

Extracts from Hidden World of a Foster-Girl will be read by local teacher Jacinta Hayes

Gorey resident Sadie Harpur has published her first book The Hidden World of a Foster-Girl and on April 2nd she will deliver a talk about her experience to Arklow Library at 7pm. Admission to the event is free but advance booking is advised.

Harpur will be joined by Jackie Hayden who co-authored her book and previously topped the book charts with two editions of My Boy about the late rock star Philip Lynott. Extracts from Harpur's book will be read Jacinta Hayes, a teacher residing in Arklow whose reading at the recent launch of the book in Gorey Library

attracted much praise. Sadie Harpur's book details how one Irish woman survived the Irish Foster Care system before becoming an inspiration for others who suffered as she did. Born and raised in Dublin, Sadie went through turbulent periods of high anxiety. Suffering from learn-

ing difficulties resulting undiagnosed from dyslexia, she was described as mentally below average, and suffered bouts of depression, suicidal thoughts and was repeatedly bullied. She endured serious teenage problems, including self-harming, violent outbursts, zero self-esteem, and the eventual suicide of her foster-brother Gary.

As Sadie savs. "Writing The Hidden World of a Foster-Girl was hugely therapeutic. It helped me look deep into my past and unlock thoughts and experiences I had hidden away in dark places. But with

the help of my loving Jackie Hayden. family and great friends, Hayden says, "Sadie's my story is out there, so I hope others might take comfort from the fact all that life threw at her, and winning in the end Because of her dyslex-

Moylisha Hill lithium licence matter referred to Department

Coillte has referred the matter of lithium prospecting in the Moylisha Hill area of South West Wicklow to the Department of Environment.

Councillors in West Wicklow recently agreed to send a letter of objection to the Board of Management of Coillte to express their unanimous opposition to the continued prospecting for Lithium at Moylisha Hill and calling for Coillte to deny access to their land holdings for that purpose.

Coillte has informed Wicklow Times that it has not issued any licence and has now referred the matter to the Department of Environment. Climate and Communications (DECC), which is responsible for prospecting licences. plan to carry out a drilling programme at Moylisha Hill which is drilling area by external environ-

The letter of opposition from Baltinglass Municipal District councillors was proposed by Fianna Fail councillor John Mullen, who said he's opposed to the potential environmental damage of a lithium mine in the area. Sinn Fein TD John Brady also called for the Department of the Environment to rescind the granting of a drilling licence. The Department of Environment, Climate and Communications says Blackstairs Lithium Limited (BLL) that a surface and groundwater risk assessment was carried out on the

We are asking Wicklow County Council to seek a fundamental reset of how farm policy is devised, implemented in the EU

and in Ireland.'

Mr Byrne conlcuded: "We want dog attacks on sheep flocks; The to work with the elected representatives and the people emplyed by Wicklow County Council. We're not anti this and anti that. We know we have an environmental and climate problem. We accept that. Farmers were probably the first people to recognise that we had a change in our climate. We knew we had such mild winters. And it affects us every day we get up. "It has rained now more or less

constantly since about the 27th day of June. The harvest was basically lost. We haven't been able to plant in the fall. We haven't now managed to plough our fields to get them ready for the next crops. That includes grass. It includes everything right across the gamut. We know we're in trouble, we know we have a climate crisis, and we don't deny it. But we want to work together. We don't want it to be 'them and us'. And clearly, we're saying enough is enough.

Cllr Shay Cullen said "I want to thank the members of IFA for coming here in great numbers, and showing the passion for protecting their livelihoods. We know we have a world shortage of food, and if we continue with the policies that we're putting forward, we're going to have a major catastrophe on our hands in the coming years. Unfortunately, all I see in agriculture is more and more bureaucracy, overcomplicated schemes designed to reduce farming, to reduce the amount of food we pro-

duce, to reduce farmers' livelihoods The Department of Agriculture clearly get pleasure out of penalising farmers, and that shouldn't be the way. There needs to be a change, and a strong change of attitude.'

