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On Sunday 12th November a service was held at the County Wicklow World War One Memorial at Woodenbridge to remember the one thousand three hundred persons from County Wicklow who directly lost their lives in the Great War of 1914-18 and the many maimed and injured who lived thereafter. A wreath was laid and historian Pat Power gave a short memorial address recalling the tragic short life of John James Walker, aged 21, formerly of Kildare Cottage in Wicklow town who was killed in the Battle of Mons on August 25 1914. He was the first fatal casualty of the estimated 1,300 who directly perished in the four and a half year long conflict. After the address a minute's silence and reflection time was observed.

Zero refurbishment grants drawn down

Sinn Fein TD John Brady has called on the Minister for Housing, Darragh O'Brien, to urgently review the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant as figures show that no refurbishment grants have been drawn down in County Wicklow since the scheme opened in April 2022.

ures show that the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant scheme is deeply flawed. In the 18 months since the scheme opened no refurbishment grants have been drawn down in Wicklow. This isn't good enough. People in Wicklow affected by the housing crisis need to see an ambitious and workable plan that will deliver homes locally.

"When it was launched last year,

Minister O'Brien had not engaged with mortgage lenders. As a result, applicants were unable to draw down their mortgages or grant until issues between the pillar banks and Department of Housing were resolved early this year.

"The scheme has also been heavily criticised by applicants as the grant is paid in arrears, meaning that applicants have to front-up the money and claim the grant after the works have been completed and paid for. In many cases, tion and vacancy.'

Deputy Brady said: "These new fig- applicants in Wicklow do not have this cash up front and this is a barrier to accessing the funding. The scheme is also chronically underfunded at just \in 30 million for 2023, and a similar amount for 2024, resulting in an annual target of just over 200 homes to be brought back into use each year."

"Sinn Fein has put forward a much more ambitious proposal for bringing vacant and derelict properties back into use. Through increased capital funding to Local Authorities, we want to see up to 4000 vacant and derelict properties bought and refurbished by Local Authorities and Approved Housing Bodies for social, affordable rental and affordable purchase housing.

"We would also continue the current grant model via local authorities as set out in our alternative budget document. Government must be much more ambitious when it comes to tackling derelic-

New water bottle refilling stations approved

Two new water bottle refilling stations have been submitted and approved for the Bray Municipal District, signaling a significant step in the battle against plastic packaging waste. Cllr Rory O'Connor and Cllr Melanie Corrigan submitted this proposal, which was got the green light during the November budget meeting.

essential refilling stations are set to be at a location in Bray and in Enniskerry Bog Meadow, strategically placed to encourage residents and visitors to ditch single-use plastic bottles and opt for a more sustainable, eco-friendly choice.

Cathoirleach of Bray Municipal District Cllr Melanie Corrigan said she "delighted to see this project being approved, there is already a water station at the playground on the Seafront, but to have another strategically placed in the town will be a huge benefit to the battle to reduce single use plastics in the community.

Leas Cathoirleach of Bray Municipal District Cllr Rory O'Connor said "I believe as a council we need to make it easy for people to be sustainable

According to recent statistics, plastic packaging waste recycling rates in Ireland remain dismally low, hovering at a mere 28 percent. Shockingly, a substantial portion of plastic packaging waste is still being sent for incineration, with less than one-third finding its way into recycling programs.

Data reveals that a staggering 22 million plastic bottles are purchased in Ireland every week. These numbers alone show the need to reduce the usage of single use plastic bottles and promote facilities like water bottle refilling stations to encourage people visiting both to use reusable bottles.

Frustration at slow pace of site acquisition for Wicklow Educate **Together Secondary School**

Sinn Fein TD John Brady, while conditionally welcoming confirmation which he received from the Department of Education that the Department is conducting a site assessment exercise for Wicklow Educate Together Secondary School (ETSS), having identified a potential property, expressed concern at the length of time that the process was taking.

The school, which is currently in temporary accommodation, is under growing pressure to cope with the demands of a growing population in the Wicklow Town area.

Deputy Brady said: "While I wel-

come confirmation by the department tion increases in the Wicklow Town that progress has been made, albeit slowly, in respect of a site acquisition for Wicklow Educate Together Secondary School, I am both concerned and frustrated at the length of time that it is taking the department of Education to progress this project. The fact is that Wicklow ETSS are faced with enormous challenges.

"The school is operating at almost full capacity, with only one available classroom to meet the needs of 72 new students, who hope to start at ETSS in September 2024.

"There have been massive populaarea, which is placing further pressure on Wicklow ETSS. The school remains in temporary accommodation. It has no leaving cert specialist rooms, no computer room, or school library, and lacks adequate sporting

"The school provides for 300 families in the area, who are growing in

"The school has been waiting over five years for a new school, and it looks like they may be forced to use prefabs to cope with overcrowding. It is not acceptable at any level that the Minister for Education has left the school in limbo as the wait for the acquisition of a site for a new school continues for Wicklow ETSS.

"It is imperative that Wicklow ETSS is prioritised. The school cannot be left to cope with the limitations of its current location indefinitely.


