Times **Wicklow RNLI undergo intensive** casualty care training

Getting their lifeboat to a casualty and getting them home is the basis of what Lifeboat volunteers do, but when they have an ill or injured person to care for what kind of training do they have for that?

A group of eleven Wicklow RNLI volunteer crew took on the challenge of learning the skills, procedures and techniques required to pass the RNLI's rigorous Casualty Care training course. They gave up approximately 30 hours of their time over the course of two weeks to enable them to successfully complete the training.

Wicklow RNLI were delighted to welcome Stephen O'Flaherty RNLI Casualty Care Trainer to the station to conduct the training

"The course is designed to enable our crew to provide correct and effective care to a casualty until such time as they can be handed over to the expert care of paramedics or doctors," said Wicklow RNLI.

"Sometimes the care given takes place in hostile and unrelenting conditions adding an extra layer of complexity to the training

required by our volunteers. The training revolves around hands on practical applications rather than concentrating on complex theory. The RNLI employ the use of check cards to assist its volunteers in carrying out the proper care. This allows the crew to concentrate on the practical application of Casualty Care without having to try and remember complex procedures in the middle of a difficult rescue

"During the training each crewmember must pass practical and written assessments to demonstrate their own individual skills. The final part of the assessments

involves the crew members working in pods together to asses and treat a casualty in a practical scenario.

"The Casualty care course goes beyond basic first aid and gives our crew the confidence to know that when the time comes, they are well prepared to deal with whatever illness or injury comes their way."

Wicklow RNLI Lifeboat Operations Manager Mary Aldridge said "I would like to thank Stephen for the training he provided and to the crew who gave up their valuable time. Training like this is what allows us to Save Lives at Sea."

Greystones needs an artistic hub'

A group of well-known artists has proposed a multifunctional space in Greystones for artistic expression such as workshops, education, an exhibition and gallery facility, creative programming and engagement with the community.

Supporting the proposal, Cllr Derek Mitchell said, "There are many interested in creative arts and it needs to be fostered in the rapidly growing community. Applications open for Community Safety Innovation Fund

The Fund established in April 2021, uses money seized by An Garda Siochana and the Criminal Assets Bureau as the proceeds of crime to fund new and innovative projects to support community safety and honour the Government's commitment to building stronger, safer communities.

Speaking after the announcement, Minister Harris said, "I am delighted to open applications for the 2023 Community Safety Innovation Fund. Last year, the Government funded 22 new projects, and this year will fund even more projects, as the Community Safety Innovation Fund has been increased to $\in 3$ million. The Fund highlights the successes of An Garda Siochana and the Criminal Assets Bureau, with their hard work and success going towards building stronger, safer communities. The Fund is open to bodies involved in community safety and will work towards supporting local needs and opportunities for innovation not provided for in other funds. I want to encourage all of Wicklowís eligible bodies to apply for the fund, as it will provide grants ranging from $\notin 20,000$, all the way up to $\notin 150,000$. The deadline for applications is at 5pm on the 19th of May this year. I hope to see many applications com-ing in from all across Wicklow and look forward to seeing the innovative and exciting opportunities that this Fund provides for."



€4.5m funding package to repair Wicklow's built heritage

Minister of State for Heritage and Electoral Reform, Malcolm Noonan TD, last week announced that 95 heritage projects across the country will benefit from a total of €4.5m under this year's Historic Structures Fund (HSF), with €44,956 being awarded to two projects in Wicklow.

In addition to supporting wners and custodians of historic and protected structures to safeguard and maintain their properties, this funding will also provide a welcome boost to local construction and heritage trades by facilitating works with a total value of over €8m and generating more employment (an estimated 11,250 daysí labour), including for specialist heritage roles such as thatching and stone work.

The HSF is one of two built heritage funding schemes which work in partnership with owners and the 31 local authorities to protect our built heritage ñ a key aim of Heritage Ireland 2030, the new national heritage plan launched by the Minister last year. Last week's announce-

ment follows the awarding earlier this month of €4.5m in funding under the Department's other built heritage grant scheme ñ the Built Heritage Investment Scheme

By providing grants of between €15,000 and €200,000, the HSF assists owners of heritage structures - including those on be funded this year.

The Pure Truck is on the road every day, and since the project was established, Pure has col-lected over 3,800,000kg (3,800 tonnes) of rubbish from over 14,000 illegal dumping sites in the Wicklow/Dublin Uplands with the project process-ing over 15,000 reports. If you were to put all the rubbish that Pure has removed from the uplands into standard household rubbish bags, they would fill over 400,000 bags. If you lined up all these bags on the road, they would stretch all the way from

Dublin to Dingle. Pure has been recording and mapping every location and incident of illegal dumping in the Wicklow / Dublin Uplands since 2007 and have built up a base-line-data of all illegal dumping activity in this region, the location of dumping, type of dump-ing, landowner, and amount of dumping, and for a number of years






Film at Mermaid: North Circular (Cert:15A)

Given its potentially sensationalist and exploitative subject matter - a morbidly obese shut-in looking to do one good thing with his life before his imminent demise - it's hardly surprising that The Whale has divided critics.

No one seems to doubt the power of Brendan Fraser's performance in the leading role, or the directing, the writing, the supporting cast...

They just have a problem with a premise that might be more voyeuristic than altruistic.

That The Whale started out as a play ten years earlier with writer Samuel D. Hunter and enjoyed four major productions across the US since whilst suffering few slings or arrows suggests that having Hollywood turn its electric eye on this tale changed the perspective. Which is a shame, given that, once you get over that initial feeling that you could be watching a Channel 5 exclamation mark TV documentary, The Whale has a slow-burning emotional centre that gradually builds to a punch. Or two.

Fraser plays Charlie, a 600-pound man hiding from the world in his apartment and making his living as an English professor working online and keeping his laptop camera firmly switched off. His only companionship is Liz (Hong Chau), who's more than a nurse she's also the sister of Charlie's late partner, Alan.

Refusing to spend the money on doctors and hospitals, Charlie is moving ever-faster to an early grave, much to Liz's anger and objections. Realising he's Elvis '77 heading for Elvis '78, Charlie reaches out to his estranged teenage daughter, Ellie (Stranger Things' Sadie Sink), in the hope of reconnecting, having walked out of the family home when she was just five to be with Alan.

Throw in a young missionary (Ty Simpkins) for the New Life Church determined to save Charlie's soul, and it doesn't take long for The Whale to go Full Mamet.

It's the small details about being this big, this helpless, this frightened, this alone, that The Whale captures so well. Fraser has deservedly won two major awards for his performance already, and there's a possible Oscar on the way come March 12th.
