# STATE TO BUY WOODS?

Almost 200 acres of agricultural zoned land in Delgany adjoining the Glen of the Downs and Kindlestown Forest has come up for sale for €6.5m. If purchased by the State, this would potentially allow for a doubling of this nature reserve, an invaluable national treasure and well-known Wicklow landmark.

Social Democrats TD for Jennifer Whitmore has written to An Taoiseach Simon Harris and Minister for the Environment, stressing the need for a pivotal intervention to purchase this land to expand the Glen of Downs.

In less than 48 hours, a petition set up by Deputy Whitmore which urgently calls on the State to purchase land gathered over

3,000 signatures.

"There has been huge positivity from the public in response to this proposal and, in particular from people living in Wicklow. People here understand the importance and ecological significance of this woodland and they want a bigger and better Glen of the Downs for future generations to enjoy," said Deputy Whitmore, who is the Social

Democrats spokesperson for Climate and Biodiversity. "I hope the Taoiseach and the Ministers for Environment and Biodiversity listen to the thousands asking for this crucial investment in our invaluable national treasure."

Deputy Whitmore added: "Sadly, the growth and vibrancy of the woodlands have been stifled in recent years as

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
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it is surrounded by agricultural land on all sides and dissected by a major road.

"I have previously raised the need for the Glen of the Downs to be expanded and in November 2023, I made a proposal to both the National Parks and Wildlife Service and Coillte encouraging them to explore the possibility of working together on a project to allow the Glen of the Downs naturally regenerate and join up with Kindlestown Forest.

"The purchase of this site in Delgany by the State would allow for a once in a lifetime opportunity to the join these two forests and provide a rare opportunity to expand this majestic and beloved oak woodland. It is important to remember that Ireland has committed to the EU's Nature Restoration Law, which

will set binding targets to restore degraded ecosystems - particularly those with the most potential to capture and store carbon. The measures will cover at least 20 per cent of the EU's land and sea areas by 2030, and ultimately all ecosystems in need of restoration by 2050.

"The Government has already set aside €3.5 billion in its Climate and Nature Fund for these types of projects. The Glen of the Downs is known nationally but it holds a special place in the hearts of those who live near it and have grown up exploring and visiting it. I have written these two forests and provide a rare opportunity to expand this majestic and beloved oak woodland. It is important to remember that Ireland has committed to the EU's Nature Restoration Law, which

The National Adult Literacy Agency has identified that one in six adults in Ireland have literacy difficulties.

"people" and the development of inclusive communities.

Cllr Winstanley states that "part of developing inclusive communities is ensuring that everyone has the same opportunities to access information and have a say in issues that affect them, especially for such important consultations like the corporate plan."

Cllr Winstanley says she is pleased that Wicklow Council are taking important steps to make their information more accessible.

"We believe that it is important for us to work together, to bring this land under public control. As our population continues to expand, we must ensure that we do everything that we can to promote wooded and biodiverse areas. After all, Wicklow is the Garden of Ireland. We believe that this measure would be widely supported by the public."

Green Party councillor Lourda Scott is a founding member of the Climate & Biodiversity SPC on Wicklow County Council. Cllr Scott has submitted a motion on purchasing the land with

the support of multiple Councillors. This will be discussed at the September meeting of the Greystones Municipal District, which the public are welcome to attend.

Cllr Scott thanked her colleagues for their support in seconding the motion. She added: "Land like this rarely comes up for sale. It is in a prime location for our local environment. I have previously met with local environmental activists who have campaigned for a long time on preserving this natural green corridor to the existing Kindlestown Woods and Glen of the Downs areas. I want to thank them for all of their work in highlight-

ing what a vital habitat this area is and its potential for the wider community. I will do my best to push for purchase of this land by the State. We are

in a Biodiversity emergency and need to act now."

Cllr Orla Finn outlined: "I believe that we need to emphasise the critical importance of preserving this land for future generations. This agricultural land potentially holds high ecological value. It could serve as a natural extension to the existing Kindlestown Woods and Glen of the Downs areas. These areas are a vital habitat for a range of wildlife species."

