# SCHOOL PLACES CRISIS LOOMS

A crisis of secondary school places is looming for Greystones Municipal District as many students learned last week that they have not secured a school place in Greystones Community College, which has been able to accept only about half of students that applied for 2021. John Brady TD said that the crisis of school places is not unique to Greystones but is a county-wide issue. "There are thousands of pupils crammed into over-crowded schools throughout the county," he said.

Speaking last week, Social Democrats Spokesperson for Children, Deputy Whitmore has said "yet again, students in Greystones will have the stress and worry of not having a school place readily available to them. This is symptomatic of a Department that has not addressed the current capacity of secondary schools in order to meet the demand for places in the area and is just not good enough."

"Greystones Community

College (GCC) have this week sent out letters to parents detailing whether their children will have a place in the next 2021-2022 school year. While many will be delighted to be accepted, there will be many more who will be equally disappointed.

Despite receiving over 180 applications, GCC will only be able to offer 96 places. And this is contingent on them moving into the new school in Charlesland which will cater to more than is currently on offer.



remains where those school children who were not offered a place, are going to go?

"It is imperative that the Minister for Education acts now. The Department

must proceed with the purchase of the land on the new site in Charlesland earmarked for the new secondary school building. Failing that, the Department must CPO the land if they cannot come to an agreement with the Developer. Discussions have been ongoing with regard to the purchase of this land for a considerable period - it is now time for the Department to finalise those discussions one way or another. Then, once the land is secured by the Department, portacabins can be put in place on a temporary basis, which would resolve the issue in the short term. And this would enable the Department to quickly

move to a design and build stage for the new building. Until the land is secured, the school will be in a limbo situation - which is not acceptable.

"This has gone on for far too long and I do not want to see a situation where a whole cohort of young people are not facilitated to learn in their local area. I will be pushing very hard on the Minister to respond to this urgent issue and address the situation before a crisis ensues. I have asked that this issue be discussed in the Dáil as soon as possible" concluded Deputy Whitmore.

Also speaking on the issue was local SocDems Councillor Jodie Neary who said "parents and children will need certainty if they were not successful in getting a secondary school place.

## Lands disposed at Shanganagh for housing development

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council and the Land Development Agency have welcomed the decision of the Elected Members to approve the disposal of part of the lands at Shanganagh to the Land Development Agency, for the development of 306 cost-rental homes.

A total of 597 new homes will be developed on the site, including 200 social and 91 affordable sale. The development is currently the largest social and affordable scheme with planning permission in Ireland.

The site occupies approximately 9 hectares adjacent to Shanganagh Castle, Shanganagh Park and Castle Farm and will be within 10 minutes' walk of the proposed DART station at Woodbrook and BusConnects route on the nearby Dublin Road (N11).

The procurement process to appoint a contractor will commence in the New Year.

## Wind Farm consultation

Cllr Derek Mitchell is urging people to have their say on the proposed Dublin Array Wind Farm. "The huge Dublin Array turbines, at 300m 50% higher than Poolbeg chimneys, are to be close to shore, 9km from the coast. The photomontages of this are on their site <https://dublinarray.com/> until 20th November and they are seeking feedback. I urge people to view this and give their views," said Cllr Mitchell.

"The Dublin Array photomontages should be changed to include all windfarms off the coast. The combined visual effect is described as 'adverse' and 'significant' from Greystones. The whole seascape horizon will be windmills. There is also no economic benefit for Greystones. The Dublin Array should be shortened by 10km so the southern end is at the north side of Bray Head thus breaking this long line of turbines off Greystones & Bray Head."

# Planning application for 7-storey telecommunications tower at Brittas Bay

There's concern among residents of Brittas Bay following the lodging of a planning application to erect a 24-metres high telecommunications tower at Rock Farm, just over a kilometre from Brittas Bay beach. The application has been lodged with Wicklow County Council by Vantage Towers Ltd, a company formed by Vodafone to manage its tower assets.

The proposed development would include the 24m high lattice telecommunications support structure, together with antennas, dishes, and associated telecommunications equipment all enclosed in security fencing. The development would also facilitate site sharing with more operators in the future.

Public submissions can be made up to December 3rd, and the Council is due to make a decision by January 2nd, 2021.

"Vantage holds responsibility for developing new sites on behalf of Vodafone Ireland to meet its coverage requirements such as is the case in this subject planning application," the cover letter of the planning application states.

The cover letter adds that Vodafone has a requirement to significantly improve its service provision in Brittas Bay after its key transmitting site there

(McDaniel's pub and holiday home complex) was decommissioned in 2019.

Since then, a temporary mobile mast has been in place. Vantage Towers wishes to keep the temporary mobile mast in place until planning permission for the new permanent structure is granted.

The cover letter states that the loss of this telecommunications site has resulted in an upsurge in complaints to Vodafone from residents and businesses and managers of community facilities in the Brittas Bay area, as it's been a struggle to meet basic coverage requirements.

Sites such as The Beach Hut and Brittas Bay Car park were considered before selecting Rock Farm for the new proposed tower.

"No other identified potential mast location can offer the same technical solution as the appli-

cation site at Rock Farm," the cover letter states.

With regards to Brittas Bay, Wicklow County Council's Development Plan states that "no development will be permitted that has an adverse impact on the environmental and ecological quality of the Proposed Natural Heritage Area (PNHA), or candidates for Special Areas of Conservation (CSAC) in the area. Applicants will be required to demonstrate beyond all reasonable doubt that a proposed development does not, beyond all reasonable doubt, adversely impact on the integrity of a designated area."

