Wicklow woman fundraising for all-terrain wheelchair

Wicklow woman Lesley Timmins (44) has had multiple sclerosis since she was 25. Her disease has now progressed to the point where it is impacting her life a lot - she can't work or walk and she needs mobility aids. She's started a GoFundMe campaign to try and raise money to buy an all-terrain wheelchair so she can go out with her sons and dog on walks in the forest to try and maintain some normality.

"My disease started off as the relapsing remitting kind where I had increases in symptoms followed by recovery," says Lesley. "My disease started to change to Secondary Progressive Multiple Sclerosis around 2015, around 18 years after I was diagnosed.

"My disease has progressed to where it has now completely changed my life, I am unable to work, and I require assistance with normal everyday tasks. I am unable to walk any distance without using mobility aids such as a Cane and a mobility scooter. Because of the state of

my health I am unable to live an outdoor life and accompany my two sons on things like forest walks. This is very disappointing to me as I am left alone at home and can't enjoy these outings with my son labrador Loki. sons or my

Wicklow the worst hit by teacher shortage'

Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore has called on Government to do more to assist principals in the midst of a substitute teacher shortage, which is being keenly felt in Wicklow.

the Dail recently calling for a range of measures to address the serious shortage of teachers in primary and secondary schools.

Deputy Whitmore said, "Here in Wicklow we are feeling this teacher shortage more acutely than most other counties. Principals are finding it nearly impossible to provide the most basic requirements - simply keeping classrooms open. This is causing significant problems for all pupils but particularly those with additional needs. I have spoken to principals across Wicklow with some telling me they cannot even get applicants for permanent positions in schools at the moment.

open. "Every primary school in Wicklow is struggling to recruit substitute teachers. As a result, 96 per cent of Wicklow schools had resorted to moving a special education teacher from their core duties to cover an absence. Earlier throughout Covid, those children were left behind because classrooms and education were not available to them. We cannot leave them behind again now."

"Among the other actions we want to see from government are for the Minister for Education to work with Higher Education Institutions to facilitate 3rd and 4th year student teachers, and master's students, to engage in increased substitution work and to eliminate delays surrounding the re-registration of teachers with the Teaching Council.

The ASTI reently demanded radical action on the teacher supply issue. ASTI General Secretary Kieran Christie said that the Minister for Education Norma Foley must take radical action to encourage teachers to come back to Ireland and to ensure teachers cur-

National Learning Network is funded by the Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board (KWETB) to provide training, education and work placements to those who need extra support to progress to further education or employment.

Cian says we opened the doors for him and the rest was up to him and no matter how tough he found being in the workplace initially, he knew he had the support of both his instructor and the employer.'

A Wicklow church leader is raising awareness of the hunger crisis raging in Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya by hanging a bag of frankincense on her Christmas tree this festive season.

Rev Katherine Kehoe, minister at Arklow Methodist Church, hopes her gesture of solidarity will also encourage people to give a gift this Christmas to support the work of Christian Aid Ireland as they respond to the severe drought in the Horn of Africa where more than 23 million people are short of food after five failed rainy seasons.

Frankincense is a fragrant resin obtained from trees native to the Horn of Africa and is famous as one of the gifts given to the baby Jesus by the three wise men.