Cllr Louise Fenelon-Gaskin is also 100% behind the proposal to acquire the land. She added: "The proposed acquisition would align with the Government's ongoing commitment to protect biodiversity, and promote environmental sustainability. This is also set out in the National

Biodiversity Action Plan and the Climate Action Plan. As local Councillors, we believe that purchasing this land would support local and national climate goals by enhancing carbon sequestration. It would further support the area's rich woodland ecosystems."

Cllr Stephen Stokes pointed to additional benefits of securing public land. Cllr Stokes stated: "We should explore the possibility of creating an additional amenity with this land. For example, this could include nature trails. Last year I visited the City of Bellevue in Washington, USA. The Deputy Mayor, Jared Nieuwenhuis, advised me that their Council is consistently seeking to acquire new park spaces, because that's what local residents want. I believe we should take a similar approach. Securing this land could serve as a positive template for other projects across County Wicklow."

Green TD Steven Matthews has contacted Minister of State for Heritage Malcolm Noonan to assess the opportunity to purchase the land for nature conservation objectives.

Deputy Matthews said "This represents an opportunity for the state to acquire land to connect Kindlestown Woods to the

Glen of the Downs. There are many good people working in the Delgany and Greystones community who are seeking ways to protect nature and provide some natural amenities for residents and visitors and I would like to meet them soon to look at the possibilities for this site.

"The area has seen huge increases in housing and population growth. I doubt there will be any appetite or evidence to

support zoning this land for housing. Therefore we should look at what this land or parts of the land could be used for to provide community gain and nature projection.

"The Greens fought hard to pass the Nature Restoration Law and that law has objectives for nature restoration in urban areas. Linking Kindlestown old woodlands to the Glen's old woodland and providing a safe ecological corridor through the

area would be a good use for this land."

Deputy Whitmore will hold a **Public Meeting on Tuesday September 24th** to discuss her campaign urging the State to purchase the land. It will take place at **7pm in The Horse and Hound in Delgany**. Deputy Whitmore will also be joined on the evening by Biodiversity experts to discuss the many benefits that expanding and nurturing the woodland will have.

# Brady calls on Council to install water supply at Kilmurry Cemetery

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has called on Wicklow County Council to install a water supply at Kilmurry Graveyard in Newtownmountkennedy. Describing the current situation as unnecessarily placing difficulties in front of the families and friends as they tend to the graves of their loved ones, he spoke of the difficulties that elderly relatives faced as they were forced to carry water with them to the cemetery to water plants and maintain the upkeep of loved one's graves.

Deputy Brady said that a lot of the pipe work is in place in the cemetery, all that is required is for the council to do is to approve a connection, get the water turned on, and the issue can be resolved.

"I believe that Wicklow County Council should and could agree to provide a water supply to the graveyard at Kilmurry cemetery in Newtownmountkennedy. The local community has been asking that a water supply be provided for a long

number of years at this stage, and it really is not too much to ask for.

"Anybody that visits Kilmurry cemetery can clearly see how well maintained that the graves are. It is obvious that visitors to the cemetery care deeply about the upkeep of the graves. But the absence of a water supply leaves it that much more difficult to tend to the graves of loved ones. It is particularly challenging for older people who are forced to carry water with them

to wash the graves, water flowers and plants.

"With a lot of the necessary water lines in place, all that is required for the council to do is to give approval for the connection and the matter can be easily resolved. As things stand, the current situation is not fair, and it is unnecessary. I am again calling on Wicklow County Council to install a water supply to Kilmurry cemetery at the earliest opportunity."

# Bray coastal dump restoration a success

Green TD Steven Matthews recently visited the site of the former coastal dump site in Bray which has now completed its restoration works. Deputy Matthews worked with both Wicklow County Council and Dun Laoghaire Council during his time as a councillor to engage them in seeking a solution to the legacy dump.

Speaking after visiting the coastal protection scheme Matthews said, "It's a success for water quality for sea swimmers, a success for our marine environment and a success for public recreation and amenity. For decades this old dump site was eroded by waves and you could clearly see old waste, plastic and rubbish being exposed and ending up in the coastal waters. I was determined that this environmental disaster should be remedied and I brought Wicklow County Council and Dun Laoghaire Council together to seek an engineering solution.