The cover letter maintains that "the proposed development is not situated within a PNHA or a CSAC and neither its operations nor its construction will have any impact on the environmental and ecological land categories."

The letter argues that the visual impact of the proposed structure will not be significant: "it is a lattice structure that allows light filtration, that can blend into the blues, greys, and clouds of the skyline. It is located on agricultural land some 850m off the R750 and distant from residential areas and recreational amenities.

"The applicant sees no other solution and certainly no more balanced solution to the coverage and landscape considerations than to permit the application structure at this location. Given the context of poor existing 3G and 4G availability in the Brittas Bay environs as demonstrated both by the Department of Communications, Climate Action and Environment, and Comreg websites it is clear that the status quo shall persist without investment in infrastructure."

## Harris hosts meeting for Delgany residents on Convent site proposal

Minister Simon Harris hosted an online meeting last Wednesday evening for Delgany residents over the new plans lodged with An Bord Pleanala for the Convent site in Delgany Village. Over 150 Delgany residents were in attendance at the meeting.

Minister Harris said "I was delighted to see so many residents actively engage on such an important issue for the future of our community. A major planning application like this requires a lot of detailed study and I would like to thank Delgany residents Alice O'Donnell and Aileen Lennon along with my colleague Cllr Derek Mitchell for the detailed presentation they gave residents at the meeting".

The presentation to the meeting outlined

the various aspects of the planning application including density, roads, amenities and the new community/cultural centre proposed and how all of this would impact on Delgany Village.

Minister Harris added "This planning application is direct to An Bord Pleanala and people wishing to make a submission to the board have until November 24th to do so. I wanted to ensure Delgany residents have the maximum amount of information regarding

the plans lodged with An Bord Pleanala.

"A wide variety of issues were raised by residents at the meeting, from traffic management to the protection of the character and heritage of Delgany Village. It is important the residents take a look at this planning application and make their views known. ## Action needed as 1,271 people are waiting for driving test

**Sinn Féin TD John Brady last week called for Minister Eamon Ryan to take decisive action to tackle the massive driving test backlog.**

Deputy John Brady's comments come as the Road Safety Authority (RSA) confirmed to Sinn Féin that there are now 1,271 learner drivers waiting for a test in Wicklow, and over 90,000 people waiting across the state.

Deputy Brady said "The RSA has confirmed to me that there are now 93,791 people waiting

for a driving test, with some constituents telling me they will be forced to wait well into 2021 for a test date.

"This issue has been deteriorating all year. Minister for Transport Eamon Ryan has failed to take decisive action to tackle the growing backlog. In fact, the number of people waiting for a test has increased by

70% since June of this year.

"With public transport down to 25% capacity and sharing of lifts now not feasible due to Covid, this is causing massive problems for people who need a licence to get to work. It's a huge issue for people in rural Ireland, where public transport simply isn't an option.

"The problem is particularly bad in our own county, with 1,271 learner drivers waiting for a test in Wicklow's testing



centre. In addition, the driver theory test has been suspended until

early December, causing further delays for those needing to learn to drive.

"There is a clear need for additional driving instructors and testers. Likewise, longer opening hours and weekend tests would go some way to address the lengthening backlog. The Minister needs to urgently consult with instructors, testers and their unions to find a way forward to accelerate the number of tests that can be carried out safely over the coming months."

# €6.4 million for Blessington Greenway

Funding of €6.4 million is to be allocated to the Blessington Loop Greenway, it was announced last week. It's expected when the project is completed in 2022 the full 42km route will attract almost 500,000 people to the area per annum.

The latest round of funding today will go a long way in delivering a safe and sustainable environment for active travel in our villages, towns and cities. We are funding the construction of a Greenway bridge across the River Shannon in Athlone as part of the Galway to Dublin Greenway. This investment will support even greater numbers enjoying our outdoors by cycling and walking for school, work and leisure.

In total the entire scheme is expected to cost €15 million when it's finished and will take in the towns of Valleymount, Ballyknockan and Lacken. The announcement was made by Minister Eamon Ryan, T.D. Minister of Transport, and Hildegard Naughton, T.D. Minister of State, and the funding is part of over €60m which is to be allocated to greenway projects across the country.

Announcing the allocations Minister Ryan T.D. said "I am delighted to be able to confirm that the allocation of €63.5m to Greenways for 2021 is the highest single year amount ever allocated to Greenways. Indeed, it nearly equals the total amount originally allocated for the 4 years 2018-2021 (€53m) and shows the commitment of this Government to providing a step-change in the way in which we fund walking and cycling."

Minister of State Hildegard Naughton said "The allocations of €63.5 million being made

€6,400,000 been allocated by the government towards the Blessington Greenway.

Minister Harris said "The allocation of €63.5m to Greenways in Ireland for 2021 is the highest single yearly amount ever allocated nationally to Greenways. This is the first step in the new government's commitment to the massive expansion of funding towards walking and cycling. I would like to pay tribute to everyone in the Blessington Town Team who have brought the project to this stage.

We are also supporting the roll-out of a new Safe Routes to School Initiative. This programme will seek to accelerate the delivery of improved walking and cycling infrastructure to schools; enhance sustainable access onto school grounds; and expand the amount of cycle parking available at schools. Underpinning this new initiative, we will see almost €1 million per day spent on our walking and cycling infrastructure in the year 2021. 2021 is only the start, we will continue to build on this level of investment over the coming years."

