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New Jigsaw site in Wicklow has opened its doors

A new Jigsaw service in Wicklow is now in operation, providing supports for young people age 12 to 25 with mild to moderate mental health difficulties.

It delivered a number of appointments to young people last week and will be escalating its level of service from early January 2021.

Minister of State for Mental Health and Older People, Mary Butler, TD commented,

"the Wicklow Jigsaw service, that was approved as part of new development funding in Budget 2019, will be a key component in ensuring that young people get early access to youth focused mental health supports in their own local community. To date, Jigsaw services across the country have been of significant importance in enhancing early

intervention to mental health supports, building up community services and ensuring that young people get access to supports at the lowest possible level, potentially reducing demand on specialist mental health services such as CAMHS".

This approach is very much in line with Ireland's new mental health policy Sharing the Vision, which promotes the continued development of a broad continuum of mental health supports from mental health promotion to acute and specialist mental health services.

The Minister added, "a Jigsaw service is also due

to open in Tipperary in the coming weeks, as arrangements to open the new site are significantly progressed. A lease for permanent premises for the new service has been signed and this will now pave the way for minor adaptations on the building to commence after the Christmas period.

Recruitment measures, including interviews for new staff, are on-going throughout this week and it is expected that the new service will open at the beginning of next year.

"The opening of the two new sites will expand on the existing 12 Jigsaw services operating across the country, therefore

enhancing youth mental health supports at community level. Enhanced access to direct and appropriate mental health services for young people, has become increasingly important in the context of COVID-19 and the additional challenges and experiences, including stress, anxiety and fear facing our young people".

Jigsaw, which works closely with the HSE, has been very pro-active in developing new service responses in light of the pandemic, particularly around a more blended service delivery model using digital technologies.

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Planning permission granted for major new film studio

State-of-the-art facility in Greystones to create up to 1,200 jobs

Greystones Media Campus Limited has received planning permission from Wicklow County Council for a new state-of-the-art film/TV studio and media campus on an 18-hectare IDA Ireland site at Killincarrig in Greystones. The new facility will provide an unrivalled boost to the growth of Ireland's film and television industry and local economy, and also create up to 1,200 jobs in the region.

The proposed facility will seek to build upon, and contribute to, the existing Dublin-Wicklow film and screen cluster, the leading economic cluster of its type in the country. It will also consolidate Wicklow's position as the traditional heart of television and film production in Ireland.

The successful planning application proposes 14 studios, offices and ancillary production buildings in a landscaped setting - more than doubling the available stage capacity

available to film, TV and media crews in Ireland. The development has already drawn international attention from several media enterprises.

A number of conditions were attached to the decision to grant planning permission, relating to environmental, landscaping and traffic and pedestrian safety considerations during development. Greystones Media Campus has committed to meeting them in full and working alongside the local com-

munity to ensure the project is a success.

Under the Greystones-Delgany and Kilcoole Local Area Plan 2013-2019, the Killincarrig site had previously been prioritised for "the development of high-density people-based employment". The proposed Greystones Media Campus will address this priority by contributing to the economic development of Co. Wicklow through the delivery of high-quality new job opportunities.

Addressing this

The audio-visual sector is currently worth over €1 billion to the Irish economy, with 12,000 people employed in film, television and animation production. However, as outlined in the Olsberg report (2017)**, Ireland currently suffers from a shortage of high-quality studio space for its television, film and media industry and the report highlights a requirement to make the sector more competitive internationally.

report, the subsequent Audiovisual Action Plan (2018) aims to make Ireland "a global hub for the production of film, TV drama and animation" and double employment and turnover in the industry

over the next five years.

The government's Mid-East Regional Enterprise Plan to 2020 also noted that Wicklow and the east coast possess an established screen creation sector with a long tradition of content creation for the film and television industry, a large number of skilled crew and talent living in the area, and an attractive connected location.

