It serves as a benchmark, providing focus and direction. Reaching a target is certainly an achievement, but it should not be perceived as the endpoint or a reason to stop progress.
"It is daft that reach-

ing a housing population target becomes a sole reason to refuse the delivery of more homes during a housing crisis. If we were to reach our climate change targets before 2030 in any one sector, will we stop?"

"I am strongly urging an immediate review of the population targets outlined in the National Planning Framework

Furthermore, I am calling for the modification of all existing county plans affected by this issue. This review should consider the most up-to-date population figures available from the latest census.'

"Urgent action is required to address this situation, as we find ourselves in the midst of a housing crisis, and this focus on flawed and failed population targets must changed."

Low noise materials to be used for Newtown road resurfacing

The original plans were to replace the current surface with similar material, but following representation from Brady TII committed to using low noise material in the resurfacing works.

This initiative aims to raise awareness about the detrimental effects of flushing instead of binning sanitary products on our natural environment including beaches and promote responsible waste management practices among beachgoers.

Flush" campaign, operated by Clean Coasts in partnership with Uisce ..ireann, emphasises the importance of appropriate flushing behaviour and disposal of items including wipes and other sanitary products in the bin. even if they are labelled as flushable. Only the 3 Ps, pee, poo and paper should be flushed down the toilet. When items such as wipes and sanitary products are flushed down the toilet, they can cause serious blockages in sewage systems, leading to sewage overflows and ultimately polluting coastal waters and beach-

Recognising the urgent need to protect Ireland's remarkable coastal ecosystems, Wicklow County Council has united with other coastal local authorities around Ireland in their commitment to spread awareness about the campaign and promote responsible waste disposal practices.

Under this collaborative effort, participating councils will display Think Before You Flush signage on Blue Flag Beaches, offering clear instructions on appropriate flushing behaviour, highlighting the main items people incorrectly flush down their toilets (the ëDirty Dození) and encouraging visitors to use designated sanitary

Each participant received a goodie bag and each primary school received a small prize to acknowledge their









One way to help them is to get more tourists visiting the area. A key part of this strategy must include the Cliff Walk. The current Cliff Walk Management Committee exists in name only."

Cllr Joe Behan and Cllr Stephen Stokes highlighted the need for forward planning. Cllr Behan noted: "The pace of change has been slow, but eventually we expect the current issues to be resolved. We need to consider a strategic plan to harness the potential of the Cliff Walk. This can be tied in with the proposed East Coast Greenway. People will be able to walk from Bray to Wicklow Town, with stops in Greystones, Kilcoole or Newcastle. As such we need to breathe new life into the Cliff Walk Management



"Staff in the test centres are trying their best and are under huge pressure but it appears that systemic issues outside their control are contributing to the backlog. The Department of Transport must work with Applus to ensure staffing and equipment resources needed to get through this backlog are put in place. "What is most frustrating is that I have raised this issue before. In January we saw similar wait times and we were assured by the government that sanctions imposed on the provider Applus would help curb these lists but they have not."

New exemption makes it easier to store bikes in front gardens

Wicklow bike owners will find it much easier to put a bike shed in their front or back gardens after Wicklow Green Party TD Steven Matthews, the Green Party spokesperson for planning and local government, drafted a new exemption which would remove the requirement for bike storage units to receive planning permission within certain limits.

This would remove the burden of unnecessary regulation and make it easier for more people to take up cycling. Deputy Matthews said, "The exemption would cover structures solely intended for the storage of bicycles or 'personal powered transporters (e-scooters and e-bikes)' with an approximate floor area of 4 metres squared and an approximate height of 1.2 metres, as long as they are appropriately screened or finished in keeping with the character of the house or street."

Deputy Matthews explained why he is proposing this exemption: "To tackle the climate crisis. we need to do everything we can to encourage

switch to green transport such as cycling. Cycling is a fantastic way to cut carbon and improve your health, so we should not put unnecessary barriers in peopleís way. If someone wants to install a small and discreet bike shed, they should not get bogged down in bureaucracy or held back by red tape. We need to be flexible and work with people to achieve a sustainable soci-

Last year, An Bord Pleanala ordered the owner of a house in Clontarf to remove a bike storage unit in their front garden as it did not have planning permission. This exemption would eliminate this kind of excessive over-regulation which only makes it more difficult for people to cycle.


