



enhancement of natural water resources and their associated ecosystems, biodiversity, protected habitats and species." Breege Kilkenny, Director

Breege Kilkenny, Director of Services, Wicklow County Council, commended the positive engagement of the farming and wider community, noting that "having just completed extensive stakeholder engagement for the Climate Action Plan, I can attest to the commitment of the farming and the wider community. The measures proposed will focus on improving water quality but will also bring multiple benefits such as biodiversity and climate adaptation."

However, on Thursday and Friday of last week, Wicklow County Council was in the High Court defending an application brought to have Wicklow County Council's Chief Executive, deemed to be in contempt of court and to be committed to prison for failure to remediate a massive illegal dump which is leaching into the River Slaney.

In 2017 the High Court found Wicklow County Council to be the 'last man standing' of those who had illegally dumped there and gave them six and a half years to remove up to a million tons of contaminated matter. The owners of the land, Brownfield Restorations, brought the case back to the High Court claiming Wicklow County Council hadn't started any remediation. The judge will give a written judgement

in the next two weeks Reacting, Fine Gael Local Election Candidate for Baltinglass, Peter Stapleton, Wicklow said County Council should not have used the Minister for Agriculture and Food and Tirlan in a 'PR stunt' to distract from its failures on dumping in Wicklow. "It is no coincidence that Wicklow County Council timed a launch with Tirlán and the Minister for Agriculture of the River Slaney Water Project days before it was due in the High Court to account for why it has not cleared up toxic dumps in West Wicklow," Stapleton said. "The Council would be better advised not to cynically engage in PR stunts and focus on remediat-

"I am calling on the Minister for Local Government Darragh O'Brien to appoint an inspector as he did into Bord Pleanala when its crises arose last year. A decade on and Wicklow County Council is still dealwith dumping in Whitestown. It is ironic now that the Council has a water project for the Slaney river while it remains at risk and while it is still unclear where the toxic waste from Whitestown will go if ever remediated. Hundreds of thousands of tonnes of toxic waste were dumped there and despite the High Court ordering its full remediation by this year, that has still not been completed. Wicklow property prices stay steady in Q1

Property prices in Wicklow have stayed flat during the quarter, according to the latest MyHome.ie Property Price Report. The report for Q1 2024, shows that the median asking price for a property in the county is still €395,000. This means prices have risen by €10,000 compared with this time last year.

detached house in the county also stayed flat over the quarter at €395,000. This means prices in the segment are up by $\in 10,000$ compared to this time last year.

Meanwhile, the asking price for 4-bed semi-detached house in Wicklow rose by $\in 5,000$ over the quarter to $\in 495,000$. This price is up by the same amount compared to this time last year. There were 554 properties for

ale in Wicklow at the end of Q1 2024 - a decrease of 2% on the quarter. The average time for a property to go sale agreed in the county after being placed up for sale now stands at just over three and a half months.

The author of the report, Conall MacCoille, Chief Economist at Bank of Ireland, said: "The chasing homes has received much message from this quarter's MyHome.ie report is that the housing market is heating up again. MyHome asking prices rose by a solid 2% in the first quarter, with the annual inflation rate accelerating to 6.5%, its fastest pace in 18

"We can see that demand is particularly intense from transactional activity. "It is worth noting, however, that the 63,000 residential transac tions recorded in 2023 is the highest number recorded since the Property Price Register started collecting data in 2010. In abso-lute terms housing supply is slowly improving, but the gap with robust housing demand is growing.

"In summary, there has been no let-up in demand, and with the supply situation still difficult, it is not too surprising that house price inflation has regained momentum. We expect to see a mid-single digit rise in Irish house prices in 2024


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

This learning Day Service has just officially opened its doors here in County Wicklow, but has been years in the planning by a group of parents, encouraged by teachers at St Catherine's Special School who had taught these students and knew their potential to continue to learn.

"Until now these learners would have been placed in a traditional care focused Day Service, but without access to formal learning programmes structured to their specific level many stagnated, regressed and lost skills learned over the years in school," explained Cali manager and interim tutor, Kristin Keogh.

"Cali provides 3 critical pillars of support for these students - Learning, Care and Therapy. These young adults some of whom also have physical disabilities and medical issues need care and therapy such as physiotherapy, speech and language, occupational therapy and behavioural supports in order to create an environment where they can maximise their learning."

Students also benefit hugely from one-to-one facilitator support which is the ideal standard. This maximises the young person's ability to actively engage in activities rather than being spectators on the sidelines.

"This learning Day Service for young adults with severe to profound disabilities is to our knowledge the first of its kind in Ireland and it is Cali's intention to roll this service out nationwide," Ms Keogh said.

