From 17th August, Wicklow's County Archives are available at https://www.heritageweek.ie/projects as part of Heritage Week. You might be surprised at the volume and variety of records relating to your county in your local archives! In this digital presentation, archivist Catherine Wright will describe the collections held in the Wicklow County Archives Service, focusing on collections common to most local authority archives and discuss their usefulness as sources for research. County Archives are widely used by local historians, family historians, academics and researchers of varied interests. Indeed, the collections of county archives tell the story of the development of communities and the authorities who served them and place this story within the national context.

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Huge spike in Notices To Quit as rents soar

country outside of Dublin to rent a home. Only Kildare and Meath come even close to the rental costs that families are enduring in Wicklow. The news comes amidst a major spike in the number of Notices To Quit issued by landlords.

inn Féin TD John Brady said that the Government has 'lost control' of the housing market and has called on the Minister for Housing to convene an urgent meeting on the crisis in the rental sector

Figures released to Sinn Féin by the Residential Tenancies Board, reveal that 1,781 Notices To Quit were served in the second quarter of 2022. This is an increase from 841 Notices in the same period in 2021.

Deputy Brady said "These figures are very alarming and require urgent action. The number of Notices To Quit has soared in recent months, which will see a dramatic escalation in evictions in the near future. Wicklow endures some of the highest rent prices in the country, particularly for new renters. This crisis will increase pressure on services, which are already stretched.

"In Quarter 1 of last year there were 352 eviction notices. That rose to 841 the following quarter as a result of Darragh O'Brien ending the Covid19 ban on evictions in April last year. Since then the numbers have escalated exponentially, to 1,132 notices in Quarter 1 of recorded the highest rents to this year and 1,781 notices in date and the lowest number of

needs to convene an urgent meeting to address this clear crisis in the rental sector. This meeting must take place immediately and include the Residential Tenancies Board, tenants and landlord's representative organisations and opposition housing spokespersons. We urgently need a crisis intervention plan to slow down the disorderly exit of private landlords exiting the rental market.

"All options must be on the table for consideration including a temporary ban on evictions, an accelerated tenant in situ purchase scheme by Local Authorities, an acceleration of social housing delivery and tax reform in the private rental sec-

"On the basis of the figures released to me the number of single people and families being evicted will increase every month for the remainder of this year and into 2023. This will lead to a level of homelessness that we previously would have thought impossible. I urge the Minister for Housing to act, and act now.'

The latest Daft.ie rent report

just over a decade, there has been an approx. 80% fall in the number of properties available outside of Dublin. Rents in Wicklow have increased 11.8% since last year.

On 1st August of this year there were a total of 424 rental homes available across the country outside of Dublin. This boils down to an average of 17 homes per county available for rent outside of the capital. Across Leinster, the figure is even worse with an average of only 12 homes available to rent per county outside Dublin.

For every hundred homes which were available to rent across the country in 2009, there are only three today - a 97% reduction in availability.

"Rents were already far too high and too many people here Wicklow are trapped by the housing crisis and locked out of owning their own home," said Deputy Brady. "This is a very worrying crisis and people cannot afford to continue paying these spiralling costs.

"Workers and families on ordinary incomes here cannot afford to fork out these huge sums for rent every month, when they are already strugrental properties on the market gling with a cost-of-living crisis their inaction.

"The Minister for Housing since their records began. In that is seeing their bills soar. Every day, people are contacting me looking for help with this crisis, including young families stuck in cramped flats that they're paying through the nose for, and young people living at home with their families while they anxiously watch house prices creep further and further out of their reach.

"It is clear that the Government has lost control of the housing market, social, and affordable housing is well behind target and the private rental sector is shrinking. This out-of-touch Government simply doesn't understand how serious this crisis is.

