BAD NEWS AND SOME GOOD NEWS

For those seeking to rent a home in County Wicklow last week's RTB Report brought bad news, but the Council Chief Executive brought good news to some first-time buyers.

Sinn Fein TD John Brady said that staggering 13.2% annual rent increases in Wicklow show the longer Fianna Fail and Fine Gael are in government the worse things get.

Deputy Brady called for the Government to urgently ban rent increases for all existing and new tenants. The report from the RTB showing massive increases in rents is shocking. Families, workers and young people deserve and need affordable housing and affordable rents.

"Sinn Fein's proposal to cut rents and freeze them would have prevented these massive increases in rents. In our own County of Wicklow, the average rent for new tenancies in Wicklow is now €1,584 per month. This is simply unsustainable. When will it end? Renters in Wicklow cannot keep taking these kinds of rent hikes. They need a break.

"But this Government does not care about renters. That much is clear. They tell

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us they are making an impact on housing. Unfortunately, that impact is just putting affordable housing and affordable rents further out of reach for people. No wonder so many young people who cannot afford his level of rents are emigrating.

"Government must urgently introduce a ban on rent increases for existing and new tenancy. They must also put a full month's rent back in every private renter's pocket. Government also needs to increase and accelerate the delivery of social and affordable homes, including cost rental homes, so that renters are not left at the mercy of an expensive and insecure private rental sector.

"The longer Fianna Fail and Fine Gael are in government the worse things get. Nowhere has this been

more evident than from this report that shows massive rent increases over the last 12 months. Only a change of government, a change of housing policy and Eoin Ó Broin as Housing Minister will allow us to start cleaning up the mess of decades of bad Fianna Fail and Fine Gael housing policy."

On a good news story for first-time buyers in Wicklow, Independent

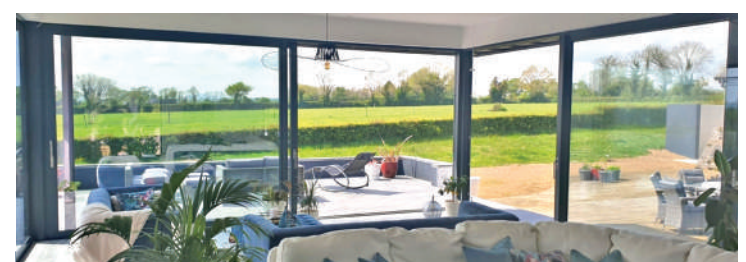
councillor Joe Behan said "I warmly welcome the news that the

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Dept of Education makes commitment on Greystones school places

Social Democrats TD Jennifer Whitmore has welcomed a commitment she received from the Minister for Education in the Dail that all children in the Greystones area will receive a first-year place in secondary school for September 2024.

This commitment was given to Deputy Whitmore during a debate on the issue, where she raised the shortage of first year places for students of the area. This shortage has been highlighted recently by the principals of the local secondary schools, when they announced that they would be offering 72 less places for September 2024 than was available for the September 2025 intake due to limitations on school building capacity. Deputy Whitmore has been calling for clarity from the Department and Minister of Education on this since early October when the shortfall became apparent.

Speaking after the debate, Deputy Whitmore said: "I welcome the commitment from the Department of Education that every child in the Greystones area will have a secondary school place made available for them. For the many parents who have contacted me and who are very concerned that their child has not been offered a place for 2024, this is an important commitment

and will go some way to alleviate their concerns. It is also welcome that the Department is actively engaged with the school bodies to deal with this issue.

"However, what we need to see now from the Department is an urgent response to this problem, and full clarity for parents as to how this shortfall in places will be resolved and when it will be resolved.

"Ultimately, parents want to know what school their child will be going to. And it cannot be the case that parents

and students have to wait months and months before this information is available. This will only cause additional unnecessary stress for everyone.

"The Department must work with urgency on this so solutions can be provided over the coming weeks. The Department must also move away from this heavily reactive mode when it comes to the provision of classrooms and class places. This shortfall should have been apparent to the Department long before now, and it should never have become this crisis

issue that it has. This causes a huge amount of stress to both the students and their parents. Having a school place is the most basic requirement of an education system and unfortunately, we have seen time and time again in Wicklow that parents have to fight for even that most simple of services.

"It is also critical that the Department expedite the school building programs for Greystones Community College, Templecarrig and Colaiste Chraobh Abhainn. All three schools are waiting for building projects to be completed, but these all appear to be taking far longer than anticipated. I made the point to the Minister that these projects must be fast-tracked, or we will be back in the same situation again for the 2025 intake."

Deputy Whitmore concluded "Finally, while the Minister's comments last night were very positive, I will continue to stay on top of this issue and advocate on behalf of the parents, students and schools in Greystones."

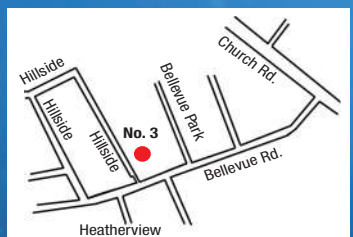

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North Beach access being restored in Greystones

The access ramp to Greystones North Beach was washed away in recent storms. Sispar Limited has said that repair works to the North Beach ramp are scheduled to commence on Monday, 4th December and continue until Friday, 8th December. It is envisaged that access will reopen on the evening of Friday, 08th December 2023.

