it has really held back the town's ability to grow.

"However, it has faced a series of frustrating delays which is why it is such welcome news to have official confirmation of real progress being made.

"Similarly, preventing the dumping of raw sewage into the Avoca River is an absolute priority as it is simply not acceptable our rivers are allowed to be destroyed by pollution.

"Bringing adequate waste water services to the county has been a major priority for me.

"I will be giving both projects my complete backing and making sure they have every support they need so they are delivered as quickly as possi-

€200,000 funding for Wicklow towns and villages

Almost €200,000 has been allocated to Wicklow in the third round of Government funding towards Covid-19 adaptations in towns and villages. The projects funded aim to make it easier for people to navigate their communities, while staying safe and socially distant.

The funding is being delivered under the Accelerated Measure of the Town and Village Renewal Scheme and is facilitated through the Government's July Stimulus Package.

€82,300.00 was allocated to towns or villages with population of 10,000 or fewer. This includes: €40,000 for Broadband Connection Points equipment for 5 BCP's across Co. Wicklow; €18,000 for outdoor seating and other improvements to make Kilcoole more accessible; €24,300 for age friendly improvements to Rathdrum Village.

€115,550.00 was allocated to projects in towns with a population of more than 10,000.

Arklow received €35,550 for enhancement of public spaces through a biodiversity scheme. Wicklow Town received €40,000.00 for the purchase and installation of portable street awnings. Greystones received €40,000.00 for the repair and upgrade of gravel paths at Burnaby Park.

Welcoming the funding, Green Party TD Steven Matthews said "This is the third round of this type of funding for towns and villages in County Wicklow. It allows the local authorities to

implement measures that will encourage people to shop and socialise, while adhering to public health guidelines.

"I particularly welcome the inclusion of funding for broadband connection points. We have seen in recent months how the move to working remotely can be achieved, but adequate broadband is a vital starting point.

"Street awnings will be well received by shoppers and help with navigating our Irish weather, and any age friendly measures are to be welcomed. As we adapt to our new way of living, we must support our communities, both the local economy and the social structure. Funding these projects helps us achieve both these aims."

Minister Simon Harris said "I am delighted that my colleague, Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, has announced the expansion of the Town and Village Renewal Scheme.

This scheme has always been a vital source of funding to help revitalise towns and villages in County Wicklow, however it is more important than ever in the context of COVID-19.

"The funding announced today will assist our towns and villages

to implement immediate measures that will encourage people into towns and villages to shop and socialise, while adhering to public health guidelines. It is important we generate economic activity while keeping the people of Wicklow safe. The aim is to allow for social distancing and to make towns and villages more welcoming.

"Applications under the Standard Measure of the Town & Village Renewal Scheme, which will support the medium-term recovery of rural towns and villages from the impacts of COVID-19 are currently being assessed. The successful projects will be announced when that process is complete."

Minister Stephen Donnelly said: "In County Wicklow our rural towns and villages are the lifeblood of the local economy which is why grants like these are so important.

"They are aimed at improving the infrastructure for rural areas and encouraging people to meet, socialise and shop locally.

"The Town and Village Renewal Scheme has invested significantly in towns and villages over the last number of years but it has never been more needed than now.

"Our local economy has had to undergo immense stress as we try to deal with the challenges of COVID-19. That's why grants like these along with the ongoing support of local people to support local businesses are so important. I would encourage people to consider supporting a local business when they are doing their shopping or thinking of buying gifts because our local businesses need our support now more than ever".

Commenting on this welcome announcement, the Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Pat Kennedy, said: "Our rural towns and villages have always played a huge role in supporting businesses and communities by providing spaces for people to meet, socialise and shop locally. This is particularly important as we address the challenges that COVID-19 has brought."

Mr Frank Curran, Chief Executive, Wicklow County Council, also welcomed this latest round of grants under the scheme adding that the results of the previous rounds of funding are already seen in towns and villages throughout the county as the Council, together with local communities, are rethinking the use of public spaces.

€29.9m in HSE resources to be made available to Wicklow over five years

Medicines for Ireland (MFI), the Irish pharmaceutical trade association and the supplier of the majority of medicines in Ireland, have launched 'Reductions in the Cost of Medicines', a report outlining how the Government can achieve a national saving of up to €1 billion over the next five years by switching to generic and biosimilar medicines. This would equate to €29.9 million worth of savings in Wicklow alone, which could be redirected towards additional HSE resources in the county.

Commenting on the report which was shared with Oireachtas members, Chair of Medicines for Ireland, David Delaney said: "It is well recognised by the HSE and the Department of Health that the increased use of generic medicines has delivered €1.6 billion in savings to the Irish health system since 2013. On a pro-rata basis this equates to €47.8 million saved in Wicklow over the same time. These savings have been delivered by the members of MFI who supply the majority of medicines to the HSE and to patients directly.

"Covid-19 has placed added pressure on an already over-stretched health system. The policy proposals set out in this report outline the opportunity for Government to free up significant HSE resources by avoiding an annual spend of hundreds of millions of euro on high cost patented medicines. Over the last decade, the increased use of generic medicines in Ireland has helped dramatically reduce the cost of everyday health care. These reductions have helped families across the county access a greater range of medicines due to generic competition. While this has resulted in the

era of the big brand being dealt a blow, an increased use of generic and biosimilar medicines will help protect public finances and the HSE budget, with the possibility of redirecting savings into other much needed HSE resources."

The report, sets out how a saving of €29.9 million in Wicklow over five years could allow for an additional 179 nurses or an extra 105 nursing home beds in the county. With a cost reduction of €47.8 million since 2013, this equates to an approximate €1,243 saving for each of the 38,495 families registered as living in the area according to the latest CSO.

Mr Delaney added: "In the last 12 months the average reimbursed price of generic medicines was six times less expensive when compared with non-generic medicines, illustrating the very significant savings that can be availed of at both national and local level. Significantly, an increase in biosimilar medicines usage will lead to an increase in savings, greater patient access and better security of supply - thereby freeing money up for the funding of frontline services such as hospital beds as well as

provide for much needed specialist staff. "Failure to address the high cost of medicines, with more sustainable generic or biosimilar options, will ensure that funding constraints remain a millstone around the neck of an already overstretched healthcare system. The current penetration rate for biosimilars medicine in Ireland is below 50 per cent while the average across other EU countries is in the range of 80 - 90 per cent, demonstrating the immense opportunity for further savings in this area.

"Medicines for Ireland (MFI) members are at the forefront of national efforts to ensure that patients continue to access medicines despite the multitude of challenges that the Covid-19 pandemic introduced to the global medicine supply chain.

"This report is a result of a detailed analysis carried out by MFI to support its work and help stakeholders across Ireland optimally modernise public policy to ensure there is a sustainable supply of medicine to patients in Ireland. The result of all this equates to increased patient access to cost effective everyday medicines."

