The grim picture for Wicklow renters was revealed in stark detail last week with the publication of the Rent Index Report for the fourth quarter of 2023 by the Residential Tenancies Board (RTB). The report shows that rents in Co. Wicklow have increased 9.1 percent from last year. Wicklow now has the 3rd highest rents in the country for existing tenancies, and Wicklow saw year-on-year inflation for new tenancies of 6.5 percent.

# Large oil spill threatens Wicklow's wildlife

Kildare Wildlife Rescue (KWR) mobilised its resources last Thursday in response to a significant oil spill along the coast of Wexford, Wicklow, and Dublin, which impacted numerous seabirds. At the time of going to press, the cause and source location of the spill, which poses a serious threat to local wildlife populations, remained unknown. The EPA is to be asked to investigate

Reports of oiled seabirds, predominantly Common Guillemots, also known as Common Murres (Uria aalge), started coming in from various locations on the afternoon of Wednesday 1st May, spanning from Carnsore Point, Wexford, to Dalkey Island, Dublin. Areas notably affected include Greystones, Brittas Bay, Beach, Newcastle Wicklow Town, and Curracloe Beach, among others.

Given the prevalence of Guillemots among the affected species, it is likely that the oil spill originated near their breeding or feeding grounds. KWR's trained responders have been actively engaged in reaching reported locations to provide assis-A number of Razorbills (Alca torda) have also been found.

"Rents in our towns are far too high right now, and this is a direct result of government policy. In Greystones, the average rent for existing tenants is €1735. In Bray East, new tenancies are coming in at an average of €1441. In Bray West, the existing tenancies are an average of €1598.

"Renters in Wicklow need a break. They need a rent freeze to halt further increases, reintroducing the no-fault eviction bans, and this government to act decisively to bring the rental market back under control."

Also reacting to the report, Bray Labour Party councillor Anne Ferris said "The latest report from the Residential Tenancies Board (RTB) is a stark reminder of the deepening housing crisis facing our community in Bray and right around the county of Wicklow. The 9% increase in rents in the final quarter of 2023 is alarming, but sadly not surprising. This sharp rise, coupled with

lights the urgent need for action to address Ireland's housing crisis.

"For renters in Bray, this means rents continue to spiral out of control while supply continues to contract. How are any regu-



lar working people expected to afford these rents? Housing and affordable housing is constantly coming up when I'm canvassing in Bray. This Government inaction has simply failed to address the housing crisis with sufficient ambition or urgency. It is time that local authorities, including Wicklow

housing building programme for people in need.

"The Labour Party has a vision for fair housing. Labour's Renter's Rights Bill, introduced in 2021, offers a constructive solution to the ongoing crisis. By addressing 'no-fault' evictions and providing greater security of tenure, our Bill could offers a lifeline to renters facing uncertainty and instability in their housing situations.

"Additionally, challenging the developerled approach of the current Government is essential. We need to build more houses and we know relying solely on private development will not solve our housing crisis.

"The reality is that the Government continues to repackage its old, unworkable policies without grasping the nettle on renters' rights. Labour's vision for a fair and affordable rental sector challenges this status quo, advocating for the rights and security of renters across Ireland. Ireland needs secure affordable housing, security of tenure for renters and a more ambitious public housing programme - we need housing that works for all.'

# Wicklow Port works to begin

An Taoiseach Simon Harris has confirmed that bed-levelling works are due to begin shortly in Wicklow Port.The Department of Housing and Local Government recently granted a Foreshore Licence to Wicklow County Council to carry out works as necessary.

The Taoiseach received confirmation from the Department of Housing that Alpha Marine Services have been appointed to conduct these works, and are expected to commence in mid-May.