Both councils collaborated to design a coastal protection scheme and a soft landscaped area to top off the old dump site.

"It's a massive improvement to the area, there's no more erosion or old waste leaking from the site and this has positive impacts on water quality, especially for the hundreds of sea swimmers that use our Seafront.

"The dump had been a problem for decades but nobody seemed to be doing anything but talking about it and I sought urgent action. It was legacy landfill site for Bray waste and was used up to

the late 1960s with ownership of the land split between the two councils. I knew it would only get fixed by sitting both councils down together, forming a plan of action and applying for funding.

"With sea level rise, higher tides, storm surges and erosive run off from increased rainfall the entire dump would have eventually end up in the sea if protection was not put in place. It took a little longer than I expected but decades of environmental damage is now fixed and this is a big success story for Bray and the harbour area.

"During the planning process I suggested the inclusion of a walkway at the site with a view to incorporating it into bigger plans for a northern coastal

and cycling route and I'm glad to this has been provided for. Green Party councillor Erika Doyle is working on developing a walking and cycling route

through the Harbour to connect with Dun Laoghaire cycling network and coastal walks. We have great potential to improve amenity and recreation at

our harbour. The priority for any development in the area must be for improving community use for swimmers, water sports, boat users and the public that

like to stroll around this beautiful location and all done to the highest standards of nature protection," concluded Deputy Matthews.

# 'CJEU verdict exposes colossal mistake to appeal case'

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has said the CJEU verdict finally brings to an end the “shameful mishandling” of the Apple Case that saw this Government “go to extreme lengths” to refuse taxes that were lawfully owed to the state. He described the decision by Fianna Fail and Fine Gael to drag the case through the courts for eight years as “unforgivable”.

Deputy Brady said: “This verdict ends one of the most extraordinary episodes of Irish politics. Over the last 8 years we have seen Fianna Fail and Fine Gael go to extreme lengths to stop the state collecting taxes that we were lawfully owed. “If Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael got their way, we would be over 13 billion euro worse off. The sheer incompetence with which this has been handled cannot be overstated. I always believed that this ruling was inevitable. The evidence was clear. That is why I was always adamant that the correct decision was to accept the European Commission's ruling in 2016. “Instead, we saw the government spend mil-

ions upon millions of taxpayers' money on legal fees acting against the national self-interest. “It was a colossal mistake by Fianna Fail and Fine Gael to put Ireland's reputation on the line when it was likely they would lose. The idea that the government were taking this appeal to protect Ireland's reputation was never credible. They were covering their own backs. “Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael knew state aid had been violated when they had overseen the design and administration of this sweetheart deal. That is why they have denied reality and resisted accountability at every stage. “It was only after

being repeatedly challenged by Sinn Féin that the Government ended the practice of facilitating stateless companies with no tax residence anywhere in the world. “This case has never threatened our national sovereignty or our tax code. It concerned the preferential treatment for one company. We must remember that Fine Gael, supported by Fianna Fail, refused to

take over 13 billion euro during a time when they were imposing austerity on people. Austerity that saw Fine Gael cut the blind pension, close hospital beds, cuts to social welfare and the minimum wage. “We can never fully undo the harm done to people during austerity, but this verdict gives us a chance to finally move on from this shameful episode.”

## '€13bn can help to end homelessness'

In a statement, Tiglin have said that the €13bn windfall following the CJEU verdict “presents the state with a remarkable opportunity to tackle the homeless crisis once and for all”.

Tiglin chairman Aubrey McCarthy said “In 2016, myself and our CEO Phil Thompson addressed the Joint Houses of the Oireachtas outlining proposals to help solve the housing crisis. Back then, we were assured by the then minister for housing Simon Coveney stated that the Government would eradicate homelessness by 2020. Since then, we have witnessed record growth in homeless figures and an Irish public that feels cheated and let down.

“The rescue boat has arrived. This money must not simply be 'assigned to a cause', we need to see impact and not repeat the mistakes of the past.”

Tiglin stated “This opportunity must not be missed and without further delay a Task Force should be assembled with a defined budget, clear KPI's and let us make the difference that our citizens have been calling for.