Here is your say - Arklow town public survey results are in!

Concerns about a lack of retail/social options and traffic congestion in the Main Street area of Arklow, along with cleanliness and appearance of the town, are priorities for both residents and visitors, according to the result of a public survey.

Wicklow County Council, Arklow Chamber of Commerce, Arklow Town Team and An Garda Síochana are working in partnership with local stakeholders to help restart the local economy.

A Public Survey on how best to reopen Arklow was carried out and the results are now in.

The survey was conducted to gauge interested parties views on how best to support the local economy in the context of applying for stimulus funding to reopen Co. Wicklow's town centres.

Such initiatives may include measures to enhance social distancing such as widening of footpaths, pedestrianisation of streets through to supporting business by increasing footfall through enhancing the streetscape, removing parking spaces and making our streets more amenable to trade.

The findings of the study will help future decision making on improvements to the town centre when funding becomes available.

The results are a valuable resource for all those who have an input into the future shaping and decision making in our town and will greatly assist in making Arklow a vibrant and welcoming town for future generations.

A number of major initiatives are taking place in Arklow and again the survey will assist policy makers in making the town a better place to live, work and play.

Wicklow County Council has recently received funding to carry out a traffic and transportation study for Arklow. Consultants will

shortly be appointed to consider a transport plan for the town which deals with mobility and traffic congestion issues which were again instanced in the response to the survey.

Other initiatives on the infrastructure side which will increase footfall and business activity in the town include URDF funding of some €1.645 million allocated for Arklow's Historic Town Core with work due to commence on the Parade Ground early in the new year.

The Courthouse building has been refurbished and will shortly offer business units and office space for new and expanding businesses in the area. All in all, this

Plans are also in place to refurbish the entrance to St. Mary's Park. The park benches and flower beds will also be upgraded.

Arklow Town Team will also continue with the Flower Basket Scheme in 2021 which continues to bring colour and vibrancy to the town centre.

Arklow Municipal District will also have its public spaces enhanced following recent funding of €35,550 secured under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme to implement a Biodiversity Plan for the District.

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Council acquires Rathdrum site for community & enterprise centre

"We rely heavily on the support of the public and our fundraising has been critically impacted by Covid-19. We receive a lot of support from communities at events big and small but this year people have been unable to get together and we are really seeing the impact of this now. We estimate that fundraising this year will be down over 35% by year-end and we urge the people of Wicklow to get behind this project once more.

"As with other healthcare providers nationwide, we are in the unfortunate position of having to restrict visiting at present.

Visiting will be aligned to the phases of the government roadmap and details of agreed visiting and other relevant arrangements will be confirmed by the clinical team. We are grateful for the support and understanding of patients and their families as we strive to protect them, our staff and the wider community.

"Virtual visits have become popular and we are happy to work with patients and their families to help them set up phone and video calling. We encourage patients to bring in items from home and we know that messages, photos, cards and pictures from children really brighten up their day.

"Volunteers play a vital role across our services. Our gardening volunteers have been active for some time, planning how to make the most of this special site. In the new year we will look to develop our volunteer programme and advise those who are interested in getting involved to keep an eye on social media and online."

The organisation continues to explore ways to meet growing demand and future needs by finding ways to integrate, improve and expand its services. In 2021, OLH&CS will refurbish Blackrock Hospice at a cost of around €4 million.

'Budget 2021 is good news for Wicklow'

Last week's budget announcement detailed the biggest and most progressive investment in the history of the state and is good news for Wicklow, said Green Party TD Steven Matthews.

He said that it was evident from many of the expenditure decisions that this budget had "green influence all over it".

"Significant green wins were contained in this budget," said Deputy Matthews. "There has been a shift towards a green and circular economy, while ensuring a just transition for all. While no budget can ever fully realise the expectations of all, this record spend of €17bn for 2021 shows that the Greens in government demonstrate a significant shift in the political landscape and in how we prioritise our spending."

Detailing some of the increased budget spends that will benefit the people of Wicklow, Deputy Matthews said, "These measures show an increased spend across the core areas of health, education and housing but also Green Party influenced measures to address climate change, housing, transport and vulnerable communities.

Budget measure that will benefit the people of Wicklow include:

- Strong social protection provisions including increase in qualified child allowance, fuel allowance and living alone allowance. Also the Carbon tax will tax pollution but not as a rev-

enue generating exercise, the funds will go towards retrofitting housing stock and social protection measures as well as agricultural schemes to sequester carbon and increase biodiversity.

- Investment in childcare, €225m to improve direct provision before system change, €70m funding towards youth work.
- Largest ever investment in housing of €3.3bn, providing 9,500 social housing, 400 cost rental, €290m allocated to retrofitting older homes, homelessness funding increased to €218m.
- Increase in frontline gardai, 620 new recruits, 500 garda staff.
- €1m per day allocated for walking and cycling improvements, an additional €1bn for public transport projects.
- Teacher pupil ratio in Wicklow's classroom will be reduced to 1:25 and 600 new teachers come on stream nationally.
- Hospitality VAT rate to be reduced to 9%, helping Wicklow's tourism and recreation economy.
- €180m investment in the arts, which will assist Wicklow's vibrant artistic community
- Pandemic payment recipients will receive Christmas bonus.

Deputy Matthews concluded, "It is clear that this is a Green recovery budget; it provides for Covid and Brexit contingencies while providing massive capital investment and catering for our vulnerable."

Major new reskilling and retraining package

Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science Simon Harris has announced a major new reskilling and retraining package and extension of Apprenticeship scheme in addition to further financial assistance for full-time students.

The package includes:

- A €50 million fund to provide financial assistance to full time third level students in recognition of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on this group.
- €120 million to reskill and upskill people affected by the pandemic.
- Supporting a green recovery by rolling out a new retrofitting training scheme and a new climate action upskilling scheme.
- 50,000 further education and training places in 2020/2021.
- Extension of the Apprenticeship Incentivisation Scheme.
- Nearly €30 million will be invested in research to support researchers, build capacity, support COVID-19 research, and strengthen north-south research links.
- Enhanced SUSI grant supports for post-grads and increased support for the PATH access initiative to increase participation in Higher Education from the most economically disadvantaged students.
- A review of SUSI to guide the future strategic direction of the scheme.

most, whether that is to assist with seeking employment or to upskill in their current jobs.

"For students, this year has been like no other. The majority of college will be online for this semester and we will provide financial assistance through a €50 million fund.

"Detailed work will be undertaken on how this once-off fund will operate for submission to Government prior to commencement.

"We will also carry out a review of student supports in line with the Programme for Government commitment but as a first step, will reform post graduate supports.

"Investment in education, research, and science will help to support a more sustainable, resilient and fair recovery across Ireland."