Minister Simon Harris TD has welcomed the news that

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly has said the €6.4-million funding for the Blessington Loop will transform the region.

"I have been a huge supporter of this scheme so am absolutely thrilled to see the funding come through this year," said Minister Donnelly. I would also like to congratulate the Blessington Town Team for the immense work they have done over the past decade to get this project across the line.

"It's also worth mentioning the support the ESB who are the landowners have given to this project. When it is completed it will be a massive tourist attraction which will give the local economy a massive boost. It's estimated it could attract as many as half a million people to the area each year. And the fantastic thing about the Loop is that it will be completely accessible.

"I am committed to the roll out of a county wide network of Greenways across Wicklow that will not only improve Wicklow's tourism offering in the years ahead but link our towns and villages providing an alternative safe route for cyclist and pedestrian local traffic.

"I am to meet the Minister for Transport to discuss how the government's expanded budget for cycling and walking can support Greenway initiatives being developed as rapidly as possible across county Wicklow".

"It's through schemes like these this Government is helping to transform the lives of people living not just in Wicklow but across the country".

Singers applying for a bursary were asked, in the first instance, to submit an online application, comprising a recent video recording of two arias and a CV showing relevant training or experience. ## Frailty First Response Team reduce hospital visits by 90%

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly has hailed the remarkable success of the Wicklow Frailty First Response Team in keeping patients out of hospital.

Since the scheme was introduced earlier this year with the aim of treating people in their homes it has far exceeded expectations.

The Wicklow Frailty First Response Team Project was initially established as a weekend Frailty First Response Team for low and moderate risk calls in Wicklow/South Dublin involving older people.

The project aims to shift care of older people with healthcare issues such as UTIs, falls and fractures from hospital environments to their own homes.

Initially, it was hoped that there would be a 50% reduction in the number of older people who had to

attend hospital following a 999 call.

However, the project has been a remarkable success, with over 90% of patients avoiding hospital visits and staying in the comfort of their own homes.

The project began as a weekend service in February 2020 but it expanded to a weekday service in April 2020 as a response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

To date they have carried out almost 1,200 patient visits.

It is funded through the Slaintecare Integration Fund, and is a joint initiative of St Vincent's Hospital (SVUH), St Columcille's Hospital, National Ambulance Service and General Practice.

Minister Donnelly said: "The success of the Team in reducing the numbers needing to be admitted to hospital has been absolutely phenomenal."

"One of the central focuses of our health strategy is to be able to treat more people in the community and to keep them out of the hospital system if at all possible."

"It was hoped the Team might be able to reduce admissions by as much as 50% but they have far exceeded that target."

"I would like to commend the whole team involved for showing just how well a system like this can work and proving without doubt it is going to play a key role in the future of our healthcare system."

# Sewage spilling into Arklow and Avoca a 'national disgrace'

Raw sewage is being released into the environment from Arklow, according to the EPA report on Urban Waste Water Treatment in 2019, released last week. The report highlights that delays in upgrading treatment systems around the country are prolonging risks to the environment and public health.

There is currently no treatment plant serving Arklow and it is one of the 19 towns and cities in Ireland that did not meet the European Union's legally binding standards for wastewater treatment in 2019. Arklow is one of 35 locations around Ireland identified in the report where raw sewage is being released into the environment for the future.

Green Party TD Steven Matthews has said that he is 'disappointed but not surprised' by the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) report.

Deputy Matthews said, "It is a national disgrace that raw sewage is being pumped into nearby watercourses across the country but hardly surprising given the chronic underinvestment in water infrastructure for decades.

"We are consistently failing to meet a commitment under the Water Framework Directive to achieve good status for our water bodies," he said.

"The main impacts on our water system are from diffuse agricultural runoff and point source wastewater treatment plants. It is well documented, it's well researched and there are many reports to support that. There are also issues with combined sewer overflows in the urban network, illegal tappings into urban surface water drainage networks.

It is expected that works will take at least three years to complete. Plans to construct the Avoca Wastewater Treatment Plant are also progressing. When these works are complete this will bring to an end the historic discharge of raw

sewage into the Avoca River.

Together, these modern wastewater treatment plants will be able to treat wastewater for 37,100 people allowing for economic and social growth in the area, as well as safeguarding our water for the future.

some of which dates back to Victorian installation. I have researched this area and have followed the Water Services Investment Programs from the 90s and 2000s and in my opinion, there has never been the attention and commitment from any government to provide adequate investment to maintain and improve the water network to the levels required.

"This Government needs to be the one that halts the decline and addresses the infrastructural deficit to provide clean, reliable and sufficient drinking water supplies.

"The EPA report also covers areas where there has been improvement and that is to be welcomed. In Wicklow we have recently carried out a major upgrade to the Victorian Varty water supply at Roundwood which is vital to Dublin and North Wicklow and I believe that the construction of the Arklow Waste Water treatment plant is soon to commence following the granting of the foreshore licence. When completed, untreated sewage will no longer be pumped into the water in Arklow. This will be less a cause for celebration and more the long overdue meeting of a very basic standard," Deputy Matthews concluded.

## Swimmer rescued off Greystones coast

A woman was rescued by helicopter last Wednesday afternoon after she went swimming in stormy conditions at Greystones South Beach.

Seventeen-year-old Colaiste Chraobh Abhann student Conor Power, a trained lifeguard, happened to be passing by and heroically dived into the water when he spotted the woman in distress in the sea, over 50 feet from shore.