Welcoming the news, Cllr Derek Mitchell said "This is a much used place and I am pleased it is being restored quickly."

Cllr Stephen Stokes stated: "This is good news. I have been pressing for this work, and raised North Beach coastal erosion at the full meeting of Wicklow County Council. Protecting the North Beach is vital."

Cllr Stokes called for more work to be actioned along the North Beach. He added: "The coastal erosion seems to have accelerated in recent years. A recent study of coastal erosion in Ireland talked about managed retreats. This is simply not an

ment is one part of a strategy that should be implemented."

time pedestrian diversions will be in place. Cllr Stokes concluded: "This work is need-

ed. I am pressing for more North Beach and Cliff Walk improvements as a priority."

Work begins on new DART Station at Woodbrook

Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council, Iarnrod Eireann and the National Transport Authority (NTA) last week announced that construction has now started on the new DART station at Woodbrook. The station, located between Bray and Shankill, is set to become the essential transportation hub for communities in Woodbrook and Shanganagh and will open in 2025.

Cllr Denis O'Callaghan, Cathaoirleach of Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council said: "I

am delighted to see the start of the construction of Woodbrook Station, which is located between Bray and Shankill, and is set to become the essential transportation hub for communities in Woodbrook and Shan-

ganagh. By providing this modern station, we aim to reduce the dependence on private cars and will assist us towards meeting our climate action targets. This new station will enrich the lives of residents and enhance the attractiveness of the Woodbrook-Shanganagh community for growth and prosperity."

The Woodbrook Station project is part of a larger development that will see the creation of a new residential community comprising up to 2,300 homes. As a 'Future Development Area' identified in the Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council County Development Plan Core Strategy, this project aligns with transport and land-use policies, fostering a sustainable and compact living environment for the Woodbrook-Shanganagh community. The funding for this project is provided by the National Transport Authority.

The commencement of construction was marked with a sod-turning ceremony attended by Cllr O'Callaghan; Eamon Ryan TD, Minister for Transport; Anne Graham, CEO of the National Transport Authority, and Jim Meade, CEO of Iarnrod Eireann.

Minister Ryan said: "There was a train stop here in Woodbrook on the former Dublin and South Eastern Railway so it's great that we are bringing a new age of rail back to thriving communities like this, as Iarnrod Eireann's

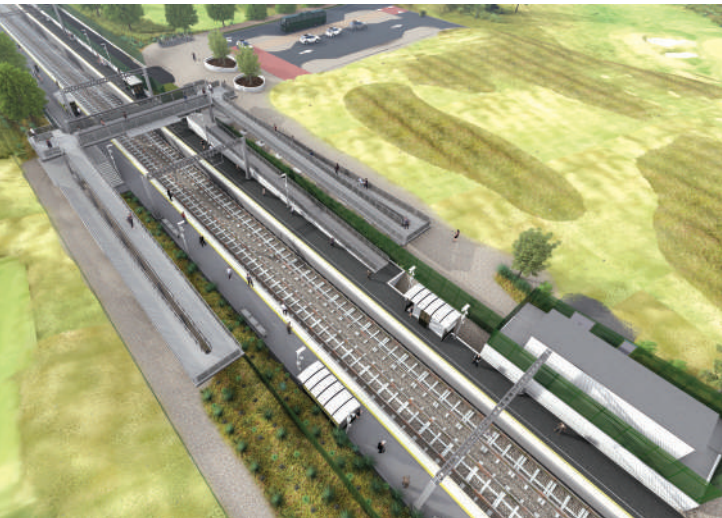


Illustration of new DART station at Woodbrook

newest DART Station. This station will be of great benefit to the local community, where new housing is also being developed. It is a good example of transport and planning working in step and a clear indication of the Government's commitment to strengthening public transport for more people. I'm delighted that construction has started and I look forward to its completion."

Anne Graham, Chief Executive of National Transport Authority said: "The commencement of construction at Woodbrook represents a significant milestone and is another indication of the real progress that is being made in developing a public transport service that will meet the transport requirements of people in the Dublin region for years and decades to come. I have no doubt that plans for investment in rail, including the

DART+ programme, will prove to be transformative for the entire region."

Speaking at the ceremony, Chief Executive Jim Meade of Iarnrod Eireann said: "This is a great day for Iarnrod Eireann as we commence construction on our 147th station on our network. The need to be more sustainable has never been more important given the climate challenges that we face. This station will serve the new and existing community with a fast, frequent, reliable and sustainable service, reducing the necessity for private car journeys."

Woodbrook Station will feature two 174m long platforms, complete with passenger shelters, seating, lighting, CCTV, customer information, bicycle parking, and ticketing facilities. A new pedestrian bridge with both ramped and stepped access will connect the station, facilitating safe

passage across the railway tracks. The design also considers future plans for improved pedestrian and cycling access routes in the station vicinity. To ensure smooth operations, modifications to the existing overhead-line equipment are necessary. Access to the station will be provided via Woodbrook Avenue, a road currently under construction.

Existing DART services are set to serve the new station with a frequency of approximately every 10 minutes in each direction on weekdays. Commuters will enjoy a convenient journey time of approximately 40 minutes to Dublin city centre.

Enabling works commenced on the station site in 2022 and included the replacement of an existing bridge deck to allow construction access and the relocation of railway infrastructure to accommodate the new station.

