Wicklow Council invites applications to the Community Monuments Fund (CMF) (including virtual/) at archaeological monuments. 2024 operated on behalf of the National Monuments Service of the Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage

The closing date for applications is 4pm on 30th January 2024.

The 2024 Fund will support the conservation, maintenance, protection and promotion of archaeological monuments.

It will:

· Enable conservation works to be carried out on mon uments which are deemed to be significant and in need of urgent support

· Build resilience in our monuments to enable them to withstand the effects of climate change and

· Encourage access to monuments and improve their presentation

Local authorities, private owners, community

groups and custodians of monuments are eligible to apply under the following three streams: Stream 1 will offer grants up to €100,000 aimed at

essential repairs and capital works for the conservation and repair of archaeological monuments. Stream 2 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for

development of Conservation Management Plans/Reports that are aimed at identifying measures for conservation of archaeological monuments and improving public access.

Stream 3 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for enhancement of access infrastructure and interpretation





This means training people and giving them skills, ranging from courses in further education, qualifying employment certificates, counselling, parenting skills, and family therapy to barista training in their social enterprise cafÈ. Rise at the Cove in Grevstones is one of their facilities making a positive difference.

Additionally Tiglin operate a number of centres throughout Leinster. On the same evening as the sleepout, Tiglin at the Lighthouse in Dublin City experienced its record day, where over 450 people came in to avail of the evening service alone. Many people had to be turned away because the facility was unable to cope with such high numbers. This influx comes as a

result of the single asylum seekers who are referred to Tiglin's service and who are no longer accommodated by International Protection Office.

Cllr Stokes announced that he is not sending any Christmas cards in 2023. Instead he has made a charitable donation to Tiglin. Cllr Stokes is urging further support for homeless services. He also commended the continued efforts of Tiglin and other organisations that work closely with the homeless.

Elena has found work with Dublin-based social enterprise We Make Good, which helps vulnerable people find employment by training them in traditional skills such as sewing, knitting and metalwork.

Now living in Bray, Elena works full-time as a machinist - and her and her colleagues' work appeared at craft and design fair Gifted, which opened at the RDS on Wednesday, 6th December. "I saw the advert

online and said to myself that I had the skills they were looking for and could make the things they were mak-ing," said Elena, who previously worked as a tailor in Nicolaev, in southern Ukraine.

Fellow Ukrainian Tanya Kazatkova also works as a machinist at the award-winning enterprise, which makes t-shirts, baby wear, tea towels, kitchenware and beauty products.

She left her home city of Dnipro to escape the fighting 19 months ago with her daughter Maria, 15, and the pair now live in temporary accommodation in the capital.

"I studied fashion design for four years in Ukraine and it is something I would love to do in Ireland, but I need to improve my English first," she said.

Since it was established 10 years ago, We Make Good has employed 26 people from marginalised backgrounds, including ex prisoners