Greystones Coast Guard Unit stated "A female swimmer was caught in strong currents, rough water and was unable to return ashore. A passing lifeguard tried to assist her but conditions at the time were dangerous. He managed to get a life ring to her, before having to return to shore."

"Our boat was crewed and ready

to launch but conditions were at our maximum allowed and therefore it was decided that Rescue 116 would attempt to rescue her first, while our boat crew were on standby.

"Rescue 116 successfully rescued the female and landed on Greystones South Beach where she was handed over to NAS Paramedics. Both the lifeguard and the casualty were brought to St. Vincent's Hospital for assessment.

"This swimmer owes their life to the quick reactions of the passing lifeguard and speedy response of Rescue 116. Remember, if you see anyone you think may be in trouble on the sea, our beaches, rivers, lakes, cliffs, headlands or inland waterways, dial 112 and ask for the Coast Guard."

# Department bow to demands for action on Greystones school

Wicklow TDs met last Friday with senior officials in the Department of Education to convey to them the concerns of the students, staff and parents of Greystones Community National School in relation to the delay in the school moving into its new purpose built facility in Charlesland.

Speaking after the meeting, Minister Simon Harris said, "I took the opportunity to convey to the Department my deep frustration and that of the community at the lack of communication surrounding the delays in moving the school into its new building and the need for urgent progress on the situation.

"I am pleased to report four things arising from the meeting: 1) The Department has now agreed to appoint a conciliator with immediate effect to seek to resolve outstanding issues and concerns between the Department and the company constructing the school. This is a welcome step forward. 2) The Department has now agreed to provide proper and monthly updates to the school patron, the principal and the parents and students and staff. This is key because the information vacuum has been really adding to anxiety and worry for all. 3) The Department has clearly said they will get the school moved into the new building this school year. I will be continuing to monitor this closely and am not in any way complacent in this regard. 4) The Department will meet again with the Wicklow TDs in advance of the Christmas school break."

At the meeting, Minister Harris also highlighted major concern regarding secondary school places in Greystones, Kilcoole and across County Wicklow. The Department officials undertook to revert back on this in the next few weeks.

Minister Harris said, "We need to see delivery from the Department on major secondary school projects including a number of promised extensions and new school building projects. I will keep constituents updated on this over the next few weeks. I have also stressed the importance of providing technical rooms for our new secondary school in Greystones."

Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore said she was disappointed with the overall lack of progress outlined during the meeting but welcomed the Department's commitment to open new lines of communication with stakeholders and TDs saying she hopes this will enable swift movement on addressing school issues facing Greystones District.

"I also welcome the Department's aim to open the new school building in Charlesland in September for pupils from Greystones Community National School, however I emphasised that there needs to be a contingency plan in place in the event this is not achieved. This means quickly progressing with additional accommodation at the Rugby Club.

"With regard to issues with Greystones Community College I stated that sustainable temporary accommodation is needed. I believe it is now key that the Department deals with the primary and secondary schools as separate issues, and ensure that separate and independent contingency plans are in place for both schools.

"Speaking on the issue regarding demand for school places, I outlined to the Department concerns from parents who did not secure a secondary school

place for their child during a meeting I held last night. Parents are rightly frustrated with the waiting list system which is not fit for purpose and causes unnecessary anxiety for the parents and child involved. I welcome the fact the Department stated it will immediately work with Principals in the area to look at duplication in waiting lists which will give a clearer picture of demand in the area and identify students who may be holding onto two or more places freeing up places for those currently on waiting lists.

"When I spoke to parents during a meeting I organised last night, it was clear that demand for school places is not just an issue for Greystones but also for Kilcoole, Newcastle, Newtownmountkennedy and Roundwood so I urged the Department to progress with acquiring the land zoned for educational purposes adjacent to the Coláiste Chraobh Abhann school so that temporary accommodation can be put in place to address to meet demand in this area as well.

"The Department also needs to be cognisant of children with additional needs. Many of them are being left behind and need to have security of where they are going to go. They need adequate time to prepare and settle into a school community before the new school year begins however, the current level of uncertainty is proving very difficult for these children and families and they need to be assured there is a school that can meet their needs. I welcome the fact that increased communication

will be carried out and will continue to correspond with the Department and the Minister on school issues in the area" concluded Whitmore.

Green Party TD Steven Matthews said "I've been in constant contact with the Department of Education since I was made aware of the school building problem. It's positive that they have entered a dispute resolution process and have stated their determination to have the building open within the school year. The lack of information has been hugely frustrating and unfair on parents, students and schools staff. The department's commitment to monthly meetings and engagement to provide progress reports is helpful but what we really want is a timely resolution to the construction issue and the school finished and opened for GCC and GCNS students."

"It's absolutely vital that better lines of communication are put in place so the teachers, parents and pupils have some clarity about when this issue is going to be resolved.

"It's extremely welcome to hear the Department say they are hoping to get this issue resolved within this school year. Obviously, the sooner this issue is dealt with the better because it is incredibly unfair on everyone involved.

"I will be maintaining close contacts with the officials in the Department to make sure the issue continues to be progressed as quickly as possible."

urgently; I am prepared to work with them and help in any way that I can. COVID is making all of this more difficult and more urgent. There must be some senior person in the department of education that can be invited to come to the Kilcoole/Greystones area and agree a solution to these urgent situations. I would welcome contact from our TDs to endeavour to get a resolution."

