

The Department of Education has announced that Greystones Community College went to tender last week. The date for tender return is the 14th July 2023, providing there are no extensions

Grevstones Community College was one of the fifty-eight school projects nationwide delayed recently. Gaelscoil An Inbhir Mhoir and Gaelcholaiste na Mara, both in Arklow, Co Wicklow are also on the list. Additional schools such as North Wicklow Educate Together, Blessington Community College, Wicklow Educate Together National School and Colaiste BhrÌde remain waiting on the Department to move forward critical plans for their schools



Thousands sign petition calling for withdrawal of Magheramore planning application

A petition launched earlier this month in Wicklow in opposition to a planning application by a subsidiary of the Oakmount development company, the purchasers of twenty one acres of land near Magheramore beach, four miles south of Wicklow Town in 2021, has quickly gained over two thousand signatures.

The petition was launched by the poet Martin Dyar, who has also announced a public meeting to discuss the controversy at the An Tairsearch Organic Farm and Ecology Centre in Wicklow Town on Tuesday April 25th at 7pm.

The signatories are calling on the current owners of the land, Paddy McKillen Jnr and Matt Ryan, to withdraw the planning application. The petition also proposes that the land be sold to Wicklow County Council, so that its public access and biodiversity can be appropriately managed, and protected for future generations.

Responding to the Magheramore controversy, RTE Broadcaster Ella McSweeney wrote on social media: "It's so utterly depressing to think of private enrichment on the back of ruining this exceptionally beautiful, tranguil and ecologically important site which is currently there for all to enjoy.'

The acclaimed Wicklow poet Jane Clarke, a regular visitor to Magheramore, has said: "We need nature for our own survival but nature will not survive unless we protect it. I was a proud citizen when in May 2019 the Dáil declared a National Climate and Biodiversity Emergency; that declaration is rendered meaningless if we are powerless to prevent the destruction of yet another precious habitat."

She added, "From my first visit to Magheramore over thirty years ago I have known it as a haven for both people and wildlife. In this small area of land and beach a wide range of birds, wildflowers, bees and butterflies thrive.'

widely praised in 2021 for their effort known as 'the avenue' and appears on to acquire the land for conservation, when they bid 500,000 in a BidX1 auction which received national attention. The initial asking price had been 200.000. Mckillen Jnr and Ryan were successful with a bid of **1700.000**

Two previous developers who wned the land failed to develop it, with the ecological richness and vulnerability of Magherabeg Special Area of Conservation (SAC) presenting an insurmountable planning obstacle in both cases.

The planning application submitted this month by a newly formed called Oakmount company Creatively Pacific Ltd., outlines a forty million euro budget for a 'boutique resort', with an eighteen-month construction period.

A cinema, swimming pool, gym, and restaurant are proposed, as part of a complex which includes forty caravan-like pods, each with a maximum occupancy of two people, placed around the headland to capitalise on views of Magheramore beach, and the famous dunes at Magherabeg to the south. The main hotel building, campaigners say, will impinge on rare tufa petrifying springs which are covered by the EU habitats directive. An ecological report submitted with the planning application acknowledges the risk of damage in multiple categories including 'habitat loss' and 'species fragmentation' and 'water quality.'

To facilitate vehicular access it is proposed to widen the half mile long tree-lined avenue that leads down to the beach, a remnant of the Lesley Wicklow County Council was Ellis estate. The lane was historically

a surveyor's map from 1840 housed in the National Library of Ireland.

The petition's signatories claim the Oakmount plans are a threat to wildlife, habitats, and heritage, Bats, kites, woodpeckers, and seals will be negatively impacted or displaced, the petition states. The fact that Magheramore is a renowned wintering ground for curlews has been also emphasised.

Martin Dyar has remarked: "The curlews are a major prize for the people of Wicklow. Every year Magheramore gets four months of unearthly music, and daily sightings of a bird that has come back from extinction more than once. We should realise that miracles of this kind are good for tourism, just as it should be remembered that ecosystems are the mothers of economies. The fact that curlews are not mentioned in this planning application could be viewed as sinister, but it is also another example of the developer's distance from the locality. Theirs is an imagined planet."

Asked why he thought the objections have been so widespread and so quick, Dyar said: "I think it's partto do with trust. It's clear that habitat bashing for unsuspecting visitors is not a credible answer to Wicklow Town's lack of hotel beds. It's also clear to those who have read the plans that convenient public access to the beach will be lost permanently, whatever people are expected to believe.

"But there is also a keen sense of ecological responsibility mixed in with the expressions of anger towards the developers. We are in a

fresh phase of history, which despite being wartorn and doggedly unequal, offers us a new understand ing of our relationship to the natural world. Everyone knows we need to accelerate into a more widespread defence of biodiversity. Ireland will soon appoint a national team of biodiversity officers. Wicklow will have, to borrow a phrase from the CEO of the Heritage Council, its own 'permanent voice'. That person will have an education mandate and they will find themselves surrounded by willing and informed communities

"But I think, at root, we're seeing an expression of love for animals and landscapes. The love comes out as activism and resistance and people power.'

The proposed resort has also been viewed as a significant loss to the Irish film industry. Dyar concluded: "The most recent buyers of the Magheramore lands have a battle on their hands. They and their partners are effectively standing on sacred ground."

It's expected that the completed development will facilitate a vibrant rural tourism offering and will employ approximately 160 people throughout the year.

It's stated in the planning application by the promoters of the development that the existing pedestrian access for the public to Magheramore beach will remain unaffected. The planning report accompanying the application states "it was imperitive to the applithat cant that the community benefit from this development just as much as the tourism industry. For this reason, the development includes a complete enhancement of the current access pathway to the beach, a cleaner and safer beach, as well as innovative surf facilities to replace the old shipping container currently in use at the beach and the addition of vital facilities inclusing WC, showers and a defibrillator.

The report, by Manahan Planners, further states that "the applicant has appointed a team of experts in their

respective fields to ensure that the proposed tourism development respects and protects the amenity of Magheramore beach and the surrounding area [...] protects and enhances the ecological biodiversity, landscape quality and amenity of Magheramore beach and the surrounding area [...].

"It is submitted that the proposed development will provide a high quality, sustainable tourism and recreation facility whih is sensitive to the character and distinctiveness of Magheramore beach [...] Iti is evident that the proposed development has been carefully and strategically designed to capture all that the scenic location has to offer without unduly detracting from the characterof the landscape. The seni landscape that the proposed development is surrounded by is a vital part of the design in itself."

The patients had borrowed significant amounts of money to have the treatment but received no reimbursement.

The Ombudsman's report also contains recommendations in relation to two other schemes: the Treatment Abroad Scheme and the Northern Ireland Planned Healthcare Scheme a scheme brought in to provide for treatment in Northern Ireland following Brexit.

A small number of recommendations are relevant to the Department of Health. It has accepted these recommendations.







Filmmaker Paddy Slattery has dozens of Ireland at the Paralympic Games in Tokyo and to help our friend Galen get a racing handbike. Galen was training for the Ironman in Australia when he was involved in a cycling accident that left him paralysed from the chest down. One of the unseen impacts of being in a wheelchair is your world shrinks but the handbike has been a life saver.

Handbiking has opened up incredible opportunities to travel across Europe to do incredible events like the Berlin and Rome marathons. It is also incredibly good for both the mind and body. Unfortunately, like most specialised equipment for people with disabilities it is very expensive. Galen has been training hard with the aim of getting to a level to race but he will need the right equipment to make it happen.




