

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly also welcomed the decision to green light work on the bus corridor. Minister Donnelly said: "I'm delighted that the much needed N11 Bus Priority scheme is to proceed. This is an issue I have campaigned on before being elected to Government as it is of the utmost importance to enhancing the quality of life in our county. At the moment the N11 is carrying on average 70,000 vehicles a day which it simply wasn't designed to cope with.

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'Plan B needed for firefighters'

Sinn Fein TD John Brady last week accused the government of once again letting down the Retained Fire Service and its members, while Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore said the Government needs a plan B if retained firefighters reject the Labour Court proposals.

Deputy Brady was speaking fol- ernment - they need to be paid SIPTU members. SIPTU, who have been representing the Retained Fire Fighters in their dispute with the government at the Labour Court, is to recommend that its members reject proposals brought forward by the Labour Court

Deputy Brady said: "I am extremely disappointed that the government continues to lack the political will to grasp the opportunity to address the core issues at the heart of the recruitment and retention crisis in the Retained Fire

"Through my ongoing engagement with members of the National Retained Firefighters Association (NRFA), I am very aware that the core issues in this crisis centre around work-life balance, and that they are resolute on what needs to be done to address the recruitment and retention crisis.
"SIPTU has begun the process

of balloting members in relation to industrial action. SIPTU have recommended that members of the Retained Fire Service reject the proposals, and likewise individual fire fighters have expressed dismay at the governmentis failure to address key issues

"Retained Fire Fighters deserve more than 'respect' from this gov-

lowing the announcement that properly. Retained Fire Fighters should not be dependent on social welfare to make up their wages or put food on the table.

"Minister Darragh O'Brien, and Minister for Public Expenditure Paschal Donohoe, have failed to step up to the plate and end this dispute with a credible offer genuinely designed to address the core pay issues in the Retained Fire

"If the government continues to fail to act, it will be responsible for the likely recommencement of industrial action by fire fighters, who had previously voted in over-whelming numbers in favour of industrial and strike action but put that on hold pending the conclusion of the Labour Court hearing.

"Minister O'Brien must secure agreement with DPER to ensure that retained fire fighters receive the fair deal from this government that is long overdue.'

Speaking last week, Deputy Whitmore said, "We deserve to have a functioning fire service one that respects retained firefighters and the valuable work they do. The Government must outline what steps it will take to avert strike settle the dispute are rejected by

"While I do not wish to preempt the outcome of the ballot, all the indications are that retained firefighters will accept SIPTUís advice to reject the Labour Court recommendations. This could lead to a resumption of suspended strike action within days.
"The feedback I have received is

that the firefighters are disappointed with the offer on the table, which they feel does not address the low retainer they are paid or the precarious elements of their working structure, such as call-out pay-

"We are talking about workers who provide a life and death service. In my Wicklow constituency, for instance, we would not have a fire service without the commitment and dedication of retained firefighters.

"We deserve to have a functioning fire service around the country one that respects the role of retained firefighters and the valuable work they do. Former Co. Wicklow Minister and TD and current author Liz McManus was one of a delegation from Irish PEN/Pen na hEireann who attempted to deliver a letter to the Russian Ambassador at the Consulate on Orwell Road condemning the recent killing of their 'friend and colleague', Ukrainian novelist Victoria Amelina, 37, who died from injuries sustained during a Russian missile attack on a restaurant in Kramatorsk on 1st July.

The letter was drafted by members of Irish PEN/PEN na hÉireann, Fighting Words and Ukrainian Action Ireland. Speaking afterwards they said the letter was n't accepted by the official present from the Chair of Irish PEN, Catherine Dunne.

are determined to ensure that the Russian Ambassador is made aware of the extent of sorrow and anger among the writing community in Ireland at the killing of renowned Ukrainian writer, Victoria Amelina," said Liz McManus. "Victoria visited Dublin last October at our invitation and spoke at a number of events, including a major concert at Vickers Street. A young woman of great talent, she was a fine writer and human rights activist. In our letter we expressed the shock and horror that her death has caused to her Irish friends.

The incident has only served to strengthen the resolve of us in Irish PEN/ PEN na hEireann to promote the cause of Victoria Amelina. We are now embarking on a campaign in her memory.'

Amelina was engaged in investigating and recording war crimes when she lost her life as a result of the missile strike. She won the Joseph Conrad Literary Prize







Corrigan calls for urgent repair works in Enniskerry

Cathaoirleach of Bray Municipal District, Cllr Melanie Corrigan has called for urgent repair works to the Ballyman road, Enniskerry.

At last Tuesday night's Municipal District Meeting Cllr Corrigan raised the issue that now the Ballyman Road has been reopened after several months of it being closed by dunlaoirghe Rathdown Council and Irish /Water for essential works, she has been alerted by Residents on the Road about the heavy amounts of traffic and trucks using the road again.