Dangerous Structures Notice served on Anvil owners

A Dangerous Structures Notice has been served by Wicklow County Council on the owners of the former Anvil store on Main Street Bray.

Sinn Féin TD John Brady welcomed the news, saying "Over the last number of months I have been engaging with Wicklow County Council in relation to the danger that the former Anvil store on the Main Street in Bray poses to local residents and members of the public. I welcome the confirmation that the council has now served a Dangerous Structures Notice on the owners of the property.

"The property, which has been derelict now for a number of years, represents an eye sore and a potential danger to passers-by, with store frontage and signage in a dangerous state of repair, and in danger of falling on pedestrians. Concerns have also been

raised by members of the public that the building is being used as a drug den by users in the town.

"There are specific regulations about dangerous structures. The local authority can direct that work, including the demolition of the structure and the clearing of the site, be carried out immediately if it considers it necessary. The owner of the property is required by law to make sure your property does not contain any dangerous structures. If it does, they must take steps to remedy the situation.

"Otherwise, they are liable for prosecution by the council. The immediate concern is that the building in its current state represents a danger to both pedestrians

who might be passing by and local residents. It is important that the owners take immediate action on foot of being served the notice.

"It is also a truth that our Main Street in the town is very much akin to the front door to Bray, it impacts on visitors, on shoppers, and on investors. There is a responsibility to businesses in the town to make the experiencing of and investing in business as attractive as possible. So again I call on the owners to take immediate action or I will be pushing for Wicklow County Council to use its powers under the Local Government (Sanitary Services) Act, 1964 and refer it to the courts."

Matthews secures commitment on Wicklow Town Courthouse

Green Party TD Steven Matthews has welcomed a significant step in the prospect of repurposing the courthouse, a heritage structure in Wicklow Town centre.

Deputy Matthews said, "I have been working constantly over the last three years with the Office of Public Works and the Courts Service to provide me with a construction and engineering appraisal of the old Wicklow Town Courthouse building. Whenever I asked about the old building, I was told it was derelict, dangerous and unusable but I couldn't find any evidence of reports on the building condition. I was determined to get a structural report, that would provide an idea of what works are required to bring some life and living back to this important building. I am delighted that I have gotten this agreement, and in my view, it is the most important first step towards repurposing the site."

Deputy Matthews has received a commitment from both the Office of Public Works (OPW) and the Courts Service that a structural and internal review will be carried out shortly and some immediate roof repairs, as part of a wider assessment of the whole campus.

"My initial proposal was to provide the Wicklow Towns Mens Shed with a new place to meet in the building to the rear and I hope this remains an option. When the necessary repairs, safety assessments and structural

reports are carried out, there is potential for further societal and economic benefit to Wicklow Town from the repurposing of the structure.

"It is an absolute shame that such a beautiful heritage building has been left vacant, neglected and rotting, severely detracting from the new Market Square. As with any large building refurbishment the important first step is to estimate the extent of works required to make it reusable. I was successful in having some superficial work carried out last year with painting and a general clean up to the front facade, however his latest progress is a step towards a far more substantial outcome for the site.

"Following the outcome of the engineering and structural assessment, I look forward to continuing recent talks with Wicklow County Council and the Town Team for ideas for the old building and to broadening the discussion with local councillors and other interested parties. The building has great potential, and from my work with the OPW and Courts Service, we will now have an idea of what work is needed before we progress ideas for revitalising this important corner of Market Square," concluded Deputy Matthews.

'More urgency needed to progress coastal erosion works on Wicklow rail line'

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has expressed concern at the slow pace of efforts to prevent further coastal erosion along the route of the Dublin Rosslare Rail Line that runs along the Wicklow coastline.

While the National Transport Authority (NTA) previously confirmed that coastal protection works will take place along the Dublin to Rosslare Railway line running through Wicklow, as part of the East Coast Rail Infrastructure Protection Project. Which is intended to maintain the operational integrity of the line which serves the area as a key sustainable transport artery, coastal erosion continues unabated.

Deputy Brady said: "Having been commissioned by Irish Rail to conduct detailed design and planning services, including environmental assessments and statutory submissions, for the East Coast Railway Infrastructure Protection Projects (ECRIPP), Jacobis furnished their report in June 2022.

"And the latest response which I received from the NTA offered confirmation that they are engaged in the carrying out of several surveys in the area, which will inform their work on the Rail line.

"This includes non-intrusive ecological surveys, topographic surveys, and unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) surveys, along with bathymetric surveys which are

water-based survey that maps the depth and shape of underwater terrain to illustrate the land that lies below. Following completion of which a public consultation will be carried out.

"While I welcome the confirmation by the NTA that coastal protection works will take place, along the East Coast Railway line running from Dublin to Rosslare along the coast of Wicklow, which is an important infrastructural lifeline which offers a much-needed transport hub to the region, I am concerned at the slow pace of work taking place. It is critical that this is not allowed to be delayed by bureaucratic entanglements or red tape.

"We have been waiting several years on the commencement of efforts of the necessary scale to address the impact of coastal erosion along the rail line and are still awaiting the commencement of public consultations which will precede major work. While intermediate work has been carried out, the situation along the coastline, and in particular at the Murrough in Wicklow Town is deteriorating.