Deputy Brady said "Schools in all corners of the county are awaiting extensions or approval to move to construction stage, with kids being taught in pre-fabs, or simply not able to get a school place. One school I'm currently working with is teaching students in prefabs that are over 30 years old while they continue to get approval for a school extension."

Speaking about the school crisis in Greystones and Kilcoole, Independent Councillor Tom Fortune said "It was meant to be sorted last February. Nothing has happened. We are now nearly a year on and the situation is far worse. Our TDs promised it would be sorted. The issue rests with the Department of Education and they are feeding us Gobbledygook. Press releases are great but are not solving the problem. We immediately need our TDs to collectively work on this."

"The situation in Greystones is crazy. The situation in Kilcoole is crazy. The school (Colaiste Chraobh Abhann) is built to cater for 550 students. It now has 800, it is bursting at the seams. They must also CPO the necessary land in Charlesland for the construction of the Greystones Community College and address

the long-term needs for North Wicklow Educate Together.

"The government has completely failed to cater for the educational needs of the people of Wicklow. We have two senior government Ministers from Greystones and yet they can't resolve the issue facing Greystones Community National School who have been unable to access their completed new school in Charlesland."

"I'm working with many parents, pupils and schools across Wicklow and trying to ensure that education can be provided in appropriate and fit for purpose schools and that every year there isn't a scramble for limited school places. They are at their wits end and are genuinely concerned about where their children will get their education."

Deputy Brady concluded "We need a comprehensive plan to address the crisis in our education system that exists across Wicklow. I will continue to engage with the Minister, her Department and all stakeholders to ensure that our kids get the education they deserve in schools that are fit for purpose. # Council's Joint Policing Committee receives presentation from Garda Commissioner Harris

The Wicklow County Council Joint Policing Committee welcomed Garda Commissioner Drew Harris to a special online meeting of the committee on Wednesday last. Committee Members were updated by the Commissioner in relation to the new Garda Operating Model and how it impacts on policing in County Wicklow.

The Operating Model is part of the transformation programme 'A Policing Service For Our Future' and was developed based on internal and external input to An Garda Siochana. Its goal is to Keep People Safe by: Enhancing community policing with an emphasis on protecting the vulnerable; Adapting more readily to changing demand; Building a more effective and efficient service.

Cllr Gerry Walsh, Chair of the JPC, in welcoming Commissioner Drew Harris to the online meeting highlighted the work of the JPC and the Municipal District Policing Plan Committees. He referred to the

community benefits that will be experienced as a result of the introduction of the new Operating Model and stressed the importance of the new model representing a fully resourced service for County Wicklow.

Committee members took the opportunity to raise issues with regard to policing in County Wicklow around the importance of community policing, referencing the valuable work of the Community Gardai, as well as issues around communication, benefits of CCTV and text alert systems and issues around the use of unauthorised substances.

The Cathaoirleach of

Wicklow County Council, Cllr Pat Kennedy, welcomed Commissioner Harris and highlighted the challenges experienced by the rural community and the effects of crime in rural areas.

Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council, Mr Frank Curran, acknowledged the cooperation between An Garda Siochana, the Council and the community, particularly in dealing with the challenges COVID-19 has presented, and thanked the Gardai for their assistance, particularly their contribution to the work of the Community Forum and Community Call initiative.

Chief Superintendent Denis Ferry thanked the JPC for the views shared and expressed appreciation for the community support shown to An Garda Siochana which he described as invaluable in terms of local service delivery.

Concluding, Commissioner Harris said that as with all change initiatives, moving to the Operating Model will require time and patience and added that he would continue to keep the community updated as implementation progressed. He pledged that An Garda Siochana is committed to working in partnership with local JPCs to Keep People Safe.

## €260,000 Frozen in Irish Bank Accounts Following CAB Operation

**Irish bank accounts containing over €260,000 were frozen on Wednesday, 11th November, as a result of two ongoing investigations by the Criminal Assets Bureau (CAB).**

This is a follow-on from the CAB operation on the 29th October where searches were conducted in Dublin and Wicklow and cash to the value of €248,149 frozen in various bank accounts and Rolex watches and designer clothes were seized.

The first investigation follows contact made with the Bureau on the 10th November 2020 by a US Federal Agency investigating a company involved in the illegal manufacture of drugs contrary to US law. The US Federal Agency as part of its investigation had identified an Irish bank account which was being used to receive funds as part of this crime and for onward transmission to a bank account in another country. An investigation was commenced by

CAB in cooperation with the US agency and approximately €150,000 was subsequently frozen in an Irish bank account.

The investigation remains ongoing and is an example of CAB working with its international Law Enforcement partners to deny and deprive criminals of assets, wherever situated and derived, directly or indirectly, from criminal activity.

The second investigation is part of the Criminal Assets Bureau contribution to Operation Thor, targeting organised crime groups (OCG) involved in burglaries and thefts across the country.

CAB's investigations identified an additional bank account belonging to this particular OCG and as a result of their actions last Wednesday a further €110,00 has been frozen bringing the total frozen as part of this particular CAB investigation to €358,000.

Last week's operation is seen as another significant development in the investigation into the assets of this OCG.

Supporting children, from newborns up to 18-years of age, the vehicles and crew provide essential professional care in secure, comfortable, and entertaining transportation environments for patients travelling to hospital, hospices, treatment centres or respite centers.