Speaking following the decision to grant planning permission, a spokesperson for GMC said "We're delighted with the decision from Wicklow County Council to approve planning permission for what

will be an exciting development for the Greystones area and the Irish film and TV sector as a whole.

"The Greystones Media Campus has the potential to be an exciting new chapter in the story of the Irish film industry and will lead to a wealth of new opportunities in the sector and across the entire county.

"With increasing global demand for content from the likes of Netflix, Amazon and Disney, this development presents a wonderful opportunity for Ireland to continue to make its mark on the global stage."

Minister Stephen Donnelly said "I'm abso-

lutely delighted to see the Greystones Media Campus getting their planning permission. The development is a massive boost not just for Greystones but for the whole of North Wicklow. For a number of years I've been in talks with the IDA about bringing jobs to the county.

"Wicklow has suffered from not having enough local employment which is one of the key reasons behind the traffic gridlock on the N11/M11. Creating more jobs in Greystones and in the county is not only good for the local economy, the environment but also peoples' quality of life."

Long Service award for Wicklow RNLI Volunteer

RNLI Lifeboat volunteer Carol Flahive has received a long service badge in recognition of 20 years' dedicated service to the community.

Carol joined Wicklow lifeboat in November 2000 and over the years has been in charge as the Helm on the Inshore lifeboat and crew on the all-weather lifeboat Annie Blaker.

In recent times Carol qualified as a Navigator on the all-weather lifeboat and looks after crew training as Local Training Coordinator at the Station.

Carol has built up a wealth of experience and knowledge during exercises with Wicklow lifeboat, which she has passed on to the new generation of crew.

Carol has been on numerous launches on service and exercise over the last 20 years. Two "Shouts" in particular stand out, from July 2014 where multiple casualties were rescued after being cut off by the tide at Silver Strand Beach and in July 2016 when the crew assisted a solo French yachtsman south of Wicklow Head in bad weather. The Coxswain and crew were later commended for their actions during the callouts.

Carol was awarded her long service medal during an outdoor Covid-19 compliant ceremony on Saturday afternoon by Lifeboat Operations Manager, Mary Aldridge who said: "It gives me great pleasure to present this award to Carol after 20 years voluntary service to the maritime community in Wicklow. It's such a pity that all the crew members cannot be present to honour Carol, but such are the times and challenges that Covid presents. It is fantastic to see Carols family here. It is the family and partners that also give a big commitment to the RNLI when the pagers go off and they are at home worrying about their loved ones. I want to take this opportunity to thank the families and partners of all our volunteers at Wicklow Lifeboat Station, and on behalf of all the Crew congratulate Carol for her dedicated service."

"The community call helpline was established with trained staff on hand, along with community and voluntary groups, to co-ordinate assistance to elderly and vulnerable persons throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. Much needed COVID-19 business supports were rolled out by the Local Enterprise Office and the Finance Department by way of rates waivers, the business restart grants scheme, business continuity and trading online vouchers.

Throughout 2020 we made significant progress on the delivery of social housing. Indeed, over the course of the next two years, we will deliver newly constructed homes for more than 400 families on the Council's social housing list.

The newly established supported homeless facility opened its doors in Bray in October and the family services hub facility in Wicklow Town is nearing completion.

ation Enterprise Hub at Wicklow County Campus will commence construction in the new year. We look forward to major tourism initiatives such as the development of the Avonmore Footbridge and the Blessington Greenway."

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly said "There's no doubt it's been a tough year but we are definitely facing into a much brighter 2021. Despite the extraordinary stresses of life under Lockdown we have still seen real progress in Co. Wicklow.

The Blessington Greenway is fully funded and the West Wicklow pool is going to happen. In Arklow work on the long-awaited water treatment plant is now finally ready to start paving the way for the town to really prosper. Nearby there are incredibly exciting things happening in Wicklow town from the new library opening to the push for the Greystones to Wicklow Greenway. 2021 will see some really ambitious plans being rolled out for the town.