"The impact of coast erosion has

had a serious impact on the integrity of the railway line. And with the advent of climate change and the further damage that we can anticipate in the years ahead. The impact of Storm Babet resulted in considerable damage to the Murrough coastal Walk in Wicklow. With large parts of the coastal walkway washed away.

"The environmental impact of global warming will pose further challenges in the years and decades ahead. If efforts were allowed to continue at the current pace, the whole coastline will end up being washed into the sea.

"The importance of this work cannot be overstated. The current Rail line carries two services, the Dublin to Rosslare line, and the DART. Both are crucial transport networks for Wicklow. There is almost 80km of the rail line running which is particularly vulnerable to climate change. The section running from Killiney through Bray and onto Greystones includes cliffside ledges and tunnels which have already undergone repairs due to erosion in the past, while the section between Greystones and Wicklow runs for some dis-

'Land attached to former Ashford Garda station could be new playground site'

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has said that the grounds attached to the former Ashford Garda Station which Wicklow County Council secured for a community centre, should be examined to see if a new community playground could also be developed there. This would be to replace the loss of local amenities following the closure of Ashford Park and playground.

Deputy Brady was instrumental in leading a campaign to have the former Garda Station transferred to Wicklow County Council in order to allow

the building to be refurbished and used by the local community as a community centre. Funding for the purchase of the building was subse-

quently secured by the Council in June 2022, which is now in public ownership.

Deputy Brady said "The closure of the former

Ashford Park and playground late last year has meant that the community in Ashford have been left without a children's playground despite an extensive search for an alternative site by Wicklow County Council. The loss of the park and playground represents a loss to the community. It represents the loss of a local focal point, and venue for children's play.

"I believe that this issue needs to be and can be addressed immediately.

The site of the former Garda Station in Ashford is now in public ownership. The station had been lying vacant and unused for almost 20 years since it was extensively damaged in a fire in 2003.

"The purchase of the former Garda Station following my campaign to bring it into public ownership for community use, means that we now have an opportunity to revamp the building into a vibrant and dynamic community center, I believe that the council

tance at a low level alongside a long shingle beach.

"We urgently need to see the allocation of sufficient funding from the government to ensure that

measures are put in place at the earliest opportunity. Climate change will not wait for the Government to respond. It will continue unabated. And it will be

the people of Wicklow who will be forced to pay the price, as we watch our coastline washed into the sea, as a result of government failure," concluded Deputy Brady.

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must also explore the possibility of building a new community playground there too. It is frustrating that 18 months after securing the funding to refurbish the old Garda Station a masterplan for the site still hasn't been completed, this would allow work to begin on the development of a badly needed community center in Ashford. The masterplan must look at the possibility of including a playground also on the site.

"The former Garda station, situated in the center of the town, and already in public ownership, offers an opportunity to avail of a ready-made solution to the areas loss. I have been in touch with Wicklow County Council to push this plan forward, and it is my hope that we will see progress in this area from the Council in the near future."

ReWild Wicklow launch tree certs and nursery

Local environmental charity ReWild Wicklow has just launched a new range of tree gift certificates in time for Christmas. It is giving the public of Wicklow the opportunity to purchase one of five types of native tree to be planted across Wicklow: Scots pine, oak, willow, rowan and hawthorn. The certificates have been brought to life by beautiful illustrations donated to the initiative by Wicklow artist Emily Robyn Archer from her Native Circles collection.

All funds raised will be used to purchase native trees and in a new tree nursery just setup by the group in Newtownmountkennedy. The nursery is located at Jacksmill Forest Gardens/Hub 13 and complements the community allotments and biodiversity reserve already on site. The group is working in partnership with NPWS to collect native tree seed from within Wicklow Mountains National Park and nature reserves such as Clara Vale and Deputy's Pass. On Saturday 18th November they had their

first volunteer day at the new nursery where 30 volunteers built raised beds and sowed over 2,000 acorns and other types of tree seed. These will be cared for by volunteers at the nursery for up to five years before being planted back out across the Wicklow Mountains, thereby giving them the best chance of surviving the grazing pressure.

"We've had a very exciting month at ReWild Wicklow," said chairperson Danny Alvey at the launch. "On Friday 10th November we were in Armagh for the IPB all-

island Pride of Place awards after a nomination from Wicklow County Council. We were delighted to be picked by the judges for a Special Award, it gave all our volunteers a great boost!

"Now we've just launched our new range of gift certificates for Christmas. This year we have increased the variety from three to five, including willow, which will be planted in river bank restoration projects, and rowan, which will be planted in Native Woodland Trust reserves. native tree nursery, to help us care for locally sourced oak and other species before they even-

One Hundred Million Trees nationwide programme kicks off new season with small forest planting in Kiltegan

The One Hundred Million Trees Project (100MT) announced the commencement of its new nationwide planting season, which started on Sunday, 19th November. With an ambitious target of planting up to 250,000 native broadleaf trees nationally this season, the project team is gearing up for a season of growth, sustainability, and impactful environmental change.

Now entering its second year, 100MT Project founder Richard Mulcahy and his brother David, say they are even more committed to ensuring 100 million trees get planted in small-forest formation at thousands of locations nationwide, throughout the coming decade.