The Taoiseach said, I am delighted to announce that works will

soon be going ahead in Wicklow Harbour. Over recent months, I have been in touch with local businesses and residents, who regularly use the port and impressed upon me the need for these works to take place as soon as possible. Wicklow Port is a vital resource for County Wicklow, and over time has been encountering issues due to the build up of material along the Port's seabed. These works

will go towards addressing these issues, and I am glad to confirm that they are expected to begin later this month.

In relation to carrying out a Full Maintenance Dredge of the Harbour the following applications have been submitted by Wicklow County Council recently: Dumping at Sea Application to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). This licence will be for a period of 8 years; Application for a Maritime Usage Licence to the Maritime Area Regulatory Authority (MARA). This licence will be for a period of 8 years.

Separately environmental consultants AYESA are well advanced in carrying out a study to identify a potential new dumping at sea site close to Wicklow Harbour.

A number of potential sites have now been identified. Relevant stakeholders will be consulted for comments on the proposed potential locations. If a suitable site is found Environmental studies can then take place



At SSE Renewables, work is continuing at pace to deliver Arklow Bank Wind Park 2. As we approach the key milestone of the submission of the offshore planning consent, we'd like to take the opportunity to share an update and to extend a word of thanks to our valued community stakeholders.

Arklow is the birthplace of offshore wind in Ireland. SSE Renewables is

committed to delivering the next phase of offshore renewable energy and its many associated benefits to the local region.

In 2022 An Bord Pleanála granted permission for the onshore grid infrastructure which will connect the project to Ireland's electricity transmission grid, and in the same year, Wicklow County Council consented the development of an operations and maintenance facility at the South Dock, Arklow Harbour.

The remaining planning consent, for the offshore infrastructure, will be submitted to An Bord Pleanála in the coming weeks and represents a significant milestone, not only for our project team, but for Ireland, and in particular the Wicklow and Wexford regions.

We estimate that Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 will deliver an overall economic benefit of up to €800m, of which around €400m will be local to the Wicklow and Wexford areas, and support around 2,300 jobs through construction, operation and decommissioning phases.

The delivery of 5GW of offshore wind is critical to the 2030 targets set out by Government, and Arklow Bank Wind Park 2, as one of Ireland's most advanced offshore projects, can contribute substantially here.

We are proud to play our part as we collectively transition to a greener and more environmentally-sustainable future - creating jobs, supporting communities and driving significant economic investment.

### **About Arklow Bank Wind Park 2**

Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 will be located on and around the Arklow Bank, approximately 6 to 15 km from the shore. The project will have a maximum export capacity of up to 800MW and will offset around 830 million kilos of harmful carbon emissions annually. Subject to the achievement of a Final Grid Connection agreement, securing a route to market, and planning consent for our offshore infrastructure, Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 project is expected to move into construction in 2026/27 with first power anticipated in 2029.

SSE Renewables is committed to the community in which our project is located, through local economic investment, job creation, and the provision of a multi-million Euro community benefit fund over the operational lifetime of the project with potential to make lasting transformational change to local communities in proximity to our Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 site.









### 1. What makes up the Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 offshore development?

The development originally started out considering 200 turbines, but given advancements in technology this has reduced to between 47 and 56 turbines. Each turbine is made up of a foundation, tower, nacelle, and three blades.

Extensive and detailed assessment of a range of turbines and layouts were examined during the development process, and range from c. 273m to 287m above sea level (level of the lowest astronomical tide). Two Offshore Substation Platforms and foundation substructures act as a common point to which the cabling from the turbines are connected, and two export cables will bring the power generated by the windfarm back to shore.

### 2. What is the status of the Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 project?

The project has been under development since 2018. It has already achieved two planning consents, for its onshore grid infrastructure including an underground cable route and substation at Avoca River Park, and an operations and maintenance facility at South Dock, Arklow.

A Maritime Area Consent (MAC) was granted to SSE Renewables for Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 in December 2022. This ensures that the project can progress through the consenting process with an application to An Bord Pleanála. The third and final planning application, for the project's offshore infrastructure will be submitted to An Bord Pleanála in the coming weeks.