Minister Harris concluded: "I will later this year launch an Apprenticeship Action Plan but in the meantime, we will extend the incentive for businesses to take on apprentices."

€4 billion for health and social care services

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly TD said "Budget 2021 saw an extra €4 billion added to the health budget, the largest budget increase in the history of the state. This money signals how determined we in government are to fund an expansion of, and improvements in, our health and social care services.

"Budget 2021 provides for the continuation of the extraordinary public health measures and health and social care service supports and capacity introduced in 2020. But this Budget will not just be about the response to COVID-19, it is also about building positive permanent change into our health service.

"While the pandemic highlighted major challenges in our health service, it has also highlighted the many strengths within the service. In Budget 2021 my objective is to address these challenges head on and to build upon the strengths. The investments being made today will mean that when this pandemic ends, Ireland will have a better, more resilient healthcare system - one which has the capacity required to meet the changing needs of the population, and one which has permanently embedded reform.

"This Budget will deliver funding for 2,600 beds and about 16,000 staff for our health service over Budget 2020 levels. It will provide

permanent funding for the capacity and staff introduced in 2020 and planned under the HSE Winter Plan. It will move care from hospitals to communities, closer to home. It will ensure that more people have access to primary care and that more older people will have medical cards. It will ensure that funding is in place for new medicines and technologies. It is providing unprecedented funding

for key national strategies that will improve maternity and gynaecology services, cancer services, our trauma network, palliative care, dementia services and women's health."

The Minister added: "Hundreds of thousands of people were on waiting lists before COVID-19 hit. Since the beginning of the pandemic this has worsened as much elective, or planned, care paused earlier this year.

The impact of this pandemic on levels of unmet need is difficult to quantify, but it is a huge concern for me as Health Minister. Therefore, I have established an Access to Care Fund of €210 million and will be allocating a budget of €130 million to the National Treatment Purchase Fund (NTPF). It will empower our GPs and provide access to more than 130,000 additional diagnostic tests."



'Government fails children and stretched families'

Jennifer Whitmore TD, Social Democrats spokesperson for children, has called out the Government for not grasping the opportunity in Budget 2021 to move to a public model of childcare provision. She also said that the Budget has overlooked the children and stretched families who have borne the brunt of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Deputy Whitmore said: "Our childcare system fell apart on its first major test in the early stages of Covid-19. The privatised, under-resourced model which successive governments have created was never fit for purpose. For most families with children, it was the equivalent of another mortgage and a huge part of the unsustainable cost of living."

"The systemic weaknesses were shown up in the pandemic, including very poor wages, lack of sick pay, poor progression routes and poor profitability for the providers. It became clearer that it is a broken system that doesn't work for children, for parents or for early educators."

"All of us relied on our childcare system to restart the economy, to enable people to get back to work. The government put band-aids on it and cobbled together something that got barely got us through temporarily. But all the crucial issues of affordability and proper pay were left untouched."

"The government badly failed in Budget 2021 to seize the opportunity to re-imagine our childcare system. This was a once in a generation opportunity the government should have taken to rebuild a system that worked for children, for families, for employers and for the workers in the childcare system."

"Budget 2021 was the opportunity to move to a publicly funded, high quality childcare system - as much of Europe already has in place. The failure of the Government to grasp the opportunity means that our chance of having proper public services responsive to the needs of fami-

lies, workers and children."

"The additional funding of €110m for the Department is welcome, however, and I am happy to see funding facilitating the work of Tusla as well as supporting those in direct provision. I also welcome the additional €5m for youth services."

"However, much more will be needed to help young people navigate the current crisis and address the effects it has had on this cohort. It has not been given the attention it deserves to date which I will work for on the Oireachtas Committee for Children."

"Some anti-poverty initiatives will also get additional funding, including an increase in the school meals programme which I called for in my recent Dáil motion on Child Poverty. This expansion will reach an additional 35,000 school children."

"Fuel poverty is also a focus in the budget, with the Fuel Allowance increasing by €3.50. However, I am concerned that this increase will be absorbed by any increases in the cost of living over time."

"Budget 2021 was also an opportunity to support parents as they cope with the Covid-19 crisis and to address the early years of a child's life. I had called for an extension to Parents' Leave in our Social Democrats Budget proposal and I am happy to see that paid leave has been increased by three weeks. However, the child poverty measures announced today do not go far enough, particularly the €2 increase for under 12 years," concluded Deputy Whitmore.

'Budget has let down workers, families and small business owners'

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has said that the government has badly let down hundreds of thousands of workers, families and small business owners in Budget 2021.

Deputy Brady said "Sinn Féin would have done things differently. We would have given certainty to workers, families and small businesses that they can get through this crisis. We would have delivered affordable housing on a scale not seen before. We would have built up greater capacity in our health service. And critically we would have started the work to rebuild our country in a better, fairer, stronger way."

"Today was the day for action but what did we get - no relief for people who saw their PUP payment cut, no relief for renters, no right to a pension at 65, more new money for developers and landlords than for genuinely affordable housing, nothing delivered for families paying the highest childcare costs in Europe, not enough to help small businesses survive, increasing costs for people across rural Ireland with carbon taxes and motor taxes and little ambition to get to

grips with the crisis in our health service."

"Our very first priority would be those who are struggling and just clinging on having lost jobs and incomes. Those who need PUP payments restored. Those locked out of homeownership in the middle of a pandemic. Those renters who just need a break. They should have reversed the cut to the PUP payment for those who have lost their jobs as increased restrictions are reintroduced. But they didn't. They should have reversed the cut to the temporary wage scheme. But they didn't. This means we have businesses closing unnecessarily, this means families slipping into further debt and in some cases at risk of losing the roof over their head."

"The Government should have grasped this unique opportunity to have the largest house building programme in the state's history - stimulating the economy, addressing the affordable housing short-

age, giving people real hope in these difficult times that they can secure a home for their family."

The new Government had completely failed its first and most important test on housing. Minister Darragh O'Brien has failed to secure the level of capital investment required to tackle the social and affordable housing crisis.

This is more of the same failed housing policy of the last Government. More new money will go to private landlords and private developers than will go to genuinely affordable homes for working people.

"They should have prioritised young people disproportionately impacted by unemployment and the housing crisis robbed of all the opportunities other generations took for granted."

Deputy Brady concluded "This was a time for change. The risk is not that we do too much, the risk is that we do too little, too late. Our focus is on supporting people to get through this crisis and that on the far side of it we rebuild the country in a better, fairer, stronger way."

"As for rural communities, the approach seems to be to kick them when they are down. Carbon taxes and VRT changes will come as a blow to people who have no option but to drive and who have no money to change to an electric vehicle."