Greystones is welcoming a new film, studio and media campus which will bring jobs to the town and help to reduce commuter traffic. By next summer we will know the final plans for the N11/M11 and should see the first bus lanes being put in place.

Across the county there's a real need for school improvements and greater school places, an issue I will continue to work hard on. But I'm certain next year Wicklow will bounce back stronger than ever from what has been a year to forget."

Green Party TD Steven Matthews said "For 2021 and in a post Covid era I'm wishing for the strongest Climate Action Bill to be passed this year to provide a future for our children. A future with an environment

where we can provide proper health services, energy efficient housing, good public transport, reliable renewable energy systems and support for farmers and food producers. That Green future would provide thousands of well paid decent jobs and a thriving economy. Also on a national level I'm working to change the building regulations to provide Changing Places facilities for disabled users. Locally I'm working on providing better rural public transport and more train services on the rail line, to continue the provision of cost rental public and social housing in places where it's needed most. And ensuring that those locations have the necessary services and enough school places through proper land use and transport planning."

Sinn Féin TD John Brady said that his 2021 wish list is for a new normality: "The last year has been a very difficult and challenging year for so

many people, families and businesses across Wicklow due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Sadly, many families in Wicklow have lost loved ones, seen family members hospitalised or have had to fight the pandemic themselves. I know how difficult this is as like many other families we had firsthand experience of dealing with Covid.

"Many have lost a lot during 2020, some have lost everything, so 2021 is going to be hard for them and their loved ones. It's essential that all the supports needed are there for them and for anyone that may need them in 2021, this must include business and social protection support. I also think that Covid has had a big impact on many people's mental health, thankfully 2021 will see the opening of two new services in the county, the Jigsaw Youth Mental Health Service and Talk to Tom in Arklow. We however need to see more services right across the country including our delivery people, our supermarket workers, our local shops. And 2020 really showed us what we can all achieve when we work together, as a community, for each other.

"In 2021 like many people I want us to return to some sort of normality, but there are still many challenges facing us. We still have a housing crisis and major issues remain in our health service and inequality throughout society. In 2021 we need to focus on a new normality where all these issues are comprehensively tackled. While 2020 was dominated by Covid we can't allow that to be the reason why important projects such as the upgrade of the N11, N81 or the swimming pool in West Wicklow shouldn't be progressed in 2021. Huge praise must be given to all our frontline workers during 2020, our nurses, doctors, retail workers and all our essential workers deserve more than praise though. I hope 2021 will see a proper wage for all our frontline workers as opposed to another round of applause."

New library for Rathdrum

Use of the library services in Rathdrum is expected to more than double when the new library is opened in the village next summer.

Construction is well underway on the library which is located in the Market Square development which also includes a Primary Health Care Centre.

The current Rathdrum library comprises less than 40 sq mtrs and is limited in its capacity to deliver services relevant to today's needs.

Nonetheless, despite its limitations, the current library is well used by the people of Rathdrum with 500-plus registered readers paying over 5,000

visits and borrowing over 10,000 items in 2019.

Increases of 150 per cent are anticipated when the new library opens in Summer 2021.

During a recent site visit, the Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Pat Kennedy, said: "I am delighted by this news. I am sure that a modern library will be welcomed and supported by all, including Librarian Margaret Byrne who has provided a great service from the current library in Gilbert Row for more than 20 years."

He added: "Its location in the new Market Square development will ensure Rathdrum library is at the

heart of the community it serves and will provide a steady footfall to other local businesses".

Director of services with the Council, Michael Nicholson, added that this latest development in the County's library service, along with the new library in Wicklow town, which is nearing completion, was further evidence of the Council's commitment to library services throughout the entire county.

Age friendly winter care packages being distributed

Special Age Friendly Winter Care packages are being distributed by Wicklow County Council to the most isolated and vulnerable in the county.

Each of the 500 packs contains a number of age friendly items such as an Eircode fridge magnet and an information guide to services for older people in Wicklow.

Under the "Keep Well" campaign, people are being encouraged to switch off and be creative and to this end, the packs include art supplies and a deck of playing cards.

