

Greystones community launches fundraiser to honour beloved local legend Bridie Mooney

Greystones Town Team and Greystones Tidy Towns have come together to launch a special community fundraiser in memory of one of the town's most treasured figures - Bridie Mooney.

Bridie ran Mooney's shop on Trafalgar Road - a small store that became the heart of the community. Whether it was coal, cleaning supplies, handmade furniture, or a wellearned treat after school, Bridie had it all. But more than what she sold. it was how she showed up - every single day with warmth, care, and an open heart, that made her so loved by generations of local families.

To celebrate her incredible contribution to the town, funds are now being raised for a 9fthigh corten steel totem to be installed at Greystones Railway Station. The totem will feature a beautiful portrait of Mrs. Mooney by Greystonesbased artist Tom Byrne and serve as a permanent reminder of the role she played in the life of the town.

'Tenant in Situ cuts will Fine Gael council drive up homelessness'

John Brady TD has hit out at the Fianna Fáil. Fine Gael, and Lowry Government for slashing funding to the Tenant in Situ scheme - a move that has led to Wicklow County Council suspending new applications to the scheme, putting families at serious risk of homelessness.

Speaking following confirmation from Wicklow County Council, Brady said: "The decision to suspend the Tenant in Situ scheme in will have devastating consequences for vulnerable households. This follows the Government's cynical cuts and changes to the scheme ó changes that are not only heartless but will actively drive more people into homelessness

"Wicklow County Council has any new applications and is awaiting clarity from Minister James Housing. This delay and uncertainty will push families over the edge. people from losing their homes. In reached the highest level ever doned.

2023, it prevented 26 households in Wicklow from becoming homeless. So far in 2024, up to November, a further 18 households were saved Wicklow is deeply alarming and from homelessness thanks to this scheme.

"That is the kind of impact that proper funding and political will can deliver - real, tangible support for people who are at risk. Cutting that lifeline is cruel, and Minister James Brown must urgently reconsider this position. "This is a deeply cynical and short-sighted move. It will not reduce the need for housing - it will only reduce the number of people who are able to stay in their homes. That's the simple truth. The Tenant in Situ scheme must be fully reinstated, and proper funding provided to Wicklow County Council without delay. We need real action, not more excuses. Families in Wicklow deserve to be protected, not aban-

Whitmore calls for action on Uisce Eireann issues

Speaking in the Dáil recently, Social Democrats TD, Jennifer Whitmore, addressed the numerous local issues with Uisce Eireann, highlighting the systemic failures and calling for urgent government action.

"Despite the significant investment and political will behind Uisce Eireann, they continue to struggle with basic issues," Deputy Whitmore

"In my constituency, there were multiple issues last year alone with Uisce Eireann. Over Christmas, a pump failure in Bray allowed sewage to be pumped onto the beach for four days. This led to the cancellation of the annual charity swim and meant that people could not swim in the sea for five days in Bray. There were also sewage leaks into the harbour at Greystones during this period, which led Wicklow County Council to prohibit swimming at Greystones Harbour Environs, Greystones Cove Beach and Greystones South Beach,' Deputy Whitmore explained.

"There were also issues with the Three Trouts River in Greystones last year where sewage flowing into the river turned the water grey and people in the surrounding area were not leaving their homes due to the smell. There were serious concerns around the wildlife living in the river at this time. Deputy Whitmore noted.

"At the moment, there are ongoing odour issues around the wastewater plants in Greystones and the Murrough. These are simple things that should be resolved, yet there's no indication that Uisce Eireann is on top of it, despite public calls for

"In 2023, Uisce Eireann reported 1,141 short-duration environmental incidents, half of which were due to equipment breakdowns and mainte-

nance issues. Many of the issues that they report are small, once-off, easy fixes. For example, alarms not going off when a pump stops or a generator fails. These are not large-scale infrastructure failures; they are basic issues that Uisce Eireann should be able to fix. Staff on the ground are doing their best to address these issues but there is a lack of focus on a senior level impeding them," Deputy Whitmore continued.

"There are too many instances where Uisce Eireann is not meeting the standard that we need from our highly invested in and highly resourced national water company The government needs to ensure that, when Uisce Eireann is tasked with a job, they do that job and do it properly," Deputy Whitmore concluded.

'This is not a solution'

Progress has been made regarding a new service to provide public transport access to Dublin Airport for North Wicklow residents, Tanaiste Simon Harris TD said.

