Wicklow's County Development Plan 2022-2028 fails to achieve balance between housing and population growth and contains breaches of national policy according to the Office of the Planning Regulator (OPR). Wicklow County Council will meet next month to finalise the plan, however many changes will need to be made to the Draft plan as the OPR made a submission as part of the consultation process expressing 'significant concerns'.

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matters considered to constitute a potential material breach of legislative or policy requirement. Once OPR's recommendations are made, the local authority must outline how these recommendations will be addressed.

Regarding rural housing, the OPR states that the plan's objectives and criteria are in contrast to sustainable development and planning regulations: "If the plan was made as is," the OPR states, it "would result in planning policies for rural areas being adopted which are not evidence based and would set the provision of housing for certain persons in rural areas ahead of other planning considerations"

The Council made an amendment to the plan which seeks to further widen the qualifying criteria for the approval in addition to the abun-

of rural housing, to include persons with access to an affordable site, who are carers and those working in healthcare settings.

"The inclusion of these references in this amendment are very loosely defined and would be likely to the further ease measures of the plan to properly manage the very significant level of pressure for development of the Wicklow countryside," the OPR says. "If included in the plan, [this alteration] would have the effect of undermining the rural living and development strategy of the Council in relation to reinforcing the vitality and future of rural villages.'

The Office is concerned that the cumulative and combined effect of a number of proposed amendments in Newtownmountkennedy. Rathdrum and Ashford, will undermine the settlement hierarchy and core strategy to such an extent that it creates wider conflicts with other stated poli-



## **Rosemary Smith joins FIVA Heritage Hall of Fame**

Earlier this year the Irish Veteran and Vintage Car Club (IVVCC) nominated motorsport legend Rosemary Smith for a prestigious FIVA (Federation Internationale des Vehicules Anciens) Hall of Fame Award. Rosemary, who has just celebrated her 85th birthday, was presented with her award by Mr. Tiddo Bresters , the President of FIVA at 2.30pm on Sunday August 21st at the annual IVVCC Classic Car Show in the walled garden of Powerscourt House in Enniskerry.

Present were Mr. Myles O'Reilly, President of the IVVCC, Mr. Tiddo Bresters, President of FIVA, Mr. Keith Gibbons, council member IVVCC, and Mr. Peadar Ward, IVVCC.

A female pioneer in a notoriously male-dominated sport, Rosemary Smit, from Dublin, drove in the Monte Carlo rally eight times, as well as most other iconic rallies all over the world, including an outright victory in the 1965 Tulip Rally, beating all the male drivers to the finish.



"The provision of nest boxes for Barn Owls has been a huge conservation success story in recent years. BirdWatch Ireland has recorded over 150 nest boxes which are used by breeding Barn Owls and this number continues to increase each year. It is expected that the number of nest boxes in suitable areas will significantly increase through this measure. Oonagh Duggan, Head of Advocacy at BirdWatch Ireland, commented "The provision of nest boxes can deliver benefits for Barn Owls, but it is also important to remember the benefits for the farmer. Barn Owls are called 'the farmers friend' for good reason, and having a pair of Barn Owls on the farm can help with rodent control. Many farmers that we work with who have encouraged Barn Owls now no longer use or need to use rodenticides, which is a win-win, for biodiversity and farmers alike."

#### The Barn Owl in Wicklow

The Wicklow Barn Owl Project got underway in April, and has been asking members of the public to get in touch to help improve the prospects for this endangered

The project is a collaboration between Wicklow County Council, National Parks & Wildlife Service (NPWS). Birdwatch Ireland and the Wicklow Raptor Group with additional funding support from The Heritage Council through the County Heritage Plan Fund.

The overall aim is to better understand the owl's distribution in Wicklow and to work with landowners to implement practical protection measures.

The project has two elements: firstly, gathering baseline information on the Barn Owl population in Wicklow through undertaking a county survey, and secondly installing nest boxes in suitable locations to improve breed-

large extent on rodents, with one bird estimated to take 2,000 prey items in a single breeding season. The Irish name 'Scréachóg reilge' relates to its screeching sound at nightime, traditionally associated with the Banshee and its habit of nesting in old churches and other ruined buildings.

The project is seeking to install nesting boxes in suitable locations throughout the county and invites landowners/ homeowners to get in touch if they have seen Barn Owls near them and would like to host a 087 2339280.