"Budget 2023 next month is the Minister's last chance to make the level of change required to fix our deepening housing crisis. We need a dramatic increase in funding to deliver 20,000 social and affordable homes every year for the next decade. We need emergency action to reduce home-lessness and slow down the disorderly exit of landlords from the private rental sector. The Government's failure to fix the housing crisis is devastating the lives of renters in Wicklow who are forced to pay the price for



Sixteen Wicklow pubs closed between 2005 and 2021, new analysis shows, with 12 of the closures occurring over the pandemic period.

Group of Ireland (DIGI) has shown a stark decline in the number of pubs doing business throughout the country since 2005. The Irish Pub: Stopping the Decline report, based on the group's analysis of Revenue license data and including an economic and social analysis by Dublin City University (DCU) economist Anthony Foley, shows a 21.2% decline in the number of pubs in Ireland from 2005 to 2021.

All 26 counties experienced declines in pub numbers through the 16-year period. The largest decrease was seen in Laois with 30.6% less pubs since 2005. This was the only county with a decrease of 30% or more. The lowest decrease was in Meath with 1.4% less. Meath was followed by Dublin, reporting a decrease of only 4.3%. All the remaining 23 counties had decreases greater than 10%.

Three counties, Carlow (10.4%). Kildare (13.6%), and Wicklow (10.1%) showed decreases between 10% and 14.9% and, five counties, Cavan (17.2%), Kerry

A new report from the Drinks Industry (19.8%), and Wexford (17.2%) were in the 15% to 19.9% decrease bracket. All the remaining counties had decreases of more than 20%. Six counties, Clare (24.7%), Galway (20.6%), Louth (20.3%), Sligo (24%), Waterford (23.5%), and Westmeath (24.4%) were in the 20% to 24.9% decrease band, while nine counties Cork (28.5%), Donegal (26.3%), Leitrim (26.4%), Limerick 29.1%), Longford (25.7%), Mayo (25.1%), Offaly (29.9%), Roscommon (28.3%), and Tipperary (26.3%) saw decreases between 25% and

The report highlights that many public houses operate at relatively low levels of sales volume. One of the factors which influence business sustainability at these low sales volumes, which is within the control of the Government, is the high Irish alcohol excise level which represents a significant cost on the business.

Paul Moynihan, DIGI member, Vintners Federation of Ireland President and Government to reduce excise tax to support Wicklow publican, described the report as

"A 21% decline or 1,829 rural pub closures represent businesses that provide jobs, a hub in the local community for socialising and community integration and a cultural hub which is among the main attractions for tourists visiting Ireland.

"The pace of decline increased as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic which saw the drinks and hospitality industry suffer the worst of all, with one of the longest lockdowns recorded globally.

"Considering this sharp decline and trend we're witnessing in the reduction of the number of pubs in Ireland, we need to monitor this industry carefully and ensure the necessary supports are in place to help reverse this trend. Business owners in the drinks industry were challenged by two increases in alcohol excise tax in Budget 2012 and Budget 2013 as part of austerity measures which were never reversed. Our high alcohol excise tax is a cost and slows the growth of these businesses and impacts their day-to-day operations and bottom line. Exasperated currently with inflation and the cost of living. We are calling on the the industry with meaningful measures that will be felt immediately.'

"I have been contacted by so many residents over the years who seek better public transport and an alternative to car use. I am committed to improving bus and rail services throughout Wicklow, expanding rural services, and bringing the DART service to Wicklow Town. Public advised not to feed horses and donkeys without the owner's permission

The Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine is urging members of the public not to feed horses and donkeys without the owner's

Many of us are enjoying walks along boreens and village roads this summer and will likely get the opportunity to see horses and donkeys up close. The Department is urging people, however, not to feed these animals without the owner's permission. While it may be well-intentioned, the feeding of bread, food scraps, fruit or vegetables to horses or donkeys may cause severe illness, choking or death. What may seem like a treat could be potentially fatal for the animals. Additionally, the horses and donkeys may be put at risk of developing laminitis (a painful swelling of the feet) or suffering colic (a condition which can be serious and even fatal).