"It has been much needed and it is fantastic that it is now a reality here in County Wicklow. The students are immersed in a wide variety of subjects including com munication skills, numeracy, literacy and science. In addi tion, they also enjoy activi-ties in the community where layered 'soft learning' reinforces content they have covered in class. They love the stimulating and fun way Cali approaches learning.

17 more Wicklow schools included in **Hot Meals Programme**

The rollout of Hot School Meals to additional 900 Primary Schools, including 17 Wicklow Primary Schools, was announced last week. An Taoiseach Simon Harris TD has the ambition to have all children receiving Hot School Meals by 2025.

Speaking after last week's announcement, Deputy Matthews said: "When visiting schools, this issue is one that is constantly raised with me by parents, principals, and Minister for Social Protection teachers. "This is particularly welcome at a time when food prices are at such a high level. The provision of school meals is a key intervention to tackle educational disadvantage and assist those children to achieve their full potential. "One thing I have consistently raised with the Ministers for Social Protection and Education is the need to avoid excess waste as part of the national rollout. In his talk, Bill Nelson will describe events surrounding the 12th August 1946 accident when a plane on its way from Paris Le Bourget to Dublin airport crashed with five crew and 21 passengers on board.

The passengers were French Girl guides invited by their Irish counterparts to relieve their wartime tribulations. Due to a miracle and several lucky episodes, all the occupants survived. This is a great story of resilience, perseverance, and the will to survive.

A young woman named Chantal de Vitry decided to leave the aircraft, as she wasn't injured, to raise the alarm and a huge rescue operation was launched. However, nobody knew the exact location of the crash site. So commenced a huge effort by the police, mountain rescue, the army and local residents who knew the mountains well.




To close the night, the brothers come together with their full-band set of upbeat, loud and fun Mute The

Times **'Government and local authorities** need to face some 'Home Truths'

Government and local authorities need to face some 'home truths' about accessible housing, according to Michelle Kent Byrne, service coordinator with Wicklow Irish Wheelchair Association

Ireland, let alone in

"Housing shortages in Ireland have been well documented and highlighted. But everyday here in Arklow, I meet people with disabilities who are facing a deeper, silent housing crisis that doesnit have the commitments or resources from government and local authorities to address them," she said.

"Working with Irish Wheelchair Association across Wicklow, my colleagues and I regularly meet people who are living in unsuitable housing that is dangerous and damaging to their health. We meet young people who cannot figure out a plan for where they will live when their parents get older. And we meet parents who are struggling to care for their adult children and are worried about the future.

"But what choice do they have? Finding housing that is 'wheelchair liveable' is impossible across Wicklow. Today if you go onto any property website looking for wheelchair liveable accommodation in Wicklow you will find next to nothing. Yes a property might beaccessible meaning it is possible for a wheelchair to get in the front door, but it doesn't mean a wheelchair user could live there; use the bathroom kitchen bedroom. This is why social housing is so vital for people with disabilities. because there are no pri-

vate rental options there for them. "Irish Wheelchair Association's latest national 'Home Truths' campaign is hoping to keep accessible housing on the agenda for local authorities and local politicians. There are many committed individuals in our local authorities who work hard to make

sure people with disabili-ties are included in local housing rollout. But overall, as government and local authorities remain committed to building more and more houses. people with disabilities remain excluded. Unfortunately a report pub-lished in January by the Oireachtas Joint Committee on Disability Matters found that Irelandís provision of independent living and inclusion in the community has worsened in recent years. The committee was reporting on Irelandís performance under the UN treaty that Ireland signed in 2018, United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. At a time when Ireland is

"Successive governments have failed to deliver on its own commitments to provide housing options that are accessible and adaptable, for people with disabilities, across our communities. For example, according to the National Housing Strategy for Disabled People 2002-2027, people with disabilities have the right to live independently with supports, but the strategy has not been implemented or funded adequately.

"For people reading this who have a disability

or support a person with a disability, there is always that when our local politihope when it comes to housing. Irish Wheelchair Association's 'Home Truths' campaign is a time to refocus on accessible housing, figure out what you need and find the support you need to make a plan. The process may be slower and much harder than it should be, but there is support along the

way. "It is important to apply for social housing to be included on your local authority housing list. Your local authority will have those details. Irish Wheelchair Associations supports many of our members around housing applications as do many other disability organisations. Ask as many people for advice

and help as you can. Noone can do it alone.

"It is also important cians call to our doors in the coming weeks looking for our vote, that we raise issues of accessible hous ing with them. What are they doing? How can they help? Access to indepen dent living, with independent living supports and wrap-around services, is a right for disabled people who need it. Or what is the alternative? Three years ago a report from the Ombudsman found over 1,300 people in their thirties, forties and fifties who are living in nursing homes for elderly people. because of their disability and the lack of any wheelchair liveable acc ommodation for them.

"Independent living is a critical pillar of our society and our government and local authorities need to make this happen."