People are being encouraged to keep active and the Road Safety Authority has provided Hi Visibility armbands for inclusion in the packs as well as an easy exercise booklet from the Wicklow Local Sports Partnership.

It is hoped that the Environmental Awareness Office Christmas recipe book in the pack will provide some novel ideas to using up any festive leftovers.

Illegal Waste Collection

Beware of unauthorised waste collectors operating in the County Wicklow area.

Only give your waste to Collectors who have a valid Waste Collection Permit. Always ask to see the Waste Collection Permit. Always note the Waste Collection Number on the Waste Collection Permit.

The Waste Collection Permit will display the Waste Collector's Name, Address and Waste Collection Permit Number. The vehicle should clearly show the Name of the Waste Collection Permit Holder and the Waste Collection Permit number.

It is a criminal offence to give waste to an unauthorised collector. Penalties upon conviction can be up to €5,000 and/or 12 months imprisonment.

Tiney Timmons, the girl who was lost in the woods for 4 days, turns 100

Last week Margaret Tiney Timmons of Clarabeg, Rathdrum, the girl who went missing in the woods for four days when she was just three years old, celebrated her 100th birthday.

In August 1924, Tiney Harvey as she was then called, went gathering fraughans (bilberries) with her brother and sister in the woods just a mere hundred yards from their home. According to newspaper reports at the time, her two older siblings helped her to fill her can and then sent her home, but Tiney took a wrong turn along the way and wandered off across the hills and fells and became lost.

When they discovered she was missing, her family conducted a search of the area, and when that failed, a more large-scale search was organised with the whole neighbourhood joining in.

According to an August 1924 article in The Herald, "All Wednesday night, all day Thursday, Thursday night, Friday and Saturday, were spent scouring wood and dale for the little wanderer."

Tiney travelled three miles from her home, scrambling through brambles and bushes, crying and scared by the dark, sleeping when she could.

Then on Saturday evening, carters passing along the road by the side of the Clara River, spotted a bundle on the other side. Two boys swam across the river then, and found that the bundle was little Tiney, asleep. They carried her back to the men who then brought her home to her parents who wept with joy.

Tiney was weak and emaciated after three days without food, and did not speak for some time, but eventually made a full recovery. She grew up to marry the late James Timmons and had four daughters and three sons of her own.

Applications lodged for telecommunications masts at Avoca, Laragh, Djouce

Signal Infrastructure Ltd has lodged three planning applications with Wicklow County Council for telecommunications mast structures in Avoca, and on Coillte lands in Laragh and Djouce Woods.

The structures, which would be 24-metres, 18-metres and 30-metres tall respectively, would be located in Kilqueeny, Avoca; Brockagh, Laragh; and Deerpark Townland, Djouce Woods.

Signal Infrastructure Ltd is a company of Cellnex, a European Telecommunications infrastructure provider.

The application for the Laragh site is to address a coverage blackspot in the area and also to meet service delivery in the future as customer requirements increase.

The Laragh site is on Coillte forestry lands on a hillside about 650 metres west of Laragh village. An architectural heritage impact assessment report was prepared by ACP (Architectural Conservation Professionals) consultants. It concludes that the proposed development would have no physical impact on the protected structures within the

vicinity of the proposed site.

In terms of the visual impact, the report notes that changes introduced to the landscape by the development would result in some adverse effects on the landscape character and visual amenity of the views, and that these would range from slight to significant.

To counteract these, the report outlines some mitigation measures such as coating the proposed tower and fencing green. It also suggests planting gorse or ferns around the site compound boundary to blend it in to the mountainside.

The Avoca site on agricultural lands at Kilqueeny has been selected to address deficiencies in 3G and 4G coverage in Avoca Village and surrounds, and improve broadband coverage. The current telecoms infrastructure is being hampered by surrounding trees and foliage.