The public are asked to be mindful that feeding grass cuttings or garden waste to equines can also be dangerous. Chemicals applied to lawns may be harmful if eaten, while plants mixed with grass cuttings may be poisonous to horses and donkeys if

And remember - don't open farm gates, or enter fields in which animals are kept, without the owner's permission

Planning permission granted for Blessington pop-up pool

Appeal lodged against **Enniskerry housing development**

Enniskerry Demesne Management CLG has lodged an appeal with An Bord Pleanala against plans for 74 houses and 10 sheltered housing units in Enniskerry.

The site is located on the southern side of the Cookstown Road directly across from the Enniskerry Demesne residential development. The site is currently under pasture and enjoys a protected view of the Sugar Loaf.

Local residents had submitted their objections and concerns during the public consultation phase. They raised the points that: The proposal exceeds the permissible density on these lands as outlined in the LAP and Action Area Plan and therefore contravenes the plan for the area: The density is out of context with surrounding existing surrounding development; Development typology is too urban for this rural area.

They also raised concerns relating to the ecological and visual impact, including the negative visual impact on the area and on views towards the Sugarloaf. They said that insensitive development will impact on Enniskerry's tourism industry. Development on the site should be of an exceptionally high quality, they

Another major concern for Enniskerry Demesne residents is traffic, and the limited social infrastructure in to serve the development. They also raised concerns regarding road safety at St. Patrick's National School due to construction traffic/HGV's having to come through the village.

ABP is due to make its decision by 5th December.

Plans for 152 Lott Lane houses

Wicklow County Council is planning to construct 152 housing units at Lott Lane in Kilcoole.

The dwellings will be a mixture of duplex apartment, terraced and semi detached.

The accommodation shall consist of 14 one bed apartments, 51 two bed two storey housing units, 85 three bed two storey housing units and 2 four bed two storey housing units.

The site is a five-acre Greenfield site, adjacent to a residential neighbourhood and less than 0.5km to the north east of the village. The land is zoned mixed use. Plans for 75 social houses on the site were approved by the Department of Housing in 2021.

The planning report says that the position of the dwellings on the site have been designed to avoid overlooking or overshadowing on neighbouring properties.

The Council has undertaken a detailed site investiga-

tion and preliminary designs for roads, foundations and retaining walls shall be further progressed as the design

Public consultation for the development is currently underway and a decision is due to be made on 20th September. The deadline for submissions is 12pm on September 12th.

Funding for outdoor adventure projects

Wicklow County Council has been allocated grants of €281,700 for 10 outdoor adventure projects under this year's Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS).

The projects to benefit will include the towns and villages. upgrading of walking trails in Aughrim, Clara Vale, Devil's Glen, Ballinagee and Ballinafunshogue. A new equestrian trail at Ballyboy Forest and a new linear wild play area on the red kite loop in Avoca will also

The Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, Cllr Tommy Annesley, welcomed this further investment in the Wicklow outdoors which will enhance the County's walkways, rivers, lakes and beaches as well as boosting local economies by attracting visitors and furthering our reputation as a destination for adventure tourism.

Michael Nicholson, Deputy Chief Executive, paid tribute to all the Council staff involved in the preparation of the 10 applications and also acknowledged the ongoing commitment to the County from the Minister for Rural and Community Heather Humphreys TD. He added that outdoor recreation tourism is a growing sector and has the potential to have major

Mr Nicholson also stated that some of the approved projects are often hidden gems on our doorsteps and he encouraged everyone to get out and discover them over the rest of the summer.

Green Party TD Steven Matthews has welcomed the additional funding, saying: "Wicklow did really well under the latest round of funding. 10 projects were selected across the county which aim to improve beautiful parts of our county for visitors and residents to enjoy.

"Wicklow received €280,000 for pro-

An Bórd Pleanála has approved the proposed Flood Relief Scheme for the town of Arklow.

The estimated €28.5 investment by the OPW includes a plan to deepen the river as well as the introduction of new debris and gravel traps in order to improve conveyance.

