'A tsunami of surrenders'

Plight of Wicklow dog rescues highlighted in The Dail

Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore highlighted the pressures on dog rescues in County Wicklow in the Dail last week and called upon the Government to act swiftly in delivering promised dog welfare legislation.

Deputy Whitmore was speaking loved animals are being surrenon a dog welfare motion where she took the opportunity to highlight the alarming increase in the number of dogs being surrendered in the county and emphasised the urgent need for comprehensive legislative measures to protect these vulnerable animals and prevent the overbreeding of puppies

through unregulated breeders.

Deputy Whitmore said "The escalating number of dog surrenders in Wicklow has reached a crisis point, placing an overwhelming burden on local dog rescues. These organisations, which work tirelessly to provide shelter, care, and rehoming services, are stretched to their limits as they struggle to cope with the surge in surrendered dogs. Many factors contribute to this alarming trend, including changing family circumstances, financial strains, and behavioural challenges. The recent lifting of the eviction ban has also seen an increase in dogs being surrendered as many rentals do not accept pets, meaning many much-

dered.

"This has resulted in rescues in the county being full to capacity, with one rescue saying that they received 28 calls yesterday alone from owners wishing to surrender their dogs."

Deputy Whitmore underscored the urgency of the situation and called on the government to fulfil its commitment to introducing comprehensive dog welfare legislation to deal with the issue of puppy farming and overbreeding in particular.

"The large number of dogs

being surrendered in Wicklow is deeply concerning, and those working in the rescues are at breaking point. They care deeply for these animals but are unable to cope with the tsunami of surrenders. It is imperative that the government delivers on its promise to bring forward dog welfare legislation through the Dail, providing a robust framework to safeguard the rights and well-being of these ani-

Deputy Whitmore believes that comprehensive legislation is crucial for regulating dog breeding practices, setting welfare standards, and promoting responsible ownership. By enacting such legislation, the government can help prevent the abandonment and mistreatment of dogs, ensuring they are treated with the care, compas sion, and respect they deserve.

Deputy Whitmore also asked that those wishing to take in a family pet look in first instance to local rescues as there are so many lovely animals waiting for their forever home. Having just rehomed a dog herself from Wicklow Animal Welfare in Rathdrum, she believes that oftentimes rescues are overlooked as families don't believe that they could get a suitable dog through a rescue. However, Deputy Whitmore said "Wicklow has many fantastic

rescues with dogs of every breed, shape and size ready for a new home. I have just rehomed my third dog from a rescue and I can safely say that the love you get from a dog that was rescued cannot be matched. They innately know that they are lucky to find their new family and repay that a thousand-fold. So, if you are looking, please consider checking out some local rescue pages. I think you'll be surprised how quickly you see the dog that is perfect for your family.'

The bikes were launched on Monday 15th May to mark National Bike Week. The bikes can be used by staff to make local work trips in and around the town of Wicklow and Rathnew. The aim is to promote active travel amongst staff and reduce the number of car journeys made by staff.

Almost 74 per cent of all journeys in Ireland are made by car and while car usage may be necessary for many journeys there is a great opportunity to shift to more active travel options for shorter ones.

Seventy per cent of journeys are less than 15 minutes in length, with an estimated 20 per cent of the total being no longer than 2kms. The statistics demonstrate that there is huge scope to reduce car dependence and the associated greenhouse gas emissions by switching to active travel options such as walking and cycling.

Cyclists want safer access to N11

Bray Wheelers have reached out to councillors from the Bray and Greystones Municipal Districts regarding the need for safer cycle access to the N11 from Willow Grove.

Bray Wheelers believe this approach road is an accident waiting to happen and have suggested a cycleway with a separate contraflow on the oneway portion of the local access from Junction 10.

Cllr Derek Mitchell however believes this suggestion to be 'dangerous'

'Vehicles already do not have an adequate turning circle and sometimes move from the slip road lane into the main carriageway because of this," he said. "This proposal would make this worse. Also they do not have visibility of the downhill road as they would have to crane their necks 180 built to connect Willow

Fundraiser to help family complete home following father's hospitalisation

The family and friends of Wicklow man Aidan Losack have begun a fundraising campaign as Aidan recovers from a severe illness which nearly took his life.

The father of two was working on a house that he's been building for him and his family, when a dog bite on March 8th resulted in septic shock. Aidan had to be rushed to ICU, almost losing his life.