Richard Mulcahy said "We were absolutely thrilled to meet our launch objective of planting 20,000 trees in year 1 but this year, we have much greater ambitions and aim to deliver over ten times that amount in 2024. By next April, we aim to have 200,000 to 250,000 new young native tree varieties planted in the ground at

over 75 different sites around the country. It's a huge step up but we have adapted to enable ourselves to do much more in the 23/24 planting season. We couldn't do it without the help of our loyal volunteers, our generous sponsors Uniphar Group plc and our partners at Bord Bia. Also Wexford County Council gave us great support over the past 12 months. We are also delighted this year to draw on the professional assistance of one of Ireland's leading private forestry management companies Forestry Services Ltd who will be central to our scaling up of activities.

Paddy Bruton, MD of Forestry Services Ltd and

Euroforest Ireland said "We are very excited to be involved in this project and proud to have been selected by the 100 Million Trees project team. As well as the important benefit of helping absorb CO2, this project has so many upsides in terms of improved biodiversity, landscape, water quality and providing new habitat for wildlife. It also sends a very important message to the wider public about the positive legacy they can create for future generations."

The 100MT project will be planting 17 sites in the weeks coming up to Christmas including Fairyhouse Race Course in Meath, Limerick Race Course, Glenstall Abbey, Limerick and Festina Lente in Bray.

The first site to be planted was a memorial mini forest in Kiltegan. Dedicated to the late Pat Blake, the One Hundred Million Trees Project planted on a family owned site that held special significance to Pat and

his loved ones. A dedicated nature enthusiast, Pat died prematurely in August 2022.

Pat's wife, Deirdre, has expressed her gratitude for this unique and eco-friendly memorial: "When his brother Martin suggested we plant 2000 trees for Pat, I thought this was a great idea. It really helped me with my grief because at a time of great sadness and this really gave me hope. Pat loved trees, he loved the bright greens in spring and then the autumn colours. He was born in Belfast and raised in the Troubles, so all he wanted was a peaceful life and so I would love this forest to be a peaceful place where people can just sit and just be calm and tranquil. It will also be a safe place for nature to thrive."

The One Hundred Million Trees Project encourages community members, environmental enthusiasts, and volunteers to join together in achieving this season's ambitious goal. Planting up to 250,000 trees over the coming months can only be achieved with collective effort and great dedication, but with huge spirit behind the campaign from supporters and sponsors alike, the project aims to make a very significant impact on reforestation and environmental conservation.

Arklow Wind Park could generate up to €800m and support 2,300 jobs

New socio-economic research on the potential benefits of Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 estimates an economic benefit to the Irish economy of up to €800m during the project's lifetime, of which over half a billion euro could directly benefit counties Wicklow and Wexford.

The preliminary data is contained in an independent report commissioned by SSE Renewables, which is due to be published in the new year. The report, compiled by BiGGAR Economics to support the project's ongoing development ahead of submission to An Bord Pleanála, details the national and regional benefits that the proposed 800MW offshore wind project off the coast of South Wicklow would create. The final report will be published in the coming months to coincide with the submission by SSE Renewables of a planning application to An Bord Pleanála for the project's associated offshore infrastructure.

The research has found

that approximately 2,300 direct and induced jobs would be created throughout the project's lifetime, from development and construction through to operations and decommissioning.

Upon commencement of commercial operations, Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 would create around 130 jobs, direct and induced, over its expected 35-year operational lifetime. Additionally, the wind farm would generate an economic contribution to the Irish economy of up to €19m annually, up to €13m of which would benefit the Wicklow and Wexford economies.

Overall, it is estimated Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 could generate a total lifetime spend across

national and international markets in excess of €4.8 billion, from early-stage development and construction through to 35 years of expected operations, and eventual decommissioning.

Speaking at the Enterprise Ireland Offshore Forum at Croke Park, Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 Project Director James O'Hara said: "I am delighted to share the key findings of this new socio-economic impact report today. The benefits that large scale offshore wind projects can bring to local and regional economies are well documented, but it is invaluable to have current data on the potential economic value of Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 project to the regional economy."

"The renewables industry already plays an important role in supporting rural and regional economies around the country, but as we look towards the development of the offshore wind industry in Ireland, the possible economic benefits could be transformative. The data we're publishing today on the Arklow project demonstrates that offshore wind infrastructure can play an important role in supporting job creation and delivering more balanced regional development. The data is particularly heartening, especially in light of global macro-economic challenges for the industry."

"This report will form part of our upcoming offshore infrastructure plan-

ning application to An Bord Pleanála and details the potential benefits to the regional and national economy in terms of job creation and GVA, as well as to the supply chain."

SSE Renewables is expected to submit its final planning application seeking consent for the

offshore infrastructure for Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 to An Bord Pleanála in the coming months. The leading renewable energy developer, owner and operator already holds two consents in relation to the project,

the first for the onshore grid infrastruc-

ture, including the underground cable route and substation at Avoca River Park, and the second for the operations and maintenance facility (OMF) at South Dock, Arklow Harbour.

Final delivery of Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 is subject to the project receiving planning con-

sent for the offshore infrastructure, securing a route to market, and a final investment decision. Should the project be delivered, SSE Renewables intends to administer a multi-million-euro Community Benefit Fund throughout the project's operational lifetime.

Access denied in Bray

There have been no accessibility audits carried out in Bray town for over a decade it has been revealed.

Aaron McAllorum, Social Democrats Local Election candidate recently queried Bray Municipal and Wicklow County Council in relation to accessibility audits.

