



They also objected on the grounds of the potential health impact and the impact on birds and wildlife and 'inadequate justification' for the development.

ABP's Inspector's Report, recommedning refusal, noted that because of "the nature and scale of the proposed development prominently sited in a scenic elevated coastal setting and in an Area of Outstanding National Natural Beauty, it is considered that the proposed development by itself and cumulatively with the existing wind turbine on site would be a visually prominent and incongruous feature and would seriously injure the visual ameni-

ties and landscape character of the Southern Coastline." The report also said that "this level of intrusion in this location" is not sufficiently justified. "The proposed development would not be in accordance with the proper planning and sustainable development of the area," the report said.

However, going against its own Inspector's Report, ABP said it was satisfied that the proposed development would not seriously injure the visual amenities and landscape character of the coastline. The Board also stated that the proposed devlopment was located in a highly suitable and appropriate location for the purposs of providing 2G, 3G and 4G coveage in the area. Rotary makes history as Remembrance Tree moves to Fitzwilliam Square

First time in living memory to have Christmas Tree in the renovated square as Rotary raises funds for local charities

The Rotary Club of Wicklow has erected it annual Remembrance Tree for the 16th year to raise funds for local charities. This year the location of the tree has changed from the Church Street car park to the newly renovated Fitzwilliam Square. This is the first time anyone on Wicklow can remember a large scale – 25ft – Christmas tree in the centre of the town.

"It looks magnificent and "who coordinated the prois a credit to Rotary and our helpers who installed the tree." said Peter Byrne, President of Wicklow Rotary. "It was a team effort from start to finish involving Balyfree Garden Sheds, Wicklow Co. Council, Smiths Electric and own our members." The Remembrance Tree, which has raised over €125,000 for local charities since 2006, is a major event in the Rotary fund raising calendar. This year, the main beneficiary will be Wicklow Cancer Support group while Wicklow Dementia Support will also receive

funding. "These are voluntary organisations, set up and run locally by dedicated people to provide emotion-al and practical support," said Donal Magner, Rotary PRO. "In addition to a change of venue this year, we are returning to signing ribbons as this was popular during the early days of the Remembrance Tree." Rotary is encouraging the public to write their messages on these ribbons to remember departed loved ones and these will then be secured to the tree. Apart from raising funds the tree is now a popular meeting place leading up Christmas where Wicklow people and visitors to the town can



CAB seize drugs and guns from Wicklow premises

The Criminal Assets Bureau (CAB) with the assistance of the Garda Emergency Response Unit (ERU), the Garda Dog Unit and the Customs Revenue Dog Unit, seized drugs and guns during a search operation in County Wicklow on the morning of Tuesday 14th December.

A total of sixteen premises were searched, consisting Storage Devices of eight residential, two business and six professional premises. All searches were conducted under CAB the Misuse of Drugs Act 1977/84. This male was Warrants, Section 14 of the Criminal Assets Bureau Act detained at Wicklow Garda Station under the provisions 1996, as amended.

The following was seized during the course of the searches: Cocaine with an estimate value of \in 9,800; Cannabis Herb with an estimate value of \in 900; Lidocaine with an estimate value of \in 50: Steroids with an estimate value of €100; Two Airsoft Rifles; €9,100 in cash; Documentation in relation to Financial Accounts and Property Ownership; Mobile Phones; Electronic criminal activity.

Seven new housing posts approved for Wicklow County Council

The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD has approved seven new posts for Wicklow County Council's housing delivery team which will assist the local authority in delivering their social housing targets.

Housing for All, the Government's new housing Plan, commits to strengthening the capacity of Local Authorities to initiate, design, plan, develop and manage housing projects. The Plan acknowledges that this requires the resourcing of housing delivery teams and the posts being announced today include both technical and administrative positions.

Commenting Minister O'Brien said, "In September this year, the Government published our new housing strategy, 'Housing for All'. It is the most comprehensive housing plan in the history of the State backed by an unprecedented \notin 4bn per year. Under 'Housing for All', we will deliver nearly 90,000 new build social homes by 2030 and we have put a very clear focus on the delivery of new build projects. "My Department has been working with the Housing Delivery Coordination Office (HDCO) and the County

and City Management Association (CCMA) to identify capacity limitations and additional staffing resources required to deliver our objectives. With the approval of these new posts, we are ensuring that Wicklow County Council have the capacity to deliver the scale of social housing required," he concluded.



Times 'He was the most effective public representative in the history of Wicklow'

Last week saw the sad passing of a giant of Wicklow politics, Liam Kavanagh, at the age of 87. Liam Kavanagh was a towering figure in local politics and the Labour Party and he served his constituents at local, national and European level.