The mast would be located in the corner of a field on an elevated position south west of the periphery of Avoca Town. A visual impact appraisal was undertaken at the site. It did an analysis from 15 different viewpoints and concluded that the upper section of the structure will be visible from some sensitive views along the R752 and from certain spots in Avoca town. However it says the impact of these views will range from slight to imperceptible. It also suggests that the mast and equipment be painted green. The analysis also concludes that the mast will be located adjacent to mature forestry and that this will also help to screen it.

The Djouce site is located on the northern side of Djouce Woods, about 1.5km north east of Powerscourt Waterfall and 3.7km south west of the village of Kilmacanogue.

The site was selected to improve broadband services in the area, particularly Powerscourt waterfall and Djouce Woods, Powerscourt

waterfall car park and all surrounding picnic areas and pedestrian walkways, part of the R760, the R755, and all surrounding regional roads Business and housing. The proposed structure will allow multiple network operators to deploy 2G voice, 3G and high speed 4G broadband services.

Regarding the visual impact, an analysis was carried out and the conclusion was that although the upper sextion of the structure will be visable from oth public and private viewpoints in the area, the backfrop of existing Coillte forestry will provide adequate screening.

The applications for both the Avoca and Larage developments were submitted on 30th November and public submissions are invited until 12th January, 2021. The Council is to make a decision on the applications by 2nd February, 2021. Regarding the Djouce application, the Council will make a decision on 20th Januae 2021, and the deadline for submissions was 21st December.

Pony rescued with horrific neck injury makes a full recovery

On 9th December, Pronias O'Briain with an address at Stringers Lane, Arklow, appeared before Arklow District Court accused of offences under the Animal Health and Welfare Act 2013 (AHWA).

The case stemmed from an incident in March 2019 when ISPCA Chief Inspector Conor Dowling responded to a report about an injured pony in Ferrybank, Arklow.

ISPCA Chief Inspector Dowling gave evidence to the court of visiting and seeing a number of ponies. He said that it was immediately obvious that one of them had an extensive injury to its neck but that it was impossible to give a precise cause of the injury.

Chief Inspector Dowling seized the injured pony and enlisted the support of the nearby Irish Horse Welfare Trust to remove it for urgent veterinary treatment.

Giving evidence in his defence, the accused said that "the land comprised of 40 acres, eight to ten acres of which was dry land and the remainder marshy ground which he asserted could not be fenced". He claimed to own only three ponies on the land, which were not found to be a concern, and denied owning the injured pony saying that it must have wandered onto his land. He told the court that "he was made aware that there was an injured animal on his land some days prior to its seizure but claimed to have been unable to locate it".

Under cross-examination by Rory Benville, State Solicitor, Mr O'Briain conceded that none of his equines were microchipped. He claimed to have seen the pony in question before it was injured and admitted that it may have been on his land for "a good few weeks". Mr Benville put it to the accused that his account was "simply not credible".

In ruling, Judge David Kennedy said that he had an issue with Mr O'Briain's credibility and that his account changed over the course of his evidence. Judge Kennedy convicted Mr O'Briain of one offence under section 11 of the Animal Health and Welfare Act 2013, with a section 12 offence taken into consideration. He imposed a three month custodial

Greystones boardwalk and coastal park opened

A new 16-acre coastal park together with an extensive boardwalk overlooking Greystones Marina was opened on Monday 14th December by Cllr Derek Mitchell, Cathaoirleach of Greystones Municipal District.

The boardwalk, which is over 300 metres long, links the coastal park to Greystones Harbour, with the two newly opened amenities forming an integral part of the Bray to Greystones Cliff Walk which runs from the Bray Promenade to the Harbour Square, Greystones.

Commenting on the project, Cllr Mitchell said: "I am delighted the entire harbour project is now virtually complete. It has transformed a derelict harbour into a community focal point for a large town with the boardwalk being a key visual feature forming a line with Trafalgar Road pointing towards Bray Head".

He went on: "The 300m development provides excellent promenades, substantial north and south breakwaters, a 200-berth marina, two public slipways, club facilities for sea scouts, rowers, divers, sailors and anglers, as well as 340 homes on what was a Brownfield site".