“It is vital that it is not seen that money will simply solve this issue. Leadership, defined direction and accountability is needed first and foremost. It is too simplistic to say that money will build houses. In an Irish context, we have been found wanting when it comes to addressing the housing needs of our nation.

“We see repetitious uses of the phrase 'homeless crisis'. The evidence of this is record numbers of people within emergency accommodation, expanding housing lists and a housing market that is struggling to meet demands. The issue here is our response has not been a 'crisis response'. In a crisis people move quickly, policies change and collective action occurs to address the problems.

“In recent years we have seen Ireland's track record in crisis response. During COVID we witnessed unity and the power of multi-agency responses. Legislation was changed quickly [...] During the commencement of the invasion of Ukraine, again we witnessed government agencies, NGO's and volunteers come together [...] These responses happened quickly, we worked in less than perfect scenarios. This was a crisis response. Currently, we are not seeing this response or leadership to our housing crisis. The Government now has a substantial amount of money available to be carefully allocated to housing initiatives that will provide lasting benefits for Irish families.”

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# Public warned to not disturb seals

Wicklow County Council is reminding beach users, and particularly dog owners, to avoid disturbing seals when they visit the coast at this time of year.

September to December is a particularly important time for grey seals, as it is the breeding season during which time the adults seek safe sites to "haul out" on land.

These are beaches where the animals return year after year to breed, rest, moult and engage in social activity. It is also the time when they give birth to a single pup which is born with distinctive white fur and needs to stay on land for a number of weeks while it is being weaned by its mother.

In recent weeks there have been a number of sightings of seal pups all along the Wicklow coast and this is a time when they are particularly vulnerable to disturbance by humans and dogs. It is important

to note that disturbance can easily occur when seals become aware of human presence even at a distance.

People and dogs are asked to maintain a minimum distance of 100m from seals that are on land as coming close to them will cause stress and can lead to the abandonment of pups by mothers.

Orphaned pups have very little chance for survival and often Seal Rescue Ireland (SRI) must intervene by bringing a seal into rehabilitation whereas without human disturbance the pup would have been successfully cared for and weaned in the wild.

If any member of the public comes across a seal it is very important to keep a distance, never touch and never attempt to return a young animal to the sea.

The Wicklow coast is a much-valued public amenity and the public can play a huge role in helping to conserve this protected species. Seals are legally protected under the Wildlife Act and it is illegal and dangerous to approach them or to allow dogs to do so.

Wicklow Municipal District are working in tandem with Seal Rescue Ireland to raise public awareness of this issue by erecting information signs at known 'haul out' sites and restricting access to these areas as required, particularly at Brides Head Beach, Wicklow Town.

## 'Hen Harrier Threat Response Plan a failed opportunity'

The Hen Harrier Threat Response Plan launched today 10th September is a failed opportunity to urgently put in place the necessary measures to prevent the extinction of this iconic bird of prey species, according to BirdWatch Ireland, the Environmental Pillar and An Taisce.

This plan has been in the works for over a decade, during which time Ireland's Hen Harrier population has declined by one third. However, despite the years of work that went into developing this plan, it is sorely lacking in ambition and in tar-

geted actions to set the species on the way to recovery, the three organizations claim.

"It will not, in our opinion, meet the legal requirement nor press pause on the losses of the Hen Harrier, never mind restore its population. The

plan sets out actions which are vague and lacking in detail, without defined targets or measurable timelines for delivery," they said.

"The new plan does not address the shortcomings which the Environmental Pillar, BirdWatch Ireland

and An Taisce highlighted in the draft plan. It is particularly concerning that the plan has not improved, despite a massive response from the Irish public calling for an ambitious plan through the national public consultation. Over 2,400 sub-

missions from members of the public called for a strong and effective plan to save the Hen Harrier.

"The plan fails to define targets at a national or population level that will ensure that Ireland's Hen Harrier population is restored to levels that ensure its survival into the future (i.e., favourable conservation status). In effect it is a road map without a clear destination.