First running for the Dáil in the 1968 byelection after the death of his uncle, Labour TD Jim Everett, Liam polled a very strong 21.9% but was unsuccessful. He reclaimed the Labour seat in the 1969 general election and went on to hold it through a further eight general elections, until narrowly missing out in 1997.

Liam also served three times as an MEP, being appointed in 1973 and 1977, and winning election from Leinster in 1979, in what was a massive victory for the Party nationally when Labour won four seats.

Liam's Ministerial service began in 1981 when he was appointed Minister for Labour and the Public Service, and he took over as Minister for the Environment in 1983 remaining in that office until 1986. He also served as a member of the British-Irish Parliamentary Assembly, was Chair of the Semi-State Bodies Commission from 1995 to 1997, and was a member of the Standards in Public Office Commission after it was set up in 2001, showing the depth of his interests and deep commitment to public service.

Labour Party Leader Alan Kelly TD has extended his sympathy to the family, friends and supporters of Liam Kavanagh, saying "I was saddened to hear of the passing of our former TD and Minister Liam Kavanagh who was a giant of Wicklow politics over many decades. Liam made a huge contribution both locally and nationally during his time as a Councillor, TD, MEP and Minister, and was viewed as a quiet kingmaker within the Labour Parliamentary Party.

"One of Liam's great legacies is the thousands of council homes he built during his tenure as Minister for the Environment in the 1980's. In the worst of economic times, Liam ensured a comprehensive building programme was put in place and delivered on. His example is one that shows what the State can do when the political will is there to deliver public housing

"Throughout his career, Liam was dedicated to the values of the Labour Party, serving his community and the people he represented with determination, honesty, and integrity, and he continued the proud tradition of Labour in Wicklow. His son Conal followed in his stead, serving as a Councillor from 2004 until 2014. and we were all shocked when he died suddenly in 2017. His niece Breeda Bonner also served as a Councillor in Clondalkin from 2011 to 2019.

"On behalf of the Labour Party I want to extend our deepest sympathies to his wife Margaret, daughter Rosemary, grandchildren Áine and Rían, brother Jimmy and sister Therese, the extended Kavanagh family, friends, supporters and the community he served so diligently." Current Wicklow Labour councillor Paul

O'Brien said "It's with great sadness that I learned of the passing of Liam Kavanagh. Anyone that I ever spoke to about Liam around the County would always say the same thing, that he was a great TD, Minister and colleague, who did so much for so many. I think one of his greatest accomplishments as Minister for the Environment was when he eradicated the housing list because he built so many houses in the 1980s.

At the back of it all though Liam was a very quiet reserved decent man who was respected by all. He was a great mentor to have and someone that I've always looked up to and aspired to be like. My sincere condolences to his wife Margaret, his daughter Rosemary & all the Kavanagh family. May he rest in

Minister Simon Harris said "I want to express my deepest sympathies to the Kavanagh family on the sad passing of Liam Kavanagh - a giant in Wicklow politics. Liam epitomised public service & decency in public friend and foe alike. He never accepted low

life. His reputation as a hard working, tena cious dedicated and effective T.D for Wicklow is well known and much appreciated. I regularly meet constituents who talk with great fondness about Liam and how he helped them or a family member or a community group across our county

"At a national level, Liam also served our country with distinction as a Cabinet Minister across a number of Government Departments and, of course, also serving in the European Parliament. His time in the Department of the Environment will always be remembered for the huge investment in social housing.

"Wicklow has lost an iconic figure who served our county and country with distinc-tion. My family and I send ourselves thoughts and prayers to Liam's wife Margaret, his daughter Rosemary, his grandchildren, sib-lings and extended family. A life of service delivered with great integrity. Rest in peace, Liam.

Tommy Cullen, former Labour councillor and long-time friend and ally of Liam Kavanagh, said "Liam was the most effective public representative in the history of County Wicklow since the state was formed. During his time in office he commenced the building of the N11. He oversaw as Minister a massive infrastructure investment throughout the county from Blessington to Grevstones, from Wicklow to Bray and Arklow to West Wicklow. He secured funding for new water and sewage plants throughout the county and upgraded many more. County road funding to upgrade many county roads was secured.

He had built three and a half thousand council houses a year in county Wicklow alone and almost forty thousand houses per year nationally during his years as Minister. No politician before or since has even come close to Liam Kavanagh's record of achievement on housing despite him doing so in far more stringent economic times

"When Liam left office as Minister there was no family on the housing waiting lists in Wicklow, in fact the council had a surplus of housing. Kavanagh showed it could be done if there was the political will to do so. Sadly, that political will is no longer present in the current political landscape of Wicklow. "As Minister for Environment he reformed

the controversial arena of planning. He sacked the entire board of An Bord Pleanala. His pursuit of integrity in public administration was widely admired and his honesty admired by

"I will miss Liam's wisdom on issues, his dedication to integrity in public office and his unshakeable belief in the rights of justice and equality for all men and women and access to health and education as a human right for all. Liam was a gentleman, to me a dear friend whom I shall always remember with fondness.

