TFI Local Link Carlow Kilkenny Wicklow has announced the enhancement of the Glendalough to Wicklow service which will be extended in both directions now serving Sallins to Arklow.

route will serve Arklow, Avoca Bridge, Wicklow Town Glendalough, Wicklow Mountains to Blessington and onwards to Naas and Sallins facilitating onward travel to Dublin with improved connectivity to regional bus and rail services.

# **National Federation of Group Water Schemes supports EPA recommendations**

The representative body for the community-owned and community-operated group water scheme (GWS) sector, the National Federation of Group Water Schemes (NFGWS), welcomed last week's publication by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) of its report on Drinking Water Quality in Private Group Schemes and Small Private Supplies - 2021.

The NFGWS supports the EPA's call to immediately address issues of exceedances on a small number of group water schemes.

Many of the GWS supplies that recorded microbiological or trihalomethane (THM) exceedances in 2021 have progressed plans to

bring about solutions. Any non-compliance is unacceptable and reflects poorly on an

otherwise thriving sector," said the NFGWS. "Particularly, instances of repeated non-compliance over a num-

ber of years must be resolved as quickly as possible to avoid continued risk to the health of individual group water scheme members.

"Robust infrastructure and operational processes are needed to ensure a safe and reliable drinking water supply. This relies on a continued commitment from all stakeholders, including impacted group water schemes and relevant statutory authorities.

The NFGWS promotes a strategy of amalgamation and rationali-

professional expertise. There has been significant delays in completing some complex projects funded under the current cycle of the Multi-annual Rural Water Programme (MARWP). This has been frustrating for all involved but the NFGWS is committed to assisting wherever possible in ensuring the delivery of this essential funding programme

"The EPA's report provides assurance that the vast majority of group water schemes were once again in full compliance with drinking water standards. Many group water schemes have also been working with their members to implement ground-breaking drinking water source protection initiatives as part of a holistic approach to quality assurance.

"The source protection measures introduced also have co-benefits for biodiversity enhancement and climate action. Gerard Oí'Brien, Chair of the Wicklow of the Irish Hotels Federation (IHF) outlined to Wicklow representatives the crucial importance that everything possible is done to protect and secure tourism livelihoods and support the long-term sustainable development of our wider tourism industry.

"Irish tourism businesses are collectively the largest indigenous employer in the country. Here in Wicklow, tourism accounts for 14700 of jobs, and €135m of revenue annuall," said

While there has been a welcome upturn in Mr O'Brien. "Speaking with local TDs and Senators it is clear that they understand the value and importance of tourism to our local communities, but also the enormous impact multiple factors are having on these business es, right now.

"Over recent months, unforeseen chalnges have arisen including the continued war le in Ukraine, the increasing risk of a global downturn, and escalating business costs and ongoing energy crisis which in particular is causing real concern for hotels and guesthouses here in Wicklow. Nationally we are seeing hotels reporting increases of upwards of 300% in energy bills compared with 2019 levels. This is unsustainable and will inevitably lead to difficulties in relation to future viability of some businesses in the tourism sector.'

Tourism VAT rate and how this is the right rate for the long-term sustainable development of Irelandís largest indigenous industry, which in 2019 employed 270,000 people and returned over €2 billion to the exchequer in direct tourism-related taxes.

The current 9% rate is the right rate for Irish tourism in a European context. Increasing the tourism VAT rate by half to 13.5% in March 2023 would make Ireland's tourism VAT rate the third highest in Europe, far above other European countries where they take tourism seriously like Portugal (6%), Malta (7%) Netherlands (9%). Tourism is an important part of the local economy here in Wicklow and the continued recovery of tourism and hospitality must be to the fore of Government economic policy as we seek to support these businesses throughout these continued uncertain times," he said.

Government policy recognised a few years ago that supply of new rental homes was critical to addressing the shortage. However, there are signs that the government plans to scrap the build-to-rent planning classification.

