

Conservation grants under Built Heritage Investment Scheme (BHIS) and Historic Structures Fund (HSF) 2023 now open for application. Wicklow County Council invites applications from owners of historic buildings, protected structures and structures within Architectural Conservation Areas (ACAs) under the following two grant schemes as operated by the Department of Housing, Local government and Heritage; Built Heritage Investment Scheme (BHIS) 2023, and the Historic Structures Fund (HSF) 2023.

The Built Heritage Investment Scheme will be administered from a total allocation for County Wicklow of €96,000. Grants of between €2,500 and €15,000 will be awarded, with applicants required to provide a minimum of 50% of total costs. Smaller grants to support the upkeep and maintenance of historic properties will also be considered, and up to €2,000 of the county allocation may be reserved for this purpose (subject to applications received). The Historic Structures Fund focuses on caring for and restoring historic structures and buildings for the benefit of communities and the public. Please note applicants cannot avail of funding under both the Historic Structures Fund and the Built Heritage Investment Scheme in the same year.



Cllrs discuss submissions on draft speed limit bye-laws

The submissions on the Draft County Wicklow Road Traffic Speed Limit Bye-Laws were discussed at December's Greystones Municipal district meeting.

Out of 257 public submissions 158 were from people in the Greystones District. Almost half of these

submissions related to reducing the speed limits to a default 30km/h at schools.

Speaking after the meeting Cllr Scott said: "Implementing 30km/h speed limits around all schools within the area was a motion I tabled last year and was passed unanimously. Since then I have been engaging with

Council officials to ensure that the speed limits review would reflect this.

"This opportunity only arises every five years. Talking to constituents it seemed an ideal time to act on improving the roads around our schools, particularly as many people told me their concerns about drivers speeding at school collection times. It seems obvious but statistics show us that lower speed limits dramatically reduce the number of people killed and reduce the severity of injury.

"So it seems common sense to make roads safer where children are going to and from school. The feedback from Council officials was very positive. They are working now on how to make these changes. On some roads it may be appropriate to introduce periodic speed limits, on others the change may be permanent. I look forward to pushing this through the next stage of the process and see the area around our schools become a safer more attractive place to be.

Up to €4m available for heritage projects

The Heritage Council is now accepting applications to a number of its funding schemes, offering up to €4m to support heritage-related projects across the country. The four schemes are:

Up to €1m will be allocated in 2023 to this scheme, which aims to foster a stronger heritage sector through the support and development of organisations that provide vital heritage services to communities and professions. The scheme is open to not for profit, non-governmental organisations with a demonstrated national relevance working in the heritage sector in Ireland. Grants of up to €60,0000 will be made available to organisations to support their operational costs. The deadline for applications to this scheme is 16th January 2023 at 5pm.

Heritage Stewardship Scheme

Up to €500,000 will be allocated in 2023 to this scheme. Running for the first time in 2022, the scheme supports the work of staff with responsibilities for heritage programmes in State agencies, local authorities and third level institutions. This includes stewardship of and access to collections, archives, buildings, monuments, and habitats. The deadline for applications to this scheme is 16th January

Historic Towns Initiative

In support of the Town Centre First: a policy approach for Irish towns (2022), the Historic Towns Initiative (HTI) is a joint undertaking by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and the Heritage Council, which aims to promote the heritage-led regeneration of Ireland's historic towns. The initiative, which is administered by the Heritage Council, is open to local authorities only. Up to €2m will be awarded to a number of historic towns for heritage-led urban regeneration projects in 2023. The deadline for applications is 2nd February 2023 at 5pm.

City and County Heritage Plan Funding

Since the local authority Heritage Officer Programme started in 1999, the Heritage Council has provided annual support for projects in each county that have been identified within County Heritage Plans or through the County Heritage Forum. Up to €37,500 will be available to each local authority with a heritage officer in 2023, with additional funding of up to €20,000 towards a Community Archaeologist Programme in seven counties. This scheme is open to local authorities only. The deadline for applications is 23rd January 2023 at 5pm.

The Irish Architecture Foundation (IAF) is reminding community groups and local architects in Co Wicklow that they have until the 16th of January to submit joint projects for improving aspects of their local town or village under its new Reimagine 'Hometown Architect' nationwide initiative.

The open call is inviting community groups to plan and submit a project in partnership with an architect who has a connection to their town or village in Co Wicklow. The architect can either be currently living in the town or village, have grown up there, or have family in the locality.

'Hometown Architect' projects should focus on town centre regeneration and align with the Town Centre First Policy published by the Irish Government earlier this year. This policy aims to promote the regeneration of town and places to live, work and enjoy.

Five successful proposals, chosen from the village centres across Ireland, and to create total submitted nationally, will receive town centres that function as viable, vibrant €10,000 each in funding, to put towards and attractive locations for people to live, work and visit.

Commenting on the deadline reminder for the open call, Bernardine Carroll, Engagement Manager, IAF Reimagine, said: "Christmas and new year brings people back to their home towns, and it's a time when local communities bring these towns to life with gatherings, activities and lighting. This is a great opportunity for communities, groups and architects in Wicklow to take a fresh look at their town or village to see what could be improved, energised and transformed to make them better

Finding archival homes for Church of Ireland primary school records

A Policy for the Appropriate Custody of Primary School Records is now in place to guide Church of Ireland primary schools and their Patrons in how to best keep and share archived information about their work and service to their communities, with the assistance of archivists in local authorities.

The policy was produced by the Representative Church Body's Library, under the authority of its managing Library

and Archives Committee. This has followed lengthy discussions with all organisations involved, and in consultation with the Secretary of the General Synod Board of Education. It will be particularly relevant for schools in the Republic of Ireland. The Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI) takes in all school records for schools located within its jurisdiction.

The five-page document has been produced with the aim of promoting awareness about the importance of primary school records and their value for historical research. The advice it contains seeks to assist School Patrons and Boards of Management with guidance about the historical value of primary school records and ensure that they take the correct steps to arrange and safeguard these materials. This is particularly relevant where records have ceased to be used in the day-to-day administration of a school. or in circumstances where a school is due to close or has already closed.

The school records of any primary school in the State belong to the Board of Management or Patron responsible for that school, with the Board of Management making decisions about what records should be retained for the historical record. Many would have a unique value which may be required for reference for a variety of legal, educational, historical and social purposes in