"The loss of habitat for nesting and foraging, and other pressures associated with the afforestation of our uplands is known to be one of the main threats to Hen Harriers. Although the plan recognises this, it unfortunately fails to set out clear targets or a mechanism for restoration of habitats needed for the recovery of the species; without these, it is difficult to have faith that the plan will deliver any meaningful change for Hen Harriers and upland biodiversity.

"As the largest landowner in the Special Protection Areas that are designated for the protection of the Hen Harrier, Coillte has a golden opportunity to be a champion for these amazing birds by committing to ceasing reforestation of its plantations and restoring its afforested peatlands. But after 10 years of round-table discussion led by government, there is no detail in the Plan whatsoever on these critical actions which would deliver significant benefits to the Hen Harrier and other wildlife, water quality and climate; and also on the State's obligations to the Hen Harrier Threat Response Plan, the Climate Action Plan and the National Land Use Review."

John Lusby, Raptor Conservation Officer with BirdWatch Ireland, said: "The Hen Harrier is the canary in the coalmine for our upland ecosystems, and it is incredibly sad to think that many of our uplands can no longer sustain Hen Harrier populations. These are supposed to be some of our wildest and most important areas for biodiversity but clearly this is not the case, due to the loss of heath, blanket bog and grassland habitats and the associated declines of species like Curlew and Skylark, among others. We have been on record to say that the Hen Harrier Threat Response Plan would be a litmus test for wider nature restoration. Unfortunately, the plan as published does not pass that test and is a missed opportunity for this iconic bird and a disappointing start to plans for nature restoration in Ireland."

Fintan Kelly, Agriculture and Land Use Policy and Advocacy Officer with the Environmental

Pillar, said: "While there are some potentially positive developments in the new plan, overall our hopes that the Hen Harrier Threat Response Plan would finally commit to necessary, urgent and decisive actions to deliver on the legal requirement of the Threat Response Plan to halt and reverse the known threats and pressures faced by the Hen Harrier have been dashed. It is impossible for us to support the plan, as many actions in their current form are too vague and not targeted enough to ensure real change, change that is urgently needed."

Dr. Elaine McGoff, Environmental Pillar spokesperson and Head of Advocacy with An Taisce, said: "Our role has always been to act as advocates for the best outcomes for the Hen Harrier, its habitats and the farming communities that support them. We remain committed to ensuring that an effective threat response plan is delivered for the Hen Harrier and upland com-

munities and will continue to advocate for the necessary actions to save this iconic bird. The current draft plan and the status of the Hen Harrier and its habitats represents an unacceptable failure by the State, to deliver on both Irish and EU law in respect of the species and its habitats. We will not allow the Government to quietly quit on this incredible bird species.

"In order to restore Ireland's Hen Harrier population, we believe any plan must: Protect all nationally important Hen Harrier breeding and wintering grounds from afforestation, forest management activities, wind energy development and other pressures; Restore habitat across all nationally important breeding and wintering sites using clear restoration targets and timelines; Guarantee long-term support for farmers through well-funded results-based schemes across all nationally important breeding and wintering grounds."

*A local group's mission to re-open the Cliff Walk*

A small group of Greystones residents, who say they are fed up and frustrated by Wicklow County Council's lack of progress in re-opening the Bray to Greystones Cliff Walk, have taken the matter into their own hands.

The Cliff Walk has been closed for three years due to rock falls and land slippage and is now very overgrown in parts.

Peter Murtagh, Dermot Dwyer, Donal Flynn and Adam Kelly started the clean up two Saturdays ago and say they have been overwhelmed with the positive response received so far. A Facebook page, 'Friends of the Cliff Walk' has gained 500 members in less than a week and there have been thousands of posts and comments.

While grateful for the offers of support, they don't want people to just turn up to help. "We need to manage the numbers as we are using bush-cutters and powerful trimmers and the thing we don't need is an accident. So contact us by email or Facebook before turning up and we will put you to work."

It is believed that Bray Municipal District had gone to tender for some of the rock fall remediation work but Iarnrod Eireann are demanding that any contractor has at least €50 million indemnity insurance.

On the Greystones side there is an issue with land slippage but Donal Flynn points out that a short term solution can overcome this: "We simply have to move inland for a few metres and lay sleepers for about 30 metres and it would be safe for walkers. They do this on many other walks and trails."