"I welcome the increase in funding to re-open disability services and I commend all those families and providers who worked so hard to bring this about. That they were left for so long and had to fight so hard is an indictment of this and successive governments. Much more needs to be done but this is a first step."

"The failure to guarantee your right to a pension at 65 in the middle of a pandemic where older people are most vulnerable and where youth unemployment is so high simply

'Supports for businesses welcome but huge uncertainty remains'

Social Democrats Cllr Jodie Neary has responded to Budget 2021 saying "while the Budget recognised the twin challenges for business including Brexit and COVID 19, it has failed to address the overall level of uncertainty in the sector and the more immediate financial challenges facing many local businesses in Greystones District and across Wicklow."

Speaking about the Budget, Cllr Neary says "Budget 2021 certainly had its eye on the business sector providing various supports such as the extension of the commercial rates holiday, reduction of VAT to 9% in the hospitality sector, a new CRSS programme providing up to €5,000 per week in the event of closure and the continuation of PUP and the EWSS."

"But for many local businesses such as hairdressers, butchers or pubs, Budget 2021 did not address the more immediate financial challenges business owners face from one day to the next. Many of the businesses I spoke to in Greystones District said overheads such as rent, mortgages and utility bills still present daily financial challenges which this Budget did little to alleviate. A much respected and loved restaurant in

Greystones closed down in recent months which was regretful for the local community but also for those who put so much work and effort into the business."

"The Government needs to be conscious of the fact that counties moving in and out of various levels of COVID 19 restrictions, brings with it additional uncertainty for businesses which needs to be pre-empted. A business that deals mainly in perishable goods can get caught out by sudden restrictions forcing them to needlessly lose out on their stock. Other business are permanently cautious over buying stock and in Wicklow, which saw a move from Level 2 to Level 3, supply chains get disrupted."

"Not only do businesses need supports for these immediate financial challenges during COVID 19, the sector as a whole can only survive if we invest in our workers. They need adequate sick leave as well as better income protections at this most uncertain time which the Social Democrats has called for in response to Budget 2021."

"Investing in local businesses and in our workers gives towns and villages such as Greystones, Kilcoole and Newcastle, a fighting chance to emerge intact from this pandemic," concluded Cllr Neary.

Celebrate Halloween without Bonfires

Wicklow County Council is calling on communities and residents of Wicklow to celebrate Halloween safely this year without risk to life and our environment and the fear some activities can generate to others in our community. Halloween has its origin in our Celtic culture and while now celebrated internationally, is something we can all take pride in as an Irish tradition. That tradition does not require destructive bonfires and the use of fireworks.

Wicklow County Council would like to remind people that the burning of waste is not permitted. Bonfires release toxic carcinogenic materials into our air and leave toxic ash, waste residues and long term scarring of the land.

The Council is calling on householders and businesses to be vigilant and ensure none of their property ends up being used on a bonfire. Householders, individuals and businesses are liable for the waste and if identified giving waste for the purpose of making a bonfire will be liable to prosecution.

Wicklow County will not carry out clean ups after illegal bonfires and will not be responsible for the cost of any cleanup where one takes place.

With incidence of Covid-19 is rising in

County Wicklow at present, the Council is asking people to remember that gathering in numbers will breach current restrictions to control the spread of Covid 19. In outdoor settings, only up to 6 people from a maximum of 2 households can meet

while maintaining strict physical distancing. This year more than ever we need to rethink how we celebrate Halloween.

In recent decades Halloween has been the busiest night of the year by far for all our emergency services. Firefighters have to deal with fires that get out of control putting buildings and people at risk, often having to deal with hostile crowds in the process.

Our hospital emergency departments experience a spike in injuries and medical emergencies at this

time also. Covid-19 has stretched our medical services to the utmost and they have responded with courage. They don't need a typical Halloween experience this year.

Anti-social behaviour puts a lot of demand on the Gardai. Such anti-social behavior is also a very frightening experience for many residents particularly the older and more vulnerable.

The social isolation that has resulted from lockdown and limiting contact with friends and family has made 2020 tough for many of these people. We can all help by ensuring that Halloween this year is a less stressful experience.

Fireworks cause fear particularly to dogs and cats with their sensitive hearing. If you don't want to cause stress to your own and neighbours pet

then don't do fireworks and bangers. Pet owners are advised to keep their pet indoors in the quietest space they can provide. Fireworks in the weeks leading up Halloween extend this misery for pets.

This Halloween lets all celebrate in family. Celebrate the arrival of darker evenings and spooks ghouls and have some fun.

Let's avoid doing harm to our environment and let's avoid the risk of spreading Covid-19. Let's give our emergency services a well-deserved break this Halloween. They have been champions, looking out for us since March.

Over 1700 young people unemployed

The National Youth Council of Ireland (NYCI) which represents groups working with over 380,000 young people nationwide - has expressed disappointment at the measures contained in the Budget to deal with the high levels of youth unemployment. In County Wicklow there are 1,203 people under the age of 25 in receipt of the Pandemic Unemployment Payment (PUP), and a further 583 young people aged 25-29 on the PUP.

Reacting to the budget James Doorley, NYCI Deputy Director said: "Ministers Donohue and McGrath both noted and accepted the impact of the pandemic on the job prospects of young people and the high levels of youth unemployment in their budget speeches. But the actual measures contained in the Budget to deal with the challenge was disappointing, given the scale and scope of the problem.

"We have 36.5% youth unemployment, the number of young people under 25 on the PUP stands at 55,000 and there is a further cohort of almost 29,000 on the live register (up 6,000 since March 2020).

"We welcome the extra 10,000 places in education and training and an expansion of the apprenticeship incentivisation scheme on top of existing measures. We also note the announcement of a further €10m in activation measures by the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection.

"However, with 83,000 young people out of work, these measures in our view are insufficient."

Local hoteliers welcome budget measures

Hotels and guesthouses in Wicklow have welcomed the range of measures and supports announced in Budget 2021 by Ministers Paschal Donohoe and Michael McGrath.

Irish Hotels Federation (IHF) Wicklow branch chair, Gerard O'Brien welcomed in particular the extension of employment supports to the end of 2021 and the rates waiver scheme along with the reduction in the tourism VAT rate, which he said would help aid the recovery of the industry. He said the new Covid Restriction Support Scheme, the Tourism Business Support Scheme and funds for tourism product development, are welcome recognition of the challenges being faced by businesses.

Mr O'Brien commented: "The extension of employment supports until the end of December 2021 is very welcome. However, we are disappointed that the rates of the EWSS scheme were not increased. This does not recognise the challenges facing tourism and hospitality businesses in retaining key staff during the difficult winter/spring months and against the backdrop of additional restrictions.