The Co. Wicklow parents of a young girl who's fighting cancer have paid an emotional tribute to the Irish public, after raising enough funds to secure life-saving treatment for their daughter in the US **By Nick Bramhill**

Wicklow County Council invites applications from owners of historic buildings, protected structures and structures within Architectural Conservation Areas (ACAs) under the following two grant schemes as operated by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage;

- Built Heritage Investment Scheme (BHIS) 2023, and the
- Historic Structures Fund (HSF) 2023.

The Built Heritage Investment Scheme will be administered from a total allocation for County Wicklow of €96,000. Grants of between €2,500 and €15,000 will be awarded, with applicants required to provide a minimum of 50% of total costs. Smaller grants to support the upkeep and maintenance of historic properties will also be considered, and up to €2,000 of the County allocation may be reserved for this purpose (subject to applications received).

The Historic Structures Fund focuses on caring for and restoring historic structures and buildings for the benefit of communities and the public.

There are three streams of funding:

- Stream 1  $\in$  15,000  $\in$  50,000 (max. 80% funding) with a sub stream for Historic Shopfronts;
- Stream 2 €50,000 €200,000 (50% of eligible costs) In exceptional circumstances a higher percentage may be sought, subject to a maximum of 80%;
- Vernacular Structures €5,000 €10,000 (max. 80% funding).

Please note applicants cannot avail of funding under both the Historic Structures Fund and the Built Heritage Investment Scheme in the same year.

The Community Monuments Fund is investing essential capital in our archaeological heritage to help owners and custodians of archaeological monuments safeguard them into the future for the benefit of communities and the public. The core aims of this fund are the conservation, maintenance, protection and promotion of local monuments and archaeological sites. The Department encourages projects to incorporate a traditional skills training element. Local authorities, private owners, community groups and custodians of monuments are eligible to apply under the following 3 streams;

- Stream 1 will offer grants up to €85,000 aimed at essential repairs and capital works for the conservation and repair of archaeological monuments.
- Stream 2 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for development of Conservation Management Plans/Reports that are aimed at identifying measures for conservation of archaeological monuments and improving public access.
- Stream 3 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for enhancement of access infrastructure and interpretation (including virtual/online) at archaeological monuments.

# **Ocean Winds and Bord na Mona** announce off-shore partnership

# Wicklow teen takes to the stage at Leinster House for Child Talks

Wicklow teenager Aisling Murphy told an audience at Leinster House about the impact the Leaving Cert structure had on her, at the recent Child Talks event hosted by the Ombudsman for Childrenís Office (OCO) on Friday, 18th November.

Now in its fifth year, Child Talks gives children a platform to share their experiences on issues that are important to them. Inspired by the location, the theme of this year's Child Talks was 'If I were Taoiseach for a day' Aisling who's 17 and from Wicklow Town, spoke passionately about why she decided to take an alternative education path due to the stress she felt when preparing for the State exams.

"There was a lot of people who told me I was doing the wrong thing and that I would never manage to get far in life without a Leaving Cert... I ignored everyone who told me this and with the support of my parents and a few of my friends I decided to leave school and continue my education in a PLC course. Since that day I have never looked back or had a single regret about leaving school."

Aisling was one of a group of young speakers aged 11-17 to take part in Child Talks this year, with other topics on the day including homelessness autism supports, accessibility, rural transport, female empowerment, the Irish Language and listen-

ing to children. Speaking about the event, the Ombudsman for Children, Dr Niall Muldoon said: "It is significant that our fifth Child Talks took place in Leinster House. We wanted those in power, those

making decisions that affect children, to hear from them directly so that they can fully consider their views.

"My job is to ensure that the rights of children are promoted and respected. I work hard to represent their views but there is no substitution for hearing from children themselves and supporting them to share their experiences, in their own words. "The issues raised by

the children are topical and relevant; they talked about their personal experience of homelessness, about why they feel sup-ports for children are not good enough, about the constraints they feel the current education system puts on their ability to reach their potential, about equal access for everyone