Greystones, Kilcoole, and Delgany without a direct public transport link to the airport

Following direct engagement by the Tánaiste, the National Transport Authority (NTA) has approved an application by Wexford Bus to serve additional stops, most notably Kilmacanogue, on its route.

Greystones Councillor Lourda Scott was less than entghusiastic about this news, however: "I say we should be doing far better than that," she said. "Not only is this impossible for those with early morning or late-night flights, but is simply not a viable option for any vulnerable travellers. In addition a car will be needed to get to the stop in the first place.

In a statement, the Tanaiste said: "I am delighted to announce that significant progress has been made in relation to public transport access for residents in the north of County Wicklow who want to fly from Dublin Airport.

"This progress follows Air-coach's regrettable decision to end their 702 service which previously served both Bray and Greystones, leaving many residents without a public transport option to access Dublin Airport.

"As soon as I became aware of the service cancellation back in February, I immediately sought alternative solutions to support the affected communities. I would like to commend Wexford Bus for their receptiveness and constructive approach to my enquiries, and I can now announce that Wexford Bus has had their application to serve Kilmacanogue as an additional stop has been granted by the NTA.

"The next step is for Wicklow

The decision by Aircoach to County Council give the green light withdraw its 702 service has left for this additional stop, and I will thousands of residents in Bray, continue to work to ensure this happens without delay.

The Tánaiste added: "I am sure that this announcement will be a great relief to many and will undoubtedly help holiday-goers as we move into the Summer months."

Cllr Scott had recently criticised the National Transport Authority (NTA) for its refusal to engage with local representatives and its failure to provide solutions to the loss of direct public transport between North Wicklow and Dublin Airport. She was also less than enthusiastic about the news that Wexford Bus being able to pick up passengers in Kilmacanogue

Councillor Scott brought a formal request. through Wicklow County Council and Greystones Municipal District Council for a meeting with the NTA to discuss replacing the service, along with other issues. This was refused. The NTA has also ruled out the possibility of introducing a Public Service Obligation (PSO) route to serve the affected areas.

Speaking on the matter recently, Cllr Scott said: "The NTA's reluctance to meet with elected representatives is very disappointing. We are best placed to know the needs of our community yet the very organisation responsible for public transport planning is refusing to engage with us. The NTA attended a Council meeting in October, however that was prior to the cancellation of the Aircoach service and indeed before the issues that have arisen with the new Bus Connects routes. If they are not willing to meet with Councillors in response to these problems, then who are they answering to?"

She also criticised the lack of

any concrete plan to replace the lost service, highlighting the significant difficulties now faced by many groups, including airport workers, all of whom relied on a direct and efficient airport link.

"This is a major public transport gap affecting over 60,000 people, and the NTA has dismissed the issue entirely. Instead of working towards a solution, the news that the Wexford Bus will be able to pick people up from Kilmacanoge is being touted as a win.

"North Wicklow is one of the largest commuter areas in the country, and public transport should reflect that. The refusal to engage with those raising the issue is completely unacceptable.

correspondence Greystones Municipal District Offices in March, the NTA stated "The NTA has no plans at present to provide a Public Service Obligation (PSO) direct bus between North Wicklow and Dublin Airport following the decision by Aircoach to withdraw their commercial service from the area. In terms of travel options between North Wicklow and Dublin Airport, there are a number of PSO services which are available via interchange with other services. Further information on these options can be assessed by visiting the TFI (Transport for Ireland) Journey Planner website or via the TFI Live app. It is also open to other commercial bus operators to seek a new operating licence or to amend an existing licence in order to deliver similar type services to those previously provided by Aircoach.

Cllr Scott is calling on the NTA to reconsider its stance and to properly assess the need for a direct airport connection from North Wicklow.

Remembering Bray's Eddie Jordan

The whole Formula One Grand Prix world stood still for three minutes at last month's Chinese Grand Prix, to watch and listen to a superb 3-minute tribute by Bono to Eddie Jordan, who died in Cape Town just three days earlier (20th March). Hundreds of millions watched it on TV.

Eddie was not born in Bray but spent a lot of his childhood there as his father, Paddy, was a Bray native and Paddy's sister Lilian was Eddie favourite aunt, who spoilt him rot-

He and his parents and sister Helen lived in Dartry, South Dublin, which was connected directly by train to Bray and Eddie would spend almost every weekend with spinster Aunt Lilian.