## Whitmore calls for Centralised Application System for Greystones schools for 2025

Social Democrats TD for Wicklow, Jennifer Whitmore, has written to the Minister for Education urging her to consider Greystones as one of the 'high-pressure' areas that a new proposed centralised school entry plan will be trialled for the 2025 school year.

"I welcome the news that the Minister for Education and her department are planning to trial a new centralised admissions process for secondary schools in some high-pressure areas for the 2025 school year. It is encouraging that the department have recognised that a centralised school entry plan like this is needed in order to avoid the chaos that we saw in relation to secondary school places in Greystones this year," commented Deputy Whitmore.

"I have written to the Minister for Education asking for an update on how plans for this proposed trial are progressing and urging the Department of Education to consider including Greystones as one of the areas that this new process will be trialled," added Ms Whitmore.

"We cannot see a repeat of this year's school places crisis in Greystones again next year. The stress and worry that so many families and children

went through over the lack of secondary school places is unacceptable. Some children only received their school places a week before the school term started, after a summer of not knowing if they'd be able to start secondary school with the rest of their friends," explained Ms Whitmore, who is the Social Democrats spokesperson for Children.

"The schools in Greystones worked tirelessly last year to resolve the shortfall in school places and now it is time for the Department of Education to step up and find a solution to this annual problem and chaos surrounding secondary school applications. My office has already been contacted by local parents who are concerned about the 2025 enrolment process, and I believe that the inclusion of Greystones in this centralised school entry plan could help with their concerns. I will continue to work with and support parents and our local schools on this and other matters," concluded Deputy Whitmore.

# New 12-classroom school building in Kilcoole

The new build will be a "massive uplift and improvement" to the school's capacity and to families across the area, An Taoiseach Simon Harris has said.

The Taoiseach said: "I am thrilled to announce Kilcoole Primary School has had their new 12-classroom new build approved to go to construction. Alongside this construction there will be 4 class extensions to the existing St Anthony's

Building. This development will be massive improvement on the current capacity and will no doubt be welcomed by parents of children in the school.

"As Taoiseach I have been working hard to deliver for families and for

schools across the country. Our children need state of the art, upgraded and spacious school facilities. Wicklow has long dealt with school places shortages but I am determined to see an end to school shortages in the county.

"Announcements like

these are a huge relief to hundreds of families in the area and show that this Government is taking action when it comes to education. It is so important that all schools in County Wicklow are able to provide for all children and cater for each of their needs.

"As a TD for Wicklow I have always placed a priority on education and on school builds. Speaking to parents across the County that we have so

much more to do for schools, it's clear there is so much more to be done to improve our educational facilities and we are making significant progress in this area.

"As a local TD I will continue to work with schools and principals to

represent their needs in Government and provide for extra capacity to meet Wicklow's growing population.

Minister Stephen Donnelly also welcomed the news, saying "Kilcoole, just like many other parts of Wicklow, is a

growing community and this will ensure that we have the primary education capacity needed in Kilcoole over the coming years. I've worked hard to press the Department of Education to deliver on this and other school projects in Wicklow.

"This is an important step in the process of delivering school places for our children, and I will continue to ensure that we can now get all the necessary work complete and get the diggers and boots on the ground to deliver this school project."

# 'Some Wicklow class sizes are still too big'

Jennifer Whitmore TD has warned that although primary school class sizes do appear to be in a downward trend nationally, there are still many classes across Wicklow with 30 or more children in them.

Based on data from the National School Annual Census compiled by the Department of Education, almost a third of the 82 Wicklow schools included in the census, had classes of 30 or more students. Under Department of Education guidelines these classes are considered to be oversized.

"Nationally we do seem to be seeing an overall reduction in primary school class sizes, but we still have a long way to go in comparison to other European Union member states who average between 18 and 23 children per a class," commented Deputy Whitmore, who is the Social Democrats spokesperson for Children.

"Almost a third of our primary schools in Wicklow have classes where there are over 30 children. Some of these classes have 34 children in them, 11 pupils more than the current rate of 23 children per a teacher used by the

Department to allocate teaching positions to schools.