The scope of the query spanned the past eight years. The freedom of information request by Mr. McAllorum was refused on the grounds that the records do not exist. However, it was disclosed that there has not been an audit of this type done since 2008.

Reacting to the revelation Mr McAllorum said: "To be honest, I am gobsmacked. It is incomprehensible that a 15-year gap in an accessibility audit exists. I was very happy to see the launch of Wicklow's first ever Disability and Inclusion Strategy recently and that Accessibility & Universal Design is a key action area."

"In order to move forward, a priority must be to undertake that accessibility audit, review it and learn

from it. The public realm belongs to everyone, but so much of it is not useable or accessible to everyone. There's a litany of examples around Bray town."

COMMUNITY MONUMENTS FUND 2024

Wicklow County Council invites applications to the Community Monuments Fund 2024, as operated by the National Monuments Service of Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage.

The closing date for applications is 4pm, 30th January 2024.

The 2024 Community Monuments Fund will invest in our valuable archaeological heritage and help the owners and custodians of archaeological monuments to safeguard them into the future for the benefit of communities and the public.

The 2024 Fund will support the conservation, maintenance, protection and promotion of archaeological monuments. It will: enable conservation works to be carried out on monuments which are deemed to be significant and in need of urgent support; build resilience in our monuments to enable them to withstand the effects of climate change; encourage access to monuments and improve their presentation.

Local authorities, private owners, community groups and custodians of monuments are eligible to apply under the following 3 streams;

1. Stream 1 will offer grants up to €100,000 aimed at essential repairs and capital works for the conservation and repair of archaeological monuments.
2. Stream 2 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for development of Conservation Management Plans/Reports that are aimed at identifying measures for conservation of archaeological monuments and improving public access.
3. Stream 3 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for enhancement of access infrastructure and interpretation (including virtual/) at archaeological monuments.

Adult learners call for equal access to 'overwhelmingly positive' educational experiences

Unequal access to public transport, on-site facilities, and inclusivity and mental health supports causing regional disparities in learners' experiences

Adult learners of all ages from Wicklow have reported overwhelmingly positive experiences of Further Education and Training, but AONTAS new Learners' Voices Across Ireland report also reveals regional disparities in learning experiences due to inequalities in public transport, facilities, and inclusion and mental health supports.

The annual research report on adult learning in Ireland was launched at the AONTAS Adult Education Summit at the Aviva Stadium in Dublin this month.

During the 2022/23 academic term, over 3,000 Further Education and Training (FET) learners participated in focus groups and online surveys nationwide. Their experiences are shared with the Education and Training Board (ETB) to inform good practices, and to ensure that learners have a say in their own education.

Addressing 200 delegates at AONTAS' 'A Window to the World' Summit, Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, Simon Harris TD said: "The power of adult

learning, especially community education, cannot be underestimated in its potential to transform people's lives. The theme 'a Window to the World', is a reminder of how adult education and lifelong learning is a crucial part of improving communities and making them more resilient. The 'Learners' Voices Across Ireland' Report is an important research project which gives learners of all ages, backgrounds and areas of FET the opportunity to share their experiences and recommendations in a solutions-focused way.

"No matter who you are or where you're from I'm committed to making sure there is access to the educational opportunity that you desire."

Also speaking at the event, CEO of AONTAS and Wicklow native,

Dearbhail Lawless said: "There are two principal narratives emerging from this year's report - that education has a hugely transformative impact on learners' lives, particularly those returning to education later in life and that issues around local infrastructure and facilities are creating inequalities and barriers for learners across the country to access, or take full advantage of, those transformative experiences.

"For many people in Wicklow, particularly those from under-resourced communities and groups that face the greatest challenges in accessing quality education, crossing the threshold of a college or training centre is a huge step, and for many even getting to the front door is proving to be the biggest barrier.

Without affordable, reliable public transport, people in rural areas and people living in poverty continue to be at a disadvantage in accessing education and training opportunities."

In addition to public

transport, learners also highlighted a need for improvement in language supports, accessibility aids, and onsite facilities such as parking, heating and canteens.

Most commonly reported by adult learners

across Ireland were the positive impacts that learning experiences and environments had on their personal health, relationships and prospects. Examples of good practice highlighted included:

* Tutors - Learners

acknowledged the quality of education, care and support provided by tutors, who were fundamental in building their confidence.

* Atmosphere - learners reported respectful treatment and positive

experiences in FET environments.

* Personal Benefits - learners reported significant improvements in self-confidence, new friendships, and a stronger sense of community, purpose and identity.

Shriya Mishra from Greystones has been presented with a Climate Ambassador Award by An Taisce.