"We also welcome the reduction in the tourism VAT to 9%, which is the right tourism VAT rate. It is an important measure that will stimulate demand and aid the recovery of the tourism and hospitality industry. After the last recession, tourism created the most jobs nationally - 90,000 new jobs - and there is no doubt that the 9% VAT rate contributed significantly to this

increased employment. Pre-Covid, our industry supported almost 270,000 livelihoods, including 13,900 jobs, and generated €135m in revenue here in Wicklow. This accounts for one in ten jobs across the country, 70% of which were outside of Dublin. Reducing the Tourism VAT will help sustain jobs and communities across Ireland.

Mr O'Brien added: "As well as providing a stimulus in the Irish economy, the reduction will improve our competitiveness as an international tourism destination. However, it should be a permanent measure, at a minimum of five years. Contracts with tour operators for example, which can account for over 30% of many hotels' business, are agreed two years in advance. Before today, VAT on Irish Hotels was the second highest in Europe and higher than 30 European Countries. The UK - our nearest largest market and one of our biggest competitors - for example, currently has a VAT rate of 5% so today's reduction is an important boost to our competitiveness.

"We cautiously welcome the extension of the local authority rates waiver period to 31st December 2020 and we look forward to engaging further with Government if, as expected, Covid restrictions are still in place at the end of the year. While every help is welcome, the time-period should coincide with business interruption

A Russian medal for Ted's 99th birthday

Wicklow resident Ted Veal celebrated his ninety-ninth year on the planet on 9th October, with a medal from Moscow struck to commemorate The Great Victory - a tank battle that took place seven decades ago.

"All I did was give a talk to some schoolchildren in Drogheda," Ted told friends at his home in Wicklow town.

Ted's presentation at St Oliver's Community College in Drogheda was of his war time experience during the Italian campaign in 1943. His story caught the attention of curators Dina Kurbanova and Sergei Menshakov of the Russian section of the Military War Museum based in Collon, County Meath. As a gesture of appreciation, they presented him with a bottle of cognac and a medal struck by the Russian State Museum in Prohorovka commemorating a famous tank battle between Soviets and Germans seventy years ago.

Ted was thrilled to add the gong to campaign medals he was awarded for his service in World War II.

"Russia was part of the Allied campaign against Germany, so we were all in the war together. Something people don't realise, the Russians lost close to 27 million people in that war."

Flight Sergeant Ted Veal served in WW2 as a RAF radio officer and machine gunner and was the sole survivor of an American built Baltimore bomber whose

whose parachute saved their lives.

With the help of the Italian underground he was taken to a hiding place and given food and water. There were other allied troops hiding in the district, including a Russian soldier. A fortnight later, Ted was repatriated along with everyone else when the Australian army arrived. Back with his RAF squadron, he was promoted to Pilot Officer. Assigned to the airlift of soldiers from Berlin and North Africa, he went up in rank again, to Flight Lieutenant.

After the war, he was a salesman for Heinz before going to Zimbabwe (Northern Rhodesia) as a miner and became a mine engineer. He married an Irish Nurse, Deirdre Wilkinson and they retired to Wicklow where, for a time, he worked as a mine engineer at Avoca's gold mine.

During his nineties, after two hip replacements, Ted has taken joy rides in a small aircraft, a hot air balloon, and the big dipper in Co Meath. He had a racehorse named after him and is a founder member of the Kilmartin Arts in Wicklow where he has a large coterie of friends. "Now I'm looking forward to making a century," Ted says. "And maybe a couple of years after that."

engines failed over Italy. The pilot, who ordered everyone to bail out, was killed along with two other crew members. Ted, sitting at the tail gun managed to escape as the aircraft plunged into the side of a mountain.

"It was night. We were over the Abruzzi," Ted remembers. "I pulled the cord, my parachute opened, and landed on my backside. It was my first parachute jump."

For that, the parachute manufacturer signed him up for the Caterpillar Club, an exclusive association for airmen

'Bill to bury mother and baby home records must be opposed'

Aontú leader Peadar Tóibín TD has announced his intention to oppose the Commissions of Investigation Mother and Baby Homes Bill which has been introduced by Children's Minister Roderic O'Gorman.

Deputy Tóibín said: "The contents of this Bill are very concerning. If enacted it will mean that records unearthed by the Mother and Baby Homes Commission of Investigation will be returned to Tusla and held under lock and key for thirty years. This is unacceptable, we in Aontú have spoken to former residents in recent days and they've expressed concern that they will not be able to access even the transcripts of their own testimonies to the commission, or their own medical records or documents."

"It is a sad reality that in thirty years' time many of the former residents/survivors may be dead. We've all heard the stories of people who have spent years trying to find their birth mother. People currently involved in the tracing or searching process are acutely aware that as the clock ticks their chances of reunion are fading. Minister O'Gorman's Bill will throw more red tape and hurdles in the faces of people who are desperate in their search, having been failed by this State for so long."

Drivers 70 years of age and over invited to renew driving licence by post

Minister for Transport, Eamon Ryan T.D., has announced that as a result of Covid-19, those 70 years of age and over will be contacted directly by the National Driver Licence Service (NDLS) and invited to renew their licence or permit by post.

The process of contacting drivers 70 years and over will begin this week and will initially target renewals due in October 2020.

Commenting on the move Minister Ryan said, "At present, only those aged 70 and over who renew their licence on a yearly basis are invited to renew it by post. As a temporary measure, given the situation with Covid19, the RSA, through its licensing service the NDLS, will expand the postal renewal option, to those over 70 who renew their licence every three years. This measure will reduce the need for this vulnerable group to attend in person at an NDLS centre."

The NDLS service, which is managed by the RSA, will be sending out application packs to those eligible to apply by post this coming week. The pack will include a partially completed application form that the customer must complete. If a medical report form is required, this must be included along with the completed application form in the pre-addressed envelope provided (postage stamp required) and posted back to the NDLS.

There is no fee required as customers 70 years of age and over are exempt from paying the cost of a driving licence or permit renewal.

If someone does receive an application pack in the post and

wishes to renew this way, but may have already booked an appointment at an NDLS centre, you must cancel this appointment by logging on to www.ndls.ie. The NDLS would appreciate if customers cancelled this appointment in order to facilitate other applicants.

Those 70 and over are reminded that unless they have a specific medical condition (listed on the application form), they do not need to provide a medical report when applying to renew their licence.

This temporary exemption was introduced to remove pressure on the health system at a time of crisis and is in place until 31 December 2020.

Five acres of land transferred to Council for housing

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has welcomed the progress that has been made by the Department of Defence in transferring five acres of land at Rockbrae House in Bray to Wicklow County Council for housing purposes.

Speaking after receiving an update from the Minister for Defence Simon Coveney, Deputy Brady said "I'm delighted that the process of bringing five acres of former lands in the control of the Defence Forces in Bray into the control of Wicklow County Council is at an advanced stage. The Minister has informed me that the lands at Rockbrae House are currently being disposed of by way of transfer to Wicklow County Council and that officials from his Department are currently liaising with the Chief State's Solicitor's Office on the necessary legal preparatory matters.