During this life threatening emergency, two weeks later Aidan had a bleed to the brain. He was rushed to Beaumount hospital for emergency life saving surgery. After this, he spent two weeks in an induced coma. Since coming out of the coma, his progress has been slow. Aidan has not been able to regain full consciousness or physical movement. The medical professionals cannot be certain what his recovery pathway will look like, psychically or cognitively. Aidan will be in hospital or rehabilitation for at least 6 months or up to a year, the doctors cannot give certainty around this which is causing distress for his immediate family. Jeannie is travelling to the hospital seeing Aidan for over the past 2 months



Over the last two years Aidan has built their house to the stage of roof and windows being fitted, laying the blocks solely by himself. The week before Aidan got critically ill, they were at the final stages of mort-

gage approval. Their family's lifelong dream to build their own home was about to be fulfilled. Since this life threatening incident, Aidan cannot finish the house build and Jeannie cannot get mortgage approval on her own.

Deep concern over findings of report on young people's mental health services

findings of the Ombudsman for Children's report on Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS).

The findings are based on a major survey of 2,166 young people aged 12-17. The survey conducted by Red C Research asked them if they experienced mental health challenges, what the reasons were, and what supports they availed of, and what they believed is needed to address the mental health needs of young people.

The report found that 78% of children rate their mental health as not good or sometimes low/stressed/anxious. That the "These figures are wholly unacceptable." top five causes of mental health difficulties for children were pressure in school (74%), body image (65%), friendships or relationships (61%), social media pressure (48%) and bullying (47%).

A staggering six in ten children who attended Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) in the past year had difficulty accessing the service. A total of 42% who accessed CAMHS said the service they received didn't help with their

Reacting to the rport, Deputy Brady, Sinn Fein spokesperson for Equality, Youth, and Integration said, "I want to first off commend the young people who took part in this important survey and the Ombudsman for Childrenis Office which commissioned and published the survey. I believe that this report provides an important insight into how the Government is failing to provide for the needs of young

"However, I am deeply concerned at the

They represent an indictment of a government which has neglected the needs of children and young people. The report by the Ombudsman for Children reveals huge shortcomings in services for young people. 12,000 are waiting for access to psychology services. We have a Minister for Health here in Wicklow who has serious questions to answer in respect of the failure of the government to address these failures

"Minister Stephen Donnelly needs to do

health needs of teenagers. I am calling on all of the government TDs here in Wicklow to give a commitment to tackle these fail-

The Government must act immediately to address the range of issues identified in the Ombudsman for Children's 2022 report, according to Deputy Whitmore, the Social Democrats' spokesperson on children.

"The report, based on over 1,800 complaints received last year, confirms that children across the country continue to be failed by the State on multiple levels," she

"It is clear from the reportís findings that Ireland is starting to fall behind when it comes to childrenís rights, with concerns across a range of areas, including education, poverty and mental health.

"Serious shortcomings in Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) are again highlighted. This comes just weeks after a survey published by the Children's Ombudsman revealed that six in ten children experienced difficulties



accessing CAMHS, with almost 12,000 now waiting for primary care psychology

"The Children's Ombudsman, Dr Niall Muldoon, should be commended for his excellent work and dedication to child welfare issues. However, he deserves action, not platitudes, from the Government.

"The Taoiseach previously said he wants Ireland to be the best country in Europe in which to be a child. He also vowed to set up a child poverty unit within his depart-

"We are growing tired of these headline grabbing statements. The Government needs to act on Dr Muldoon's findings and ensure that this report does not end up on a shelf like previous ones.

Positive children's mental health discussion takes place at The Whale



Positive momentum continues for Housing For All

Q1 2023 completions highest since records began

Housing for All contains a projected housing output of 29,000 new homes in 2023 and 33,450 in 2024. The latest new home completion figures for Q1 2023, published by the CSO show progress in reaching those targets.

CSO figures show 6,716 new homes were completed in the first three months of this year, representing a 19.1% increase on the same quarter in 2022.

"This is really strong progress from Housing For All and Iím delighted that the positive momentum thatis now behind Housing for All is continuing," said Wicklow Senator Pat Casey.

There were 3,092 scheme dwelling completions in Q1 2023, up 10.1% from Q1 2022, with 1,197 single dwellings completed, up 7.7% from Q1 2022. Completions increased by 41.0% for apartments from 1,721 in Q1 2022 to 2.427 in O1 2023.

Senator Casev said, "Housing targets were exceeded in 2022 and with the current progress for this year it looks likely targets will be hit again. It's imperative Housing For All delivers for people across the country and Minister O'Brien's plan is now bearing fruit. This is evident in the strong

completion figures released by the CSO which show a nearly 20 per cent increase for quarter one of 2023 with over 6,500 homes completed.

The latest commencement notice data show that 7,349 homes commenced on-site in the first three months of 2023. This is the highest Q1 commencement

level of activity since records began in 2014.

There is also a strong pipeline of social and affordable housing, with over 19,000 social homes at various stages of construction and over 2,700 more

affordable homes already approved for funding.