Liz Mcmanus who served with Liam Kavanagh as a councillor and was subsequently a Labour TD and Minister said "Liam Kavanagh was a fine public representative Whether as Government Minister, MEP, TD and county councillor he always had the interests of working people at heart, particularly those of the people of County Wicklow. In particular his extraordinary record in providing social housing in county will be remembered.

"It was a pleasure to work alongside him as colleague and a friend. He was a man of intelligence, great warmth and a mischievous sense of humour. Margaret, his beloved wife, made her contribution to county Wicklow too, quietly and often out of the spotlight. I want to extend my deepest sympathy to her and to their daughter Rosemary at this sad time. Liam will be remembered by many people with affection and with pride to have known him.

With my proposal for the DART extension to Wicklow Town now included in the NTA transport strategy it makes sense to deploy battery electric trains to the Wicklow route in advance of the constructing the overhead wires.

Times STAY SAFE THIS CHRISTMAS From the Irish Cancer Society to the Gardai, everyone is getting out the message to 'Stay Safe'

as we enter into the second Christmas of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Be Covid safe

The Irish Cancer Society is urging people to take the simple steps that can keep vulnerable cancer patients safe this Christmas amid concerns over the Omicron variant.

Commenting on the upcoming fes-tive period, Dr Robert O'Connor, Director of Research, Irish Cancer Society said: "We are hearing the distress from cancer patients who want to have a meaningful Christmas after almost two incredibly difficult years but are worried about the risks as families gather, and understandably so given the further uncertainty over the Omicron variant.

"It is important to remember that we are not dealing with the same COVID-19 variant that we were in December 2020. The Delta variant was much more transmissible and, unfortunately, there are already strong indications that the newer Omicron variant spreads even easier again. "Now more than ever, it is vital to

take all possible steps to protect those in your life who have a weak immune system, including cancer patients.

"A cancer doctor will usually explain if a patient has a weak immune system. Those who are currently undergoing active cancer treatment such as some types of chemotherapy and those with blood cancers should be particularly careful during the Christmas period.

"These conditions can mean that the immune system doesn't work as well, making patients more vulnerable to illness and infection.

"The benefits of vaccination for this group can also be reduced. A positive COVID-19 diagnosis or close contact may also greatly delay the start of cancer treatment, and infection can have profound consequences for patients' health," Dr O'Connor added.

The best ways to protect loved ones with cancer from COVID-19 include: Vaccination and Booster Doses; Reducing Contacts; FFP2 or FFP3 Face Masks; PCR and Antigen Testing; Being symptom aware; Avoiding confined or crowded methods of travel.

On the roads

An Garda Síochána and The Road Safety Authority (RSA) have called on drivers to act responsibly and to not be tempted to drink and drive this Christmas and New Year period. Launching today at An Garda Síochána Headquarters in Dublin, this year's Christmas and New Year road safety appeal focuses on the dangers of driving under the influence of alcohol and the devastating loss of life and serious injuries it can

Research published by An Garda Síochána and the RSA showed that over the last five years there were 83 fatalities and 709 serious injuries over the Christmas and New Year period. This means that an average of 17 people die and 142 are seriously injured each year at this time. Almost seven out of ten fatalities were male, while almost two thirds of serious injuries were male. The time period 4pm to 8pm was highlighted as the highest risk for fatalities. Serious injuries tended to occur predominant-

through to 8pm.

Deputy Commissioner, Ann Marie McMahon said "An Garda Síochána said: "An Garda Síochána will be conducting Mandatory Intoxicant Testing checkpoints around the country, to detect irresponsible drivers who drive under the influence of either alcohol or drugs or a combination of both. We will also be targeting other lifesaver offences including speeding, not wearing seat belts and mobile phone use by drivers. Members of An Garda Síochána will also focus on unaccompanied driving by learner drivers.

Don't take risks with electricity

ESB Networks is reminding all electricity customers to never take risks with electricity during the festive period.

As always, never use ESB Networks poles to hang outdoor Christmas lights as the electricity wires overhead are live and extremely dangerous. You must always keep a safe distance because electricity is very powerful and can jump gaps. While in and around the home,

make sure your electrical equipment is in good condition.

