The campaign to save Bray's swans continues to gain momentum as there are growing fears that the design of the proposed new bridge over the Dargle River in Bray will cause a 'bloodbath' as swans are injured or killed. Speaking last week, Pearse Stokes from We Help Wildlife, one of the groups in opposition to the design of the new sustainable transport bridge in Bray, painted a grisly picture, saying the new bridge "won't look so great if it's covered in blood".

The campaigners say that this would demonstrate that the Council was made aware at that time of the threat that cables posed to swans. Speaking on East

Coast FM last week, Pearse said "Swans regularly hit the power cables that go across the DART line and volunteers from Save Our Swans regularly go down to help get ghe swans off the tracks."

But Pearse claims that the Samuel Beckett Bridge in Dublin is the real 'acid test': "There are far fewer swans in that area of the Liffey than

they still regularly crash into the Samuel Beckett bridge and then fall onto the road and cause traffic chaos. Pearse claims that the volunteers objecting to this bridge in Bray "are going to be the same people who will be going down after the bridge is built to fix the problem, so it seems very unfair that the Council wouldn't listen clearly to what all of these groups

have to say and change the design of the bridge" The groups in opposition to the design of the sustainable transport bridge have called it a 'vanity project' and cannot understand why it can't be a less visually stylish design that's ultimately safer for the swans.

### N11 public consultation period extended by two weeks

Wicklow County Council has extended the public consultation period for the N11 upgrade scheme by two weeks. The extension will ensure that opportunity is afforded to all members of the public and interested parties to engage with the process and make submissions. The closing date for receipt of submissions is now 11pm on Monday, 4th October,

Minister Simon Harris TD announcement, saying "The Junction 4 to 14 upgrade is an enormous project and many people had contacted me regarding difficulties they had viewing documents and maps on the N11/M11 website.



A new pedestrian boardwalk is proposed along the southern bank wall to link the existing walkway to the bridge crossing.

### 'Government must resist lobbying for data centres'

The government must resist lobbying by tech giants for data centres and instead publish a strategic analysis of their impact on our climate target goals and energy security, according to Social Democrats Climate Spokesperson Jennifer Whitmore.

A new lobby group, Cloud Infrastructure Ireland (CII), which represents some of the biggest tech companies in the country, has demanded the government express its clear support for the continued expansion of data centres. This suggestion, that it can be business as usual for data centres - even as the government scrambles to publish the details of its Climate Action Plan - is as deluded as it is arrogant

"We know we are facing a crisis in our energy security and we know where most of the threat is coming from - the proliferation of data centres, which are putting immense pressure on our national grid. The energy regulator has already warned that we face rolling blackouts if immediate action is not taken to mitigate this risk. "CII need to answer a simple question: how many data centres are enough? As it

stands, the annual increase in energy demand, from data centres, in the last four years was equivalent to adding 140,000 households to the power system each year. This level of increased demand is simply not sustainable.

"We also need some clear information about the economic benefit of these data centres. At the end of July, I asked Tánaiste, and Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, Leo Varadkar to provide the number of short and long-term jobs created by data centres and was told his Department did not collect that data. The IDA does not maintain a register of data centres either. How can we assess the economic benefit of this surge of data centres in the absence of any information about the jobs they support? "We are facing into a twin crisis in terms of energy security and climate change in

which there is just one certainty. If data centres are allowed proliferate, in the way they have to date, our national grid will be unable to cope and we will spectacularly miss our legally-binding climate action targets.

"It is now time for the government to get real. Stop listening to lobbying from tech companies and impose a moratorium on the construction of new data centres until we have more information about the risks that they pose and the best way to mitigate those risks. We need a strategic analysis of the impact of data centres on our climate target goals and energy security."

By putting our money into local food systems instead, and by supporting local food growers, that's a powerful way of creating change. In a way, this is about relearning what our ancestors knew about the wisdom of the land. Irish people have always had a deep connection with the land and we are reconnecting with that."

"It is also about personal development. It helps them learn about themselves, about the land, and their connection with nature, it's important and incredibly rewarding work" says Karen. 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

The new library and County Archives are spread over six floors of what was previously a branch of Ulster Bank on Main Street.