The Cathaoirleach concluded by saying he hoped the final small block of retail space and 33 apartments would be completed within two years.

Speaking at the opening, Mr Frank Curran, Chief Executive, Wicklow County Council, said: "Today's opening represents a significant milestone in the Public Private Partnership (PPP) between Wicklow County Council and SISPAR."

The project, he said, had revitalised and expanded Greystones Harbour and made it a central feature of the town, as well as providing an ultra-modern facility with the deepest marina on the east coast.

Mr Curran noted that "the last harbour constructed on an open coast in the country was Rosslare Harbour in 1906, which makes this a rare project and a complex one for the Council to have implemented".

Also present at the opening event were representatives from Glenveagh Properties PLC and Greystones sailor Pamela Lee who set the Round Ireland double-handed circumnavigation record from Greystones Harbour earlier this year.

'Serious lessons need to be learned from Greystones schools debacle'

Wicklow TDs met with the Department of Education's School Building Unit on 17th December to receive an update on resolving the accommodation needs for Greystones Community National School and Greystones Community College.

Following the meeting Minister Simon Harris said "The conciliation process between the builder and Department of Education about the new Community National School building is ongoing. While the process is subject to confidentiality the Department intends to have this completed by the end of the present school year.

"I wish to pay tribute to Principal Ruairí Farrell and all the team at Greystones Community College who have had to work in impossible circumstances over the past few months. Eire Óg GAA club has stepped forward to facilitate a solution for Greystones Community College that would decouple the school's accommodation needs from that of the Community National School and the Department of Education should proceed on that basis," Minister Harris concluded.

"Last week the Department of Education applied for planning permission for six additional classrooms on the Rugby Club site, primarily to be used as specialist rooms for the Community College. The Department has also commenced discussions with the Eire Óg GAA club with a view to utilising part of their grounds for further temporary classrooms for the Community College for September 2022 and also, if required, as a contingency option for September 2021.

"Unfortunately, again there is little progress on this deeply frustrating process which continues to drag on. The first meeting with the newly appointed conciliator took place and the contractor has until February to furnish a report on the school building, at that point the Department can make a submission. Little information has been given on the nature of the issues in the new school, however the officials have again reiterated that it is their hope that the National school will be able to move into their new school this school year.

"I am very much of the view that the accommodation needs of Greystones Community College need to be separated from that of the Community National School. That's why we have asked that plans for the new specialist rooms should be cited on Eire Óg's lands and that Community College's accommodation for autumn 2021 not be at the mercy of the ongoing conciliation process taking place regarding the

Community National School Building. "A planning application has also been lodged with Wicklow County Council for 6 additional prefabs for the temporary Rugby Club location. A number of these are for technical rooms for the Community College which is currently sharing the location with the National school. The Department estimates that this along with the tender process for the prefabs is a five-month process.

"The Department have stated that the hope is that GNS will be in their new school prior to September 2021, at that point the Community College will have use of all the space at the Rugby Club. If for some reason that doesn't happen, they have informed us that the contingency plan is to utilise lands at Eire Óg GAA club and that they have had discussions with the club.

"Unfortunately, there doesn't seem to be much progress on the site for the permanent school for the Community College. The Department have said that there is ongoing 'active engagement' with the owners of the land in Charlesland that has been identified for the school. They also said that the option of a compulsory purchase order remains and that it could be used if they felt progress hadn't been made on the acquisition of the land. Despite being asked how the progress was going they refused to say, stating that

Deputy Brady concluded "The situation with the schools in the Greystones/Kilcoole area is deeply frustrating, I've been working with many parents who are deeply worried about if and where their child might get a school place in September next. There has been a complete failure on the Departments behalf to plan for the expected growth in the area.

"Serious lessons need to be learned from this saga as similar pressures are building in other areas of the county. I will continue to work to have these issues resolved as soon as possible."