It also includes elements to enhance the public realm, strengthening works to the existing quay walls and Arklow Bridge, the construction of floodwalls, glass panelling and an embankment as barriers against flood risk. Wicklow County Council will act as lead authority in delivering the scheme, with full funding and support provided by the OPW under the Capital Flood Relief Programme.

Minister Stephen Donnelly said: "This is a project I have been pushing for a number of years as it is of

vital importance for the future of the town.

"In 2018 I invited then Minister for State for the Office of Public Works and Flood Relief Kevin 'Boxer' Moran to the town to see for himself what needed to be done and to ensure that the scheme was incorporated into Government policy. During the visit we made it clear that the scheme was essential to protect the town against both river and coastal erosion. It's an issue that has been championed on the ground by Cllr Pat Fitzgerald and I'd like to also commend Wicklow County Council for the work they have done in pushing it forward. I will continue to work with the local authorities and through the Government to make sure the project is delivered as quickly as possible.

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








Come along to discover more about life at Castlekevin, the epicentre of ferocious struggles between Anglo-Norman colonists and the native Irish from 1169 to 1652. It tended with the execution of the de facto head of the O'Toole clan. the 75-yea- old Luke O'Toole.

Castlekevin, a typical Anglo-Norman castle with motte and bailey, has been a landmark since then. Its survival is thanks to the generations of private landowners who had the foresight to keep it intact. The intervening four centuries have taken their toll. This has allowed us to use top professional archaeologists to scrutinise the area with non-invasive lidar, geophysical and ecological surveys. These have just been

Register now for the 2022 Big Beach Clean

The Big Beach Clean initiative is back, and Clean Coasts, supported by Cully and Sully, are calling people all across Wicklow to register to receive clean-up kits and join the world biggest

In 2021, a record number of over 400 clean-ups were organised by volunteers who removed 42 tonnes of litter across the whole country. This represented a 5% decrease in litter found across Ireland, compared to the previous vear campaign, which reflects the incredible work that Irish volunteers do all year round to tackle litter, as well as more conscious behaviours by beach users.

Last year in county Wicklow, volunteers organised clean-ups in over 15 different locations, removing 1.4 tonnes of litter. Moreover, Clean Coasts hosted a Big Beach Clean event at Greystones Beach on Saturday the 18th of September 2021, where 28 dedicated volunteers managed to collect 8 bags which amounted to 34kgs of litter. According to these volunteers, the top 5 Big Beach Clean offenders were: cigarette butts, plastic pieces, food wrappers, food containers (plastic), and wet wipes.

The Big Beach Clean is an annual call to action and this year it will run from 16th to 18th September, as part of the International Coastal Cleanup (ICC), operated internationally by Ocean Conservancy. This call to action invites communities and volunteers around the country to remove litter from around the Irish coast after the end of the bathing season. This initiative is also an opportunity for volunteers to get involved in a worldwide citizen science project, which entails collecting the amount and types of litter on Irish beaches and filling in Clean Coasts' Marine Litter Data Cards. This will help heighten awareness about the issue of marine litter serving as an indicator of the magnitude of the problem and help shape future policies and campaigns.

The 2021 results have been shared with Ocean Conservancy and, in Ireland and regionally in Wicklow, they have been used to shape Clean Coasts campaigns up on cleancoasts.org.

This year, Clean Coasts are calling not only Clean Coasts groups and people who would traditionally be involved in environmental activities to join. Clean Coasts, with the support of Content Creators, are asking everybody in the community to get involved and find out more about the benefits of taking part in a beach clean and international citizen science project, which go beyond the environmental aspect of the initiative.

Registration will again be open to all residents of Ireland. no matter how far from the coast they are based. Statistics show that the number one cause of marine litter is litter dropped in towns and cities. Getting involved in the Big Beach Clean is a way for residents of non-coastal counties to help prevent litter entering our waterways and seas by holding a clean-up no matter where they are in the country and tackling the problem at source.