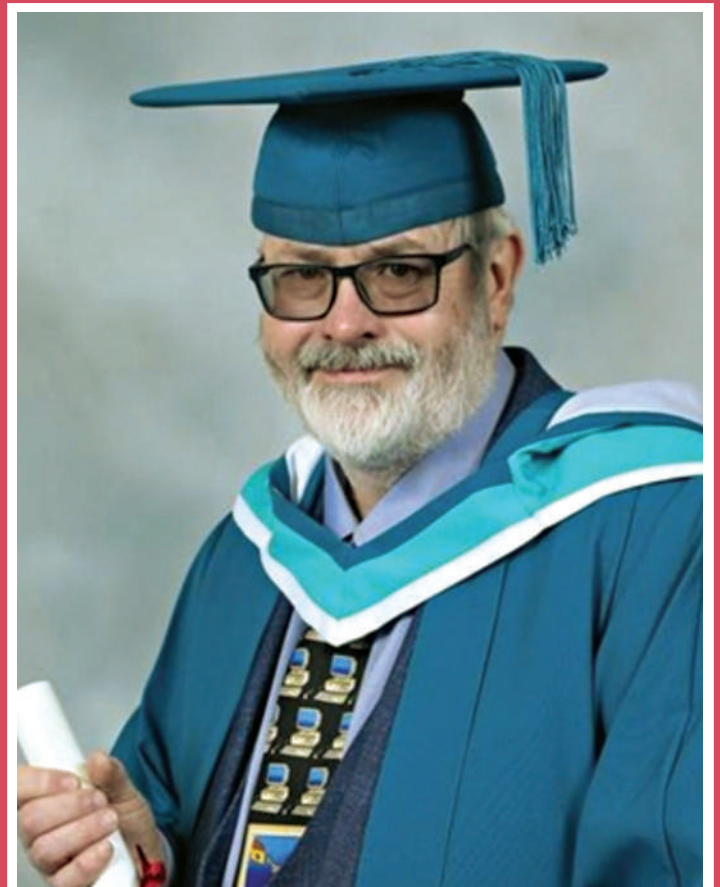
"Taking part in this programme was a huge step up for me in initiating more climate action in my local area. It exposed me to many new ideas and experiences, and I am putting these into action through a project on climate anxiety and working with various community groups to raise awareness about the co-benefits of climate action," said Shriya, a student at Dominican College Sion Hill.

An Taisce held the Climate Ambassador Awards on Thursday, November 23rd, in the Morrison Hotel, recognising the tremendous effort and dedication demonstrated by volunteers throughout the year. Each Climate Ambassador received a certificate and some sustainable gifts, with an additional ten awards presented to secondary school students, PhD students, a podcast duo, farmers market organisers, Tidy Towns volunteers, and employees from PwC, Vyra, and Microsoft.

In 2023, Climate Ambassadors completed 331 climate actions, directly engaging over 710,000 people, creating 2,013 climate communications, reaching an estimated 4.6 million people!

Climate Ambassadors receive training at the start of the year in climate science, solutions and communications which enables them to carry out climate actions. Throughout the year they are asked to undertake four key tasks in two climate communications and two climate actions, though many participants achieve a lot more. Out of 179 citizens, Hilda O'Grady from Kinvara, Galway, received the Climate Ambassador Award for going above and beyond.

Shriya Mishra from Greystones, has been heavily involved with the GLOBE citizen science air quality campaign for NASA, and she has also completed a project on climate anxiety. Pursuing many ideas all at once, this young Climate Ambassador has boundless energy from making pencil pots out of magazines, to presenting at European conferences, and having climate conversations with her elected representatives. She has sourced free trees from the local council, organised a nature walk, presented to peers at the local library and secured a grant for a bee garden and pond at school.

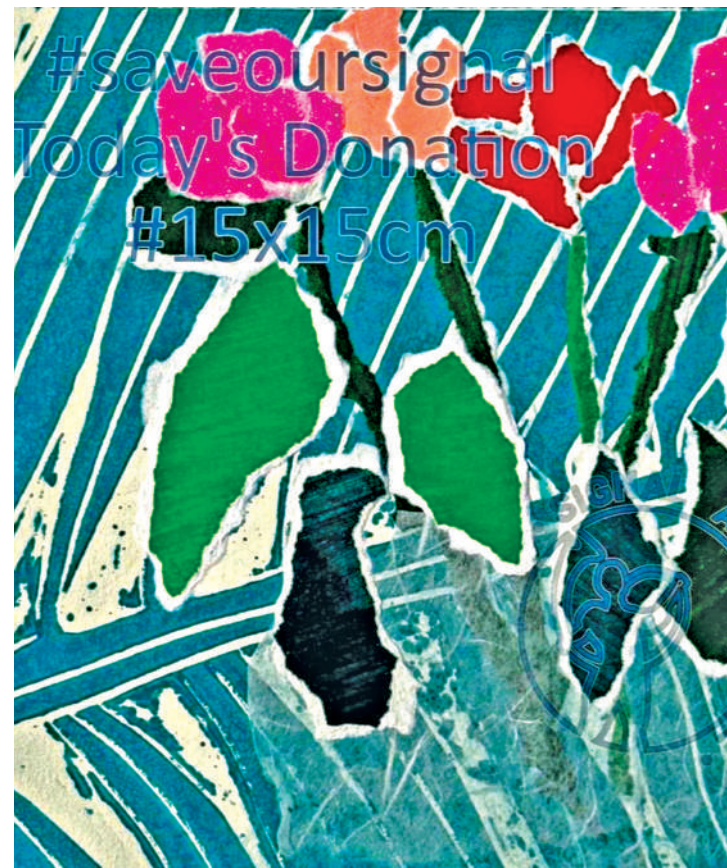
Signal has been in operation for over 32 years and in that time has facilitated over 600 artists to exhibit and/or work in the center.

Video series marks 100th anniversary of WB Yeats Nobel Prize

Seanad Eireann and The National Library of Ireland (NLI) have launched a video series to mark the award of the Nobel Prize in Literature to WB Yeats. The poet and dramatist, who was a member of Seanad Eireann from 1922 to 1928, received notice of the award on this day 100 years ago.

