Dangerous Structures Notice served on Anvil owners

A Dangerous Structures Notice has been served by Wicklow County Council on the owners of the former Anvil store on Main Street Bray.

comed the news, saying "Over the last number of months I have been engaging with Wicklow County Council in relation to the danger that the former Anvil store on the Main Street in Bray poses to local residents and members of the public. I welcome the confirmation that the council has served a Dangerous now Structures Notice on the owners of the property.

"The property, which has been derelict now for a number of years, represents an eye sore and a potential danger to passers-by, with store frontage and signage in a dangerous state of repair, and in danger of falling on pedestrians. Concerns have also been

that the building is being used as a drug den by users in the town.

"There are specific regulations about dangerous structures. The local authority can direct that work, including the demolition of the structure and the clearing of the site, be carried out immediately if it considers it necessary. "Otherwise, they are liable for prosecution by the council. The immediate concern is that the building in its current state represents a danger to both pedestrians courts.

Deputy Brady said: "Having been commissioned by Irish Rail to conduct detailed design and planning services, including environmental assessments and statutory submissions, for the East Coast Railway Infrastructure Protection red tape Projects (ECRIPP), Jacobís fur-

Access denied in Bray

There have been no accessibility audits carried out in Bray town for over a decade it has been revealed.

Aaron McAllorum, Social Democrats Local Election candidate recently queried Bray Municipal and Wicklow County Council in relation to accessibility audits.

The scope of the query spanned the past eight years. The freedom of information request by Mr. McAllorum was refused on the grounds that the records do not exist. However, it was disclosed that there has not been an audit of this type done since 2008

Reacting to the revelation Mr McAllorum said:"To be honest, I am gobsmacked. It is incomprehensible that a 15-year gap in an accessibility audit exists.I was very happy to see the launch of Wicklow's first ever Disability and Inclusion Strategy recently and that Accessibility & Universal Design is a key action area.

COMMUNITY MONUMENTS **FUND 2024**

Wicklow County Council invites applications to the Community Monuments Fund 2024, as operated by the National Monuments Service of Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage.

The closing date for applications is 4pm, 30th January 2024.

The 2024 Community Monuments Fund will invest in our valuable archaeological heritage and help the owners and custodians of archaeological monuments to safeguard them into the future for the benefit of communities and the public.

The 2024 Fund will support the conservation, maintenance, protection and promotion of archaeological monuments. It will: enable conservation works to be carried out on monuments which are deemed to be significant and in need of urgent support; build resilience in our monuments to enable them to withstand the effects of climate change; encourage access to monuments and improve their presentation.

Local authorities, private owners, community groups and custodians of monuments are eligible to apply under the following 3 streams;

- 1. Stream 1 will offer grants up to €100,000 aimed at essential repairs and capital works for the conservation and repair of archaeological monuments.
- 2. Stream 2 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for development of Conservation Management Plans/Reports that are aimed at identifying measures for conservation of archaeological monuments and improving public access.
- 3. Stream 3 will offer grants of up to €30,000 for enhancement of access infrastructure and interpretation (including virtual/) at archaeological monuments.



It exposed me to many new ideas and experiences, and I am putting these into action through a project on climate anxiety and working with various community groups to raise awareness about the co-benefits of climate action," said Shriya, a student at Dominican College Sion Hill.

An Taisce held the Climate Ambassador Awards on Thursday, November 23rd, in the Morrison Hotel, recognising the tremendous effort and dedication demonstrated by volunteers throughout the year. Each Climate Ambassador received a certificate and some sustainable gifts, with an additional ten awards presented to secondary school students, PhD students, a podcast duo, farmers market organisers, Tidy Towns volun-teers, and employees from PwC, Vyra, and Microsoft.

In 2023, Climate Ambassadors completed 331 climate actions, directly engaging over 710,000 people, creating 2,013 climate communications, reaching an estimated 4.6 million people!

Climate Ambassadors receive training at the start of the year in climate science, solutions and communications which enables them to carry out climate actions. Throughout the year they are asked to undertake four key tasks ñ two climate communications and two climate actions, though many participants achieve a lot more. Out of 179 citizens, Hilda OfGrady from Kinvara, Galway, received the Climate Ambassado Award for going above and beyond.

Shriya Mishra from Greystones, has been heavily involved with the GLOBE citizen science air quality campaign for NASA, and she has also completed a project on climate anxi-ety. Pursuing many ideas all at once, this young Climate Ambassador has boundless energy from making pencil pots out of magazines, to presenting at European conferences, and having climate conversations with her elected representatives. She has sourced free trees from the local council, organised a nature walk, presented to peers at the local library and secured a grant for a bee garden and pond at school.

As the festive period approaches, the RSA, An Garda Síochána and the Department of Transport are calling on people to refrain from driving while under the influence of alcohol and illegal drugs, and they will be also targeting other road traffic offences such as mobile phone use, speeding and non-wearing of seatbelts.

This year's road safety campaign focuses on 30km/h speed limit in urban areas, a strategic initiative aimed at reducing road traffic fatalities.
