111 vacant social homes returned to active use

Figures released last week show Wicklow County Council brought 111 vacant social homes back into active use under the Voids Programme, recouping €1.221m from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage through the Voids Programme in 2022. The Voids Programme support local authorities in preparing vacant homes for re-letting.

Nationally in 2022, 2,307 vacant social homes were brought back into active use in 2022 under the Voids Programme. This is just above the anticipated figure of 2,273 vacant social homes, indicating that the intensive work in 2020 and 2021 by local authorities in this area has reduced the number of vacant social homes

Making more efficient use of existing housing stock is a key action in the Government's Housing for All plan. The Voids Programme builds on the ongoing work to tackle vacancy and dereliction and bring vacant properties into re-use for housing

The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien said: "Apart from the obvious advantages of meeting demand for social housing, the return of these 111 vacant homes in Wicklow has a positive impact on communities and avoids vacant homes becoming run down and derelict in some instances and the source of anti-social behaviour.

"Wicklow County Council seized the opportunity to bring these homes back into active use in 2022 and this will make a real difference to the lives of 111 households.

"It's important to note and welcome the fact that nationally the number of vacant programme in 2022 supported this.

In 2022, local authorities recouped almost €29 million in funding for stock improvement programmes for the refurbishment of vacant local authority-owned social housing. Of the €28.9 million, €3.6 million supported the transition to planned mainte-nance and included funding towards stock condition surveys. The number of vacant social homes that had works done to prepare them for pre-letting was lower in 2022 than in 2021 and 2020. It was always envisaged that the programme would revert to more normalised levels in 2022. The culmination of those three albums and over a decade of recording and touring, 'The Wedding Above In Glencree' is a landmark album for Daoiri; Crafted and honed over two and a half years, it is the work of a mature artist who has succeeded in taking on the challenge of recording an acoustic album that heads deep into the heart of the songs.

Job opportunities in Wicklow to grow by 20% in 2023

The number of job opportunities in Wicklow will grow by 20% in the coming year, according to a new forecast from FRS Recruitment. This follows on from the 34% increase experienced in Wicklow in 2022.

Wicklow experienced one of the meant the average response rate strongest levels of growth in the country last year. Other counties to experience high increases in 2022 included Dublin (up 36%), Clare (up 31%), Sligo (up 15%), Cork (up 15%) and Roscommon, which recorded the highest year on year increase with the number of roles more than doubling (up 101%).

18 of the 26 counties in the Republic experienced an increase in openings in 2022. The largest decreases came in Kerry (down 10%), Leitrim, (down 9%) and Louth (down 7%).

Nationally the number of job postings handled by FRS casting further growth in IT, con-Recruitment rose by 32% in 2022, struction and healthcare recruitreaching a total of 107,802 - up from 81,528 in 2021. Year on year the monthly increase was across 11 of the 12 months and illustrated the return of the market to post FRS Recruitment's '2022 Review and emic normality, with the level and 2023 Trend Forecast' Report. of jobs aligning with 2019, the last pre Covid year of activity.

Despite the surge in opportunities available, the number of people applying for jobs was down last year.

Significant growth was also recorded in arts, entertainment and recreation (up 43%), education & training (up 31%) and professional services & practices (up 25%).

The analysis is contained in Speaking about the report, Lynne McCormack, General Manager with FRS Recruitment said, "We are confident that we will see further growth in recruitment opportunities in Wicklow for the year ahead. We experienced a good year

"Both in Wicklow and nationallv we believe there will be strong opportunities in the IT, healthcare and construction sectors. There hasbeen such a build-up in openings across these sectors over recent years that they have become relatively inelastic and that will continue throughout 2023. Not all parts of the economy will rise in 2023, but we are very optimistic about the prospects in those particular sectors.

"Another trend we saw in Wicklow and across the economy last year was that the level of applications did not keep up with the number of openings. With the economy reaching a 20 year low for unemployment and nearing full employment, this impacted the market. For some high demand sectors it became a candidateís market. This, coupled with the rising cost of living, meant significant pressure on salaries in some high demand sectors over 2022. With the economy likely to be less buoyant in the next year, we expect this pressure will diminish as candidates in Wicklow and nationally focus more on job secu rity and work life balance consid-erations," Ms. McCormack concluded.