A collaboration between Seanad Eireann and the NLI, the 'Yeats Nobel Centenary' series is a collection of 12 short videos featuring readings of a selection of Yeats' poems and excerpts from his Seanad speeches. Readers include current and former senators, past

winners of the NLI's Poetry Aloud poetry speaking competition for schools, WB Yeats' granddaughter Caitriona Yeats, and others across the cultural spectrum with a link to WB Yeats. Featured pieces include Yeats' Seanad debates about Irish manuscripts

and divorce, as well as readings of poems such as 'The Lake Isle of Innisfree', 'When You Are Old', 'The Wild Swans at Coole', and 'The Second Coming'.

On 14th November 1923, via a phone message from The Irish Times, WB Yeats

received the news of his Nobel Prize in Literature award, to be conferred in Sweden a month later. In his citation, the Nobel Prize chair described Yeats as 'the interpreter of his country' while Yeats described the prize as 'Europe's welcome to the Free State'.

Commenting on the launch of the videos, Cathaoirleach of Seanad Eireann, Senator Jerry Buttimer said: "WB Yeats is recognised as one of

Ireland's greatest poets, but what is lesser known is that he was also an outspoken member of Seanad Eireann. A member of the first Seanad in 1922 and the 1925 Seanad, this coincided with the birth of the Irish Free State.

"As a senator, he was a frank contributor to debates. This included a motion on returning paintings from the Hugh Lane Collection from Britain to Ireland, and objecting to the use of the Irish language in parliamentary proceedings when it was not widely understood amongst its members. He was also a vociferous crit-

ic of the law that prohibited divorce in Ireland, arguing that it would alienate Protestants and create a barrier between the South and the North.

"On behalf of Seanad Eireann, I am delighted to partner with the NLI on this project, which brings the cultural and political parts of Yeats' life together and puts in context his award as giving expression to the spirit of a whole nation."

Director of the National Library of Ireland, Dr Audrey Whitty said: "The National Library of Ireland holds the world's largest collection of mate-

rial relating to WB Yeats. His Nobel Prize medal and manuscripts of many of his poems, including 'The Lake Isle of Innisfree' and 'Easter, 1916' are just some of the items on display as part of our Yeats' exhibition."

She added: "Yeats frequently visited the National Library of Ireland, so we are always exploring new ways to share his work. We are delighted to collaborate with Seanad Eireann on this celebratory project. Yeats was awarded the prize 'for his always inspired poetry, which, in a highly artistic form,

gives expression to the spirit of a whole nation'. We hope that the poems selected in this series will showcase his extraordinary talent'.

The 'Yeats Nobel Centenary' series was produced by the Oireachtas Broadcasting Unit and will run on the NLI and Oireachtas social media channels, and on Oireachtas TV. The videos will be published on the NLI website here and across social channels on a phased basis between now and 10th December, the date on which WB Yeats accepted his Nobel Prize in Literature.

Christmas Road Safety Campaign launched

The Road Safety Authority (RSA), An Garda Síochána, and the Department of Transport and Department of Justice are together urging road users to act responsibly and safely when using the roads throughout the Christmas and New Year period.

The call was made at the launch of a new road safety campaign highlighting the benefits of 30km/h speed limits in urban areas.

As the festive period approaches, the RSA, An Garda Síochána and the Department of Transport are calling on people to refrain from driving while under the influence of alcohol and illegal drugs, and they will be also targeting other road traffic offences such as mobile phone use, speeding and non-wearing of seatbelts.

This year's road safety campaign focuses on 30km/h speed limit in urban areas, a strategic initiative aimed at reducing road traffic fatalities. There is overwhelming evidence that lower speed limits make streets safer and more pleasant places for children and adults to live, socialise, work and play. When parents and children can walk and cycle in their neighbourhood, families benefit from healthier children, less stress and more money in their pockets.

In addition, data consistently indicates that higher speeds significantly escalate both the incidence and severity of road accidents:

- If hit at 60km/h 9 out of 10 pedestrians will be killed.
- If hit at 50km/h 5 out of 10 pedestrians will be killed.
- If hit at 30km/h 9 out of 10 will survive.

Minister of State at the Department of Transport, Mr. Jack Chambers said: "Altho-ugh we have made great strides in the past 20 years, it is clear from the current trends that we must redouble our efforts to restore the downward trend of deaths and serious injuries on our roads. We are working on multiple fronts to address this problem. My Department has published a speed limit review, containing a



range of recommendations focused on ensuring that we have safe and appropriate speed limits on all classes of roads. We are also drafting new legislation to introduce mandatory drug testing at the scene of serious incidents, amending penalty points legislation for motorists committing multiple offences, and continuing to work with An Garda Síochána to support it in its enforcement of road traffic legislation. I urge everyone to remember that responsible driving is not just a personal choice, but a responsibility we must all share. Let us make this festive season a safe one for everyone."

Mr Sam Waide, CEO of the RSA said: "The

Christmas period should be a time of joy and celebration, not tragedy. Slower speeds save lives, and by complying with these limits, every road user contributes to a safer, more responsible road environment. We implore all road users to slow down and adhere to speed limits, including those in urban areas like 30km/h speed limits where they are in place, avoid driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs, and respect all other road users. Together, we can ensure that this Christmas is remembered for the right reasons."
