Underpinned by the best available science, Fair Seas will campaign for long-overdue effective marine protected areas for all.

"A Marine Protected Area (MPA) is a part of the ocean that

Fair Seas is urgently asking our government to create robust and ambitious legislation so that our waters can be effectively protected, managed and monitored right out to the edge of the continental shelf.

'Gap between mortgage payments and rent widening at an alarming rate'

Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore has responded to reports that the gap between mortgage payments and rental costs over time are widening.

Deputy Whitmore notes with concern, a Whitmore report recently published by the Irish Independent, that the gap for Wicklow is now over €100,000 over the lifetime of a 30year mortgage.

Matthews seeks urgent review of waiting lists for children's mental health supports

Green Party TD Steven Matthews has sought an urgent review of waiting lists for mental health supports for children in Wicklow.

Deputy Matthews sought an initial report following a series of queries from concerned parents from across Wicklow who have children on a waiting list to see a child psychologist and other related childhood mental health supports. The HSE report indicated that 664 children in the Wicklow catchment area, as of January 2022, had been waiting for over 3 months for an appointment with some waiting over a year.

Discussing the report's findings, Deputy Matthews said: "I am extremely concerned by the report issued by the HSE, by any estimation, waiting 3 months for an appointment is too long but when it concerns the mental health of a child, it is completely unacceptable. We all accepted extra delays and hurdles during the pandemic, but we are on the other side of that, and this is an area that clearly needs immediate and significant intervention.

"I have written to both Stephen Donnelly as Minister for Health but also Mary Butler as Minister for State with Responsibility for Mental Health seeking an urgent review of the waiting lists and investment in Wicklow services to deal with the back log. These are children who have already attended their GP, been referred formally to seek further specialist mental health services and they and their families are left in limbo for at least three months and in some cases

"The report did outline that additional funding had been provided in recent months in recognition of the significant wait times, but this needs more than budgetary increases, this needs a full in-depth assessment as to where the shortcomings in services are; how we can go about assigning experts in children's mental health care to roles in the areas required and immediately go about the challenging task of reducing wait times. This is also about future proofing the system so that once the backlog is cleared, it isn't allowed build up again.

'Unfortunately, this report doesn't exist in isolation and the lack of mental health support for younger people in particular in Wicklow is something that I have raised with the Ministers both in writing and in the Dáil previously. During the pandemic, I had the opportunity to meet remotely with a group of GPs from across Wicklow who were despondent by the lack of expert care for their patients and judging by the waiting lists, their genuinely held concerns continue to go unanswered

"This is not an issue that we can afford to continue to put on the long finger and the delays brought about by the pandemic are no longer an excuse that people are willing to accept. I hope that this matter is treated with the urgency it requires and if there are any specific cases/ issues that I can bring to the attention of the HSE, I would be more than happy to do so. I would encourage any family in that situation to get in touch with me directly," concluded Deputy Matthews.

'Phones should be easier to fix'

Ireland South MEP Deirdre Clune is looking to make it easier for people in Wicklow to fix

Clune is a member of the European Parliament's Committee on the Environment, Public Health and Food Safety, which is putting forward measures to make portable batteries in appliances including smartphones easy and safe to remove and replace. A recent Eurobarometer poll found that 77% of consumers would rather repair their devices than replace them, but the cost of fixing problems is often cited as a major

MEP Clune said, "this Battery Directive is a good step forward in strengthening consumer's 'Right to Repair', to help them save money and also to reduce waste. On a wider scale, the Battery Directive aligns with the current proposals outlined in the EU's Circular Economy Action Plan. If adopted, these would require manufacturers to make products more durable and repairable, while ensuring spare parts, repair manuals, software updates and upgrades are available. All of these initiatives will play an important role in advancing the EU's commitment to help people live more sustainably and reduce their impact on the



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Heritage projects receive funding boost

through the Built Heritage Investment Scheme (BHIS) administered by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

Examples include roof, wall and joinery repair, draught-proofing windows, lime rendering and the repair of stained-glass win-

"The funding will allow for conservation and help safeguard it for future generations. These awards also provide employment to small businesses, skilled conservation specialists and tradespeople, ensuring a continued focus on the traditional crafts - all of which help us to deliver on Heritage Ireland 2030, the new national heritage plan."

Green Party TD Steven Matthews said, "This funding is a vital aspect of maintaining our built her itage across the county Much of the funding announced today will go to specialist tradespeople who have the expertise required to carry out the work while maintaining the historic nature of these locations. Under the Bill, homes that are vacant for at least 180 days in the preceding year would be subject to a new vacant home tax at 3% of the market value of the property, to be collected by revenue as part of the local property tax. This would be re-paid to the local authority where the vacant property lies, to fund housing needs in the area. The tax would not apply to the principal private residence of the owner and includes a number of key exemptions, including if an owner is in care; if the occupant has moved temporarily for work purposes; if the property is a holiday home; or if the prop-erty is undergoing major renovations. An initiative introduced in Vancouver has seen a 25% decrease in vacant property since introducing similar tax measures in 2017.