He loved Bray and the surrounds and learnt to drive the familyis Ford Anglia while his parents played golf in the old Bray golf course located beside the River Dargle

Eddie spent winters and summers in Bray and developed his love of motorsport from his Bray born cousin Noel Smith, a rally champion driver and solicitor.

The Rathdrum and Wicklow races were gone by the time Eddie was of driving age, but he competed at Hillclimbs at Callery (beside the Sugar Loaf), Enniskerry and elsewhere around the county.

His mother Eileen was a loyal member of Bray Golf Club and played into her 80s. What he achieved was simply amazing. He was a champion driver ñ winning the premier class Formula Atlantic Irish championship in 1978. In 1979 he left his ten year career at Bank of Ireland and emigrated to

become a professional driver in and spent his final three months in old. so he started his own race team and ran it very successfully in 1980s. In 1990 he put every penny he had - and a lot more - on starting his own Grand Prix team which had a largely glittering existence ñ winning multiple Grand Prix and almost winning the 1999 World Championships. The team were enabled to win thanks to Benson & Hedges sponsorship, then headed up by Greystones man Nigel Northridge

Speaking after the event. Wicklow Sinn Féin TD John Brady said: "Easter is a time of remembrance, but it is also a time of recommitment. Wicklow RNLI brings three people to safety after yacht gets into difficulty

Wicklow RNLI brought three people to safety on the evening of Monday 21st April after their vessel developed mechanical problems four miles south of Wicklow Harbour.

slipped its mooring at 8:50pm to reports of a yacht with three persons on board which had developed electrical issues leading to engine failure.

The volunteer lifeboat crew under the command of Coxswain Nicky Keogh located the vessel approximately 20 minutes after launching in a position four miles south of Wicklow Harbour. Conditions on scene were calm wind, with calm seas and good visibility

Once on scene, the volunteer crew assessed the situation. Given the fact that the yacht was unable to make safe progress without any wind and without any means of propulsion, a decision was made to establish a tow. The yacht was towed by the lifeboat to the

The all-weather lifeboat RNLB Bridie O'Shea nearest safe location which was Wicklow harbour. The vessel was secured alongside a short time later

and all 3 casualties were assessed as being ok with no further attention required.

Speaking after the callout Deputy LPO Connie O'Gara said "This was a quick response by the crew and that along with their training helped bring three people safely ashore and we wish them well.

"As we approach summer, we would like to remind people planning a trip at sea to ensure they have a suitable means of communication to be able to call for help should the need arise. Let someone know where you are going and when you are due back and if you get into trouble or see anyone in difficulty, dial 112 or 999 and ask for the Coast Guard.

Greystones Coast Guard Station 'plagued by delays'

Sinn Féin TD John Brady has voiced serious concern over what he describes as the complete mismanagement of public funds in relation to the long-delayed Greystones Coast Guard Station project at Greystones Harbour.

Commenting on the situation, Deputy Brady said: "Since planning permission was first granted by Wicklow County Council in 2020, the Greystones Coast Guard Station project has been plagued by a litany of delays. These include a complete redesign midway through the process, the need to submit fresh planning applications, and repeated setbacks that have caused mounting frustrationóboth among Coast Guard personnel and the wider community.

"Now, nearly five years later, we have yet to see any construction begin. I have received a breakdown of the project's costs from the Fianna Fail Minister, and I am

This level of expenditure, with no physical progress to show for it, is deeply alarming and raises serious questions about the oversight and management by the Department of Transport and the Office of Public Works

"The Coast Guard Station is not a luxury it is an essential piece of infrastructure that plays a critical role in protecting the lives of those along our coastline. The prolonged delays are putting both Coast Guard personnel and the local community at risk. At present, the Greystones unit remains stationed in a premises that is wholly unfit for purpose, while this cumbersome and costly process drags on.

"The tendering process is now finally nearing its conclusion. The OPW is expected frankly dismayed to learn that over to submit a tender assessment report and rec-

Transport by the end of April 2025, with a view to awarding the construction contract shortly thereafter. Construction costs are estimated to be in the region of Ä6million. However, given the protracted timeline, excessive spending, and the repeated obstacles faced, confidence in the OPW - both nationally and certainly here in Wicklow has been severely undermined.

"I will continue to hold both the Department of Transport and the OPW to account, to ensure that this project is moved swiftly to the construction phase. I will also be scrutinising all future expenditure to safeguard taxpayer money and will follow up directly with the Minister's department to demand transparency and accountability. This project has dragged on for far too long. Coast Guard, and the people of Greystones, deserve better.'



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












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