Kilian McGreal, Managing Director of Novaerus At McGreals and McGreal's Pharmacy Group said: "BUMBLEance plays a crucial role in bringing children to their medical appointments, it is a fantastic service that we are proud to support. Providing a clean air solution that complements existing hygiene protocols will protect and reassure both staff and patients on board the vehicles. The Novaerus device helps to close the hygiene loop by eliminating all airborne viruses, bacteria and fungi including measles, MRSA and Tuberculosis, which is so important in settings

There are over 1500 in England and new legislation will make Changing Places Toilets mandatory in new public buildings from 2021. In Northern Ireland, there are approximately 40 and the NI Assembly is now following England and has committed to amending their building regulations.

Changing Places Ireland are calling on the Irish Government to follow the example of England and change Irish building regulations to make such toilets mandatory in public buildings. Without Changing Places Toilet Facilities available throughout the country people with disabilities are denied a basic human right and continue to be excluded from everyday life.

"The aim of the Changing Places Ireland campaign is to promote the inclusion of Changing Places Toilet facilities in public places nationwide. Thousands of people need Changing Places Toilet facilities to enable them to get out and about and enjoy the day-to-day activities that many of us take for granted. We are calling on the Government to change the building regulations and support the opening of more Changing Places in communities all across Ireland," commented Gillian Murphy, Enable Ireland Communications Manager and Changing Places Ireland representative.

While several types of Diabetes exist, the Lions Signature Project aims to specifically address the risk of Type 2 Diabetes. Eating healthily, increasing the level of physical activity and maintaining a healthy weight, all play a role in preventing or delaying

the onset of Type 2 Diabetes.

Bray Lions Club President Danny Bohan, highlighted the importance of this initiative. "Diabetes is the 8th leading cause of death in the world and it is estimated that worldwide more than 460 million people have Diabetes, and this number is growing," he said.

Diabetes Ireland and Diabetes UK (NI) estimates that there are 340,000 individuals with Diabetes in Ireland of which approximately 80% have Type 2 Diabetes.

District Diabetes Team chairperson Ann Ellis stated that it is impossible to predict the level of COVID-19 restrictions that will apply in early 2021 and "therefore our plans to roll out the project will need to be flexible".

Bray Lions club are confident that the project can create awareness of Type 2 Diabetes and greatly reduce the impact of the condition on individual health and that of our children and grandchildren.

## Enduring Power of Attorney

**Many people are alarmed to be told that just because you are the 'Next of Kin' that you do not have the authority to make decisions for your loved one if they become mentally incapacitated due to injury or accident.**

The medical profession will require that an Enduring Power of Attorney be in existence, as indeed will other professions such as accountants and banks.

Safeguarding Ireland says more people 'Thinking Ahead' would help to reduce and prevent abuse of vulnerable adults.

An Enduring Power of Attorney is a legal document which allows an individual to choose to appoint a specific individual (usually a close family member) to look after both your person and financial affairs in the event that for any reason you lose your mental capacity in the future.

An enduring power of attorney can be an extremely powerful document that significantly bypasses the hurdles and problems your family could face when trying to deal with your affairs should you become incapable. The main purpose of an enduring power of attorney is to enable somebody of your choosing to have the entitlement to manage your financial and personal affairs for you if you lose your mental capacity at some future date.

The execution of an enduring power of attorney is an excellent way of planning for the future and provides a mechanism for the management of the donor's affairs in the event that the donor becomes incapable of doing so themselves in the future.

Unlike a general power of attorney which has immediate effect once executed, an enduring power of attorney will only come into effect at a

later date should the donor become incapable of managing their affairs. The enduring power of attorney will not come into force should you remain in control of your affairs.

As a donor of an enduring power of attorney, there are a number of safeguards designed to protect you.

When executing an enduring power of attorney, you can decide as to the scope of your affairs that you wish to have delegated to your attorneys. As donor, you can decide whether to grant authority for the control of your financial affairs, personal care, housing, medical affairs, etc.

Parents across Ireland were surveyed to take the temperature on the uptake of the free children's nasal flu vaccine, offered for the first time this year. The results showed that almost 8 in 10 parents reporting that their children have either already been vaccinated, or have an appointment to do so within the next two weeks. The nasal flu vaccine is not a new vaccine and has been offered to children in the UK since 2013. The children's nasal flu vaccine is free for all children aged between 2-12 years and is available from GPs and pharmacies nationwide. The vaccine is easily administered with a single spray in each nostril of a child's nose. Many parents of children already vaccinated say their child compared it to a tickle up their nose. Interestingly, over half, or 53% of parents surveyed were not aware of the increased chance of serious complications when it comes to children suffering from the flu virus. This additional knowledge served to give parents even greater peace of mind that their child was protected this winter. The HSE reports that over the last 10-years, over 5,000 children in Ireland were admitted to hospital as very unwell. The HSE and medical experts are keen to point out to parents that you can't get the flu from the flu vaccine. A small number of people might experience some mild side effects, including a runny nose, headache or temperature which can be treated with over the counter paracetamol medicine. The flu vaccine is the best protection against this virus in children and also reduces its spread to others in the community.

## ISPCC highlights need for updated Relationships and Sexuality Education

The ISPCC has highlighted the significance of the current review of the Relationships and Sexuality Education (RSE) programme, in welcoming the findings of new research published last week by the ESRI and HSE.

The organisation has inputted to the review of the RSE syllabus, which it views as vital to meeting the needs of children and young people in Ireland today and reflecting the changes which have taken place in Ireland since the current programme was published in 1999.