It includes four floors of modern library facilities, including a children's library and a general reading area, adult borrowing area, study area and public access to technology and teenage library in addition to a dedicated community

Ii- In addition to the four standard library floors, there are two further floors at basement and lower basement level, dedicated to Wicklow's local history facility in a public build-ing in County Wicklow and possibly Ireland. Changing Places facilities are designed to enhance the health, safety, comfort and dignity of someone who may need extra support and additional equipment during personal care tasks. Changing Places promote dignity and are a key element of inclusion. The facility will make a big difference to so many people in Wicklow and beyond. 14% of the population

of Wicklow or 19,244 people have at least one disability, with many reporting more than one. Wicklow County Council carried out an extensive consultation process and held a public webinar explaining the role of the Changing Places Facilities. After that, extensive work and consultation was carried out by Wicklow county council with all stakeholders including people with disabilities, disability service providers, Wicklow Tourism and the Chamber of Commerce.

Changing Places Toilet Facilities are different from standard accessible toilets. They are a large facility that provide the right equipment like a hoist and an adult sized changing bench designed to support disabled people who need it.

Imagine not being able to find a toilet when you need to. Imagine having to look after the personal care of your son, daughter, or partner on the floor of a public toilet. Imagine the indignity, this is unhygienic, undignified, and unacceptable.

Standard accessible toilets meet the needs of some disabled people but not all. For example, people with serious impairments such as spinal injuries, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis or multiple learning disabilities require extra facilities that are not provided in standard toilets or accessible WCs. This purposebuilt toilet facility gives disabled people and assistants/family members more space and the right equipment to take care of personal hygiene, in safety and comfort.

### Calls for Blessington traffic and pedestrian safety audit

Minister Simon Harris has requested that Baltinglass Municipal District Council carry out an audit of pedestrian safety in Blessington.

Minister Harris said "I have raised an ever growing number of pedestrian safety issues in Blessington with Wicklow County Council.

"Blessington Main Street is an extremely busy thoroughfare and there was a serious incident recently which highlighted the need for an entire review of pedestrian facilities in Blessington"

Minister Harris continued: "I have also highlighted particular concerns at Burgage near the Texaco Garage where commuters from the 65 bus have to dodge traffic without any signalised pedestrian crossing in place

"The Budget for cycling and walking has been expanded by the government and I would support any application by Wicklow County Council for funding from the Department of Transport for Blessington to improve pedestrian safety."



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# **Old watermains in Greystones** being replaced

Irish Water, working in partnership with Wicklow County Council, is progressing with essential water mains replacement works in Greystones to improve the security of supply and reduce high levels of leakage in the area.

The works, which are scheduled to begin on Monday 20 September, will involve the replacement of almost 1km of old problematic cast iron water mains along Trafalgar Road, including Cliff Road, that were prone to leakage. The pipes will be replaced with new, high density polyethylene (plastic) pipes which will improve water quality and reduce high levels of leakage which was impacting the water supply to customers in this area.

The works will also involve laying new water service connections from the public water main in the road to customers' property boundaries and connecting it to the customer's water supply. Where the existing service connections on the public side are lead, these will be replaced as part of this improvement work

To facilitate the safe delivery of Regional Lead these works, there will be a requirement for intermittent road closures. Traffic management will be in place and diversions will be clearly signposted. Local and emergency traffic will be maintained at all times. Speaking about these works, Joe Carroll, Irish Water's Regional Lead, commented "These works are vital to ensure a more secure water supply to homes and businesses in Greystones and are part of a significant investment by Irish Water to safeguard the water supply. We understand this type of work can be inconvenient and we will ensure our work crews make every effort to minimise any disruption these works may cause." Irish Water said "Fixing leaks

can be complicated with over 63,000km of water pipe in Ireland. Most leaks aren't visible, resulting in precious water being lost but we are making progress. In 2018 the rate of leakage nationally was 46% by the end of 2020 it was reduced to 40% and we are currently on course to achieving a national leak age rate of 38% by the end of 2021.

"The national Leakage Reduction Programme which will see €500 million invested up to the end of 2021 helps to reduce the level of leakage across the country by fixing and replacing old water mains. This will ensure a safe, reliable water supply which is vital for our health, our environment and our growing population and economy.