Cllr John Mullen proposed a reso lution, which was agreed to by the rest of the councillors. It proposed that "Wicklow County Council recognises the significant contribution that farming and the agri- sector makes to the Irish and local economy; the Council acknowledges the

income challenge on Irish farmers arising from the significant increases in the cost of doing business, regulatory costs and cuts in basic import or income support for farmers; the Council calls on the Government to introduce no further regulations on farmers or any measures that may increase costs on farms without full negotiation and agreement with the Irish Farmers Association. This Council calls on the European Union and the Irish Government to provide additional stand-alone funding, sepa rate to the common agricultural policy, to support farmers and to undertake climate and biodiversity mea sures.



"However, there is still plenty of work to be completed and I will not rest until boots are on the ground," Minister Harris said.

He added: "I have been persistently pushing the Department and Minister for Education on this, and this week I have again spoken with the Minister personally to drive home the need for progress.

"Families have raised a number of questions over the past few weeks and some of these have been answered by the Department of Education. The Department has committed that Greystones Community College will absolutely be the first project among its bundle to break ground.

"Further to this, the Department wants to reassure all parents that it will ensure that school places will be available for all children for September 2024 and in to the Grevstones for September 2024 future. This is essential, we cannot be satisfied with simply resolving the shortages expected this September. We must have a long term solution to school shortages in the area

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Grant payments for students left behind by school transport scheme

The process is now open to apply for the back payment for the exceptional payment grant for children with a school bus ticket but for whom a school bus did not run.

The exceptional payment was introduced in response to the shortage of school buses, and was intended to cover additional costs faced by parents in providing transport to school for their children.

Deputy Jennifer Whitmore has repeatedly asked the Minister to ensure the timely payment of the exceptional payment, and not to force parents to wait until the end of the school year as was initially required by the Department.

Deputy Whitmore said: "I welcome the fact that the Minister has finally decided to enable the payment of this interim grant for those parents whose school transport was delayed coming into operation at the start of the term. "This payment was

brought in to assist families who have paid for their child to access the school transport scheme but found at the last minute there was no bus running. Whilst most routes are now opera-

Therefore, if your child was without a bus service for ten days, or even ten weeks, or is still without one now, you can claim this grant. This grant is only open to school transport ticket holders, and it is for a number of days that these children attended school from the date the service ceased or should have run.

"The School Transport Section will process payment for this grant for the number of days they have travelled to school. Families should request that their school submit the statement of attendance form to the School Transport Section, and the Department will process these grant payments."

Wicklow RNLI assist fishing vessel with rope fouled propeller

Three fishermen were brought to safety by Wicklow RNLI on Thursday afternoon 22nd February after their vessel developed mechanical problems three miles southeast of Wicklow Head.

The all-weather lifeboat RNLB Bridie O'Shea slipped its moorings at 2.50pm from the South Quay and put to sea under the command of Coxswain Nick Keogh.

The lifeboat crew was alongside the casualty vessel ten minutes later. The fishermen had deployed their anchor after losing propulsion while fishing for whelk and contacted the Coast Guard for assistance. Conditions in the area at the time was wind south easterly in direction force 4, with moderate sea and good visibility.

Speaking after the call out Coxswain Nick Keogh said, 'We carried out an assessment on the 12-metre fishing vessel and found that a rope was fouled in one of the propellers, so we estab-

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Times **Prison sentence and lifetime** ban for Wicklow woman convicted of cruelty to horses

On Wednesday 21st February 2024, at Arklow District Court, Ms Yvonne Coe (age 60) of Main Street, Tinahely, Co Wicklow was sentenced to three months imprisonment, having previously admitted charges under the Animal Health and Welfare Act 2013 (AHWA).