"I think this is a fantastic site in Bray and it has huge potential if developed properly. The site has unfortunately fallen into disuse by the Defence Forces, this followed a major restructuring of the Reserve Defence Forces who had primarily used it.

"In 2018 I met the then Minister for Defence Paul Kehoe and put forward a proposal of using the disused Rockbrae House site of 5 acres for housing purposes. At the time the Minister gave a commitment to have the officials in his Department carry out a report and consult with all the stakeholders. In 2019 the Minister

reverted to me saying that Officials from his Department had met with representatives of Wicklow County Council to discuss the future of Rockbrae House and the lands and they were awaiting an updated position from the council.

"I have consistently held the view that the lands at Rockbrae House were underused and held so much potential. I'm delighted that serious progress has now been made in advancing the issue and utilising the 5-acre site. In the Bray Municipal District Local Area Plan the site is zoned Residential. I believe that once the transfer to Wicklow County Council is complete a conversation needs to be had about what type of development would be

best for the site. I think that it provides us a rare opportunity to develop a social and affordable housing scheme and also provide badly needed community facilities. I also feel that consultation with the residents of Charnwood and the Church Road at an early stage is vital."

Cllr Dermot O'Brien said "This is a unique opportunity to develop this site in a way that complements the existing area while at the same time responding to the need for social and affordable housing in a sustainable and dynamic way. The sooner we open up the conversations about this the better."

Cllr Grace McManus said "While we are eye to eye with an acute housing crisis, as we are now, it is

essential that we utilise every resource available to address the presenting housing needs of our community. We know that there are many young people, families and individuals who have no choice but to await a proper strategy for public housing, a mix of social and affordable, and I think this land provides us a unique opportunity to answer that need. I look forward to hearing the views of all within the community on how we can utilise our assets to rise to this challenge in a way that is mindful and considerate of the neighbours of this land too."

Deputy Brady concluded "I look forward to a swift transfer of the site and will continue to proactively engage with all the stakeholders."

Opening on Thursday 22nd October, Mary-Kate's '50 Faces of Halloween' will feature images of her own face transformed into those of creatures and characters






Rhythms - An exhibition by ReVerve at Signal Arts Centre

Wicklow graduates unveil new style of midi music controller and launch a kickstarter campaign

Joyst (Joyst Instruments Ltd), a University College Dublin (UCD) spin-out company established earlier this year, has unveiled the Joyst JV-1, a new style of MIDI (Musical Instrument Digital Interface) controller and announced the launch of the company's Kickstarter campaign.

The Joyst JV-1 has emerged from a Master of Engineering thesis project carried out by Philip Snell, who is from Rathdrum, under the supervision of Dr Paul Cuffe at the UCD School of Electrical and Electronic Engineering.

Joyst was co-founded by Philip and fellow UCD Master of Engineering graduates, William Langrell, who is from Kiltegan, and Edward Byrne, who is from Hacketstown, along with Dr Cuffe, to commercialise the JV-1 MIDI controller.

The Joyst JV-1 MIDI controller provides an array of gamer-style thumb joysticks to give more expressive possibilities for electronic musicians. Notes are played by striking the joysticks, if one is then rotated, this pitchbends that note up or down. Using joysticks in this role is a very new approach for a MIDI controller, which significantly increases a musician's ability to play with subtle intonation and expressive flourishes.

The ambitious goal of the project was to create a new MIDI controller that would allow a musician to bend each note, finely control velocity, inject vibrato, and articulate precise aftertouch effects. Maximising ease of playability was also a key project goal, which led to the JV-1 adopting the note layout of a chromatic accordion. In this handy arrangement, every type of chord has a consistent fingering shape, regardless of its root note. Scales are always the same pattern wherever you start. This minimises the need for rote memorisation.

Philip Snell, CEO and co-founder, Joyst, said, "From day one, the vision for the JV-1 has been simple, electronic music with no creative compromises. Why can't a MIDI controller let you bend notes like an electric guitar? Even on the earliest prototype, we could see the power of joysticks in this role. They allow the player to inject subtlety and fine intonation into their playing, with a tactile and responsive feel. The buttons and pads you find on traditional MIDI controllers are just too one-dimensional, sterile and overly digital. Joysticks restores what was lost, a full range of motion, a responsive springiness, organic bends, fresh sounds. Electronic music in full colour."

Through its Kickstarter campaign launched last week, Joyst has set a minimum funding target of €12,500 to be raised by the close of the campaign on 5 November. Backers will be rewarded with various reward tiers if the project is funded. Discounts are on offer for the earliest backers, who can secure a JV-1 for just €199, a significant discount on its RRP of €349. William Langrell, COO and co-founder, Joyst said, "We've been through several good rounds of prototyping now so we are now ready to present JV-1 to the world through our Kickstarter campaign. We are super excited about the JV-1 so we are asking people to back this project today to help us meet, and hopefully even exceed, our Kickstarter target and get the JV-1 into the hands of talented musicians around the world."

Joyst has been established with the support of NovaUCD, the Centre for New Ventures and Entrepreneurs at UCD and earlier this year Joyst completed the NovaUCD Student Enterprise Competition.

This intensive 4-week mentoring programme is run by NovaUCD as a framework to support undergraduate and postgraduate students who want to work together to develop and grow start-up companies. Its aim is to assist the participating students in refining their start-up ideas through a series of structured workshops, including taught content from industry experts, interactive workshops, regular pitching sessions and mentoring. Joyst will also be taking part in this year's UCD VentureLaunch Accelerator Programme, run by NovaUCD, which commences later this month.

Tender process begins for building work at four schools

The tendering process for four Wicklow schools is about to start. The National Development Finance Agency (NDFA) is supporting the Department of Education and Skills by delivering an element of the Department's school building programme on its behalf.

The NDFA have confirmed they will shortly be releasing a Prior Information Notice (PIN) to the market with a view to stimulating interest in advance of starting the tender process for the appointment of contractors for that programme.

This is separate to the tendering process - a Prior Information Notice is typically issued approximately four weeks in advance of the tendering process commencing.

The programme, entitled the Devolved Schools Building Programme 2, will comprise of 20 individual

school building projects ranging from new builds to extensions/refurbishment projects for works at both primary and post primary level.

These projects will be delivered as three distinct project bundles: Project Nore, Project Boyne and Project Dargle.

A framework of project management and design team consultants has already been appointed for the programme and the process to appoint teams to specific project bundles is now underway.

In Wicklow Coláiste Chraobh Abhann, Kilcoole, C.B.S

Secondary School Arklow, St. Kevin's Community School, Dunlavin and Avondale Community College, Rathdrum have all been included in the project.