No planning permission needed for conversion of vacant Wicklow pubs

Since 2018, 24 residential units have been provided in county Wicklow through 14 notifications of exempted developments. The regulations signed by Minister O'Brien extend the exemption to the end of 2025.

For the conversion of former pubs into a home/homes in Wicklow: the pub's license must have lapsed; a limit of 9 residential units can be produced under an exempted development.







Regulations to improve grant scheme for students

Minister for Further and Higher Education Simon Harris TD last week signed new regulations to improve the student grant scheme for the new academic year.

The changes, introduced in Budget 2022, will see: Income grants increase by \leq 200; Increase the income threshold by \leq 1,000; The distance for the higher non-adjacent student grant will be reduced from 45km to $_{30km}$.

Minister Harris said: "I'm delighted today to sign these regulations, which will deliver much-needed assistance to students and families across County Wicklow.

"The \leqslant 200 increase in the maintenance grant will offer direct financial assistance to over 62,000 students nationally, and increasing the eligibility cut off point by \leqslant 1,000 will ensure even more students qualify, and more Wicklow families can access support.

"Reducing the distance for the higher non-adjacent student grant also means more Wicklow students who are living away from home or travelling to college will qualify for the higher grant."

The student grant system is open now for renewals, and will open for new applications on April 28th.

Call for school-based mental health supports for primary school children

At its AGM, Bray & District Council of Trade Unions adopted a motion submitted by the executive committee noting a call by the National Parents Council and St. Patrick's Mental Health Services for the establishment of school-based mental health supports for primary school children.

The motion stated that "The Council acknowledges that schools are considered appropriate and valuable settings for delivery of such supports. Over the past two years it has been well documented how the mental health needs of children have seriously intensified during the pandemic

"The importance of early intervention and prevention cannot be overstated. It is well recognised that if the social-emotional, behavioural and mental health needs of children are not met in a timely and appropriate manner that this has far-reaching consequences not only for their school engagement and academic progress but also for children's future

well-being.

"Teachers and school communities have been trying to draw attention for years to the lack of support and resources and in particular the lack of clinical support, available to primary school age children with social, emotional and behavioural needs. They also point to the lack of training and continuous professional development available to equip them in supporting pupils whose mental health needs can be complex and sometimes extremely challenging. Therefore, this Council calls for a radical overhaul of the liaison structures between children's community mental health services and schools the putting in place of clear and definite pathways where

supports are readily accessible to schools seeking advice and referral in relation to children with significant social, behavioural and emotional needs adequate staffing of all agencies working in the area of community mental health for children a recognition of the urgent need to put in place a school-based clinical support system which is adequately staffed and properly resourced appropriate training and CPD to be made available immediately for school staff."

Proposing the motion, Council Secretary, Kieron Connolly also stated; "While incoming Governments have over the years committed to improving integration of services for vulnerable children and adolescents with mental health difficulties there is little evidence that this has been seen as a real priority by governments during their terms of office."

Surveying for National **Broadband Plan continues**

National Broadband Ireland (NBI) has announced that surveying works in Wicklow are well underway.

In Wicklow, there are 15,781 premises in the Intervention Area (IA), which includes homes, farms, commercial businesses and schools. This equates to 23% of all premises in the county. Under the National Broadband Plan, Wicklow will see an investment of €59M in the new high speed fibre network. This will enable elearning, remote monitoring of livestock or equipment, e-health initiatives, better energy efficiency in the home, and facilitate increased levels of remote working.

NBI crews have made substantial progress in Wicklow, where Baltinglass has now been surveyed.

These initial works pave the way for the next stage of deploying fibre on

poles/ducts and includes the erection of poles, unblocking of ducts, and the in tion of sub duct into existing ducts, for the fibre to be installed.

In advance of the Fibre-to-the-Home roll out, the NBP provides for the delivery

of Broadband Connection Points (BCP's) nationwide. 512 of these sites are no 'live' and have both internal and external broadband access. These facilities - which include GAA clubs, community centres and tourist sites - will provide free public access to high-speed internet in the rollout area.

These will pave the way for rural communities to receive the benefits of broad-

band, from mobile working, e-learning and mobile banking, to digital tourism. A full list can be found at https://nbi.ie/bcp-map/. Locations of Broadband Connection Points in county Wicklow will include Crossbridge Community Hall, Brockagh Resource Centre, Knockree Youth Hostel, and Ballinacor GAA Club


