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Petition opposing junction closure delivered to Council

'The voices of local people must be listened to

Sinn Fein TD John Brady on Friday 3rd November handed in a petition with 1,853 signatories along with his own personal submission to Wicklow County Council regarding the proposed closures of vital junctions on the N11.

petition and Deputy Brady's submission opposes plans to close the Herbert Road Junction onto the N11 and to remove the round-about at Hills Garage, instead putting in place a traffic lights system in order to facilitate the Bus Priority Corridor on the N11, which he described as a disaster which will bring the whole of Bray to gridlock if the plans are permitted to go

Deputy Brady said "There is strong opposition for the traffic plans in Bray which will result in the closure of the Herbert Road Junction, and the installation of a traffic lights system at Hill Garage in place of the existing roundabout.

Wicklow property prices rise by €5,000

Property prices in Wicklow have risen by €5,000 during the quarter, according to the latest MyHome ie Property Price Report.

The report for Q3 2023 shows that the median asking price for a property in the county is now €395,000. This means prices have risen by \leq 6,000 compared with this time last year.

Asking prices for a 3-bed semidetached house in the county also €390,000. This means that prices in the segment have risen by the same amount compared to this time last year.

Meanwhile, the asking price for 4-bed semi-detached house in rate hikes. Wicklow stayed flat over the quarter at €495.000. This price is up by €20,000 compared to this time last

There were 664 properties for sale in Wicklow at the end of Q3 2023 ñ which is unchanged from the previous quarter.

The average time for a property to go sale agreed in the county after being placed up for sale now stands at three and a half months.

The author of the report, Conall MacCoille, Chief Economist at Davy, said: "The period of falling house prices we saw earlier in the rose by €5,000 over the quarter to year has come to an end, with the underlying imbalance between demand and supply providing fresh impetus to the market."

He said that housing demand had remained resilient, despite interest

"That competition for homes is heating up is evident in the 3% premium over the asking price that buyers were prepared to pay in September, up from 1% at the beginning of the year. Furthermore, in July the average mortgage approval was €298,800, up 4% on

the year, lending volumes up 18% on 2022.

He said Ireland had avoided the house price declines seen in the UK and other countries for two reasons.

"First off, the Irish economy has performed far better with employment already 12% above pre-pandemic level, an extraordinary pace of job creation. Hence, housing demand has remained robust. Second, the Irish housing market has been less liquid than other countries, so less vulnerable to the unexpected rise in ECB rates.

However, he noted that supply was still a major issue: "The figures suggest any period of catch-up for housing activity following the Covid19 pandemic is now over. Worryingly, homebuyers may have to reconcile themselves to this tighter market.

Council showcases solar car port at NOAC seminar

A solar car port project installed at Wicklow County Council's headquarters in Wicklow town was showcased at the annual Good Practice Seminar organised by the National Oversight and Audit Commission (NOAC) in Kilkenny on Thursday 26th October.

The car port is generating renewable energy and is assisting with achieving climate change targets in County Wicklow. This innovative project is the largest solar car port project in Ireland covering 107 car park spaces and circa 1600m2 at County Buildings. The 300kWp of solar panel capacity commenced energy production during the summer of 2022.

Wicklow County Council has identified the use of renewable energy and energy efficiency as a key goal in meeting the national targets and in reducing long-term energy costs in our public

buildings.

The Council is the Lead Authority for the Mid-East Energy Unit, established in December 2022 in partnership with Meath and Kildare County Councils and under the SEAI Pathfinder Programme. The Energy Unit will assist all three local authorities in achieving their combined public sector climate action ambitions.

'Roll out of e-bike scheme in Greystones could help alleviate transport issues'

Greystones could soon benefit from the roll out of an e-bike sharing scheme thanks to a recent motion by Green Party Councillor Lourda Scott.

Following a brief discussion at a recent meeting of Greystones Municipal District, it was agreed the council would explore options to bring a scheme to the area. Councillors agreed to write to the Chief Executive making the case that Greystones be considered for the next Bolt e-bike

Speaking after the meeting Cllr Scott said: "Ebike sharing schemes have been very successfully rolled out in other areas across the country such as Athlone and Mullingar, and most recently in Bray. They are a great help in encouraging people to get out of their cars and hire a bike for those short journeys. E-bikes are robust and easy to cycle."

The Green Party Councillor said that the roll out of an e-bike scheme in Greystones would help people to navigate the steep roads in the area as well as being a fun alternative to car transport.

"One of the big advantages is that e-bikes would make it much easier for people to get around our very hilly roads in Greystones and Delgany. Greystones is a rapidly growing town that desperately needs alternatives to car transport. Introducing an e-bike sharing scheme wonít solve all the problems in travelling around the area but it would definitely offer an attractive and fun alter-



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Harris urges Sea Life owners to reconsider closure

Minister Simon Harris has expressed his shock and deep disappointment at the decision by the Merlin Entertainment Group to close the Sealife facility in Bray, and has called on them to reconsider the decision.

Speaking last week after news of the closure broke over the weekend, Minister Harris said, "This has come as a real shock and surprise to residents in Bray and across our county. Sealife is an important tourism attraction in Bray and in County Wicklow and it is also an important educational hub for students from schools in the community and further afield who enjoy visiting and learning about marine life.

"This decision seems to have come as a bolt from the blue and it was widely recognised that visitor numbers were increasing again since the difficult pandemic days. These days the town of Bray is bustling with visitors and the seafront in particular is a hive of activity. Sealife has been an important draw in attracting visitors into the town and the spin off economic benefits of that are really important.

"I am also thinking of the excellent and dedicated staff and their families at this time of uncertainty. While Merlin have made their decision known, Sealife is still currently operating and I would call on Wicklow County Council, Failte Ireland and all relevant State agencies to see if they can assist in having this decision reversed. I would encourage the company to engage in a meaningful way to see if a resolution can be found. I intend to actively pursue this."

Amphitheatre performance space planned for Greystones

A grant of €250,000 has been allocated for the construction of an Amphitheatre Performance Space at the La Touche car park in Greystones. The announcement was made at the October 2023 meeting of Greystones Municipal District.

The funding is part of the Outdoor Public Space Scheme 2021, with a majority of the the funding from Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media.

The project will require a Part 8 consultation process.

Welcoming the news, Cllr Stephen Stokes stated: "Greystones needs this type of civic space, as we have tremendous local talent, which will complement the Whale Theatre. I would like to commend Michael Nicholson and Wicklow County Council for their efforts."

The funding for the project is conditional on money being spent within the next year. Cllr Stokes added: "I have been pressing for a number of improvements in this area. At the Greystones District meeting I again mentioned that the security gate can be pushed open by anyone. As such I would like to see a long term solution. We will need to factor in access for Irish Rail, who require large vehicle access."

Cllr Stephen Stokes says this is an excellent opportunity to make the area more user friendly. He noted: "Of course we still need to consult fully with local people to ensure that their views are listened to, but it seems like a positive opportunity. It has great potential to further enhance our area as a creative hub."