St. Kevin's, which was built with a capacity for 500 students but now has over 600, has been waiting for an extension since 2014.

It is set to get a nine room extension which will include two science rooms and two special needs units.

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly said: "It's fantastic to see progress being made for

these schools who are in dire need of additional capacity. Schools like St Kevin's have had to wait far too long for this building work to get underway. I know having worked with the parents at schools like Coláiste Chraobh Abhann just how much they are in need of an extension to meet the ever growing demand for places.

"I'm delighted we are finally seeing some movement but I will be working to make sure these projects are delivered in a timely fashion because they are all desperately needed."

KWETB schools participate in ETBI Bliain na Gaeilge

Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh, Bláthnaid Ní Chofaigh, Bláthnaid Treacy and ETB past-pupil Séamus Ó Scanláin recently launched Education and Training Boards Ireland's Bliain na Gaeilge 2020/21 last week across 245 ETB post-primary Schools, 23 of which are located across Wicklow and Kildare.

The theme of the yearlong festival to celebrate Irish language is 'Ag tabhairt na Gaeilge linn' - 'Bringing Irish with us'. Speaking about the initiative, Minister of State for Gaeltacht Affairs and Sport, Jack Chambers TD said: "It is wonderful that over 100,000 students will be celebrating our language and our Irish culture during the schoolyear 2020/21. Irish is very important for us as a community and as a nation." In a video address to ETB students the Minister added: "The future of the language is depending on young people like you, participating in initiatives like this and promoting Irish within your own communities."

Speaking at the launch, ETB General Secretary Paddy Lavelle commented: "It is important that our students recognise that their journey with Irish does not stop in school. In fact, it is just the beginning: our relationship with Irish and our Irish culture is a life-long journey as inspired by our ETB Bliain na Gaeilge ambassadors.

Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh, Bláthnaid Ní Chofaigh, Séamus Ó Scanláin and Bláthnaid Treacy all exemplify how Irish language and culture can shape and benefit all aspects of our lives including our work life, social life and sporting life etc."

The programme launches today, 13 October 2020 and will run for the duration of the school year with a new competition/initiative featured every month and prizes awarded. In the interest of fairness, Irish-medium schools will not be pitted against English-medium schools. Each monthly competition will award a prize (including €500) for the best entry from an English-medium and an Irish-medium school.

Commenting on the initiative, Séamus Ó Scanláin, RTE RnaG and TG4 and past pupil of an ETB school said: "I am delighted to be one of this year's ETB Bliain na Gaeilge ambassadors. I attended an ETB school, Coláiste Cholmcille, Invern, Co. Galway, a school that encouraged me to pursue a profession through Irish, a profession that has opened up so many opportunities and brought me to when I am today as a successful broadcaster. It is a privilege to support the students of this generation to develop and nurture an interest in the Irish language".

Wicklow's student entrepreneurs begin online road to national success

Student entrepreneurs across Wicklow have begun their journey in this year's Student Enterprise Programme, with eyes on next year's National Final. This Local Enterprise Office (LEO) run programme will be delivered differently given the current restrictions across the country, and the Final, which will take place on Friday 14th May 2021, will be a virtual one.

This is 18th year of Ireland's largest secondary school entrepreneurship programme and has seen over 200,000 students take part since it began. The Final usually takes place in Croke Park but in 2021, as with the 2020 Final earlier this year, the event will take place online in line with current guidelines.

The students, who will compete across three categories, Junior, Intermediate and Senior, will see judging take place virtually via electronic submissions. Each student enterprise is challenged with creating, setting up and running their own business, which must show sales of their service or product.

The programme will also include two additional categories that students can enter. These are the "Most Creative Business Idea" video competition for the senior category and the "My Entrepreneurial Journey" category for the Junior and Intermediate categories.

The schools from Wicklow taking part this year are: Avondale Community College, CBS Arklow, Coláiste Bhríde, Coláiste Chill Mhantáin, Coláiste Chraobh Abhann, Dominican College, East Glendalough School, Gaelscoil Na Mara, Scoil Chonglais Post Primary School, Glenart College, Loreto Secondary, St Gerard's College, St Kevin's Community College, St Killian's Community School, St Mary's College, Temple Carrig School, Greystones Community College, St David's Holy Faith Secondary.

Over 1200 students from 19 secondary schools in Wicklow took part in last year's Programme. The enterprise education initiative, funded by the Government of Ireland through Enterprise Ireland and delivered by the 31 Local Enterprise Offices in local authorities throughout the country, saw over 25,000 students from over 500 secondary schools across the country take part last year.

Due to Covid restrictions the final in Wicklow last year was a virtual one and took place just after the schools closed. As a result the LEO was only recently in a position to present the trophies to the winners when the schools re-opened. The LEO Head of Enterprise, Vibeke Delahunt and Business Advisor Annette Rowsome were delighted to present the trophies to the winning teams.

Ms Delahunt said; "We would like to congratulate the winners of the competition last year, but also wish to recognize all the students that participated. This is a very important programme to the Local Enterprise

Office as it develops entrepreneurial skills in our young people and we very much look forward to having many of them as clients in the future when they start their own business".



IT Carlow to receive funding for researchers

Institute of Technology Carlow has welcomed the announcement by the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, Simon Harris TD of €644,504 in funding to support its researchers and research students whose work has been seriously disrupted by the pandemic.

Studies, Institute of Technology Carlow said, "The COVID-19 pandemic has demonstrated many things, not least that research and innovation is needed now more than ever. The pandemic has impacted on third-level research, with many worthy projects being forced to pause indefinitely and this funding will help to protect both people and projects at a critical moment for Ireland's national research system".

The funding was secured by the Minister as part of the €168 million package for further and higher education in light of the pandemic. Within this fund, €47 million will be provided to the higher education institutions by the Higher Education Authority to support researchers whose work has been affected by COVID-19.

In their utilisation of this funding, the institutions will prioritise the researchers and research students in greatest need, for example, those researchers who are coming to the end of their projects before the end of 2020. They will also continue to pursue all other avenues for project completion, for example in the form of budget re-allocations, and will engage with relevant funders to agree the extension of appropriate activities.

Students invited to take part in online writing competition

ActionAid Ireland is asking young people in Wicklow aged 14 to 17 to submit a five-minute speech for its newly relaunched ActionTalks competition.

The competition, now in its seventh year, has had been relaunched as an entirely digital competition to make it accessible to as many students as possible during the coronavirus pandemic. Entries will be taken online and finalists will be asked to present their speech to a panel of esteemed judges during a Zoom event in February. The first prize will be a €500 One4All voucher for the winning student and a €100 voucher for their teacher.