Mitchell stands by Three Trouts decision

Cathaoirleach of Greystones Municipal District, Cllr Derek Mitchell, has reiterated his support for the controversial decision to approve the development of 41 social houses on the 'Three Trouts' site. Greystones councillors voted 3 to 2 in favour of the development.

Cllr Mitchell (FG), Cllr Gerry Walsh (FF), and Cllr Jodie Neary (SD) voted for it while Cllr Tom Fortune (Ind) and Cllr Mags Crean (Ind) voted against it.

Cllr Mitchell said "I welcome the majority vote of Greystones Councillors by 3 to 2 to provide 41 Social Homes at the Council owned site. This was purchased probably a decade ago for housing and lots of money has been spent preparing detailed plans, studying flooding, how to reduce it and other issues.

"The Government has agreed to fund building and I hope they will be ready in two years. There are 394 people on the Greystones

housing list, many for a long time and I believe that we have a duty to provide houses.

"The bridge and houses will be above the 1 in 1000 year flood level. Attenuation tanks will be installed under the new area to slow down, below current undeveloped site, rate of water run off in the 1 in 1000 year storm. This reduces flood risk from present.

"There were some suggestions that traffic should go through Charlesland Court however that would mean driving past about 70 houses as against 20 with access through Burnaby Lawns. Also the Council does not own the Charlesland road. There were also

suggestions to combine the site with others but that would delay the homes by 3 years at least.

"After the vote Cllr Fortune stormed out of the meeting criticising both the Director of Housing and myself as Chair. I have complete confidence in the Director who works hard in a dedicated manner to try to solve the problems of people without housing, a difficult task. Councillors should be supporting his efforts. As Chair I applied the normal rule that councillors can only speak once and for 5 minutes on a topic but this time I had a stopwatch and recorded each speaker. This rule is to ensure that all six Cllrs can speak on a topic.

"Being involved in politics involves difficult choices but all of us have to learn to cope with being outvoted and the need to move on for the benefit of the area."

The team of sound technicians, stage and production managers, all with full COVID safety training, have been travelling travel with the vans, thereby providing welcome employment to events support industry.

A busy year for Wicklow PPN with 70 new member groups

Co Wicklow Public Participation Network (PPN) was delighted to welcome 70 new member groups of all different types from all around the county in 2020. The PPN supported groups are to be informed and have their voices heard through Wicklow PPN's 35 representatives who bring the community voice and experience to 18 different boards and committees.

The online 'Meet Your Councillor' events facilitated over 100 people to ask their local councillors about the things that matter to them. The PPN also ran consultations on various national plans and strategies and made submissions on a few.

Co Wicklow PPN worked closely with Wicklow County Council to support vulnerable communities during the pandemic. PPN members very quickly set up support services and activities that were entered on to a mapping system that was used to connect people to any help that they needed through the community call. The PPN also worked with the Irish Red Cross to distribute Nestlé Food hampers to groups that were providing food to the sick and elderly. Working with Wicklow County Council, the PPN was involved in an initiative to address the problems created by the lack of access to digital equipment and supports. The PPN continues to provide the latest pandemic support information from national and local government through all our media platforms.

Community groups were challenged in many ways during the pandemic. Understanding the new health guidelines and social distancing was at times confusing and groups' capacity to fundraise was severely impacted. Co Wicklow PPN provided training to support groups to adapt so they could safely provide limited services and activities and explore new ways of funding. The PPN recorded the issues and concerns of community groups and compiled them into reports that were sent to local and national government.

The pandemic has had a significant impact on people's mental health and wellbeing. Co Wicklow PPN worked with Avril Bailey of the Dublin Human Givens Centre this year to develop Super Charge Your Self Care, a set of six sessions ran with groups to help community activists to mind their mental and physical health.

Towards the end of the year these sessions were further developed into video resources and linked in to the government's Keep Well campaign. The PPN is currently providing groups with Good Governance Training using the Charities Regulator's Governance Code. The first of four modules took place at the end of November and the remaining modules will run in 2021.