### 3. Will the wind farm use fixed or floating turbines?

The wind farm will use fixed-bottom turbines. Fixed-bottom technology can typically only be deployed in water depths of up to 60-70 metres, although we expect this to increase in the coming years as technology evolves. Anything beyond that is considered too deep for current technology. Along the Irish coastline, generally the farther out you go, the deeper the sea. For example, at distances from shore of up to 30 km, much of the Irish seabed is too deep for current bottom-fixed

### 4. How will the project progress without an Offshore Renewable

Electricity Support Scheme (ORESS) contract?

SSE Renewables plans to deliver Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 outside of the State-subsidised ORESS, which is just one type of mechanism through which a developer can secure a market for their energy. The project was unsuccessful in the ORESS auction, however we are pursuing an alternative route to market in line with the requirements within the project's Maritime Area Consent. The project will still connect into the national transmission grid and contribute to our national renewable energy targets.

### 5. What is the purpose of an Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR) for the Arklow Bank Wind Park 2 project?

The purpose of the EIAR is to understand and quantify the impact the development will have on the surrounding environment. The EIAR will be a key part of the project's forthcoming offshore consent application and will be publicly available after submission to An Bord Pleanála. The report assesses impacts and sets out mitigation measures under a range of themes, not limited to:

Coastal processes; Airborne Noise; Air Quality & Climate; Benthic Ecology; Fish, Shellfish and Sea Turtle ecology; Marine Mammals; Offshore Ornithology; Commercial Fisheries; Shipping and Navigation; Civil and Military Aviation; Seascape Landscape and Visual Impact; Marine Archaeology; Population and Human Health.

### 6. Will the project impact on the Arklow Bank as a habitat

Our studies indicate that the windfarm will not significantly negatively impact the sandbank as a habitat for marine life. Acknowledging that there will be some temporary impact during construction, those areas are likely to regenerate. New ecosystems and/or marine habitats are expected to establish on and around the turbines and scour protection; which prevents erosion occurring around the wind turbine foundation.

### 7. What effects are likely on our local beaches during construction and operation?

Coastal processes have been extensively assessed as part of the offshore EIAR. Our studies indicate there will be no impacts to local beaches from the proposed development. The offshore infrastructure will meet the land at Johnstown North. Cables will be installed using trenchless techniques and will pass underneath the existing shoreline. This means that there will be no open trenches on local beaches during installation, and no visible infrastructure once the wind farm is operational.

Severe storm incidents which have had a detrimental impact on coastlines all around Ireland, and internationally, are largely driven by climate change. Removing our dependence on fossil fuels and increasing renewable energy infrastructure at scale, is critical to reducing the impacts of climate change, and protecting the environment.

### 8. Will there be a visual impact on the seascape?

The turbines will be positioned on and around the Arklow Bank extending approximately 27km from north to south and will be located c. 6 to 15km from the shore. Layouts and photomontages from key viewpoints such as Wicklow Head, Brittas Bay, Arklow and Courtown, of the proposed development will be published as part of the EIAR and were shared as part of our public consultation in 2023. Lights will be fitted on chosen peripheral turbines for the purposes of navigation and aviation safety.

### 9. How is noise impact managed during construction?

This is a key fosus area in the EIAR. We have completed noise assessments and modelling of foundation installation piling operations. The impact will be temporary in nature - over one installation season - and we will be obliged to comply with standards and maintain noise emissions at certain limits to avoid any nuisance scenario.

### 10. What if any impacts are likely on commercial fishing?

Post construction fishing activities will be permitted around and within the wind farm. However, we do expect that some safety advisory zones will be required for the construction phase - and this is for navigational safety purposes.

These 'rolling' safety advisory zones will be positioned around complex lifting operations and cable installation activities. There will be a Fisheries Management and Mitigation Strategy included within the EIAR, which will address how the project will interface with commercial fisheries in advance of, and during project construction and operation.