All the horses were visibly underweight, their hooves were overgrown, and their coats were matted with faecal material. One horse had two swollen legs and was struggling to walk. The defendant admit-

ted under caution that veterinary attention had not been sought for this animal. The same was the case for a horse with a semi-protruded and swollen penis, despite the fact that the injury was sustained up to three years prior. The sheds in which the horses were housed had insufficient light and ventilation, and there were huge accumula-

tions of dung. Between 29th July and 2nd August 2022, eight horses were surrendered by Ms Coe and removed to the IHWT Centre for assessment and treatment. On 9th August 2022, Senior Inspector Conlon discovered another horse that had not been disclosed during previous visits. It used by Ms Coe, it was in an emaciated state and had deformed hooves. This horse was also surrendered and required sedatives and pain relief to enable it to travel.

The court heard that, of the nine horses removed. three were ultimately euthanised as they could not be adequately rehabilitated to allow them to live pain free. Minister for Nature, Heritage and Electoral Reform Malcolm Noonan TD and Minister for Agriculture Charlie McConalogue TD recently announced the revision of the Deer Open Seasons Order. The announcement signals implementation of a key recommendation from the Report of the Irish Deer Management Strategy Group.

Changes to the Deer Open Seasons Order come into effect immediately, and mean an extension to the deer hunting season in the Republic of Ireland. Changes will allow for the continuation of the hunting of female and antlerless deer until 31st March 2024 and males until 30th April 2024. In addition, the 2024/2025 male deer hunting season will now begin at the earlier date of 1 August 2024

The Deer Management Strategy Group was established by Minister McConalogue with support from Minister Noonan. The report makes a number of recommendations regarding deer management in Ireland, and the implementation of this first recommendation by the National Parks and Wildlife Service demonstrates that all stakeholders are committed to a renewed vision and strategy for the management of wild deer in Ireland.

On signing the new Statutory Instrument, Minister Noonan said:

"Deer are an integral part of the Irish landscape, but overgrazing by deer has become a serious pressure for native woodlands and for peatland habitats across Ireland. Extending the open season will provide land owners with greater flexibility for deer management and should, with time, help us to how we manage applications for deer bring deer back to sustainable levels hunting licences, with a new online por-

locally and nationally."

Minister McConalogue added: "It has become clear that deer densities in areas across the Country are above a sustainable level for land management activities and are impacting on farming, forestry, nature conservation and biodiversity. Together with Minister Noonan, I published the Irish Deer Management Strategy Group's report on developing a sustainable deer management strategy for Ireland last December. The development of the report, under the Chairmanship of Mr Teddy Cashman, involved a thorough process including public consultation and stakeholder meetings and led to 15 actions being put forward. Extending the deer hunting season is one of the priority actions identified to combat this increas ing problem. There is no doubt that the wild deer population is having a significant impact on farmers. Land set aside for grazing livestock is being plundered and our forestry is being impacted by over grazing which prevents regeneration. I very much welcome this step in implementing the report of the Deer

Management Štrategy Group." Niall Ó Donnchú, Director General of the National Parks and Wildlife Service added:

"We are also making improvements to


tal in development. This will become a one-stop-shop for all licences in due course. Applications for deer hunting licences for the 2024/2025 seasons will be managed through the new portal. This will provide a fast, efficient and user friendly process."

The Association of Hunt Saboteurs (AOHS) has strongly criticised the extension of the deer hunting season, claiming that it will lead to an anti-deer campaign that will be exploited by deer hunters with the support of the farming community. John Tierney, Campaigns Director, Association of Hunt Saboteurs, says that no independent scientific evidence exists that says a deer cull is needed.

"The conservation of deer has to be based on scientific research and not around hearsay and concerns based on a hidden agenda," said Mr Tierney. According to Mr Tierney, "Minister

Noonan and the Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Charlie McConalogue, have allowed Ireland's small hunting community to extend the bloodsports season which will see an increase in deer killed for recreation."

The AOHS said that "rather than using deer as live targets it would be more humane if a rural based deer tourism industry was developed that would pro vide for deer watching activity."