The research findings, including that almost half of all those surveyed age 17 have not discussed sex and relationships with their parents and that the delivery of relationships and sexuality education varies widely, reflect the experience of the ISPCC's Childline Listening Service.

ISPCC Chief Executive John Church said: "The ISPCC warmly welcomes this timely report published today, which emphasises how important it is that an updated RSE programme be delivered to children and young people in an age and developmentally-friendly manner through our schools from primary level."

"The findings of this research reflect what many children and young people who turn to the Childline Listening Service for support tell us. Of the approx. 800 online contacts, calls and texts the service receives every day, many

come from children and young people seeking support or information in relation to sex, sexuality and relationships.

"It is essential that children and young people receive education which is relatable for them and grounded in their lived experiences. A whole-school approach is needed to ensure this is effective. Relationships and Sexuality Education and Social, Personal and Health Education must incorporate the needs of all children and young people in Ireland today – including those who live with a disability, those who identify as LGBTQI+ and those whose gender is different to that which they were assigned at birth.

"Through our work, we know that many children and young people can search online for answers to questions which have not been covered through RSE in school. The results to these searches can be pornographic in nature and can lead to confusion and perceived unrealistic expectations of what constitutes a positive, healthy, sexual relationship. The ISPCC, therefore, supports the recommendation of the 2019 Joint Oireachtas Committee on Education and

Skills' report that the negative impact of pornography should be central to discussions on reforming SPHE and RSE.

"Irish society in recent decades has heard of too many instances where children who were sexually abused did not have the language to explain what was happening to them, or the understanding that what was happening to them was wrong. A truly innovative and dynamic new RSE programme will empower all children and young people, by making them familiar with the concept of sexuality and the distinction between healthy and unhealthy, or inappropriate, relationships. This could assist in the prevention of, or early intervention in, potential child sexual abuse cases happening in future." "The ISPCC looks forward to continuing to contribute our insight and experience from our work with children and young people to the development of the vital updated RSE programme."

# Bray student receives €20k Naughton Foundation scholarship award

Last week, Dr Martin Naughton and his wife Carmel announced the winners of the 2020 Naughton Foundation Scholarship Awards. County Wicklow student, Elena Ó Céidigh was awarded a scholarship worth €20,000.

Supporting academic and innovative excellence in Irish students, this Scholarship Award is an investment in the future of Ireland's reputation as a country with outstanding graduates. Former student of Coláiste Raithín in Bray, Elena Ó Céidigh has accepted a place at University College Dublin studying Engineering. Elena joins 35 exceptional Irish students who were awarded third level scholarships towards their studies in the areas of engineering, science, technology and maths.

Since its establishment in 2008 scholarships worth over €4million have been awarded to over 300 students. The scheme started in three counties and has continued to expand annually to become a nationwide scheme in 2016. There is one guaranteed Scholarship (€20,000) for each participating county, with some counties awarded more than one Scholarship. Each Scholarship is worth €5,000 per annum for each year of a student's three or four year undergraduate degree.

Traditionally the awards are presented by founding patrons of The Naughton Foundation, Dr Martin Naughton and his wife Carmel at a ceremony with the students' schools and families in attendance but as a result of current restrictions this event was deferred for this year.

More than 200 schools have also benefited from this prize to date with some schools receiving it on more than one occasion. Elena's former secondary school Coláiste Raithí received a prize of €1,000 towards their school's science facilities, for their support of these students. Last year's recipient of the Naughton Foundation Scholarship Award in Wicklow was Ciara Fagan from Dominican College and Jack Lawlor from Presentation College, Bray.

After the difficult academic year that 2020 was, we are particularly delighted to announce this year's scholarship winners and their schools. We are both really looking forward to celebrating with them in person next year and welcoming them to our community of over 300 Scholars and Alumni."

The Naughton Foundation is also continuing its support of ESB Science Blast, a program run by the RDS which brings primary school classes from all over Ireland together in Dublin, Limerick and Belfast to display and discuss their science projects.

## Wicklow schools to receive over €1.65 million in minor works grants

**Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly has welcomed the news that Wicklow's primary and post-primary schools are set to receive €1.65million.**

However, the final figure could be closer to €2 million when payments to schools with pupils with special needs are made.

The money is being made available as part of a €55million programme of grants- €25 million in funding for post-primary schools and the standard €30m minor works grants for primary schools.

The minor works grant funding is aimed at giving schools the funds they need to put more sustainable longer term Covid prevention measures in place as well.

For example, schools may use this funding to enhance ventilation, purchase furniture or adapt toilet areas.

It means Wicklow's 85 national schools and 23 secondary schools in the public system are in line to receive over €1.65million.

But schools with students with

special needs are being granted additional payments for each of those students which will almost certainly massively increase the amount being paid out to schools in Wicklow.

The minor works grant funding is aimed at giving schools the funds they need to put more sustainable longer term Covid prevention measures in place as well.

These grants will be paid automatically to schools in the free scheme while granted on applica-

tion to fee-paying schools.

Minister Donnelly said: "Schools across Wicklow have done immense work in making themselves compliant with the new Covid restrictions.

"Getting our schools back open and remaining open has been a key priority for this Government.

"It has only been made possible thanks to the tireless work put in by staff to make their classrooms safe.

"The payment of the Minor Works Grants is another way our schools are being supported during what is an unprecedented year.