Co Wicklow PPN highlighted the great work going on in the county to combat social exclusion using Social Inclusion Week in November to do so.

"We work collaboratively with the Wicklow County

Council Disability and Inclusion Group to work towards a more accessible county for people with disabilities."

The PPN continues to raise awareness of the importance of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Working with the Environment Office of Wicklow County Council, a mapping tool was developed in 2020 that allows community groups to link the things that they do to the SDGs clearly showing that even the smallest local actions can have an impact on achieving the SDG targets.

Co Wicklow PPN has also commissioned an animation to raise awareness of the goals, show how community actions help to achieve the targets and encourage groups to enter their actions on the WCC mapping tool. Their animation, training resources, Representative Reports, submissions, newsletters, work reports and much more is available on their website www.countywicklowppn.ie

Letter to the editor

Dear Editor,

When someone has a stroke, minutes matter and they cost real lives. A stroke kills two million brain cells every minute - and every 60 seconds saved between having a stroke to getting effective treatment saves one week of healthy life for a patient.

A new Act F.A.S.T. campaign (Face, Arms, Speech, Time), warns stroke patients how crucial early hospital treatment is to limit long-term damage.

An Ipsos MRBI survey, commissioned by the Irish Heart Foundation and the Government of Ireland shows that almost half of Irish people would not call an ambulance immediately if they suffered a stroke, wasting vital minutes that could save lives.

Stroke is one of the few conditions where your own actions and the speed of your response can determine your outcome. While treatments for stroke have improved dramatically over the past decade, they still rely on people getting to hospital as soon as possible after a stroke.

Stroke is unlike any other disease. It can hit anyone, of any age at any time. If it doesn't kill you it can rob you of the power of speech, leave you paralysed, forced to spend the rest of your life dependent on others. Survivors struggle to get their lives back on track post discharge and those who do return to work can experience a huge loss in income.

As a stroke survivor myself I urge you to print this letter to remind people in our community that stroke doesn't stop during a pandemic and it is as important than ever that if you or someone you know is having a stroke, that you call 112 or 999 immediately. By spreading the FAST message we can save lives.

Finally, I'd like to let other stroke survivors know they are not alone. They can find support and friendship from other stroke survivors through the Irish Heart Foundation's network of stroke support groups.

Report finds 2019 performance of Council was mixed

An independent oversight body has identified several areas of improvement and concern across Ireland's local government sector.

A report by the independent watchdog of local government has revealed the performance of Wicklow County Council in 2019 across eleven areas. The annual report, by the National Oversight and Audit Commission (NOAC), found the Council delivered mixed results in a range of areas including housing, the environment and financial management.

Some of the key findings in the report include:

Housing: Wicklow County Council owned 4,544 social housing dwellings at end of 2019 with 2.77% vacant. The average time for rehousing in vacant properties was 29 weeks.

Finance: The level of collection of commercial rates was 87% and the level of housing loans collection was 80%.

Environment: 10% of the Council's area is unpolluted or litter-free while energy savings made since 2009 is 16%.

Fire service: Attendance at the scene in

respect of fire within 10 minutes was 39%, and 49% within 20 minutes.

Public Libraries: There were an average of 4.06 visits per head of population and 428,186 items issued to library borrowers in 2019.

Commenting on the publication of the report, Chairman of NOAC, Michael McCarthy, said: "This report highlights some of the important work our local authorities carry out each year. We would encourage all local authorities and public representatives to review the report to learn ways they can continue to help local communities thrive. Local government plays an important role in people's lives and as we look beyond the pandemic, NOAC is looking forward to working with all stakeholders to build on this work."

Michael McCarthy concluded by thanking local authority staff, the LGMA, and all organisations who provided or reviewed data for NOAC's 2019 Annual Report.

The NOAC uses 39 indicators across eleven areas to measure local authority performance. The data is submitted by the local authorities and other State and regulatory bodies.

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