"Out of 82 Wicklow Primary schools only 14 schools had classes where their largest class size was 23 students or less. Over 80% of the schools had classes of 25 or more children, far exceeding the recommended international best-practice guideline of 20.

"These larger class sizes impact children, teachers, SNAs and school staff and need to be addressed. Circumstances such as the teacher shortage, combined with an increase in demand for school places and the lack of permanent classroom accommodation for some schools are exasperating the situation and making it almost impossible for schools to reduce class sizes.

"In some schools we are seeing class sizes increase as schools are having to take drastic actions to deal with the current teacher shortage. I have been contacted by con-

cerned parents from one Wicklow school where class groups have had to be combined to form larger 4th and 5th classes due to a lack of teachers. The Department of Education needs to be proactive and offer greater supports for schools struggling to fill teaching positions and urgently address issues with the procurement and building of permanent classroom accommodation."

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# Progress made in establishment of Neuro-Rehabilitation Centre in Bray

Jennifer Whitmore TD has welcomed news from the HSE that progress is being made in the establishment of the long-awaited Neuro Rehabilitation Centre in Bray. Deputy Whitmore has received confirmation from the HSE that positions for this team will be advertised this month with the recruitment process taking place over the autumn and they hope to have established this Community Neuro Rehabilitation Team in early 2025.

"This is a very welcome and encouraging development for the families and patients who have been waiting so long for the establishment of this community-based service. We now have a clear timeline with a date set for the establishment of a Community Neuro Rehabilitation Team in Bray, which will service the needs of East Wicklow

and South Dublin," commented Deputy Whitmore. Recruitment for the planned CH06 (East Wicklow/South Dublin) Neuro Rehabilitation team had been signed off on in May 2023 but was subsequently delayed by the HSE hiring freeze. Following the end of this hiring freeze in July, Deputy Whitmore wrote to the HSE asking for an

update on the status of the recruitment process. In a response from the HSE it was confirmed that following a consultation process with unions on these new development roles, recruitment for the team should commence in September. "I would like to commend the Neurological Alliance of Ireland (NAI) on their tireless campaigning to see the estab-

lishment of community rehabilitation teams for neurological patients in Wicklow and across the country. Their determination to ensure that this essential community healthcare service is available to patients will allow hundreds of people across Wicklow to access rehabilitation services following stroke and brain injuries as well as Parkinson's patients and

others in need of physical or speech therapy," added Deputy Whitmore. "I will continue to closely follow the progress being made on the establishment of the Community Neuro Rehabilitation Team in Bray and ask for regular updates on the early 2025 opening date. Ensuring that this team are in place as soon as possible needs to be a priority for the

HSE so that neurological patients in Wicklow can receive the care and treatment that they need within their community. "I will also continue to advocate for the speedy establishment of a team for West Wicklow to ensure that this service is available for all who need it across Wicklow. This is a key priority of mine," concluded Deputy Whitmore.

# Casey welcomes Govt crackdown on disposable vapes

Fianna Fáil Senator Pat Casey has welcomed proposals brought to Cabinet by his party colleague Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly that would ban the sale of disposable vapes.

The proposals would also restrict the sale of flavoured vapes, which often appeal to children, as well as ban point-of-sale advertising displays in shops other than specialised outlets that only sell vapes.

Senator Casey said: "Disposable vapes are a blight on our environment. They are hazardous if not recycled properly and they can be seen littered across the country, in all of our communities, in

even the most remote locations.

"It is well documented that they have a detrimental impact on the climate and our biodiversity as the lithium batteries within these vapes are very toxic form of litter and could be releasing toxic compounds into the environment.

"For both environmental and public health reasons, ban-

ning disposable vapes is a hugely important step that will protect younger people in particular, who often impulse by them in shops and experiment with them."

Senator Casey said it is welcome that the legislation will tackle advertising displays, packaging and flavours, as these are targeted at younger people.

He said: "The bright colours and imagery used to promote flavoured vapes are used to attract young people into impulse purchases. By introducing plain packaging for vapes we will reduce their appeal to youth and non-users, and by banning point of sale advertising displays we will reduce 'gateway' vaping among young people.