"It's vital for the welfare of our children that they are able to continue their education in the safest environment possible," concluded Minister Donnelly.



## Trauma: An exhibition by Carol Jordan

An expressive artist, Carol Jordan works across numerous disciplines including ceramics, weaving, sculpture, painting, printmaking with photography often being a prominent part of her installations.



Her exhibition 'Trauma' can be seen in the Signa Arts Centre in Bray from Monday 18th to Sunday 31st January.

A searing poet and a storyteller, Jordan is no stranger to performing in Bray and includes projections of her artworks as companion pieces to her poems.

Equipped with a background in psychology, Jordan is drawn to exploring and expressing difficult emotional states and does not shy away from themes such as anxiety, dementia and death.

Arising from her political activism, Jordan's art has a socio-political dimension - as in her Tuam babies installation, a savage yet poignant indictment of the Mother and Baby Home.

This exhibition addresses the experience of cancer and its devastating impact on the emotions. Arising from the breast-cancer journey of Carol Jordan's close friend and artist, Trish Cavanagh, the stark black and white photographs are co-creations and testify to her courage and artistry in embodying her emotions for the camera.

Jordan likes to work ritually, choosing hairs, shorn at the onset of chemotherapy to over-sew her image of Trish's mastectomy scar. The more recent large-scale sculptural works address states of associated anxiety, terror and dark-night-of-the-soul in an immersive way.

This is a highly charged exhibition and aims to evoke a strong emotional response.


Shortly after settling into their new home, an unusual structure in the distance dominates the family's intrigue.



# Lockdown and restrictions increases environmental awareness

The Pure Mile, an environmental initiative which aims to create a greater awareness of the countryside of the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands, has seen an increase in recent months of people getting outside and improving and enhancing their local areas.

The Pure Mile is an environmental, community, heritage initiative, established by the Pure Project, which encourages communities and groups living in rural areas of Wicklow, South Dublin and Dun-Laoghaire, to adopt a mile of road, or miles of road, in their local area, or in the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands and organise litter picks, clean-ups, anti-dumping campaigns, research information about their local wildflowers, plants, trees, animals, and the built, cultural, and social heritage of an area.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions the annual Pure Mile Gala Evening, which would usually attract hundreds of Pure Mile Volunteers, was cancelled this year. However, Pure consider it important to celebrate the hard work and achievements of the Pure Mile Volunteers in Cleaning Up The Wicklow/Dublin Uplands.

2020 was the eleventh year of the Pure Mile, with the largest number of groups and volunteers

involved in the project since it was established in 2009. In the first year the Pure Mile had 6 miles of road, and over the years the project has grown extensively to over 100 communities, groups, scouts, beavers, primary schools, secondary schools, walking groups, cycling groups, running groups, businesses and organisations, who collectively improved and enhanced over 650 miles of road, mountains, woodlands, valleys, forestris, upland amenities, car parks, and beaches, with the removal of

Pure Mile Calendar, which will also be launched this month. Minister for Environment, Climate and Communications, Eamon Ryan T.D., commented on the success of Pure Mile 2020, 'Now more than ever we need to protect our environment, illegal dumping has no place in our society, I welcome the success that Pure has had in reducing illegal dumping in the South Dublin and Wicklow uplands.'

The Pure Mile is an environmental initiative which aims to foster an appreciation and awareness of the country landscapes and scenic road networks in the uplands. More than that, it is a chance for communities to come together to make a measurable difference by improving the environment we share and live in. Twenty of the Pure Mile groups will receive Certificates of Recognition for their efforts and a cash prizes of €250, with a total of €5,000 distributed to groups which will further assist them in their local projects to improve and enhance the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands.

Pure was launched in 2006 and since that date it has proven extremely successful, in both reducing illegal dumping, and engaging with all demographics in society. It's the first project of its kind in Ireland involving a multi stakeholder approach collaborating with, the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications, Wicklow County Council, South Dublin County Council, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council, Coillte, National Parks & Wildlife Service, and the Wicklow Uplands Council.

# A daily fitness plan for lockdown

Joe McDonald from PureFitness Arklow has mapped out a daily fitness routine for those staying at home during lockdown. Joe presents these workouts live on video, from the Pure Fitness Arklow Facebook page, Monday to Friday, at 10am. Each workout lasts 20-30 mins.

**Day 1:** Burpees: 20 seconds on 10 seconds off 8 rounds; Mount climbers 20 seconds on 10 seconds off 8 rounds; Squat jumps 20 seconds on 10 seconds off 8 rounds; Jumping jacks 20 seconds on 10 seconds off 8 rounds.

**Day 2:** Push ups 20 reps; Plank hold for 40 seconds; Reverse crunch 20 reps; Wall squat 40 seconds hold. Repeat 6 times

**Day 3:** The Ladders - 1 Squat jump 1 Burpee; 2 Squat jumps 2 Burpees; 3 Squat jumps 3 Burpees; 4 Squat jumps 4 Burpees; 5 Squat jumps 5 Burpees; 6 Squat jumps 6 Burpees; 7 Squat jumps 7 Burpees.

**Day 4:** Core - Side plank on the left side hold for 30 seconds; Side plank on the right side hold for 30 seconds; Sit ups 30 reps; Back extensions 30 reps. Repeat 6 times.

**Day 5:** Solid Legs - Squat 1 and a half 20 reps; Split Squats 10 reps each leg; Lunges 10 reps each leg; Pulse squats 50 reps. Repeat 7 times