Sinead McCoy, Coastal Communities Manager, stated: "The work carried out by Clean Coasts groups across Ireland throughout the year is amazing, and unfortunately very much needed during these times. We are asking Clean Coasts groups and any other group that would like to join the effort to sign up to partake in the Big Beach Clean, which runs on the 3rd weekend in September each year, and receive a free beach clean kit. Last year we had a boost in clean ups with loads more areas on the coast, along lakes and riverways and in our town and villages being cleaned up, we are excited to build on this success and get even more volunteers out cleaning during weekend. A new edition of A Short History of the Church of Ireland, by Dr Kenneth Milne, has been published by Messenger Publications.



Ifac advises Wicklow SMEs and start-ups to get credit under control now

Ifac, Ireland's farming, food and agribusiness specialist professional services firm, is advising Wicklow SME and start-up business owners to make sure they avoid poor credit control to ensure their survival.

Julie Burke, National Credit Controller at ifac said: "I like to think of a business as a person. At the heart of that business, is credit control. It brings money into the business. This in turn means it can be pumped back out in many different directions to keep the business alive. And of course, if it doesn't, come in, it can't go out and the business suffers."

Common mistakes businesses make in their first five years

Overtrading – Avoid taking on every bit of business that comes your way. This may sound counter-productive but if you over-promise and under-deliver, this will be much more damaging to your reputation. It is better to take on what you can confidently complete to a high standard and build on that.

Avoiding the talk – New businesses get so caught up in generating new business, that they avoid following up for payment. Whatever your credit terms are, you should be actively following up after this date with any fees due.

The see-saw effect -Instead of chasing payment with their customers, a lot of young businesses will opt to avoid paying their own suppliers, dragging out credit terms. extending limits, etc. In effect, just passing on their credit control issues to their suppliers. Eventually, suppliers become frustrated and stop supplying and this is where the business is stuck. They can't get paid and they can't get more product.

Unpredictable events – We have all seen first-hand over the past two years what can happen when something nobody could have planned for occurs. Having a good handle on your credit controls means you can respond to these events, pivot your business and continue on with little to no interruptions.

Polite persistence – Follow up consistently with all debts past your credit terms. You want the customer to feel "they have been chasing this, I better sort this out".

Make it real – Letters tomorr can lose their meaning and often are left unopened. A phone call makes it real. A local is letter does not look for an ifac.ie.

Julie Burke, National answer, a phone call does. Credit Controller at ifac said: "I like to think of a business as a person. At the heart of that business, is credit control. It brings money into the business. As answer, a phone call does. Sometimes it's only when we talk to our customers that we realise there's a problem and this is the perfect time to discuss how we go forward.

Put credit control at the top of every agenda - Just like your customers, you can't put your head in the sand. Deal with your credit control, analyse it weekly at a minimum and ask the hard questions. Remember it is the beating heart of your business. A healthy cash flow = ahealthy business and your total debt should never be more than 10% of your annual income. This is what you should be working towards.

When is a sale a sale? – Businesses often focus on sales, sales projections and promises of sales! A sale is not a sale until it's in the bank. Compare your expected sales every month to what has actually come in. They will be two very different figures, but only one of them is real.

Deal with it - Whatever issues arise from chasing debts, deal with them. Remove any barriers to payment. If a customer complains that they have not paid because of a certain reason, follow that feedback until it is fixed. Then it's back to chasing the payment.

Julie continued, "If you are looking to start this process today, my advice is to start with your worst and work backwards. For example, look at all aged debt over six months, pursue every lead, follow up and chase this debt. When you are satisfied you have done all you can, move the goal post and work from 60 days credit and so on. The key to this is breaking it down into manageable portions so that you can manage it.

"Finally, it is also important to ask yourself why. Why did you go into business in the first place? It's most likely because you feel you have something really great to offer, you want to do well and you want to be around in 10 years. To ensure this get your credit under control today and you can be more confident of your business and its future tomorrow."