# New pedestrian crossing confirmed at Greystones **Community National School**

Works will commence shortly to construct a new pedestrian crossing on the R744 road serving Greystones Community National School. There has been a consistent residential development in this area in recent years and with the much-awaited new Grevstones **Community National School now open there** is increased footfall in the area especially at school start and finishing time.

Upon receiving confirmation of the new pedestrian crossing, Green Party TD Steven Matthews said "I had been contacted by local residents earlier this year to enquire about traffic management and pedestrian safety maters when the school would open. The area has quite good pedestrian and cycling infrastructure but there was an obvious weak point around the lack of a safe crossing point on the R744 near the school.

"I checked back on the planning applications over the years and noted that a pedestrian crossing was a condition of a 2019 planning application for a residential development in the area. Subsequently, I liaised with Greystones Municipal District and contacted that developer to request that the work be carried out as soon as possible due to the urgency brought about by the school opening and the need to create a safe route to school. "I have received confirmation that the developer

will now proceed with the construction and a location has been agreed with the district office with a contrac tor is being appointed shortly.

"Road safety for cyclists and pedestrians and safe routes to school is a priority for me for all areas across Wicklow and I would encourage anyone with a concern or idea for how we can improve safety for our children cycling and walking to school to get in touch.

"The Green Party has secured unprecedented multi annual funding for cycling and walking infrastructure, matched with staff resources within our local authorities which will see huge improvements for vulnerable roads users over the coming years and I will continue my work to ensure Wicklow gets the safety improvements we need," concluded Deputy Matthews



A solar car port project installed at Wicklow County Council's headquarters in Wicklow Town will generate renewable energy and assist in achieving climate change targets.

company, commenced the installation of 300kWp of solar panel capacity for Wicklow County Council. This project is the largest solar car port project in Ireland covering 107 car park spaces and circa 1600m2 at County Buildings.

The Council has identified energy efficiency as a key goal in meeting the national targets and in reducing long-term costs.

The Council has signed up to the SEAI Partnership programme for public bodies. An Energy team is in place for the Council as it

In August, Enerpower, a Waterford-based continues with a programme of upgrading social housing with energy efficiency measures.

The Council provides services out of more than 35 buildings. These include the main County Building in Wicklow Town, area offices, Town Halls, libraries, heritage centres, swimming pools/leisure centres, fire stations, community centres and waste management sites.

The annual estimated energy consumption for Wicklow is 22 million kWh per annum of which approximately 10 million kwh's is 2021.

# **Dementia - Getting Plugged In**

September is World Alzheimer Month and the Wicklow Times, in partnership with the HSE's Dementia: Understand Together campaign, is featuring a series of articles on living with dementia. This week, we focus on how technology can help

When so many of our usual routines have changed due to COVID-19, thankfully, technology has offered us ways to stay in touch. Virtual and online communication methods have become the norm and will no doubt continue to play a role in our lives. For many people with dementia, technology has been a lifeline in maintaining a level of social connection so important for

health and well-being. To showcase the advances being made, and how they can help, the HSE has Memory Technology Resource Rooms (MTRRs) in almost every county to support people with memory difficulties. including people with dementia and their families. The MTRRs often have a homely feel and feature a wide variety of low- and high-tech equipment that can help overcome common problems encountered as a result of memory loss or cognitive impairment. These include orientation clocks with the day, date and time; easy-to-use technologies such as TV remote controls, one-button radios, and picture phones; and prompts and safety technologies such as medication reminders and

GPS devices.

Visitors to the MTRRs are able to see what pieces of equipment might best suit, how they work, as well as check out the benefits of smart technologies.



### **Smart Homes**

Thanks to smart homes and the arrival of voice-activated personal assistants, advances in technology are now increasingly evident in our living spaces. These can be a great support for people with dementia, for example, in playing a favourite song, asking the day or simply requesting the device to make or answer a call. They are also great for appointment reminders and medication prompts.

#### **Smartphones**

Smartphones too can be a great support. Unfortunately, as dementia progresses, they can become challenging. However, there are steps you can take to make things simpler:

• Increase the size of text and icons • Change the background to a strong contrasting colour to support visibil-

· Delete or conceal apps no longer in use

Smartphones also offer access to supportive apps for reminiscence, stimulation and brain challenges, e.g., Irish Film Institute (IFI) player or Luminosity. Of course, easy-touse phones can also be purchased as an alternative.