The Road is in a bad state of repair and local residents are unable to walk safely on this road as there is no footpath on the road. Residents have said that when the road was closed to traffic they were able to walk safely and allow their children to walk and cycle it safely. 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Major animal welfare breaches for Irish **Dairy Calves**

Secret filming of Irish calves' true export journey across Europe leaving from Co. Wickow

Broadcast on 10th July, RTE Investigates - Milking It: Dairy's Dirty Secret revealed that the poor treatment of bull calves, often regarded as worthless, reflects their lowly status in the İrish dairy industry.

Made by is by RTE Prime Time presenter and former Agricultural Correspondent Fran McNulty and producer/director Frank Shouldice, it was filmed by Matt Naughton. The award-winning journalists spent over five months investigating the story, filming through calving season and interviewed a wide range of contributors.

Munster grasslands are home to autumn. over a quarter of the national herd. dairy calves are born in Ireland every year. They are born so that the cows continue to produce milk.

Around half a million of the calves born are male, many of lower grade quality aren't suitable to be reared for beef, so they are virtually

tered on farm, in meat factories or being exported as veal to mainland Europe.

The investigation shows how at some Irish mart sales animals couldn't even be given away free of charge such is the oversupply of calves at peak points in the calving season, which is for a short six-eight week period in spring and also in

The documentary showed examples of slapping, striking and kicking of animals, all prohibited by law, as well as throwing them mid-air which is regarded as a serious breach of animal welfare, Under EU regulations, sticks are not permitted for use on young valueless and end up being slaugh- calves, often regarded as worthless, is sensitive and can break, should



not be twisted or pulled yet undercover footage shows occurrences of these by mart staff, by farmers and by transporters in Ireland.

The programme also featured a recent sharp increase in baby calves being delivered for slaughter to meat processing plants. Over a seven-day period, RTE Investigates observed dozens of trucks deliver calves for slaughter to a meat plant in Co Limerick. Most were just a few weeks old. Both farmers delivering there, and the factory itself confirmed to RTE Investigates there would be no payment for the animals. According to the Department of Agriculture's own figures, close to 30,000, mostly young bull calves, were slaughtered at meat factories in Ireland so far this year.

The programme also investigates the journey taken by some of the 200,000 bull calves exported from Ireland every year to be fattened on veal farms in mainland Europe. The team visits farms in Spain, Holland and Poland, where several dead calves with Irish identification tags were found by the investigation team. The export of calves to the continent is a Ä170 million industry which see some ferries out of Irish ports carrying up to 3,000 calves in ne sailing.

RTE Investigates sets out to see how the export system works. Following a truck with Irish calves from Wicklow late afternoon, first on to Rosslare Port where with other calf transporters, some with trailers contin board the 9pm ferry for breaks.

'Families need urgent help with unaffordable back-to-school costs'

Sinn Fein TD John Brady and Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore have called on the Goernment to address the high cost for schoolbooks and back-to-school costs which families are struggling to meet.

A recent survey by the Irish arents are facing over their children's education.

Deputy Brady said, "Backto-school costs are putting huge pressure on families across Wicklow. School transport, books, uniforms and voluntary contributions can add up to hundreds or even thousands of Euros for families.

"These costs are unaffordable, and this is particularly the case as families face the costof-living crisis. Every day, parents in Wicklow have shared their concerns with me about meeting these costs.

"This survey by the Irish League of Credit Unions highlights the huge pressures families are under here in Wicklow and across the state.

"The results find that a third of families are unable to buy new shoes for their children when they go back to school in September. The figures also show that 72 per cent of parents are finding back to school costs to be a financial burden this year compared to 66 per cent in 2022.

KPMG Future Analytics on behalf of the IPI, found that the role of planning in climate action and Marine Spatial Planning are viewed as major issues in the profession.

Greater emphasis on engagement at the plan making stage and further collaboration between public and private sector planners were highlighted as key requirements over the coming years. This initiative would ensure better outcomes for developments.

The extent of legislative change is also an issue facing the planning profession. The legal system being seen as the final arbiter in planning decisions and the need to ensure the expertise and planning judgement of planners is respected were highlighted as serious challenges. The reconstituthird party objections, iudicial reviews and regular changes to the legislative framework were also among the top top-ics presenting concerns for practising planners. Many respondents feel that the planning profession is poorly understood by the public and that the system, and by association the profession, is portrayed negatively in

The backlog of planning applications pending determination by An Bord Plean·la, remains a major concern for the planning sector. This is exacerbating the housing crisis and demand for development more widely thereby undermining the function, role, and public perception of the planning profession.