"The efforts of Minister Donnelly to tackle the scourge of youth vaping must be applauded. My party colleagues and I in Fianna Fáil recognise that nicotine is a highly addictive drug, and we are acting to make these products less accessible to our young people and to remove them from their everyday lives."

# 'Govt needs to address crisis in public dentistry as a priority'

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has revealed that information provided to him by Frances O'Callaghan, the Chief Dental Surgeon, reveals that the number of dental practices in the East Wicklow area who are currently signed up to the dental treatment services scheme (DTSS) now stands at a mere nine. He described public dentistry as being in a state of crisis and called on the government to make it a priority.

Deputy Brady said: "Despite the fact that I have called repeatedly for this issue to be addressed here in Wicklow, it appears that my appeals are falling on deaf ears. There are three government TDs in Wicklow. Including the Taoiseach and the Minister for Health. Yet they are content to completely ignore the running down of the DTSS.

"Such is the government's indifference on the issue, the question needs to be asked as to whether they are intent on running down the service, and forcing a private dental system on patients, many of whom would be denied access to dental services due to the prohibitive cost

of such measures. The Irish Dental Association is on record as saying that the current DTSS does not allow them to provide the level of service that their patients need.

"According to reports there are now at least 252 fewer dentists signed up to the scheme that there was last year. This is a trend which we can anticipate will continue, as the government continues to ignore the problem. Across Wicklow patients are struggling to get appointments, are being forced to travel further, or are forced to postpone visits to dentists.

"Under the current rules that govern the DTSS, patients are allowed a limited level of treatment to

save teeth, but the scheme allows for an unlimited number of tooth extractions. These rules are preventing dentists from offering the level of treatment which they want, and their patients need.

"This is completely unacceptable. It places unnecessary and undue hardship on the most vulnerable in our society. There are many families and workers who are being forced into debt to ensure that they and their families receive the dental treatment they need privately, more often than not at enormous cost.

"Regular dental care is also important in the identification and diagnosis of mouth cancers. If patients are unable to afford to

attend dentists as a result of the government's failure, this could also lead to life threatening health issues arising and being left untreated. Simon Harris and Stephen Donnelly cannot be allowed to continue to ignore this situation. Not only as it impacts on Wicklow, but it is a statewide issue that is now at crisis level.

"The government needs to act immediately to address this issue, particularly at a time when they are leaking left right and centre about how they are going to spend billions in order to buy the next election. They need to prioritise the needs of people above their own ambitions."

# €1.4m allocated to Tiglin

## Aftercare programme and residential facilities launched

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly has allocated €1.4m to Tiglin and has also officially launched Tiglin's aftercare programme and residential facilities at Coolnagreina for women in addiction.

Minister Donnelly, a long time supporter of Tiglin's addiction services, has today launched the next phase of services for women in addiction. The €1.4m allocated will lead to a new 12-bed facility for women who have completed Tiglin's programme.

The same facility includes a unique aftercare service and therapeutic programme which Minister Donnelly allocated annual funding to from 2022. This service provides youth workers and staff, including a children's therapist and

family psychotherapist. Minister Donnelly spent the morning of Friday 6th September with service users, staff and volunteers. Speaking at the launch he said: "The team at Tiglin deserve huge credit and our on-going support for

the work they do. This latest innovation is focused at supporting women in addiction and in recovery. The 12-bedded unit will make a huge difference. The added benefit of the aftercare programme is what's really making this a success for service users and their families.

"The people I meet coming through Tiglin's services are some of the strongest women and men I've ever met. The Tiglin team, the staff and volunteers, are some of the best people I've ever met. It's an honour to be able to provide State support for what they do.

"I have no doubt that the Tiglin team will continue to innovate, continue to provide new and important supports for those who need them and I wish them the very best with their endeavours."

Currently, Tiglin boasts a youth café, spaces for community use such as drama groups, and a bakery that services the needs of the café and brings training and employment opportunities for residents. Tiglin is also currently providing accommodation for many Ukrainian refugees.

From 11 am to 4 pm, the grounds will be buzzing with activity. See the bees close at hand in the observation hives, and chat to our beekeepers who are always happy to answer any questions you may have. There are plants and flowers for sale, organic produce, handmade soaps