Young people will be asked to choose one of three topics relating to international development and the global coronavirus pandemic, and write a five-minute or 600 word speech. This year's topics are:

The coronavirus pandemic is an opportunity to imagine a more equal and sustainable world, but we must act now.

With a shocking increase in violence against women and girls, the coronavirus pandemic has shown us that the struggle for gender equality is far from over.

The coronavirus pandemic has reminded us of the importance of global solidarity and international aid.

working across of programmes. We are delighted to relaunch the ActionTalks competition as a completely digital event and to continue engaging young people in Wicklow. We have also created learning resources to help teachers to get the most out of the competition."

While students in Ireland have had to face lockdown and miss out on school for six months, many students across the world will never get to return following the pandemic. ActionAid surveyed 130 teachers from 14 countries who work in communities where livelihoods have been lost during the pandemic and where girls are being hardest hit by school closures.

Around three in five teachers surveyed say higher drop-out rate for girls (59%) and poorer children (62%) will be a long-term impact of the pandemic.

Nearly half are concerned about increases in early pregnancy (41%) and early marriage (45%) due to the Covid-19 crisis. Over a third (35%) are worried about rising hunger.

Teachers say some of the biggest issues preventing girls from returning to school are parents unable to afford the cost (62%), unpaid care

work (59%), child labour (51%) and early marriage (52%).

In addition, ActionAid research has also found that global lockdowns and coronavirus restrictions have led to a shocking increase in gender-based violence worldwide.

ActionAid provides long term support to the poorest and most marginalised women and children in developing countries, so they can overcome the obstacles holding them back. Its Women's Rights programme, funded by Irish Aid (Department of Foreign Affairs), works to eliminate violence against women and girls by engaging with women and girls, as well as men and boys. Throughout 2020 the programme has also been supporting communities in Nepal, Kenya and Ethiopia to stay safe during the coronavirus pandemic. Irish Aid programmes are funded by Irish citizens and are part of Ireland's important global role.

ActionAid is hoping entrants will come up with innovative, well-researched, and creative speeches, using their own unique perspective from growing up in a pandemic.

Bray social entrepreneur honoured for his work in response to covid-19

A Bray-based social entrepreneur - Hugh Brennan - was among eight social entrepreneurs honoured for their innovative and visionary response to the covid-19 pandemic at a special online event hosted last Wednesday by Social Entrepreneurs Ireland (SEI) - the SEI Gathering 2020.

Mr Brennan is the co-founder of Ó Cualann Cohousing Alliance, a voluntary housing co-operative that builds affordable houses in fully integrated and sustainable communities across Ireland. The demand for affordable housing has increased since the onset of Covid-19. Ó Cualann has responded by scaling up. While construction work had to be paused during lockdown, work has recommenced on 39 homes in Ballymun, Dublin 11 with a further 1,800 in the pipeline across the country.

Commenting, Mr Brennan said: "Social enterprise is changing the world by degrees and I was delighted to share the Ó Cualann story at the SEI Gathering.

The support from Social Entrepreneurs Ireland has been the most important support that we have received to date. It is enabling us to build our own internal capacity which in turn gives confidence to Local Authorities and others to work with us, which means that we can replicate and scale the Ó Cualann model all over Ireland."

At the SEI Gathering event CEO of Social Entrepreneurs Ireland, Darren Ryan highlighted that social entrepreneurs have played a key role in responding to the covid-19 crisis and will be needed more than ever as we rebuild our society.

According to Mr Ryan:

"The pandemic has shone a light on the communities that remain most vulnerable and isolated at this time and reminded us about what matters most. It has also shown that individuals around Ireland are willing and ready to step up and act.

"Social entrepreneurs are society's problem solvers. They are ordinary people who develop new, innovative ideas to address the social challenges we face and work tirelessly to put them into action.

We have already seen examples of this in recent months, as people around the country have developed innovative ways to care for people,

combat isolation, and keep our society going through the crisis. We will need a lot more of this as we respond to the evolving situation and continue to tackle the existing social issues.

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Advice for owners of dogs and cats during fireworks season

Veterinary Ireland is advising pet owners on measures to keep their pets safe this Halloween. As their hearing is much more sensitive than us humans, most pets are scared by sudden, loud noises, as well as flashes of light and so the weeks leading up to Halloween can be a very distressing time.

Up to 80% of pet owners report that their pet is afraid of fireworks. Most pets display mild symptoms of fear or anxiety initially but if improperly managed they tend to get worse.

Some of these animals may suffer from noise phobias - their reaction to certain noises are sudden, extreme and excessive. This can be very distressing for pets as well as their owners and can result in harm to the pet - for example, dogs may panic and run blindly. Halloween is a common time of year for pets to go missing or to be injured on the roads.

Some signs of anxiety to look out for in pets:

Dogs: Shivering or shaking; Destructive behaviour - e.g. chewing/scratching; Soiling

the house; Panting excessively; Licking lips; Pacing; Attempting to run away.

Cats: Cowering or hiding; House soiling; Refusing to eat; Attempting to run away.

Veterinary Ireland is issuing the following advice to pet owners this October:

Ideally, try and ensure that someone remains with your pet when fireworks may be heard, and especially on the night of Halloween.

Provide a den or a hiding place where your pet can feel safe. Make your pet a comfortable bed here, with old sweatshirts and other clothing to give your pet a sense of your reassuring presence. A crate with some blankets over it is ideal for a dog. A cat may prefer to

hide in a high up location such as the top of a wardrobe.

Keep your pet inside with the doors and windows closed and your favourite radio station switched on in the room. Provide an extra litter tray for cats.

Make sure to exercise your dog early in the day and give your pet something to do in the evening (such as chewing a frozen food-stuffed dog toy).

Ensure that all pets are wearing identification tags and have microchip identification - just in case your pet runs away from the sound of fireworks, the chances of being reunited significantly increase with identification.

Ignore fearful behaviour such as pant-

ing, shaking or whining. If owners give such animals extra attention in an attempt to "comfort" them, the pet may perceive this as a reward for displaying this type of behaviour and it can make matters worse over time.

Do not punish your pet for anxious behaviour such as scratching at doors or house soiling. This can also tend to exacerbate anxiety and make matters worse.

There are plug in diffusers, sprays and collars containing pheromones, as well as other products available from your vet, all of which can help to relieve anxiety in pets.

In severe cases visit your vet who may be able to prescribe medication to help in the short term. In the long term, some pet owners may need to ask their vet or a qualified behaviourist about noise desensitisation to prevent worsening of the problem.

Please do not share any of your Halloween sweets or treats with your pet - chocolate can actually be dangerous for pets, especially dogs, and can make them sick and/or choke.

Pet costumes - not all pets like or appreciate dressing up, so ensure that your pet is happy with whatever costume you might wish to dress it up in. Also ensure that the costume is made for your pet and is for the right size and species, or it might be painful and restrictive to wear