At this time of year, storms and strong winds can cause damage to electricity wires and poles, bringing

wires to the ground, always be alert and keep your distance. Remember: fallen electricity wires are live and therefore danger-

ous to approach. Please report any damage imme-

diately to ESB Networks by contacting our emergency phone num-ber: 1800 372 999/021 238 2410 (24 hours/7 days).

Wicklow's Fire Service has the following advice for preventing fires: "Remember most fires in home start in the living room and bedroom at night when we are sleeping. Always use a proper fitting spark-guard in front of open fires especially when you are going out of going to bed. Don't use an open fire to air clothes as this is a major fire risk Clean your chimney. Don't store items like papers, maga-zines, clothing or combustible items near a fire. Be Careful how you dispose of hot ashes. Don't place them in a plastic bin. Never leave lit candles unattended and ensure candles are in proper holders. Position candles away from draughts. Ensure candles are not near items that may catch fire such as curtains. Avoid moving a lit candle. Ensure all candles are properly extinguished before you leave the room.

Also, remember before you go to bed to ensure spark guards are in front of open fires. Switch off and unplug all electrical items,

Don't overload sockets or use of double adapters. If electrical cables or plugs are damaged, worn or frayed, contact an electrian."

In the Water

Irish Water Safety is concerned that many people planning to take a dip over the Christmas period may

ly late afternoon/evening, with over take chances beyond what is accept half (51%) occurring from 12pm ably safe and are cautioning the public to minimize the length of time they remain in water due to the risk of hypothermia as water temperature is approximately 11° Celsius at sea and 5° Celsius in freshwater

"Cold water immersion" and hypothermia can overwhelm the fittest of swimmers but steps can be taken to remain safe. Cold water cools muscles faster than during warmer summer swims and may cause an increased heart rate dizziness, cramp and panic. Take great care walking down slipways, jetties, piers and over rocks as they may be slippery and cause you to fall.

Swimmers should "Get In, Get Out and Warm Up", avoiding extended periods of exposure. Before entering the water throw some water down the back of your neck to allow your body prepare for cold water immersion. Alcohol should be avoided before swimming as it impairs judgment and increases the risk of cold water immersion and hypothermia. Ensure that you have safe access and egress with appropriate shallow shelving, steps or ladders. Less agile people should be mindful that steps leading into the water might be dangerous due to the possible growth of algae.

In the Hills

Dublin Wicklow Mountain Rescue Team has issued advice for staying safe if going for hillwalks: wrap up well; the higher you go the colder and windier it gets, but remember that you'll warm up with exercise. Lots of thin layers are better than one thick layer, as you can add or remove them easily to balance your temperature. Bring a waterproof jacket and trousers even if the forecast is dry, the weather can change quickly in the hills. It's better to have them and not use them, than get caught out by a sudden shower.

Carry some spare warm layers in ase you get unexpectedly delayed. A survival bag - a large, orange plastic bag which can be purchased in most good outdoor shops - is a very useful addition to your kit. It's a good idea to carry some spare food too - chocolate, nuts, dried fruit, or jellies are good choices.

Don't get cold; hypothermia is dangerous, but avoidable. Put on an extra layer when you stop for a break, and try to stay out of the wind. If you, or one of your party, is cold the best remedy is to eat something sugary and get moving. Warm drinks are helpful, but to stay warm you must keep moving. If you need assistance, call 999 or 112 and ask for mountain rescue.

Emergency calls (999/112) use any network available to your phone, not just the one you're on, so you should be able to make an emergency call if your phone has no coverage. If you find that you're still unable to make an emergency call, consider sending a member of your group to higher ground to pick up a better signal. You should be careful not to put anyone at risk by asking them to climb to higher ground

An Arklow man is sharing the story of his heart attack in the hopes that it might help to save other people's lives.

Tom Kavanagh, 73, who lives alone in his house in Fernhill in Arklow, had a brush with death recently when he suffered a heart attack while home alone.

Mr Kavanagh's ordeal began when he awoke with chest pains at about 2am on Sunday 21st November, and when they hadn't gone away by 1pm that afternoon he rang CareDoc, the out of hours service for urgent medical problems.

Tom says he was then on hold for 45 mins waiting on the line to speak to someone, before he was eventually put through to someone and was advised to call 999.

Tom did so, and an ambulance was distpatched and arrived in 30 mins to take him to St. James's for emergency lifesaving surgery.

"I didn't know at the time that I was having a heart attack," Tom says. "I told the paramedics that I had been in two minds about whether to call anyone and that I might have waited until Monday to call my GP. They told me that I wouldn't have been able to ring anybody on Monday because I would have been dead.

Tom is now advising people in similar situations, instead of ringing Caredoc to just ring 999 straight away







Bray Camera Club 'Celebrating 50 Years' with new exhibition


